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

The Exhibition will open at I p.m., Tuesday, November 14th. Each day during the continuation of the Exhibition the Hall will be open to the public from 8.30 a.m. until 10 p.m.


Members of the Ontario Fruit Growers Association, Ontario Bee Keepers Association, Horticultural Societies, Toronto Gardeners and Florists Association, Toronto Electoral District Society, and the Ontario Vegetable Growers Associations, on applying to the secretaries of their respective organizations, will be furnished membership tickets for fifty cents, which will entitle them to admittance at all times during the Exhibition. Until November 14th, the general public will be sold three coupon tickets for fifty cents. General admittance will be; adults 25 cents, children 10 cents.

RAILWAY RATES

Arrangements have been made with all railroads in Ontario, whereby delegates purchasing a first-class single fare ticket to Toronto, will be returned free, if three hundred or more in attendance holding Standard Certificates; or for one-third single fare, if fifty or more in attendance holding Standard Certificates. Certificates must be endorsed by the Secretary at the Exhibition in Massey Hall before they will be honored by the railways for the return ticket. RULES-Fruit Exhibits

- I. Entries close Tuesday, November 7th.
- 2. Entrance fees in Fruit Department; single entries up to four, 25 cents each; five entries, \$1; all additional entries 10 cents each.
- 3. Competitors can make only one entry and receive only one premium in each section.
- 4. All exhibits must be correctly named and properly labelled.
- 5. The names of exhibitors will not be allowed on the exhibits until the prizes have been awarded.
- 6. All fruit must be delivered to Massey Hall, Toronto, on or before Monday, November 13th.
- 7. All articles once in the hall are under the control and subject to the order of the Superintendent in charge of the Department, and cannot be removed or withdrawn without permission, until the close of the Exhition.
- 8. Exhibitors are requested to furnish the Superintendent, as soon as they arrive with a list of their entries, so that proper space may be reserved.
- 9. All packages forwarded prior to the time of the Exhibition should be addressed to Toronto Cold Storage Co., care of P. W. Hodgetts. Such packages will be taken care of, free of charge, till required.
- 10. Transportation charges to Toronto on all exhibits will be paid by the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association. It is provided, however, that all prize winning packages shall become the property of the Association.
- II. All entries must be made on the printed forms accompanying the Prize List. These forms are to be signed and filled in by the Exhibitor and sent to P. W. Hodgetts, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, before November 7th.
- 12. The entrance fee must in all cases be forwarded with the entry No entry be accepted unless this is done. Fees may be sent by Post Office Order, Postal Note, Express Order, or in bills by registered letter.



RULES-Floral Exhibits

- 1. Entries must be made to the Secretary, on or before November 7th, and state distinctly each and every premium they compete for. This rule will be strictly adhered to.
- 2. All plants and flowers must be correctly and conspicuously named.
- 3. No exhibit can be staged until the exhibitor has furnished the Secretary with a full list of all exhibits offered, whether for competition or exhibition only.
- 4. Entries not made according to schedule will be disqualified.
- All plants and cut chrysanthemums must be staged, and ready for judging, before 12 o'clock noon, Tuesday, November 14th.
- 6. Carnations will be staged the second day, November 15th, by 12 o'clock noon. Roses, violets, and all made up work, the third day, November 16th, by 12 o'clock noon. The Superintendent will commence sharply each day at 9 a.m., and all exhibits not ready when called for must take their chance for position.
- 7. All exhibits must be the bona-fide property of the exhibitor, and all exhibits (except made-up work), must be grown by exhibitor and be in his possession three months before date of show.
- 8. Exhibits will be entered and staged by numbers. Cards corresponding with entries will be furnished the exhibitors, who alone will be responsible for the placing of them. After the awards are made the Secretary will attach the names of exhibitors.
- 9. No competitor shall receive more than one premium in each section for which he competes.
- 10. No person except those appointed by the Committee will be allowed to interfere with the judges whilst they are performing their duties.
- 11. Exhibitor not member of either the Toronto Horticultural Society, Electoral District Society, or Gardener and Florist Association, will be required to become a member of one of the societies on payment of one dollar.
- 12. Plants must be exhibited in clean pots; all pots where size is specified must be inside measurement.
- 13. Cut flowers must be exhibited in uniform vases provided by the Association.
- 14. Each exhibitor will be allowed to place one printed card on each exhibit, all cards to be white, size 5x4 inches, containing name and address only. Exhibitors of groups will be allowed to place one card, 8x10 inches, on each exhibit.
- 15. The judges are authorized to withhold or modify the prizes if the articles are considered unworthy, also to recommend Certificates of Merit subject to the approval of the Committee. Judges' decisions in all cases shall be final, except it can be proved the printed rules have been violated.
- 16. Protests must be made to the Committee, in writing, before ten o'clock in the morning after the prize tickets are placed, and must be accompanied by two dollars, to be returned should the protest be allowed.
- 17. The Superintendent shall have power to exclude all exhibitors and their employees from the Hall during the judging, should be think it necessary.
- The Committee of Arrangements desire to impress upon the Exhibitors the importance of carrying out all regulations.

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


