RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Membership—All members who have paid up their subscriptions of not less than one dollar for the current year are entitled to enter and exhibit for prizes, as hereinafter stated. Non-members must enclose \$1.00 with their entries.
2. All entries (except for speeding) must be made before 8 p.m. on 30th September. All entries in Poultry made on Fair Day will be charged 25c for each entry. All entries in other classes will be charged 25 cents for each entry on Fair Days. This rule will be positively enforced.
3. Holders of member's tickets and their families can make one entry. For each additional entry in horses and cattle, 25c; sheep and pigs, 15c; poultry and all other classes, 10c.
4. All entries must be made on the forms of the Society supplied by the Secretary free of charge.
5. All entries in stock must be made by the bona-fide owner, and in

thoroughbreds and pure bred cattle, sheep and pigs, certificates must be produced of entry in stud book at the time of entry and to the Judges on the ground. The exact age of horses will be calculated to the first of January Member's Ticket for 1921.

6. All Grains, Fruits, Roots and Vegetables entered must be actually a ry, 1920, and for Cattle and Pigs to the first of September, 1920. raised by the exhibitor, and the growth of the present year, unless otherwise specified. The correct name must be put on every article exhibited. Dairy produce must be the manufacture or produce of the exhibitor. All exhibitors of grain must show samples of grain in straw.

7. In stock and poultry the exhibitor may compete for more than one prize in each section, unless otherwise specified. No animal shall win more than one Society prize and one Special unless otherwise specified in the prize list. No stallion shall be allowed to show in any harness class. No exhibitor shall compete for more than one prize or exhibit the same article in more than one section for Grain, Roots, Vegetables, Dairy Produce, Manufactured Articles and Ladies' Work, unless otherwise specified; nor will anything found in the regular list be allowed to be entered as an extra. Anyone to whom a first prize is awarded may have a diploma in lieu thereof.

8. In all departments, unless otherwise specified in the list, the lists are open to the Dominion.

9. All entry and prize tickets must remain on all articles and animals while on exhibition. No ticket, medal or other award of any former exhibition, or name of exhibitor, or any mark by which the ownership of the exhibit can be made known, will be allowed on any animal or article until the Judges have completed their awards.

10. Animals not ready for judging at the proper time will forfeit right of competition.

11. All protests against the decision of the Judges or against an exhibit must be made and declared to the Secretary in writing within 24 hours, stating the cause of protest, and must be signed by the complainant and accompanied by five dollars, which will be forfeited to the Society if the protest be not sustained. All protests shall be referred to the Protest Committee, which shall have full power to investigate the same and report to the Board of protest with the report thereon shall be entered in a book kept for the pur-Directors for approval, which if confirmed by them shall be final, and the pose.

12. While the Directors will take every reasonable precaution to insure the safety of animals or articles exhibited, they wish it to be distinctly understood that owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them, and should any animal or article be actually injured, lost, stolen or strayed, the Directors will give every assistance in their power towards the recovery of the lost stolen, or strayed article or animal, but will make no payment in whole or part value thereof. The Directors will take every precaution to prevent accidents, but will not hold themselves responsible for any accident on the fair grounds.

13. Tents or booths for the sale of intoxicating liquors, all kinds of gambling or montebank performances are prohibited in accordance with Statute 31, Vic. Chapter 58.

14. JUDGES AND THEIR DUTIES—1st, the Judges shall report themselves to the Secretary as soon as they arrive on the grounds, when they will receive the necessary information. 2nd, in the absence of competition in any section or if the stock or article is of inferior quality, the judges are instructed and desired to award only such premiums as they think the article judged is deserving of; they will exercise their discretion as to whether they will award a first, second or any premium. The judges are to act with the utmost impartiality, and are not to award or recommend prizes in any class unless the animals come up to the desired standard of excellence. 3rd, under "Extra Entries" in each class, when more than one entry of the same kind or article has been made, the judges shall judge as in competition the same as the regular sections, or when but one entry has been made, the article if worthy shall be recommended only. The Judges shall make, or cause to be made, their entries in a clear and distinct manner, in all cases of doubt referring

to the Secretary or Director, and when their reports are completed will sign the book and return to the Secretary.

15. No exhibitor shall be allowed to be present while the judges are discharging duties. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with the Judges, Directors, the Officers of the Society, or who shall on the premises use any contemptuous or abusive language to any Judge, Director or Officer, shall forfeit his right to any premiums to which he may be entitled. All disqualifications in this and the next following rules may be published with their awards. No Directors will be allowed to have charge of any class in which he is an Exhibitor.

16. Upon the discovery of any fraud, deception or dishonest practice, either in the preparation or ownership, or any fraudulent representation concerning any article exhibited, the Director shall have the power to withhold the payment of any or all premiums awarded to the exhibitor proved to be guilty of such offence.

17. Any members or exhibitor giving or lending his ticket to any person for the purpose of getting on the grounds without paying entrance fee, or the purpose of imposing on the Society in any way, will deprive him of all rights to which he would be entitled and forfeit any prize which may be awarded him.

18. The grounds will be open on the first day of the Exhibition at 7 o'clock a.m. for the reception of exhibits from Class XXV. to L., inclusive, which must be on the grounds at 10 o'clock, that the Judges may proceed with the judging. All Live Stock except poultry by 12 a.m. second day, no exhibit to be removed before 5 o'clock on second day of Fair or prize will be forfeited.

19. All moneys received by mail for exhibit will be acknowledged by post card by the Secretary. All entry and Exhibition Tickets will be retained at the office until called for.

20. All persons entitled to receive premiums must apply to the Secretary, who will give orders on the Treasurer for the amount awarded; but should the weather prove unfavorable, the Society reserves the right to retain a percentage of all prize money, such percentage not being more than fifty per cent. of the amount awarded. The Treasurer will commence to pay out prize money on and after the 18th of October. All orders for prize money must be presented on or before the 31st day of December, or the prize will be forfeited. One dollar will be retained on all prizes of \$5 and upwards for Member's Ticket for 1920.

21. The Board of Directors will meet at eight o'clock on the first day of the Fair at the office on the grounds, and also on Saturday, the 16th of October, at the Secretary's Office, at one o'clock, to close the business of the exhibition and confirm the prize list.

22. Admission to the grounds—First Day: Members on presenting their tickets free; non-members 25c each; children under twelve years, 10 cents. Second day: Adults 25c; children 15c, grand stand 15c. Judges and members of the press will be furnished badges. Horse stalls 50c; cattle stalls, 25c; sheep and pig pens, 15c. Two horses and carriage, when not for exhibition, will be admitted into the grounds on payment of 50c for vehicle; autos 50c; single horse and carriage, 25c; saddle horse, 25c; usual fee for each occupant or rider each day. Such carriages will take position on the grounds as directed by the managers. No furious driving will be allowed. For violation of this rule any horse or team will positively be removed from the grounds. The entry ticket upon animals will admit the person bringing them to the Fair Grounds for exhibition free. Autos will not be permitted to run on the grounds.

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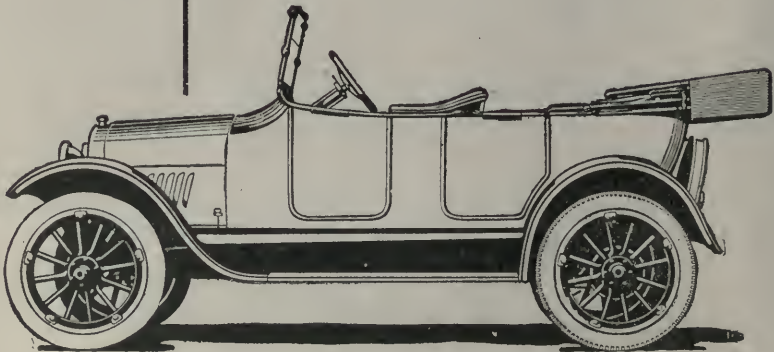

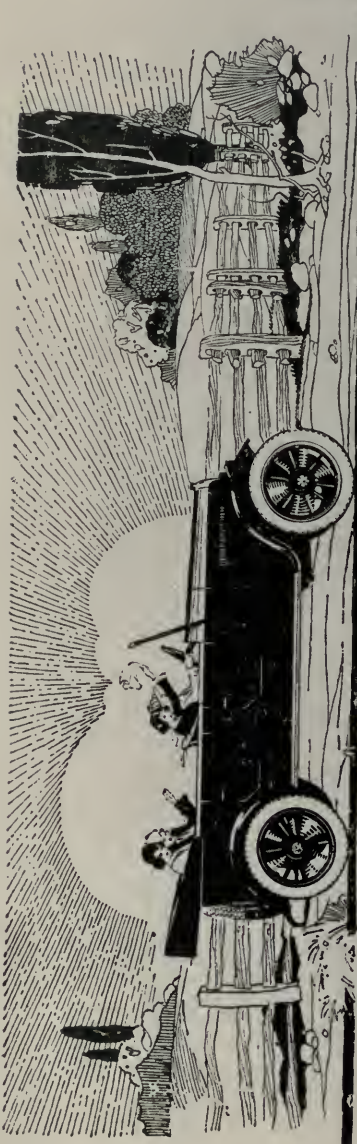

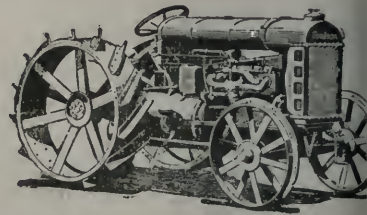

The big feature of activity this year has been the combined efforts of all sixteen branches as expressed in the establishment of the school nurse project. This began on April 12th and up to vacation time 33 schools were visited, 963 pupils inspected and some 80 home visits made. - INGLEWOOD**—School Fair booth, furnishing cots in Gordon Home.
- MALTON**—Dental clinic, work among blind soldiers.
- MEADOWVALE**—Specialized in making returned men welcome and comfortable.
- PORT CREDIT**—Work on all projects, study of Canadian history.
- SANDHILL**—Attention to relief work at home and abroad, successful play.
- SNELGROVE**—Games for schools, plays, short course in sewing.
- STREETSVILLE**—The new Red Cross work, play, short course in Home Nursing.

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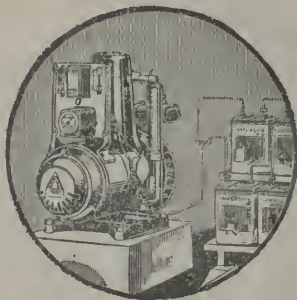

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WHEN AUTUMN COMES

Autumn brings with it a lot of tasks that belong peculiarly to the fall of the year. Some of these are the work that come simply because it's Autumn, the time of harvest—of garnering.

Some of these tasks come because Winter is following along on the heels of Autumn and preparation must be made before the icy blasts come, for the shut-in days and the long nights of the winter season.

Autumn is the time to get everything snug—to replace all broken window panes, to put back into place the cellar windows, to get the winter's fuel supply housed in a good, dry place if that has not already been taken care of earlier in the season.

When the evenings begin to lengthen and indications come again of the long evenings that are ahead, it is a good time to think about the lighting system and to decide whether the present lighting system is good enough for the

coming winter. If this is the old, coal-oil-lamp system, it will pay to investigate the subject of electricity for lighting the farm or suburban home. Electricity can be had for lighting, nowadays, in any locality, by means of one of the small individual electric plants and the farmer who will put one of these to work on his premises will be sure of modern lights for the long winter evenings ahead.

But he should not wait until winter to plan for it. Electric lights mean electric wiring, the same as for a house in the city. An electric plant will require a concrete base for a support and this should be made while the work can be done in comfort. It is a mean job mixing concrete in the winter time and while it is a small one to make a base for the lighting plant, it's smaller than ever if it is made during nice autumn weather. And many thousand farmers and their families are declaring that it makes autumn more enjoyable to be able to look forward to winter evenings with plenty of bright electric light in the home instead of the coal oil lamps.

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
