With a whiney, piney, shower of briney, heigho! Odear me!


He next went to the workhouse, alas! poor boy! Heigho! O dear me!

Blacker than the sootiest sweep,


Blacker than the shiny beetles

Never stain yourselves with ink.









# THROWING STONES.
