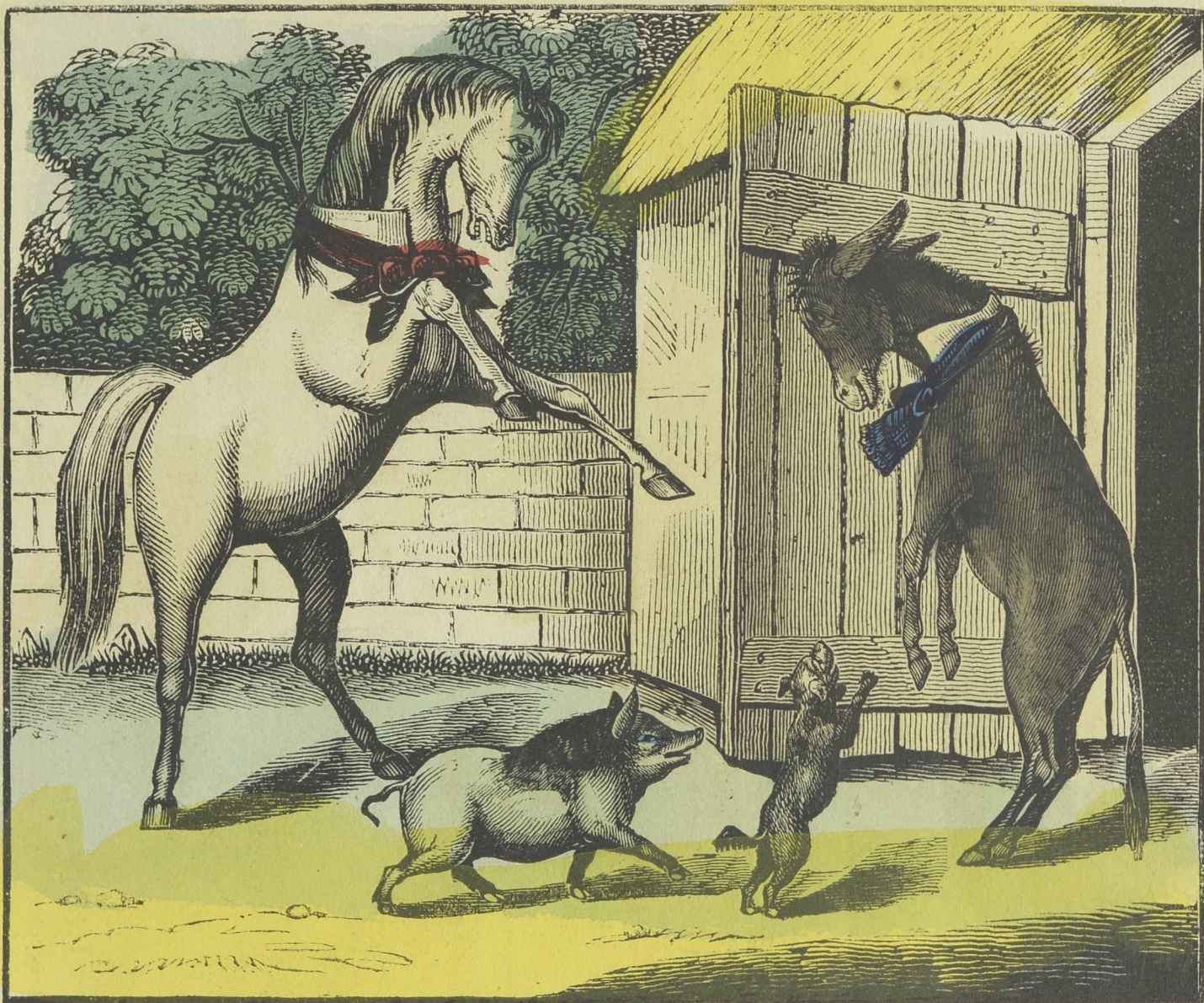

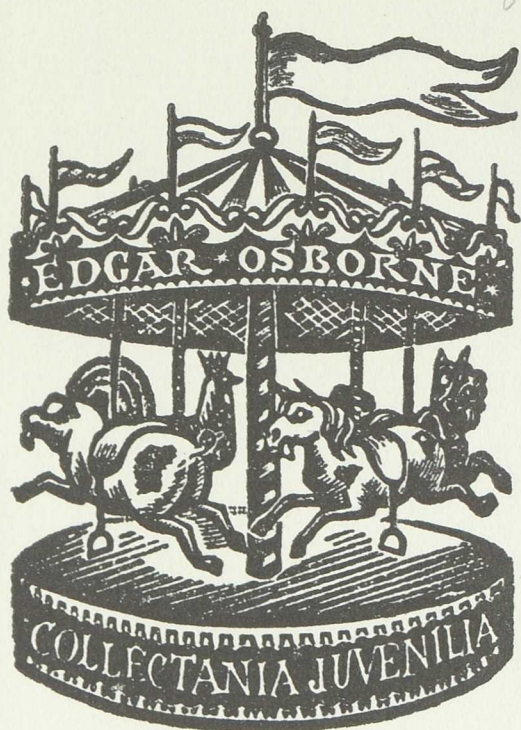
THERE lived in the country, a Donkey, whose

To show all his friends the first lesson in dancing;

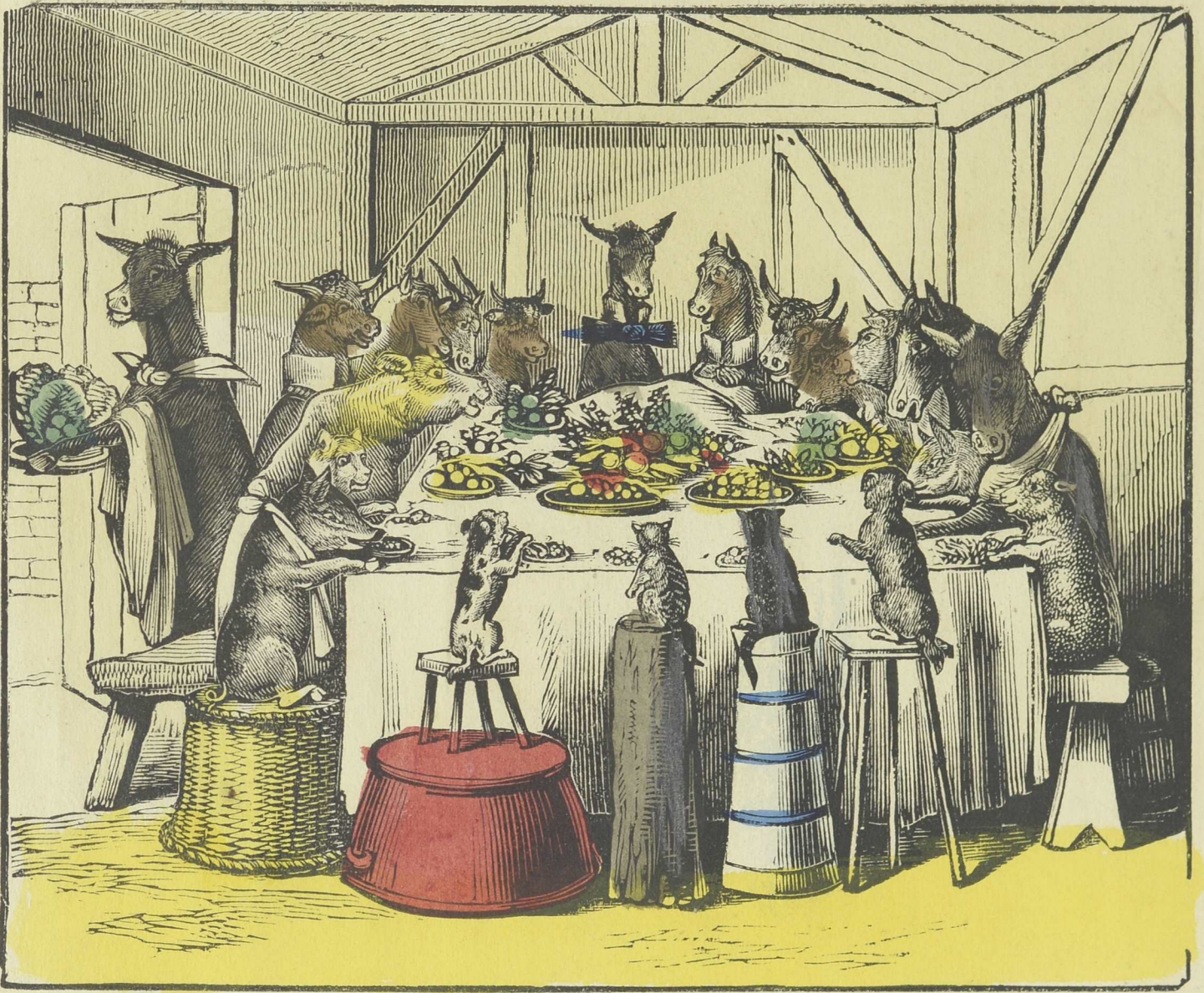
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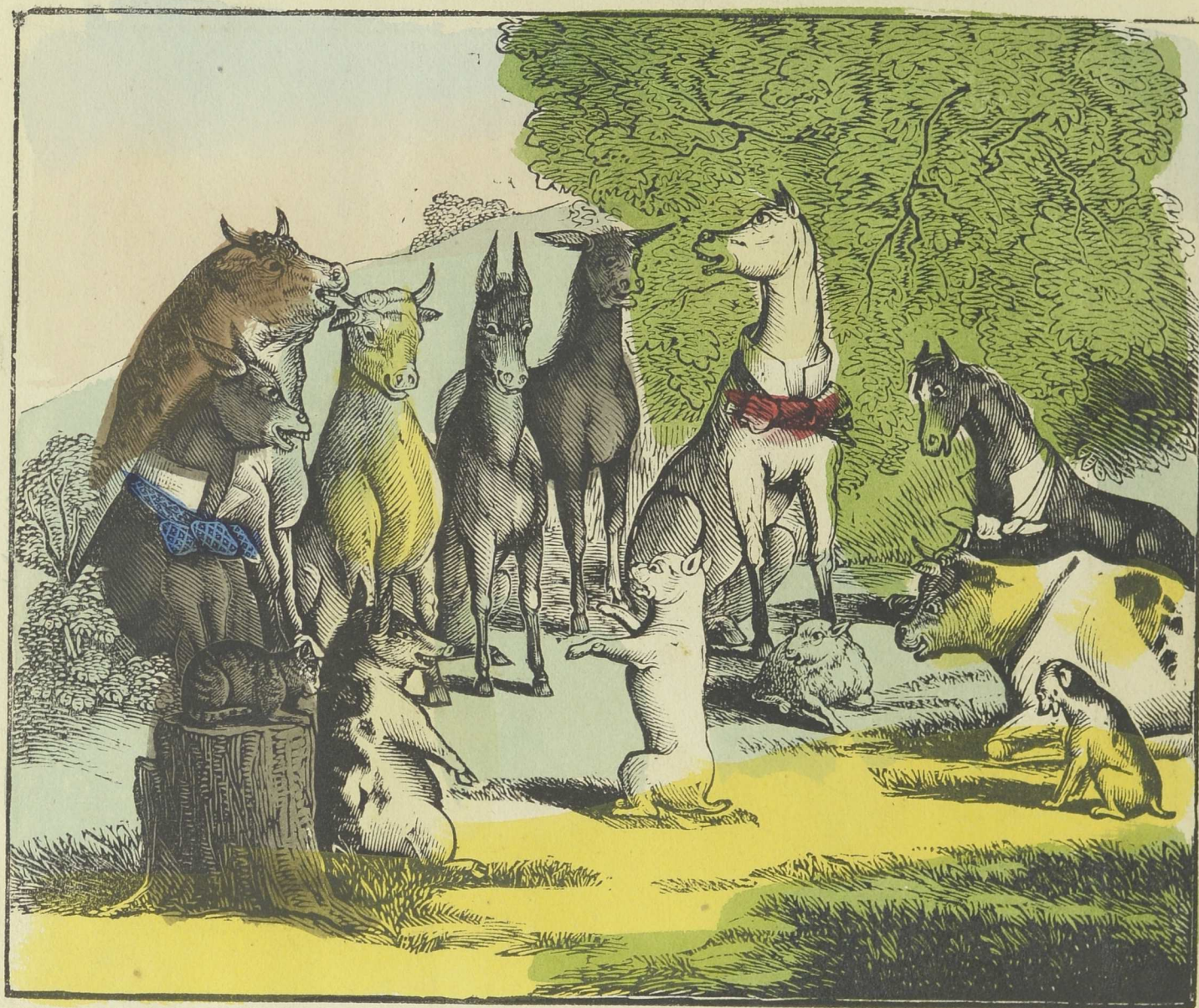


Next came Mr. Pig, running quickly, and squeaking

allow;

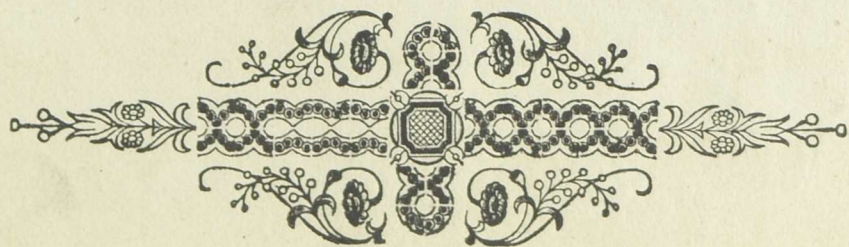
So the party soon sent him o'er the next field to roam,
