## : Military Day :

## MORNING

9.30 O'CLOCK—Military assemble on Wellington Street, between John and Simcoe Streets. Parade up Simcoe to King, along King to Jarvis, up Jarvis to Wellesley, and along Wellesley to the Queen's Park. Here the troops will be reviewed, and after firing a *feu de joie*, will return to the point of starting by way of Grosvenor Avenue, Yonge, Queen and Simcoe Sts.

*Rifle Brigade*—Lieut.-Col. KERR, P.W.O.R., commanding—Queen's Own and Prince of Wales Own Rifles, of Kingston.

*Cavalry Brigade*—Lieut.-Col. G. T. DENISON, commanding—Governor General's Body Guard.

*Artillery Brigade*—Major GRAY, M. P. P., commanding—Toronto Field Battery; Welland Canal Field Battery, and Hamilton Field Battery.

## AFTERNOON

2 O'CLOCK—Parade of the Canadian Wheelmen's Association, numbering 500. They meet at Clarence Square, and proceed along King, Yonge, and Queen Sts., Queen St. Ave. through Park, along St. Albans, Yonge, Gloucester and Jarvis Sts., to Rosedale Lacrosse Grounds, where the annual Championship Races will commence at 3 o'clock. This will be one of the most attractive features of the celebration. The most eminent bicyclists in Canada will participate. 


**Toronto Zoological Gardens**

**Trip to Niagara and Lewiston**



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
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
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
