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CHIEF CONSTABLE'S OFFICE.

Toronto, January 14th, 1890.

To His Worship the Mayor of Toronto, Chairman of the Board of Police Commissioners:

SIR,—I have the honor to submit my annual report upon the Police Department for 1889 with the criminal statistics covering the same period. I also transmit reports from Inspectors Stark and Archabold of the work done under their immediate supervision.

DETECTIVE DEPARTMENT.

RESULT OF REVIEW.

A review of the work performed by this department enables me to state that the results are in the highest degree satisfactory, and could only have been achieved by constant and assiduous labor on the part of all connected with this branch of the Police service.

The Inspectors' report deals so exhaustively with all matters attended to by the staff under him, that a few brief references only seem necessary.

Crime in 1889, as indicated by the records, compares favourably with the previous year, for while there has been an increase in minor cases of a miscellaneous nature, the number of serious offences aggregate considerably less.

The total value of property lost and stolen, recovered by the Police is shown to be \$102,823. Of this amount the Detective Department claim to have restored to the owners \$56,386 worth.

MURDER.

Under the head of murder five names appear, one was executed, two were acquitted and two are awaiting trial. The prompt arrest of W. H. Harvey by Acting Detective Black, on a telegram from Guelph, probably saved the life of his son.

BURGLARY.

Included in this category are a number of cases which showed upon investigation that they might have been prevented by the occupants of the houses taking the ordinary precaution of locking their doors and windows. It is, however, known that most of the others were committed by professional burglars, and I am pleased to be in a position to say that all who were primarily concerned are now in penal servitude or have left the City.

HOUSEBREAKING.

Many instances of this kind are due to the causes mentioned in my report of last year, and would seldom have occurred had the Police been notified as requested when the houses were left unoccupied. Out of between three and four hundred people who availed themselves of my suggestion and sent word to have their houses looked after during their absence, only two reported anything missing on their return.

HIGHWAY ROBBERY.

Drunkenness contributes greatly to this class of offence, sober people being rarely molested. Robbery with violence was seldom attempted, and in most cases the culprits were apprehended.

LARCENY.

To lessen the number of cases under this head it will be necessary to have the Vagrant Act amended or applied in such a way as to enable the Police to rid the City of well known thieves who are aware that they can prey on the public, so long as their complicity in some specific act cannot be proved. I again most strongly urge the adoption of measures that will remove the difficulties the Detectives in particular have to contend with in this respect.

IMPORTANT ARRESTS.

The number of important arrests effected during the year has been considerable, and for their names, etc., I would refer you to the Inspectors' report.

PHOTOGRAPHY.

Photography has played such an important part in the identification of criminals as to be indispensable. The plan of taking the photographs by an officer of the department continues to work satisfactorily.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The recommendations made by Inspector Stark have been carefully considered, and being the result of mature consideration founded on experience, I concur in them, and express the hope that it may be found possible to carry them into effect.

STAFF INSPECTORS' DEPARTMENT.

Staff Inspector Archibald reports at length upon the work done in this department under his direction, and from the number of cases that have devolved upon him and his men it is evident their time and attention have been fully occupied. The report is comprehensive, and I submit it for your consideration. A tabulated statement gives in detail the results under the several heads, the total of which shows an increase of 456 as compared with last year.

HOUSES OF ILL-FAME.

Houses of ill-fame have received due supervision from the Divisional Police, and the proceedings taken against them reduced the number of those long established, and scattered the inmates.

ILLICIT LIQUOR SELLING.

The prosecutions against illicit liquor sellers show a marked decrease compared with 1888, though the activity of the Police in every division has been in no way diminished. It seems probable that the business having become risky and unprofitable has been abandoned by some who were heretofore engaged in it. To make the present Act really effective, stringent amendments are required, and the City Council should increase the Police share of the fines derivable from the prosecutions they undertake, say from one-third to a half.

GAMBLING.

Gaming houses, maintained as such by professional gamblers, are not believed to exist in the City, nor is there reason to think that gambling is carried on to any extent or in such a way as to require Police intervention. There was one prosecution under the Act for keeping a bucket shop, but after being sent for trial the case was dismissed on technical grounds.

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.

The officer charged with the duty of looking after cruelty to animals brought 250 cases into Court, which, however, by no means, represent all that have received attention at his hands. The fines and fees imposed amounted to \$800, a sum more than sufficient to pay the Constables salary.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS.

I invite your attention to some proposed amendments to the Statutes governing certain offences, some of which, after careful revision, might be adopted with advantage.

PATROL SIGNAL AND WAGON SERVICE.

WAGONS IN USE.

There are three wagons in use and one in reserve, and on reference to the detailed statement of the work they have performed it will be seen what essential service they have rendered.

SIGNAL BOXES.

The original sixty signal boxes comprise the system in operation, the 20 new ones not having yet been connected owing to a difficulty in getting permission to erect the necessary poles. I am in hopes these will be included shortly. A private box to connect the business premises of Messrs. T. Eaton & Co., Yonge Street, with Police Headquarters will shortly be attached, and I would recommend Banks and other mercantile houses to follow this example.

OPERATORS.

The operators have been intelligently attentive to their duties, and Acting P. S. Peckham has exercised a careful supervision over the system under his charge.

AMBULANCE SERVICE.

The Ambulances under police control have answered an average of very nearly eighty calls per month, and have exceeded the number during the comparative period in 1888 by 103.

I have reason to believe that the duties devolving upon the drivers have been efficiently discharged. There was on January 1st, to the credit of this fund, the sum of \$268, which represents the entire gross payments made for services rendered since the police assumed charge.

While on this subject I would throw out the suggestion that all constables might be instructed how to render first aid in cases of accident or illness in the street. Ambulance lectures during the winter season would be the means of imparting much useful instruction for this purpose.

MOUNTED SERVICE.

The number of mounted men has not been increased since the formation of the squad, and so far there has been neither occasion nor accommodation for any addition, but as there will be stable room available in No. 6 Division and also at the new station house, it might be well to keep a man at each. I would not recommend reducing the number at Head Quarters.

There have been no casualties among the horses, and they have been generally free from sickness, lameness, etc., which speaks well for the care and attention bestowed on them.

STATIONS.

HEADQUARTERS.

The upper corridor has been enlarged by the removal of the Caretaker from the building, the light and ventilation being improved, also the accommodation for the general public.

No. 1 STATION.

This station requires to be cleaned and painted throughout, and some minor repairs attended to. The Caretaker's apartments being now vacant, I would recommend the rooms in the basement to be fitted up for the detention of children, there being space enough to separate the sexes. If this is done, the Matron's office can be made more suitable as such, and if required, she can sleep there.

No. 2 STATION.

I would repeat my recommendation of last year, that a wagon house be built adjoining this station, which also should be provided with lockers for the men.

No. 3 STATION.

There is a movement on foot to change the location of this station house in the interest of St. Andrew's Market. If this should be done, I would advise the selection of a site more central for the division. The premises as they now stand are in good repair and in a satisfactory condition.

NO. 4 STATION.

There seems to be no prospect of improving the present accommodation for the patrol wagon and horse attached to this station, unless the firemen should vacate their adjoining quarters, a step which, I understand, is in contemplation. Lockers are required for the use of the men.

NO. 5 STATION.

The dormitory is rather too small for the number of men now doing duty in this division. By the removal of the bath-room down stairs additional room could be obtained at small expense.

NO. 6 STATION.

Upon the annexation of Parkdale the station house in Dundas Street was abandoned and the Division moved into the Town Hall, which has been converted into the most commodious police station in the city. When the new Fire Hall, now under construction, is completed, the firemen's premises adjoining will be used as a patrol wagon house, etc.

NEW STATIONS.

The plans are now in course of preparation for a new station to be built on Ossington Avenue, near Bloor Street, by the architect (Mr. A. R. Denison), who accompanied myself and Judge McDougall when visiting the most recently constructed station houses in New York, Boston and Philadelphia. I expect this station to be ready for occupation before the close of the year. There is a strong feeling among some of the residents and property owners in the eastern section of the city in favour of a station house being built across the Don river. This would mean the establishment of another Division, involving a considerable annual expenditure apart from the cost of purchasing a site and erection of a station house.

GYMNASTIC APPLIANCES RECOMMENDED.

I consider it would be very desirable to provide at each police station simple and inexpensive means for the men to exercise themselves with, such gymnastic appliances as would develop and maintain their physical and muscular strength.

GENERAL REMARKS.

VISIT TO UNITED STATES.

In company with His Honor Judge McDougall I paid a brief visit of a week to New York, Boston and Philadelphia, and looked into the police systems of those cities as closely as time and circumstances permitted. I found the general features of administration to be similar to our own, but in detail they differed from each other in adaptation to local requirements. A comparison between the police organization of Toronto and those wealthy and populous cities would be only relative, and consequently not of much value. It however may be said that without doubt the system and its appurtenances here are as modern and as suitable for the requirements of Toronto as could be expected in most particulars.

QUESTION OF RESERVES.

I might mention one point in which this remark does not hold good. and that is the absence of reserves in the stations both by day and night during the greater part of the year. I cannot say that this want has been seriously felt up to the present time, but an emergency might arise such as a large conflagration or tumult, at which men should be rapidly concentrated. Under existing arrangements assistance is only obtainable by withdrawing men from their beats.

PRESENT STRENGTH AND PROPOSED INCREASE.

During the past year twenty-five men were added to the Force, and since they were available for street duty considerable more ground has been patrolled. Large sections of the City embracing parts of the residential quarters, still remain uncovered, and from the representations made on all sides it would seem that this state of affairs is not relished by those who live there. The only remedy is more men, and to add them in sufficient numbers is a mere question of expense. I adhere to the opinion expressed in my last annual report, that in Toronto there should be at least three constables to every 2,000 of the population, a proportion that would bring the Force up to a total of nearly 300 of all ranks.

VAGRANT BANDS.

Vagrant bands parading the streets at night have given the police a good deal of trouble, composed, as they are, of rowdy youths belonging to no responsible Society or organization. They play party tunes for the distinct purpose of being offensive, and with the object of causing a disturbance. They are usually accompanied by a rabble who are always glad of an opportunity to throw stones, the damage from which might be serious, and a breach of the peace is always imminent. The police cannot be on the spot at all times, not being aware of the movements of the bands before hand. I would recommend the passage of a By-law making it obligatory upon all bands (military excepted) to obtain a permit to play through the streets after sun-down.

FERRIES AND EXCURSION STEAMERS.

During the season of navigation the officer detailed to superintend the passenger traffic on the ferries and excursion steamers had by no means a sinecure, but the absence of complaints from the public and their immunity from accident gives me every reason to think that A. P. S. Geddes discharged his duties in a satisfactory manner.

The prosecutions for overloading steamers undertaken by the Government upon the information furnished by the police had the effect of preventing further infractions of the law.

COMPLAINTS OF BOYS.

A large number of complaints have been received from all parts of the City respecting the conduct of boys in the streets.

It is undoubtedly a fact that the citizens have good reason to protest, for there have been numerous cases in which boys have been concerned, such as windows broken by catapults, stones, etc., fences and buildings wantonly defaced, also P.O. letter boxes, flowers stolen, trees injured, etc., etc. It is not an easy matter for the Police to catch the perpetrators of the mischief in the act, for while the boys are ubiquitous the Constables are not omnipresent. Public and private property should be respected, and if parents, guardians, school teachers and others who have the means of inculcating this principle would assist the authorities, a great improvement would soon be noticeable.

TRAFFIC.

It has become now obvious that the traffic, pedestrian and vehicular, in the streets should be placed under the control of the Police, beyond question, as it is in all well-regulated cities. The by-laws relating to the subject are somewhat vague, and require to be put in more definite form.

VAN SERVICE.

From the van for the conveyance of prisoners which I saw in the States, it is abundantly evident that by building two on the latest improved models and placing the service under the control of the Police it can be done in a more creditable manner and at about the same expense.

ANNUAL INSPECTION.

The Annual Inspection which took place in the Queen's Park on November 9th, was attended by Sir Adolph Caron, K.C.M.G., Minister of Militia, who, in addressing the Force, was pleased to compliment them upon their appearance, efficiency and reputation.

EXPENDITURE.

The expenditure for the year under the control of the Board was less than the estimate by nearly \$4,000.

I append the report of Dr. Spragge, Surgeon in charge of the Force.

To the Chairman of the Police Commissioners, Toronto :

Sir,—I beg to submit for your consideration my report for the year 1889.

We lost two men by death. William Kernaghan died from consumption, and Michael Larkin committed suicide.

There was a considerable increase in the number on the sick list, due in a great measure to the additions made to the Force, the new men always suffering out of proportion to the old, caused partly by the work incident to their duties, and partly by the fact that the majority of them, prior to joining, were accustomed to hard physical work.

As in former years a large proportion of those incapacitated were due to derangements of the digestive system, nearly half the Force being laid off by this cause.

All the stations have been in a fairly good sanitary condition except No. 5, but this state of affairs has been lately rectified.
