Of forfeits, draughts, and blind-man's buff;

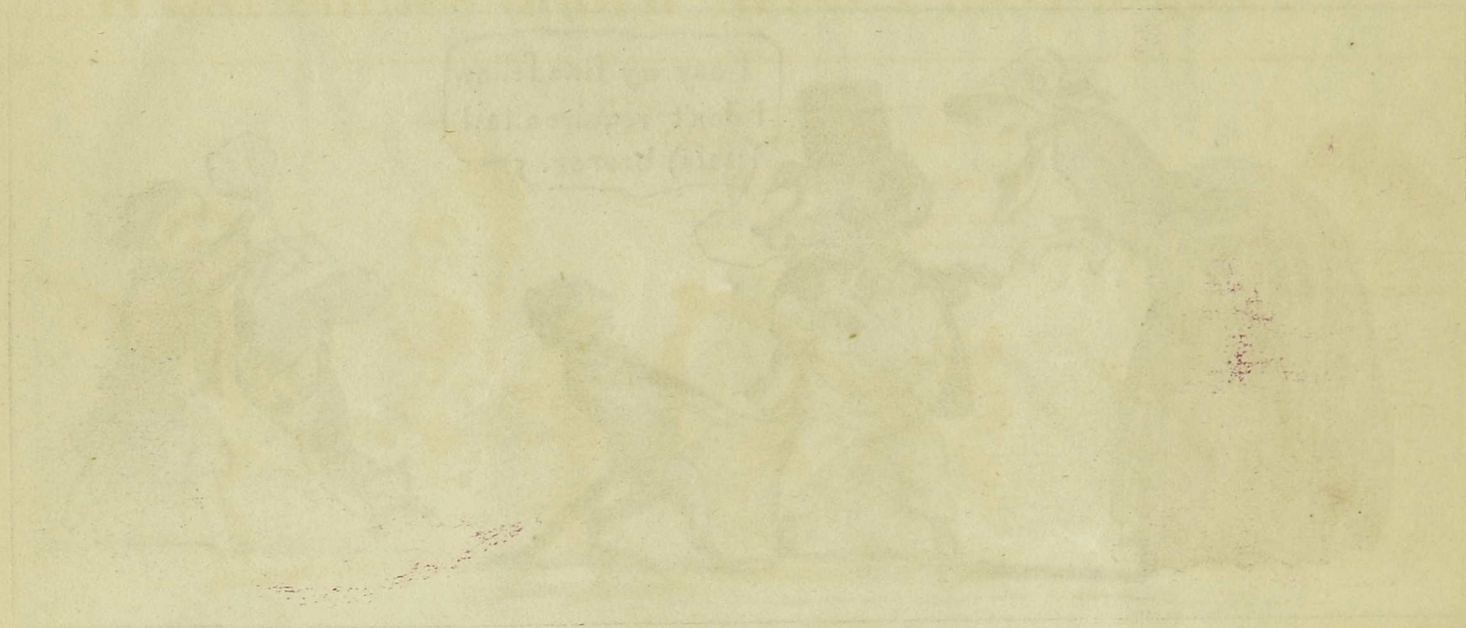


I now must take the showman's part:

Will make the room with laughter ring.

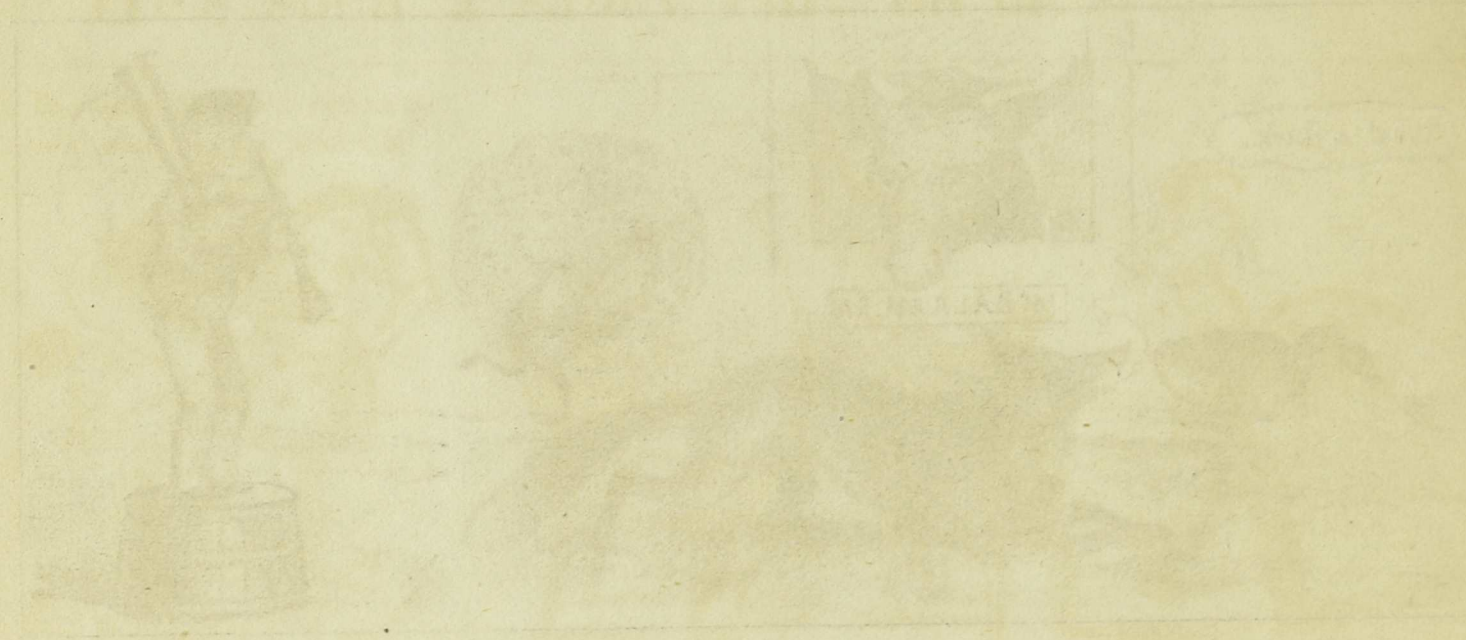


What 's here? good lack! ain't that a guy!

Of forfeits, draughts, and blind-man's-buff;

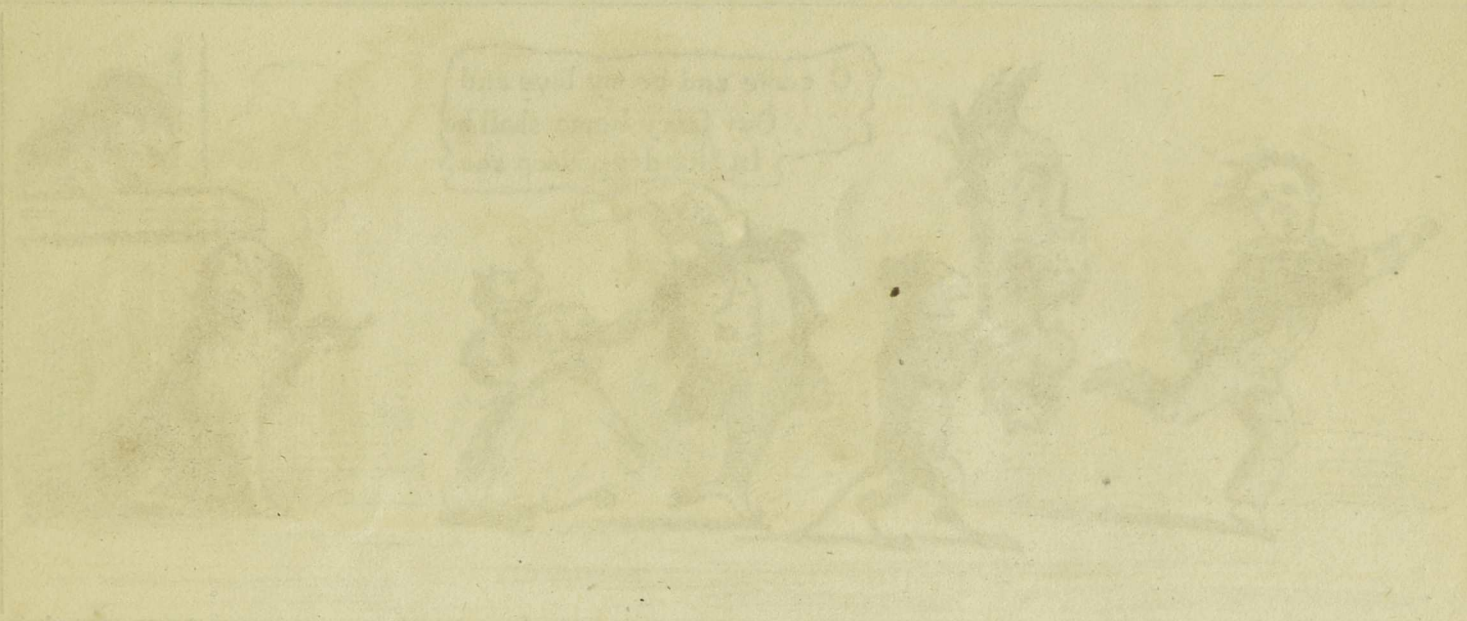


I now must take the showman's part;

Will make the town with laughter ring.

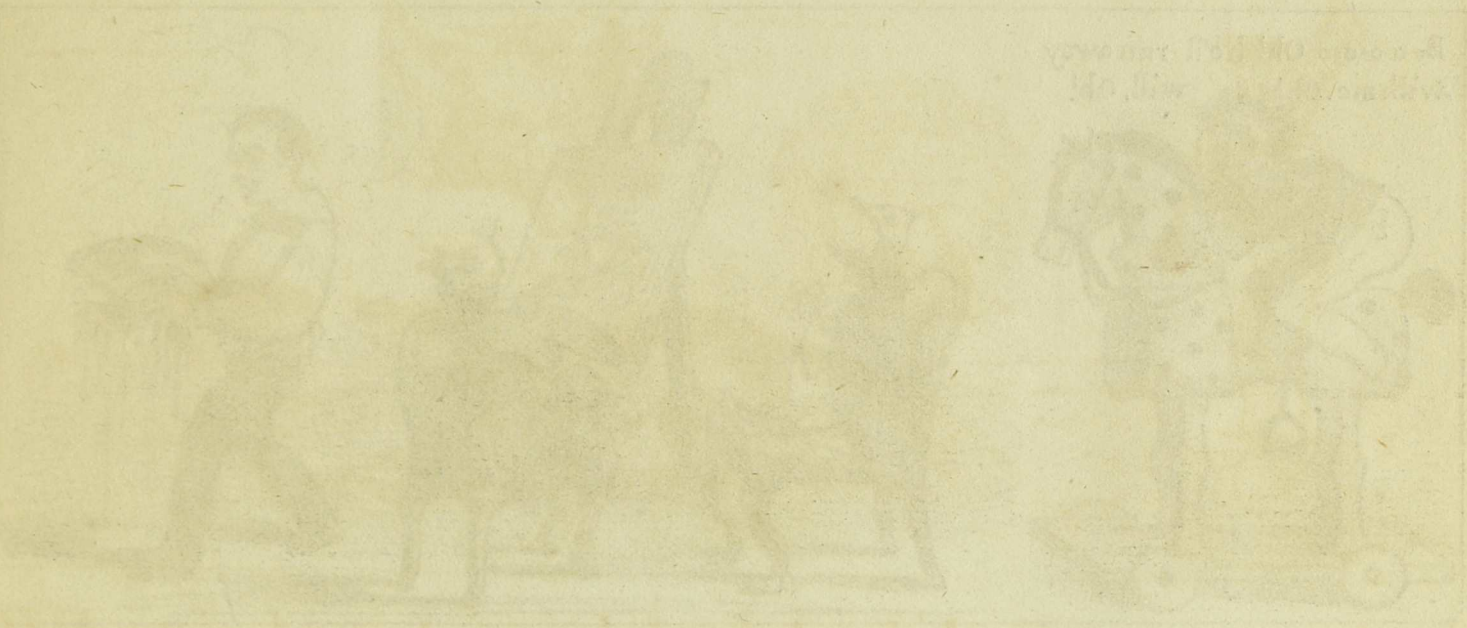


What's here? good lack! isn't that a guy?

Who with his wicked bow and arrow

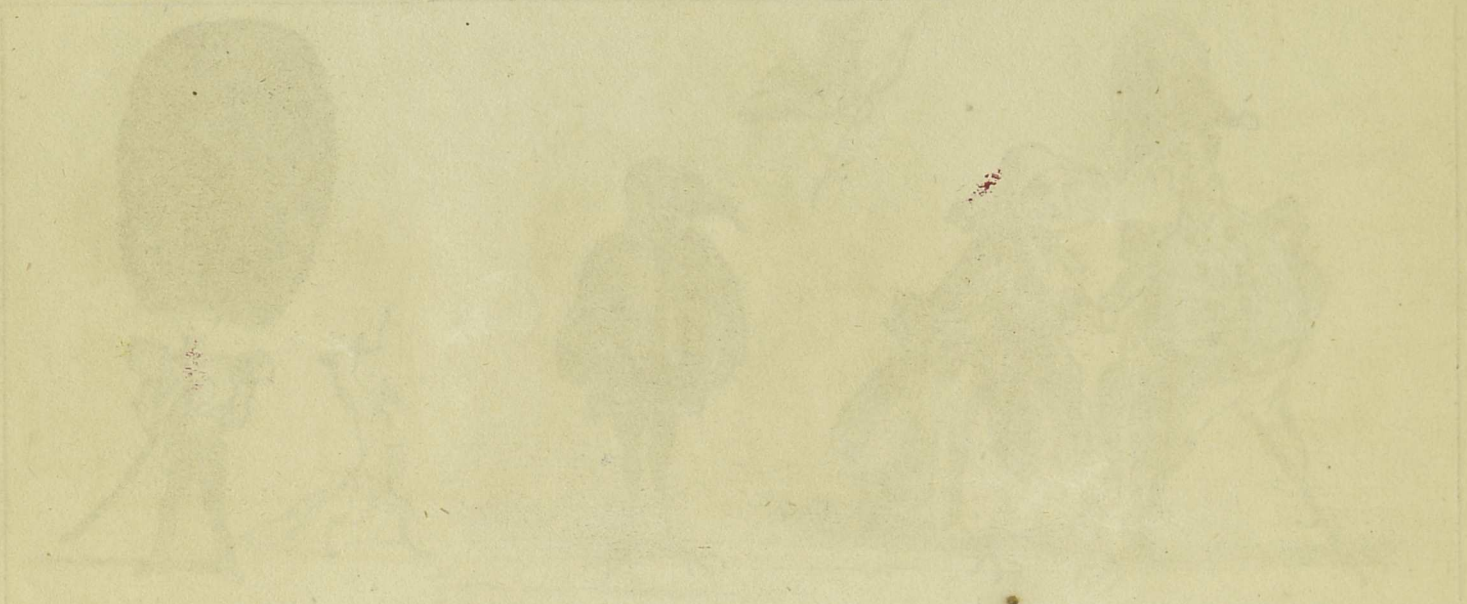


Shot poor Cock Robin through and through,
