

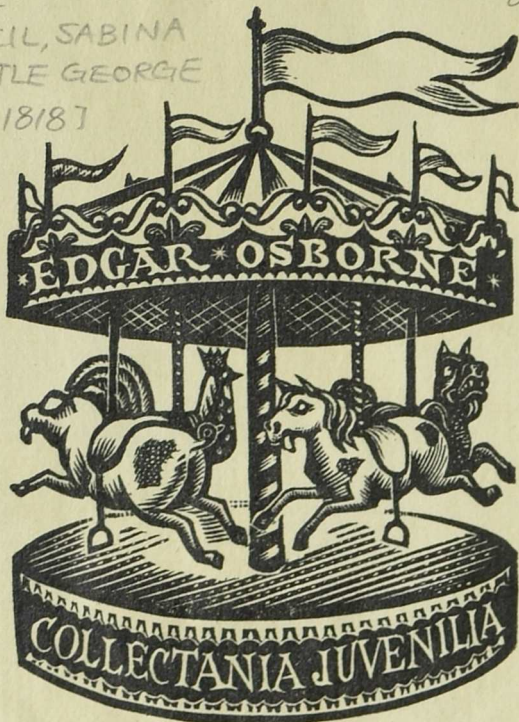

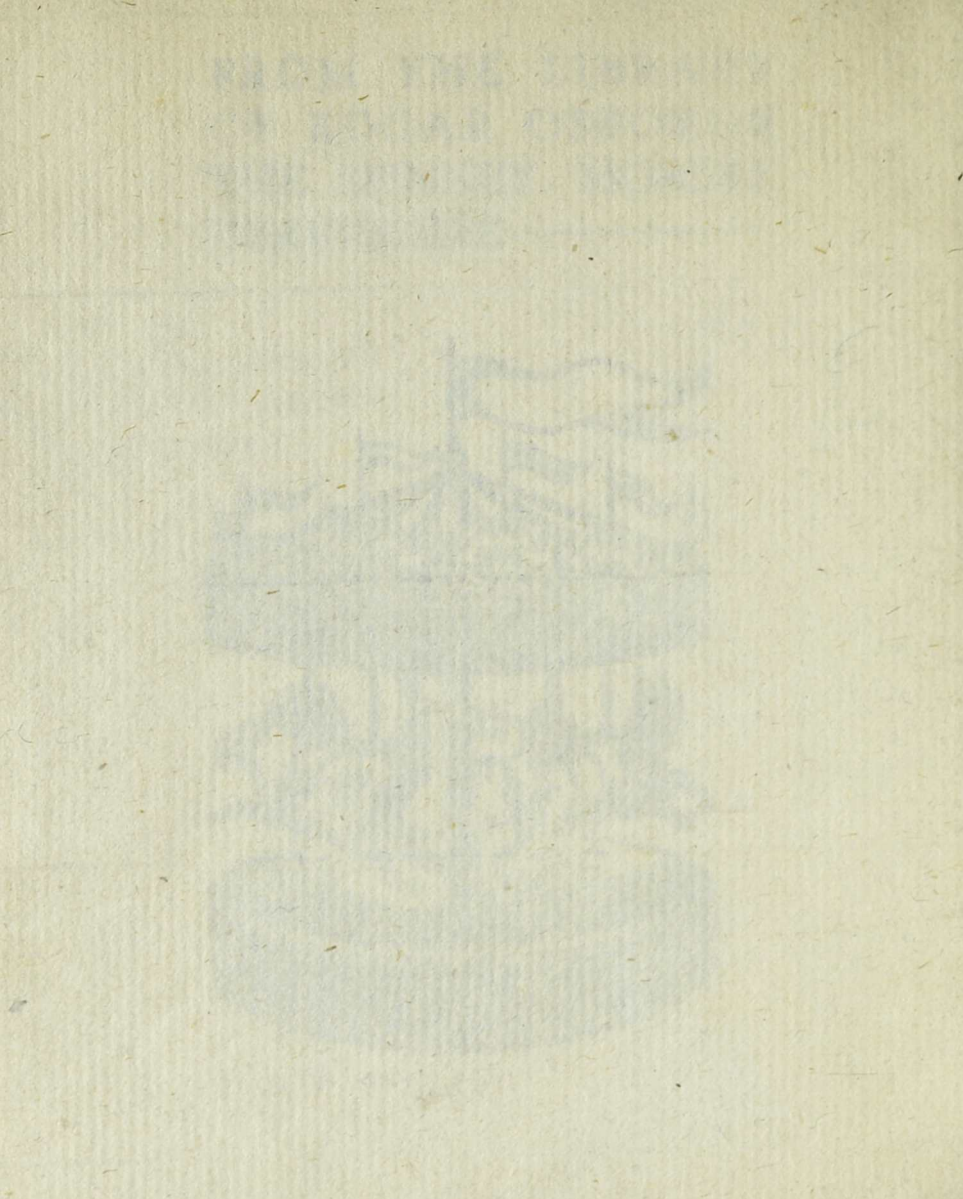

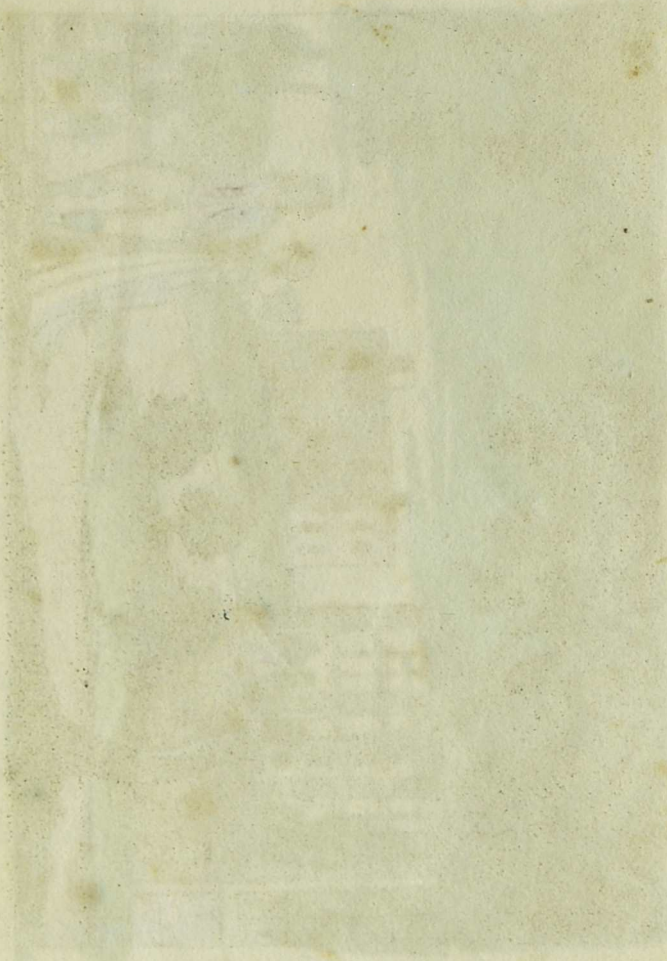
An Officer

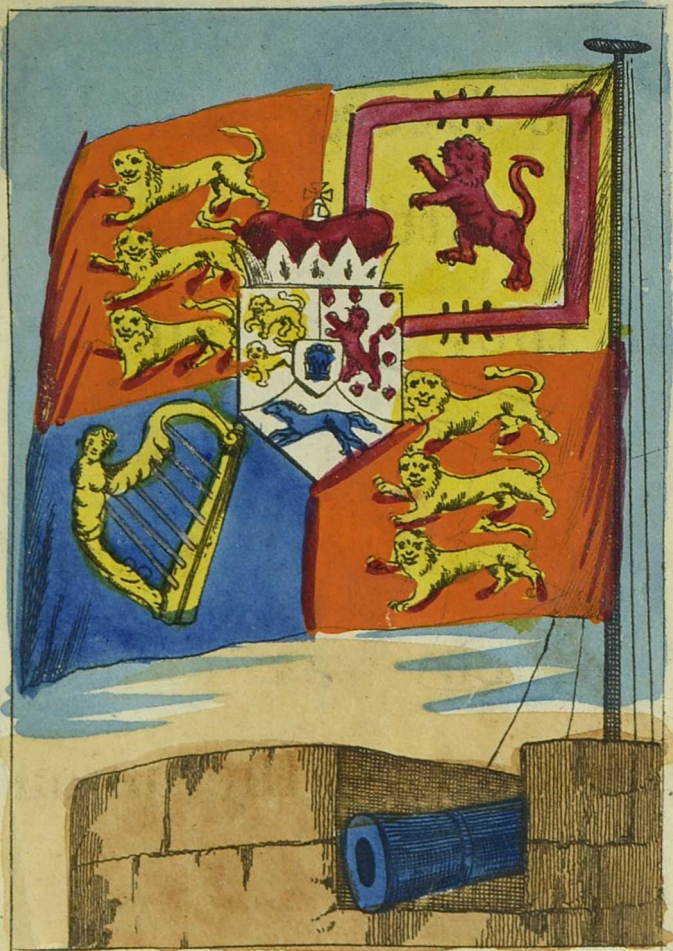


The Greenhouse .

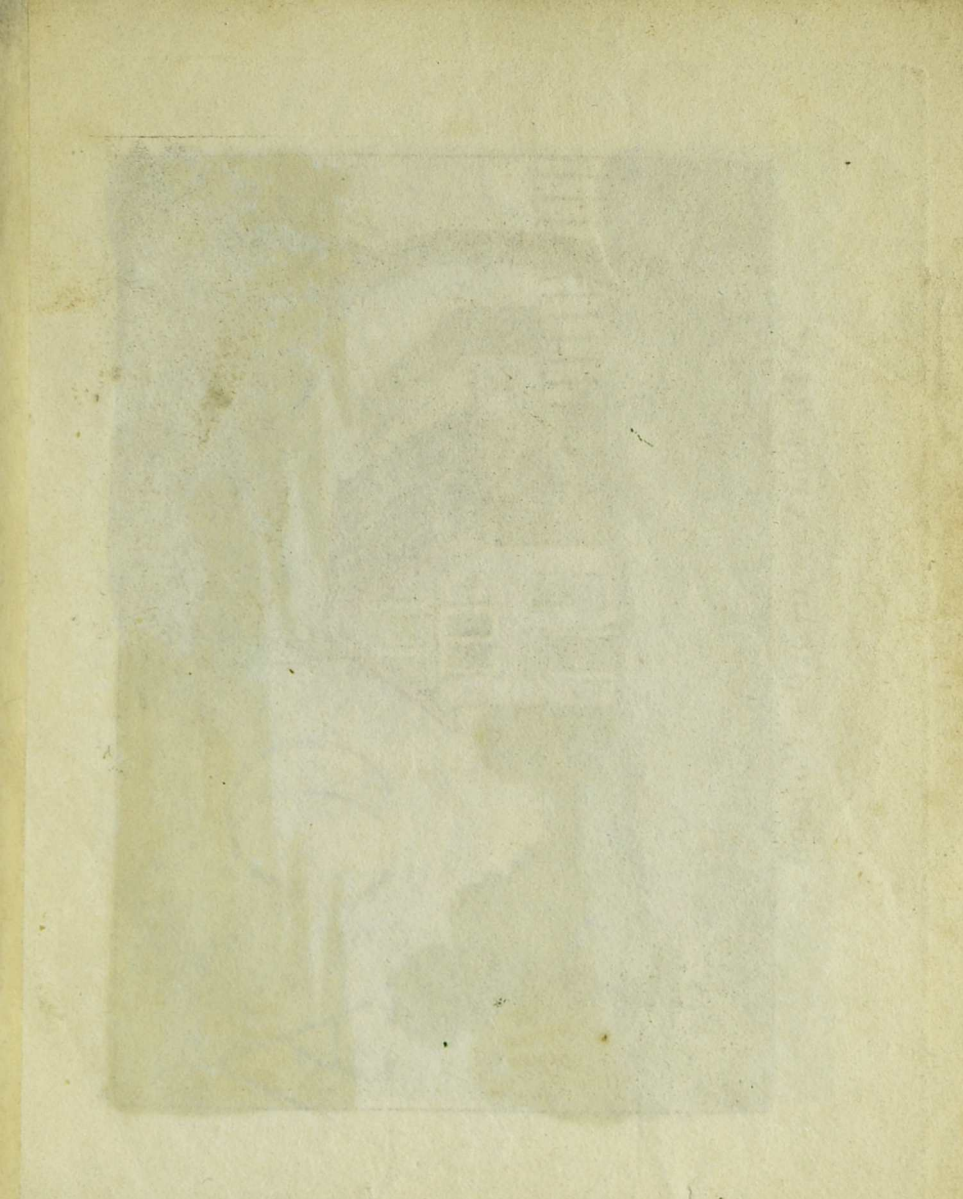

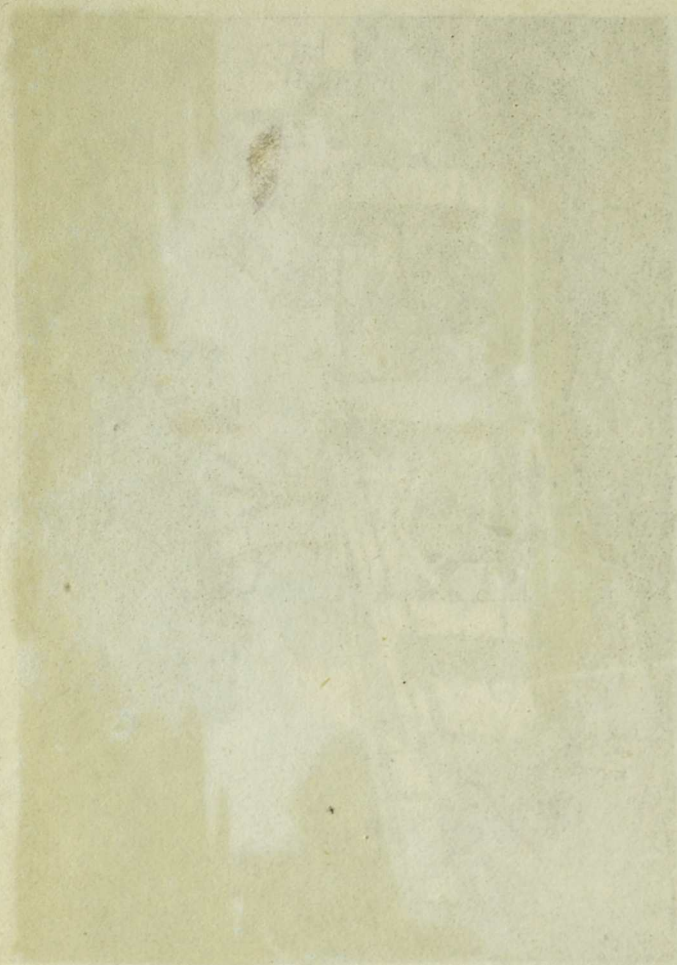
A Pleasant View from the Cottage .
