



## Training a Murse

## What a Young Woman has to do to become a Trained Nurse.

She writes to the Superintendent, receives and signs application.

She enters at 21 and must be in perfect health.

She is a probationer for three months, and wears a pink uniform which she provides herself.

At the end of three months her knowledge is tested for a month in the wards. If satisfactory she is accepted.



SUPERINTENDENT AND FOUR HEAD NURSES.

At fifth month she becomes a pupil nurse and receives a cap and uniform as a Junior till end of first year.

In second year she is an intermediate, and at end of two years she is perhaps selected as head nurse, with cap, gown and pin, on which is inscribed "no charge."

Her course is two years and eight months, and the last six months she spends in New York, where she receives training in adult work—general and obstetrical.

While in training she has a course in the diet kitchen, which enables her to do any kind of cooking, invalid or general.

The Training is thorough, and medical men state that our nurses are exceptionally good.

ALL SURGICAL CASES.

The total of surgical cases treated was 581—54 more than last year. Here are

some of the cases :-

Appendicitis 24, abscesses 16, inflamed glands 29, bow legs 14, burns 13, cleft palate 13, stiff legs and feet 15, fracture of thigh 24, leg 11, arm 6, forearm 4, collar bone 5, harelip 13, rupture 36, hip disease 34, birth marks 12, inflammation of bones 35, infantile paralysis 23, hump back 34, curvature of spine 11, club feet 51, tuberculosis of knee 9, ankle 4, wrist 4, elbow 3, wounds 9.

Of these 205 were cured—210 improved and 19 unimproved, 78 still in Hospital.

#### THE LAKESIDE HOME.

The Home is on the Lighthouse Point, Toronto Island.

It has 125 beds, 7 wards and 7 balconies. It has been in operation since 1882.

It has the complete equipment of an Hospital.

It cost \$71,000, and was presented to The Hospital by Mr. J. Ross Robertson.

It stands in centre of six acres of lawn. The 125 beds are occupied from June to October.



KIDS ON THE SANDS.

There were 350 children at The Lakeside last summer—about four weeks for each child.

It is one of the prettiest spots on Island. The patients sleep out night and day

on the balconies—they like it.

The average increase of weight in the baby patient is 3 lbs.

One youngster who weighed 7 pounds

on the 31st May scaled 13 lbs. 4 oz. on the

2nd October. It was a record case. Since 1882, 4,250 children have been cared for at the Lakeside.

## Like a Lot of Busy Bees

#### LAUNDRY AT THE HOSPITAL.

The Laundry is one of the very busy spots in the Hospital building.

The amount of linen that is handled

would surprise a city laundry man.

Recollect that we have 1,245 little patients who wear a lot of clothes—698 boys and 547 gurls.

The girls take better care of theirs than the boys.

The week's wash runs to 10,000 pieces for patients only.

Then there is bed linen,

pillow slips, towels, napkins, spreads and household linen, nearly 1,000 pieces a week

The nurses have each 21 pieces a week. The staff and the domestics have nearly

900 pieces a week.

It uses about 200,000 gallons of water. It takes 5,000 lbs. of Surprise Soap to meet the demand of the Hospital for washing and cleaning.

Pieces washed each year total 500,000. It is just as necessary to have soap and

water in a Hospital as to have medicine.

## .....Patients at School .....



The School Room is a feature in our work.

It occupies the time of the little ones.

It is in charge of a Public School teacher.
It has a kindergarten, and elementary classes.

Since 1892 nearly 3,000 patients have

attended the school.

Last year 221 pupils, average daily attendance 36.

Children who enter the Hospital unable to read or write—do both before they leave.

Last year two little ones who could not read or write at entry, wrote letters home.

Both parents wrote to know if their child did write the letter with its own hand— "Yes, every word of it," answered the Superintendent.

So that you see we help the little ones

not only physically but mentally.

JUST LIKE A MOTHER.

There were 698 boys and 547 girls, a total of 1,245 inpatients last year.

Of the 1,245,193 were under 1 year, 109 under 2, 116 under 3, 97 under 4, 79 under 5, 78 under 6, 90 under 7, 92 under 8, 61 under 9, 46 under 10, 75 under 11, 60 under 12, 60 under 13, 52 under 14, 37 under 15.

14 is maximum limit but where patient is a few months over we try to help them.

Boys are harder to manage than girls especially the bigger boys - they do get lively when convalescing.

Take them all in all, they are fairly amenable to discipline-and as a general rule they are a lovable lot.

At the Lakeside Home the fresh air is a great tonic-The up-patients, boys and

girls, have a great time on the six acres of lawn that surround the Home.

The funniest sight on earth is to see a baseball match by the boys at the Lakeside—some on crutches-some with arm in a sling—some with one eye bandaged—and some with one leg-all a merry lot.

In a minute the sciagraph is made.


