Miscellaneous.
Scott's Return to Abbotsford.
At a very early hour on the morning of Wednesday, the 11th, we again played him in his carriage, and he lay in the same torpid state during the first two stages on the road to Tweedside. But as we descended the vale of Gala he began to rouse himself, and by degrees it was obvious that he was recognising the features of that familiar landscape. Presently he murmured a name or two—Gala, Water, surely—Buckholm—Tornocle. As we rounded the hill at Laddie, and the outline of the Edmonds burst on him, he became greatly excited, and when, turning himself or his coach, his eye at length caught his own towers, at the distance of a mile, he sprang up with a cry of delight. The driver being in food we had to go round a few miles by Melrose bridge, and during the time thus occupied, his words and looks being within prospect, it required occasionally both Dr. Watson's strength and mine, in addition to Mr. Nicholson's to keep him in the carriage. After passing the bridge the road for a couple of miles loses sight of Abbotsford, and he relapsed into his stupor; but, on gaining the bank immediately above it, he exclaimed became again ungovernable.

A new Invention.
We had the happiness to examine on Wednesday last, a curiously constructed wheel, invented by Mr. Frederick H. Southworth, called the Current, or Tide Wheel. The construction is entirely different from anything of the kind we have ever witnessed, or even heard of. Although wheels have frequently been constructed in such a manner as to be turned by the simple current of the stream, yet it never occurred to our mind that back water could ever be brought into successful requisition, so as to increase both the motion and strength, which is the case in that of Mr. Southworth's.

The wheel is intended to be placed in a horizontal position, so far under water as to be entirely free from any obstructions of ice or flood-wood; the buckets, which are placed on the outside of the wheel, are so constructed that the current both opens and shuts them, and by so doing, creates what is called a double power; the buckets being filled by the current on one side, remain open until it turns so far around as to come in contact with the current of the stream on the opposite side, when it is immediately shut, and in shutting opens another directly opposite, which is immediately filled by the current, thus causing a continual and steady motion to the wheel. But it will be almost impossible for us to give a plain and correct description without a cut by which to represent it. We shall therefore leave the subject by saying, the experiment which we saw tried, was upon a wheel about six or seven inches in diameter, and placed in a current of about three or four miles an hour; it ran with as much strength as could be expected from a wheel of that size. Mr. Southworth is now attending school at the Academy, (Homer) and we presume he would have no objection to showing the model to any who may desire to see it.—*Canterbury Eagle*.
