SIR,—I have just now read a Sermon preached on our late Thanksgiving day by the Rev. Mr. George, Minister of the Presbyterian church of Scarborough, and recently published at the request of his congregation.

To those who wish to live without Government and without laws, this sermon will be considered as an attempt to abridge the natural liberties of mankind in this Province. In its pages they will pretend to find nothing but the doctrine of tyranny and oppression, and foresee nothing but that approaching junction of church and state which every politician declaims against who knows not watte essays, or who wishes a change in the Government, because he is discontented with his own condition. This fearful junction of church and state is a visitation which no man need to fear in this enlightened age and free country, who Government and without laws, this sertion which no managed to country, who is contented age and free country, who is contented to enjoy the fruits of his nadians. own industry, without trespassing upon the profile or privileges of others. This love, or tather desire of change, with a view of ameliorating their condition, probably rendered uncomfortable by the profile of the defence of that city the statement of the private of the condition. themselves, is the principal cause why so many would-be politicians reprobate themselves, is the principal cause why so many would-be politicians reprobate and affect to fear the junction of church and state, a junction which in a great measure appears to be unavoidable, including the proof of the delence of that city and government on the evening of Tuesday the third of December last, thereby giving a proof that his loyalty, like true friendship, was ready in the hour of need. wherever there is freedom in the Government and virtue in the church; be-cause the former is the national standard of our duty to man, and the latter the national standard of our duty to God—the two great duties of life, which are as inseparably connected in a nation, as of our duty to man, and the latter the national standard of our duty to God— the two great duties of life, which are as inseparably connected in a nation, as religion and morality are in an individual, where the latter rarely exists without some share of the former. By the word Church, I do not mean a domiupon trust, by politicians who disclaim without thinking what they say. By the word Church, I do not mean a dominant church, possessed of earthly rule—that is the Province of Government—but the divine moral philosophy of Jesus Christ, as it is pure and rationally taught

in the houses of worship of the different denominations of christians. It is true that a tyrannical governmen and a corrupt church, when combined for evil purposes, possers, when united, more power of doing mischief, than they possibly could separately. Nearly in the same proportion that they possess more power of doing good, when united, than they possibly could do when acting chant they possibly could do when acting enganately. But it certaily is unabiliaid a corrupt church, when combined separately. But it certaily is unphilo-sophical to reason from the abuse of mesns. What atrocities the church and meens. What atrocities the church and state in combination may have committed in dark ages and urenlightened countries, is no longer to be dreaded from the friendly union of church and state in the Province of Upper Canada, at present. The days of persecution and tyramy have passed away in the British dominions, let us hope for every and therefore instead of an exist. and therefore instead of an evil, the friendly union of church and state will ultimately tend to promote that harmo-ny in this province which is so much wanted, and is so great a blessing overy-

I therefore approve of the subject of Mr. George's political sermon, on moral and religious principles, leaving the divine authority contained in the text entirely out of the question. In calling men to their political duty at such a crisis, by implestical duty at such a men to their political duty at such a crisis, by inculcating submission to the Laws which we ourselves have made, and which we ourselves have the power of altering at any time if they do not suit us, is certainly the duty of every public orator. How ably Mr. George has fulfilled this duty, the published sermon to which I allude is the best proof. I have neither time nor inclination at present to enter into a long detailed criticism respecting the merits or defects of this sermon, now before the public. of this sermon, now before the public.

It teaches, but not servitely, the principle of political obedience, that is, due submission to the Laws, and respect for those who are entrusted with the powe those who are entrusted with the power of putting those laws in operation. The Sermon is clearly written, without osten-tation; it is apparently all there that ought to be, and nothing more. The author seems to depend on the authority of his text, and the force of his arguments, addressed directly to the understanding. principles rather than rules; and there-fore with confidence I recommend it to
