From the London Inquirer.

Address from those inhabitants of the Town of London and neighbourhood, friendly to the Free Church of Scotland, to the Deputation of that body now in America.

To the Free Church of Scotland.

Gentlemen,—We wish with enlarged satisfaction the opportunity afforded us by your visiting this section of Canada, of presenting to you our congratulations on the great under-takings in which we are engaged, and the eminent success which seems to mark your progress in advancing the important interests of the cause.

Most of us natives of that land, from whence you came, and all of us keenly alive to the great trials and difficulties of the people in the prevailing, and which we trust will end in the final overthrow of that secular dominancy over the minds of men, which has hitherto prevailed, which has been sufficiently exposed but feelings of admiration and respect for your noble efforts in helping great and good men to stand forward boldly in the face of the world, and in the face of Heaven, in the cause of truth, justice, and the eternal triumphs of truth and justice, of pure and disinterested principles, of the principles of our Christian religion, and of the principles of our
