

PROGRESSIVE IDEA TAKES SHAPE.



Under the auspices of the Guildwood Village Community Association, a Subcommittee has been formed to start immediate implementation of a Recreational Complex in Sylvan Park adjacent to Elizabeth Simcoe School. Excellent progress has been made to date and some of the details are spelled out below. Architectural drawings have been developed and the above illustration shows current thinking.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON

- Q. WHAT IS KIWANIWOOD ANYWAY ?
- A. It is the Recreational Complex to be developed in Sylvan Park, adjacent to Elizabeth Simcoe Public School in Guildwood Village.
- Q. WHO IS BEHIND KIWANIWOOD ?

It was initiated jointly by the Guildwood Village Community Assoc, and the Scarborough South Kiwanis Club following authorization by a General Membership Meeting of the Association on November 5th,1969.

Q. WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF KIWANIWOOD?

It is intended to provide recreational activities for members of the community particularly for the children and teenagers who find it most difficult to obtain adequate recreational facilities nearby. It will be open to residents of all ages.

The News and Views, although a nonprofit endeavour, can only be continued by the Community Association with the support of our advertisers who have been most loyal and forebearing in the past. 
A few years ago our request to have traffic lights installed at the intersection of Livingston and Guildwood Parkway was turned down as research indicated that there was insufficient traffic to warrent the installation.

With our gaining so many new neigbours as a result of apartment construction and the traffic build-up as a result of the "GO TRAIN"service we feel we have a stronger case to present. We have a stronger case to authorities asking them to review this matter and hope that we receive the desired results before there is a fatal accident at this intersection. We will keep you posted.

Also, we have submitted a request to the Scarborough Traffic Co-ordinator to have his Department investigate the possibilty of automobiles being able to make left hand turns off Guildwood Parkway on to Kingston Road westbound. This is a particular problem in the morning and even worse when the hill up to Kingston Road is icy. Again, we will keep you advised through this publication.



Q. PLEASE BE A BIT MORE SPECIFIC <u>ABOUT WHAT THIS RECREATIONAL</u> <u>COMPLEX WILL INCLUDE</u>

of progress a phased approach has been adopted. Our current schedule calls for Phase 1 to be completed by May 31st,1970. The six(6) phases in our current schedule are as follows: In order to provide visible signs

Phase 1. Completion of 4 tennis courts, surrounding screening, lighting and change facilities which can be doubled for other activities. Phase 2. Completion of an outdoor swimming pool. Phase 3. Completion of a Community Building(added on to Phase 1's facilities.) Phase 4. Completion of an artificial Ice Skating Rink. Phase 5. Covering over the swim-Phase 6. Covering over the Ice Skating Rink.

Q. WHY HAVE YOU CHOSEN TENNIS COURTS AS PHASE 1 OF THE COMPLEX ?

Current research indicates that these courts will receive a high level of usage. They cater to a community activity for individ-uals of virtually all ages. They are easy to maintain, an import-ant factor for the initial phase of a multiphase project. Finally they can be built at a relatively modest cost.

Q. DO YOU HAVE ANY CONCRETE IDEAS ABOUT WHAT ALL THIS IS GOING TO COST ?

Current estimates place the cost of Phase 1 and Phase 2 at approx-imately \$25,000 and \$70,000 respectively.

Q. HOW ON EARTH ARE WE GOING TO RAISE MONEY LIKE THAT IN GUILDWOOD ?

Not without a certain amount of Not without a certain amount of blood, sweat and tears. However, the financial data, as we see it currently, is most interesting. Talking only about Phase 1 (as the Kiwanis is only committed this far) the following situation explicitly a second with applies, assuming we reach our personal target of \$5,000 from the Village.

Donations from Guildwood residents.....\$5,000 Kiwanis fund raising commitment.....\$3,000 Matching donation from Scarborough Parks and Recreation Department...\$8,000 Provincial Government. Grant(25% of total)....\$5,333 TOTAL....\$21,333 Thus every dollar contributed by a Guildwood resident contributes \$4.27 to the total project object-ive. Finally we hope to obtain futher assistance from the Scar-borough Board of Education. The most important point here is that we can obtain an immense amount of outside help once we indicate that we, as citizens, are out to help ourselves.

kiwaniwood (continued) Q. IS MY DONATION DEDUCTABLE FOR TAX Q. <u>PURPOSES</u> ?

Yes, we believe so. We have not received a reply from our appli-cation to the Federal Government asking them for registration as a Chariable Organization.

Q. YOU HAVE MENTIONED A NUMBER OF OUTSIDE ORGANIZATIONS HERE. JUST HOW DO THEY ALL RELATE TO THE CUILDWOOD COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION AND HOW CAN WE BE SURE THAT THE NEEDS OF THE CITIZENS OF GUILD-WOOD ARE MET PROPERLY ?

At the present time we have firm assurance that the Scarborough Parks and Recreation Department and Scarborough South Kiwanis Club both wish to participate with us in the Kiwaniwood dev-elopment. We are currently holding meetings with members of the Board of Education and have received a very favourable response. We intend to draw up a legal document among the four parties,out-ling the responsibilities of each as to both initial construction and continuing commitments. We will turn over the responsibility for maintaining the Complex to the Parks and Recreation people who have the trained staff and since operating costs for the Kiwaniwood project could reach as much as \$75,000 annually.

WHAT LEVEL OF COMMITMENT ARE YOU Q. SEEKING FROM MEMBERS OF THE VILLAGE ?

Just as much as the citizens are willing to provide. We are inter-ested not only in cash donations but also commitments in the form of labour, experience and know-ledge that can help us complete all phases of the project at the earliest possible date. To assist us in this regard we will be dist ributing, on Friday February 14th, a report on Kiwaniwood progress together with a "skills inventory" form which we will ask all interested residents to complete. This form will provide an opportunity can best help. These forms will be collected during the Community Canvass by our official canvassers and the Canvas will be held during the week of February 15th to 22nd, and will cover all 1400 homes in Guildwood proper plus the greater portions of Markham Bluffs.

Q. WHAT IS MY FAIR SHARE ?

We cannot answer this question direct but a few guide lines may be of some assistance. Our current goal for 1970 is the completion of the first two phases of the project-that is, facilities for four tennis courts completely lighted and fenced, change facilities and most important an outdoor swimming pool with foundations for the pool cover to be completed as phase 5. On the basis of cost sharing as outlined earlier this amounts to a minimum donation of \$5 per family to com-plete Phase 1 - the Tennis Courts, and \$25 per family to permit our completing both Phase 1 and 2 the Swimming Pool.

HOW DO I KNOW THAT MY DONATION WILL BE PROPERLY APPLIED TO THE KIWANIWOOD COMPLEX ?

Receipts will be provided for all donations received. A bank account in the name of Kiwaniwood has been opened in the Guildwood branch of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce. The books will be aud-ited at six month intervals by a Chartered Accountant.

WHY DO WE HAVE TO DO ALL OF THIS WORK OURSELVES TO GET A COMMUNITY RECREATIONAL COMPLEX ? ହ.

> Mainly because other methods that were attempted have failed. We have little to show for the last ten years. Let's get with it and make Kiwaniwood a success.







Frank is also co-ordinating a fund raising campaign in the Markham Bluff area on behalf of "KIWANIWOOD".



Thanks a lot for your time in reading all of this. By the way, congratulations Mr Editor and staff for a much improved format for News and Views. Very Interesting !


HOLY TRINITY CHURCH








This is the first opportunity I have had to thank the many people of Guildwood who voted in the re... cent Municipal election. Particu-larly, I want to express my apprec-iation to those of you who actively iation to those of you who actively participated and supported me in so many ways. It was extremely gra-tifying to see so many people of all ages git involved. As a matter of interest, slightly more than 40% of the eligible voters went to the people of the best turnout polls, which was the best turnout in Scarborough. Needless to say this a very politically active Ward and I hope to further expand this interest

this interest. I am currently working on the dev-elopment of a Ward wide committee of interested residents, to assist in research, formulating policies and generally maintaining an aware-ness of the issues confronting the people of this Ward. It will take a while to sort out many complexities of local government. However, I am prepared to devote the time necessary to do this. 



WHEN THE DROP-IN WAS OPENED IN THE AUTUMN OF 1969, A COMMITTEE OF GUILD-WOOD VILLAGE RESIDENTS HAD PROMISED THE YMCA THAT ADEQUATE PARENTAL SUP-ERVISION WOULD BE SUPPLIED TO ENSURE THAT THE CENTRE WOULD BE ABLE TO FUNCTION EFFECTIVELY. REGRETFULLY, WE AS A COMMUNITY HAD FAILED TO LIVE UP TO OUR OBLIGATION AND THE CLOSING RESULTED.

FORTUNATELY, DISCUSSION AT THE GENERAL MEETING OF THE COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION ON APRIL 1 RESULTED IN SUFFICIENT VOLUNTEERS AMONG PARENTS TO CONVINCE THE YMCA REGIONAL DIR-ECTOR, BOB KEMP THAT THE DROP-IN COULD BE REOPENED.

OUR TEENAGERS MUST ALSO BEAR PART OF THE BLAME FOR THE PROBLEM, SINCE ONE OR MORE OF THEM INFLICTED THE DAMAGE. YOUNG PEOPLE OF GUILDWOOD, WISE-UP: IF ANY MORE DAMAGE IS DONE, THE DROP-IN CENTRE WILL CLOSE PERMAN-ENTLY.



"This is one of the sad things, "This is one of the sad things, that too many people sit at home and think a lot, but do very little... I don't think there are enough people around who are willing to speak free ly, to speak their mind." With these words, Community Association chairman Tom Nicholson summed up one of the major frustrations he encounters in his position in the Association.





Dear Sir



Elsewhere we have recorded the statistical story of the Kiwaniwood Canvas, a success no matter how you look at it. The generous contributions of residents of Guildwood and Markham residents of Guildwood and Marknam Bluffs have carried our Fund Raising activities way over the top. A spec-ial note of thanks should be extend-ed to the Kiwanis Club of South Scar-borough, our partners in this venture, who must have knocked on every door in Markham Bluffs not once but sever-al times al times.

Appropriately enough we can say that "the ball is now in our court". You've provided the dollars; it's up to us to . You've see that those tennis courts are completed and ready for play by Sunday May 31st.1970 as advertised. It's go-ing to be a fight ! We're still on a schedule, but just barely. Made a second presentation to the Parks and Recreation Commission and wrote a letter to the Mayor and the Board of Control when notified by our Alderman Ed Fulton that our gr-ant of \$8,000 from the Borough had been knocked off the budget. It has, as a result, been reinstated.
- 3. In company with the Kiwanis Club, successfully petitioned the Scar-borough Board of Education for 18 parking spots on Elizabeth Simcoe Public School property adjacent to the tennis courts.
- 4. Thoroughly checked out the Borough of Scarborough specifications for the tennis courts with two very knowledgeable people, our Architects representative, Bob Marshall, and the President of the Heron Park Tennis Club, Brian Abbott, both residents of the village.

- 5. Started the formation of what promises to be a most energetic, and aggressive Kiwaniwood Tennis Executive with the able assistance of Bill Schachow.
 - Current strategy of the Subcommit-tee is to return to its original planning role as soon as possible, for the SWIMMING POOL this time, pausing only long enough to meddle occasionally with the details of the Tennis Court construction or the formation of the Tennis Club Executive.

In a planning capacity we are in a unique position to-gether with Kiwanis representatives, to represent to the two major official bodies, Parks and Rec and the Board of Education, the well considered views of local citizens. Incidentally, during the Canvas, there was absolutely no doubt that the people WANT A SWIMMING POOL -and quickly too ! As soon as we've got all our cards sorted out and we know exactly what we want we'll be after Parks and Rec and the School Board again. We'll be after YOU again too. The Canvas for the swimning pool should average \$20. per family to re-alize our financial objectives. Those families who have already contributed \$25. need feel no futher obligation but all additional contributions will be gratefully accepted. No report such as this would be com-plete without alist of those public-minded citizens who have helped us to date. At the risk of omitting someone, here it is



chairmans report

Our April 1st General Membership Meeting barely had a quorum however the meeting was a productive one as our proposed amendments to the Constitution were all adopted. Copies of the revised Constitution can be obtained from any member of the Executive Committee.

A general discussion on the Laurier Drop-In Centre resulted in our deciding to play a more active role in this activity. A number of the members volunteered to assist in the supervision of the Centre and it was agreed that a steering committee should be formed to insure that adequate supervision is provided on a continuing basis. Bob Kemp of the Y.M.C.A. talked to the group and he outlined some of the problems assoc-iated with the Drop-In Centre and emphasized that the school author-ities were willing to co-operate and keep the centre open as long as some one assumes the responsibility to organize a group of parents who in turn would assist in supervising the Centre.

Our efforts to have traffic signals installed at the intersection of Guildwood Parkway and Livingston Rd, and having double left hand turns off the Parkway on to Kingston Road westbound has been favourably rec-eived by the Borough. The light sit-uation at Guildwood Parkway & Liv-ingston has been reclassified from a "B" to an "A" priority and alth-ough this in itself should not infer that we will get lights...it is an indication of the Boroughs acknowledgement of the situation as we see it. The Borough Traffic people have researched our request for double left hand turn off the Parkway and have come up with a very good solution to the problem. They will re-commend lengthening the advanced green light at this intersection to permit a greater flow of traffic through each light change. This will do the job nicely.

With the recent ban on D.D.T. use the Association has been informed that a chemical formulation of Thiathon and Vapona will be used this year. This combination is very effective and also permissible by Government standards. The cost of the new formulation is approximately double the cost of D.D.T. however we still think it is money well spent.

Victoria Day Activities


One of the highlights of Guildwood Village Community Association activities each year is our Gala Victoria Day Celebration. This year will be no exception.

We bespeak for him a warm welcome to the parish and to the community.




POLLUTION: A GUILDWOOD PROBLEM, TOO

REZONING BID FAILS

Most of our readers are no doubt aware of a recent attempt by an real estate developer to have properties on Westlake Road, immediately east of Livingstone Road rezoned.At a meeting of the Scarborough Planning Board on June IIth.the proposal was rejected unanimously.

The executive committee of the Community Association became aware of a proposal by Gulf investments to have five properties currently zoned for single family dwelling, rezoned to permit the construction of 96 suites of two and four bedroom housing in three story row type units. An emergency meeting of the executive committee of the Association held on June I2th. resulted in unanimous agreement to oppose the attempted rezoning.

On June 13th. and 14th a letter was circulated throughout Guildwood Vil lage explaining the rezoning proposal and outlining the executive committee's opposition to it.Residents were invited to also indicate their opposition to the rezoning by signing a letter to be forwarded to the Scarborough Planning Department.

The opposition to the developers proposal was overwhelming.Over 575 families indicated strong objection to any rezoning. The response was also widespread. As might have been expected there was almost IOO% reaction from homeowners immediately adjacent to the area affected. More surprisingly was the large number of letters signed by residents of the Village not immediately affected and particularly those south of Guildwood Parkway.

The Scarborough Planning Board was made aware of the massive opposition of Village residents.By June IOth several hundred letters had been de livered to Don Easton Scarborough Commissioner of Planning.Other village residents had also publicized the feelings of Guildwood taxpayers.

The Planning Board meeting was att ended by a number of Association members led by Tom Nicholson,Les Brown who acted as spokesman for the association and Ed Fulton,our Alderman.Legal counsel for the devel opers spoke at length on the propsal He disputed the conclusion of the Borough engineers that storm and sanitary sewers were inadequate to support the proposed development.Les Brown spoke briefly for Guildwood. On a Motion by Karl Mallette the application for rezoning was denied unanimously by the planning board.

Weeks of preparation by the Victoria Day Committee culminated at 6:30 A.M. on May 18th. when the day's activities began when a truck loaded with materials driven by our hard-working Chairman Tom Nicholson rolled onto

the grounds of Laurier Collegiate. Tom and Eric Parker soon had the area strewn with lumber and assorted bits and pieces. Sam Sauve soon entered the fray, hammer in hand, and things started to take shape. The working group increased rapidly although space doesn't permit us to list everyone.

Before long, Rene and Eric Fisher were setting up the refreshment stand and the aroma of hot coffee soon filled the air.

The festive atmosphere was accentuated as Barb Jensen's crew put the final touches on games of skill and chance. Eager players soon surrounded them attempting to win one of the many prizes available. (cont page 2)

EDITORIAL

Elsewhere in this issue the results of a recent attempt to spot rezone an area of Guildwood Village are reported in detail. This particular situation very amply illustrates the necessity for the maintenance and growth of a strong, active community association with broadly based support throughout the Village. If we are to retain the unique character and superior environment of this area, it is imperative that our efforts to prevent its destruction be redoubled in the future.We can expect the assault by moneyhungry apartment builders to increase, not decline!

Too many of our public officials have in the past, allowed their better judgements to be subordinated to the pursuit of tax revenue. They were either unaware or did not care that they created future mass ive social problems when they permitted excessive housing densities through apparently uncontrolled high-rise construction.Most of our representatives will protest "But it has been controlled!"We reply "Hogwash".All anyone has to do is look around Scarborough for confirmation.The unhappy results of inadequate recreational facilities, overloaded services,traffic conges tion and family and social problems are multiplied beyond all proporties occur.

In the recent case in Guildwood the developer proposed to increase the housing density in the area in question by over 19 times. Was there any concurrent proposal to increase our already overloaded public recreational facilities? No! Was there any commitment to expand permanent educational facilities to cope with the increased population? Never! Did the developer consider the effects of the greatly increased traffic in an already congested area? Apparently not.

We believe that the unanimous rejection by the Scarborough Planning Board to rezone in Guildwood illustrates growing awareness of the

necessity to consider the social results of planning decisions. This awareness must be fostered among all our elected representatives and public officials. The Guildwood Village Community Association and the News & Views are dedicated to the preservation of Guildwood Village as a good place to live and we will continue to encourage responsible planning in Scarborough.





The first thing the KIWANIWOOD TENNIS CLUB executive would like to do is thank the residents of Guildwood for the overwhelming suport they have given the Tennis Club. The number of people applying for membership far exceeded all expectations and, as a result, the membership is greatly over subscribed. we unfortunately had to call a halt to accepting any more members and further applicants were and are being placed on a waiting list.

The Tennis Club may be likened to a boat and at this moment the water is only a couple of inches from the edge. If the waters are calm we may be able to take on more members until the water is one inch or less from the edge. But we can not let chaos develop. The very most the tennis courts can handle in one evening is 70 players-if everyone who has had a turn on the courts goes home, and if everyone observes tennis etiquette. It is very unlikely that new applicants will be able to become club members this season, however the courts are open for <u>anyone</u> from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. on weekdays. We have all been waiting impatiently for the completion of the courts-and we are finally there. 





KIWANIWOOD PROCEEDS

Hello again! This is your regular Kiwaniwood Progress Report. In the May issue we were telling you about some of the problems we had been having with rain which delayed the tennis court construction. When all the clouds had cleared away, the courts were completed June 26 and dedicated June 27, thanks to a much appreciated, concerted effort from both the Recreation and Parks Department and the lighting contractor. Jack Keay deserves a real pat on the back for his efforts here!

As Bill Schachow implies elsewhere in this edition, the Tennis Club is now flourishing, with a total of almost 600 (600, count them, 600) beautiful members. To add icing to the cake, we have not had to turn away any local people who put their name in on the waiting list. This has been most encouraging to our Kiwaniwood Subcommittee and just gives us more reason than ever for pushing on to Phase 2, the outdoor Swimming Pool. We missed our May 31 deadline for completion of the Tennis Courts by 27 days, but we don't intend to let this happen again. We have set our sights a little higher this time (now that we've had a little practice), aiming for the outdoor Swimming Pool at the Sylvan Park location to be completed prior to July 1,1971 at a cost of approximately \$80,000. We have seen examples of some beautiful outdoor pools, complete with concrete decks and good change facilities, costing less than this figure.

Of course we've got a long way to go yet. We don't yet have a clear commitment to the land itself, nor do we have any firm assurances as to financial backing from the Borough of Scarborough or the Province of Ontario. Nevertheless, on the basis of our previous experience, it should be possible to get the pool built for a cost (to us) of approximately \$30,000. The Kiwanis



The value of a strong, effective community association was amply illustrated by our successful battle to prevent spot rezoning in Guildwood. We can expect this type of sniping at the character of the Village to continue. We <u>must</u> continue to be an active organization with broad support to resist future rezoning attempts.

We have had a very active sports and recreation programme during the past year. Over 350 boys and girls from Guildwood and Markham Bluffs participated in our softball programme. Over 125 of our boys played organized soccer sponsored by the Scarborough Minor Soccer Association and supported by the Community Assaciation. Other activities included tennis, floor hockey, skating (on outdoor rinks maintained by the G.V. C.A.) and swimming.

Our major social activities were two very successful dances held at the Moose Hall. The association also

Street lights have been installed on Westlake Road from the GO station to Galloway Road.





Elizabeth Simcoe

Elizabeth Simcoe begins the school year with an enrolment of 870 students. The number of staff members has increased, as well as the number of portables! We anticipate that this year will be a very active one.

Mrs. Donellan's Grade 1 class got off to a good start by taking the first excursion of the term to Bowmanville Zoo on September 11th. In sports, the Intermediate students are already involved in a friendly Flag Football league.

As in previous years we plan to show a full length movie each month. The first will be on Friday, October 2nd and is the family favourite 'Lady and the Tramp'. A very different form of acting was seen at the school on September 24th when we were visited by the much-sought-after Young People's Theatre Company. They emphasized child participation in their performance of "Balloon Faces" for the Grade 1 and 2 classes and "Almighty Voice" for Grades 5 and 6. Following its trial run in June, the Safety Patrol organized by Mr. Jones is again doing its invaluable work. At school we are continuing to emphasize that the Patrol can only be effective if other students, especially those in the primary grades, watch for and obey the crossing guards. Car drivers in the area can easily identify the guards by their orange belts and coats.

The school will hold its annual Curriculum Night on October 13th. Parents are invited to meet the staff and to hear the proposed programme of study for the year, as well as an outline of school policy. Our guest speaker will be Mr. F.S. Cooper, the Assistant Director of Education for the Borough of Scarborough. We hope the 13th will provide the opportunity for meeting new families in the district as well as for renewing old acquaintances.

Guildwood

We welcome several new members to the staff of Guildwood Public School this year. Miss B. Bianca, from Toronto Teachers' College, is specially assigned and is doing remedial work in reading in the primary grades; Mrs. C. Henderson is an experienced teacher from the United States who is teaching Grade 5; Mr. J. Cadan from Highcastle Junior School, Scarborough has a Grade 7 class; in Grade 8 as Grade Chairman is Mr. J. Heino formerly at H.A. Halbert School, Scarborough; Mr. G. Barrett, returned from sabbatical leave in England, is the new principal.

The total school enrobment is 555 with 42 children in the kindergarten and 513 in grade classrooms. The senior pupils are involved in a rotar system which has five classes partici pating in a programme where History, Geography, Composition, Science, Art, French, Physical Education and Health are on a rotary time-table. The home teacher is responsible for the remain der of the subjects. Girls' teams have been entered in the Junior and Senior Borden-ball League and boys' Soccer teams in the bantam, junior and senior divisions. The girls and boys have been practicing with great enthusiasm and this effort has started to show results as the Senior Boys Soccer team defeated Meadowvale Public School 7-0 in their first game played September 24th.

The first Home and School executive meeting was held on Monday evening, September 28th. The programme for the year was discussed in broad detail and it was agreed that meetings would be planned with the panel discussion theme in mind. There will be a Home and School night in October, and further information will be sent to each home.

St. Ursula's

As a result of the Board's recent decision, St. Ursula's School now offers a half-day morning Junior Kindergarten programme. The purpose is to broaden the experience of each child emotionally, socially,

physically, and intellectually. We have also expanded our French programme this year to include Grade 2 students. These pupils under the direction of Madame M. DiMambro are now having oral French lessons each day.

The sacrament of Confirmation will be administered to pupils in grades 5 to 8 by Bishop T. Fulton, Thursday November 12th at 7:30 P.M. in St. Boniface Church.

Several classes are now preparing for their up-coming excursion to Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre, Hidland, Ontario. Under the guidance of several naturalist, the students will view and discuss various adaptations of plants and animals.

St. Ursula School instrumental music programme under the direction of Mr. W. Jacobs now includes students in grades 5,6 and 7. Some of these students will also soon begin rehearsals each Saturday for the Metropolitan Separate School Board Elementary School Concert Band.

Our school flag football team, coached by Mr.W. Boyle and Mr. J. Clarke, has been torking hard to prepare for our area's interschool tournament. The team recently completed a successful series of exhibition games against some of our neighbouring schools. We would be pleased to have any parents who may have the necessary time and interest assist us with any of the school extra-curricular sports programme that we are now planning.







This year's recipients were Pam Griffiths and 'Hardy Limeback, both Ontario Scholars and honour students throughout their years of schooling at Laurier.

Pam is presently enrolled in a General Arts Course at Victoria College, University of Toronto. Pam contributed extensively to the life of the school during her five years at Laurier. She was a member of the debating club from 1965 to 1968, of the senior band from 1965 to 1969, of the assembly club from 1968 to 197-. She played the lead in "Oklahoma" in 1967, served as Simpsons' Representative in 1969-70 and was editor of the year book in 1969-70. Pam resides with her family at 19 Somerdale Square.

Hardy has decided this year to gain a year's work experience and will attend university next year. He is now in Dusseldorf, Germany working on the office staff at one of the large hotels. Hardy added a great deal to the life of Laurier during his five years of attendance. He was a member of the senior band for two years, headed up the United Appeal in 1970 and played senior basketball from 1966 to 1970. Hardy is highly regarded by members of the staff and other students and will undoubtedly be successful in University when he returns to begin his studies next fall. KIWANIWOOD PROGRESS REPORT

Progress continues to be made in our quest for the swimming pool to be built in Sylvan Park. At a recent meeting with one of the Scarborough Parks and Rec. officials, we received considerable support for a pool in Guildwood. He indicated that we could count on the Departments' support in the form of a guarantee to supply land for such a project. In addition, we were advised to go ahead with our fundraising activities, to indicate



clearly the level of community interest in the Kiwaniwood Project. The Department has accepted our target date of July 1,1971 and will work with us, as in the past, once we have obtained the concurrence of the various levels of local government to proceed. The Department agrees that a pool in the Guildwood area is sorely needed.

We will be making our first submission to the Parks and Rec. Committee during the week of October 26. Unfortunately, the outcome of this Meeting was not known at press time.

We have approached one of Metro's largest outdoor pool contractors and discussed our construction requirements with him in considerable detail. He indicated that a 25 metre L-or T-shaped pool with one and three metre diving boards and change facilities could be constructed for \$70,000. Assuming normal participation of the Province under the Community Centres Act and a matching contribution from the Borough, we could count on \$15,000 and \$27,500 respectively from these sources. This would leave us with \$27,500 to raise through our two major fund raising activities-the Walkathon, November 21, and the Car Lottery in the spring. Further Walkathon details are available in a front page

Public housing by the Ontario Housing Corporation (O.H.C.) in Scarborough will be the subject for the next Public Information Forum I will sponsor on Tuesday November 17th in the teachers' lounge at West Hill Collegiate. The discussion starts at 8:00 p.m. West Hill Collegiate is on Morningside Avenue just north of Kingston Road. Mark your datebook now! And bring along a neighbour. Find out what government decisions are affecting your own neighbourhood and community before you discover you can't change those decisions.

The first "Community Conversation" attracted 72 Guildwood residents: 18 teenagers and 54 parents. That was on September 29th at Sir Wilfred Laurier Collegiate. I learned a lot from the often heated discussions on education, foreign ownership, drugs, etc. I am holding these informal, "non-structured" meeting in every neighbourhood in the provincial riding of Scarborough East (east of Markham Road). Politics is a two way street: I must provide the opportunities to meet the people I represent and you have to get in touch with me either at such forums or make the effort to phone or call on me! The Ontario Legislature went back to work on October 6th. The spending estimates of both the Department of Education and the Department of University affairs, totalling more than \$1.5 billion, have been passed. As the Official Opposition spokesman for the estimates, I spoke at length on the waste of the tarpayers' money on duplication of facilities and programmes and called for a Special Investigation on Education costs in Ontario. The Government turned a very deaf ear to such a proposal. If you would like to have a copy of <u>Hansard</u> which contains my remarks and proposals please phone Mrs. Frances Winter at 365-2145 and ask her to send you the material.

I'd appreciate your comments and suggestions for future debates in the Legislature.

TRUSTEE REPORT

The growth of community involvement in edugation is one of the more encouraging trends in our schools these days, and one which has the support of most educators.

The Council-Board Liaison Committee, of which I am co-chairman, for example, is promoting ways by which schools can be used recreationally evenings and weekends.

This has led to the opening of dropin centres at three schools in Ward 7-Laurier(Tuesday and Wednesday evenings); Guildwood(Friday evening); R.H. King (Monday and Thursday evenings).

All are under leaders appointed by the Recreation Department. Funds for this staff have been provided through the Board of Education granting that department the free use of schools for all its programs instead of charging rent as in previous years.

Volunteers to help these leaders will he much appreciated as the attendance is often large.



why have these centres? One reason is that they offer a more wholesome place than street corners for young people to spend their evenings, and it is also hoped that if a student participates in a healthy activity instead of an unhealthy one, he is better prepared to meet the requirements of his school day. Another example of community invol vement is the public opinion survey the Board of Education has authorized to learn what citizens think on various educational issues. This study will provide a guide for trustees and educators in charting the course our schools should follow.

Safety patrols to help pupils cross busy intersections have been established at many Scarborough schools. They have been added recently to the program of Elizabeth Simcoe, and appreciation is expressed to the boys and girls who are helping on these patrols. Training is provided by the police department and organization is co-ordinated by the principals and the board staff.

The vast majority of us will live our everday lives as we did a few days ago. This brings me back to the question posed at the beginning, 'What is Freedom?'




cost of the facilities and the refreshments--probably around 1.00 per person. We decided not to have & banquet because it would be too expensive and we do want the Junior members to show up.


Since the last issue we have successfully completed another milestone in our quest for the pool. At a meeting of Scarborough Council, November 9, agreement in principle was given, on a vote of 11 to 3, to provide us with a grant of \$30,000 towards the cost of an outdoor pool in Sylvan Park. The province will supply \$15,000 and it is up to us to raise the remaining \$30,000 by April 15, 1971, the latest date for tendering on the pool.

At a meeting with the Recreation and Parks Department and a pool building consultant, our plans were reviewed in detail and the figure of \$70,000 for pool construction approved as being reasonable for all costs except

services. Permission of the Recreation and Parks Committee has been asked to obtain detailed engineering drawings of the swimming pool complex from which more precise services costs can be determined and from which tenders can be called in March or April of 1971.

It was fun to walk with neighbourhood students on November 21 when about 700 of them turned out to support the proposed Kiwaniwood's swimming pool for Guildwood.

Organizing their efforts involved liaison between the local committee and the schools through the Board of Education's Auxiliary Services Department.

It was only one of several such efforts in which Scarborough students have shared under this department's leadership in 1970--Rotary Olympathon, Unicef, Miles For Millions, Kinsmen's Elephant Walk, Grotto Cerebral Palsy tag day, United Nations Peace Rose Day, the United Appeal being others.

Participating in projects of this kind is a constructive demonstration of "student power" and also a learning experience for our society's future adult citizens.

The Jack Miner Senior Public School on Guildwood Parkway is progressing on time and should be completed this Spring in good time to receive its Grade 7 and 8 pupils next September. Why is it being built? Its facilities in our (Canadian) national interest? and program will both relieve potentia Of the sixteen companies in Canada crowding at two local schools and also that sell textbooks to our elementary give pupils a better preparation for collegiate. This kind of school collegiate. This kind of school brings the Scarborough system up to the level of education in other parts of Metro, all of which have a three -level program. Some have senior public schools (Grades 7 and 8), others junior high schools (Grades 7, 8 and 9), others middle schools (grades 6, 7 and 8). Intermediate schools have been introduced throughout the province and not to do so here out the province and not to to be and would short-change our own children. The opening of the new Jack Miner Senior Public School will thus mark real progress in our program. It will real progress in our program. It will serve boys and girls from Guildwood, Elizabeth Simcoe, and Poplar Road Public Schools.

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



What does a Member of Parliament do when his "House is not sitting"! Do I simply sit around home enjoying a rather extended holiday until the successor to the Honourable John Robarts calls all 117 members of the Ontario Legislature back to sit in solemn consideration of new laws and a new \$4 billion budget?

Well, here's some of the things that have been keeping your MPP busy.

The "Community Conversation" programme in the riding has been stepped up from one every two weeks in October and November to at least three every two weeks starting in mid-January. If you were unable to come to the Community Conversations at Sir Wilfrid Laurier last September or at Elizabeth Simcoe in November, you are most welcome to come and participate in one of these informal discussion sessions in another neighbourhood. Here are some scheduled dates and places: Tuesday, February 9th at Military Trail Senior Public School; Thursday, February 11th, Cedardrive Junior Public School; Tuesday, February 16th, Tecumseh Senior Public School. Other dates are February 18th and 23 and March 4,10 and 23. TRUSTEE REPORT

by R. F. Stackhouse Trustee, Ward 7

Controlling the cost of education is one of the big challenges facing the Board of Education this year. In Scarborough we have had a good record in this regard, our per pupil cost at present being the lowest in Metro. Nonetheless, we will be required to cut our budget still further in 1971. How can this be done? It will mean postponing any worthwhile proposals for program improvement and even cutting back some already started. But as well, it may mean a slight increase in the pupil-teacher ratio.

The largest part of our school operation costs are the instructional salaries which come to 70% of the annual budget. It is difficult to conceive major savings that don't affect this # 1 item. That is why the Metropolitan Toronto School Board suggests the possibility of an increase in the pupil-teacher ratio. This would mean our teaching staff would not expand in 1971 as much as it has during recent years.

The idea is not welcome to anyone who knows the importance of the pupil-teacher ratio but it may be unavoidable.

This matter is still before the Board and trustees must look at every aspect of budget control in order to achieve the best savings and at the same time, safeguard the quality of the school program.

The Laurier Word

A NEW KIND OF HOME AND SCHOOL FOR LAURIER

After all the troubled reports emanating from Laurier, this could be considered a "good news" story.

A group of Students, Teachers and Parents have agreed to sit on an Advisory Committee at Laurier, for the purpose of cultivating a closer working relationship between home and school.

Over the next few months it is our intention to have discussions, and hopefully solutions, for a variety of problems affecting students, teachers and finally parents.

Our first meeting of the year was held January 25th and the agenda included a round table discussion on the "questionable preparedness" of a student entering the business world today. It is a shattering experience for him to discover that his sheltered learning years did not sufficiently prepare him for the "competitiveness" and "decision making" expected of him once he enters the marketplace. There was a general agreement that more on-thejob training, or in-school corporation (or business) management, should be incorporated into the school system.

Also high on the agenda was discussion of the Board of Education proposal to increase the pupil-teacher ratio in Ontario schools. A very determined stand will be taken by the Committee in opposing this action as it was agreed that any increase in the size of the class would be detrimental to the function of both the teacher and the student, and must be avoided. We will be making recommendations as to more acceptable areas of cost-cutting (eg-equipment budgets, administrative personnel, fuller use of buildings and equipment)

Balmoral Estates wants to build a recreation centre to service its town house "development." By-law 9676 states that a minimum set-back of 450 feet from the water's edge is necessary for all buildings. The recreation centre would have a set-back of 430 feet.

Mine is a definite feeling of disillusionment and dejection on Sylvan about the town houses being built at all. Mine is also a fairly active movement to prevent any additional building.



This is our progress to date, the committee meets every 2nd and 4th Monday at 8:00 P.M. at Cedarbrook Community Centre and cordially invites you to attend.



CAST HEAR DETAILS OF "DIARY OF ANNE FRANK" FIRST HAND

Twenty-nine years ago, a Dutchman named Kraler hid eight Jews in the attic of his office building in Amsterdam. One of the fugitives, thirteen year old Anne Frank, kept a diary that was later published, publicized, and adapted into a stage play. The students of Sir Wilfrid Laurier C. I. are presenting that play on Feb. 11,12 and 13 with a little help from Mr. Kraler. His real name is Krugler, and he has lived in Canada for fifteen years. Despite the fact that he now lives in Weston, he made the trip out to Guildwood Village on Jan. 24th to speak with the cast and crew of "The Diary of Anne Frank". He sat in a straight chair, with the students circling him on the floor, and searched for the English words to describe Amsterdam in the Second World War. Pictures of Anne and her sister Margot, young Peter Van Daan, and the secret home of the Franks and Van Daans were passed around while Mr. Krugler told of what happened after Anne's story had come to an end...his own capture and freedom, conversations with Mr. Frank, who is still alive in Switzerland. "Anne was a very quick girl," he said, remembering. "She perceived everything immediately..." In the play "The Diary of Anne Frank" the Laurier Drama Club will bring this perception to life again.


We were very pleased with the results of the Community Walkathon. A total of \$7,100 has been banked and a surplus of \$2,300 has been carried over from the initial canvass for the tennis courts. We hope to collect <u>all</u> of the Walkathon money within the next two or three weeks, raising our balance to the \$10,000 mark.

The Kiwaniwood Tennis Club has delighted us with a pledge of approximately \$750.00. Bill Schachow, the President, has announced that the Club will provide us with 3/4 of their 1970 gross proceeds, less one hundred dollars. It is most gratifying to see this type of feedback occurring so quickly, less than a year from the start of our original fund raising. Not only is our first baby alive and well but, at the age of 10 months, is able to help support its parents! Our congratulations, Bill, for a job extrem mely well done.

In our campaign of last year we were able to apply 98 cents of every dollar collected, towards the cost of building the courts themselves. In other words, the fund raising was accomplished in total by hard working, unpaid volunteers from the Community. Only a few unavoidable expenses for printing and postage were charged against the Project. It is our intention that this next phase of the campaign will be carried out in the same economical manner.

CREDIBILITY GAP and COMMUNICATION GAP

These are two word groupings that have become commonplace in our vocabulary. Generally speaking, we confine the former to our disbelief in the words and promises uttered by politicians, whereas the latter is used primarily when one doesn't hear, won't hear, doesn't believe the sincerity of the other. Generally the young not believing the older.

There is a great deal in common between the two phrases. To paraphrase-Your actions are contrary to your words!

IS THERE A CREDIBILTY GAP IN YOUR CHRISTIAN LIFE?

I feel confident that the latest census rolls would list at least 95% of our community as Christian. I also believe the 'action rolls' of the various churches would contain far fewer names of those who put their action where their mouths are. That difference in percentages represents the Christian 'credibility gap' in our lives.

The younger generation accuse the older generation of having a distorted sense of values. 'What you practice belies what you preach'

I believe a great number of the young are equally confused, but that, in no way, discredits what they proclaim.

If we believe in God as revelated in Christ, and don't live it---the gap is real.

If we insist in our children going to church school or confirmation class and don't attend the worship services of the church, then our definition of Christianity is similar to our belief in castor oil; it is good for you--but not for me.

We live by our values. Our values in turn reflect our attidutes, which in turn reflect our actions. Some claim, in way of defense, that values and attitudes can't be measured?


Jesus didn't appear to agree with this excuse. I believe he was declaring an accurate measuring stick when he said 'By their fruits you shall know them' (Matt7:16)

If we are amongst those who contribute to the Christian credibility gap, yet proclaim to be Christian-then our faith leaves us no choice but to reassess our values, and perhaps we will discover the validity of the claim of the young.






With less than five or six walkers to be heard from, our Walkathon receipts total \$7,800 which is most gratifying. We anticipate a final total of approximately \$8,000.

We are often tempted to make number one priority the amassing of wealth, of possessions (to provide the best for our family of course, to give our kids things which we didn't have) We devote our entire time and energy to this aim, which becomes our God. So we succeed, except that we have devoted so little time to those for whom we were allegedly working, that we have seriously damaged the relationship with our loved ones. 'Man does not live by bread alone'. The words of Christ. Matthew's 2nd and 3rd temptations also hit very close to home. To be such a dramatic personality that everyone pays homage to us as a real hero; to have such power over others that homage is something that others must pay. Is this what life is all about? Jesus Christ, who offers the fullest life to man, says 'No'. He declares that life in its totality can only be found in Him, that He brings to man the opportunity to share in God's kingdom the life that the Creator God intended. All we need is to accept it and come to Him.

TRUSTEE REPORT

Picture the mammoth O'Keefe Centre filled with a lively, interested audience ready to jeer or cheer, groan or applaud.

They are not a typical matinee crowd for a smash hit.

They are this borough's mighty teach-ing task force which this year held its annual Professional Development Day in one place for all teachers from Kindergarten to Grade 13, and had to go to the O'Keefe to find a place big enough to hold them.


Attending part of their session was a great insight for me. It drove home just how big a school system we have in Scarborough and how it has mushroomed in the last decade and a half.

In 1954 a similar all Scarborough convention was held and all the teachers met in the General Purpose Room of Cliffside Public School. Today with 87,000 students, the fourth largest public system in Canada, 4,000 teachers needed the O'Keefe.

When we consider that 71 cents of every dollar spent to operate our schools go into instructional salaries, we see one of the major reas-ons for the cost of education-and it is money well spent because there cannot be good education without good teachers.

The teachers at this meeting ware impressive for the way they put per-tinent questions to their disting-uished visitor, Hon. William Davis, Ontario's new prime minister making his last public appearance as Minister of Education.

MPP REPORTS

As Her Majesty's Loyal Official Opposition Spokesman in the Ontario Legislature for University Affairs, I believe our universities are rapidly being "de-Canadianized." I wonder what you think?

In my opinion, the point of no return has been reached in the de-Canadianization of the teaching staff, in the de-Canadianization of the graduate student body and in the de-Canadianization of the learning materials available in the libraries, bookstores and in the offices of the teaching staff. Virtually by the process of omission, Canadian undergraduate and graduate students are being increasingly denied opportunities to discover and study about their own present culture and their own past inheritance.

The Government of the Province of Ontario must:

(a) Require each university in Ontario to have Canadians make up at least a majority of its teaching staff within two years.

(b) Encourage with financial incentives the hiring of qualified Canadians in the 1970's so that each department in each university would have Canadians as a majority of its teaching staff within three years, with this ratio reaching the twothirds level in six years. (c) Require the President of any university that did <u>not</u> meet these standards to appear before the Standing Committee on University Affairs of the Ontario Legislature to explain why his university had not achieved these standards. The Canadian public has a right to know just why at McMaster University, for example. 13 of the 18 teachers in the Department of Folitical Science are Americans, when there are so many highly qualified Canadians in this particular field who are looking for university teaching positions My own personal view is, that for most of the de-Canadianized Departments (where Canadians account for fewer than two-thirds of the teaching staff), this policy would: (a) mean that no present non-Canadian teacher need be let go because of his citizenship---the policy is phased in over six years and present non-Canadians could, if they wish to become part of our country, become Canadian citizens; (b) mean that for some Departments which are excessively non-Canadian because of an excessive policy of hiring anybody but Canadians in the 1960's, a policy of hiring "qualified Canadians-only" would have to be adopted or additional staff hired at all in those particular departments.

In my opinion, there are too many first-rate Canadians being denied teaching positions in Ontario's universities and too many less than first-rate non-Canadians hired at this very moment. This must stop. Please tell me what you think. Scarborough Ballet Company Seventh Annual Season of Ballet







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PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE G.V.C.A.

CONSTITUTION

An amendment has been proposed by Mr. Jim Sykes to revise Article V11-By-Laws, of the Guildwood Village Community Association. Following are details of the proposed amendment: <u>PRESENT CONSTITUTION</u> "(q) Only a paid-up member and his or her spouse, if applicable, will be permitted to vote on any question at any meeting of the Association"

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

(q) Only a paid-up member, his or her spouse, and their children of age 16 and over, if applicable, to a maximum of two votes per family, will be permitted to vote on any question at any meeting of the Association"

REASON FOR AMENDMENT

Under Article VI-Duties of Officers, Section (h), "The Youth Director shall..represent the youth of the community on the Executive Committee" This fact seems to be in direct conflict with the fact that youth, as part of a family membership group in the Association, is denied the right to properly elect a representative of their own choice. In order to obtain this right our constitution requires that a youth must buy his or her own membership which defeats any purpose in Article IV (a)

The above proposed amendment will be placed before the membership of the association for consideration at the General Membership Meeting to be held at Guildwood Public School, April 7,1971.

TRUSTEE REPORT



Our school board has always taken pride in being ready to look at a new idea, and as a result has given leadership in many new developments such as community colleges, special vocational schools, and others. It showed this pioneering spirit at a recent meeting when it agreed to prepare a course in religious studies for use in the secondary schools as a credit option.

Until now religion has been taught exclusively in the elementary schools and never as a credit subject. Putting it into the secondary curriculum, however, was recommended by the McKay Committee on religion in public education, and it is expected the Ontario Department of Education will soon authorize this teaching.

You may wonder why this is being proposed when some people have wanted to eliminate all reference to religion in schools, but there are good reasons.

One is that if religious studies are offered as an option, they will be taken only by those students that want them. There can be no question of discrimination, pressure, or any other undesirable influence.



A second is that religious studies have acquired a new popularity in many universities and colleges where they are offered on the same optional basis. Religion is not only part of life exciting a natural curiousity among the young, but it deals with the fundamental issues of existence and therefore speaks to a young person where he is really concerned.

The proposed course will be prepared by a committee of Scarborough

educators and will have to be submitted to the provincial department and the local board before being used. It is not expected it will be introduced before September 1972.

We agree with the petitioners that Laurier would have been the best location possible for the pool but it was out of the question since the next addition to Laurier was planned without a pool, despite the most determined efforts by the residents of Guildwood to have one included. If we were to delay our pool in hopes of having a pool included in some possible future expansion at Laurier, we would have no guarantee of con-struction by 1972, by 1973, by 1979 or ever!

Under the able chairmanship of Alderman Ed Fulton, a meeting was held on March 26th at the Elizabeth Simcoe School Auditorium to discuss the petition. It was attended by School Trustee Reg Stackhouse, the Kiwaniwood Sub-Committee, Community Association executive, and 15 or so local residents, most of whom signed the petition. It was a well conducted meeting and some limited aggreement was reached on points such as traffic, noise and alternate locations (likely none).

The whole problem is aggravated by the relatively small percentage of park area in the immediate vicinity. Whatever space is available should be used to the maximum advantage of all of the local residents, not just those living adjacent to it; how-ever, Community Association and the Kiwaniwood Sub-Committee is fully aware of its obligation to the residents near the pool. We intend to take all reasonable steps to minimize the noise level in the immediate vicinity by constructing an elevated area around the pool to deflect the noise upwards and by planting dense trees to absorb as much sound as possible. We have secured a commitment from the Board of Education to construct 18 additional parking spaces for Kiwaniwood as part of the current construction of a new

wing to Elizabeth Simcoe Public School. With 21 spaces presently available, plus these 18, we believe, on the basis of statistics we have overcome any potential parking problems.



POOL FUND \$33,000

At the Guildwood Village Community Association Dance at the Guild Inn on April 24th, Mrs. Marv Macher our "First Lady of Guildwood" drew the name of the lucky winner of our car lottery, Mr. Gordon R. Hart, 127 Shoreham Drive, Downsview. The seller of the winning ticket, #38660, was George Abbott, 260 Sylvan Avenue.

We're over the top in our pool fund raising! At the time of our draw on April 24th. we had over \$33,000 after expenses. As we indicated earlier, any surplus funds will be used to assist in landscaping and beautification of the site; however, it is premature to speculate at this time since we have not yet gone to tender. Although we have strong assurances that the the tender price will be less than \$70,000 for the pool itself(less than \$80,000 for the total cost of pool plus services), we have no way of knowing what the actual costs will be until bids are opened.

We were successful in our recent submissions to the Scarborough Recreation and Parks Committee, Board of Control and Council. Initially we received support for the project, subject to the restriction that "further discussion take place with regard to the possibility of locating an alternate site for the swimming pool. In our opinion, we completely satisfied the requirement to examine alternate locations and we received the unanimous endorsement of Board of Control(5 members) and Council (15 members). A special thanks to Alderman Ed Fulton for his vital support. Ed was instrumental in convincing Board of Control that all feasible alternate locations had been sought.

It is virtually impossible at this time to thank all of the people who have assisted us on this project

We have had 40 Area Captains alone helping us (including our Board of Education Trustee, Dr. Reg Stackhouse and our M.P.P. Tim Reid) and these fellows all worked hard. The Area Captains enlisted the assistance of 150 to 200 Team Captains who in turn distributed lottery tickets to upwards of 1,500 homes who in turn sold something of the order of 25,000 tickets. A vote of thanks here to our organizing genius, Jim Foster, who developed the <u>idea</u> for this sales organization, and who made it work!


We are completing plans and specifications prior to going to tender. Although we lost two weeks on our schedule, we believe that we can still meet our completion date of July 1.

What's up for May? Well, we have



Elected politicians often get asked to join and support voluntary citizen groups and to become publicly identified with them and their objectives. Why then, has the newly formed COMMITTEE FOR AN INDEPENDENT CANADA (CIC) made it a policy <u>not</u> to ask MP's and MPP's to become members of the Committee? Why has the CIC treated such politicians as undesirables?

The answer is found in the purpose of the CIC which is to let governments at all levels (including school boards) know that millions of Canadians from all parts of Canada regardless of their political party affiliation are aware and deeply concerned about the effects on their country of the present degree of foreign influence on our values, culture and economy. The CIC believes that the issue of foreign influence on Canada is in danger of becoming monopolized by a rather small, articulate minority who believe in solutions that are unacceptable to most Canadians and that this is unwise for two reasons.

First,other Canadians who are just as concerned about the future of their country are in effect excluded from having an organized influence on governments. Secondly, because the solutions of the articulate minority, for example, large scale nationalization, are so unacceptable to governments that those governments will use this as an excuse to do very little, if anything, at all about the problem. Therefore, the CIC wants to safeguard its-(cont'd page 4)







Karen Chartier (Grade 8) is our representative in the 27th Annual C.Y.O public speaking contest.





Alderman reports Ed Fulton

For the first time in years your Municipal taxes in 1971 will act-ually show a decrease! This will amount to \$18 on a house assessed at \$5000.00 While the deduction is not that large, I'm sure that with to-day's economic situation any re-duction is welcome. Savings could have been greater but Council dehave been greater but Council de-cided to continue its prepayment program for the new Town Centre and to allocate much needed funds to our Recreation and Parks Department. Nearly a quarter of a million dollars will be spent to improve, enlarge and connect the dressing rooms at the arenas we covered last year. Other major items include the installation of an all weather track at Birchmount Stadium and, of course, the Borough share of the Kiwaniwood Pool.

Last October, Alderman Belfontaine and I initiated negotiations with the Metro Roads people to explore how Kingston Rd. might be improved aesthetically and structurally. The early results of our efforts was early results of our efforts was the resurfacing of Kingston Rd., from Midland Ave., to Markham Rd. Subsequent to this, with the ass-istance of Alderman Paul Cosgrove and our Commissioner of Works, a report was prepared and unanimously adopted by Council. This report to Metro stresses the need to improve the road bed. more clearly define the road bed, more clearly define egress and access points, provide improved curbs and sidewalks, improved street lighting and clean up and landscape the median strip and road shoulders. I don't think Metro has paid enough attention to Scarboroughs needs over the years and this current request to assist us in improving our main thoroughfares is more than reasonable. Heaven knows we need it. Your written support would be appreciated.

SWIMMING POOL REPORT

In spite of herculean efforts on the In spite of herculean efforts on the part of our architectural and de-sign staff, there will be a six week delay in pool completion to August 14. Our designer, Allen Workman of A.C. Murphy Construction Limited, has literally worked around the clock for us as has Bob Fernandez of Frost-Fernandez Associates I of Frost-Fernandez Associates. I can't speak too highly of the co-operation we have received from these two gentlemen, neither of whom is from the Guildwood area.

What has caused the delay, if we have received this type of cooperation? I would have to say: "Inexperience". We underestimated and exactness of the drawings and written specifications. Our final package will consist of ten detailed drawings and approximately 80 typed pages of materials and meth-ods of construction. We heartily endorse this degree of exactness demanded by the Borough for, with-out it, we would have no guarantee of quality or staying within budget.


We thought we had two things go-ing for us but both turned out to be of less assistance than anticipated. A pool contractor provided a drawing which proved to be of lim-ited value. Written specifications

provided from another pool in Scar-borough were similarly of small use. We did not encounter this problem in construction of the tennis courts as the Recreation and Parks Commission were able to supply us with a complete set of written specifications.

We can take consolation from the fact that the building of any future outdoor pool in Scarborough should be easier, since it could also be constructed using our specifications.

If we were doing things over again. we would probably have tried to complete the specifications at the same time we were involved in fundraising and answering the petition against the pool. Both of these activities took considerable of our resources and we elected to hold plans and specifications until later. So, Apologies! We'll do our best to see that no further delays ensure.

Our present schedule calls for tenders to be opened June 16, Construc-tion to start June 30 and to be com-pleted by August 14. Stay with us then and keep your fingers crossed; you couldn't possibly be more un-happy about the delay than we are.

TRUSTEE REPORT by R. F. Stackhouse Trustee, Ward 7

The place is filled with over a thousand teen-agers. They have come not for fun and games, although there will be some of them too. They are assembled for one of the most serious and thought-provoking gatherings Scarborough people of any age can attend.

It is the annual conference the history departments organize for Grade 12 students and visitors from many parts of the United States and Canada. This year its theme was "The Third World" and its sessions were held at Cedarbrae Collegiate and at Convocation Hall on the St. George Campus of the University of Toronto.

The program conisted of panel discussions involving experts on Latin America, Asis and Africa, as well as students. The large plenary sessions also broke into smaller seminars for discussion purposes so that as many could be personally involved as possible.

This conference is only one example of the way Scarborough Teachers are demonstrating not only their own intellectual vitality but their willingness to give the lead in inspiring and guiding their students. Arrangments took many committee meetings and extra hours on the part of adminstrators and teachers, the kind of "second mile" our educators take much more often than most of us realize.

We can be proud of everyone connected with this conference. It represented Canada and Scarborough at their best, as hundreds of young geople with their teachers wrestled with some of the big issues of our time. Not the least fringe benefit of the experience, however, was the opportunity for so many Scarborough families to meet students from other places who were billeted with them.



POLLUTION PROBE has come to our community. I would like to tell you about Pollution Probe and how to go about working with it.

Pollution Probe is a citizens' group dedicated to attaining a clean and healthy environment. Members believe that man must alter his life style to accommodate the ecological value; It is certainly a matter of survival


Pollution Probe now has an ecological action and information centre at Scarborough College in West Hill (University of Toronto). Its staff wants to help smaller neighbourhood anti-pollution groups and individuals who want to do something about pollution.

Pollution Probe projects in Scarborough are numerous and designed to create personal involvement. In order to give you an idea, there will be a major study of the amount and kind of pollutants in Highland Creek. These facts will be used along with other pertinent details to ascertain the source of this pollution and what can be done about it. It is hoped that through pressure by Pollution Probe along with the citizens' support, a change will be brought about in the present situation.

Another major study group will focus on urban development issues in Scarborough. Present zoning laws in Scarborough, are, according to Pollution Probe, resulting in uncontrolled growth of commercial establishments, light industries and typical sub-divisions and apartment complexes which leave little room for recreation, proper mobility and an aesthetically pleasing environment.

The question of proposed major changes in Scarborough's road system, for example, the East End Expressway will also be studied. In this case, after some careful deliberation, Pollution Probe hopes to make recommendations that will change present and future plans towards a better environment.





SWIMMING POOL REPORT

As most of our readers are probably aware, the construction of the Kiwaniwood Swimming Pool in Elizabeth Simcoe Park did not commence according to the schedule previously announced. Although the Kiwaniwood Subcommittee and G. V. C. A. Executive were optimistic that the tenders would come in within budget, a rude shock shattered that optimism.

Briefly, to review the events surrounding the pool tenders, here is what happened:

July 7 - Tenders opened. Three bidders with lowest bid \$124,500 - over 50% higher than budget.

July 7 - Kiwaniwood Subcommittee meets to drown sorrows, reenforce determination to proceed and plots future course of action.

July 14-Presentation to Board of Control which indicates that the Borough is unable to provide any further funds in 1971 beyond the \$30,000 previously pledged by Council.

Faced with the above "facts of life", the Subcommittee decided to revise specifications with the advice and assistance of two major pool building contractors. The objective, according to Subcommittee Vice-Chairman Pete Hagarty, was to make the minimum number of changes necessary to bring. the pool costs down to the budget price. Revisions to the plans have been underway during the past month.

Recently Mr. Hagarty, filling in for Subcommittee Chairman John McMillan who was on a well-earned vacation, stated that a meeting was expected during the week of August 30th with officials of the Scarborough Recreation and Parks Department to obtain approval of the revised plans and specifications for the pool. Approval is expected to be followed by retendering and construction during the autumn with the pool opening re-scheduled for spring 1972. (Continued Page5)



Youth Director- Organizes and coordinates youth activities.



G.V.C.A. Pushes Laurier Pool

Indoor Pool in Laurier in 1972 a Possibility

The Kiwaniwood Subcommittee has been actively engaged during the past month in a dual role. We have been pushing forward with retendering plans for the outdoor swimming pool and we are also involved in "lastditch" effort to put a pool in Laurier Collegiate. This twin strategy has been adopted knowingly with the basic aim that any discussion or activity associated with the Laurier proposal does not in any way delay or prevent construction of the outdoor pool. This action is being taken with the knowledge of civil servants and politicians from both the Scarborough Board of Education and the Borough. What we hope to achieve is the possibility of giving you a choice between two attractive alternatives rather than to merely push doggedly on with the outdoor pool. Initially, we felt that further discussion of an indoor pool was simply an academic exercise because of the past history of failure but we were amazed at the success of recent efforts in this direction (spearheaded by Ed Fulton with our full support). Things have now reached the point where the Scarborough School Board/Board of Scarborough Liaison Committee on September 23 unanimously adopted the following resolution: "That the Council of the Borough of Scarborough and the Scar-borough Board of Education agree to jointly undertake the construction of an indoor 25 metre swimming pool (of depth varying between 3 and 9.5 feet, accommodating a one metre diving board) at Sir Wilfrid Laurier Collegiate; con-struction to start as soon as possible so that completion can be sch-eduled for the Summer of 1972. This proposal is contingent upon the Kiwaniwood Pool Committee not proceeding with its plans for construction of an outdoor swimming pool".

This resolution, to become law, will have to be approved by four political bodies: the Recreation and Parks Committee, Board of Control and Council from the Borough of Scarborough and the Scarborough School Board itself. It is conceivable that all of these bodies could support this resolution by formal vote as early as Monday September 27 (to-morrow. as I write) and quite likely by Tuesday October 12 (two weeks later). In either case, construction could be commenced in 1971 to be paid for from money taken from 1972 levies. There is no certainty that these bodies will even support this resolution but past history indicates a strong probability of success. (see page 7)

If the various politicians give their concurrence to the indoor pool, it will be necessary for the Kiwaniwood Subcommittee to forego its plans to build an outdoor pool. This we will not do until we have been given appropriate direction by the Community Association. The final arbiters, will be the people of the area.

We are most pleased with the way things have proceeded to date and welcome any reation you may have to the current situation. Your comments will be welcomed by:

a trip once each week or month to our non-returnable receiving depot. If there are any teen-agers willing to assist in this project, I would like to hear from them.

A clean and healthy environment is the right of each individual. It is everyone's responsibility to combat it.

The provincial government must ensure that government departments and agencies do not pollute. The government must give scientific and financial help to industries comm-itted to the fight against pollution. Pollution violators must be sharply penalized and deterred.

An <u>Environmental Council</u> should be created to provide an independent assessment of our progress in the fight against pollution. This Council 's membership should be drawn from the ranks of anti-pollution and conservation groups, the scientific community, industry and citizen's groups.

We must take new approaches in our use of non-degradable items, whether they be liquor bottles sold by the provincial government, plastic packages or scrap automobiles. enthusiasm (-zi-) n. Ardent zeal (for, about, a cause etc.)

There are other definitions that one might propose for the word 'enthusiasm'. The pocket dictionary is a bit too concise and doesn't give quite the usage that we normally make of the usage that we normally make of this word. The pragmatist is likely to point out that the key to the meaning lies in the last four letters of the word-I Am Sold Myself. We often relate the use of enthus-iasm with the spirit of youth, to sports as 'enthusiasts', in fact we often tell our children that we expect more than anything else that they exhibit enthusiasm to all of life.

Everywhere that is, but when it comes to religion. Of all places, don't show enthusiasm here-you can't really afford to be called a religious enthusiast. It's a bit much!

The word'enthusiasm' however has a root meaning that plays foul with the reaction above. The Greek root for this word that we use is 'en theos' which simply means-'in god.'

The Church institution that you see at the corner or that mysterious body that we condemn as the institution is dying today, or showing signs of death and decay. It is really the fault of there being too few who are willing to be 'in God' about the whole area of responsib-ility to him and to His creation. we are literally dying for want of enthusiasm.

Remember the **sh**oe polish ad? 'Have you got It?' Let's ask ourselves this very same question when it relates to our enthusiasm for the things of God.

'Come and Worship' then becomes meaningful to those who explore at this level of relationship to God's concern for you and for one an-other. Let's not hide the fact nor ignore it-the Christian in the Seventies must be an enthusiast of the best kind. Do you dare?

the quarter finals of the Ontario Cup before being ousted by Toronto City and Westwood respectively.





As you all know we are finally going to get a swimming pool at Laurier Collegiate. At the last meeting of Scarborough Council, the recommenda-tion to build the indoor pool was adopted unanimously. The slim possibility of an indoor pool became apparent late last June, when a joint Sch-ool Board, Recreat**don** and Parks staff report was received by the Board/Cou-ncil Liaison Committee. 
Church Rews

Laurier Pool a reality !

Because of excellent coverage in the Scarborough Mirror and the local "grape-vine", I suspect that the news that Laurier is at last about to get-its indoor pool is somewhat of an anti-climax. How-ever, it's true and the Kiwaniwood Subcommittee and the Guildwood Village Community Association ex-ecutive couldn't be more pleased. These feelings are shared by the vast majority of the residents we have talked to over the past few weeks.

There are a number of additional details which I'm sure you will find interesting. First and foremost, construction is slated to begin November 1. Assuming suff-icient progress can be made prior to the onslaught of winter, a nine-month construction period is envisaged. This places completion of construction at or about August 1,1972, as well within our revis-ed estimate. Secondly, a total of \$440,000 has been voted for this project to be shared equally between the Scarborough Board of Education and the Borough of Scarborough. The majority of this money is to come from the 1972 current budgets of both bodies. Thirdly, the \$30,000 we have deposited with the Borough of Scarborough will not be used on this project and will be made available for community use in ways decided by the citizens of the community.

The itinerary of meetings involving various Borough and School Board Committees and their recommendations makes interesting reading:

September 8(School Board) The question of an indoor pool at Laurier was raised by Alderman Ed Fulton and the Kiwaniwood Subcommittee was invited to attend the next meeting of the Property-Finance Committee in order to present its views on this subject.

September 20(School Board-Property Finance Committee)

The Property-Finance Committee, with the support of the Kiwaniwood Subcommittee, recommended that the Liaison Committee, consisting of mem-bers from both the School Board and the Borough of Scarborough, consider the possibility of immediate construction of the indoor pool at Laurier.

September 23(Liaison Committee)In perhaps the biggest breakthrough of the whole campaign, the following resolu-tion was passed(4-0):"Recommended that Council and the Scarborough Board of Education jointly undertake the construction of an indoor 25 metre swimming pool to a depth of 3 feet to 9½ feet to accommodate a one metre diving board at Sir.Wilfrid Laurier Collegiate and that construction start as soon as possible so that completion can be scheduled for the summer of 1972, subject to the Kiw-

aniwood Pool Committee not proceeding with its plans for construction of an outdoor pool at Elizabeth Simcoe Park.

"Committee further recommends that the cost of the proposed pool be equally divided between Council and the Board of Education and that the funds be made available from the respective 1972 Current Budgets."

September 27--9.30 A.M. (Scarborough Recreation and Parks Committee) By a vote of 6-0 the Minutes of the Liaison Committee(see above)were adopted in total, assuming the total cost of the pool would be of the or-der of \$440,000.

September 27--8 P.M. (School Board) The resolution of the Liaison Committee was accepted by a vote of 12-0, subject to the amendment that the sum be contributed by the Board of Education is not to exceed \$220,000.

October 6(Board of Control)The Re-creation and Parks Committee resolution was accepted by a vote of 4-0.

October 12(Scarborough Council)Coun-cil recommended adoption of the

Liaison Committee resolution by a vote of 15-0.

Most of the credit for the unanimity of opinion by all elected bodies and the speed with which this whole complex issue was resolved must go to Alderman Ed Fulton who spearheaded the whole campaign for the indoor pool, carrying it from its status of vain hope to actuality in just five weeks. Congratulations Ed!

In anticipation of Councils' vote on October 12, the G.V.C.A. Gen-eral Meeting of October 6 supported the Laurier proposal by a vote of approximately 41-0. A poll by telephone conducted on the weekend of October 9-11 el-icited the following information (on the basis of 124 families contacted):


The number of individuals contacted in each area is roughly proportional to the money collected from each. Our sample was directed largely at the Area Captains and the Team Captains who had helped us raise the major portion of the \$30,000 via the Lottery.

Well then, where do we go from here? First of all, it's our intention to leave the \$30,000 with the Borough of Scarborough where it will gather in-terest at the rate of 6% while we're thinking. This makes sense from an-other point of view in that we don't want to do anything with the money until we see visible signs of construction on the pool at Laurier.

We would also like your help in considering uses for this money. These uses should be in keeping with our original objectives of making the Guildwood, East Guildwood and Markham Bluffs communities a better place in which to live. I think that any recreational, educational or social service that adds to community life should be considered seriously; the more people served the better!

Our near-term approach will likely be this. We will shortly contact local residents by flyer on which we will list a number of attractivelooking proposals and to which further ideas could be added. We will ask you to vote by returning the flyers to us indicating your choice(s). We would then select the four or five most popular suggestions and examine the merits of each by means of a relatively exhaustive feasibility study. The study would likely take two or three months and, where possible, we would employ the services of one of the proponents of each scheme to work with the Subcommittee. At the end of this period, the advantages disadvantages and probable cost of each alternative would be tabulated and published either through a public meeting or in writing. Finally, by means of a second ballot, the best proposal for the community would be accepted and the Subcommittee would aggressively adopt the strategy best calculated to achieve this objective in the shortest possible time.

The almost total lack of good restaurants available locally to Guildwood residents appears to be changing as the old stone building on Kingston Road near Eglinton which was once a familiar eating place in our area, reopened about six weeks ago as the Stone Cottage Inn.

Muriel and I were recently dinner quests of the new management, Messrs. Eid Attia and Garry Ohannesyan. We were treated to a fine meal and excellent service in the attractive, subdued surroundings of the main dining room. This intimate room, with its colourful red and gold linen and beautiful fireplace, is tastefully decorated with various items of Canadiana.

Our host, Mr. Attia, selected the speciality of the house, an Egyptian shishkebob for us. We opened the meal with the soup du jour, chicken noodle which was hot and tasty. A crisp salad with delicious home-made dressing (rather than the usual bottled variety) was a very pleasant surprise, as was the ample supply of hot garlic bread. The shishkebob came steaming hot on a bed of rice garnished with baked tomato and we were not disappointed when we tasted this delicacy.

Dessert was a mouth-watering dish. It was unfamiliar to us until our charming waitress informed us that it was "basbousa" a favourite on Egyptian menus. The meal was topped off with Turkish coffee of excellent quality.

Our host took pains to assure us that our meal was typical of the house and comments by other diners tended to confirm this.

The menu, as befits a good eating place, is not excessive-three varietities of shishkebob from \$2.65 and six entrees ranging from rock



cornish hen and wild rice at \$3,45 to Nova Scotia scallops on toast at \$2.50, all including soup and hot rolls. There are also three specialties at 95¢ to \$1.15 for the young ones whose gourment tastes have not yet developed. The menu will be changed from time to time.

The Stone Cottage Inn is rapidly undergoing improvement and renovations, as the new management is determined to turn this beautiful old building into a landmark eating place for Guildwood residents with absollute emphasis on service and quality. Banquet facilities are available for parties up to 100 and beverage licences can be obtained. A small, intimate room in Egyptian motif for. parties from 12 to 20 will open in approximately three weeks. For those who prefer a more informal dining atmosphere, there is also a lunch counter room.

First, may I thank the editor of the Guildwood News, Eric Parker, for the opportunity to express my views in this excellent community newspaper.

Secondly, my thanks to the hundreds of residents in the Guildwood community who supported me in the election. I am honoured by the confidence you have placed in me and I will do my utmost to represent Scarborough East at Queen's Park.

On Dec.13th.a special session of the Legislature will be held. It is expected to last only a few days and will deal mainly with a change in legislation to effect a 3% cut in your personal Ontario income tax. This, combined with a 3% cut in Federal income tax an-nounced October 14th. by Finance Minister Benson will mean a saving in taxes of about \$150 million a year for Ontario taxpayers. For a family of four with an income of \$7,000, it will mean a saving of about \$30 next year.

There is also good news for those residents 65 and over.Beginning January 1st. they will no longer have to pay medicare premiums. Hopefully in the next edition of this paper I will be able to announce the opening of a service centre to serve the residents of Scarborough East. TRUSTEE REPORT

The opening of the new Jack Miner Senior Public School was an indication of how important good education is to this community. Held on Nov. 12, this ceremony attracted a

standing-room-only audience of parents, educators, and visitors, all keen to see the new facilities provided for the Grade 7 and 8 pupils of Guildwood.

Several school board officials claimed it was the largest crowd they had ever seen at a public school opening, and took it as evidence of the keen interest this neighbourhood takes in its young people.

Those young people were rightly the stars of their own show that night, the senior and junior choirs of the school holding the attention of the more than 500 people who overflowed the large meeting hall where the ceremony was held.

Manley Miner, son of Jack Miner the great Canadian naturalist after whom the school is named, was present and soon showed how he had be-come a much beloved "Uncle Manley" to all the boys and girls of the school.

Principal James Bernard and his staff certainly deserve credit for organizing such a fine evening so soon after the actual commencement of classes. Teachers and pupils functioned together so well, no one could tell they first met only two months earlier.

To provide for the growing school population of the Guildwood area, several major building projects have been undertaken or are being planned. The addition of several teaching areas and a libraryresource centre at Elizabeth Simcoe has been completed and is in use. An addition to Laurier Collegiate will include a swimming pool, designed to serve not only the students of that school but of neighbouring schools at certain times of the year. It will also be used in the evenings and on weekends by the general community.

Poplar Road Junior Public School is to receive an addition of two classrooms and a library resource centre because of increased enrolment. At Guildwood Junior Public School, two classrooms are to be converted into a library resource centre.

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



Open House is scheduled for Guildwood School on Monday, December 6th. from 7:30 to 9:30 P.M. Putils will be acting as hosts to their parents and will conduct them through the school to view the displays of work in each room. We hope the children will be especially proud of their own classroom and make sure that Mom and Dad see all the work that has been done since September 7th.

Individual interviews have been arranged by the staff during November preceding the first report which was issued on November 26th. Open House is not to be a "Discuss Problems with the Teacher Night," but rather a time where pupils' work is seen and admired, and teachers are in the classroom to greet parents and direct them to items of special interest.

During the evening there will be two brief programmesof music presented in the auditorium at 8:00 P.M. and again at 8:45. Mrs. Brown's Junior Choir (45 pupils from grades 2,3 and 4) and Mr. Heino's School Choir(30 pupils from grades 5 and 6) will sign some Christmas selections. A group of 10 children studying stringed instruments will play a few numbers directed by Mr. Rickard.

A project of Community Involvement in the school has progressed very satisfactorily since it was proposed to the parents on Curriculum Night. 


Alderman reports

In conjunction with the bottle and can recycling depot at the Midland and Ellesmere yard, I have proposed that we expand this project to include newspapers. Paper comrises about 25% of the bulk of wast disposal and is in growing demand for recycling purposes. The initial phase of this project will involve locating additonal receiving bins at the yard and disposing of the paper through a private waste handling contractor.

In addition to the foregoing we are planning to undertake a pilot project with the Seven Oaks Community Association. That community has volunteered itself as a test area for reclaiming paper. Receiving bins will be located at the Centennary Plaza, opposite the hospital, or at local schools. Both of these projects will have been before Council (Cont'd Page 5)

MPP REPORTS

One of the many problems facing us to-day is how to get the best use out of our schools, not only for educational purposes but for the benefit of the community as a whole.

It is a problem the Ontario Government now hopes to do something about. During the mini-session of the Legislature held in December a committee representing all three parties in the Legislature was named to enquire into the use of educational facilities in the **p**rovince. Briefly these are the guidlines: Wider community use of educational facilities at all levels from public schools to universities.

Year-round use of such facilities for educational and/or community programs.

Ways and means by which the abovementioned activities could be brought about and emphasized.





THE CHURCH OF THE HOLY TRINITY

We are now in the season of Lent. Perhaps it is time for many of us to unwind and start thinking about the meaning of life and the meaning and direction of all our activities. In the Crucifixion scene, Pilate asked Jesus 'What is Truth?" Pilate was obviously a man who lacked the courage of his convictions. He was unable to find any fault in Jesus, no reason to judge him guilty, nevertheless he did. Why? The Gospels are quite clear. Pilate was afraid to become unpopular. He wouldn't stand up and be counted for what he believed. His decisions were based upon security and popularity, rather than on his own belief.

I believe there is a bit of Pilate in most, if not all of us. We are quite certain that we know what is right, yet we all to frequently act in the opposite direction. We are more inclined to establish our priorities in life on convenience, popularity and personal pleasure rather than on conviction.

Jesus had answered Pilate's question (and the question of many this day and age) when he had earlier told his disciples that 'I am the way, I am the truth, I am life'. Lent gives us the opportunity to assess our personal priorities, and our life's direction, before the great wonderful day of love;-Easter.

Holy Trinity is holding mid-week on Wednesday evenings during Lent. We invite all to share in Our Lord's gift of himself through his sacrament of Holy Communion and spend a few minutes contemplating the meaning of our lives, by relating them to the people involved in the crucifixion incident.

There will be services held Maundy Thursday evening and Good Friday in conjunction with Guildwood Presbyterian Church. Then Easter day will be celebrated with Holy Communion at 8.00 A.M., 9.15 A.M. and 11 A.M. All are most heartedly invited to share with your neighbours and friends in these services.

Unfortunately there are too many so-called Christian people who lack that special 'sparkle' and prove to be poor advertisement of what the life of Christ is all about. A philosopher of quite a number of years ago, Soren Kierkegaard, told this parable that may well speak to your problem and mine:

"Once in a dirty barnyard surrounded by a high fence, there lived a flock of geese. Every Sabbath morning, there came into their midst a strange creature, known as, "the preaching goose". This bird spoke to all his fellows. He told them that they need not stay in that barnyard. Beyond the board fence, he said, there were green pastures, blue skies, running brooks, freedom and happiness. He pointed out to the geese that God had given them wings to fly. They need only to use their wings to escape from their dreary prison to the real world beyond. The geese never tired of heaing the message. To them, it was good news. They looked excitedly to one another and praised their preachers style of oratory. But one thing they never did: they never stretched their wings and flew, for as Kierkegaard said, the corn was fattening and life was secure in that barnyard."

I believe there is a bit of Pilate in Now if you think that this is a plug most, if not all of us. We are quite to pick up and fly South-you're certain that we know what is right, wrong!





Trustee Report.

The annual Variety Night at Laurier Collegiate was an unintended answer to questions posed at a recent meeting of parents, teachers and students about freedom and authority in our schools. Discussion at the meeting was often polarized between those who thought freedom was excessive and others who thought authority tyrannical.

But Variety Night could not have been produced without a balance of both.

It was a bouncy, fun-filled evening that kept the capacity audience entertained, even enthusiastic. Applause kept bursting out as spectators joined in the party spirit the ener-

getic, talented performers stimulated from the stage. It was clear these young people were free.

But the program showed they were also willing to accept organization, and the authority it requires. It could not have been produced without teachers and students committing themselves to hours of work and being willing to accept direction.

It is not always possible to strike the balance in the way our schools are run, but my impression is that most staff and students are making the effort. On the whole, I think they are succeeding.

did you know?

One of the lesser known branches of Scarborough's school system is the Special Education Department which provides services for students with special needs.

Its staff includes a wide variety of skieed experts, each practising his own specialty but co-operating with the others to make an effective team.

There are two child psychiatrists, who work in conjuction with psychologists and social workers. There are reading, hearing, and speech specialists, as well as others in charge of testing. "Is all this really necessary?" might be the question a practical person could ask. The real wonder, however, should be that such a relatively small staff can deal with the needs of 87,000 students who comprize Canada's fourth largest public education system.

A student with a learning disability in reading, for example, may be "crippled" for life and needs special help if he is to develop himself. A student who is emotionally disturbed cannot learn effectively until his inner problem has been solved.

The work of this department is necessary for the sake of the individual, his family, and the society which needs him as a healthy citizen. Scarborough people can be proud they have the integrated team program this department is providing.

ALDERMAN REPORTS

A number of residents have called me regarding the availability of cable TV. The latest information that I have is that cable will be available about July 15, 1972. Many of the feeder lines are now in and work is in progress in the balance of the area.

The public response to our recycling depot at Midland Ave. and Ellesmere has far exceeded any of our expectations. Since its start in July we have received 82,500 lbs. of glass and 25,600 lbs. of cans. The most impressive statistic, though, is that of the above poundage, 36,000 lbs. of glass and 12,000 lbs. of cans have been collected this year. This clearly indicates that public awareness and interest is on the increase and I want to thank those of you who have contributed to this success.I understand that Scarborough is now the only municipality in Canada involved in this type of project.

YOUTH REPORT

In this column I would like to point out some of the activities for Youth in this community with the focas on this year.

The Drop-In Center, ran by the Scarborough Parks and Recreation Department is held at Laurier C.I. Tuesday and Wednesday nights. Activities range from volleyball, basketball and gymnastics in the gym to loosely organized activities in the cafeteria. This activity draws an average of 190-200 people per night. This season, believe it or not, has passed the half way mark and the Laurier Drop-In is still the best in Scarborough.





ALDERMAN REPORTS-CONT'D

Year" award is presented at the annual Recreation and Parks Recognition Night. My recommendation, after two previous attempts, was approved at the Council meeting of February 10. This year's recipient is our own Guildwood Village Community Association. This long overdue recognition is a tribute to the many Chairmen, Executive members and hundreds of volunteers who, over the years, have contributed so much of their time, energy and enthusiasm to this community. As a resident and a parent, thank you and congratulations

POOL REPORT

First of all, I should mention that the decision to proceed with the pool in September was a very quick one and did not leave the planners much opportunity to iron out all of the construction details. Following the main decision to go ahead, it was necessary to clarify a number of issues prior to construction. The School Board just does not have a design package available for the construction of an "instant pool". The creation of such a package is the function of the Architect.

One major decision was to provide for spectators, since the pool was to be 25 metres, a desirable length for competitive swimming. Then, if we're going to have seats, should they be of the deck-level or the balcony variety? We've opted for balcony seating on the basis of cost (the total square footage of the building can be reduced, since the seats will not extend as far back from the pool). About 450 seats are planned.

Another major decision was to adopt the unorthodox approach of "sequential tendering" so that planning and construction can proceed at the same time rather than planning first and then the starting construction. In sequential tendering, the initial planning is completed for part of the main building design and tenders

are called for this portion of the total construction. Then, while construction proceeds for this portion of the job, planning continues for the next, and so on. The total job could be divided up into four or five separate modules in this manner. The objective is, to reduce the total time for the project, from the decis-

ion to go ahead to the time the first alderman or school trustee is pushed fully clothed into the pool as part of the dedication ceremony.

One thing which permitted this seguential tendering was the fact that actual construction was in progress at Laurier to make additional space available for class rooms and technical shops; a second was the fact that the School Board was willing to add this project to the work-inprogress. Through this happy combination of circumstances, it was possible to work with the present contractor, another major time saving measure.

O.K. so where are we now! Friday February 18 saw the first tenders opened. These covered bids by subcontractors for excavation, foundation, concrete and structure, a substantial portion of the total job. Tom Lennard reports that he is "quite content" with the bids received. He adds that there have been some increases in the magnitude of the total job due to regulations of the Fire Marshall and modifications for spectator seating. Tom believes that they are working on a "tight budget" but that there is no reason to think that it can't be lived with.

The major concern we are faced with at the present time is the rodmen's strike. The School Board is very reluctant to commence excavation of the hole itself until such time as the strike is settled because of additional costs that could be incurred as a result of water problems. Site clearance could be commenced now, but, since it can be completed in one or two days. it is not necessary. Doug Smith, the Architect, tells me that the target for completion of the overall project is September 30, not as early as we had hoped, but, I think, quite reasonable in view of the problems encountered and overcome and the short lead time the School Board and Borough technical staff had available to them prior to construction. Doug says "We're on our way now."

I plan to attend the next meeting of the Liaison Committee, a joint team of School Board Trustees and Borough Aldermen, at which time Tom Lennard plans to present design specifications and architectural drawings of the proposed pool. This is an information session only and is intended to bring the members of the Committee up to date. I'll pass



on any useful information I acquire in the next issue of the News and Views.

Excellent Progress on Laurier Pool

The construction crew at Laurier is really making itself felt these days as progress on the 25 metre indoor swimming pool has moved into high gear with the settlement of the four week long rodmen's strike. (Rodmen are the workmen who put in the steel reinforcing rods in reinforced concrete structures). The strike was resolved on March 27, at which time construction commenced. All excavation work and the installation of footings is complete. As of date of writing (April 26), formwork for the holding tank and sump pits and the construction of concrete block foundation walls is in progress.

I attended the last meeting of the Scarboroug Council School Board Liaison Committee at which Tom Lennard ' Supertintendent of Plant for the Board of Education, provided an up-todate report on progress. All but in, four of 23 contracts have been awarded for all phases of the construction at a total cost of less than \$350,000, somewhat under budget. Tom Lennard has expressed cautious optimism that the total project will be completed at or below the total budgeted figure of \$440,000. The method of sequential tendering used on this project was strongly endorsed by Anson Taylor, Director of Education for Scarborough, as an excellent means of securing close adherence to budget estimates. Individual tenders for specific portions of the work are opened over a considerable time span and comparisons with budget estimates are made at numerous points to ensure that major deviations from estimates can be accommodated. Should a project be about to go over budget, desisions can be made to either allocate more money or scale down some of the lat-(Continued Page 7)


Curling

Don't be surprised if within a few years Scarborough has one of the finest networks of bicycle pathways in North America.

Late in April the first step was taken when the Borough approved a three mile bike path down the west branch of Highland Creek from the Ellesmere Rd. area to Cedarbrook Park. Community use of schools is one of the major interests of the Scarbor-ough education system. Two recent events in Guildwood schools show how the schools are reaching out more and more to the community as a whole.

One of these was the beginning of construction of the Laurier Pool. This had been delayed by several unavoidable factors such as a strike and changes in building plans to

meet the requirements of the Scarborough Recreation and Parks Department. But excavation has commenced and it is expected that the pool will be open for use this fall.

Like all the other swimming pools attached to Scarborough schools, this one will be available for community use after school hours throughout the week, as well as on Saturday and Sunday.

Jack Miner Senior Public School had a fine program recently that aimed at establishing a more personal relationship between young people and the pol-ice. What was called a "Police Week" was held at the school with many instructive programs being offered, including an address by Metrc Police Chief Harold Adamson, himself a Scarborough citizen.

These events are only two of the many ways by which schools throughout the Borough are establishing closer ties with their communities.

This year school facilities will be used by community organizations to the extent of 88,000 hours or 3,666 full days. Of those 88,999 hours, 87% are made available at nc charge to the organization using the facilities. This is one reason why Scarborough people can feel confident that their impressive school buildings are being used to the full.





ALDERMAN REPORTS

The Metropolitian Toronto and Region Waterfront Plan, 1972,-1976 is nearing the final approval stage. The Plan, first released in September 1970, has been undergoing continuous restudy and revision. It is now expected that the new proposal will be brought to the Scarborough Planning Board before the end of June. Hopefully, Council will deal with it by the middle of July. Of some significance to the communities involved is that we have arranged an ad hoc committee including at least one representative from each of the lakefront communities to assist and advise in the preparation of the brief. The major focal point for de-velopment is between Brimley Road and McCowan Road, however Sylvan Ave. Park will be developed for passive recreational uses. The area south of the Guildwood Parkway between Livinston Road and Galloway Road is also within the scope of the Plan. Negotiations are presently underway between the owners of the Guild Inn and the Ontario Heritage Foundation for the Heritage Foundation to receive the Guild Inn and 19 acres surrounding the Inn as a gift to be held in perpetuity. Subject to negatiations between the Foundation and the Guild Inn coming to a satisfactory conclusion, this project would enable the acquisition of certain waterfront lands around the Inn being acquired and developed as a public resource park. The attractive nature of this property, the existing access to the lake and the possibility of linking these lands with the Cudia/Sylvan complex by a hiking trail makes this an important water-front area. Facilities which would be provided in the area would be in keeping with the passive nature of the land.

REPORT FROM MARTIN O'CONNELL M.P. SCARBOROUGH EAST



M.P. Report

by Hon. Martin O'Connell

Since my appointment as Minister of Labour in January 1972 many of you have had questions as to the jurisdiction and role of my Department. I thought in this report to you I might outline some of the proposed changes in Canadian labour legislation.

Part 1 of the Canada Labour Code (Fair Employment Practices) prohibits discrimination in employment, within federal jurisdiction, based on race, colour, religion or national origin. Similarly, no trade union may exclude expel or suspend a person from full membership on the same grounds.

The amendments to this Part of the Code, which I introduced in the House of Commons last month would substantially reinforce and improve the government's ability to seek and eradicate such discrimination whereever it occurs within federal jurisdiction. The list of prohibited reasons for discriminatory acts would be expanded to include age, sex and marital status.

The inclusion of sex as a prohibited reason for discrimination stems from the government's firm commitment to improve the status of Canadian women. The experience of human rights administrators in Canada has been received respecting employment policies aff-

ecting married women. The principal domplaints have been that married women are not hired by many employers and that many employers release women when they marry.

It is important to note that the Bill would not apply to any superannuation or pension plan, or to any insurance plan that provides life, accident, sickness or disability benefits. Without this exclusion a great number of such plans might be found to be illegal, resulting in substantial disfunruptions. The government recognizes that there may be discriminatory elements in these plans, and is considering what can be done to remedy the situation.

I feel that the new Bill marks a significant advance toward the objective of equal employment opportunity and treatmnent for all Canadians.


The June 7th edition of the Scarbor-ough Mirror stated that the proposed townhouse development on Westlake Ro-ad has been stopped. The Article is misleading in that it appears that the applicants defeat is absolute and final. This is not the case. Th-ere are a few courses of action open to the applicant and Council. Since the By-Law was approved, Council could be asked to consider a report of the Borough Clerk to repeal the By-Law. The applicant may have a legal basis for circumventing Council and making a direct appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board. However, in my opinion, the most likely event will be a direct appeal to the Council bo reopen the matter to allow the application to go on to the Municipal Board. This last course of action will require that a member of Council who voted against the application will have to move to have it reopened. There is no way of knowing when any of the above steps may be taken but it is unlikely that the developer will allow his application to remain dormat for long.

Council, at its next meeting June19, will be asked to consider my proposal to establish a Borough sub-committee on recycling. The function of the sub-committee will be to co-ordinate all aspects of recycling not in effect, to deal with all future requests of community groups and to study new developments in this field. I expect to meet with your executive in the near future to discuss the possibility of a pilot project in Guildwood.

As a footnote to the foregoing you may be interested in the most recent (May 23) totals from our recycling depot at Midland and Ellesmer Rd; glass-108,000 lbs., cans;-36,000 lb paper(for approx. one month) 12,000 lbs.



The Planning staff expect the application to be presented to the Planning Board at its next meeting, Thursday August 31. I would appreciate hearing your comments regarding this proposal.

The Gulf Investment Ltd., proposal for townhouses on Westlake Rd., is still in limbo. I understand the applicant is attempting to appeal directly to the Ontario Municipal Board for a hearing. Should a hearing be granted, our objections would be heard at the same time. In any event, I have been advised that Scarborough Council still must make a decision for or against this project. As you know this application resulted in a series of tie votes at Council.


A newspaper drop box is to be located at the Fire Hall on Coronation Rd., just east of Galloway Rd. This receiving depot should be set up and in operation by mid September.







Guildwood schools continue to enjoy impressive progress in their structure and equipment.

Perhaps the project of greatest inter interest to the public is the Laurier Pocl, now well on its way to completion, the end of October being the target date.

This fine pool will be of Olympic size so that Scarborough swimmers will have one pool in their Borough suitable for any competition.

It has been equipped also with bleacher facilities so that these swim meets can be watched by interested audiences.

The cost of this jointly financed by the Board of Education and the Borough's Recreation Department budget, has been well controlled and the planners of this pool deserve great credit for providing what they have for the money involved.

Sometimes projects such as this are criticized as "frills", but there is another side to thede detate.

In most Communities- and certainly in Guildwood- a pool is constructed chiefly as a result of local demand. The efforts of the Kiwaniwood Committee have certainly been ah example of haw a community can get behind a project, and demonstrate how much this pool is what the people of the area want. It is right that they should. We certainly have had enough reason this year to recognize Canada needs a new emphasis on physical fitness. Just as health is one of the most precious possessions an individual has, so it is a society's and what we spend on this will be returned many times.

In a time when many understandably are concerned about drug abuse and the like, it is important to see what a positive contribution healthy sports and other creative activities make to Building good character and personality. . Laurier has also been equipped with a much enlarged library resource center, more adequate to serve the enlarged student population receiving an education that puts a new stress on individual study and research. Larger library-resource centres have been provided also at scme of the public schools. including Guildwood and Poplar Road. These improved facilities aim at making learning a personal discovery experience.

Junior kindergartens were opened this Fall in all our junior public schools so that four years new becomes the normal starting age. These 'JK's' are very popular as a way of giving children a better beginning for those vital primary grade years.

As of November 29, I received 73 re-sponses to our survey requesting citizens of the Guildwood, East Guildwood and Markham Bluffs to indicate their views as to how the money collected earlier by the Kiwan-iwood Subcommittee should be spent. Nine or ten of the respondents have indicated a desire to be of further assistance and this I find to be encouraging. The most popular item of the choices indicated was the out-door hockey cushion, with the library project slightly behind and the wading pool (with or without the ornamental fountain-a controversial item!) a far distant third. Of the write-in suggestions there was exskating on an <u>outdoor artificial</u> ice surface. We could not likely obtain ice for the sole purpose of pleasure skating but we would certainly insist that a sizeable percentage of the total skating time be devoted to pleasure skating. The hockey players need to have their time too but hockey should not be permitted to monopolize facilities!

A word of caution must be expressed at this point. We have no commitment from anyone to the idea of an outdoor artificial ice surface in the Guildwood area. Furthermore, earlier cost estimates indicated that we were talking of dollar values in the \$85,000 range, probably \$100,000 right now.

I am merely mentiong these points to indicate that the element of feasi bility must come into our thinking. We don't want to tackle the imposs-ible! At this time it would appear that we will be making studies on the artificial ice idea, the library, a community hall and/or a youth cen-tre and a few others.

To date, I have classified 31 distinct suggestions which include, in addition to those already mentioned, building more tennis courts, a curl-ing rink, tennis club house, sports equipment storage facilities, play-Continued page 3


Thrown a 'snit' lately?
