Guildwood residents who commute to work downtown by GO train or the TTC have had their problems this winter when heavy snowfalls have disrupted the service. Both are basically excellent services, but many of the people operating them leave something to be desired. With a couple of exceptions, the crew at the Guildwood GO station are about as sour as you could get. And at Union Station, much of the frustration of GO commuters would be eliminated, when the trains are behind schedule, if the GO staff had the interest and initiative to pass along information about the delays.

As for the TTC, passengers suffer the same lack of information as on the GO service, with special frustrations thrown in. For example, towards the end of the rush hour to have two or three consecutive buses go past headed for the garage indicates a lack of thought for the feelings of passengers. And even a genius would be lucky to correctly interpret some of the signs in the Warden subway station explaining the bus routings.

But I believe in looking for the silver lining. They are both good services, and maybe some day we'll have people running them who take pride in their jobs and want to make the system work.

I introduced two motions to the Board in December and these will be coming before the Education Committee for consideration in February.


# PHYSICAL AND HEALTH EDUCATION

At the present time, Physical and Health Education is not a compulsory subject in Ontario Collegiates. In most Scarborough schools, about 85-90% of grade nime students choose this option. Since possibly 1% of the student body would be opting out for legitimate physical reasons, it would appear the remainder are opting out for less acceptable reasons. An unfor-

tunate occurrence since Canadians are rated at the bottom of the scale in physical fitness.

Last spring, the Physical Education heads of Scarborough prepared a brief for the Minister of Education outlining their concerns over a trend showing a greater number of students in first year would not be enrolled in physical education courses and grade ten students were not continuing the option in that year. This is unfortunate because our courses now

stress individual sports as well as team sports in the belief that one can carry on with these sports throughout life, or as long as one enjoys good health.

Since I believe that physical fitness is often reflected in superior academic performance, a fact that has been proven through pilot projects testing this philosophy in France, I felt that greater emphasis should be placed on physical fitness by the Ministry by making it a mandatory subject in grades nine and ten, in the belief that once a student established the habit of regular physical activity in these grades, he would be likely to continue through the rest of his high school years. In May 1977, the Scarborough Board supported my motion to ask the Ministry to make it compulsory in all Ontario Collegiates. It is now apparent that this will not happen in time for the 1978-79 school year.

However, the Minister has also said that any Board wishing to do so could make Physical Education a highly recommended subject or compulsory, although this would not receive Ministry backing.

My new motion asks that all Scarborough Collegiate principals place Physical and Health Education in a "highly recommended" category for the 1978-79 school year. It should be remembered that students who do not take physical education do not receive health education courses either. In view of the increase in social problems i.e. alcohol, drugs, V.D., surely this is not a healthy state of affairs.

#### LIBRARY RESOURCE CENTRES

The second motion under consideration is one related to Library Resource teachers. Although the Scarborough Board of Education places great emphasis on the importance of developing good reading and research skills, many of our school libraries do not have full time resource teachers.

Outside of sound educational reasons for having a qualified resource teacher in the library, there is also a sensible economic reason for it as well. My research showed that between December, 1973 and September 1977, the total expenditures for additions and conversions was \$513,800. or over .5 million dollars. Added to this would be the cost of audio-visual equipment, books, furnishings, etc.

In the senior schools, and J.K. to Grade 8 schools there is a vital role for the trained resource teacher, because she must also be able to act as program co-ordinator, work with classroom teachers and handle all audio-visual equipment. She helps to stimulate an interest in reading and prepares senior students for high school by developing good research skills. A good resource teacher can also assist in developing enrichment programs in the school.

While the two senior schools in Ward 7, Bliss Carman and Jack Miner are fortunate in having excellent library resource teachers, this is not the case in all of our schools. My motion asks that all senior and J.K. to Grade 8 schools have a full time resource teacher and that we work towards this goal for the junior schools.

The motion causes some difficulty in that present Board policy allows each Principal and his staff to determine how the school's allotment of teachers should be deployed. This must have the approval of the Area Superintendent. Some teachers are willing to take slightly higher class sizes in order that all students can benefit from a library program. Other schools may see the need to apply this teacher elsewhere. While I respect this approach. I feel that now in the face of economic restraints and with teacher hiring at a standstill, we must as a Board, identify our priorities and take steps to work toward our goals through specific staffing decisions.

## ED FULTON, ALDERMAN

In the last edition of the News and Views, I attempted to highlight some of the more important recommendations of the Robarts Commission studying the re-organization of Metropolitan Toronto. One of the more important recommendations was to realign Scarborough's western boundary to Warden Avenue. The probable results of this proposal caused a great deal of public concern and active interest in opposition to the boundary change. Recently, the Provincial Government announced, to the relief of many people, that this change will not take place. However, while this

matter was of a higher profile than many of the other recommendations, the balance of the report is still under review. Several matters which could have an effect on you are yet to be decided. Your continued interest and participation in this process would be appreciated.

A number of rumours concerning the disposition of the Guild Inn have been circulating through the community. In an attempt to clarify the situation, I can only comment that at the time of writing: The Inn is for sale and has been listed since last May. No offer of purchase has been accepted by the owner. At an appropriate time, in co-operation with the Association Executive, a meeting will be arranged to discuss the future of the Guild Inn.

As you may be aware the Council has appealed to the Provincial Cabinet to overturn the decision of the Ontario Municipal Board refusing construction of the Scarborough Village Community Centre at Markham Road and Eglinton Avenue. This facility is generally thought to be just an ice rink. Actually what is contemplated is a complete community centre, containing a gymnasium, arts and crafts centre, senior citizen facilities, possible squash and handball courts, a 'little' theatre, and a physical fitness centre in addition to one ice surface. I would appreciate hearing your comments on this proposal so that I may pass them on to Mrs. Birch, whom I expect will advise her cabinet colleagues accordingly.






finals to be held at John A. Leslie Public School, February 7th at 1:30 p.m.



# Report from the Civic Centre

At the meeting of Council, Monday September 25th, Mayor Paul Cosgrove resigned his office. Paul, who served as the Alderman of Ward 9 for one term prior to seeking the mayorality in 1972, has left the municipal scene in order to seek election to the House of Commons as M.P. for the riding of York Scarborough, in the upcoming by-election October 16th.

Of a more local nature, I want to inform you that the last remaining section of the Kingston Road reconstruction project, begun in 1972, will soon be underway. The contracts for the section east of Guildwood Parkway to

ticket. In the case of Guildwood, the family return ticket costs \$3.50. The only problem is that very few passengers seem to know about it and the station attendants a pear reluctant to divulge the bargain rate.

In all cases I know of, families using GO Transit from Guildwood to the Exhibition station have been charged full rate, which would be \$10 for a family of five, all of whom were 12 or older. My wife was charged \$7 for herself and four children, another resident paid \$6 for himself, wife and two children, etc.

If you were one of the many who have been overcharged and can recall who sold you the individual tickets, you should ask why he didn't let you know about the family ticket. One explanation I was given was that family tickets are good only on the day of issue, which the attendant

As it stands now, the by-law regarding Group Homes will allow the setting-up of such homes only for the mentally retarded. If an institution in any of the other seven categories that were originally designated makes application for a Group Home, the Borough would have to hold extensive public meetings to determine whether to accept or reject the application. Mr. Fulton assured the membership that Scarborough will not be inundated with Group Homes. Indeed, during the past two years, there have been only two applications for Group Homes of any kind.

Mr. Fulton also showed to the G.V.C.A. a proposed plan for the Scarborough Village Recreation Centre. The proposed site for this centre is the north-east corner of the Markham Road and Kingston Road intersection. Included in this facility would be: a theatre for the Scarborough Theatre Guild and other drama groups, a large gymnasium, an ice surface 85' by 185', squash courts, a competitive fitness area, and a senior citizen's lounge and deck; also included would be such necessities as: kitchen, change-rooms, arena seating, etc.

The plan is modular in design, so that if the overall cost were going to exceed the \$2.6 million approved budget, one or more segments could be deleted from the first phase and added when funds became available. Mr. Fulton emphasized that this proposal is still before Council and that the complex would require about two years to construct after it receives approval.

Mr. Fulton also reassured residents of Guildwood that the traffic on the road leading off Guildwood Parkway into the new townhouses by the gates is being carefully monitored to determine if any congestion is being caused.


"The Good Old Days"

### Guildwood Fights Topless Issue

SPECIAL REPORT

On the afternoon of Monday, January 8, 1979, a delegation of approximately 350 Guildwood residents attended a meeting of Scarborough Council. The purpose of the delegation was to urge Council to expedite Metro's passage of a by-law to license, restrict and control adult entertainment parlours of the kind that exist in Gerald Black's Guild Manor Tavern.

David Wilmot, representing Guildwood residents, stated the community's position:

"We feel that Mr. Black's topless entertainment harms our sense of community, damages our community pride, and undermines our selfesteem.

"That such entertainment is immoral or not, is not at issue here. It is enough to say that this is recognized as a low form of entertainment which cheapens its environment.

"If a community is to survive, it must have some say in what may or may not take place in its midst.

Every community should have a say in what does or does not take place in its midst."

Gerald Black urged Scarborough Council to consider his point of view before any vote was taken regarding the control of establishments such as the Guild Manor

Tavern. Mr. Black explained that he had gone to great expense to advertise in the <u>Guildwood News and Views</u> and in the <u>Scarborough Mirror</u>, but had received no response from the <u>Guildwood community</u>. He added that he felt that he had been forced into hiring topless dancers by nonsupport from the community.

Mr. Black then presented to Council a petition containing 262 names, most without addresses or telephone numbers, of individuals who were in favour of the entertainment being offered by the Guild Manor Tayern.

When Controller Joyce Trimmer asked Mr. Black to read the statement at the top of his petition, it was apparent that Mr. Black could not decipher the writing. Under further questioning by Mrs. Trimmer, Mr. Black also disclosed that he felt that the Guild Manor Tavern had had a 'bad name' under its previous ownership; Mr. Black also informed Council that he had never looked at the previous owners' books before buying into the establishment.

Alderman Ed Fulton commented on the chain of events leading up to Monday's confrontation in Council and stated his position on the issue:

"On December 15 .... I was in contact with Mr. Black and felt obligated to tell him what I perceived to be the probable community reaction .... Mr. Black's reaction to my suggestion that we meet and pursue other areas of perhaps enhancing his business, whether it's with the Community Association and/or the landlords of

the plaza .... were to no avail. Then he proceeded on the 19th of December to commence this type of operation, even though he knowingly understood what the reaction would be.

"Mr. Black, unfortunately for him, myself and members of the community, chose to take his battle to the press.... He certainly didn't see fit to meet with me, or members of the community, or the Association.

"We're not suggesting that this form of entertainment be banned; nor are we going to stand back and let Scarborough become the sex capital of Metro Toronto or North America. There is a place, probably, for this form of entertainment. But I don't think it happens to be in this neighbourhood plaza, or Bridlewood neighbourhood plaza, or Malvern, or Oakridge, or anywhere else that was designed solely for the day-to-day convenience of the abutting neighbours."

The vote was unanimously in favour of the Board of Control's recommendation which stated substantially that Scarborough Council "expedite the processing of

a bill (by Metro) to license,
restrict and control adult entertainment".

Then on January 16, 1979, the matter of topless waitresses and dancers came before the Metro Licensing Committee. David Wilmot made a brief statement concerning the history of the topless issue in Guildwood and the reasons why residents here are opposed to having such entertainment in their local plaza. Julius Troll, representing the Bartenders' Union, also spoke out against toplessness as a condition of employment as a waitress or waitress/dancer. Melvin Deutsch, a representative of Giustini's Steak Houses (topless establishments due to open in Metro in the next few months) spoke against the controlling of toplessness. Gerald Black was on the agenda to speak before the Committee, but Mr. Black was not present.

unanimously passed a motion calling for the Metro solicitors to draft a by-law that will:

- stop servers of food and beverages from working topless
- 2) designate specific areas in Metro in which establishments may apply for a license to offer topless entertainment.

The first part of the by-law will probably be drafted quickly and presented again to the Licensing Committee within a week or two. It may, however, take a month or two before the second part of the by-law is drafted, because the solicitors will have to meet with representatives of all the boroughs to determine which areas are appropriate for topless licensing.

The reason for controlling such establishments through a combination of licensing and zoning was explained by Controller Ruddell: if only zoning were used, places such as the Guild Manor Tavern would constitute "lawful non-conforming" uses, since they were operating as topless establishments before the zoning came into effect. But if such places have to apply for a license to operate as topless establishments, and if their location is outside of "topless" zones, they will be forced to discontinue offering nude entertainment.

#### EDITORIAL

It's doubtful that anyone other than Gerald Black enjoyed the publicity that recently rocked our little community.

But the issue itself did have a positive effect on Guildwood: its people once again showed how vigorously they can work toward a common goal.

There were dissenters, to be sure: some people felt that we should just have kept our mouths shut and let the Guild Manor Tavern die a natural death. But those people must be made aware of the fact that topless establishments in the City of Toronto have not simply closed down or reverted to their former state once the initial lure of toplessness has worn off: they have tended, rather, to move into the showing of porno movies.

And what about Guildwood's responsibility to other communities? We have a strong association here, and a committed, hard-working group of residents. If we hadn't taken a stand on this issue, perhaps Scarborough Council would have been

less adamant in its urging of Metro to pass legislation controlling this kind of entertainment in other areas like our own that don't have the resources we have to fight this

And if the Executive of the Community Association hadn't responded to the many, many complaints it received from Guildwood residents, the Association would surely have died.

People generally are disenchanted with government. Many consider our federal government to be a joke at best. Many feel that they have been let down by the provincial government -- the provincial government that dumped the entire topless issue back onto the municipalities.

But if people think that they have no voice whatsoever in shaping their environment, then there can be no democracy. The only level of government in which many people still have any faith at all is the municipal. Scarborough Council responded -- unanimously -- to a community's wishes. Citizens' faith in something, at least, remains intact.

For that alone, it was worth the fight. For that alone, it was worth allowing Mr. Black a few extra dollars' worth of notoriety.

#### \*\*\*\*\*

But before we get too carried away congratulating ourselves, we must pause to ask, "Could all of this have been avoided?"

Obviously, the onus of success or failure of a business enterprise rests upon the entrepreneur, not upon his potential customers. If the Guild Manor Tavern was never the kind of establishment desired by this community, it behooved the owner, not the community, to find out what was wrong.

But what about the merchants in the plaza who do provide appropriate services and products? Do we all patronize them as much as we should? Because if we don't support them, they won't be there when we need them; or worse, our plaza will start to decline.

Many of our local merchants offer the kind of friendliness and old-fashioned service that can be found only in a neighbourhood store. They deserve our business.



The large turnout was due in part to the hard work of many concerned people who delivered hundreds of letters announcing the meeting to Guildwood Residents. Mr. Ken Hare, who originally brought the concerns before Scarborough Board of Control, provided the spark when people reacted angrily to his treatment by the press and by the Tavern owner.

As you know, Scarborough Council will now have a stronger hand at



Metro when asking for the right to apply new legislation recently handed over from the Province which should control such entertainment, or at least its location. schedule some at other times.



people with older people, affluent people with less affluent people -- in order that they may help each other, and in order to dispell some of the prejudices that exist in our community.







The last issue of the News and Views thoroughly covered the matter of the Guild Manor Tavern's introducing topless entertainment to this area, including an excerpt of my presentation to the Borough Council.

Since that accounting of the issue, Metro Council has passed a by-law prohibiting topless servers (waitresses). Of more concern to us, however, is that Metro has also passed a recommendation of the Legislation and Licencing Committee that the Metro Solicitor draft a by-law for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating topless entertainers. I believe Scarborough's position would be to emphasize the need to regulate, rather than prohibit, this form of entertainment. I expect Metro will approach controls by way of licensing the operator as opposed to introducing zoning by-laws. The outcome of Metro deliberations will be reported in a future issue of the News and Views.

On a recent number of

occasions, I have been asked about the dates of the newsprint pick-up for recycling purposes. Generally, for this year, pick-up is made on alternate Thursdays starting January 11th. There are some Thursdays during the year that are missed. To avoid any confusion or inconvenience, I would be happy to send you a calendar indicating the pick-up dates for the balance of the year.

The Borough budget is again before members of Council. Again the question of garbage pick-up frequently has been raised as a way of holding down any potential tax increase. Several variations in scheduling this proposed reduction of service are available, including reducing service only during the winter months. I would very much appreciate hearing your comments related to this matter in the near future.





## Going To The Dogs

Do you walk along the pathway leading to Guildwood Junior and St. Ursula's schools? Many children do, and also adults on their way to the GO station. It can be a pleasant walk - if you watch carefully where you are putting your feet, for what was intended as a path for people has become a toilet and free-running area for dogs.

I do use the pathway every day, and rare is the occasion when I do not see at least one dog running free with no sign of its owner. While small dogs pose no real threat by size, the occasional Doberman and German Shepherd are sufficient to test the courage of an adult, let alone that of young children. How long will it be before a child is severely mauled by one of these household pets?

It is not only the dog bite that threatens the health of children, but also the mass of faeces deposited on the pathway, on the grass surrounding it and on the play areas behind the schools. Random samplings of dog droppings by a doctor in Montreal showed that an overwhelming percentage of them contained parasites capable of passing on serious diseases to humans. Check this with any veterinarian.

This article is not intended to suggest getting rid of dogs as pets, but to suggest that those owners who let their dogs run free realise the dangers to which they are exposing our children. Owning a pet, as I do, entails responsibility to the animal and to other people. It is a few irresponsible people who are giving excellent reason for passing "stoop and "scoop" bylaws and encouraging taxpayer expense through greater need for dog-catchers. To those dog-owners I say, "Clean up your act - we don't want to step in it." CHURCH OF THE HOLY TRINITY

On April 1st, at 8:00 a.m., there will be a corporate communion and breakfast for the ladies of the parish (especially the Chancel Guild) and on the 8th, at 8:00 a.m., the men (especially the Sidesmen) will hold their corporate communion and breakfast.

On Maundy Thursday, the day the church commemorates the Last Supper, we will have a Holy Communion service at 7:30 p.m. Then on Good Firday, we will contemplate our Lord's Crucifixion in the "Seven Last Words" service at 10:30 a.m.

All this is by way of preparation for Easter. We will greet the Happy Morning with services at 8:00 and 10:30; then in the evening, at 7:30, Bishop A. A. Read, Suffregan Bishop of Toronto, will visit us for a service of Confirmation. We anticipate a great day!

If you have been absent from church for some time, this Lent and Easter will be a great opportunity to get back into the swing of things. Come and join us. All are welcome.

At the Annual Vestry Meeting, the parish moved to a "Parish Council Concept". As you can see, many of the leaders at Holy Trinity are leaders in the Guildwood community.

We are especially blessed.

student will be more confident and therefore less anxious when it comes to writing an examination.

Encourage your child to establish a fixed time and a place where study can occur without interruption by anyone.

You might also help your student to plan a study programme. This programme should allot reasonable periods of time to each subject. It should also alternate the various subjects and it should provide for brief breaks.

Discourage study marathons.

After more than 2 hours of
uninterrupted study the brain is
no longer able to absorb new
information effectively.

Encourage your child to study by involving as many senses as possible. Learning is facilitated by reading, writing and saying something over and over again. You might also have your child explain his lesson to you: if your child can teach you, he probably understands the material reasonably well.

Your child's wish to please you probably produces more anxiety than all other factors. As a result,

you can best help your child by explaining that pass or fail, your love for your child will remain constant. Encourage your child to do his very best. When the very best effort has been put forth, and the results are in, success or failure alike deserve understanding.

Throughout the year, but especially immediately prior to examinations, all teachers provide extra help. Students are encouraged to ask for assistance.

We hope that with the help of teachers and parents, the upcoming examinations (March 9 - March 16) will be filled with less anxiety and much success.



#### **DINING OUT**

This is the first in a series of reviews of eating establishments in and around Guildwood.

The Stone Cottage Inn

Eid Attia and Garry Ohannesyan, owners of the Stone Cottage Inn, have hit upon a great idea with their Sunday family buffet: in a warm, quiet atmosphere, timid souls like myself can sample from a smorgasbord of exotic and not-so-exotic Middle Eastern dishes.

It was bitterly cold outside the Sunday we visited, but inside the Stone Cottage Inn there was a lovely fire crackling near our table. The service was warm and friendly, but unobtrusive. After a quiet drink, we went up to fill our plates at the buffet; there were so many things to try that we had to make a second trip just to have even a little taste of everything.

Even the most conservative palate would love many of the

Egyptian dishes. the laboula (cracked wheat, tomatoes, cucumber green pepper, onion, mint, and parsley all finely chopped, with lemon juice) was positively addictive. And the Zagazig Dip (yogurt, cucumber and spices) was lovely. The Mousaka (eggplant, meat, parmesan cheese, eggs, milk, and spice) was very good, too. But the lamb was magnificent: so good, in fact, that we are looking forward to going back for the Tuesday Lamb special.

In deference to Anglo-Saxon customers, the buffet included such things as potato salad and tossed salad, but Mr. Attia mingled with his guests, encouraging them to try some of the Egyptian specialties and telling people the names and ingredients of the various dishes.

To finish off the meal, there was an English trifle that was, without a doubt, the best I've ever tasted. While we were enjoying dessert, Mr. Ohannesyan offered long, colourful Egyptian cigarettes to his customers.

So if you want to be ahead of the times and beat the Tutankhamen

rage that's sure to sweep the city later this year, become a connoisseur of Egyptian food now. The Stone Cottage Inn's Sunday buffet is a marvellous way to ease gently into Middle Eastern cuisine.



#### NOTES FROM THE EDITOR

A few weeks ago I received a telephone call from a woman who was very upset. She lives in one of the apartment buildings at the south end of Livingston Road, and she explained that she and her fellow residents have been harassed, for several years now, by the youth of Guildwood. This harrassment has taken many forms: verbal abuse, apple-throwing, cutting through expensive fencing, using the private grounds of the apartment as a public park, and many other kinds of disrespectful and insolent behaviour.

Unfortunately, I have heard similar complaints from other residents and from merchants, and the recent series of newspaper articles about suburbia seems to indicate that such problems are widespread.

And yet, I find it very hard to reconcile these charges with the behaviour of young people whom I know personally: with almost no exceptions, they are polite,

considerate and responsible.

So I'd like to invite you, the people of Guildwood, to write to me, or call me, and tell me how you feel about the kids who live here. And I especially would like the young people themselves to tell me how they feel about the conduct of their peers, the example set by adults, and the attitude of the community toward youth.

In the next issue we'll publish a selection of your opinions and any suggestions you have for improving the situation.

EDUCATION WEEK (April 22-28)

Although we like to think that Scarborough schools emphasize the best in education all year long, the Ministry of Education suggests one special week be set aside each year to highlight programmes at local schools across the province. During the past few years the scope of Scarborough's Education Week has broadened considerably.

Most large shopping malls displayed work done in the local family of schools and featured live pupil demonstrations. 
focussed on education in Scarborough--past, present and future. The Cedarbrae Collegiate band and the Scarborough Youth Choir provided musical entertainment.

The motion was deferred until the Board meeting of April 23rd, in order first to obtain the reaction of principals, groups and individuals. I support the present policy and will continue to support it because of views expressed to me by many parents. 





It's easy to be alive and well at Sir Wilfrid Laurier C.I. Our Nutrition programme is now in full swing and our students are eating it up. That is, they are eating their Wilf-burgers and their salad plates.

How did all this start?
Since April 4, the school has been humming with nutritious activities. The programme was kicked off with an assembly. On each of the following days we featured reduced-cost luncheon specials. The specials were designed to provide at least one of each of four food categories of Canada's Food Guide.

Those students who did not wish to join us for breakfast were treated to an educational film on nutrition.

Other highlights of our programme were the "Fibre Festival" days and the vegetable "Corsage Days". The combination of fun and nutrition is unbeatable.

Will this nutrition fever last? We believe so. Our Nutrition Committee, under the able leadership of Mrs. Mary Denne--Head of Family Studies Department--is working on a maintenance programme. With the cooperation of Mr. Jim Taylor, our caterer, we are hoping gradually to reduce the consumption of junk foods and to encourage the consumption of nutritious meals.

#### The Other Side Of Guildwood Youth

A VIEW FROM SIR WILDRID LAURIER C.I.

The editorial in the June 1

issue of the Guildwood News and Views castigates this community for failing to take the trouble to write about our children. Apparently, in a response to this paper's request for opinions about the behaviour (either good or bad) of Guildwood's young people, only three people phoned with news of vandalism, rudeness and drug and alcohol abuse.

Since it would be most unjust to tar all of our young people with that kind of brush, I have decided to give you my impressions and at the same time to champion the cause of the overwhelming majority of our young people who are hard-working, straight-thinking and honest citizens.

True, as one of the Vice-Principals of Sir Wilfrid Laurier C.I., I do see examples of vandalism like broken windows, clogged toilets and carved-up desks. I also encounter rudeness and I have dealt with incidents of drug and alcohol abuse. But let me state unequivocally that the many hours which are spent by a Vice-Principa dealing with vandalism, trespassing, rudeness, alcohol or drug abuse, skipping, truancy, cheating theft and failure to complete home. work are spent as a result of the behaviour of less than 10 percent of our school population.

That other 90 percent of the student population unfortunately does not get the credit it deserves.

There is a newspaper cliché which may account for this oversight. Good news does not sell papers. It may also be that we are just too modest to brag about the successes of our offspring.

I don't have any biological offspring attending school in this area but, I have developed a deep parental pride in the achievements of my young charges. And, I am not too modest to speak up about their good deeds.

Here are just a few examples.

Chris Travell was one of my
charges. He was involved in the
production of a number of Variety
Nights and the Community Connection where he performed as a
magician. He was a member of the
school band. He played badminton,
floor hockey and he ran for the
cross country team. Chris is a
member of the Society of Canadian
Magicians and on November 9 he
will be the valedictorian for the
graduating class. By the way, his
final average in Grade 13 was 77%.

Christina Tracy is another fine example of hardworking, clearthinking Guildwood youth. She was a member of the badminton club, she acted in Anne of Green Gables; she took part in the Theatre Arts Festival, the Laurier Lope, and the Variety Shows both at school and at the Guildwood Villa. This is not all. Christina also wrote for the Quill - a creative writing magazine; she was a member of our Reach for the Top team; she was on the Track Team; she took part Continued on page 9

The long debated Scarborough Village Community Centre was approved at the September 17th meeting of Council by a 13 to 3 vote. The Complex, first approved in February 1977 will be located at the northeast corner of Markham and Kingston Roads. The Centre will include a one ice surface arena, a 250 seat theatre for the lively arts a senior citizen's lounge, a community room, a combative room and fitness centre, and a food services area.

The final Ontario Municipal Board approval granted last November limited the total expenditure to the original 1977 budget of approximately 2.6 million dollars. Since the O.M.B. neglected to provide for any cost of living or other inflationary factors in their decision, certain of the originally planned components had to be deleted. Regrettably the gymnastic gymnasium and the squash courts will not be built, at least in this original phase of the complex.

It is expected that construction will begin very early in 1980 with the opening planned for the Fall of 1981.



MEDICAL CORNER

By Dr. W. Kingston

BLOOD TESTS

Why is all that Blood removed from your arm vein when you have your annual health examination? What tests does your Doctor order?

The examination gives the Doctor an opportunity to screen patients for potential problems, to practice preventive medicine, and a chance to detect any ongoing disease.

The blood tests ordered include: Haemoglobin (detects Anaemia), White Blood Count (to exclude lukaemia) and a Blood Film. These are routine. Tests of Liver and Kidney function are undertaken. Testing of Thyroid function is usual, especially in patients taking birth control pills. To exclude Diabetes Mellitus, a random blood sugar is measured.

The preventive medicine aspect involves measurement of the blood fats (Triglycerides, Cholesterol and High Density Lipoproteins). If these are found to be high, then arrangements are made to test a blood sample after an overnight 14 hour fast. Hopefully, your Doctor's office opens early to prevent the pangs of hunger from being too prolonged!







# *ANDRAGOGY ?*

ANDRAGOGY STRIKES

SIR WILFRID LAURIER C.I.

Our latest count indicates that at least 15 students and four teachers show all the symptoms usually associated with andragogy. The Scarborough Board of Education has been notified and the officials there are watching the situation closely. The school administrators, headed by Mr. M.B. Flynn have developed a waitand-see attitude but they are having a difficult time suppressing the enthusiasm.

"Strange reaction" you say, for what sounds like an ominous condition. Actually, enthusiasm is a most appropriate response to the word andragogy which simply means "the education of adults".

How did Sir Wilfrid Laurier C.I. become involved with andragogy? The laurels go to Mr. Jim Stewart who is the head of our Business Education Department. It was Mr. Stewart's feeling that there could be a considerable number of adults in the area who might be interested in taking typing, data processing, shorthand or accounting in order to develop new skills or to brush up on old skills. In order to test his theory, Mr. Stewart distributed posters throughout our attendance area. These posters invited adults to enrol in one or two courses in the above mentioned subject areas.

The response to the posters was encouraging. Twenty-five adults showed interest and

Some Guildwood residents may not be aware that a large portion of the property surrounding the Guild Inn has been fenced off as a public park named, logically enough, Guildwood Park. The park areas are at each end of the property and along the face of the bluffs behind the Inn.

#### General Observation

Those attending the annual meeting of the association in October were amazed to find nearly all the seats occupied. Although some 800 families belong to the association, we don't expect to see more than 20 or so at any general meeting.

The explanation of the large attendance on this occasion was that residents of the Galloway Road area where no active community association exists had taken advantage of our meeting to discuss a local problem. The Executive Committee wants our members to know that an unsigned circular distributed to some member households about the Galloway problem in advance of our meeting was not issued by the association.

We allowed the Galloway visitors to take over the meeting for about an hour, but took no official action as a result of the discussion since Galloway Road is outside our sphere of interest.

This experience served to remind us of the importance of keeping The Guildwood association strong so it will be in a position to express the views of the community on any important issues.

The Executive Committee hopes all Guildwood residents will have an enjoyable holiday season.

Scarborough Council recently met with the Borough's four Members of Parliament to discuss several subjects of mutual concern. Of particular interest were the discussions dealing with transportation, Federal social service funding and Bluff erosion.

Our specific concern with Transportation at the Federal level is the need for continued financial assistance to provide the needed grade separations at railway level crossings. Scar-


borough still has the greatest number of railway crossings of any municipality in Canada and needs continued Federal involvement to eliminate dangerous crossings.

In the matter of Social Services funding, the relationship between the Federal Government and the findings of the Metropolitan Toronto Social Planning Council's Report "Metro's Suburbs in Transition" was discussed. Specifically noted was the Federal initiation and promotion of programs and subsequent withdrawal of support. We were advised that all social service related programs were being reviewed and that better co-ordination of programs with all levels of government was needed to improve planning.

With new members representing Scarborough, the subject of Bluff erosion was of particular interest. Federal involvement began in 1976 with funding

provided by the Ministry of Fisheries through the Small Harbour Branch. Over one million dollars was committed to the Bluffers Park development. It is our hope that the Federal Government will maintain its interest in the shoreline management needs of Scarborough. Subsequent to meeting with our Member of Parliament, Controller Brian Harrison and I have met with representatives of the M.T.R.C.A. We are optimistic that the Authority will include funds in their 1980 budget to resume their role of protecting the Scarborough waterfront. I hope to have more details related to this matter in the near future.

teachers of Scarborough, East York and York have reached settlement with their Boards, but Toronto, North York and York negotiations are still continuing. All Boards and elementary teacher negotiators are still at the bargaining table.

The Metro Steering Committee sets guidelines and strategy for senior administrators appointed by their boards to negotiate with teacher federation negotiators.

#### ENRICHMENT CLASSES

Poplar Road school is now the scene of the first enrichment withdrawal classes in this ward. For the past year this type of program has been operating as a pilot project in Ward 9. Because of its success and the availability of Poplar Road classrooms, we

decided to follow the same pattern as West Hill, drawing students each week from grades three to six from Guildwood, Poplar Road and Elizabeth Simcoe for special enrichment. The students chosen are recommended by their teachers and principals and with parental consent are given a test to measure I.Q., emotional security and maturity and creativity.

Many students are able to work far ahead of their grade level in many subject areas and within a structured program. They are convergent thinkers and receive top grades. The students most often chosen for the enrichment program are "divergent" thinkers, able to grasp more abstract ideas and be creative in the way they express these ideas. The

convergent thinker fits well into an accelerated program because he can master large amounts of work quickly, while the divergent thinker wants to expand his knowledge and use it in creative ways through art, science, literature, project work and dramatics.

Teacher Paul Scott is doing a fine job of launching the program, which is being closely observed and will be assessed at the end of the school year.



#### REMEMBRANCE DAY

## INDOOR PLANTS

by Fern

The time has come to bring our "green thumbs" indoors and get re-acquainted with the indoor plants.

Let us look at some basics for watering since some of us can be over generous at watering time. Know your plants by inspecting them regularly. Plants in plastic pots require less water since it doesn't evaporate through the sides as it does in clay pots. Plants with thick leaves hold water, therefore intervals between watering can be longer.

After transplanting, the plant needs less water since it is in a state of shock.

When watering, do it thoroughly to allow the water to work its way down through the soil and deep into the root ball. Be sure to pour the excess water out of the base saucer. For those plants too awkward or heavy to move use a basting syringe or sponge to remove the excess water.

#### TESTING BLOOD FATS

A review of patients who have been unfortunate enough to have suffered a heart attack reveals that many have high levels of triglycerides and cholestral. (The other significant factor is heavy smoking.)

It is thought that if these high levels of blood fats can be lowered--usually by dietary control--heart attacks can be avoided. This control should be achieved at an early age if possible.

Because elevated blood fats seem to be familial (that is, runs in families), the relatives, especially children, of individuals with high blood fat levels should have blood tests.

For this reason the Hospital for Sick Children runs a lipid clinic to detect high blood fat levels in children and to advise parents in the management of dietary control. Hopefully, such clinics will eventually reduce the number of deaths from heart disease.
