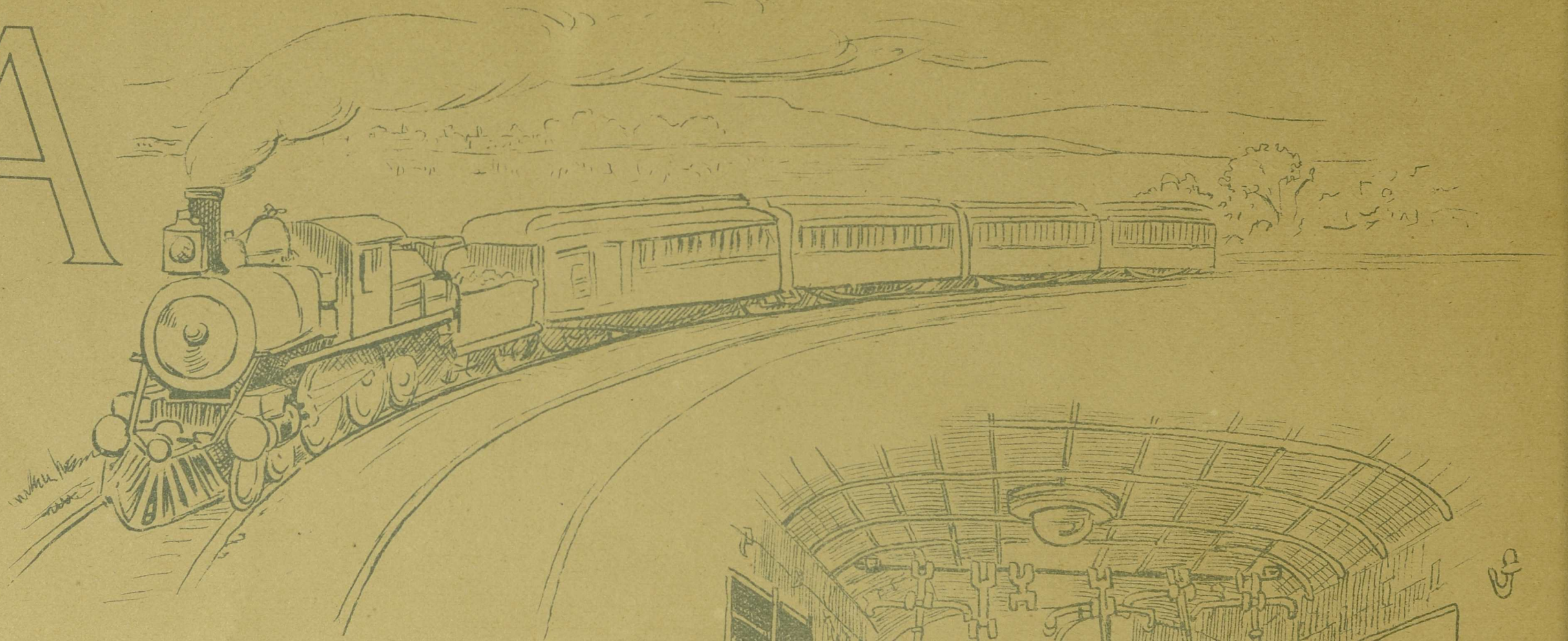

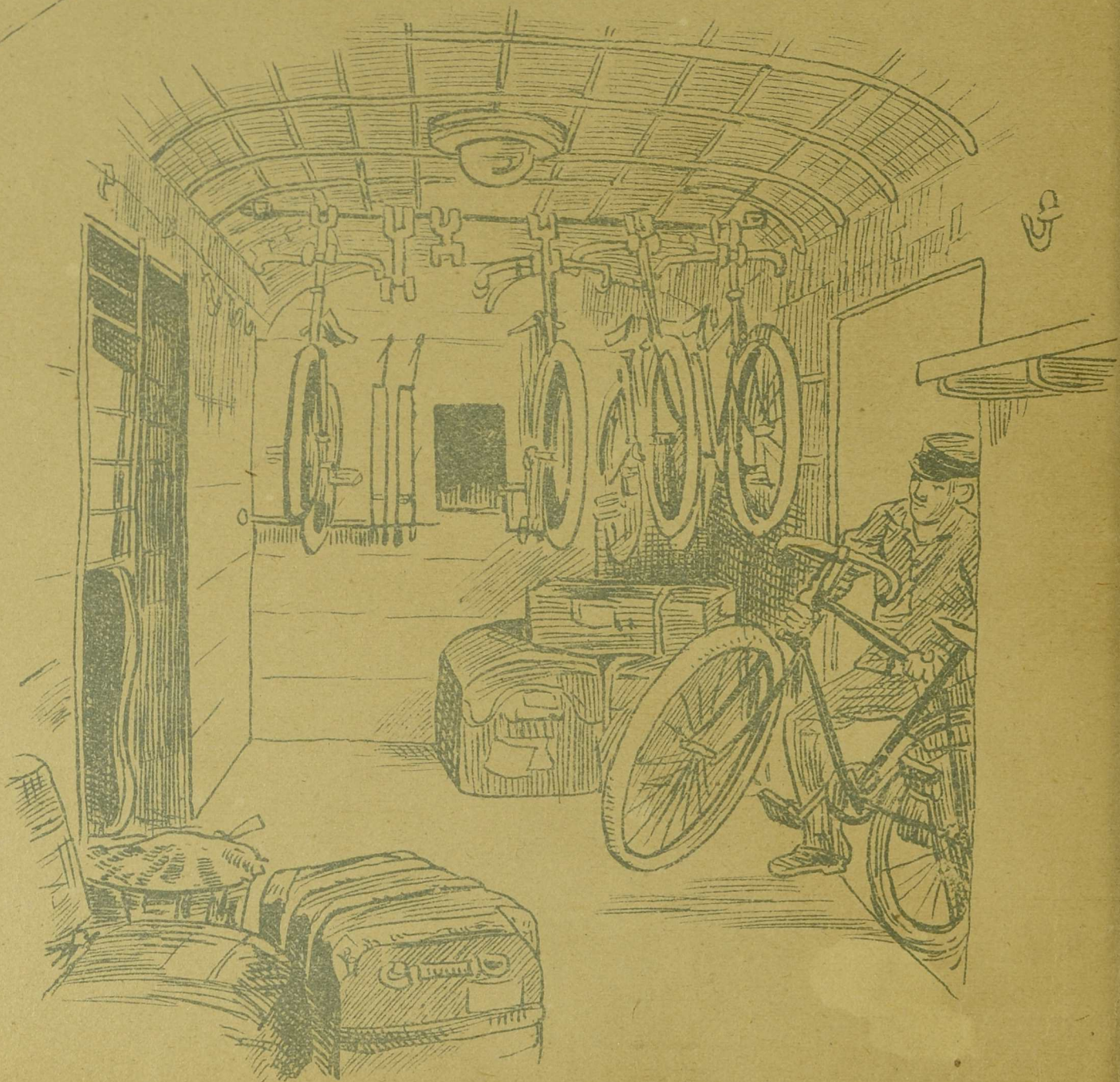

take care indeed.

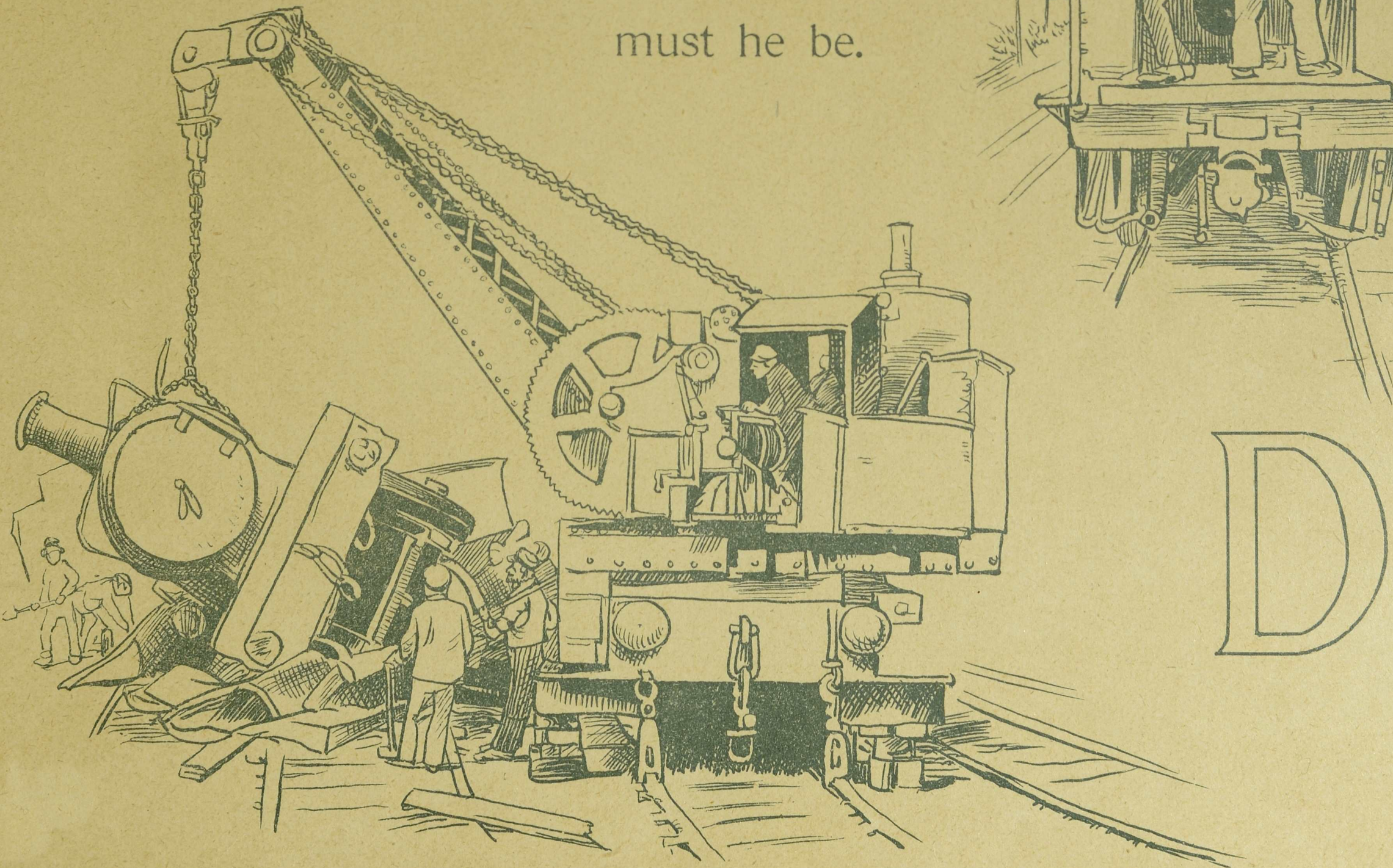
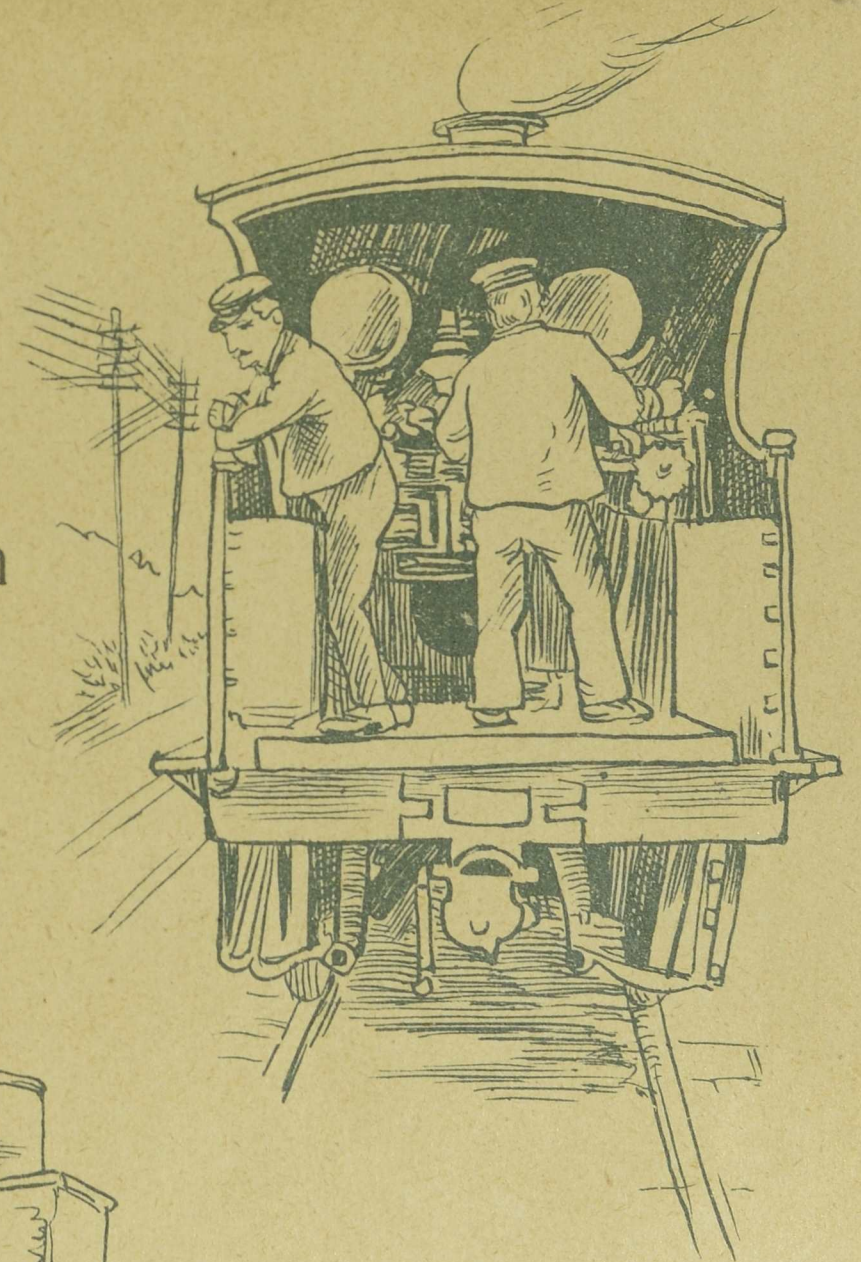




C

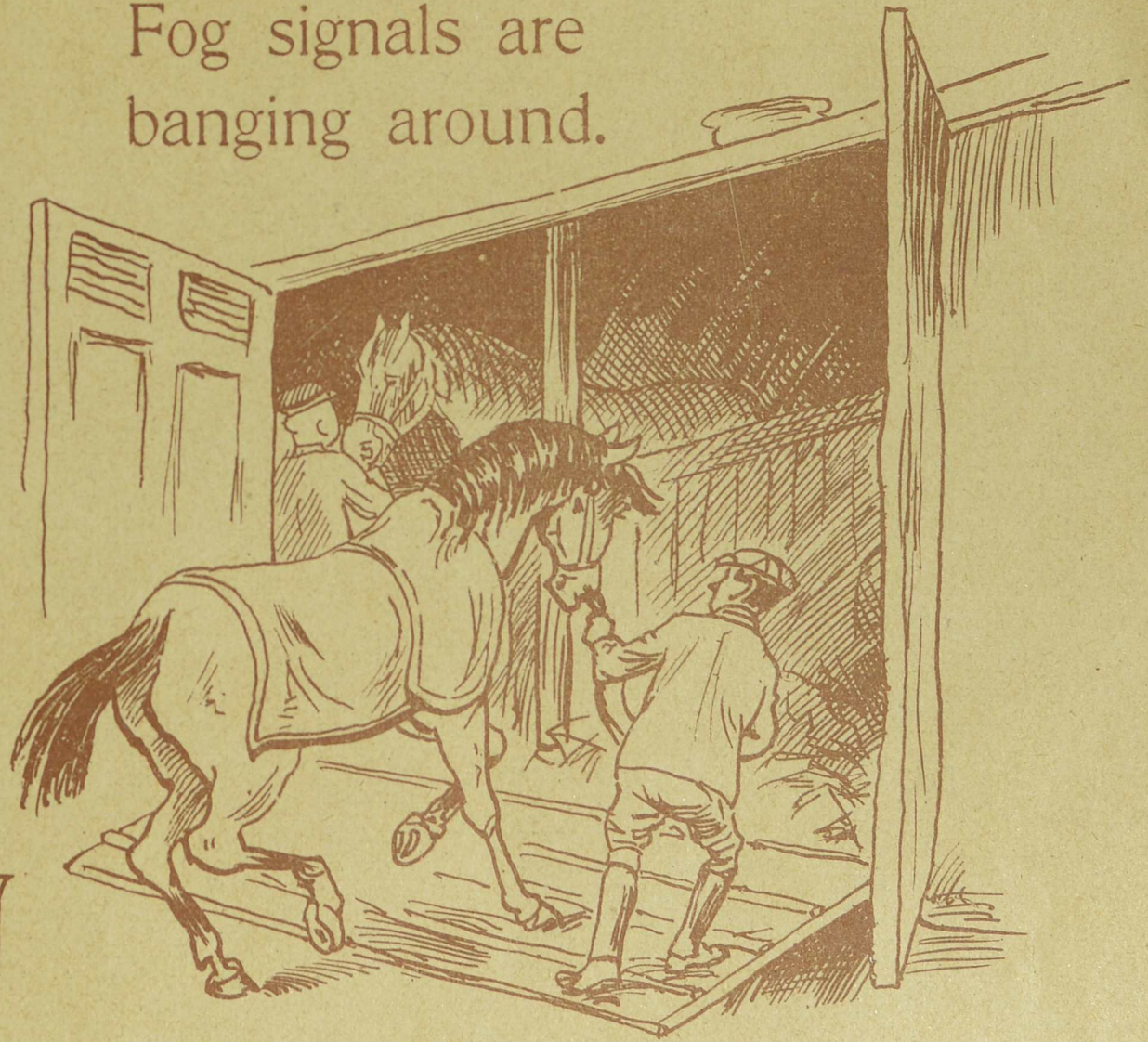
E stands for Engine that stops and lets off big

a puff, and a scream.

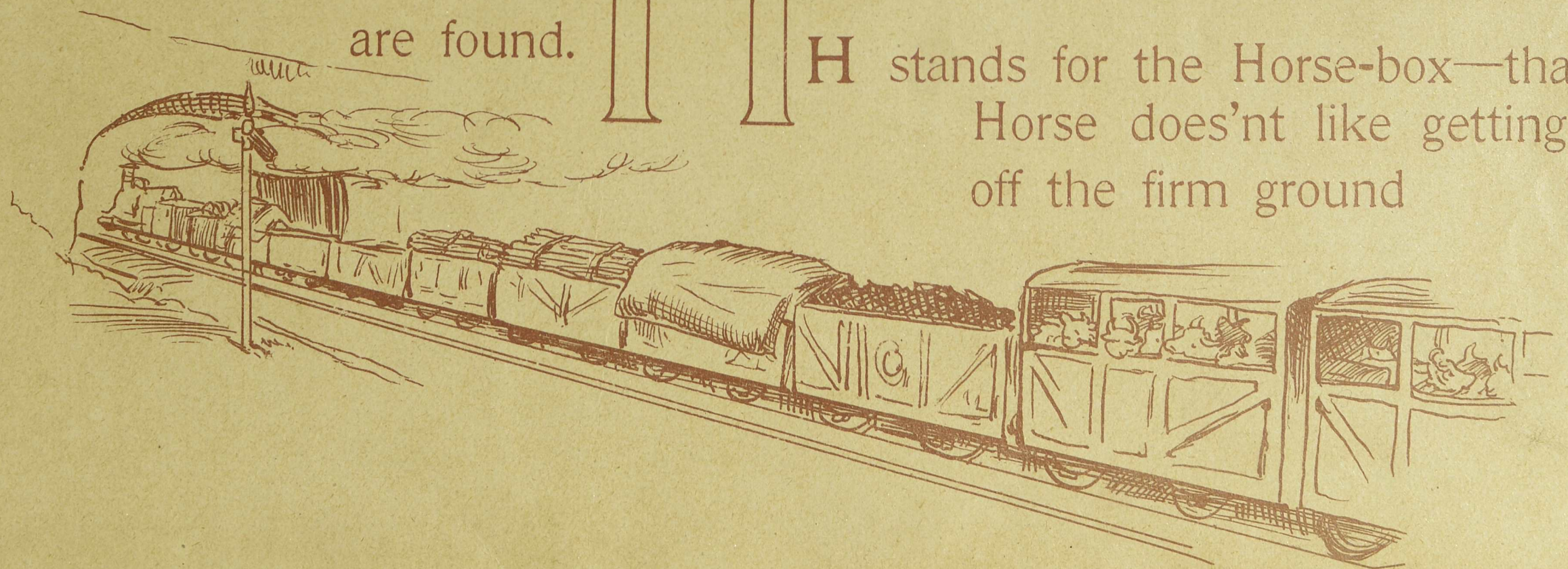


**F** stands for the Fog that's so thick,

are found.



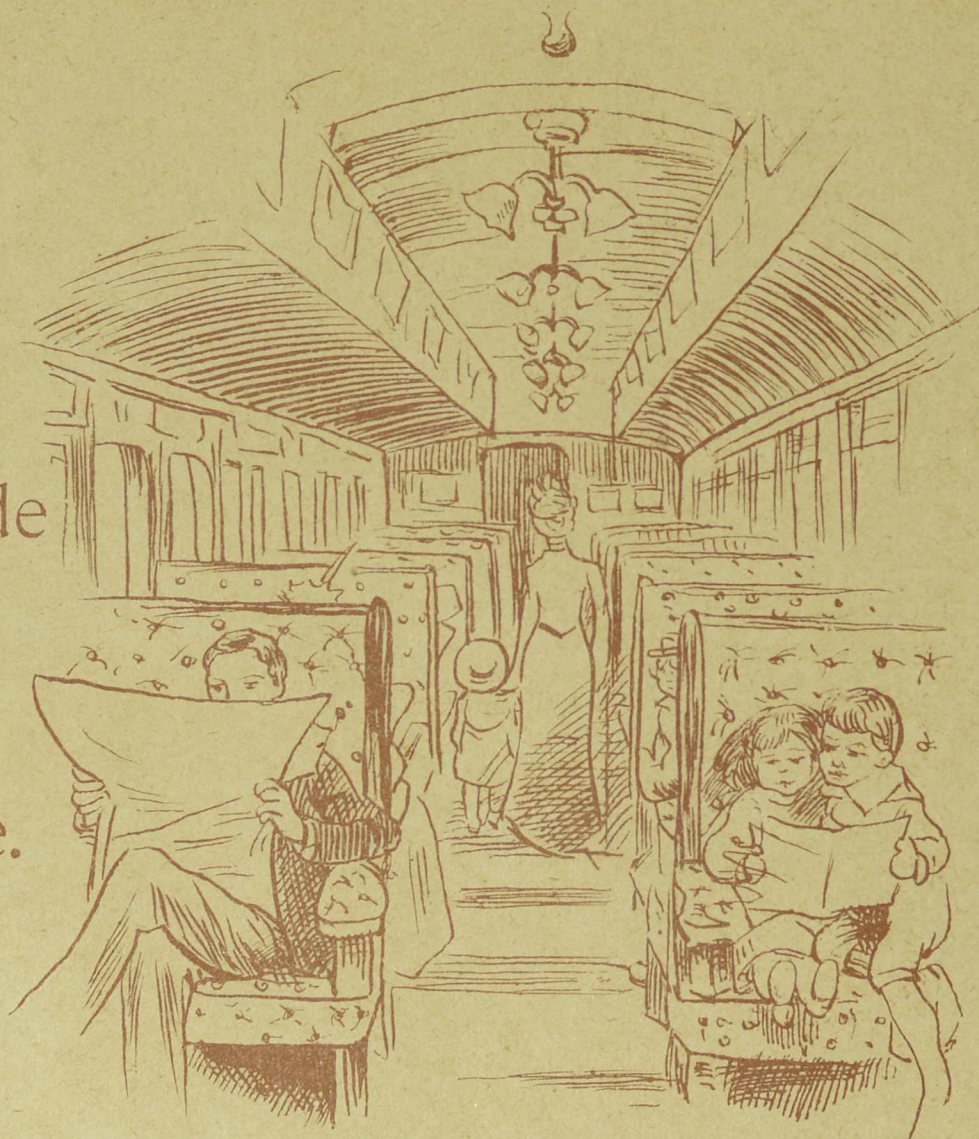

off the firm ground

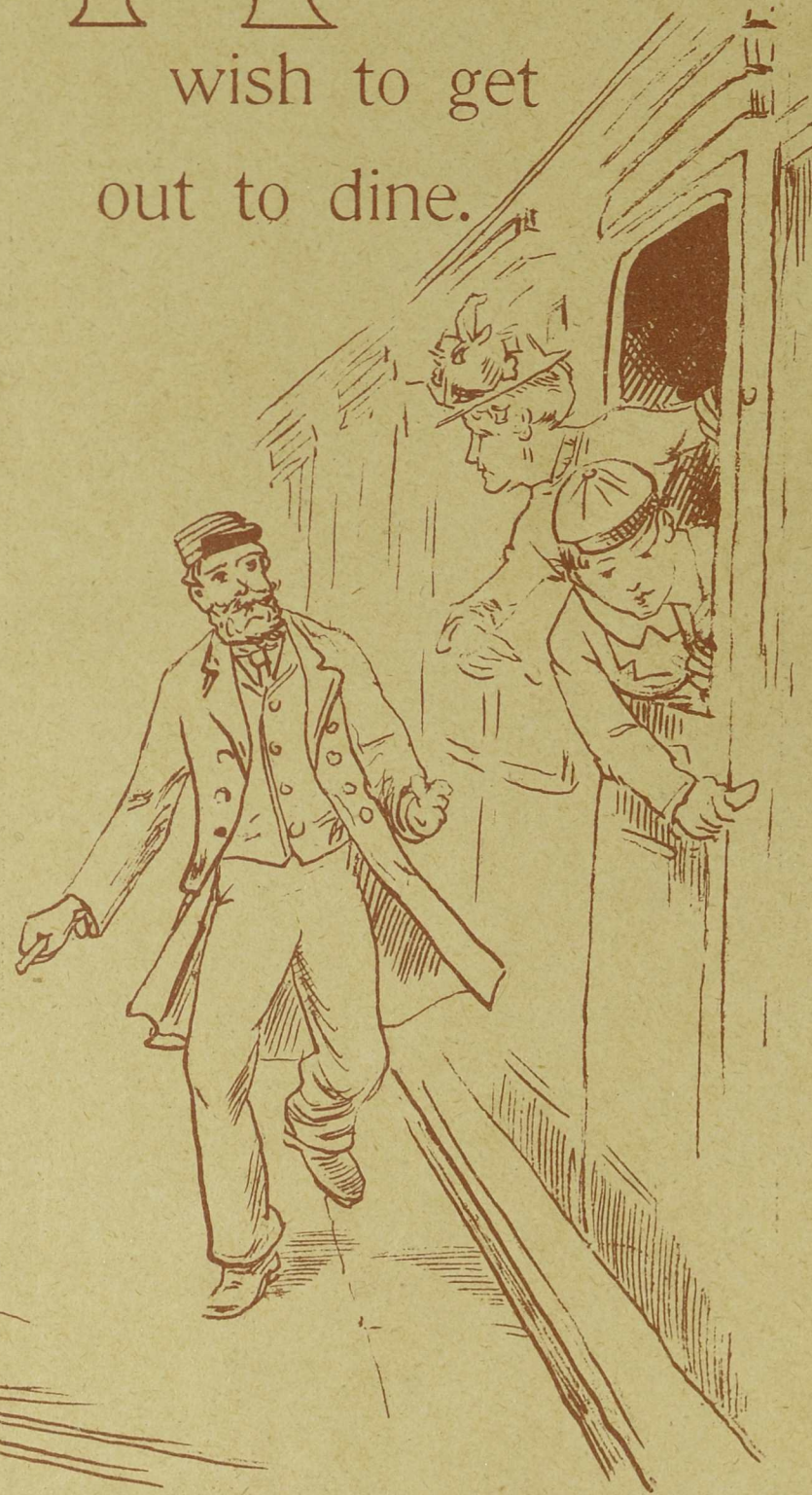

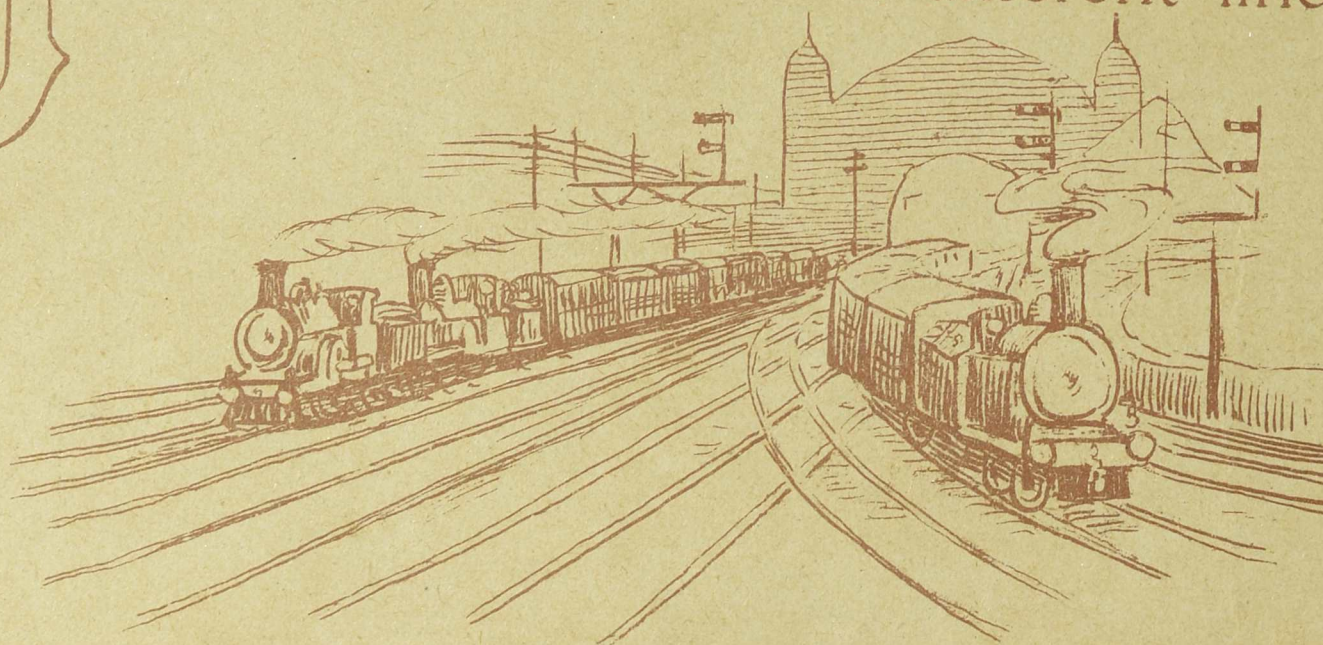
I stands for Inside

in which all these letters are sent.



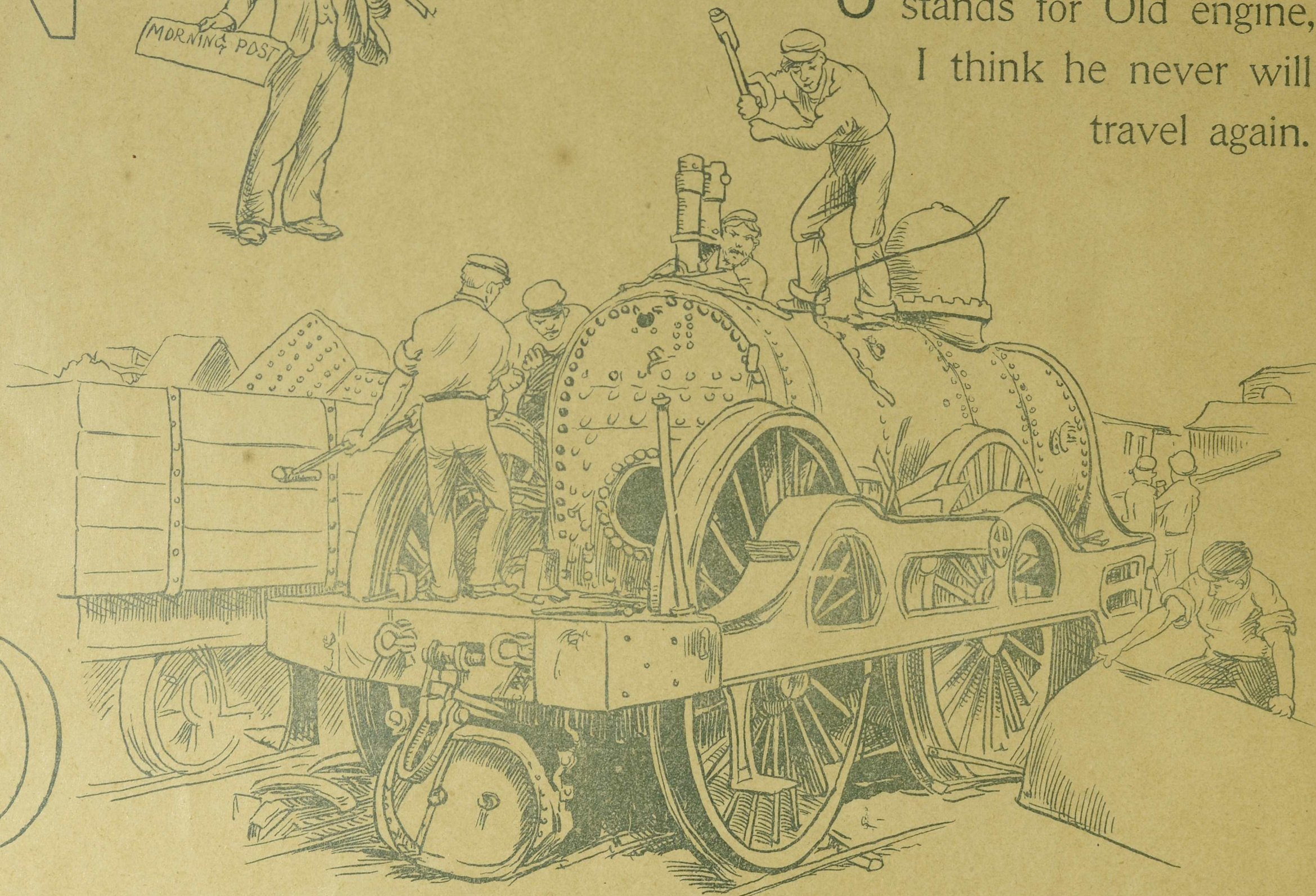

travel again.

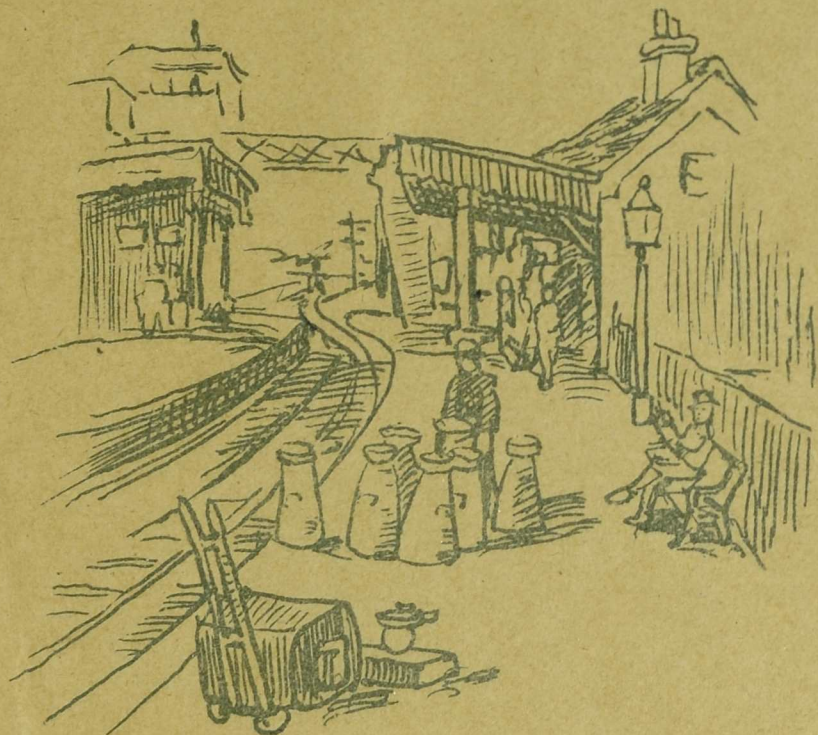
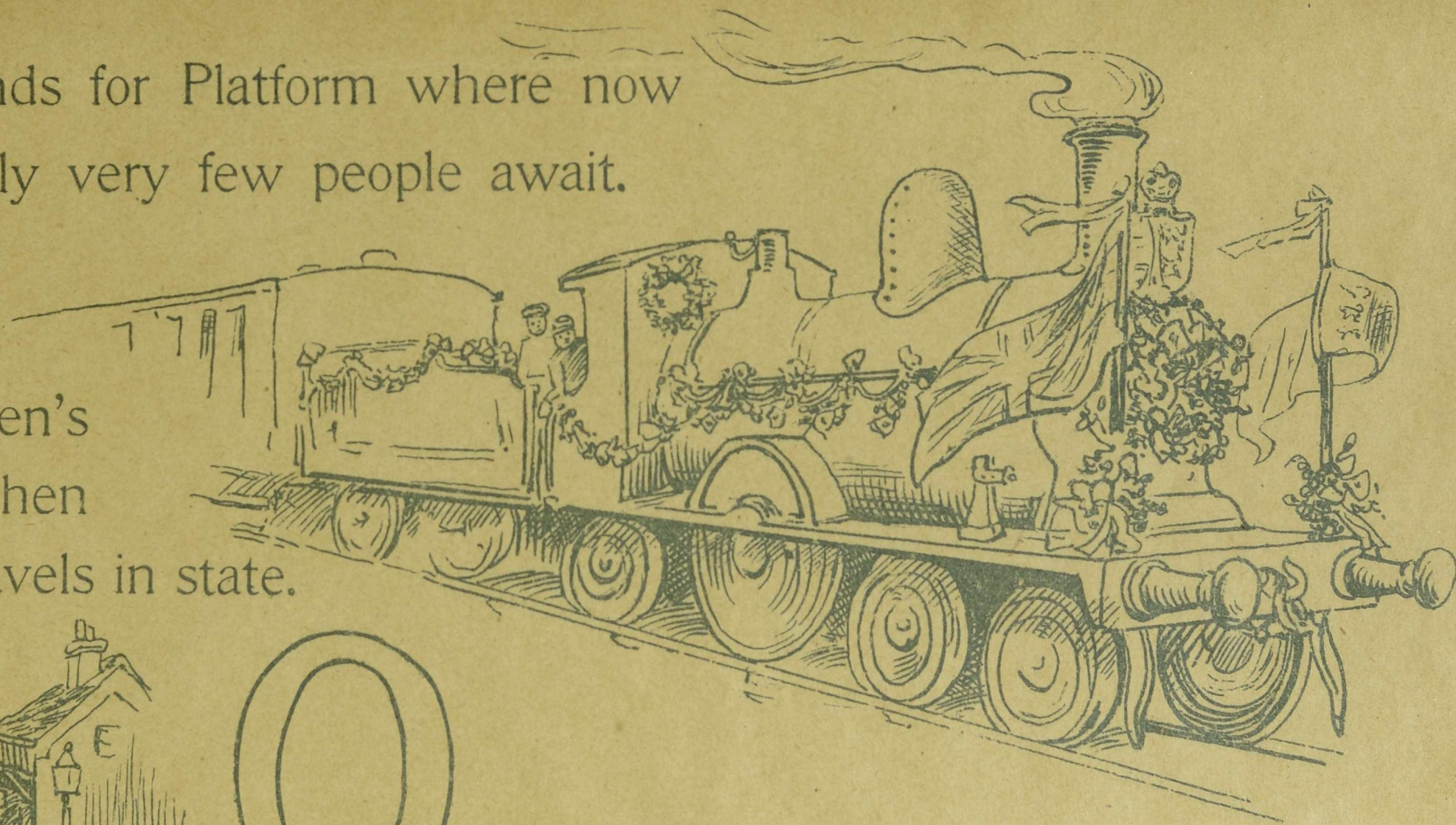

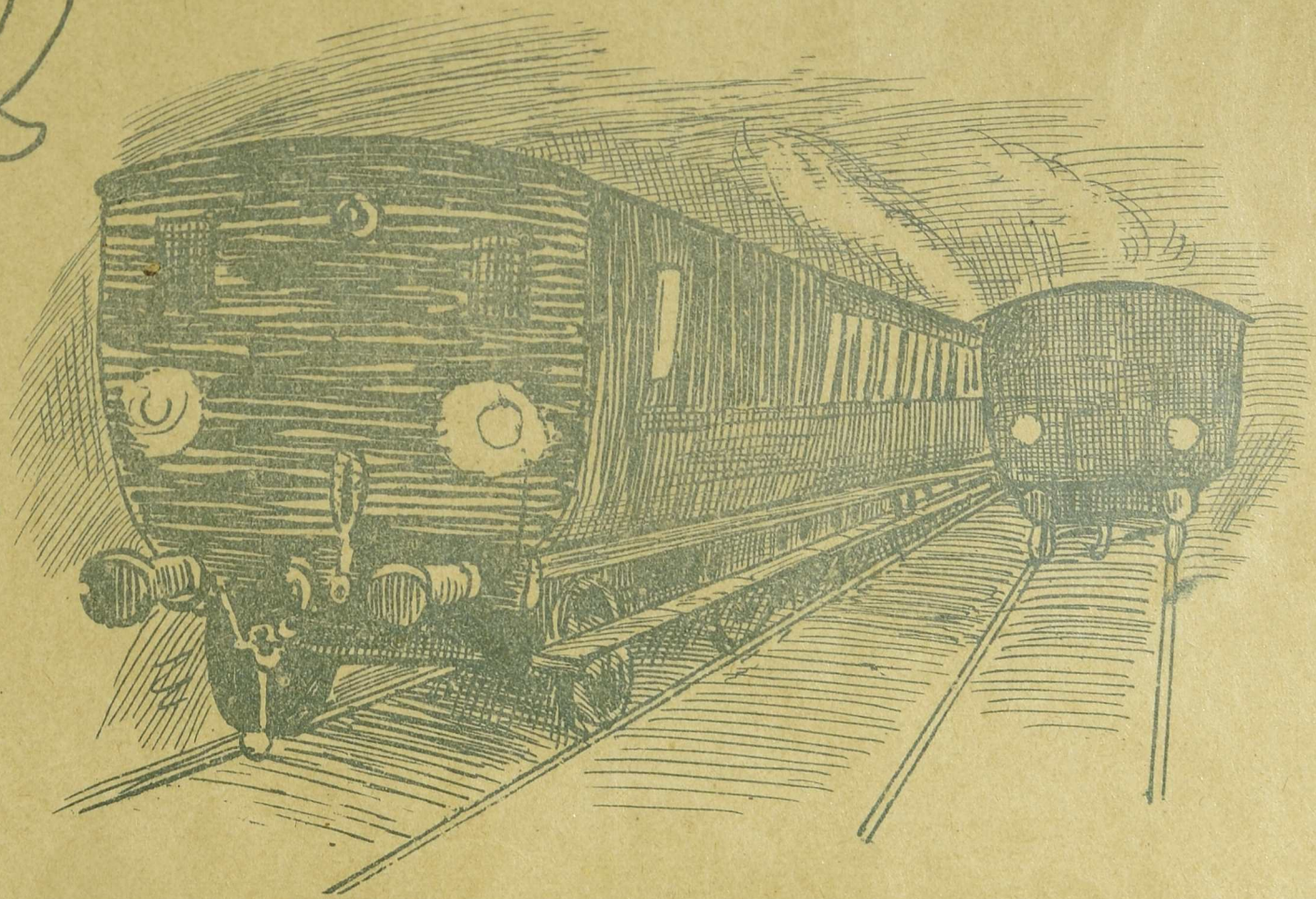
P stands for Platform where now

not to be late.



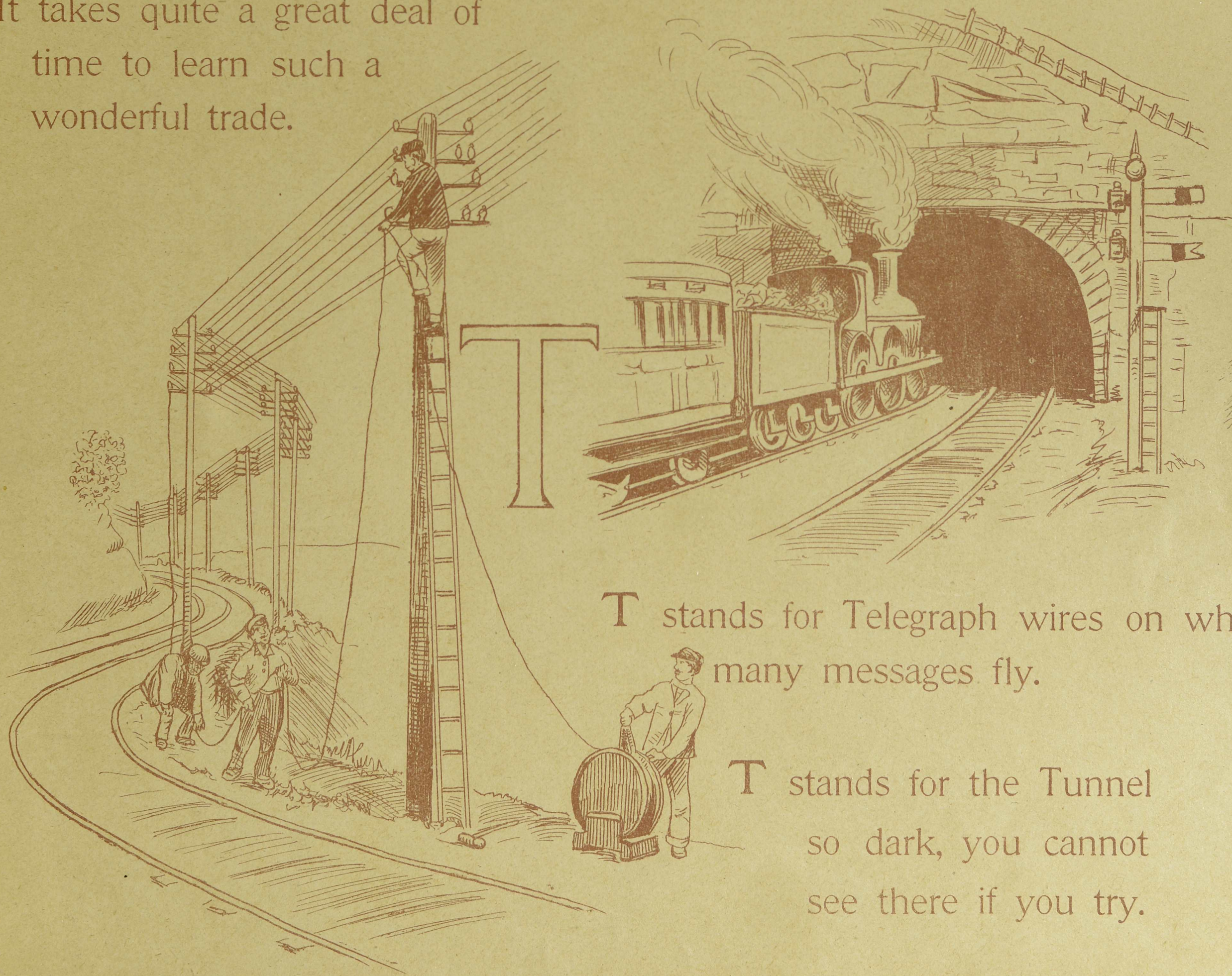




S stands for the very large Shop

wonderful trade.

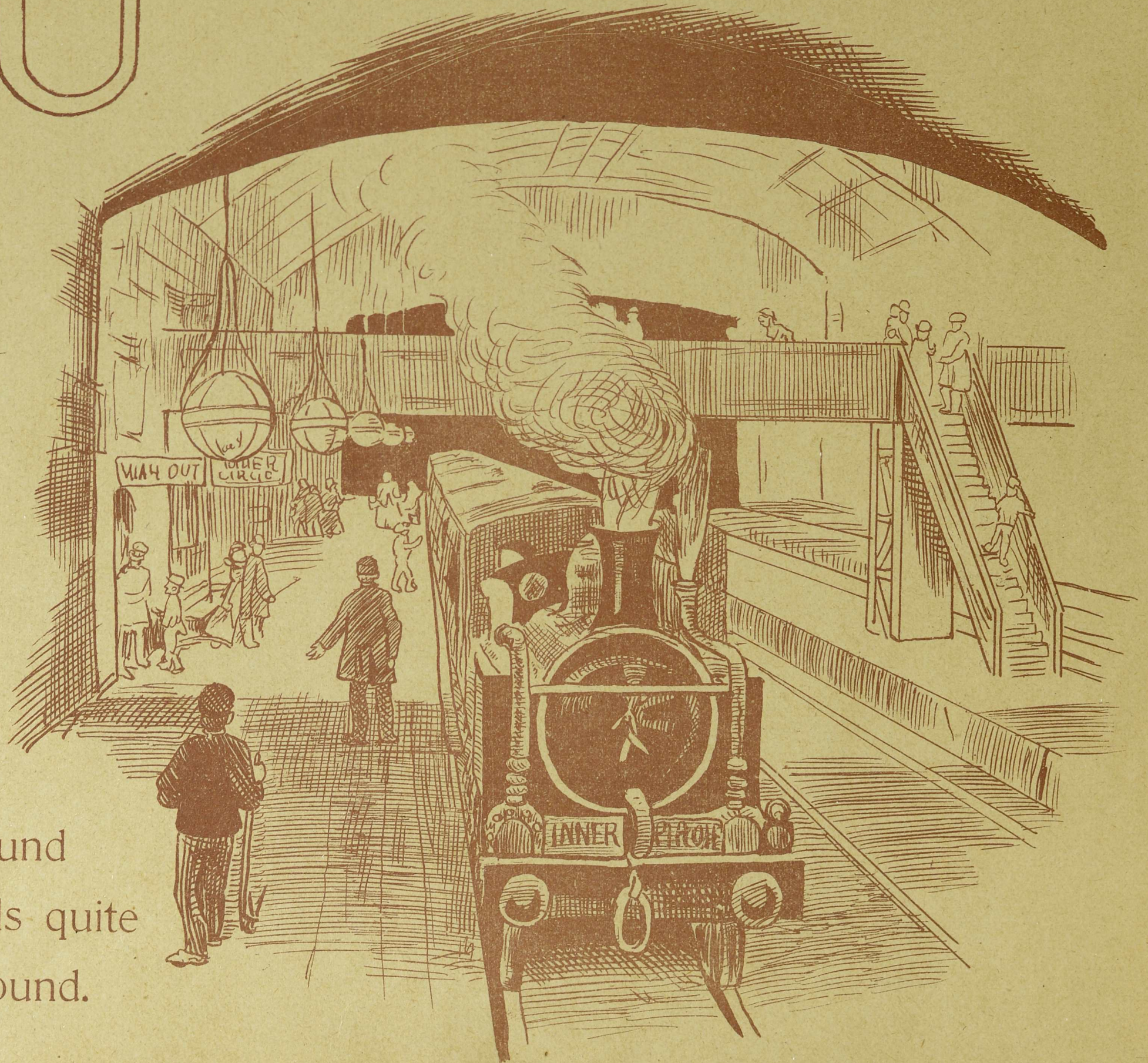
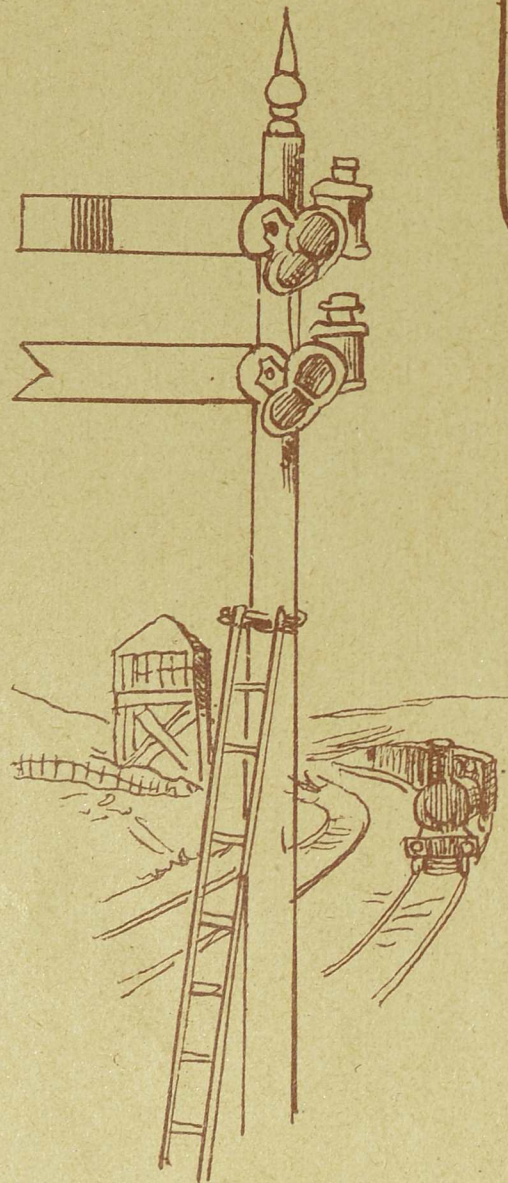


T stands for Telegraph wires on which

see there if you try.



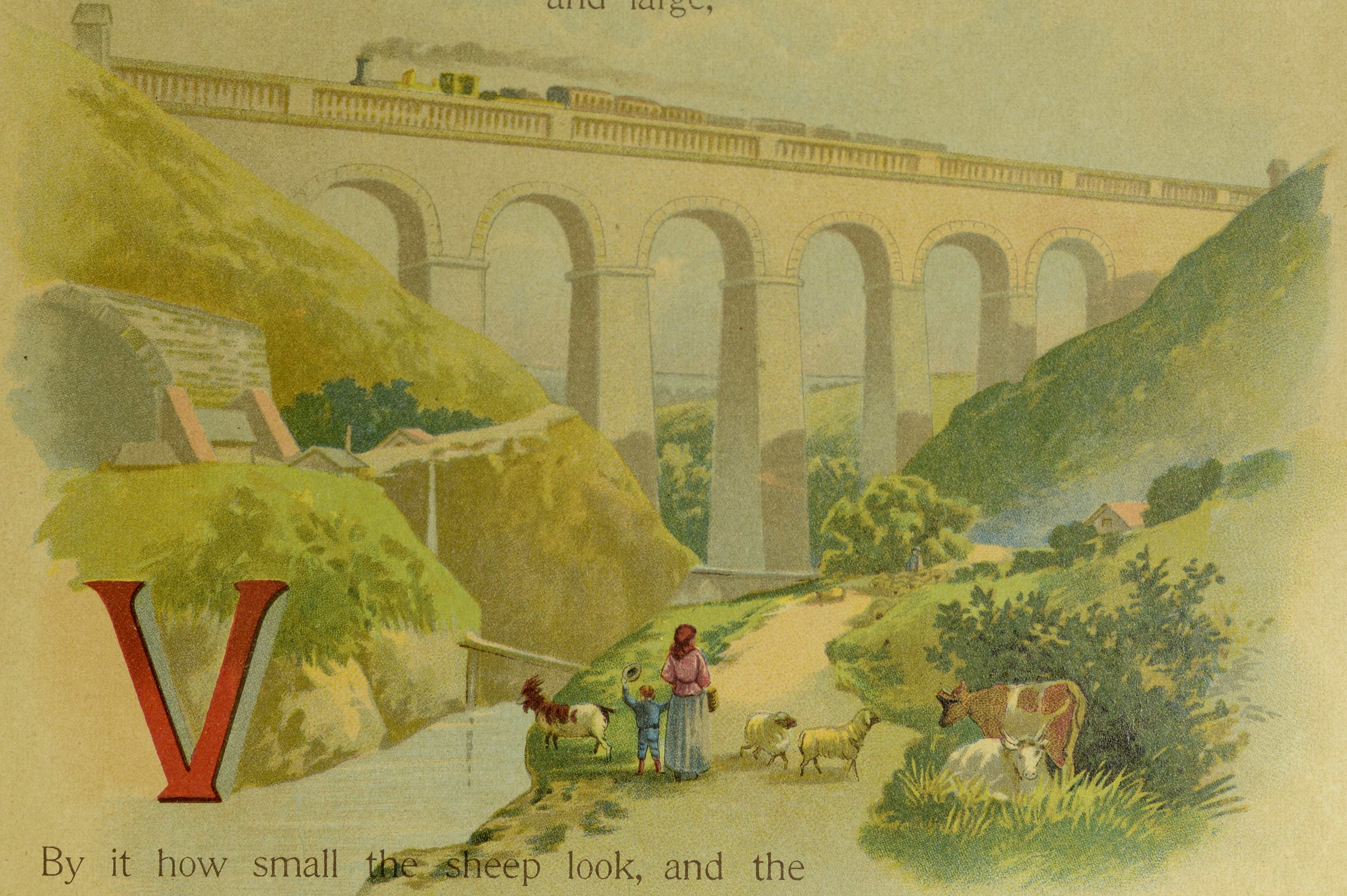
U stands for the Up train which waits,

and large,



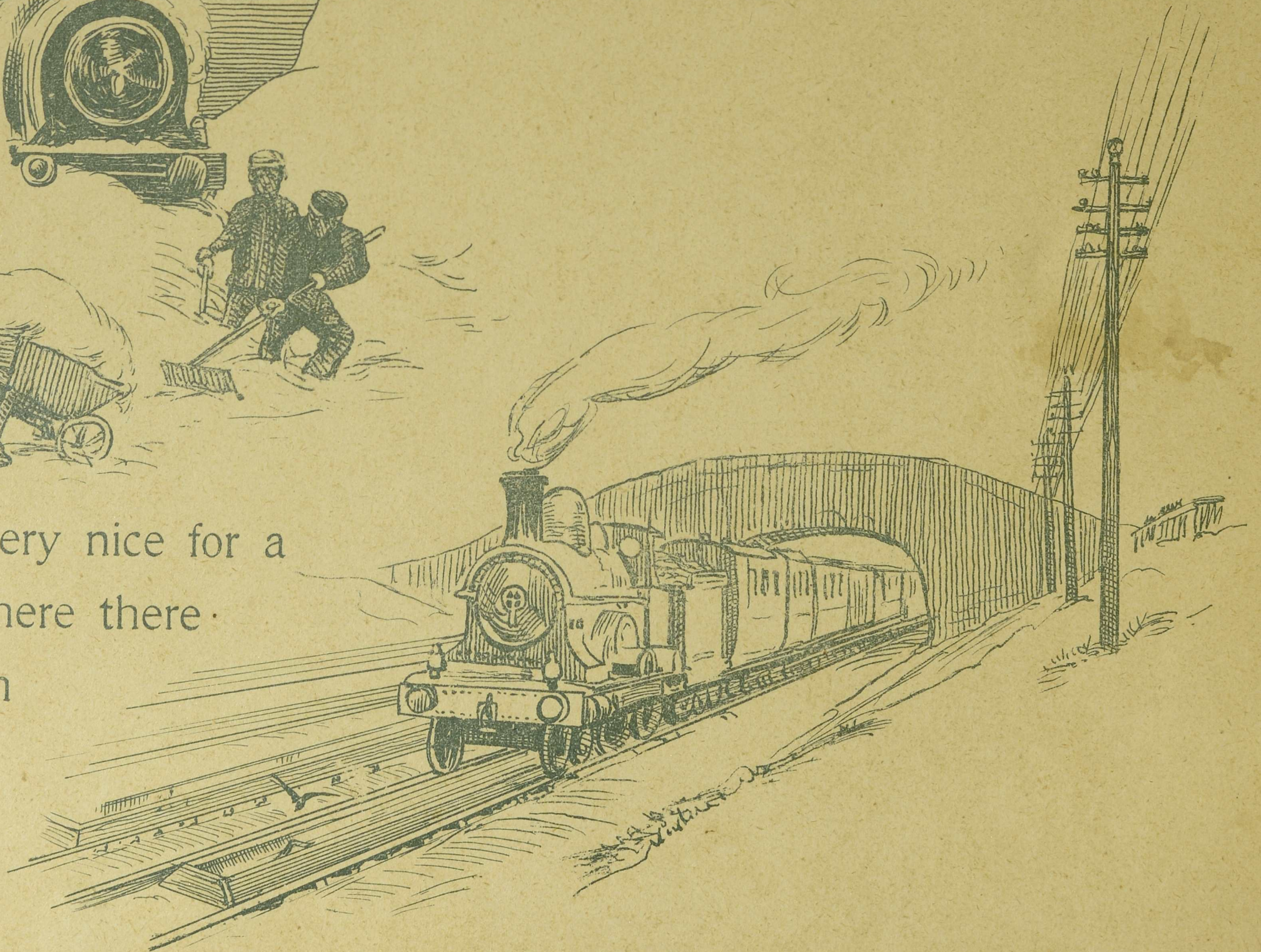

and eager to start.

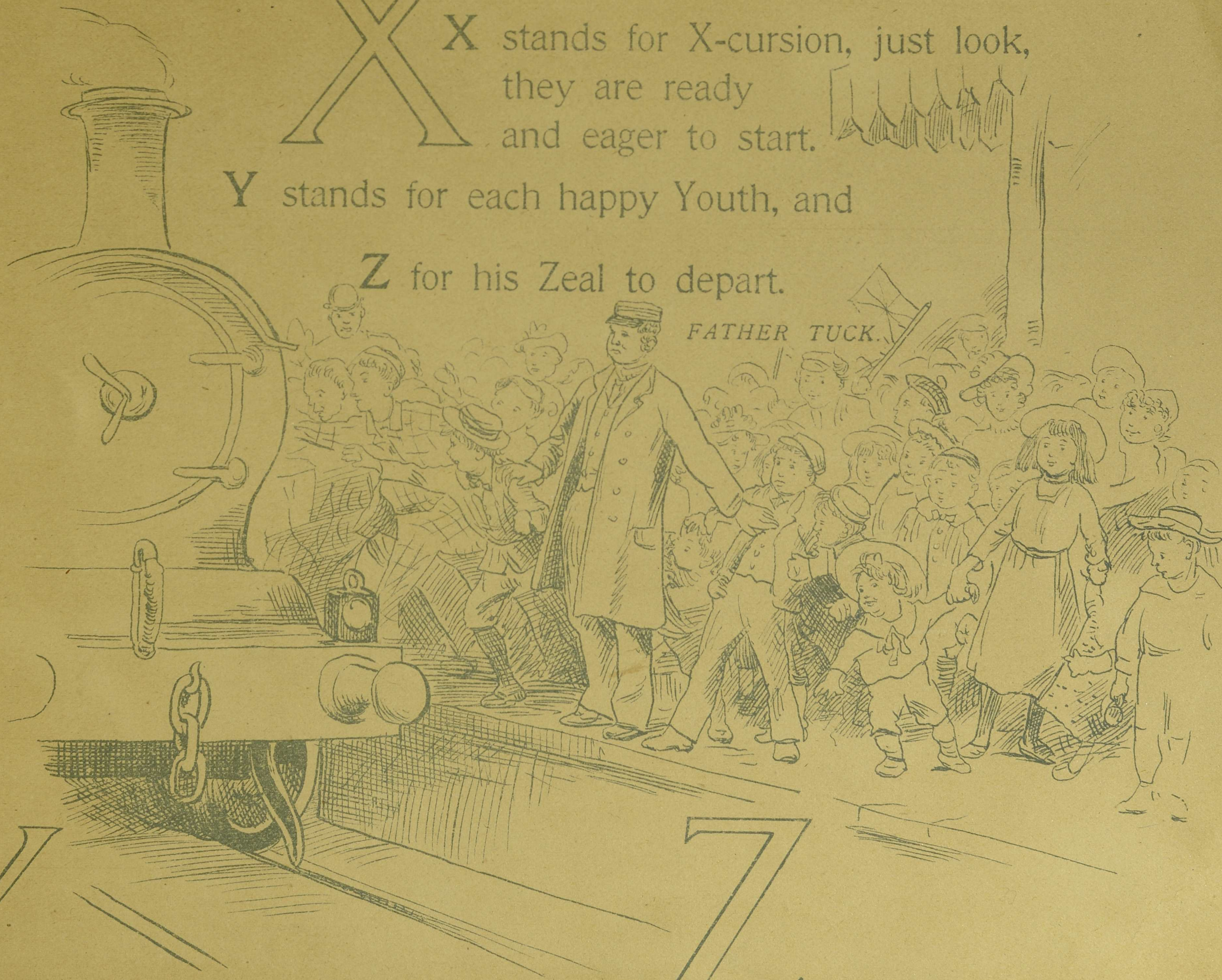
