"I have received from His Majesty's Solicitor General a copy of the bill passed by the Council of the Governor in the name of the Governor and reserved by you for His Majesty's pleasure thereon for the better securing the Council of this Province."

"In that report, it is stated that the bill appears very materially to increase the power vested in the Imperial Parliament of the Her Majesty's reign, chap. 10, and that the appointment of the members of the Council."
