REPORT.

The Committee of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute hving fulfilled their term of office, in accordance with the asage customary on similar occasions, beg leave to present a statement of their labours.

As in general history, times of peace supply but little material for the historian's pen, so is it with institutions established for the promotion of scientific and literary objects, while pursuing the even tenor of their way, but few incidents occur out of which their managers can prepare an exciting narrative. And while such has hitherto been the case with this Institute, yet the past year's proceedings cannot be viewed without exciting feelings of lively satisfaction, partaking so largely as they have done of successive triumphs and augmenting prosperity. If its advancement was slow and hardly perceptible for many years after its formation, may not its continuance to this day, and its ever growing usefulness be taken as an earnest of the permanent and large success that awaits it in the future. And if in its history, an intimate connection be discovered between well-directed pains-taking effort and manifest progress-let not the lesson thence deducible be lost upon any one of its numerous supporters !

The means by which your Committee have sought to contribute to the improvement and intellectual gratification of their fellow members and of the community generally, were such as have been employed in past years; but it is much to be regretted that circumstances beyond the control of your Committee rendered it impossible to open classes for the study of any branch of knowledge, or instruction in any of the arts which now command so general attention. Your Committee hope that this will cease to be a complaint when suitable accommodation is secured for prosecuting this important branch of the Institute's operations.

THE LIBRARY

Comprises 1,830 volumes—125 of which were added during the year. The members continue to manifest a laudable desire to obtain knowledge from this source, as many as 290 being regularly supplied with books for perusal at home.

It is with pleasure your Committee record the liberality of the Right Honorable the Earl of Ellesmere, who, during a bi visit made to Canada last summer, was pleased to te the sum of twelve pounds ten shillings for the the library. THE READING ROOM

Has now become the favorite resort of a large number, who but for it might find it impossible to gain access to the periodical literature of the day. So much has the room been frequented, that the accommodation provided has often been insufficient, causing no little inconvenience to many, which however has been patiently endured, in the pleasing anticipation that this difficulty will be unknown in the new premises.

The tables are well supplied with Newspapers, Magazines, and Reviews, of which 43 are regularly received. The following gratuitously, namely, the New York Albion, Hamilton Spectator, Port Hope Echo, and Toronto Christian Guardian— by Mr. J. E. Pell; the International Journal —by Mr. R. Lewis; the New York Albion—by Mr. J. J. Woodhouse; the Herald of Peace, and the Anti-Slavery Reporter—by Mr. Wickson; the Canadian Agriculturist, Upper Canada Jurist, Journal of Education, Kingston Commercial Herald (daily), Bradford Chronicle, Owen Sound Times, Old Countryman, Churchman, North American, Port Hope Guide, and Brampton Mercury—by their respective Proprietors.

THE LECTURES

Have been well sustained this Winter, by numerous and interested auditories; the subjects were varied, and the Institute is laid under weighty obligations to the several Gentlemen who so readily devoted their time and talents to the dissemination of information, at once popular and instructive.

THE NEW HALL.

Two years ago, the Annual Report then presented, contained the deliberate opinion and thorough conviction of the Committee, that the providing larger and more convenient accommodation for the Institute, could no longer be regarded as a matter of mere expediency, but one of urgent necessity. Last year the Committee then retiring, reported having taken a most important step towards realizing that object, namely, the securing of an eligible site. And now, your Committee, when making way for their successors, are happy to be able to report still further progress in this matter. A suitable design and details having been adopted, a Contract was entered into in the month of November last, for the erection of a new "uilling, of which the Institute will be sole proprietor, d which will furnish all the conveniences that the most anguine can reasonably anticipate as being required by he Institute for many years to come. The work is now in progress, and with becoming energy on the part of the Contractors, there is the prospect that before the end of the year, the building will be in such a state of forwardness as to allow of its being occupied by the Institute. The chief corner stone was laid on the seventeenth of April with Masonic honours-the members of the ancient Fraternity of Free Masons having most cordially undertaken, on the invitation of the Committee, to perform the ceremony. All the circumstances of the occasion tended to show that the public are not indifferent to the real value of the Institute. Of this fact, however, your Committee were well assured, through the large and liberal subscriptions which had been obtained to the Building Fund. To all who have assisted with their contributions the Institute is placed under lasting obligations; and your Committee trust that the future course and proceedings of the Institute will only prove more clearly that it is worthy of being supported liberally,---its prosperity contributing to, as it certainly indicates, the growing intelligence and taste of the community. Your Committee refrain from particularizing the many instances of liberality which have cheered and encouraged them, preferring to allow the List hereunto appended to disclose the facts, which are alike honourable to the contributors, creditable to the city, and gratifying to the Institute.

In a statement published in October, 1842, the Committee then judged that the sum of $\pounds 3,000$ would probably suffice for the erection of suitable premises, but further consideration convinced your Committee that a larger and more ornamental building than was at first contemplated, would better subserve the true interests of the Institute and meet the expectations of its friends. Acting on this idea, and also in consequence of the greatly advanced cost of building, the new hall will require over £8,000 to complete and finish it in all its parts. The sources from which your Committee expect to raise this sum, or rather so much of it as is required to meet the present contract, are subscriptions' which already amount to $\pounds 1920$; the interest of the Institute in the present premises; a loan from the Toronto University Authorities (from whom the ground was purchased) of £3,000 which now only awaits the sanct on of the Governor in Council to be at the disposal of the Institute, together with the proceeds of an undertaking in connection

with the opening of the hall the general outline of which will now be given.

A BAZAAR AND EXHIBITION.

It is proposed to hold on the occasion of removing to the new building, as a fitting inauguration of that auspicious event. At a quarterly meeting of the members held in the month of November, 1853, the suggestion was made and cordially approved of, and the Committee were empowered to proceed in the matter. A prospectus was drawn up some time ago, extracts from which shew you how it is proposed to be carried out.

"It is proposed to hold in the new hall on its being ready for occupation, a grand Exhibition and Bazaar, of the plan of which the following is an outline.

The Exhibition to be divided into Four Departments, viz :---

1st. Fine Arts, including Paintings in Oil and Water Colours, Drawings, Engravings, Sculpture and Models.

2nd. Mechanics, in Metal and Wood

3rd. Manufactures.

4th. Ladies' Bazaar.

In each of these departments it is proposed to form a collection of articles for sale as well as for Exhibition, and the Committee hope that Exhibitors will, with those articles they may send for exhibition, include one or more as a donation to the Institute for sale, the proceeds to be acknowledged as a subscription to the building fund.

As such an undertaking will afford a favourable opportunity for Manufacturers and Importers to exhibit in the most advantageous manner their several articles of trade, as well as greatly promote the interests of the Institution, the Committee hope that a hearty interest will be taken in it by all classes of the community."

The precise time of holding this exhibition the Committee could not definitely fix, but they hope that the main building will be so far completed that it may be held in the large Music Hall soon after the 1st of October next.

Your Committee anticipate large results from the united exertions of all who in this way will have it in their power to present an exposition of the state of the Arts and Manufactures amongst us and at the same time contribute much to the material prosperity of the Institute.

Last year Canada was honoured with a visit from one of the most eminent Engineers of the age-Robert Stephenson, Esq., M. P., whose fame has reached all lands, and whose works bid fair to be known to an equal extent. During his brief stay in Toronto, your Committee waited upon him with an address expressive of their pleasure at having the opportunity of personally assuring him of their high admiration of his talent, and their satisfaction at the prospect of Canada possessing in one of its great public works, a monument of his skill. The interview was most agreeable and cordial. Mr. Stephenson spoke of the evidences of progress he was delighted to observe as he travelled through the country; in no part of which were they more noticeable than in our own city. He was ever happy to meet with the managers of a Mechanics' Institute, and to mark his estimation of the value of the labours in which we are engaged, and as a memento of his desire to aid the Toronto Institute, he was pleased to ask our acceptance of a copy of an important work on a particular branch of engineering, which was then being prepared by a gentleman with whom he was associated in England, and which it would be his care to have forwarded immediately upon its publication.

The Treasurer's Account herewith submitted shows the finances of the Institute to be in a most satisfactory state, the receipts exceeding those of the previous year by £63 2s. $1\frac{1}{2}$ d., leaving a balance in hand—after defraying the current expenses, and placing the sum of £50, to the credit of the Building Fund—of £19 12s. 6d.

The Committee feel that everything connected with the Institute conspires to draw forth in its behalf an increased amount of exertion, and still more liberal support on the part of its friends. Its history has been cheering, its present state is prosperous, and its prospects are most encouraging. It must not be forgotten, however, that the achievements of the past have only been attained by continuous unremitting labours, and that if the anticipations of the future are to be realized, redoubled efforts are absolutely required. Indeed, nothing that is worthy of the pursuit of man can be accomplished without corresponding toil. Knowing then, this condition of success, let their be the vigorous employment of every power that may be brought into our service, and difficulties will be overcome, the influence and usefulness of the Institute will be largely extended, and succeeding generations will gratefully remember those who reared the Institution upon a broad and deep foundation that it benefits may be enduring.



R E P O R T.

The Committee of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, at the close of another year, beg to present a report of their proceedings during that period.

In 1823, the first Mechanics' Institute was established in Great As these Institutions gradually increased, many pre-Britain. dicted that they were destined to decline and die. After an experience of more than 30 years, however, we find, that in proportion as education has advanced, they have become more prosperous; their permanence more firmly secured; and that in the present day, they rank with the great modern agencies, calculated to foster and extend education. Mechanics' Institutes were established with a view to afford means for the attainment of scientific knowledge by the artisan classes, and thereby to promote mechanical inventions; to open up a path for the development of natural ability; and to improve generally the intellectual culture of society. It was justly conceived, that, aided by education, many advantages would result to the community, from "adding to dexterity of hand and ingenuity of head, a knowledge of the scientific principles which are the foundation of every mechanical art."

The improvements and inventions, which are frequently presented for our inspection and admiration, bear pleasing testimony to the utility of these and kindred institutions and lead to the opinion, that the most sanguine hopes entertained of their success, will be realized at no very distant day.

It is a matter of much gratification to your Committee to be able to record the evidences of another successful year in the history of the Institute; successful, at least so far as receiving large accessions to its membership; and a growing disposition to embrace the advantages for mental improvement which it affords.

The increase of members since the last Annual Meeting, cannot fail to be satisfactory, in a high degree, to the friends and supporters of the Institute.

Your Committee have much pleasure in acknowledging the kindness of Robert Stephenson, Esq., M.P., England, in presenting to the Institute, a copy of a valuable work on the Britannia and Conway Tubular Bridges, with plates; of the American Institute, New York City, for 8 volumes of the Transactions of that Society, to last year; of Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Chief Superintendent of Education, for Reports of Normal, Model, and Common Schools, for 1852-3; of the Board of Registration and Statistics, for their First Report; of the Hon. W. B. Robinson, M.P.P., W. L. Mackenzie, Esq., M. P.P., W. Patrick, Esq., M.P.P., E. Larwill, Esq., M.P.P., and J. Hartman, Esq., M.P.P., for sundry Parliamentary papers.

THE READING ROOM

Is supplied with 50 Reviews, Magazines, and Newspapers, selected from those published in Great Britain, the United States, and Canada.

The large number who attend to read the periodical literature and news of the day, is the best proof of the appreciation of this particular branch of the Institute.

It was expected that the New Hall would have been occupied by the Institute before the present time; but the sum required to finish it being much larger than was anticipated, your Committee were obliged to suspend the works until the necessary funds could be raised. An appeal has recently been made to the members, and the public generally, for additional aid, to finish, at least, as many rooms in the building as may be necessary for the accommodation of the Institute, and serve as offices for rental; the proceeds of the latter to be applied to the payment of interest on the present loan. The appeal has been partially successful; many of the members and citizens, already called upon, having subscribed liberally; and it is the opinion of your committee that when the canvass of the city shall have been made, a sufficient sum will be realized to complete those parts of the building referred to.

In October last, Lord Elgin-late Governor General of Canada-paid a farewell visit to this city previous to his departure for England. During his stay, your Committee took the opportunity of waiting upon his Excellency with an address, acknowledging the support which, during the term of his Excellency's administration, had been generally extended to this Institution, of which he was the patron-referring also to the establishment of a successful and enlightened system of education in the Province, and his Excellency's active sympathy and aid to societies specially calculated to elevate and strengthen mechanical and agricultural industry among us. In replying to the address, his Excellency remarked, that he had "always considered it an imperative duty, whilst engaged in the administration of the affairs of this Province, to promote, to the best of his ability, the education of the people; and had always desired to render especial assistance to Mechanics' Institutes, because they practically illustrated the principle of self-improvement."

Your Committee have to record the removal, by death, during the year, of two members of long standing, the late Mr. William Atkinson, and Mr. Francis Thomas. They were among the early members of the Institute, and continued their connection with it up to the time of their death. For many years they served as members of the General Committee, and from the commencement took a warm interest in its affairs, and, by advice and assistance, did much to affect its permanent interests.

The Finances of the Institute for the past year, as shewn by the Treasurer's Account, exhibit an increase over the previous year of $\pounds 51\ 17s.\ 2\frac{1}{2}d$, leaving a balance in hand, after paying current expenses and appropriating $\pounds 50$ to building purposes, of $\pounds 22\ 18s.\ 2d.$

For details of General Account and Building Fund, see Statements submitted herewith.

It is the opinion of your Committee, that an advance on the present rates of annual subscriptions is very desirable; and that the members need only to be reminded of the increased cost of lighting and heating, and the other necessary requirements of the Institute, to obtain their hearty concurrence to the proposition. The scale proposed is as follows:—For ordinary members, ten shillings per annum, instead of seven shillings and sixpence; and for junior members, six shillings and threepence, instead of five shillings; and to abolish the entrance fees altogether. It may be observed, that, whilst the sum to each will appear comparatively trifling, it will in the aggregate be of considerable importance to the Institute.

Your Committee respectfully suggest, that the duties connected with, as well as the importance and usefulness of, the Institute, which, for years past, have been steadily increasing, have now arrived at a point to require the entire services of an officer who shall act in the capacity of Secretary and Librarian, and manage the affairs of the Institute, under the direction and control of the General Committee.

Your Committee refer, with pleasure, to the generous disposition manifested by the numerous friends of the Institute. When their sympathies have been appealed to, and their aid required, they have shewn, in a substantial manner, their appreciation of an enterprise in every way worthy of countenance and support. The progress which has been made during the past twelve months when viewed in connection with the gradual but steady growth of former years, affords a pleasing indication of a bright and promising future for our Institute.

SPECIAL MEETING.

A Special Meeting of the members of the Institute, was held on Saturday evening, May 19th, 1855; the President, G. W. Allan, Esq., in the Chair.

The President stated the object of the meeting, viz., to take into consideration a proposition made by the Provincial Government, to lease the new Hall of the Institute for four years, as Offices for Public Departments.

A memorandum,—forming the basis of agreement,—drawn up by Hon. H. H. Killaly, and approved of by the General Committee of the Institute, was then read by the Secretary, as follows:

"In the event of the new Mechanics' Institute Hall being placed at the disposal of Government, during the time of its being carried on in Toronto (say for four years), the following is understood to be the basis of the arrangement to be entered into between the parties, viz.: The Government to be at liberty to divide and partition the interior to suit the wants of the several departments to be accommodated in it; but, on, or prior to, its being handed up to the Institute, the building is to be completed and left in the state in which it was intended it was to have been for the purposes of the Institute; that the Government shall pay the interest on the debt $(\pounds 4,600)$ while they occupy the building; shall discharge the present liabilities of the building, or otherwise arrange with the respective parties for the same; they shall also keep the building insured,—during the time of its being occupied for public purposes,—for the sum of $\pounds 6,000$; and shall pay to the Institute the sum of £100 a-year, to cover the rent, &c., of the temporary accommodation of the Institute during the time the Hall is occupied."

Several members having addressed the meeting in favour of the arrangement, it was


Moved by Mr. J. Duggan, seconded by Mr. T. Sellar, and unanimously

Resolved. "That this meeting,—taking into consideration the liberal offer made by the Provincial Government, through the Hon. Mr. Killaly, for the use of the new Mechanics' Institute Building, during the period of four years,—recommend that the said offer be accepted, on the conditions mentioned in the memorandum of agreement drawn up by Mr. Killaly, which memorandum was approved of by the General Committee, at a meeting held on Friday, the 18th instant; and that the President and Committee take immediate steps to conclude the same."

The meeting then adjourned.

REPORT.

The Committee of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, in submitting a Report of the Society's operations during the past year, would congratulate the members on its satisfactory condition and encouraging prospects.

It is perhaps, unnecessary at this time, to say anything in commendation, or praise, of Mechanics' Institutes; they are sufficiently established in public favor, and have taken their place among the noble institutions of the present day, having for their object the diffusion of useful and scientific knowledge among a numerous class of persons, who, but for the facilities such institutions afford, would be prevented from obtaining many valuable advantages which they hold out; their claims, therefore, cannot be too strongly urged, especially upon the younger portion of our population.

It is cause of much satisfaction, that hitherto, the history of our Institute has been one of progress and increasing usefulness.

It cannot, indeed be denied that large numbers of that class for whose benefit it was more especially designed, still hold themselves aloof from it, declining to share in its advantages, or to assist in promoting its interests; yet its continued advancement, if not so rapid as might be desired, is highly encouraging to its warmest supporters.

Your Committee would notice the fact of the unusually large number of members who have left the City during the past year; being more than twice the number struck off the roll from the same cause in the previous year. Owing to this the net increase is not so large as would have been gained under ordinary circumstances. Your Committee would further remark, under this head, that if the members generally would use a little exertion to induce their friends to join the Institute, they could materially add to its numbers and influence.

THE LIBRARY

Has, during the past year, received large augmentations. Through the liberality of the members and friends of the Institute, your Committee have been enabled to expend the sum of £222 in the purchase of new works. The balance of this special subscription, amounting probably to £75, when the remainder shall have been collected, will be available for the same object next year. From financial causes, the Library, previously to last year, had not received that attention to its requirements which was necessary to its efficiency; but it is to be hoped that, in future, each year will witness an adequate expenditure in this department.

The Library now comprises 3,109 volumes, 1,158 of which have been added since the last annual meeting. The number of members now regularly supplied with books, is very nearly 500. From the fact, that the number of volumes issued, amounted to 9286, during the year just closed, may be inferred the extent to which the advantages of the Library are made use of by subscribers.

In order to accommodate members living at a distance, or who, from other causes, would prefer changing books in the daytime, the Library is now regularly open every afternoon from two to five o'clock.

The above facts are, in the opinion of your Committee, peculiarly gratifying, convinced as they are that the Library is the most important department of the Institute, as it regards the benefits imparted; and that, the more attention there is paid to its condition and improvement, the more numerous will be the accessions to the membership of the society.

Your Committee acknowledge, with pleasure, the following donations; from Mr. James Bain, copies of the Municipal and and Educational Manuals for U. C.; from Mr. B. Huson, U. S. Census Report for 1850; from Mr. A. McCallum, a copy of his Chart of Natural History; from Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Report of Schools in U. C. for 1854; from R. A. Harrison, Esq., copies of Trade and Navigation Reports of the Province for 1854; from Hon. W. B. Robinson, M. P. P., and W. L. Mackenzie, M. P. P., Parliamentary Reports.

THE READING ROOM.

This branch of the Institute receives increased attention from the members; and it is exceedingly gratifying to witness the large number of young men who avail themselves of the opportunities of information, which the valuable amount of interesting matter laid on its tables affords. The opening of the Room in the afternoon, with the Library, has been found to give general satisfaction.

LECIURES.

Your Committee experienced considerable difficulty in pro curing a course of Lectures for last season; they, however, ultimately succeeded in securing the services of several talentec gentlemen, who during the winter, generously supplied useful and interesting information, on various subjects to the mem bers of the Institute. To those gentlemen the thanks of the Institute are specially due, for their disinterested and valuable assistance.

The utility of lectures, in general, your Committee firmly believe, is very great, inasmuch as, independent of the direct instruction they afford, they create a spirit of inquiry, and a thirst for knowledge in the minds of those who attend them which are of the greatest assistance to them in the task of self improvement. At the same time your Committee are of opinion, that in addition to occasional lectures on general subects, it would be very desirable to obtain a course of teaching lectures on one or more subjects during each winter, that is, lectures in which a connected system of instruction would be pursued, enabling the hearers, or rather pupils, to acquaint themselves with the details of a science, as well as its general principles. Your Committee regret that they cannot report the formation of any classes during the past year; the reason, and it is one of long standing, being the want of proper accommodation in the present building. They recommend, however, that means should be taken, before next winter, to procure the necessary accommodation and teachers, so that this justlyvalued department of instruction may be efficiently organized and conducted.

It will be recollected that, at the last Annual Meeting, the Retiring Committee reported that an effort was at that time being made to procure additional subscriptions from the members, and the citizens generally, to enable the Institute to finish and occupy a part, at least, of the New Hall; and that they had reason to hope the appeal would not be unsuccessful. In a few days afterwards, however, the Provincial Government, through the Hon. Mr. Killaly, offered to lease the building for four years, for public offices, on terms favorable to the Institute. Your Committee, after a consideration of the existing and prospective difficulties which opposed the completion of their heavy undertaking, decided to accept the offer of the Government, which decision was subsequently sanctioned by the Members at a Special Meeting called for the purpose. Βv the terms of the arrangement, the Government undertook to discharge the Institute's liabilities to the contractors and other parties, amounting to £1,320,-to finish the Hall at the expiration of the lease, according to the original plans, reserving the right of making certain temporary alterations, in the meantime, to suit their own purposes-to keep the building insured, during the time, for £6,000,—and to give the Institute a yearly rent of ± 376 , to enable it to pay the interest on the Building Loan, and for accommodation in its present premises. Your Committee, while regretting the necessity of the Society being obliged to defer its occupation of the New Hall for so long a period, feel that, under the circumstances, the above arrangement was highly advantageous to the Institute, in relieving it, in a great measure, from responsibilities, the extent of which, would necessarily have cramped its energies for some time to come.

An application to the City Council, to allow the Institute to remain in the present building, during the occupation of the New Hall, by Government, was granted,—the rent being fixed at $\pounds 60$ per annum.

On the arrival of His Excellency the Governor General, Sir E. W. Head, to take up his residence in Toronto, your Committee presented an address to him on behalf of the Institute; to which His Excellency replied "that the address gave him great pleasure, convinced as he was that Mechanics' Institutes were of the highest utility; and that he would always be ready to do his utmost to promote their prosperity."

By the Treasurer's statement, it will be seen that the Finances

of the Institute are in a satisfactory condition. The receipts for the past year amounted to £955 13s. $9\frac{1}{2}d.$,—the Expenditure to £936 4s. 1d.,—leaving a balance in hand of £19 9s. $8\frac{1}{2}d.$ The details will be found appended to the Report. A statement of the Receipts and Expenditure connected with the Building Fund, from last May to the closing of the account in September, is also submitted herewith.

Your Committee have now taken up the different matters which, in their judgment, required notice; and while, in doing so, they have found cause of satisfaction for the past, and encouragement for the future, they do not hesitate to say that much yet remains to be done to render our Institute as powerful for good as it might be. Let every member reflect that he can, by his influence and example, contribute in some degree, to its success and efficiency; and so reflecting, make use of all the means and opportunities afforded him towards the accomplishment of so desirable an object. Then will this Institute be enabled more widely to extend the peculiar benefits it was de signed to confer, and gain, in an increased degree, the confidence and support of all classes of the community.

# MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.

The Annual Meeting of Members was held on Monday Evening, the 4th May, in the Society's Hall, the President, E. F. Whittemore, Esq., in the Chair.

Notwithstanding the unfavourable state of the weather, the attendance of members was much larger than at any former Annual Meeting.

The Report of the Society's operations during the past year was read by the Secretary; whereupon it was

*Resolved*, That the Report now read be adopted, and printed for circulation among the members.

A vote of thanks to the Scrutineers was then passed, and the meeting adjourned.

# REPORT.

In resigning to the members of the Institute the trust reposed in them at the last annual meeting, your Committee beg to submit the following Report of their proceedings during the past year:

Amongst the numerous modern agencies, calculated to direct and develope the moral and intellectual energies of the industrial classes of society, Mechanics' Institutes hold a proud and prominent position. Indeed, it is difficult to form a proper estimate of their genial influences, and it is perhaps the misfortune of these useful institutions that their beneficial results are not placed more prominently before the public eye. Individuals must be improved by their connection with these institutions, for no one can read such books as their libraries contain, or listen to the public lectures, or peruse the choice periodical works of the day, or avail themselves of the many other advantages they offer, without increasing their store of knowledge.

As the cause of education advances and gains new friends every day, it is impossible that such institutions will not make progress with it. While our city is rapidly increasing in population and material prosperity, and new societies of an educational, literary, and scientific character are springing into existence, it is most gratifying to your Committee to be able to report that the past year has been one of unprecedented success to the Institute.

As respects the growth of the Institute, a most favora-

ble result is shewn, by comparing the year 1846—the year after the building now occupied was erected—with the present year; a period of eleven years.

It will be seen by this statement, that while the population of the City has more than doubled, the number of members in the Institute has increased more than six times, and the books in the Library over four times.

Taking the number of members as a fair criterion of the position of the Society, the foregoing returns exhibit undoubted evidences of advancement.

### THE LIBRARY.

Being convinced of the paramount importance of the Library as the medium of conferring the largest amount of benefit, and accomplishing the great objects of the Institute, your Committee have given special attention to its requirements.

During the past year, 541 volumes, many of them valuable standard works, have been added to the Library, which now contains 3,650 volumes. The number of members who avail themselves of this department is 625, being an increase of 125 during the year,—and the number of volumes issued amounted to 13,736, being 4,450 more than were issued during the previous year. The remarkable advance in the number of books read, is no doubt in part attributable to the extensive additions made during the last two years; the Library having been nearly doubled in extent during that period.

This early recognition by the members of the more extended advantages afforded, supplies a gratifying inducement for the future application of the same judicious system of extension, as far as is consistent with the financial position of the Society.

Your Committee desire to tender their acknowledgments to the donors, for the following gratuitous additions to the Library:—To Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Chief Superintendent of Education, for "Report of Schools in Canada," for 1855; to Provincial Board of Agriculture, for the 1st volume of its transactions; to the Legislative Assembly, for "Canada at the Universal Exhibition of 1855;" to G. P. Ure, Esq., for "Prize Essay of Anti-Liquor Alliance;" to Thomas Hodgins, Esq., for the "Canada Educational Directory;" to Mr. J. Rordans, for the "Law Directory;" to Mr. E. Wiman, for bound copy of "Canadian Agriculturist," for 1856; to Mr. V. Parkes, for "Tredgold on Stationary Engines," 1 vol.

### THE READING ROOM.

In this department also, your Committee have pleasure in announcing a largely increased patronage. The number of members who availed themselves of its advantages increased to such an extent, that inconvenience sometimes arose from the crowded state of the room. To remedy this as much as the contracted building now occupied would admit, the room has been enlarged, and the hours during which members can have access to it The room is now open daily from have been extended. 10 a.m. to 10 p.m., and is supplied with about sixty periodicals and newspapers, including the standard British Reviews; the principal Scientific, Commercial, and other Magazines and Journals; some of the leading newspapers of Great Britain and the United States; and a fair selection from the newspaper literature of Canada.

The Institute is indebted for the following gratuitous contributions to the Reading Room,—to Mr. J. E. Pell, for the New York Albion, Hamilton Spectator, Toronto Christian Guardian, and Echo, and the Evangelical Witness, London, C. W.; to Mr. John Harrington for the Streetsville Review; to Mr. M. Sweetnam, for the Albany Prohibitionist; to Mr. J. Wickson, for the Herald of Peace, and Anti-Slavery Reporter; to Mr. H. W. Jackson, for the Alliance Weekly News (Temperance), and to their respective proprietors, for the U. C. Jurist, U. C. Journal of Education, Canadian Journal, Canadian Agriculturist, Toronto Daily Leader, Toronto Times, Canadian Independent, Montreal Transcript, Kingston Herald, Barrie Advance, Brantford Courier, Bradford Chronicle, Port Hope Guide, Windsor Herald, Owen Sound Times, Thorold Gazette, Stratford Beacon, Stratford Examiner, Brampton Weekly Times, Collingwood Enterprise, Guelph Herald, and Markham Economist.

## THE LECTURES.

In pursuance of the opinion recorded in the last Report, and adopted by the members at the annual meeting, viz.: that the time had arrived when a change in the system of giving isolated lectures was desirable, the serious attention of your Committee was early directed to this subject, with a view to the organization of connected courses of lectures on subjects of interest and practical importance. It affords your Committee no small degree of pleasure to be able to state, that the inauguration of the new system has been attended with complete success.

Being favoured as the seat of several great educational establishments, Toronto is fortunate in possessing within itself men whose lives have been devoted to philosophical studies and scientific research; and among these your Committee were happy in securing the services of four gentlemen of acknowledged eloquence, learning, and ability, to deliver the lectures of the past season, which were as follows :---

Four Lectures on "The Primitive Sources of Histori-B cal Truth," by Dr. Daniel Wilson, University College.

Four on Chemistry, by Professor Croft, University College.

Two on Chemistry, and two on "The Mineral Wealth of Canada," by Professor Hind, Trinity College:

And four on "Natural Philosophy," by the Reverend William Ormiston, Provincial Normal School.

Confident that such a course would attract larger numbers than their present building could accommodate, the St. Lawrence Hall—the most spacious room in the city at present—was engaged for the lectures, and was generally well filled with attentive audiences.

Notwithstanding the doubts entertained by many sincere friends of the Institute, the lectures, in a financial point of view, may be considered satisfactory. In past years the printing, lighting, heating and other expenses, formed a considerable item in the general expenditure; and in view of the increased outlay attending their delivery in the St. Lawrence Hall, and the remuneration to the lecturers, your Committee appropriated the sum of forty pounds, from the general funds, to aid in carrying out the new arrangement. They are, however, glad to be able to state, that the lectures were in every respect self-sustaining, and that instead of the appropriation being required, a small balance remained in favour of the Institute, after payment of all expenses. With the experience now acquired, your Committee have no doubt that in future greater advantages in this respect may be anticipated.

Being without the requisite accommodation in the present building for the efficient organization of classes, the attention of your Committee in this department was confined to the adoption of an arrangement with Mr. E. Nugent, by which members of the Institute were admitted to his classes in mechanical drawing, practical mathematics, &c., at half his usual charge. Your Committee have been informed that the progress of the pupils under Mr. Nugent's superintendence has been marked and satisfactory.

The accompanying statement of the receipts and expenditure of the Institute for the past year contains sufficient evidence that its finances are in a sound and promising condition. The receipts from all sources amounted to £843 15s. 2d., and the expenditure to £814 18s.  $4\frac{1}{2}$ d., the balance in the hands of the Treasurer being £28 16s.  $9\frac{1}{2}$ d.

It is with sincere regret that your Committee announce that the Treasurer of the Institute, John Harrington, Esq., has signified his intention not to resume the duties of the office which he has so ably filled for the last eleven years. The disinterested and valuable services he has rendered the Institute during that time, merit the warmest acknowledgments of his fellow members.

Your Committee regret to have to record the loss, by death, of one of the earliest friends of the Institute, the late John Ewart, Esq., who, in the early period of its existence, took an active part in advancing its interests, and during more than one term occupied the Presidential Chair.

That the prosperity which has marked the progress of the Institute during the past few years, will be sustained and accelerated, your Committee have every reason to hope and believe. Taking into account the comparatively small proportion which the number of members bears to those of the population who might beneficially avail themselves of the advantages the Institute supplies, it is evident there is still great room for further advancement; and your Committee fondly indulge the expectation that when the time arrives that the members shall be called to occupy their commodious new Hall, the increased advantages and facilities, added to the greatly extended membership, will mark a new era in the history of this Institution, alike creditable to the Institute and the city.

## REPORT.

The General Committee of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, at the conclusion of their term of office, beg leave to submit the following report of proceedings during the past year :---

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

As might naturally be expected, the unexampled depression in trade during the last few months—from which the mercantile and manufacturing classes have especially suffered—has had the effect of preventing as large an increase of members as would have taken place in ordinary times. Notwithstanding this drawback, however, the nett increase in the membership during the year has been 57, which, under the circumstances, your Committee consider is very satisfactory, proving, as it does, the vitality and permanent influence of the Society.

#### THE LIBRARY.

This important branch of the Institute continues to supply a constantly increasing number of readers with works in the various departments of Science and Literature.

Your Committee have endeavoured as far as possible to keep the Library supplied with new works as they are published; and they hope that the time is not far distant, when the funds of the Society will enable its managers to carry out this system more completely.

The Library now contains 3,928 volumes; of which 278 have been added during the past year. 642 members now regularly receive books; and the number of volumes issued during the year amounted to 14,515, being an average of about 23 volumes to each reader.

 $\Lambda$  new and complete catalogue of the works in the Library is in course of preparation, and will shortly be issued.

#### THE READING-ROOM.

Several periodicals and newspapers have been added to last year's list, and the attendance at the Room is now larger than at any former period. During the past winter the Reading room has been of great advantage to many of the members, who, being out of employment, have resorted to it as a relief from the mental disquietude and gloom, which are ever the result of enforced idleness and want of occupation. The following publications are regularly supplied to the Institute free of charge, viz-

#### THE LECTURES.

For many years the managers of the Institute have felt it their duty to provide a Course of Lectures for delivery during the winter season. As referred to in the Report for last year, a change in the usual system was introduced with satisfactory results. Your Committee regret to report that their efforts in this direction were not so successful in the year now closed. The Course of Lectures just concluded, from the scanty attendance thereat, resulted in a pecuniary loss to the Institute, amounting to upwards of thirty-one pounds. Several causes combined to produce this result, the most prominent of which, no doubt, was the prevailing commercial distress, causing a general retrenchment in personal expenses, as far as practicable.

The Lectures delivered were as follows—viz., two on the "Language and literature of the Anglo-Saxons," by Dr. Daniel Wilson; two on "Optics," by Rev. E. K. Kendall; one on "British India," by A. G. A. Constable, Esq., two on "English Language and Literature," by T. J. Robertson, Esq., one on "Sound," by Professor Cherriman; one on "Astronomy," by Col. Baron de Rottenburg; and two on the "Hudson's Bay Territory," by Professor Hind.

At the invitation of your Committee, Dr. Charles Mackay visited Toronto, and delivered two lectures on "Poetry and Song." From the loss experienced in connection with the regular course of lectures, your Committee did not consider themselves justified in en gaging Dr. Mackay on his own terms, but offered to undertake all the arrangements, and hand him over the proceeds, after deducting expenses. The result was highly satisfactory; the accommodation in the St. Lawrence Hall being hardly sufficient for the numbers that attended on each occasion.

#### THE FINANCES.

From the Treasurer's Statement it will be seen that the receipts from all sources, for the past year, amounted to £858 5s. 2½d; the expenditure to £851 12s. 2d; leaving a balance in hand of £6 13s. 0½d. The liabilities, consisting of unpaid accounts, amount to £80 7s. 5d; the assets, being subscriptions and rents due, to £87 17s. 6d.

#### BOARD OF ARTS AND MANUFACTURES.

At the last session of the Legislature, an Act was passed establishing a Board of Arts and Manufactures for each section of the Province, in which Mechanics' Institutes are largely represented. Your Committee, although not anticipating any immediate benefit to the Institute, from association with the Board, yet at once took the necessary steps to entitle the Institute to representation therein, considering it to be their duty to join in any movement calculated to promote the manufacturing interests, and develope the industrial resources of the Province.

#### EXCURSION.

In compliance with a general desire your Committee made arrangements for an excursion to the Falls of Niagara, on the 3rd of September last, in connexion with the Institute. The result was gratifying; the weather and arrangements combining to make the trip agreeable and satisfactory. The proceeds, after payment of expenses amounted to  $\pounds 24$  3s. 5d.

#### CONCLUSION.

Although the Institute, in one or two instances has suffered from adverse influences during the past year, yet its general condition may safely be pronounced sound and satisfactory. It must be admitted that there are important branches of instruction, properly belonging to a Mechanics' Institute, complete in its organization and management, which our society has not fully carried out. The principal cause of this neglect is, as has often been stated, the want of proper accommodation in the present building. Your Committee. however, consider that it would not be advisable to leave the premises now occupied, for larger, until the society can take possession of its new Hall, the lease of which expires in October, 1859. At that time, it is the decided opinion of your Committee, an Exhibition and Bazaar, should be held on a scale commensurate with the high position now taken by this Institute and the extent of the commodious premises it will then enter upon. To do this well and efficiently. and with any hope of success, will require immediate attention ; and your Committee hope that their successors will take the matter up vigorously, as the time now intervening will be short enough, within which to make all necessary preparations. In the present state of affairs your Committee do not think they would have been justified in taking any step in this direction, but hoping and believing that this will only be temporary, they make the foregoing suggestion. But they cannot leave this matter without pressing upon members the necessity of individual effort, as without the aid of every member, the exertions of any Committee, no matter how efficient, must and will be ineffectual. Let not the members therefore neglect any means by which they can forward the interests of the Institute, either in this or any other branch of its operations. Much may be done, even with its present accommodation and resources, by increasing its roll of members, enlarging the Library, and in other respects, to render it an Institution worthy of being encouraged and sustained by an intelligent public.

Mr. Robert Ed-wards was so closely identified with the Insti-tution, and so sedulously devoted to its inter-ests, that his loss must be sensibly falt ests, that his loss must be sensibly felt.

"It is a melancholy pleasure to the commit-tee to recall the zeal and efficiency with which during several years, he discharged the duties of Recording Secretary and Acting Librarian; and his valuable services to the Institute, by the personal promotion of every plan which had been considered conducive to its interests, will always associate his name with those of its most practical well-wishers.

"Some time must elapse before even the most competent party can be expected so far to fall into his place, as to remove from the continual recollection and regret of the subscribers, the service thas unremittingly rendered by him."

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

THE MEMBERSHIP. The Committee reports a decrease of 27 in the membership of the Institute during the year. Withdrawals, removals and deaths amounting to 163, new members to 136, leav-ing a total number of members at date of Re-port of 781, classified as follows :--Honorary members, 23; life members, 90; ordinary mem-bers, 528; and junior members, 140. The Com-mittee accounts for the decrease in the member-ship, by the continued extraordinary depresship, by the continued extraordinary depres-sion in all departments of business, and antici-pate, with the return of a more healthy state of trade, a degree of prosperity for the Insti-

#### THE MBRARY.

THE TIBRARY. The Committee regrets that, owing to the large amount of subsciptions in arrears by the members, and the paynent of \$552 of arrears of interest due on loar to the Institute for the building of the new Hill, they have not been able to make any large addition to the Library during the year. The number of volumes at last Report was 3,928; by purchase during the year, 87 vols.; by donations, 24; bound up from reading room, 27; less worn out during the year, 31; making a total now in the libra-ry of 4,035 vols. ry of 4,035 vols.

The average number of members taking out books during the year was 556. An increased interest appears just now to be manifested in the library the library.

#### THE LECTURES.

The winter course of Lectures resulted in a loss to the Institute of 65, which is accounted for principally by the mallness of the Lecture Room, the number of lectures delivered in the city, and the busines difficulties weighing upon the minds of enost all classes of the community.

increased expenditure which must of necessity follow the removal to this large and commodious building; and also reminds the members, that, much as the affairs of the Institute required careful and judicious management in past years, much greater care, skill and judgment will be now required.

In reference to the offices of Secretary and Librarian of the Institute, the Report says:--"In managing the affairs of an Institution such as this, much, very much, depends upon the acti-vity, zeal and efficiency of the Secretary; and your Committee are convinced that the office of Secretary in this Institute ought to be a per-manent one; that in addition to the duties of Secretary, he should also discharge the duties of Librarian, and that a sufficient salary should be attached to the office to secure the services of a man of high standing and ability; and this, though apparently involving additional expense, your Committee are con-vinced would be good economy. Our act of incorporation, however, will not permit such a course being now adopted, but your Com-mittee feel that an amendment in the act should be secured, so as to allow the appoint-ment of a permanent Secretary and Librarian, if it should be thought necessary.' The Report also alludes to the reduction, \$200 In reference to the offices of Secretary and

The Report also alludes to the reduction, last year, of the Government grant from \$200 to \$140, and of the entire withdrawal of all aid to Mechanics' Institutes for this year, so that the institution will now have to depend entirely on its own resources.

In conclusion the Committee express the hope, -- "that each member will feel it to be his In conclusion the Committee express the hope, —" that each member will feel it to be his duty, as far as in him lies, to sustain an insti-tution which has been, and still, they trust, will be, of great benefit to all connected with it, and that an expressive prosperity may in the next year be commenced such as has not heretofore been equalled in its history; and which will place it, as they earnestly hope it will yet be placed, the first among the institutions of the kind in this country."



# REPORT.

The General Committee of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute beg to report, for the information of the members, a statement of their proceedings, and of the general affairs of the Institute, for the past year.

The first, and in some respects the most important feature to present, is

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

Your Committee regret that it should fall to their lot to have to report a considerable decrease in the membership during their term of office. The continued depression in the various branches of Commercial and Mechanical pursuits; the removal from Toronto of the seat of the Provincial Government; the unexpected delay in obtaining possession of the Society's new Hall; and other causes altogether beyond their controul, your committee believe, accounts for this result.

With returning prosperity to the industrial classes, and the occupation by the Institute of its new building, with its ample accommodation, there is little reason to doubt but that this ground of complaint will be removed, and the Institute enter upon a new career of usefulness such as it has not hitherto attained.

#### FINANCES.

The receipts for the year, as per finance statement hereto annexed, amounted to  $$2560 \cdot 10$ , and the expenditure to  $$2458 \cdot 88$ , leaving a balance in hand of  $$1 \cdot 22$ .

The available assets are shown to amount to  $$1436 \cdot 22$ , and the liabilities to  $$1779 \cdot 30$ , showing a balance against the Institute of  $$343 \cdot 08$ .

From the depressed state of the finances,

#### THE LIBRARY,

during the year, has not been replenished with any large number of new works.

Your Committee have had under their consideration the desireableness of making some special effort, with a view to large additions to this most important department of the Institute; but believing that the most fitting time for this purpose would be when the Institute takes possession of its new premises, your Committee have not taken any steps in this direction, but have expended only as much as the means placed at their disposal would warrant.

Your Committee consider it would be to the interest of the Institute, and a great convenience to a large class of its members, if the Library were opened for the exchange of Books for at least one hour in the morning of each day, in addition to the usual hours in the afternoon and evening. The following donations have been made to the Library during the year:—

Your Committee remark that there is not at present any provision in the By-Laws for closing the Library, and calling in the books, with a view to a thorough examination being made; so that although the number of volumes above given are shown in the catalogue, yet, for want of this examination, they cannot speak with certainty as to how many of them may be missing.

When your Committee entered upon the duties of their office, they did not anticipate that it would devolve upon them, as it had upon their predecessors, to report the continued insufficiency of accommodation in the

#### READING ROOM.

In this they have been disappointed, as the Institute still occupies the premises it then held; and the attendance at the Room having been larger than at any former period, has rendered the want of sufficient space even more severely felt.

Your committee recommend that so soon as sufficient accommodation shall be secured, a vigorous effort be made to re-organize this department so as to make it a first class Commercial News Room, as well as a useful and instructive Reading Room for the Industrial and other classes; this, they believe, can be effected by the Institute more efficiently and economically than by any other existing organization, without in any degree interfering with the more immediate and important objects of the Institute; and would, in the opinion of your Committee, largely tend to its prosperity.

During the past year the plan of providing a series of

#### LECTURES

For the Winter season, has not been adopted. The smallness of the Society's Lecture Room; the expense attending the engagement of the St. Lawrence Hall; and the uncertain position in which your Committee found themselves by reason of the still pending negotiations with the Government; together with the financial difficulties of the Institute, and the general depression in the various departments of Trade, induced your Committee—with the approbation of the quarterly meeting of November last—to decide on this course.

One Lecture was, however, delivered in the Hall of the Institute on the 18th of November last, on "Self Education," by WALTER A. WATTS, Esq., M.A.; preparatory to efforts being made to establish in the Institute a system of

#### CLASSES

For the winter session. The subjects selected for study were-"English Grammar and Composition," "Latin," "Arithmetic," "Algebra," "Natural Philosophy," and "Geometry;" but although the Committee afforded every facility, by placing the rates of admission for members very low, they only succeeded in the formation of the class on "English Grammar and Composition." This class, under the able tuition of Mr. Richard Lewis, was continued for upwards of three months, and made very satisfactory progress in the studies engaged in.

Your Committee cannot but regret the apparent apathy manifested on the part of the youthful members of the Institute, in not availing themselves of the advantages thus offered for their improvement; and they would strongly urge on those having youths in their employ, and also on parents and guardians, the vast importance of education in the various pursuits of life, not only to those intended to be directly benefitted, but to the community at large; and they would also express an earnest hope that the efforts of their successors in this department may be crowned with that measure of success which the importance of the object certainly merits.

An Act praying the Legislature that this Institute may be allowed to surrender its present

#### CHARTER,

And become incorporated under the general "Act for the Incor-"poration and better Management of Library Associations and "Mechanics' Institutes," has, in answer to the prayer of the Institute, passed its several readings through both houses of Parliament, and now only awaits the sanction of his Excellency the Governor General.\*

In placing the Institute under the provisions of the above-mentioned act, it will become necessary to alter and amend the present By-Laws of the Society; and your Committee, in addition to the changes indicated as desirable in the last Annual Report, deem it also desirable that some change should be made in the manner of receiving new members. At present they can only be elected at the regular Quarterly Meetings of the Institute, and all subsequent propositions must lie over to the next meeting; thus a number of candidates have to wait—some for nearly three months—before they can be admitted. This has always been found to be vexatious in the working, and opposed to the interests of the Society.

Were members received by the General Committee at the regular monthly meetings, or oftener, a stricter scrutiny could be instituted into the characters of the respective candidates than can now be obtained, when so large a number are proposed and ballotted for on the same evening.

<sup>\*</sup>The Bill has since received his Excellency's sanction.

These suggestions are thus early thrown out that they may receive due consideration by the members of the Institute, prior to the discussion that will undoubtedly arise in connection with the adoption of new By-Laws.

During the present session of Parliament your Committee petitioned the Legislature for a renewal of the usual

#### ANNUAL GOVERNMENT GRANT.

To this petition your Committee have not received any formal reply, but they perceive by the published proceedings of the Legislative Assembly that the Honorable the Minister of Finance has, in his place in the House, announced that it was not the intention of the Government to ask for money for the ordinary Mechanics' and Literary Institutes.

Upwards of two months prior to the expiration of the lease to the Government of the Society's

#### NEW HALL,

On the first of October last, your Committee made a proposition to the Department of Public Works to arbitrate the cost of making the necessary alterations required to the building, prior to its being given up to the Institute; this plan of settlement not being acceded to, the Commissioner requested the Institute to have estimates of the cost of the work prepared and submitted to the Department, which, if considered satisfactory, might be taken as the basis of an immediate settlement. These estimates your Committee caused to be prepared in detail, and referred to two professional gentlemen— W. HAY and W. G. STORM, Esquires—who, after examination, verified them as being correct.

These estimates were at once transmitted to the Commissioner of Public Works, from whom an answer was shortly after received containing an offer to the Institute—in full settlement of all claims against the Government—of a sum amounting to a little over onethird of the amount of the verified estimates. This offer your Committee at once refused, and again asked that the whole matter be submitted to arbitration, but without success. Eventually the Department appointed an Engineer to examine and report on the building, and an offer has since been made of a sum based on that gentleman's report. This last offer of the Government is still under consideration; some further information in relation to certain deductions made by the Departmental Architect being asked from the Government before giving a final answer.

A difference has subsequently arisen in regard to a claim on the Government for rent and premium of insurance on the building, from the expiration of the lease until it shall be finished and given up to the Institute, according to the agreement.

Your Committee append to this their report a copy of the lease, and copies of all correspondence had with Government on the subject of the settlement, in order that the members of the Institute may be able fully to understand the whole matter. To the last communication, sent on the 27th of February last, no reply has yet been received.

Your Committee would here remark that, during the whole of the negotiations, they have acted with the utmost promptness in considering every communication received, and in furnishing all information asked by the Government, having been anxious to arrive at a satisfactory adjustment of the matters in dispute, without an hours unnecessary delay; and they cannot but express their sincere regret that their endeavours should not, long ere this, have been successful, as the unexpected delay has been—both as regards the membership and the finances—very detrimental to the interests of the Institute.

In the year 1857 this Institute became associated with the

#### SOCIETY OF ARTS,

In England, and believing that members are not aware of the benefits this connection confers, your Committee avail themselves of this opportunity of calling attention to the subject. The following special privileges are secured to this Institute by being thus associated, viz.:— The productions or manufactures of this country, transmitted by our Institute, are entitled to receive all due publicity by means of the Society's Exhibitions, Publications, and Discussions.

We receive the weekly Journal of the Society, with its other publications; and a portion of the columns of the Journal is reserved for Colonial discussions and correspondence.

Whenever any member of this Institute, bearing a letter of introduction from the Secretary, shall visit London, he may enjoy the usual privileges of a corresponding member of the Society of Arts during his stay, and may have his letters addressed to him at the Society's House in the Adelphi.

The system of examinations instituted by the Society of Arts is extended so as to embrace candidates who shall have duly attended classes at Colonial associated Institutions; and Certificates of Merit are awarded by the Society's examiners, on examination papers duly authenticated and remitted from the Colonies.

#### CONCLUSION.

From the foregoing Report it will appear evident that a very large increase in the membership—and, probably, an increase in the amount of the annual subscription of members—will have to be made, so as to meet the necessary annual expenditure. On the latter point your Committee would remark, as their belief, that the privileges of this Institute are given at a much lower rate of subscription than are those of any other similar institution in Britain or America; and while they would be opposed to any large addition to the present rates, they yet consider it necessary that some slight advance should be made—especially when the Society shall take possession of its new Hall; a step which will of necessity involve increased expenditure and new liabilities.

The settlement with Government, even if attained on the most favorable terms, will yet leave upon us a debt of  $\pounds 4,600$ , which will require considerable exertion and careful management to meet;

and this can only be done by the active exertions of members to increase the efficiency of the Institute, and by every means in their power to promote its best interests. Upon the individual exertions of each, and the well directed efforts of all, will the future career of the Institute depend; and feeling confident that this will not be wanting, your Committee look forward to the change as one which will mark a new era in the history of the Institute, and the commencement of a career of prosperity and usefulness which even the most sanguine among us can hardly anticipate.

## REPORT.

The Board of Directors of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, beg leave to present the 30th Annual Report, being a review of the proceedings of the Board for the past year; and also a statement of the present position, including the assets and liabilities, of the Institute.

Since your Board were elected in May last, several important changes have taken place in regard to the working and prospects of the Institute; these, in addition to the ordinary topics of the Report will be considered in their proper order.

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

During the year preceding the acceptance of office by your Board, a large decrease took place in the membership of the Institute, the causes for which having been alluded to by their predecessors in the lastAnnual Report, need not be here repeated.

Your Board had hoped to be in a position to report an increase of members during their term of office. Although their hopes in this respect have not been fully realized, the decrease has been so trifling, compared with the two former years, as to justify them in concluding that the Institute has again entered upon a career of prosperity similar to that which it previously enjoyed.

Showing a decrease of six during the year, compared with a decrease of 165 reported last year.

It will be observed that the usual class of junior members, owing to a change in the Constitution and Bye-Laws of the Institute, are omitted in the foregoing statement, no one being now eligible for election as a member unless of the full age of 17 years; consequently, a large number who would otherwise be junior members, have become quarterly, or annual subscribers, and are admitted as follows :--

BYE-LAW NO. 1, Section 9. "Any person not eligible for mem-"bership, or not wishing to become a member, may be admitted to "all the privileges of the Institute, except that of voting and being "elected to office, upon paying such subscription, and conforming to "such rules and regulations as may from time to time be adopted "by the Directors."

\* "Females, and males under nineteen years of age, shall pay a "sum of fifty cents per quarter, or \$1.50 per annum; and males over "nineteen years of age, seventy-five cents per quarter, or \$2.00 per "annum.

Your Board confidently anticipate a large accession to the membership during the ensuing year, induced by more extensive accommodations, the prospect of large additions both to the Library and Reading-Room, and improvement in every other department. Much, however, will depend upon the present membership; the heavy expenses under which the Institute must labour for some time to come, will not only tax the discretion of its officers, but will require an active interest on the part of its members.

#### THE LIBRARY.

Your Board beg to refer to the following paragraph which occurs in the last Annual Report :---

"Your Committee remark that there is not at present any provision "in the Bye-Laws for closing the Library and calling in the Books, "with a view to a thorough examination being made; so that "although" the number of volumes above given are shown in the "Catalogue, yet, for want of this examination, they cannot speak "with certainty as to how many of them may be missing."

This difficulty no longer exists, as provision has been made under the new Bye-Laws for calling in all the Books, and closing the Library, for one week previous to the Annual Meeting in every year.

In compliance with a notice issued by your Board, the principal portion of the Books held by members have been sent in, and a thorough examination has been made.

The Library Committe report that in addition to the 153 volumes that are now worn out, they have selected and laid by 260 volumes for re-binding, and request the attention of the new Library Committee thereto as soon as practicable.

Your Board would submit, respecting the large number of books lost, that, according to the report of the Library Committee, many of them were taken out by members who have left the city within the last two or three years, and who failed to return the books they had in their possession at the time of their removal. Every endeavour should be made to secure the return of books on the expiration of the time allowed for reading them. The coöperation of members and subscribers is particularly requested in this matter.

The only donation made to the Library during the year was by Mr. Norris Black, of one volume, entitled "Evidences of Christianity."

Your Board would respectfully suggest to their successors in office, that a conversazione should be held at the opening of the Music Hall, the profits of which should be exclusively devoted to the purchase of books for the Library.

#### READING-ROOM.

This department of the Institute has been well attended during the year, and undoubtedly would have been better appreciated, but for want of room and consequent classification of the periodicals supplied; the interest, however, taken in the Reading-Room augurs well for the future, when the large room with its ample accommodation shall be thrown open.

#### LECTURES.

For want of accomodation in the present Building, and having to devote so much time and attention to matters connected with the completion of the New Hall, your Board did not make any arrangements for a Course of Lectures in the Institute during the past Season; one Lecture, however, was delivered by Mr. Richard Lewis, as introductory to the Class conducted by him in connection with the Institute.

#### CLASSES.

The English Class established in 1859, under the direction of Mr. Richard Lewis, was re-organized last fall and met for a term of five months. The exercises consisted of lessons in English Grammar, on the Analysis of Sentences, on Composition and Rhetoric, and on Logic, Elocution and Public Speaking. Mr. Lewis laboured zealously for the improvement of his Class, which was well attended, and a manifest improvement was the result in all who attended industriously to the studies. It was closed only a week or two since, when the thanks of the class were heartily accorded to Mr. Lewis for the interest he had manifested in the welfare and improvement of its members.

The Class has agreed to meet at intervals through the summer months, so as to continue its organization ready for next session.

A Class for the study of Vocal Music has recently been established in connection with the Institute, conducted by Mr. C. Pearson, which your Board have reason to believe is making satisfactory progress in its studies.

Your Board deem the establishment of classes of the utmost importance to the satisfactory working of the Institute, and should therefore receive a large share of attention from future Boards of Directors, especially when in the New Building, where ample room has been provided for them.

#### THE NEW HALL.

After numerous difficulties which your Board, in common with their predecessors, have had to contend with, a settlement was obtained with the Provincial Government in August last, and the sum of \$16,000 was accepted for the purpose of covering the cost of alterations and repairs to the New Hall, and for Rent, Insurance and Interest on the debt for such time as the building might be expected to be undergoing the necessary repairs and alterations.

The foregoing sum, although insufficient for the finishing of the Building and covering of Rent, Insurance and Interest, according to the conditions of the Lease to Government, was accepted by your Board, under the conviction that longer delay would be prejudicial to the interests of the Institute.

To your late President, Patrick Freeland, Esq., who so ably and energetically conducted the negociations with the Government; and to the Hon. G. W. Allan, who took such a warm interest in endeavouring to secure to the Institute its just rights, and in aiding Mr. Freeland in his negociations with the Government at Quebec, the warmest thanks of the Institute are due. To the exertions of these Gentiemen, mainly, is the Institute indebted for its success in obtaining the above mentioned sum, being an advance of \$8,000 on the first offer made by the Government.

After various delays, from causes which have already been under discussion, the principal works for the completion of the building were given out to contract, and are now, with the exception of the Music Hall, nearly ready for occupation.

Your Board used all possible economy in re-arranging the Building, making no alteration to any portion that would answer the present purposes of the Institute, although not in accordance with the original design; they therefore anticipate that after payment of all contracts and accounts in connection therewith, there will remain a small surplus of funds in hand, which they recommend should be invested as the basis of a sinking fund for the gradual extinction of the debt of \$18,400, which now remains on the building and ground. Your Board have leased the set of offices in the south-west corner of the ground floor of the building to Messrs. Roaf & Davis, for a term of five years, at an annual rent of \$300, and taxes; and have also leased three rooms on the south-west corner of the second story to the Board of Arts and Manufactures, for its Model Rooms, and Free Library of Reference, for a term of three years, at an annual rent of \$240.

Other rooms, both for permanent and casual rentals, are yet at the disposal of the Institute, from the whole of which a sufficient revenue to meet the annual interest, and insurance on the building, may be anticipated.

#### EXHIBITION.

Your Board have entered into an arrangement with the "Toronto Electoral Division Society" to hold a joint Exhibition of Arts, Manufactures, and Horticultural and Agricultural products, in the new Hall of the Institute, in October next, on the basis of an agreement adopted by both bodies, and as contained in a circular just issued to the members of the Institute.

When the building was in course of erection—in the year 1854 the Institute had determined to hold such an Exhibition as is now contemplated; and also to hold a Bazaar in connection therewith, where any article presented should be sold for the benefit of the Institute; this object is still intended to be carried out.

Your Board therefore strongly recommend that the proceeds of such sales of articles as may be presented, as well as the one-half of profits arising from the general receipts of the Exhibition, to which the Institute will be entitled under the agreement with the "Electoral Division Society," be devoted exclusively to the purchase of a suitable organ for the Music Hall, where it may be at all times available for concerts, musical societies, &c.

#### CHARTER AND BYE-LAWS.

Under authority of the Act passed during the last session of the Provincial Legislature, your Board surrendered the original Charter of the Institute, and filed declarations incorporating it under the general act for the Incorporation of Mechanics' Institutes, Chap. 72 Consolidated Statutes of Canada. The new Constitution and Bye-Laws adopted under said Act have been in force since the first day of September last.

#### BOARD OF ARTS AND MANUFACTURES.

Your Board would strongly recommend to the members the monthly journal published by the Board of Arts and Manufactures for Upper Canada, as having a claim on their support. From the numbers already published and supplied to the Reading-Room, and from the following extract of a circular addressed to the Secretary of the Institute, its general design and object may be gathered :---

"As indicated in the Prospectus, the Journal will be devoted "mainly to the promotion of the Arts and Manufactures of the "Province; but it is also the desire of the Board to render it "availble as a medium of communication between the several "Mechanics' Institutes of Upper Canada, whose interests, it is "intended, the Journal shall at all times advocate. Abstracts of "Reports and Proceedings of Institutes, as well as correspondence "on any subject within the scope of the Journal, are therefore "requested to be furnished for publication."

The annual subscription is only fifty cents to members of the Institute, to non-members, \$1.

Your Board have also received copies of a programme of Examinations in the several departments of science and education, proposed to be held annually by said Board, of such members of Mechanics' Institutes as may choose to avail themselves of their advantages.

In a communication accompanying the programme, the Board states that—

"The system therein proposed is very nearly the same as that "which has been, for some years past, in successful operation in "England, under the direction and management of the Society of "Arts. One of the advantages to the holders of the Society's "Certificates is, that it generally secures to its possessor ready "employment, and at the highest rate of remuneration, in that "special branch of business in which his previous studies, and certi-"fied attainments, may be more particularly available."

Your Board trusts that during next year, with the extensive accommodation for classes already referred to, a large number of its members will prepare themselves to compete for the diplomas of that Board.

#### SECRETARY AND LIBRARIAN.

Under the new Constitution and Bye-Laws of the Institute, the office of Secretary and Librarian is made a joint office, filled by the appointment of the Board of Directors, instead of by annual election by the members as heretofore.

This change would not have taken place until the present time, had not the late Secretary, Mr. W. Edwards, and the Librarian, Mr. W. Eales, tendered their resignations in January last, so as to enable your Board to make the appointment three months before the expiration of their year of office. Your Board received numerous applications for the office, and, after due consideration, appointed Mr. George Longman, believing him to be well adapted for the position.

By this arrangement, Mr. Longman has had considerable time to become acquainted with the duties of his office before entering the new Hall, where more arduous duties and responsibilities await him, and a large amount of re-organization of the different departments of the Institute will become necessary.

# TORONTO MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.

It was moved by Mr. F. W. Coate, seconded by Mr. J. M. Cooper, and resolved-

That the thanks of the Institute be given to the several ladies who, according to the Report now read, undertook the management of the Bazaar held in December last, by which the large sum of three hundred and ninety dollars was added to the funds of the Institute.

It was moved by Mr. Edwards, seconded by Mr. Walter S. Lee, and resolved—

That a vote of thanks be accorded to the Auditors for their attention to the duties to which they were appointed, and for the valuable suggestions made in their report.

It was moved by Mr. W. S. Lee, seconded by Mr. S. S. Martin, and unanimously resolved-

That the thanks of the Institute be given to John Crawford, Esq., M.P.P., and to the Hon. J. H. Cameron, M.P.P., for the reports and proceedings of Parliament which they have regularly sent to the Institute.

Mr. D. G. Carnegie gave notice that at the next Quarterly Meeting he would move the following resolutions :---

1st. That the subscription of Members be raised to \$2 50.

- 2nd. That a sinking fund be at once established for the payment of the debt on the building.
- 3rd. That the Secretary be instructed to keep a book to be called "Voluntary Subscriptions to the Reading Room."

4th. That steps be taken for permanently establishing certain Classes.

On motion of Mr. John Hallam, a vote of thanks was unanimously tendered to the Scrutineers of the Ballot.

The meeting then adjourned.

# THE ANNUAL REPORT.

The Directors of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute beg leave respectfully to present the thirty-first Annual Report.

The Directors feel much pleasure in congratulating the members on the great prosperity which has attended the affairs of the Institute during the year just closed—a year in its history remarkable for the great advance which the Institution has made in the extent and character of its resources, and the large accessions to its numerical strength. At no period in its history has the Institute been in so healthy a condition; never before could it so well effect the objects of its organization; and never has it stood so high in the estimation of its members and the general public.

#### THE NEW BUILDING.

Since last annual meeting the new building has been entirely completed; the handsome and commodious Music Hall and Lecture Room have been opened to the public; the various apartments specially for the use of the Institute have been elegantly and comfortably furnished; while the several spare rooms throughout the edifice have been rented, and are now a source of considerable income. The details of outlay and other particulars may be had by reference to the financial statement.

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

For three or four preceding years it has been the disagreeable duty of the Directors to record a gradual decline in the membership, but they are happy in being able to state that since last annual meeting there has been in this respect a large increase.

Being an increase of no less than 369 in a single year.

The Directors deem it unnecessary to comment on these figures, as the statement proves conclusively that the Institute is rapidly growing in popular favor.

#### FINANCES.

The total receipts for the year, from all sources, amount to \$13,684 69; the expenditure to \$13,591 64; leaving a balance in hand of \$93 05; an analized statement of which will be found in Appendix A to this Report.

As the building is now completed, a full statement of all monies received and payments made on account of the building fund is furnished, showing the total cost to the Institute of the building and site, including the furnishing, to be nearly \$50,000, with the respective years in which the various expenditures have taken place.

Appendix C furnishes a complete statement of the assets and liabilities of the Institute.

The very low rate of members' subscriptions, in view of the privileges afforded and the financial requirements of the Institute, has led the Directors at various times to consider the question of increasing the amount from \$2 00 to \$2 50 or \$3 00 per annum. The conclusion they have come to, however, is that it is not advisable to make any change until such time as the present rate shall have had a fair trial in the new premises, as a continued increase in the membership may reasonably be expected.

With a view to lay before the members a full exposition of the financial prospects of the Institute, an estimate of probable revenue and expenditure, for the ensuing year, based upon past experience, is submitted in appendix D, from which it is evident that the strictest economy, and the active exertions of members to increase the membership, are necessary.

The Directors recommend that the subscription for Life Memberships be reduced to \$20, and that moneys derivable from this source be invested in a sinking fund for the liquidation or reduction of the debt.

#### THE LIBRARY.

This important department has undergone considerable improvement during the past year. The Board, fully aware of the necessity that existed for the immediate purchase of new books, at once appropriated a large sum to that purpose, and in a very short time not less than 500 volumes of the latest and most interesting works were placed on the shelves. A large number of lost and worn-out books, also, were replaced, and the Library generally overhauled and renewed.

The Directors made provision for the purchase, during the year, of the principal new works, as they were issued from the press, by a permanent monthly appropriation for the purpose.

The Library has been so greatly increased that a new catalogue was deemed absolutely necessary. The Directors accordingly made arrangements for an improved classification of the books, and the issue of a new catalogue, the matter for which is now in the hands of the printer, and will be completed in the course of a few weeks. The Directors are glad to perceive that the great advantages the Library affords are properly appreciated, as is evident from the fact that at least four-fifths of the Members take out books constantly. As compared with previous years, there is in this respect a large proportionate increase.

This demand for books has been so great that the Directors considered it would be to the interest of the Institute to have the Library kept open daily from nine a.m. to ten p.m., or for thirteen hours, instead of seven hours as heretofore. This change has, no doubt, proved of much convenience to the members.

The greater attendance consequently required, and the extension of the general business of the Institute, necessitated the appointment of an assistant Librarian; and Mr. James Woodsworth was consequently engaged.

In accordance with the By-Laws, the Library has been closed for examination during the past week, and the Board have much pleasure in being able to report that the books are generally in good condition, comparatively few, considering their continuous use, requiring repairs.

#### THE READING ROOM.

The Reading-Room, the next department in importance, has also been much improved, by the introduction of several additional publications, as well as by the greater regularity with which the various periodicals are supplied. The systematic arrangement of the department, and the numerous appliances which have been obtained, cannot fail to afford the members much comfort and convenience. Heretofore many of the English and American newspapers have been supplied by contract; but the Directors, finding that this method ted to irregularity, ordered them direct from their respective publishers—the consequence of the change being that they now almost invariably arrive at the proper time.

# LECTURES.

The Directors have duly considered the importance of having lectures delivered under the auspices of the Institute, but for various reasons—the hitherto unsettled condition of the Institute's affairs, and the great difficulty of procuring suitable lecturers from a distance—they did not deem it advisable to engage in the enterprize during the past winter.

#### CLASSES.

The attention of the Directors has been so much occupied by the works required in completing and furnishing the building, and the various improvements in the several departments, that they have been heretofore unable to organize classes of a suitable nature. There was one, however, during the past winter, under the charge of Mr. Henry Martin, for tuition in painting and drawing, which was well attended, and generally very successful. The Directors hope that their successors will devote their attention to this important subject, as well as to that of the lectures.

#### THE CHESS CLUB.

Since the last annual meeting a new feature has been added to the Institution. Several members frequently urged upon the Directors the advisability of establishing a club for the practice of the scientific game of Chess, and proposed to co-operate in its formation. The Directors agreed to their proposals on stipulated conditions, protecting the Institute against loss in case the enterprize should not succeed. The Club was accordingly established, and styled "The Mechanics' Institute Chess Club." Rules were drawn up for its government, subject to the approval of the Directors; officers were appointed; and the necessary furniture and appliances procured. The Directors have pleasure in reporting that so far the Club has succeeded, and they have no doubt that with a little exertion on the part of its members, who at present number between fifty and sixty, it will continue to prosper.

#### THE INAUGURATION,

It will be seen by reference to last annual report, that it was proposed to hold a *Conversazione* as a suitable entertainment for the inauguration of the new building. But the Directors, desirous that the entertainment should be of such a nature as would admit of the members generally taking part in it; and being also desirous of combining profit with pleasure, decided on a Soiree, to be followed by a Bazaar. They accordingly solicited the co-operation of several of the Lady members, who, with most praiseworthy alacrity, at once offered their services. The Soiree was held, but the intense exitement prevailing at the time, caused by the anticipated troubles with the United States, rendered the affair somewhat a failure. The Bazaar, which immediately followed, and which was entirely under the control and management of the Ladies, was highly successful, and resulted in a profit of about four hundred dollars. The Institute is under a debt of gratitude to these Ladies for their very valuable services.

#### THE EXHIBITION.

The Board of Directors for the preceding year entered into an arrangement with the "Toronto Electoral Division Society," to hold a joint Exhibition of Arts, Manufactures, and Agricultural and Horticultural Productions, on the basis of an agreement adopted by both bodies, and as contained in a circular then issued to the members of the Institute.

In accordance with this agreement, the exhibition was opened in the Music Hall and adjoining rooms, on the 7th of October, and continued open for two weeks. The result, however, did not meet the reasonable anticipations of the Board, either in a financial point of view, or as an exposition of the arts and manufactures of the city.

Of the 614 entries made for exhibition, but 77 were for manufactured articles, 143 Fine Arts, and 62 Ladies' Work. The remaining 332 entries were for agricultural and horticultural products. The total amount offered in prizes was nearly \$1000, of which upwards of \$600 was in the department of arts and manufactures. The total receipts were \$952 07; total expenditure \$927 75; balance to divide between the two Societies \$24 32.

The Directors cannot but express their surprise at the little interest the manufacturers of Toronto, especially those who were members of the Institute, manifested in this exhibition, when so favorable an opportunity was afforded for displaying their various productions, and at the same time indirectly contributing to the fund for the liquidation of the debt on the building. Were it not for the kindness of the Educational Department of Upper Canada, in contributing a very superior and extensive collection of mathematical and school apparatus, of Toronto manufacture, the exhibition would have been anything but creditable to our artizans.

#### THE HEATING APPARATUS.

The building has been furnished, at considerable cost, with an excellent steam heating apparatus from the establishment of Mr. Jas. E. Thompson, of this city, which has given the greatest satisfaction; affording, as it does, a sufficient and agreeable heat; and being, in the opinion of the Board, much more economical than any of the ordinary systems of heating.

#### RENTS.

The Board desire to congratulate the members on the prospect that is presented of a large annual income from the permanent and casual rents of the Music Hall and Lecture Room, and the various minor apartments. Since the building was opened in July, the large sum of nearly two thousand dollars has been received for rents alone. The Music Hall is now the largest and most handsome public room in Toronto, and every way the best fitted and most suitable for public entertainments. There were a few acoustic defects in the Hall for some time, but such alterations have been made as have rendered it as nearly perfect in this respect as possible. The Lecture Room has obtained much popularity.

# TORONTO MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.

ANNUAL MEETING-1863.

The Annual Meeting of Members was held in the Music Hall, on Monday evening, 11th May, 1863, at eight o'clock P.M. --RICE LEWIS, Esq., President, in the Chair.

The Minutes of the preceding Quarterly Meeting were read and approved.

The following letter, from the Montreal Mechanics' Institute, was read :---

MONTREAL, February 27th, 1863.

TO THE SECRETARY,

TORONTO MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.

SIR,—At the meeting of the Committee, Montreal Mechanics' Institute, held on last Monday evening, the possibility of increasing the funds of the Institute was brought forward for consideration, and after proposing several plans, the following was agreed upon, and I was instructed to communicate the same to the Institute in Toronto :—

Resolved,—That the Committee of this Institute do take such steps as may be deemed necessary, in order to have a successful excursion to Toronto, about the beginning of July next; and that they make arrangements with the Grand Trunk Railroad, whereby the trip shall be the first of the season.

Resolved,—That the Corresponding Secretary do write the Secretary of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, informing them of our intentions; and at the same time suggesting that it might be made profitable to them also, were they to get up an *Excursion to Niagara Falls*, at the same time, as no doubt many of the excursionists would desire to see the Falls.

Should this meet the views of the Members of your Board, we would be thankful for timely notice.

Resolved,—That the members are pleased to hear of the intended visit of the members of the Montreal Mechanics' Institute to this City, during the ensuing summer; and do hereby cordially invite them as guests at a conversazione, to be held in the rooms of the Institute, on such evening during their stay as may be convenient for them.—Carried unanimously.

The Secretary then read the Annual Report, which was unanimously adopted.

The Secretary read the Auditors' Report, which was also unanimously adopted. (See Appendix "C.")

It was then moved by Mr. WALTER S. LEE, seconded by Mr. F. W. COATE, and—

Resolved,—That the thanks of this meeting are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. Charles Robertson and Mr. Henry Joseph, for the valuable services they have rendered the Institute in auditing the accounts for the past year.—Carned.

Moved by Mr. W. EDWARDS, seconded by Mr. JOHN HAL-LAM, and-

Resolved,—That the following gentlemen be requested to act as scrutineers of the ballot, viz., Messrs. Samuel Spreull, Alfred Mason, Thomas McLean, Richard Brown, E. Webb and James Wright.—Carried.

The Scrutineers then proceeded to take up the ballot; and whilst preparing their report.

It was moved by Mr. EDWARDS, seconded by Mr. COWAN, and  $\rightarrow$ 

Resolved,—That the thanks of the Institute be tendered to the gentlemen of the Press, who have so liberally contributed their various publications to the Reading Room gratuitously during the year.—Carried.

Mr. CARNEGIE gave notice that at the next Quarterly Meeting he would move, in accordance with the suggestion of the Auditors in their Report, that the office of Treasurer be combined with that of the Secretary for the time being.

Mr. SPRY moved, seconded by Mr. C. J. GILMOUR, and-

Resolved,—That the thanks of this Annual Meeting be tendered to the retiring Officers and Directors, for the able manner in which they have conducted the affairs of the Institute during the past year.—Carried unanimously.

Mr. EDWARDS gave notice that at the next Quarterly Meeting he would move an addition to the By-Laws, to the effect that the retiring President shall not be eligible for re-election until at least one year shall have elapsed after the expiration of his year of office. Moved by Mr. D. G. CARNEGIE, seconded by Mr. JOHN PATERSON, and—

Resolved,—That this meeting desires gratefully to acknowledge the valuable services rendered to the Institute by the Teachers of the various classes held under the auspices of the Institute during the past winter, and to thank them for having so efficiently discharged their important duties.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. E. GIBSON, seconded by Mr. E. WIMAN; and  $\rightarrow$ 

Resolved,—That the thanks of this meeting are due and are hereby given to those ladies and gentlemen who gave their valuable assistance at the several Re-unions recently held in connexion with the Institute.—Carried.

It was moved by Mr. JAMES E. ELLIS, seconded by Mr. T. G. MASON, and—

Resolved,—That the thanks of this Institute are tendered to Col. JARVIS for kindly presenting this Institute with a copy of the "York Observer," published 6th October, 1823.

The Directors are happy in being able to congratulate the members on the continued progress and prosperity of the Institute, and on the steady and continuous additions which are constantly being made to its several departments, rendering it still more worthy of the high estimation in which it is held by its members and the general public.

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

During the year just closed, as during the preceding year, there has been a gradual increase in the list of members and subscribers, as will be seen by the following statement :---

From this statement it will be seen that, though there has been a decline in the membership proper, there has been a considerable increase in the number of Subscribers, and an addition to the numerical strength of the Institute during the year of seventy-two. This change is to be attributed to the low rate at which Subscribers have been heretofore admitted; but the Directors, deeming it advisable to render the rates of

subscription more equable, have recently raised those of Subscribers as follows :---

#### THE FINANCES.

The Treasurer's audited accounts show total amount of receipts from all sources, \$9,130 62; expenditure, \$8,921 84; balance in hand, \$208 78; an analyzed statement of which will be found in Appendix "A" to this Report

Appendix "B" contains a full statement of the assets and liabilities of the Institute to the 80th April. This statement shows the *available* assets to be \$591 89; liabilities, exclusive of the loan on the building and ground, \$2,221 26; balance of such liabilities over available assets, \$1,629 57.

The accounts submitted in the reports of their predecessors showed the amount of such liabilities over the available assets to be only \$1,401–05, but in making a thorough analysis of the accounts paid during the past year, the Directors have found that sums amounting to \$459–29 have been paid which were incurred during the preceding year, and which, if added to the amount reported of \$1,401–05, would show that the floating liabilities have been reduced during the year by the amount of \$240–97.

The Directors hoped to have considerably reduced these liabilities, but the expense of further completing certain portions of the Building, and furnishing others, has been so great as to prevent them doing so to any considerable extent. The advance in the rates of members' annual subscription has been in operation for only six months of the past year, and in that of annual and quarterly subscribers but four weeks, so that but little benefit, compared with what may be anticipated in the ensuing year, has yet been derived from this source of revenue.

The Directors are convinced that the financial affairs of the Institute have now assumed such magnitude, that to keep the expenditure within the limits of the receipts, and to establish a sinking fund for gradually extinguishing the debt on the Building, as well as to pay off the floating liebilities, it is desirable that all proposed items of expenditure, other than such as shall be covered by special appropriations, be first submitted to the Finance Committee, for their report thereon, before such liabilities be incurred.

#### THE LIBRARY.

The Library, the most important department of the Institute, has undergone much improvement during the year. The great increase in the demand for books obliged the Directors to make special efforts to render the Library more complete and attractive. To attain this object, they more than doubled the monthly appropriation at the disposal of the Library Committee, and from time to time, as the state of the finances would warrant, special appropriations have been made for the purchase of such of the popular standard works as were more frequently enquired for.

Complaints have occasionally been made of difficulty having been experienced by Members in obtaining the new and more entertaining volumes; but to obviate this difficulty, and allay any dissatisfaction that may have arisen from this source, for months past several copies of the more interesting new books have been procured.

The Directors are happy in being able to report a constant and considerable increase in the number of those who take advantage of the privileges which the Library affords. The general improvement of this department, and the more easy access to the popular volumes, have no doubt contributed much to this gratifying result.

In accordance with the General Regulations, the Library has been closed during the past week, for the purpose of examination; and the Board have pleasure in stating that the books are in excellent condition, considering the continuous use to which they are subject. A very large number of volumes have been repaired during the year.

The Catalogue of the Library, which was promised in the last Report, has since been completed and printed, and is now extensively circulated among the Members.

## THE READING ROOM.

## CLASSES.

The Board have much pleasure in being able to report that the several Classes which have been established, in connection with the Institute, during the past winter have succeeded even beyond their expectations. Early in the season, it was decided to organize Classes for tuition in English Grammar and Composition, Bookkeeping and Penmanship, Mathematics. Architectural and Mechanical Drawing, Ornamental Drawing, French, German, and Music. Qualified teachers were engaged, and invitations were issued to the Members generally to join such of the Classes as they might choose. An interesting lecture on the subject of Self-Education, introductory to these Classes, was delivered by Mr. Richard Lewis, In a very short time, no less than one hundred and fifty pupils were enrolled, and business was at once proceeded with, The English Class numbered forty-four, under the charge of Mr. Richard Lewis; the Bookkeeping and Penmanship Class thirty-four, under the charge of Mr. W. R. Orr: the Mathematical Class twenty-three, under the charge of Mr. John Huggard; the Architectural and Mechanical Drawing Class ten, under the charge of Mr. John Tully; the French Class thirty, under the charge of Mons. Pernet; and the Ornamental Drawing Class nine, under the charge of Mr. H. Martin, The Music and German Classes failed for want of sufficient support. All these Classes were under the immediate control of the Board, with the exception of the French and Ornamental Drawing Classes, which, though under the auspices of the Institute, were controlled and managed by the teachers. Each Class met two evenings per week, for twenty weeks, and the fees were placed so low as barely to cover the necessary expenses.

The Directors of the Northern Railway of Canada, at the suggestion no doubt of F. W. Cumberland, Esq., an old and valued friend of the Institute, placed at the disposal of the Directors of the Institute the nomination, from the Members and Classes, of two apprentices during the present year, and one apprentice annually, to the machine shops of the Company, on conditions that the nominees should each give sufficient testimony of moral character, and pass a satisfactory examination in such branches of knowledge as would the better fit them for mechanical pursuits. In addition to this, the Company presented the Institute with the handsome sum of one hundred dollars, to be appropriated to the purchase of suitable prizes to be awarded to such of the pupils as should pass the most creditable examinations in their respective Classes, at the close of the term. In accordance with this design, first and second class prizes of books were purchased, of the value of \$10 and \$6 each respectively. The services of several efficient Examiners were procured, and the final com-petitive examination resulted as follows :---

The prizes were presented by His Worship the Mayor, J. G. Bowes, Esq., at a soirce which was got up for the purpose by a committee of the pupils, and at which suitable and interesting addresses were delivered by the Mayor, Rev. Dr. McCaul, F. W. Cumberland, Esq., and other gentlemen.

An Address from the Pupils was presented to the Directors on that occasion, and was sufficiently expressive of their gratitude for the information they have received through the instrumentality of the Institute. The Directors desire to thank the Pupils for this Address, and to express the hope that during the ensuing winter they will again present themselves, and continue to attain, through the medium of these Classes, such valuable knowledge as will tend to make them useful and good members of society.

The Directors, on behalf of the Institute, desire to express their gratitude to the Teachers, for their hearty co-operation, and for the zeal and efficiency with which they have discharged their duties; for they feel that to them in a great measure may be attributed the very gratifying success which has attended their united labours.

In addition to the foregoing Classes, seven Members of the Institute have passed the necessary preliminary examinations, in certain given subjects, entitling them to compete for prizes which will be awarded by the Board of Arts and Manufactures for Upper Canada, to the successful competitors in a final examination which will take place during the month of June, under the auspices of that body.

## THE LECTURES.

The Directors were fully aware of the importance of having suitable Lectures delivered, in connection with the Institute, during the past season; but considering the fact, that a number of Lectures under the auspices of another Society, besides several of a minor character, were about to be delivered in the building, they did not deem it advisable to engage in the enterprise.

# THE CHESS CLUB.

The Chess Club, the Directors regret to say, has not succeeded ed so well as they had reason to anticipate. At the date of the last Annual Meeting the Club had a membership of between fifty and sixty, but during the past year it has fallen away to about thirty. This decline may be attributed, in a great measure, to the fact that during the early part of the year the Directors were unable to give them a room for permanent occupation, the consequence of which was that the attendance gradually decreased. Lately, however, a comfortable apartment on the second floor of the building has been appro-

priated to their exclusive use, the fees have been considerably reduced, and in view of the improved facilities afforded, the Directors hope that before the close of another year in its history the Chess Club will be in a more prosperous condition.

#### THE RE-UNIONS.

At a quarterly meeting of the Members, held in August last, it was resolved—

"That a series of Meetings be instituted, for the purpose of affording Members an opportunity of conversing together on subjects of general interest, for discussion, for the reading of Essays, and generally for mutual improvement."

In obedience to the requirements of this resolution, a special committee was appointed at a subsequent meeting of the Directors. for the purpose of considering the matter, and, if found practicable, for making the necessary arrangements for opening and conducting these meetings. This committee reported favourably, and presented a scheme for the prosecution of the enterprise. It was decided to hold six meetings, or "Reunions," as they were thereafter called, one every alternate week ; and for the purpose of rendering them more entertaining and attractive, it was deemed advisable to introduce Music and Singing. The first two were held in the Lecture Room, but so large was the attendance, that that apartment was insufficient to accommodate all who came. The remaining four were held in the Music Hall, besides a special one, for which extra arrangements were made. The entertainments consisted chiefly of discussions on topics of popular interest, songs, and instrumental music, which were for the most part volunteered by the Members and their friends; and the rates of admission were so moderate, as to place them within the reach of the whole community.

The Board feel satisfied that these meetings have been a source of much amusement and instruction to those who attended them, and are gratified in being in a position to report that they have resulted in a considerable profit to the Institute. With the experience now attained in the management of these Reunions, the Directors are of opinion that in future seasons they might be conducted on a more improved method, and with still greater advantage to the community.

#### THE MECHANICS' MEETINGS.

In accordance with the terms of a resolution passed at the last Annual Meeting, the Directors made arrangements for the holding of meeting's of the Members, for the discussion 'of matters of practical interest to mechanics. Seven of these meetings have been held, and were fairly attended. Discussions took place, several papers of an instructive character were read, and such action was taken by those interested as must, no doubt, have tended materially to their mutual improvement.

## THE VISIT OF THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.

His Excellency the Governor General, Lord Monck, honored the Institute with a visit during the month of October, and the Directors took advantage of the occasion to present His Excellency, on behalf of the Members, with an Address, expressive of their loyal attachment to the Throne and Government of Her Majesty the Queen, and of sincere welcome to His Excellency. His Excellency was pleased to reply, and expressed his sympathy with the objects of the Institute, and surprise and satisfaction at the elegant appearance of its several departments.

#### THE SECRETARY.'

The Directors feel it their duty to express their entire satisfaction with the manner in which Mr. Longman, the Secretary, has discharged his multifarious duties since his appointment. The account-books and papers of the Institute have been neatly and accurately kept, and the various departments have been admirably managed by him during that time. The undersigned, appointed to audit the books of the Mechanics' Institute, for the financial year ending 30th April last, beg to Report :---

That they have carefully examined the Balance Sheet of the Treasurer ; compared it with the Vouchers, and found it correct.

Your Auditors have pleasure in stating, that the General Balance Sheet of the Institution, now presented, has been copied from the Ledger, in accordance with the suggestions of the Auditors of last year, the general accounts having been all entered therein.

Your Auditors would respectfully suggest, that the Treasurer be furnished with a book, containing printed forms of receipts for his disbursements, which would form a more compact and satisfactory method of reference than is now

supplied by the usual vouchers. They would further suggest that books with printed forms, similar to Bank Cheques, be given to the Secretary, in which all moneys received by him from Members or otherwise should be entered in the counterfoil, to correspond with the receipts given.

Your Auditors are of opinion that if these suggestions were carried into effect, a better system of checks would be initiated than now prevails.

The attention of your Auditors has been called to the anomalous position of the offices of Secretary and Treasurer being held by different individuals a system which creates a difficulty in the bookkeeping of the Institution, when their duties could be more efficiently performed by uniting the offices in the person of the Secretary.

In this connection, we have much pleasure in directing the notice of the Directors to the elaborate and satisfactory statements of detail of Income and Expenditure presented by the Secretary, and taken from his subsidiary books, which appear to be kept with great care.

And merely a simple account of their operations. And though the details may be somewhat lengthy, still your Committee hope that they will not, on that account, be less interesting; showing, as they do, the still continuing prosperity of the Institute. And though the increase of members, during the year just closed, has not been nearly so great as thet of lest year wat is there meanliked a more that of last year, yet is there manifested a more decided and active interest in the affairs and welfare of the Institute, by its present members generally.

At the last Annual Report the number of members was 330. During the year, 76 new ones have been elected, making an aggregate of 406 members; from which, however, must be deducted 63,--removed by death, retirement from the city, and withdrawal from the Institute; leaving at present on the books of the Institute, as members in full standing,—

This small increase in the number of members, This small increase in the number of members, your Committee are of opinion, is in a great measure attributable to the very unfavourable situa-tion of the present building, and the bad state of the street leading to it. This latter objection, how-ever, your Committee hope soon to see removed.

The necessity of providing larger and more con-venient accommodation for the Institute has become increasingly apparent to your Committee : and they now record their thorough conviction that this question is one of the most vital importance to the well-being of the Institute, as demanding the careful consideration, and active and united efforts of its consideration, and active and inned clotte of a members, in order to realize the means of obtaining that which can now no longer be regarded as a more matter of expediency, but one of urgent necessity.

The rapid increase in the population of our ra-The rapid increase in the population of our fat-pidly improving City; the certainty of a proportion-ate degree of advancement for some years to come, seem to urge this step, and the difficulties in the way of its accomplishment will only increase rather than diminish; for with the improvement of the City, the value of property will most assuredly in-crease also : and where now an eligible site for a Building might with comparatively little difficulty building might with comparatively inthe difficulty be secured, a very few years will render such a thing almost impossible, except at a very high price. Your Committee, fully alive to the importance of this subject, have not been inactive, but have been carefully on the watch for a convenient building site, such as they could feel themselves at liberty to recommend for the purpose of erecting a New Hall Several have been under their consideration, but none that they thought would in a sufficient degree answer the purposes of this Institute. Your Committee regret that they have not the Your Committee regret that they have not the same pleasing task before them, when speaking of the last Exhibition, as when recording the results of their other labours. Notwithstanding the exertions of your Committee, the extensive distribution of Circulars-one of which was sent to every member of the Institute—and the extensive preparations which were made to insure its success,—that Exhi-bition did not meet with such a degree of encouragement from members, nor did bey so heartily co-operate with your Committee, as the importance co-operate with your Committee, as the imponance of the undertaking, and their professed interest in the welfare of the Institute ought to have insured. Owing to this, as a principal reason, the Exhibition was rather a failure. At all events, its success was by no means so great as your Committee, judging from past years and the flourishing state of the Institute, were warranted to expect. Connected with the reason above alluded to for this want of success, was one thing which caused your Com-mittee deep regret; that was, the small number of articles exhibited as Mechanical specimens. Out of 340 members of the Institute, only 13 contributed articles of this description. Your Committee feel themselves called upon to speak thus strongly of this themselves called upon to speak thus strongly of this lukewarmness of members, as its direct tendency is to damp the ardour, and fimit the exertions of those who are most desirous of seeing this Institute increase in usefulness, and in the public favour.

From the results of this Exhibition, your Com-mittee fear that it will not be possible to maintain efficiently or successfully an Annual Exhibition of works of Industry and Art in connection with the Institute, and they therefore have taken no steps to organise one for the ensuing season; for they would hesitate to commence a work, entailing so great an amount of labour and anxiety upon their successors without the certainty of a much larger return than what was obtained from the one of this last year.

But notwithstanding the small number of me-chancial specimens exhibited, there are some points of this Exhibition which your Committee cannot pass over without commendation. 

The Library has been increased to such an extent during the past year, and has consequently undergone such a change, that it was deemed necessary to issue a Supplementary Catalogue.

The Financial position of the Institute continues to improve. With a balance against it at the commencement of the year of \$1116 31, your Board have now to Report that by constant effort and extraordinary exertions they have succeeded in reducing the balance to \$321 23.

#### THE LIBRARY.

Whether regarded as an educational influence, or as a source of high intellectual enjoyment, the Library of a Mechanics' Institute is one of the most important of its departments, and has the first claim to the support of its members, In order to meet the constant demand upon its resources and to make it in every respect an efficient public library your Board have felt themselves justified in acting with the greatest liberality consistent with a just economy. Hence they have not only promptly supplied all new works of acknowledged merit and attractiveness in proportion to the demand for them, but in the encour-aging condition of their finances they have felt themselves authorised to grant one hundred dollars, in addition to the regular expenditure of \$25 per month, for the replacing of old but useful works, lost or worn out, and for the purchase of other works of high standard in various departments of literature never yet introduced into the Library. These addi-yet introduced into the Library. The number of books in the library at the date of the last examination was 6100, from which deduct those worn out and lost 250, leaving 5850, to which add 704, making a grand total of 6554 now at the service of the Institute. This great and constant increase of the Library is already overcrowding its shelves, and it will no doubt be one of the duties of the new Board to take into consideration the enlargement of their present library accommodation. In addition to the above statistics the following summary of the number and character of the books taken out during the year is important and interesting :

It will be seen that a very large proportion of these books are works of fiction. It would have been more gratifying to have reported a more extensive reading of works of a higher order, but it is satisfactory to know that the utmost care is taken to exclude all works of a doubtful or improper tendency; and although the balance of reading is largely in favor of works of fiction, it will be seen that the aggregate number of all other works of a more solid character is very high.

EVENING CLASSES .- The establishment of Evening Classes for the instruction of those who have failed in securing the advantages of early education is as essential to a complete Mechanics' Institute as its Library and Reading Room. The Board of Directors are conscious that no feature of the Institute has higher claims upon them than that of adult education? and although their efforts in this regard have not been financially successful, they are satisfied that the trifling sacrifice made to establish this important element of a Mechanics' Institute has been fully justified by the good results already produced; and they trust that under all circumstances the future managers of the Institute will continue to direct their labours to the development of this great object, satisfied that their efforts will be crowned with ultimate success. Whatever may be done in this direction your Board believe that the success chiefly depends upon a judicious selection of competent teachers, and that in this regard the most liberal expenditure will prove the best economy.

The readings of Mr. Vandenhoff have not only The been eminently snccessful as a financial enterprize, but from their high character have no doubt exercised an important influence on the public mind, and given to the Institute a

stronger claim to public respect and support. The Directors again desire to express the obligation they are under to those ladies and gentlemen who have so liberally given their services to this enterprise, and whose efforts so often delighted the public and contributed so largely to the success of the Reunions.

An excursion to Niagara Falls undertaken in the spirit of the Reunions and for the same purpose—the pleasure and entertainment of the members of the Institute—failed in a financial point of view, owing to circumstances which may easily be avoided on any future occasion. In every other respect it proved a most agreeable and satisfactory affair; and the financial loss was afterwards amply covered by extraordinary efforts made for that object by the Reunion Committee.

### THE EXHIBITION.

The Exhibition has proved one of the most important and satisfactory enterprises of the year. The articles exhibited were of the most interesting and attractive character, and the liberality shown in lending specimens of the fine and decorative arts and manufactures, often costly and rare and highly valued by the owners, deserves and has received the thanks of all who had the privilege of viewing them. It must have been very gratifying to the projectors of this experiment, and to those who sofgenerously aided it by their contributions, to have observed the large and delighted crowds of spectators who assembled on each day in the Exhibition rooms; and it is highly to the honour of these mixed assemblies and satisfactory to all, to have to state that although there were altogether upwards of 6,000 visitors, scarcely any article was injured The great success of this underor lost. taking will no doubt encourage future Boards to imitate the good example set them. Such efforts are peculiarly appropriate to the character of a Mechanic's Institute, and especially calculated to carry out its designs as a popular educational agency.

The Board of Directors feel it their duty in closing their Annual Report to express their approbation of the valuable and faithful services of Mr. Longman, and of the other officials of the Institute, to whose labors so much of its success is due.



### ANNUAL MEETING, 1866.

The Annual Meeting was held in the Lecture Room on Monday Evening, 14th May; about one hundred members were present; F. W. Cumberland, President, in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

### ANNUAL REPORT-1866.

The directors of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, in pursuance with the requirements of the constitution, beg leave to present their report for the year ending the 1st May, 1866, being the thirty-fifth annual report of the proceedings of the Institute.

For the purpose of comparison, and with a view to a clearer understanding of the relative value of the figures, and the progress of the institution, the respective returns have, as far as possible, been tabulated in combination with those of previous years.

1.---OF THE MEMBERSHIP.

Total......978 969 1002 1061 989 620 The directors are unable to explain how it is that the increasing attractiveness and utility of the Institute have failed to secure a commensurate addition to its membership, which although it represents by far the largest, and it may perhaps be added, the most useful and popular association in this community, is yet an entirely insufficient index to the wealth, prosperity and population of the city,

Of the 643 adult members probably less than 400 are heads of families or house-holders, a very inadequate representation of those classes of the inhabitants who might be expected to seek the advantages of the institute, or to appreciate the duty of contributing to its support and usefulness.

It would be inconsistent with the proper independence and status of such an institute to seek any support partaking of an eleemosynary character; but the directors can scarcely bring themselves to doubt that a more intimate and wider knowledge of the work that the

Institute is doing, and the many and great advantages it affords, would lead to a more general appreciation and more active support of its labors.

A brief analysis of the abstracts of accounts may be interesting and instructive. the gross income for 1865-6 of Thus of \$7,053 42, but \$2,189 25 or 26-64 per cent. has been due to the subscription list, whilst 37-75 per cent. has been due to rentals, 19-55 per cent. to proceeds of various entertainments, and the remainder, 16-06 per cent., to sundry other contingent and fluctuating sources of revenue. On the other hand, of the gross expenditure of the year, \$6,818 17, it appears that \$2,653 31, or 37-61 per cent. of the income, represents the disbursements on account of the Library, Reading-room and other services incident to the work of the Institute proper and to the privileges of its membership; in other words, that the actual cost of the provisions made for the use and service of the members (exclusive of all charges upon the building, interest on debt, insurance, repairs and the like) has been \$464 08, or 21-19 per cent. more than has been paid for them in the form of subscription, and representing therefore a deficit to the Institute on the membership account equivalent to about 50c. each member for the year.

How this deficit has been supplied will appear when the profits upon other sources of revenue come to be considered ; but the bare fact of such a deficit on the most legitimate item of income, is the strongest illustration that can be given of the economical character of the advantages afforded by the Institute; so much so, indeed, that were the governing body actuated by any lower motive than that of public usefulness, no stronger justification could be supplied for raising the subscription to a standard more nearly equivalent to the actual outlay involved in the service of the members.

Apart, however, from the fact that a large proportion of the revenue is derivable from uncertain and fluctuating sources, the current financial position of the Institute is satisfactory ; yet the Directors would fail in their duty were they to evade the expression of their regret that its vigour is necessarily impaired by the burthen of a heavy debt, for could the management be relieved from the presence of so serious a liability the operations of the Institute could be greatly extended to the obvious benefit of the whole community.

By the care and prudence of many years the assets of the Institute in real estate, lands, buildings, library, furniture, &c., &c., represent a surplus over all liabilities, amounting on valuation probably to about \$28,000, a sufficient guarantee for the stability of the Institute and a cheering incentive towards such further efforts as shall gradually but finally relieve it | circulated at a charge of only two cents.

The wear and tear of the books has become very serious, and the directors anticipating considerable future outlay in maintaining the present stock in available condition, would strongly appeal to the members to assist in protecting the books from injury.

4.---OF THE READING ROOM.

The Reading Room continues to attract a very large and regular attendance of members. It is replete with the best journals of the provinces and of Great Britain and the United States, whilst the supply of the periodical literature of the day is on the most complete and liberal standard. By reference to appendix B, it will be seen that the reading-room files present a list of journals and periodicals unequalled by that of any other reading-room in the province, available at so small a subscription.

During the past year the system of circulating the reviews and magazines has been established with a success which evinces an appreciation of the measure and warrants its continuance. Under this system the standard periodicals of the day (including Blackwood, Westminster, Quarterly, North British and Edinburgh Reviews, Cornhill, Temple Bar, Macmillan, London Society, Dublin University, Chambers, &c., &c.) are

The very large and increasing attendance of ladies in the library, and the evident propriety of making due provision for their comfort, has induced the directors to initiate the necessary steps for establishing, at an early date, a "Ladies' Reading-room," to be open for such a limited number of hours each day as may hereafter be determined, in connection with which it may be found expedient to adopt the principle of "family tickets."

#### 5.---OF THE EVENING CLASSES.

The practical importance and value of this department of the operations of the Institute can scarcely be exaggerated, for whether it is to supplement the deficiencies of early teaching in the solid attainments essential to active business life, or to supply the attraction of elegant accomplishments tending to refinement, these classes represent a provision not only personally beneficial to those availing of them, but calculated in time to exercise a very decided and wholesome influence on the social and material wellbeing of the community at large.

That the want of such provisions was practically felt has been evinced by the increasing numbers who have availed of these evening classes, whilst a hearty appreciation of them has been amply illustrated in the steadiness of the attendance, and the devotion with which the studies of the respective classes have been prosecuted, as well as in the anxious expression of a general desire that they should be continued with unbroken vigor.

It is with the highest satisfaction, therefore, that the directors are enabled to report that the winter session, just closed, has been marked by decided success, alike in relation to the efficiency of the staff of teachers engaged, to the number of pupils enrolled, to the strict regularity of attendance, to the testimony of the examiners as to the satisfactory progress made in the respective studies, and finally to the fact that these gratifying results have been attained without recourse to any assistance from the general funds of the Institute.

The classes, of which a list is subjoined, were ovened on the 16th October, and closed by examination on the 2nd of April, forty lessons of two hours each having been comprised in the session :

Thus, whilst the classes of the preceding year, comprising 105 pupils, involved a deficit to the Institute of \$95 01, the last session with 200 pupils, yielded a surplus of \$3 72.

Under the encouragement of such satisfactory results the directors commend to their successors the vigorous and liberal prosecution of this important department of the work of the Institute.

#### 6.—OF THE REUNIONS AND OTHER ENTER-TAINMENTS.

Under the excellent guidance of the standing committee charged with the conduct of this department, the year just closed has been especially successful, as well in regard to the extent and character of the entertainments provided, as in relation to their financial results.

It has been the object of the directors to supply, from time to time, such attractions as, whilst contributing to the recreation of the public, and especially of the youth of Toronto, should exercise a beneficial influence by guiding the tastes and elevating the sympathies of their supporters into legitimate and refining channels. Thus, during the year, the Institute has given six reunions, combining literary exercises with vocal and instrumental music of a high order, under the accomplished direction of Mr. Humphries,-four promenade and military concerts and three oratorios (the Messiah, Judas Maccabeus and Rossini's Stabat Mater.) For the production of these great classical works the directors are indebted to the services of an amateur choir, organized and directed by Mr. Carter, who, with a skill and devotion worthy of his reputation, has now thoroughly established this class of entertainment in the highest appreciation.

In addition to these the Institute is indebted to the Honorable T. D'Arcy McGee for a most able and acceptable lecture, generously given in aid of the building fund, a service gratefully recognized, not alone for its own merits and results, but as an illustration and example of the graceful sympathy of the statesman with those who labor in less ambitious spheres.

During the year the directors were also fortunate in securing the services of Mr. G. Vandenhoff for eight dramatic readings in Toronto, subsequently extended (under the auspices and management of the Institute) to twenty-two similar entertainments in seventeen other cities and towns of western Canada ; a measure authorized by the directors with a view to public usefulness, and warmly appreciated by the localities thus visited by that famous reader.

These efforts, the directors rejoice to state, have been highly productive to the revenues of the Institute, as will appear from the subjoined statement of receipts and expenditure on the respective occasions :—

#### OF THE EXHIBITION.

There has been no branch of the labors of the Institute which has given greater satisfaction to the directors, or which seems more entirely to have commended itself to general support and approval than that of the exhibition of the past season; for al though previous efforts of a like character had been most encouraging, that now under revision was more than usually attractive and gratifying, and peculiarly successful in its results.

The collection of the fine and decorative arts, of mechanical and manufacturing skill, of foreign antiquities and curiosities, of general articles of vertu, and of embroidery and other lady's work, were alike extensive, interesting and valuable, affording useful information in a most attractive form and unmixed delight to a larger number of visitors than had ever before attended at the Institute.

The exhibition was open for twelve days, viz., from the 20th March to the 2nd April the number of visitors 9,204, and the amount received a trifle in excess of \$800.

For these satisfactory results the directors feel that their grateful acknowledgments

are due to the generosity and public spirit of the exhibitors, (a list of whom will be found in appendix "C,")who, regardless of personal inconvenience and sacrifice, contributed to the collection with a genuine liberality worthy of the warmest recognition.

Nor should the directors omit to particularize the services most kindly rendered by a committee of ladies, (see appendix "C,") who, with the zealous assistance of a large number of lady contributors, succeeded in forming a collection of their handiwork of peculiar excellence, and to the taste and energy with which this department of the exhibition was managed may be attributed much of the success attending the whole enterprise.

The Directors believing that the resources contributary to such exhibitions have not by any means been yet exhausted, and believing also that they exercise a most useful purpose and wholesome influence, would recom mend their continuance; for the experience of the past seems to show that they grow steadily in public favor, and in each succeeding year provide in a measure for their own success by provoking new efforts in the various departments of art and mechanical skill which they are intended to illustrate, and by inciting new generosity on the part of contributors.

#### GENERALLY.

The Directors in closing their report feel justified in congratulating their members on the continued efficiency and extending usefulness of the institute. It has won its way through many early and great difficulties to public confidence and favor, and though still oppressed by a serious debt, it fulfils its functions to general approval. The obstacles already surmounted, the success already achieved, and the warm (although still insufficient) support and interest it attracts, are alike incentives to such further vigorous support as shall at no distant day relieve it from the pressure under which it still labors, and set it free to occupy a wider sphere and to realize a more perfect fulfilment of the objects and duties it professes.

#### FINALLY.

The Directors desire to bear testimony to the continued zeal and fidelity of the excellent secretary of the institute, Mr. Longman, to whose ability, experience and discretion the institute is under increasing obligations.

## ANNUAL REPORT, 1867.

Your Directors, in retiring from office at this, the close of the Institute year, and in accordance with its by-laws, beg to present to the members the following Report of their proceedings, and of the present position of the Institute.

Their predecessors, in the last Annual Report, went so fully into tabular comparisons of the past with previous years, that it is not now necessary to pursue that course, any further than to compare the present results with those of 1866.

The property held by the Institute is estimated at the same value as at the close of the past year—the additions made to the number of books in the library, and the fitting up of the large class room, since the date of last report, being considered by your Directors as fully equivalent to the loss by ordinary wear and tear of the building and furniture. Full details of the assets and liabilities will be found in appendix A to this report.

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

During the year there has been but a slight increase in the membership of the Institute ; but in anticipation of the probable increase of population, consequent upon the establishment of the Local Government in Toronto, and by devoting more earnest attention to this important department, it is believed that a much larger increase may be secured during the ensuing year.

The Treasurer's statement, as audited, and published in detail in Appendix B, shows total receipts for the year \$7,478 31; expenditure, \$7,251 87; balance in hand, \$226 64.

Your Directors had hopes of being in a position to have reduced the mortgage debt, on the building during the year. The fact of the floating debt, of some \$4,000, having been paid off during the previous five years of occupation, led them to anticipate a proportionate success in the reduction of the larger debt alluded to. Various causes have tended to disappoint them in their expectivtions, some of which will be apparent on perusal of the subsequent clauses of this Report.

#### THE LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

Your Directors, through the active supervision of the "Library Committee," have given much attention to the continuous replenishment of the Library and Reading Room during the past year; and although the expenditure for books and periodicals has not amounted to the sum expended during the year ended May, 1866, it has considerably exceeded that of the previous year. The list of newspapers and magazines regularly supplied to the Reading Room, will be found in appendix C.

Vour Directors cannot but express their regret that the larger proportion of issues, upwards of two-thirds of the whole, continues to be in the department of "Novels and Tales." Notwithstanding that many of these are works of a standard or instructive character for this class of publications, it yet indicates that sufficient attention is not given to the more practical and useful works contained in the library.

Next to Novels and Tales, and in the following order, the issues were respectively in Biography, Periodical Literature, History, Science and Art, Poetry and the Drama, Voyages and Travels, Religion, and Miscellaneous Works.

Your Directors would earnestly and es pecially urge the younger members of the Institute, upon whose present conduct in life, and course of reading and studies depends so much their future success, to avoid at least the lighter department of Fiction,

and study such works as shall fit them for the sterner and more practical duties of life.

The issue of a number of copies of the standard Reviews and Magazines, at a charge of two cents per day, each, has been successfully continued during the year. The project which originated with their predecessors, of opening a "Ladies' Reading-Room," has not yet been accomplished, owing to the want of a proper room for the purpose not being at the disposal of your Directors.

#### THE EVENING CLASSES.

The importance of this department of the operations of the Institute was so fully dwelt upon in the report of last year, and again in the report presented at the public awarding of Prizes during the past month, that it is scarcely necessary to enter into any lengthened remarks on this occasion. Your directors caunot, however, refrain from urging upon parents and employers of youth engaged in business, the duty of both morally and practically supporting so efficient and economical a means of instruction as the Institute thus supplies. It is not while boys are attending school, as a general rule, that the importance of sound and useful instruction is impressed upon their minds; and were it otherwise, there are many branches of study necessary for the mechanic and practical man, that the ordinary schools of the country afford no means of becoming acquainted with. The actual requirements of business bring these studies home to the minds of the thoughtful, and the Institute secures competent teachers, and furnishes all the other necessary facilities for the acquirement of such instruction ; and blind indeed to their interests must be the youths, and the parents and employers of such, who need instruction and yet fail to avail themselves of it when so liberally offered. Were the leading Mechanics and Manufacturers to follow the generous example of the Directors of the Northern Railroad, this department of the Institute might constitute it a "People's College" -a pride to our Mechanics and an honor to our Metropolitan city.

Although the foregoing accounts show a deficit of \$49 35 against the classes for the session, they are not fairly past balance ; chargeable with that as in the expenditure, included is the sum of \$108 85 for permanent fittings for class-room, a proportion of which should be chargeable against class expenses of future years.

#### ENTERTAINMENTS.

From various causes, not necessary to be discussed in this report, the profits arising from the several entertainments have been much less than for the previous year. The total receipts from this source of revenue for the year ended May, 1866, were \$5,095 42; expenditure \$3,715 37; profits \$1,380 05. The total receipts for the year just closed have been \$3,279 31; expenditure \$2,950 04; profits \$329 27; or \$1,050 78 less profits than for the previous year.

#### THE EXHIBITION

The seventh exhibition in connection with the Institute was opened on Wednesday, the 20th of March, and closed on Wednesday, the 3rd of April-being open altogether thirteen days. The total receipts (at 10 cents each admission) were \$627 10; expenses \$465 97; leaving a balance of profit to the Institute of \$161 13: or less than the profits on the exhibition of 1866 by \$190 00, and of the previous year by \$34 38. These results for the present year were to a great extent owing to the very unfavorable state of the weather during the earlier days of the exhibition; and in part from the fact of the novelty of these exhibitions having to a certain extent passed away.

Although scarcely any of the articles exhibited had been shown before, yet the committee of management in their report to the board, say :- "They have grave" "doubts as to the propriety of attempting to "certainly not, unless they can be more "varied in their several features from year "to year, than has been the case so far. "These exhibitions have, undoubtedly, been "both interesting and instructive, tending " to create a taste for the beautiful in nature "and art where it did not before exist, and "improving it where it already had an exist-"ence; and their discontinuance altogether "would be a cause of regret to many; but "from the experience gained by your com-" mittee, it appears evident that new material " for continuing these exhibitions on a simi-"lar plan is becoming every year less "available."

The cordial thanks of the members of the Institute are due to the lady and gentlemen contributors, a list of whom is given in appendix D, for their generosity in lending so many articles of beauty and value for the occasion. It will rest with the Directors to

be elected this evening, to say whether not there shall be an exhibition during the incoming year; and if so, upon the active co-operation of the members as to whether it shall be a success or a failure.

#### THE SECRETARY.

During the year your late secretary, Mr. George Longman, having accepted a more lucrative appointment sent in his resignation, which was accepted. From a large number of applications, sent in answer to a public advertisement, your Directors, after the most careful consideration of their respective qualifications, appointed Mr. John Moss to the vacancy. Of the zeal and activity of Mr. Longman, in the performance of his duties, you are well aware. Your Directors have no doubt but his successor, Mr. Moss, who has as yet been so short a time with you, will manifést an equal zeal for the interests and general prosperity of the institution.

## TORONTO MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.

## ANNUAL MEETING, 1868.

The Annual Meeting of members was held in the Lecture Room, on Monday evening, 11th May; Mr. J. J. Withrow, President of the Institute, occupied the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Annual Report was then read by the Secretary, and, on the motion of Mr. John Hallam, seconded by Mr. Rice Lewis, was received and adopted.

Messrs. Carnegie, Hamilton and Harcourt were then appointed by the President to be scrutineers of the ballot.

It was moved by Mr. Carter, and seconded by Mr. Harcourt, that this meeting learns with satisfaction that the lots to the east of the Mechanics' Institute have been secured, with a view to the enlargement of the Music Hall, and would urge upon the new Direction the desirability of taking all necessary steps for the speedy erection of the same provided they can ensure a fair amount of support from the public.

An amendment was moved by Mr. Mc-Donald, and seconded by Mr. Hallam, to the effect that no further steps should be taken in this scheme, but was lost, and the original motion carried. Moved by Daniel Spry, seconded by T. ## ANNUAL REPORT, 1868.

Your Board of Directors at the termination of their year of office, beg to present the chirty-eighth annual report of the condition and prospects of the Institute.

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

While there has been an increase in the number of members. your Board do not feel justified in stating that the Institute in this department presents a satisfactory aspect.-The anticipation expressed in last year's annual report that "the probable increase of population consequent upon the establishment of the local government in Toronto might lead to a large increase of members" has not been realized. In view of the present population and wealth of the city. and the important educational interests promoted by the Institute, your Directors are satisfied that its claims to public support are not fully appreciated. The earnest attention of the members and friends of the Institute is invited to this subject, as offering the safest and most legitimate sphere of effort for advancing its interests and securing its permanent prosperity.

#### FINANCES.

The financial condition of the Institute, in comparison with its past history, is satisfactory. While some of the sources of its

revenues have not been as productive as in former years, a strict economy in the management of its income has enabled the present Board to close the year with slightly diminished liabilities. Were the Institute released from the heavy mortgage debt which to some extent now weighs upon its energies, its general resources and effi-ciency would be enlarged; and its reverues for educational purposes increased. The value of such an Institute to the public, in all its departments of usefulness and entertainment, cannot be too highly estimated, and as it has every claim to be regarded as an establishment necessary and important to a mercantile community, the Directors trust that at an early period means may be adopted by which it may be relieved from the difficulties which press upon it, and placed in that prosperous and flourishing condition to which its public importance so justly entitles it. Under the influence of this faith, your Directors felt justified in negotiating and completing the purchase of the property adjoining this building, on Adelaide street, with a view to greatly enlarging the present Music Hall and affording increased accommedation for the various operations of the Institute. This property secured, nothing is now required but the means wherewith to carry out the contemplated improvements, and secure for public meetings, exhibitions, and musical entertainments three times the accommodation ot the present Hall, besides increased library space, rooms for classes, and other convenient and lucrative results.

Your Treasurer's statement, as audited and published in appendix B. shows the total receipts for the year, \$6,782.38; expenditure, \$6,760.85; balance in hand, \$21.53.

#### LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

The reading room and library are the chief sources of attraction in the institute. The reading room has the advantage of being the only establishment of the kind in the city. In the ample reading resources it presents—resources which embrace the best journals and periodicals of these Provinces, the United States and Great Britain, with a just regard to the views, opinions and tastes of every class of the community, and in the comfort, chee-fulness, order, and cleanliness which always distinguish it, and make no small part of its attractiveness, it offers advantages which could not be secured to any individual member for ten times the fee paid in subscription. The library, an equal source of attraction and interest has been as liberally supplied with new books, as the state of the funds would permit. In submission to the popular taste works of Fiction, the demand for which, while it is a subject of regret, the directors cannot control, nor disregard as they form a large source of the attractiveness and revenue of the institute, have been liberally supplied. They would, however, respectfully suggest to their successors the importance of using every effort to add to the higher, more solid and useful literature of the library, both to satisfy and to increase the demand in the direction of more valuable reading. They believe that if efforts were made to supply a higher order of books, selected from the literature of the past as well as the present, it would increase that class of members for whom light literature has few attractions, but whose influence and numbers would materially add both to the dignity and the finances of the Institute.

#### THE EVENING CLASSES.

Of all the useful and important departments of a Mechanics' Institute the evening classes in their influence on the portion of industrial the community. have the highest claim to public sympathy. The end they have in view is not only to af ford a general education and means of improvement for those engaged in the active and industrial pursuits of life, but also a technical education, such as no other educational establishments provided, but which is most necessary to the manufacturing and commercial progress of the country. They do not take the place of the ordinary schools. but when properly constituted they continue this school education, complete it as far as as possible, and in a special manner direct it by appropriate studies to the special interests of the individual students. It is gratifying to the friends of these classes to find that the Legislature of Ontario has to some extent recognized the importance of the principle expressed in these views, by awarding grants to Institutes complying with certain proper conditions, and that our Institute has qualified itself for the grant of \$200 for the present year—the whole to be devoted to educational objects. either in evening class instruction, or in the purchase of books of a technical character for its library. The example of the government in this important direction cannot fail to give a new impulse to adult and technical education. and gives to the evening classes a powerful claim on the sympathies and liberality of all who are interested in the commercial and manufacturing prosperity of the province.

The reports of the examiners were highly satisfactory, and bore testimony to the soundness and excellence of the instruc-Impressed with the importance tion. introducing technical ot instruction. the Board of Directors undertook to establish a class in Chemistry and Natural Philosophy, in addition to the subjects previously taught, and placed it under the charge of Dr. May. The results as reported by competent examiners have been very gratifying, and have satified the Directors that with proper resources they would be justified in making further advances in the direction of technical and scientific education as applied to the practical purposes of liíe.

The financial results of the classes are of inferior consideration; for the object should be to make them available to all by fixing the fees at the very lowest standard; and it is this view of their purpose and value which encourage the directors to believe that further appeals to employers and to the wealthy portion of the citizens would so increase the funds of the Institute as to enable them to carry out to the most liberal extent the design of a Mechanics' Institute, by offering the best instruction in science connected with manufacturing and industrial progress.

Your directors here gratefully acknowledge the liberality of the Directors of the Northern railroad; and of John McDonald-Esq., and the other donors named in ap pendix B iu sustaining their efforts for the promotion of these classes.

#### ENTERTAINMENTS.

The Directors are not able to report any thing beyond a mere nominal profit in the Entertainments. Several circumstances have combined to prevent this important department of their labors from being carried out with its former success. They have, how ever, no reason to believe that this sphere of enterprise and usefulness is closed against their successors, and they have little doubt that if the Music Hall should be enlarged, ample resources would be available for renewing the operation in a form so attractive and of such benefit to the treasury of the Institute. During the past year the oublic has at a very low charge, had the benefit of one excursion, four readings, one re-union, one Christmas carol, and six entertainments. The total receipts had been \$864 17 ; expenditure, \$862 49-balance, \$1 77.

THE FUTURE OF THE INSTITUTE.

While your directors have thus ventured to indicate, by a reference to past action, the fields of labor and usefulness open to the future managers of the institute they desire to offer a few suggestions as to some of the modes of operation by which they conceive these objects may be accomplished. The heavy burthen of a constantly pressing, though slowly diminishing debt, is one of the great obstacles to the success of the institute. Were that debt removed, the Institute would have at its command the large sum now sunk in the payment of Two ways consistent with the interest. character and objects of such an Institute present themselves to accomplish this purpose. The first, the most legitimate and reliable, is the increase of the membership. Your directors are satisfied that if judicious and energetic steps be adopted, not only by their successors in office, but by individual members the membership might be largely increased. They would suggest, in the first place, that every effort should be made to keep up the existing membership by prevailing on all, as their respective terms of subscription expire, to continue and renew their subscription; and by using induce their personal influence to acquaintances their friends and to The connect themselves with the institute. suggestions thrown out at your last annual meeting, it acted upon, would accomplish the desired object, and with little labor to each individual, viz.: "That each member should, during the year, endeavor to induce one friend at least to become a member." This action would itself double the membership, and at but a slight additional cost of management, would be one of the most (fficient means of increasing the financial prosperity of your institute. The necessity for prompt and energetic efforts, consistent with the character and usefulness of the institute being made, is the apology your Directors offer for submitting

Another most important, and your Directors believe, imperative enterprize that will demand the attention of the future Board, one to which they have already referred, is the enlargement of the Music Hall, A strong feeling is growing in the public mind that Toronto requires a very much larger room for public purposes than the Music Hall; and while the general belief of the leading professional musical men in the city is that attractions and advantages could be created in connection with a larger room so as to amply repay the cost in-curred, your Directors consider that in prospect of any other enterprise being contemplated in this direction, it is due to the character and claims of their own institute that the subject should be fully considered. (

efforts, consistent with the character and usefulness of the institute being made, is the apology your Directors offer for submitting these suggestions. They feel that the time has arrived, when the welfare and prosperity of their Institute may be seriously af fected, and when, by wise and active measures its best interests may be so firmly estallished, as to make its future prosperity dependent only on economy and judicious They therefore close this management. report by urging upon its members and friends the immediate consideration of the messure they have indicated to secure the ends in view.

# TORONTO MECHANIC'S INSTITUTE.

### ANNUAL MEETING, 1869.

\*\*\*\*

The Annual Meeting of members was held in the Lecture Room, on Monday evening, 10th May. The President, the Hon. G. W. Allan, occupied the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Annual Report was then read by the Secretary, and, on the motion of Mr. Thomas Brunskill, seconded by Mr. Alex. Munro, was adopted.

Mr. Davison, in accordance with notice given at the previous quarterly meeting, proposed certain amendments to the Constitution bearing upon the admission and election of members.

After some discussion, it was moved by Mr. Edwards, seconded by Mr. Walton, and carried—" That Section 2, of Art. I., Constitution should be amended so as to read thus:

"MEMPERS.—Any person above the age of nineteen years shall, upon paying a sum of \$2.50c., be eligible to become a member of the Institute, &c."

It was then moved by Mr. Thos. Davison, seconded by Mr. J. J. Withrow, and carried,—"That Section I., By-law No. 1, should be amended so as to read thus:

"Every person desirous of being admitted to the Institute as a member shall, if required, give to the Secretary one or more references as to his respectability; and at the next monthly meeting of the Directors the Secretary shall read the names of all applicants for membership; and that such appli-

cants shall be regarded as duly elected, unless a member of the Board shall demand a ballot, in which case the ballot shall be taken for each candidate respectively."

It was moved by Mr. Higgins, seconded by Mr. Harcourt, and carried,—"That this meeting expresses its regret that circumstances had prevented the canvassing of the citizens for subscriptions towards the erection of the proposed Public Hall, and would respectfully urge upon your Board of Directors the desirability of taking an early opportunity of endeavouring to accomplish so important an object."

Messrs. Rattray, Bunting and Griffith were appointed to act as scrutineers

The President declared Mr. WILLIAM EDWARDS Treasurer for the ensuing year, being elected without opposition.

The scrutineers reported the following officers elected :---

At the close of another Institute year, and the 39th of its existence, your Directors, in accordance with the requirements of the constitution, beg to present the following Report of their proceedings :--

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

Your Directors desire again to urge on the attention of the friends of the Institute, the importance of increasing the membership. Whatever other sources of income the Institute possesses, the subscriptions of its members should be the most satisfactory and the most permanent. The incomes from rents and entertainments are casual and uncertain; but a large membership secures a fixed and reliable income, and is the best evidence that the Institute is fulfilling its work as an educational and literary organization. Your Directors believe that in this department it is open to very great improvement. The subject has in previous reports been brought before the annual meetings, and various suggestions have been made to aid the object in view; but, practically, they have not led to satisfactory results. As the Institute offers in its library and reading-room, and classes, advantages and attractions to all, fully adequate to the subscription paid, you Directors believe that the most effectual method of bringing its claims before the public, and largely increas-ing its membership, is to canvass the city through its officers. They are of opinion that an intelligent explanation of its advantages. and an earnest representation of its claims as an Educational Institute, necessary to the progress and improvement of the city, and especially to the rising generation, would induce a large number to enrol themselves amongst its members, either to secure its advantages, or, in the generous spirit of a patriotism, liberal to encourage and improve an institution so closely as-sociated with the reputation and wellbeing of the community. With this view it is proposed not to leave this important business to voluntary efforts, or to casual agents, but to authorize the Secretary-Librarian to undertake this duty; and as that officer might carry on this labour during the whole of the sum-mer months, your Directors look with confidence for successful results.

#### FINANCES.

There are two principal sources of revenue, on which the prosperity of the Institute de-The first, that of membership, has pends. been already referred to; the next, that of rents, which is always the largest, shows a considerable decrease from the previous year; and as this is a source of income which your Directors cannot control, the importance of relying more upon the subscriptions of members gains additional force. Another source, of income is that of Lectures and Entertain-The amount derived from these ments. efforts has been very small, and will be more particularly referred to under their distinctive heads.

The Treasurer's audited statement, as given in appendix B shows total receipts for the year \$7,321 75; total expenditure, \$7,196 80; balance in hand, \$124 95.

### THE LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

The Library being of such importance as a means of popular education requires a large, amount of attention. Your Directors have, to the extent of their resources, supplied it with the best and most useful books available; but to sustain it in a manner commensurate with its claims, requires a far greater outlay than the Institute can at present afford. The constant wearing out of the books, as well as occasional losses, are causes of considerable expense. It will be well for the members of the Institute and the public at large to consider the importance of having a really good circulating library in the city, and endeavour, by increasing the member-ship, or by any other desirable effort, to place at the disposal of the Directors, the means for adding to it not only the best literary works of the day, but a large selection of those practical works, so valuable to the engineer and the mechanic, and without which no Mechanics' Institute Library can be said to meet its contemplated requirements.

The READING ROOM continues to be well supplied with the leading political, commercial and literary papers and magazines of Britain, the United States and Canada; and which, together with the library, guarantees most valuable privileges to the members of this Institute, at an exceedingly small annual cost.

THE EVENING CLASSES.

The CLASSES have again been very successful. In order to increase their efficiency and to establish classes of a higher character, the directors have for the past two years

appealed to a portion of our citizens for special contributions, but which secured to the donors rights to nominate pupils for freetuition in proportion to the amount subscribed. The thanks of the Institute are specially due to the gentlemen referred to, whose names and donations will be found in appendix.

Encouraged by the financial results of last season's proceedings, it is hoped that the classes-with the assistance of the Govern. ment grant, and other permanent emoluments-will not in the future require the directors to solicit subscriptions for their support; but the work contemplated in the institution of these classes would be much promoted if our merchants and manufacturers could be induced to contribute liberally, and send to the classes their apprentices or other employees, who may wish to improve their education, and thus make availawish to improve ble to themselves the full value of their subscriptions. It is also to be hoped that the youth of the city will appreciate the necessity of seeking education in the higher branches of practical science, and thus sustain the Institute in this important department of its operations.

ART EXHIBITION.

Encouraged by the success of previous exhibitions, your Directors, hoping to stimulate a taste for, and to gratify the lovers of, the Fine Arts, and also to realize some funds therefrom for the advancement of the other and more proper objects of the Institute, inaugurated an exclusively Fine Arts Exhibition, which was opened on the 6th of Octofor ten ber last, and continued davs The fitting up of the rooms for the purpose, and the collecting, hanging, in surance, care-taking, lighting, and distri-bution of so large a number of pictures as were on exhibition, involved a considerable expense, exceeding the receipts for admission In every other respect the exby \$108.53. hibition was a success. It contained upwards of seven hundred pictures, in oil, water, pencil and crayon, and in photography, &c., many of which were works of merit-the contributions of native professional and amateur artists; and the works of some of the old masters, kindly lent by friends of the Institute for the occasion-the whole of which were publicly acknowledged in the classified catalogue published at the time.

The total expenses amounted to \$522.79; receipts, \$414 26; loss, \$108 53.

ENTERTAINMENTS.

Anxious to satisfy the wishes of many of the members, and hoping to realize some profit to the Institute for the labour imposed, your Directors endeavoured to secure the delivery of a course of interesting and useful lectures. Applications  $\mathbf{to}$ this effect made were several to well - qualitied Lecturers, from some of whom favourable answers were received; but subsequent circumstances arose which prevented your Directors carrying out their proposed arrangements.

Your Directors succeeded in securing for the members and the public-twelve entertainments; five of these consisted of Readings -four of them being given by Mr. Vandenhoff and one by Mr. Richardson. A series of seven entertainments, similar to the earlier Re-unions, were also given. The total receipts at these entertainments amounted to volve on their successors free from embar-

\$160 81. profits, It believed that these entertainments were the means of supplying to the members and the public an agreeable and elevating source of amusement.

#### THE NEW HALL.

Acting under instructions received from you at the last annual meeting, your Direc-tions completed the purchase of the Stewart lots, with a view to an eastward extension of the Music Hall. At a susequent quarterly meeting of members, your Directors submit. ted a plan for erecting an entirely new Hall. as a wing to the present building; it having been ascertained that this plan would involve the least expenditure, and leave the present Hall undisturbed for other uses-the whole forming a magnificent suite of rooms, for festive cr other purposes.

The plan thus submitted was approved of, and instructions given to your Directors to purchase certain other lots of land necessary for the amended scheme and to proceed as speedily as possible in its erection. Considerable delay having occurred in obtaining satisfactory abstracts of titles of the lands. first purchased, it was nottill December 1868. that your Directors were in a position to ask for plans, which was then done by offering a premium of \$100 for the best and most suitable, on a ground plan of 130 ft. x 60 ft. Three designs were sent in ; and after mature deliberations, and having availed themselves of the best information within their reach, the premiums offered were equally divided between the plans of Messrs. Gundry & Langley, and those by Mr. Jas. Smith; leaving the selection of the plans whereby to build, until it shall be ascertained that the work shall be proceeded with.

The size and full description of the proposed Hall have been published in a circular and distributed to the citizens. The cost has been estimated at \$30,000; \$12,000 of which is proposed to be raised by free subscriptions, and \$18,000 by loan. The annual revenue anticipated from rentals has been estimated at \$2,\$\$0; the annual expenses at \$2,243; leaving an annual surplus towards sinking fund of 8636,

Your Directors, acting under reiterated instructions were prepared to proceed with the canvas for subscriptions during the month of March last; but, on consultation with various parties, were advised, in view of the then depressed state of city business, to defer the canvas for a short time.

This course your Directors were the more inclined to from the fact that their terms of office were about to expire. The additional lots of land were not purchased, funds not being available for the purpose.

The whole project, therefore, will de-\$540 65; the expenditure to \$379 81; rassment, except the liability incurred in the purchase of the Stewart lots. The latter, upon which stands a good dwelling, while involving an annual cost of \$456 for interest, (supposing none of the principal be paid), will probably realize, should the new Hall not Ъе built, rental of а about \$200, per annum. While this constitutes a rather heavy burthen upon the Institute, it has resulted, nevertheless, from securing the only property available for enlargement, contiguous to the Institute-an opportunity which might not have again occurred. Your Directors, however, in view of the urgent demand for a large public hall in the city, and the economical cost of erection and management offered by the Institute, trust that their successors may be enabled to proceed with the erection of the proposed hall at a very early period.

In addition to the inducements already offered of life memberships to all subscribers of \$50 each to the Building Fund, it has also been suggested that a separate subscription of \$50 should entitle the subscriber to one life ticket for a reserve seat, or two life tickets for ordinary seats, to all Institute entertainments that shall take place in the new Hall. 300 subscribers of \$100, entitling each to one life-membership and a life ticket, or tickets, to all Institute entertainments in the new whole would realize  $\mathbf{the}$ sum Hall, of \$30,000, and leave the Institute with the new Hall free additional from any

burden over and above its present debt, beyond the life rights secured to the respective subscribers.

#### CONCLUSION.

Your Directors cannot but express their regret at the large amount of liabilities remaining unpaid, which, in some measure, is no doubt owing to the depressed state of business for the past few months, and partly from the want of interest in the institution by a large number of those from whom support might be expected. The Institute has, undoub dly, by its library. its reading rooms, its lectures and its evening classes, been the means of imparting instruction and healthful recreation to many of the young men of this city, who have thereby become more steady and better skilled workmen, and who might but for the attraction of the Institute have fallen into the evil courses too prevalent in the times in which we live. In this not only have the young men been *directly* benefitted, but indirectly it has been of anvantage to their friends, their employers, and the citizens generally; and has thus constituted a claim to the generous support. of the Toronto public.

## TORONTO MECHANICS' INSTITUTE,

### ANNUAL MEETING, 1870.

MAY 9th, 1870.

The Annual Meeting of members was held in the Lecture Room this evening, the Vice-President, Mr. W. P. Marston, in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

. The Annual Report was then read by the Secretary, and, on the motion of Mr. N. G. Bigelow, seconded by Mr. J. H. Mason, was adopted.

It was moved by Mr. D. G. Carnegie, seconded by Mr. J. J. Withrow, and *Resolved*, That six gentlemen be elected out of this meeting, to confer with the Directors as to the advisability of going on with the erection of the proposed New Hall, and to report to a special meeting at an early day; the following members to form the Committee, Messrs. J. H. Mason, Robert Wilkes, Alderman Hallam, John Paterson, John McBean and D. G. Carnegie.

It was moved by Mr. J. P. McDonald, seconded by Mr. Thomas Downey, That the Directors be instructed and empowered to negotiate the interest of the Institute, to some party or parties willing to erect the proposed New Hall, on his or their own account without risk to the Institute, with a view of its being used in connexion with, and its internal affairs managed by, the Institute, on reasonable terms, and failing that, to sell the property in question to the highest bidder, at Public Auction, or private sale; but so as no loss shall re-

sult to the Institute, and that the arrangements be submitted to a special meeting of the members, for their sanction before completion. The motion was put to the meeting, and lost.

Mr. J. J. Withrow gave notice that he would move, at next quarterly meeting, that Section 2, of Art. 1, of the constitution be amended by substituting \$3 in place of \$2 50; and that Rule two of "Rules and Regulations for the admission of subscribers" be amended by substituting \$3 for \$2 50; and Rule three by substituting \$2 50 for \$2.

Messrs. J. A. Rattray, W. B. Thompson, and J. E. Cupples, were appointed to act as scrutineers.

The President declared Mr. William Edwards, Treasurer, for the ensuing year, the same being elected without opposition.

At the close of their term of office, and the 40th year of the existence of this Institution, your Directors beg to submit a brief report of their proceedings.

The first and most important department of the Institute is its membership; if that fails, success in the objects for which it has been established must also of necessity fail. The past year, in this respect, has not been one altogether of discouragement.

Showing an increase of 110 members during the year. There are, however, not included in the above, a large number of names on the books of members whose subscriptions have been in arrears since prior to the 1st of January. Many of these have not relinquished their membership, and will yet pay up their subscrip-tions. Had these been included in the above returns, as in former years, the increa se would have appeared much larger than now reported. Your Directors have decided not to include in this return any whose subscriptions became due and were not renewed before the 1st of January last; and if this system is adhered to in the future, it will more accurately show the increase, or otherwise, for each Institute year.

During last autumn, with a view to add to the membership of the Institute, your Directors engaged with Mr. James Rollo, who made a very successful canvass for reimbursed to the ordinary account, the

new members. That so many should discontinue their connection with the Institute. year by year, as the annual returns show, is a fact to be deplored; but with an indus. trial population so liable to change of residence, and the organization of various national and philanthropic societies and associations, having strong claims upon the active sympathies and efforts of 80 many of our fellow citizens, it appears to be a difficulty with which this Institute has increasingly to contend. Even in respect to a class of entertainments which originated in this institution, and which, for a time, were so successful, and have been copied extensively by other in. stitutions in the province, the various churches and benevolent societies have taken them up; and by the peculiar claims to sympathy presented to their members and the public, have rendered the success of lectures and reunions in this Institute almost impossible. If, however, the moral and intellectual improvement of the youths of our city is promoted, though in connection with other associations than our own, it is still a matter for congratulation; but your Directors, nevertheless, must submit that this Institute has strong claims, peculiarly its own, and quite different to those of any other organization, to the generous support of the citizens of Toronto.

#### FINANCES.

The finances of the Institute are, undoubtedly, in a very unsatisfactory condition, owing to the project entered into some two years since, for the erection of a large public hall, in connection with the present building. This project, although repeatedly endorsed by the members, at annual and quarterly meetings, and strongly advocated by a portion of the city press, has, from various causes, not yet been proceeded with In the meantime a total sum of upwards of \$1,300 has been disbursed from the ordinary funds of the Institute, in payment of in stalments and interest on the additional property purchased and expenses connected therewith ; and upwards of \$600 of the liabilities now reported are also chargeable to the new hall building account. If the hall were proceeded with, and these amounts finances of the Institute would immediately be placed in a healthy condition. This must be done at once, or some other means be devised for relieving the Institute of this nongihiliti

The excess of liabilities over assets thus shown is larger than given in the last Annual Report; but here again your Directors have adopted the system of not only including liabilities actually due, but all items of Interest, Gas and Water accounts, Newspapers, Periodicals, &c., up to the 1st instant; although the period for payment of these current accounts is yet sometime distant. Had the same mode of reporting liabilities been adopted, as in former years, the returns would have shown a considerable deduction as compared with the last year's report, notwithstanding the large payments made on the new hall acccunt.

Full details of the finances will be found in Appendixes A and B.

JHERARY AND READING ROOM.

The depressed state of the finances at the time your Directors assumed office, and which has continued through the year, has prevented as large an expenditure in the purchase of books as was felt to be desir. able; yet, notwithstanding this financial pressure the sum of \$256 21 has been dis bursed in the purchase of new books; \$175 94 in binding magazines and old books, and \$484 51 in newspapers and magazines for the Reading Rooms.

During the year several entertainments were given, the proceeds of which it was proposed should be devoted exclusively to These, however, as will be the Library. shown in a subsequent portion of this report, resulted in a serious financial loss to the Institute. Considering the object proposed to have been benefitted by these entertainments, the result was not only unfortunate, but manifested a want of sympathy on the part of the membership in the efforts put forth by your Directors.

The Reading Room continues to be supplied with a large number of the leading successful than in previous years. The British and Canadian newspapers and Liaga number of pupils in attendan ((was 326— ·

zines, and also a fair representation of American publications.  $\Lambda$  few papers, for which there did not appear to be a demand, have been discontinued, while some others have been added. The Reading Room still. claims, and deserves a generous support.

Your attention is here drawn to the very reprehensible practice on the part of some person or persons unknown, in continuing to remove papers and magazines from the Reading Rooms, and in mutilating others. This has been a source of great annoyance to your Directors, and loss to the Institute. Various notices have from time to time been posted up, and other means resorted to; but so far the guilty parties have not been discovered, nor deterred from their dishonest practices.

The thanks of the Institute are due to a large number of publishers, who continue to furnish their papers to the Reading Room free of charge.

The list of newspapers and magazines regularly received will be found in appendix C.

As a strong inducement to the members, beyond the mere merits of the entertainments, it was announced that the net proceeds would be devoted to the purchase of new books for the Notwithstanding this announce-Library. ment and the exertions made to render them a success, each one but the last resulted in a loss to the Institute, amounting in all to the sum of \$106 22; while a profit arising from Mr. Robin's lecture on Scottish song, given under the patronage of the Caledonian Society, amounting to \$28 49, reduced the loss on the whole series to a net sum of \$77 73.

MAY Sth, 1871.

The Annual Meeting of members was held in the Lecture Room this evening, the 2nd Vice-President in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting wore read and approved.

quence of the errors in the nomination list and the neglect to present a proper constitutional list, that the Provisional Board be requested to prepare a nomination list and that it be filled up in a constitutional manner. This motion on being put to the vote was carried.

On the motion of Mr. J. J. Withrow, seconded by Mr. Davison, the meeting adjourned sine die.

JULY 7th, 1871.

The Meeting adjourned May 15th was held this evening for election of officers. Mr. F. H. Medcalf in the chair.

On the motion of Mr. McCrosson, seconded by Mr. Maclear, Messrs. Badenach Crawford and Foster were appointed scrutineers of the ballot.

The Chairman declared Mr. Sweetnam elected as President for the ensuing year, there being no opposition.

### ANNUAL REPORT, 1871.

Mr. S. BRODIE, Secretary, read the annual report of the Directors, as follows :--

The Directors of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, beg leave to present their report for the year ending May 1st, 1871, being the forty-first year of the existence of this institution.

During the year a change occured in the personnel of the Board of Directors, under the following circumstances :- A resolution was passed at a meeting of the Board held on the 6th January, 1871, dispensing with the services of the Secretary, after the ex-piration of his years services [Feb. 4th]. On the evening of January 19th, a special meeting of the members was held pursuant to a requisition signed by twenty-four of the members, to take into consideration the resolution passed by the Board of Directors, and the propriety of calling upon them to withdraw and cancel the said resolution. At this meeting the following resolution was adopted on the motion of Mr Bunting, seconded by Mr. W. S. Smart, "That in the opinion of this meeting the proposed dismissal of Mr. Brodie, the Secretary, by the Board of Directors, is not desirable at present, and that the Directors be, and are hereby requested to rescind the resolution passed at the last meeting of the Board dismissing the Secretary, and further, that it is the opinion of this meeting that Mr. Brodie has discharged his duties as satisfactorily as could reasonably be expected con-sidering his very recent appointment." The Board of Directors d d not deem it proper to take any action upon this until the Regular Quarterly Meeting which was held on February the 15th, the Secretary being in the meantime retained in the service of the Institute. At this meeting the following resolution was carried on the motion of Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Brunskill-" That this meeting appoints a committee of five to confer with the Directors upon the subject of their resolution passed at last meeting, | Leaving balance cash on hand....

Showing an increase in the receipts of \$607 59. At the date of the last annual report the floating liabilities and amount due the Treasurer were \$2,916 45. At the present time they amount to \$2,609 97, showing a reduction of \$306 48.

In preparing the statement of assets only one half the amount of members subscriotions remaining unpaid since the first of February was taken in account, which is a much smaller amount than was included in the calculation of last year.

Under these circumstances your Directors have every reason to believe that the affairs of the Institute are in a better financial condition than at the date of their last report. For a statement of assets and liabilities see appendix B.

#### LIBRARY AND READING-ROOM.

Your Directors have done as much as lay in their power to keep the library and read ing-room in an efficient state. The thanks of the Institute are due to a large number of publishers for their liberality in continuing to furnish the reading-room with their periodicals free of charge.

In conclusion we have to report that all the officers of the Institution have performed their duties to the satisfaction of your Board of Directors.





# TORONTO MECHANICS' INSTITUTE ANNUAL REPORT, 1873.

The Directors, in resigning to the members of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute the trust to which they were elected at the last annual meeting, beg to present their report for the year ended the 1st May, 1873, being the forty-third year of the existence of the Institute.

Your Directors have sincere pleasure in being able to state that the past year has been a period of marked prosperity in the several departments of the Institute. Our predecessors foreshadowed very accurately the position of your Directors when, in last year's report, they stated that " with freedom from pecuniary embarrassments and the other cares consequent upon the management of a large building heavily burdened with debt, their successors would be enabled to give their undivided attention to the immediate and actual business of the Institute." In the year which has just closed it has been the duty and privilege of your Directors to carry into effect the well-defined policy of their predecessors, as they were that it was, in the main, convinced the best course that could be devised to foster and improve the several interests of the Institute, and to regain the confidence of its members and of the general public. It has been the aim of your Directors to place the Institute, through the improvement of its Library, Reading-room, and Evening Classes, and as opportunity afforded, by the addition of lectures on popular scientific and other subjects, upon such a basis as to render it one of the most important adjuncts in this city to the noble work of self-culture amongst the mechanics and other classes of the community.

In the carrying out of the duties to which they have applied themselves during the past year, your Directors have received the most encouraging proofs of the growing interest which has been awakened amongst the members and many of our leading citizens, in the wellbeing of the Institute; and they are enabled to state that, with reasonable effort on the part of the Directors and members, the Institute may speedily reach a position of usefulness and prosperity which has rarely been the privilege of any similar institution in this country to enjoy.

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

In the past year there has been a very satisfactory increase in the membership of the Institute, more especially in the additions to the list of members proper, in which the gain during the year has been equal to nearly fifty per cent. This fact is especially cheering, as it gives greater permanency to the annual receipts than would be afforded by a similar increase in the number of subscribers. The membership at present embraces many of the leading gentlemen of the city engaged in manufacturing, mercantile, professional and other pursuits.

There will be found in the appendix s detailed statement of the receipts and expenditure for the past year, together with a statement of assets and liabilities, which have been duly examined by the auditors appointed at the last quarterly meeting.

On looking over the reports of previous years it would appear that the largest number of members and subscribers returned was 1,160, which occurred in the year 1870. In the same year the subscriptions received amounted to \$2,096. Although the membership at the close of the past year is less than it was in 1870, the sum paid as subscriptions is in excess of that year.

During the early part of the year your Directors were satisfied that they were being charged for a larger quantity of gas than had been consumed, and although the Gas Company was required to make a minute examination, the discrepancy could not be detected or explained. Subsequently, whilst the roof of the building was being repaired, an escape of gas in the wall above the Music Hall was accidentally discovered. It is probable that this W850 has been going on for ten years, and, if so, it has been a loss to the Institute of about \$1,450.

A comparison of the balance in favour of the Institute at the date of the last report, with the present balance, shews an improvement of \$1,166.94 in favour of the year just ended.

#### READING ROOM AND LIBRARY.

These important departments of the In stitute have received the careful attention of your Directors, and they trust that their labours in this regard have been such as will meet with the approval of the members.

The Weckly Disputch, Liverpool Journal Canadian Mechanics' Magazine, and English Mechanics' Magazine, have been added to the previously large supply of newspapers and magazines provided for the Reading-room.

During the past year another member has been expelled for mutilating the magazines; but it is to be regretted that to some extent this dishonest practice still continues. It is recommended that criminal proceedings be taken against the next offender who may be discovered.

A new description of cover, suggested by your first Vice-President, has been adopted for the magazines—it has been found to serve an excellent purpose in preserving the magazines, and from advertisements placed on the sides of these covers the Institute obtains a yearly revenue of \$39.

The books in the Library have been placed in a satisfactory condition, and the daily issue now exceeds 100 volumes.

The cost of binding novels and magazines has been \$51–10. The sum expended for re-binding volumes has been \$186–56.

Your Directors tender their sincere thanks to the friends of the Institute who have kindly made donations of books during the past year,—as per appendix,—also to the proprietors and editors of newspapers, who have generously forwarded their papers for the use of the Readingroom,—a list of which will be found at ot the end of this report.

#### THE CLASSES.

During the past year (the fourteenth session) the Classes have been highly successful. As the Institute had no suitable rooms for the purpose, the Directors engaged apartments in the St James' school House which were eminently adapted for the classes. Some expenses were necessarily incurred in the purchase of desks, &c., and an additional number of drawing copies, required by the large increase of pupils over previous sessions, these will be available for further use.

The whole of the Classes have been under the management of competent teachers, who have been most assiduous in their care and attendance, and have given entire satisfaction to the pupils.

The annexed list of the various Classes shews an increase in the number of pupils equal to 25 per cent above the previous session.

This fact will doubtless afford much satisfaction, when it is remembered that additional facilities are now offered elsewhere in the city, which it had been feared might diminish the popularity of the Institute Classes.

Your Directors hope that this will stimulate the future management to still greater energy in the organization of these most effective and highly prized means of education.

Although it has been necessary to incur an additional expense of \$200 for rent of rooms, your directors are happy to state that, by improved arrangements and strict economy, they have succeeded in carrying the Classes through this session at a loss of only \$59 61, against \$64 81 in the previous session—and this has been done without making any addition to the fees charged to the pupils.

Your directors desire to tender their sincere thanks to those gentlemen who kindly performed the duty of examiners, and to the President and second Vice President for their kind donations of \$10 each, also to Mr. W. C. Morrison for a handsome silver medal—all presented to augment the prizes submitt<sup>2</sup>d for competition, and which, by these additions, amounted to the value of nearly \$100. At the close of the session the prizes were presented by the President to the successful students.

Your Directors have again the pleasing duty to place on record the liberality of the Northern Railway Company of Canada, through F. W. Cumberland, Esq., M. P. P., Managing Director, in donating the handsome amount of \$100 to the Institute in aid of the Classes.

#### ENTERTAINMENTS.

Your Directors availed themselves of Professor Pepper's visit to this continent to make satisfactory arrangements with that gentleman to deliver a course of his highly popular lectures, which they are happy to record gave much satisfaction to the citizens, and aided somewhat to increase the membership of the Institute. By the avoidance of paid ushers (that duty having been performed by your directors) a handsome amount was added to the funds of the Institute. They regret, however, that an engagement with Edmund Yates, Esq., to deliver two lectures, was not fulfilled by that gentleman, thereby entailing a loss to the Institute of \$80. A similar disappointment was also experienced from the withdrawal of an engagement for the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher to deliver a lecture under the auspices of the Institute. The loss in this connexion was much less than in the case of Mr. Yates. It would seem that, in the present state of the law, doubt exists as to the liability of lecturers to make good any losses Institutes may suffer from such non-fulfilment of contracts.

#### CONCLUSION.

In glancing over the operations of the year which has just closed, your Directors see much cause for encouragement in the fact that their efforts to increase the membership, and to bring the legitimate work and operations of the Institute more prominently before the public, have resulted, as they anticipated, in a fair measure of success; and that their labors to improve the internal economy of the Institute have met with the general approval of the members. In view, however, of the various and important advantages to the general public which, in their opinion, cannot fail to spring from a well equipped and properly managed Mechanics' Institute, your Directors earnestly hope that their successors may do what lies in their power to make the Institute increasingly useful and prosperous.

The Library should receive particular attention, and be still further improved and enlarged. Works of fiction and light literature continue to be largely in request, and it is not likely, in the nature of things, that the desire for this class of kcoks will diminish. From observation it is manifest that many of the members of the Institute take from the Library a large number of the books alluded to-this remark applies especially to the young people-and that their reading taste is, in consequence, being more or less moulded by the works which the Institute supplies. Without further enlarging on this subject, your Directors desire to place on record an earnest recommendation that their successors shall careully overhaul that department of the Library at an early day-that if any objectionable books be found in the collection they be discarded—that this portion of the Library be considerably augmented-and that, in future, each book added be the best of its class.

Ficm the evidence they possess of the decided advantages afforded by the evening classes of the Institute, your Directors commend this branch of the Institute's operations to the continued care and liberality of their successors.

It is due to Mr. John Davy, your Secretary and Librarian, to state that he has performed the duties of his effice to the entire satisfaction of your Directors; and, anticipating your desire in the matter, they have, in view of the services required, and the hours assigned to him, increased Mr. Davy's salary.



# TORONTO MECHANICS' INSTITUTE ANNUAL REPORT, 1874.

Institute having fulfilled their term of office, in accordance with the usage customary on similar occasions, beg leave to submit for the consideration of the membership the result of their labours for the past financial year, ended the 30th April, 1874.

Amongst the numerous modern agencies calculated to direct and develope the moral and intellectual energies of the industrial classes of society, Mechanics' Institutes hold a prominent position. It is difficult to form an estimate of their influences, and it is the misfortune of those useful institutions that their beneficial results are not placed more prominently before the public. People of all classes-no matter what their reading tastes may be-must be improved by their connection with these associations, for no one can read such books as their libraries contain, or attend the public lectures, without increasing their store of knowledge, and making them better and more useful members of society.

The cause of education progresses daily, and it is impossible that such institutions will not advance with it. Our city is rapidly increasing in wealth and population, and while new societies of educational, literary and scientific character are springing into existence, it is gratifying to your Directors to be able to report that the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, notwithstanding the trials and troubles it has experienced, the want of sympathy from the religious public in consequence of its nonsectarian character, still holds its place and is continually gaining favour.

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

During the year just closed there has been an increase in the membership, though the cash receipts from this source show a triffing falling off. Previous to the last annual report, a determined and successful canvas was made by a few of the then Board of Direction among the mercantile classes, which resulted in the addition of some sixty odd members. This year no such canvas has been made, the Directors believing that the time had arrived when the institution should be in a position to recommend itself to everyone still continues to improve. Negotiations have been entered into with the remaining banks and several other public institutions with every prospect of success, and your Directors would strongly urge upon their successors the desirability of completing these arrangements immediately on taking office.

> During the past year your Directors regret to record the removal by death from the membership, of Mr. Thomas Brunskill, who was for many years a life member, and who always manifested the most lively interest in the affairs of the Association. Shortly prior to his death he was associated with many of your present Board, and by his intimate acquaintance with its affairs and by his counsels aided materially in helping to further the welfare of the Institute.

#### THE FINANCES.

The financial condition of the Institute of the year as shown by appendix A, are good to the greatest possible number, over. of the previous year. The expenditure as

shown by the same table was \$4,520.75, being \$708,71 more than in 1872-3 The me mbership will, however, to pleased to no tice that this additional expenditure has been made for the improvement of the Library and Reading Room. A pleasing addition to the income of the Institute is that derived from lectures and entertainments, further allusion to which is made in the report of the lecture season. An additional income will be derived in the coming year, from advertisements displayed in the Reading Room.

#### LIBRARY.

Special attention has been paid during the past year to the improvement of the Library. The Board however, regret to say, that they have in response to the demand of the membership, particularly the lady subscribers, been compelled to purchase more novels than they would otherwise have done. It seems, however, only fair, that if 75 per cent of the membership demand light literature, their demands should be fairly met, great care being taken that nothing of a trashy character should be 'admitted—an unusual number of books of voyages and travels have been added to the shelves, and your Directors would suggest to their successors that great additions may be made to this section of the Library, considering that a moderate annual outlay will now suffice to keep up the section devoted to novels, at its The Directors are present position. pleased to acknowledge the kindness of the Government at Washington, in donating to the Institute, the Surgeon-Genwith the promise reports, of erals' more so soon as they shall be in print. These form an almost invaluable addition to the library, and will be much sought after by the physicians of our city. Communications have been opened with societies and individuals in England, which it is hoped will result in further donations.

The Directors also acknowledge with much pleasure the kindness of C S Gzowski, Esq, in presenting a copy of his recent work, "The International Bridge."

It has been found necessary during the past year to prosecute an individual for stealing books, which it is hoped will cause the property of the Institute to be more carefully regarded than your Directors regret to say is generally done.

#### THE READING ROOM.

This, the perhaps most popular department of the Institute is still regularly supplied with the leading newspapers and periodicals. Some few have been discontinued, after first testing their popularity by withdrawing them for a few days, and others have been added. The plan of displaying advertisements on the walls, already alluded to, it is thought will not prove unacceptable, more especially as it is expected that a revenue of \$100 or \$20J will be derived therefrom. Care will be taken to have the show cards as far possible of an ornamental as description, and nothing of an objectionable character will be admitted. A leading Telegraphic Instrument Manufacturing Company, through the solicitation of your first Vice-President. Mr T Davison, have kindly signified their donating a intention of handsome telegraph fire alarm for the ornament of the reading room and convenience of the members. In response to an application of your Directors, the City Council have granted permission to connect with the city alarm, and the Dominion Telegraph Company have generously offered their poles and the labour of stringing the wires free of expense to the Institute. There will, however, pe a slight cost, probably \$10 or thereabouts. Your Directors hope that their successors will carry out the plan proposed.

#### LECTURES AND ENTERTAINMENTS.

Their trials and troubles have been manifold, through breach of faith on the part of some, unavoidable illness of others and sometimes over-estimated people who failed to draw. Your Directors look back upon the season with satisfaction, believing that it should be the aim and object of such an Association as ours to promote scientific and other lectures, and to entertain and amuse the people, even though the profit should be nothing. A list of the lectures, &c, is appended. Arrangements have been made for further entertainments, which it is hoped will be approved of by the incoming Board.

#### CLASSES.

The greatest success has attended the evening classes, during the past year, be-ing their fifteenth session, and your Directors have much pleasure in being able to announce that the aggregate number of pupils exceeded that of any year since the Institution was established.

It was found necessary to re-engage the roo as of the St James' School, where a majority of the classes were conducted, to the general satisfaction of the tutors, pupils and Directory.

Your Directors gladly bear the highest testimony to the general efficiency and regular attendance of the teachers. It is also pleasing to add that the average attendance of pupils has been much better than in preceding years.

In addition to the regular classes, (Grammar, Book-keeping, Writing Architectural, Ornamental and Mechanical Drawing,) classes for instruction in French, Wax-Flower making and Phonography have been maintained to the mutual benefit of all concerded.

Your Directors suggest to their successors for the current year, that, in the event of the re-purchase of the entire building, the best means be considered for increased class accommodation, so that this very useful and popular feature of the Institute may be extended.

The sincere thanks of your Directors are hereby tendered to those gentlemen who so kindly undertook the examinations. It is also a pleasure to acknowledge and record the usual annual donation of F W Cumberland, Esq, M P P, Managing Di-rector of the Northern Railroad, who has contributed the sum of one hundred dollars, and to John Fenson, Esq, for the sum of \$10, and W C Morrison, Esq., for Silver Medal.



# TORONTO MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.

The Annual Meeting of the Members was held this evening.

MATHEW SWEETNAM, ESQ.,

PRESIDENT, IN THE CHAIR.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Moved by Mr. Turnbull, seconded by M. J. H. Mead, and resolved,

That the reading of the Annual Report be dispensed with.

Moved by Alderman Withrow, seconded by Mr. J. E. Pell, and resolved,

That the Annual Report of the Directors be received.

Moved by Alderman Withrow, seconded by Mr. Anderson, and resolved, That the report be adopted.

The President appointed Messrs. Turnbull, John Smith, Wm. Graham, Samuel Whitt, and Charles Carnegie, scrutineers of the ballot.

Mr. Thomas Davison being the only candidate for the Presidency, was declared by the Chairman duly elected.

Mr. Thomas Maclear being the only candidate for the office of Treasurer, was declared by the Chairman duly elected.

The ballot was then taken for the 1st and 2nd Vice-Presidents, when neither of the candidates having obtained a majority of the votes cast; the ballot was again taken, and a similiar result was reported by the scrutineers. The ballot was resorted to for the third time, and the scrutineers having reported that Mr. Dwight had the majority of votes for the 1st Vice-Presidency, and Mr. Samuel for the 2nd Vice-Presidency, the Chairman declared these gentlemen duly elected.

The ballot was then taken for twelve | following resolution :---

Directors, and the scrutineers having reported that Messrs. James Ashfield, James Courtney, John Fensom, Donald Gibson, Mark Hall, W. B. Hartill, A. W. Murdoch, R. H. Ramsay, John Ritchie, Sr., John Shanklin, Matthew Sweetnam, and John Taylor, had the largest number of votes; the Chairman declared these gentlemen duly elected.

Mr. Thomas Davison moved the resolution of which he had given notice at the previous meeting, namely, to amend Section four, of Article one, in the Constitution, by adding after the word "attainments," the following sentence: "or who may have materially promoted the interests of the Institute." The resolution was seconded by Mr. Maclear, and adopted unanimously.

Mr. Thomas Davison having withdrawn, the resolution of which he had given notice at the previous meeting; gave notice, that, at the next meeting, he would move the following amendment to Section one, of Article two, in the Constitution, namely, to strike out all the words after "Directors."

Of the 202 Members whose subscriptions bave expired during the past year, it is found, on analysis, that 96 appear to have left the city, 73 have declined to renew, 14 are in arrears, 13 have joined again, and six have died.

#### THE FINANCES

The financial position of the Institute has been somewhat improved during the past year. The expenditure for books, newspapers, management, &c., have been slightly in excess of the previous year; but, notwithstanding this, an addition of \$375 has been made to the amount now deposited in the Canada Permanent Building Society. Looking forward to the pro- Regulations. The Report of the Commit-

bability that the building will again come into the possession of the Institute, and that in the event of its not being exempt from taxation in the proposed change of the law, this Board would strongly urge upon their successors the necessity of making provision for taxes, if imposed. The amount required will be about \$400, which might be raised by adding fifty cents to the present charge for membership and subscription.

#### THE READING ROOM AND LIBRARY

have received special and careful attention during the past year. It is much to be regretted that members have so little regard for the wear and tear of the books entrusted to their care, for the small fee they pay for their perusal. The attention of such members is particularly requested to the cost of binding during the past year, a very large portion of which outlay would have been available for the purchase of new works, if certain members could be instructed in the fair and proper usage of the books.

The attention of the Directors has 1,121 been specially directed to the following complaints :-

1st. The difficulty experienced in getting access to the books in the Library, on account of the Room being crowded with the friends of members.

2nd. That some ladies were in the habit of taking away books, without their being entered, having, at the same time, in their possession, the full number the Rules allowed.

3rd. -That many books were stolen; a case in point being quoted of a person who has since left the city, and escaped punishment; who had been in the habit of stealing the books when visiting the Library; and,

Lastly, the dissatisfaction of some members, who did not approve of the Librarian, carrying out the Rules in regard to fines, without respect to person.

Having fully considered the matter, a Special Committee was appointed to examine the Rules and Regulations of the Library and Reading Room, with a view to their improvement, if possible.

This Committee gave considerably at tention to their charge, and consulted with other Institutes as to their Rules and

Rules and Regulations, which, it is trusted, will meet with the approbation of the membership. A copy of the Report is appended, and your Directors unanimously coocur with the Special Committee, that the order and regularity of the Institute, demand that the fines be strictly enforced, and they trust the membership, on fairly considering the matter, will agree in the necessity of supporting them in that reso lution.

In all other Institutes that have been communicated with, the fines (so obnoxious to some of our members) are strictly enforced, although in many cases much higher than those specified in our Rules. The Boston Library charges 32 per day, and if a book is retained fourteen days beyond the time allowed, a messenger is sent for it, and a charge of 20c is made, in addition to the regular fee of 3c per day.

Donations of books have been received by the Institute during the past year, from the Department of the Interior, Washington; from Messrs Campbell & Son, and Mr. T. Maclear, to all of whom the thanks of the Institute are due.

The macks of the Institute are also due to the Dominion Telegraph Company, for their kindness in connecting the Fire Alarm system of the City, with the Electric Fire Alarm presented to the Institute by its Secretary.

It is much to be regretted that the practice disreputable still continues stealing of the magazines and from the newspapers Reading Room, examples of and mutilated papers, &c. are convinually brou ht under the notice of your Dir clore. Many endeavours have been made to detect the ff-nders, even so far as the police searching all persons in the room, but the guilt individual has hitberto escaped the punishment, which it is hoped yet awaits him.

The sum of \$13 40 has been received from weekly visitors; and 301 strangers have been ellowed the privileges of the Reading Room, on the regular introduction of members.

By continuous supervision, the number of persons improperly using the Reading Room has been considerably reduced, not more than some 300 persons having been ejected therefrom during the past year, being a considerable improvement on the experience of previous years, and tending considerably to the comfort and security of the members. #### CIRCULATION.

33,977 volumes have been issued for circulation during the past year, being 7,420 in excess of the previous year.

THE SIXTEENTH SESSION OF THE EVENING

#### CLASSES.

The number of pupils enrolled during the past session was 281, being somewhat less than the preceeding year. This falling off, it is believed, was caused by the insufficient and uncomfortable rooms in which the classes were compelled to meet, the complaints of over-crowding in the past, militating against the present session. It is gratifying, however, to know, that in all probability next year, the class accommodation will be greatly multiplied, and it is hoped, result in an increased number of students. Nearly 3,000 pupils have, since the formation of the classes, availed themselves of their advantages.

Your Committee, as far as possible, secured the same staff of teachers, which had already given such unbounded satisfaction. Any changes were of necessity, and the successors of the three retiring teachers, have been eminently successful in their management.

Classes have been carried on successfully in English Grammar, Book-keeping, Penmanship, Architectural Drawing, and Figure Institute; but one which, in justice to Drawing, Mechanical Drawing, French,

Phonography, Arithmetic and Mensuration, Wax Flower making and Modelling, and Telegraphy. The latter, although not conspicuous by its numbers, has been a marked success, fully 25 per cent of the pupils being, after their four months' tuition, capable of taking charge of any ordinary telegraphic duties. The cost of telegraphic apparatus and other expenses, incidental to a proper understanding of the science of electricity, have, as may be readily supposed, entailed a loss to the Committee, but they are sutisfied to reflect, that the pupils have had the advantage, reaping as they have done, the benefits of this instruction, for the small sum of three dollars, whereas the ordinary Telegraphic Institutes charge from \$15 to \$30. The Committee do not, however, wish to convey to the public, that a knowledge, perfect or imperfect, of the science of telegraphy, is certain to be rewarded with immediate employment. On the contrary, they believe the chances of any, but firstclass operators, are very small-really clever operators only being able to command good situations at once.

The attendance of the pupils has, on the whole, been satisfactory and regular, when the inclemency of the weather is taken into consideration. Many of the pupils live at long distances from the class rooms, and the sacrifice of time and comfort they have made to improve themselves, is commendable to them, and gratifying to the committee. With the exception of two trifling complaints, their conduct has been good, especially when it is remembered that their attendance is entirely voluntary.

The thanks of the Institute are due to Mr John Fensom, for his donation of \$10 for prizes.

The balance of the account is against the committee, but the success of the classes is such that they feel pleasure in recommending to their successors in the coming year, to make still further efforts towards the advancement and improvement, of this, perhaps the most, important duty of all Mechanics' Institutes.

#### LECTURES

The season, just closed, has not been as successful as could be wished. It is some gratification, however, to reflect that this association has not fared as badly as many others in this country, and the neighbouring Republic. The severity of the past winter, and general depression of trade, were fatal to amusements and entertainments of all descriptions.

In conciusion it affords your Directors much pleasure, to again record their entire satisfaction with Mr. John Davy's services as Secretary Librarian. His courteous treatment of the members, and the impartial manner in which he has, at all times, enforced the rules of the Institute, have met with the fullest approval.

M. SWEETNAM, May 10th, 1875. President REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

The special committee, beg leave to submit the following report on the management of the Library and Reading Room :-

They have carefully considered whether it would be advisable, to prevent the members, from having personal access to the books, as they have at present. There can be no doubt that the present plan, results in a great number of books being absolutely stolen; many taken by members without being registered, and quietly replaced on the shelves when returned, without notice being given to the Librarian; in many being misplaced, to the great inconvenience of other members, who may be looking for the same books; in many being damaged and worn, not only by members, but by their friends who may by in attendance on them. For all these reasons it appears to your Committee, that the property Institute, and the interests of the of its members, would be best preserved by crecting a barrier and requiring each applicant to receive his book from the hand of an attendant. This system prevails in all well conducted libraries elsewhere, and must eventually be introduced here.

There are, however, in the opinion of this Committee, several reasons wby, it should not be immediately carried out.

First—The rooms we now occupy, may or may not, become the property of the Association. In the event of the latter, any alterations or improvements, would be so much wasted money.

Second—The change from the present system could not be fairly enforced, in consequence of the very limited room, that would be afforded to the public in front of the counter; the small space would inevitably lead to confusion and dissatisfactiop.

Third—It would be necessary to at once have a complete catalogue reprinted, at a cost of from \$200 to \$390, of which sum the Institute would not probably receive back more than \$50 from sales, judging from past experience.

Lastly—The number, and variety of books in the most popular sections of the library, are altogether inadequate to the requirements of the membership. For this reason it is thought, that perhaps members failing to readily get such books as they wanted, would prefer to pick and choose for themselves as at present. Under all these circumstances, your Committee would recommend, that the question be fairly stated in the annual report, and left to the decision of the membership.

#### THE INFLICTION, AND COLLECTION OF FINES

This is, and always has been, one of the most unpleasant duties, of the officer in charge of the book register, and any suggestions, tending to remove the difficulty, are worthy of careful consideration.

Remembering that we have rules for the guidance of the librarian, and that, as the officer of this Board, it is his imperative duty to faithfully carry out those rules as far as practicable, we are of opinion, that the matter should be so placed before the members, that they will see, that no alternative is left to him, and that any fancied odium, should be incurred by the Board and not by its servant. We are led to this, by the fact that with some previous Secretaries, fines were not impartially exacted from all, and that their imposition was enforced in a loose way. The present librarian, by reason of his strict-ly enforcing the rules, has incurred the ill will of some members. This should not be the case, as he merely follows his instructions. The remedy that occurs to us, is to require each member to sign a written form, binding himself to abide by the rules of this Association, the Secretary furnishing him at the same time, with a copy of that which he has signed.

It may be well to carefully examine, and where necessary, enlarge the time for reading the books. If any member neglects to return a book, until he becomes subject to fines, we would recommend their enforcement, even though it should result in a slight diminution in the membership. Any member might pay a fine, urder protest, and appeal to the Library Committee, but all discretion should, we think, be with-drawn from the Librarian, and the onus of exacting payment be placed upon the Chairman of the Library Committee. There being no competing library in the city, we ought to be able to take a bold and decided stand, and it does occur to us, that perhaps our citizens would appreciate the advantages it offers, if it were conducted on strict principles. The members, from hav ing been allowed free and easy access to, and use of the books, think they confer a favour on the Institute by joining.

It may not perhaps be known to the Board, that a careful analysis of the accounts, shows that each member nets a loss of \$1 56 to the Association per annum. This result has been arrived at, by deducting the fees derived from members; from the expenses incurred for newspapers, books, magazines, management, gas, &c. The deficiency has been, and is now, made up

in part from interest on capital, lectures when profitable, fines, &c., &c.

Recognizing these facts, it behoves the Board to carefully consider, whether or not, an increase on the fees should not be imposed. There are two sides, however, to the question, while it might result in some increase per member, it might on the contrary, form a plea for many dropping off the list. Another point for consideration is, whether it would not be advisable; to return to the old system of charging an entrance fee. It is not an uncommon thing now, for a member to fall two or three months in arrear, and then, instead of paying up the arrearages, pay only, from the date of his receipt. It is certainly a most petty way of defrauding the Institute, but still is resorted to by persons who consider themselves highly respectable.

It is an extremely difficult matter, to devise any means, of preventing the intrusion of non members into the Library, when accompanied by members The ladies are especially conspicuous for this, many of them making a trysting place of the Library. One remedy that suggests itself to this Committee, is to enforce strict silence. It is, at all events, worth a trial, and where parties fail to take the hint, which might be conveyed by one or more placards, the Librarian could place a card in the hands of the offender, drawing attention to the offence.

It appears to this Committee, that mem bers are constantly taking advantage of the Institute, either through a misapprehension of what constitutes their priviliges, or from a desire to save money. It should be distinctly laid down and understood, that each member, only in person, has the right to use the Reading Room. and to take out one book, either personally or by deputy. The families, or friends of members have no right to read in the Library, and in no case to examine the papers. Lady subscribers should, if they desire to read the papers, be compelled to pay the same sum as gentlemen, and, in the opinion of this Committee, a notice should be given at the next annual meeting, providing for the admission of ladies to the Reading Room, on this condition. As to life members, their privileges should be the same as ordinary members; while resident in the city. If, however, they permanently remove, they should not be allowed to transfer their privileges, to any member of their family or others; as in the event of any loss, damage or fines,





The Annual Meeting of the Members was held this evening.

THOMAS DAVISON, ESQ.

PRESIDENT, IN THE CHAIR.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

A letter was read from Mr. James Cooper, declining his nomination.

The President and the First Vice-President, by consent of the meeting, withdrew the motions, of which they had given notice.

Moved by Mr. Pell, seconded by Mr. Edwards, and resolved,

That whereas there are, at the present time, only some forty mechanics who are members of the Institute, a fact which is greatly to be deplored. And whereas this result has been brought about by a variety of causes not necessary here to mention; and whereas it is desirable that an effort should be made to induce the young Mechanics of the city to become members, and to take an interest in its usefulness and prosperity.

Be it therefore resolved, that it be an instruction to the incoming Committee, to take steps to secure a Prize List, for an Exhibition of Art and Manufactures, to be held about the beginning of February next, of the works of Journeymen and Apprentices, who are, or shall become members of the Institute, such time prior to the holding thereof, as the Committee may determine.

Bazaar of Fancy Articles in connection with the said Exhibition, and that an Auxiliary Committee be appointed to assist in carrying out the resolution.

That the consideration of the report be now proceeded with.

The report having been read by the Secretary, it was

Moved by Mr. McCrosson, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, and resolved,

That the report be received.

Moved by Mr. Bailley, seconded by Mr. Samuel, and resolved,

That the report be adopted.

Moved by Mr. Maclear, seconded by Mr. Hartill,

That the new Constitution and By-Laws, of which notice was given at the last regular meeting, be adopted.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Pell, seconded by Mr. Allan, and resolved,

That the new Constitution and By-Laws be considered clause by clause.

Section one, of Article one, having been read, it was

Moved by Mr. Pell, seconded by Mr. Badgerow, and resolved,

That this Section be amended by striking out all the words between "called," and "The Toronto," and adding to the end of the Section the following words "including the present Life and Honorary Members."

Section Two having been read, was adopted without amendment.

Section Three having been read, it was

Moved by Mr. Edwards, seconded by Mr. Walton, and resolved,

That this Section be amended by striking out the words "and the usual Entrance Fee."

Section Four having been read, it was

Moved by Mr. Edwards, seconded by Mr. Ridout, and resolved,

That all the words in this Section making a distinction between male and female members, be struck out.

Moved by Mr. Hamilton, seconded by Dr. Canniff,

That the words "One Dollar Entrance Fee," be struck out, and the words "Five" be altered to "Four."

Moved in amendment by Mr. Pell, seconded by Mr. Shanklin,

That the words "One Dollar Entrance Fee and," be struck out, and the words "Five" be altered to "Three."

The amendment having been put to the meeting, was declared carried.

Section Five was struck out.

Section One, of Article Two, having been read, it was

Moved by Mr. Edwards, seconded by Mr. D. H. Allan,

That this section be amended by adding at the end thereof, the following words: "Provided that one-half at least of the Board of Directors, shall be persons engaged in Manufacturing  $\Lambda rt$ , or as Operative Mechanics."

The President having called the Vice-President to the Chair, addressed the meeting, and then resumed the chair.

# Annual Report, 1876.

The Directors of the Toronto Mechanics' Y Institute beg leave to submit their report for the financial year ended 30th April, 1876.

The year just closed has been one of almost unexampled depression in all branches of industry, it was therefore almost too much to hope that the legitimate resources of the Institute would be maintained to their customary standard. That they have been, is a pleasurable disappointment.

#### THE MEMBERSHIP.

Your Directors regret to report a slight decrease in the membership during the past year, part of which has arisen from the withdrawal of the subscriptions paid by two Companies who paid for the whole of their staff. Finding their Employees refusing to accept the privileges of the Institute even when offered free of any cost, the Companies in question felt compelled though reluctantly to withdraw their subscriptions; a further reduction is due to the reduced number of pupils attending the evening classes, many of whom become members or subscribers when joining the classes. A reduced number of pupils therefore produces a corresponding decrease in the number of new Members or Subscribers. Making due allowances for these reductions, it is a matter for congratulation that the memhas maintained its present bership strength, notwithstanding the great depression of trade during the past year, and the increase in the rate of subscription adopted at the last quarterly meeting of the members.

#### FINANCES

This important section of the Institute is in a satisfactory condition, the amount received from Members and Subscribers during the past year being in excess of any former year of the Institute ; and the Members will find pleasure in observing that the legitimate resources of the Institute are yearly steadily increasing. In consulting the comfort of the Members your Directors have expended during the past year, the sum of \$229 in repairing. of the reading-rooms and library, they trust in so doing to have met the approbation of the Members.

#### THE READING ROOM AND LIBRARY

have received careful attention during the past year. Your Directors regret the continued stealing of books from the library, 231 volumes having been stolen during the past year. It has also been discovered that parties other than Subscribers have been in the habit of taking away books by secreting them about their person when visiting the Institute with Subscribers; a Member of your Board having accidentally discovered four persons of one family who were in the habit of so doing. These frauds on the Institute, together with the great yearly loss of books by stealing, point most forcibly to the urgent necessity of enclosing the library and issuing the books by catalogue, as the only means of maintaining and enlarging the library.

The infliction of fines has been strictly enforced, your Directors are pleased to report, with an absence of the annoyance complained of last year. The amount received for fines and fees has been \$277 60, being \$185 in excess of the average of the past ten years, and only 53 cases of appeal have been adjudicated by the committee.

107 volumes of works stolen have been replaced by purchases. The Directors derive some satisfaction in recording the fact of 116 volumes entered in last report as stolen, having been surreptitiously replaced in the library : it is much to be regretted that the consciences of many other persons have not been similarly affected to the profit of the Institute. The sum of \$24 50 has been received from weekly visitors to the Reading Room.

The recent alterations in the postal regulations has afforded an opportunity of effecting a considerable reduction in the cost of newspapers and periodicals, of which full advantage has been taken, resulting in a saving of some \$50 without in any way diminishing or delaying the supply; a still further reduction has also been arranged for the coming year.

The sum of \$1,219 has been expended

cleaning, and improving the lighting on the Library and in maintaining the supply of newspapers and periodicals to the Reading Room.

> It is much to be regretted that light literature engrosses so much attention. The total issue of books from the library during the past year has been 34,205 out of which 27,164 were novels, and 3,155 periodical literature. A novel, when placed in the library, will require rebinding in less than six months, while in the Biographical Section, which contains 642 volumes, no less than 431 are still in their original bindings and very many unsoilcd.

#### THE SEVENTEENTH SESSION OF THE EVENING CLASSES.

The past session of this most important

department has not been so successful in point of the number of pupils as the Committee would have wished, and the able staff of teachers could have conducted. The number of pupils enrolled was 191 and the decrease has arisen from three distinct causes : 1st, The impossibility of procuring suitable Class-Rooms; 2ndly, The competition arising from the free classes of the College of Technology; and 3rdly, The depression of trade.

The attendance, conduct and progress of the Pupils have been all that could be desired, many of the students at their examination having obtained a much larger percentage of marks, than are usually gained by the pupils of the Public Schools, a fact highly commendable to themselves as well as creditable to the teachers. It is much to be regretted that the Institute Classes, so highly useful for popular Education, cannot be rendered more available to the working classes in consequence of the impossibility of obtaining the requisite accommodation.

In regard to prizes, the old system of presenting books has been abolished, in consequence of finding in former years, that they were not appreciated by the pupils in the manner their value deserved. At the close of the past session, useful articles were therefore, presented to the successful pupils : such as a handsome walnut and plated writing desk, microscope, electro magnetic machine, miniature electric telegraph, work-boxes, ladies' satchels, camera, stereoscopes, &c. The delight of the successful pupils was so satisfactory that the class Committee strongly recommend their successors to continue the system.

The thanks of the Institute are due to the Dominion Telegraph Company and their Manager, Thos. Swinyard, Esq., for their kindness in furnishing the necessary instruments and apparatus for the Telegraph Class, free of charge.

The thanks of the Institute are due to F. W. Cumberland, Esq., Managing Director of the Northern Railroad Company for a continuance of the kindness evinced towards the Institute for many years past, by the annual donation of \$100, a donation which was the more acceptable from the past session not proving an exception to the rule, of the

class account being against the Committee. This department is, however, an important element of a Mechanics' Institute, and the great success that has attended the past session, so far as the results exhibit, warrant the Committee in the belief, that if suitable accommodation could possibly be obtained, these classes would produce such results as would be highly gratifying to every advocate of popular education, and every one desirous of promoting the progress, prosperity and tranquility of the city.

The care with which the Gentlemen fulfilled the duties of Examiners, was highly satisfactory to the Committee, and merits the thanks of the Members.

Your Directors cannot close this portion of their report without drawing attention to the regulations, under which the Institute receives back the \$20 paid annually to the "Mechanics' Institutes' Association," this sum is received upon the condition that it is awarded in prizes of the value of \$10, \$6, and \$4 to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd, most proficient pupils. These amounts must, at all times, be in excess of those awarded by the Institute to the other classes, and is the cause of dissatisfaction to the pupils and teachers. If the prizes presented by the Institute were made of equal value, it would entail an annual expense of \$160 to the Institute.

The conditions would be much more satisfactory if the amount was simply received to be awarded in prizes, as the Examiners might decide.

Your Committee also regret that Mechanics' Institutes are unable to obtain the requisite books, &c., required by the pupils, from the Educational Department, on the same terms, and subject to the liberal discount allowed to the Public Schools. The Classes of the various Mechanics' Institutes are organized for the education of those who, in earlier life, have not had the opportunity to avail themselves of the Public Schools. In fact these classes, throughout the country, fill a blank which now exists in the Public School system; and being important means to educate and elevate a portion of the people, who cannot be reached at present by any other means, should, your Committee believe, be awarded the same liberal privileges as are allowed to the

#### LECTURES

#### RE-PURCHASE OF THE BUILDING, AND SUGGESTIONS.

In December last, the Secretary submitted some suggestions to the Board, tending to the improvement and sociability of the Institute. The suggestions were carefully considered and shortly afterwards a letter was received from the Hon. Mr. Crooks, relative to the Institute re-purchasing the building. A special meeting of the Members was convened, when your Directors were emdious rooms.

powered to negotiate with the Government for the re-purchase of the building, and to carry out the suggestions of the Secretary as soon as possession of the Music Hall could be obtained.

The negotiations have not however been completed, but your Directors believe that they will result in a provisional agreement for the repurchase of the building, to be submitted to the Legislature at its next session, when the Institution will be placed in a position to effectually carry out its objects and to give effect to the best wishes and interests of its members.

The large number of persons who have voluntarily expressed their readiness to become members, when the smoking, conversation and games room is established, fully convince your Directors of the ultimate success of the Institute; they believe with many of our Citizens, that it will afford a great and powerful counterattraction to the many places of public resort, which, unfortunately, do not tend to the moral or mental improvement of the large number of young men in the It is believed the proposed adcity. ditions will promote the sociability and popularity of the Institute, and largely increase the membership. Funds would thereby be provided, whereby the Institute could extend its usefulness, augment the classes, improve and greatly enlarge the library, making it a boon and a credit to our Citizens. The Ladies' Reading and Waiting Room would also, without any doubt, be largely patronized, there being no such accommodation in the city. The members are assured that no endeavor has been wanting, on the part of the Board, to bring the matter to a successful issue, but which they trust their successors may speedily be able to accomplish.

#### NEW CONSTITUTION.

The Constitution and By-laws of the Institute having become out of print, the Directors felt that before issuing another edition for the use of the Members, some alterations and amendments might be made with benefit to its working. That Constitution is now submitted for your approval. Many of its clauses can only become operative, when the Institute shall become possessed of more commodious rooms.





MONDAY, May 28th, 1877.

The Annual Meeting of the Members was held this evening in the Recreation Room.

MR. THOMAS DAVISON, PRESIDENT,

IN THE CHAIR.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

The Annual Report having been submitted, it was

Moved by Mr. J. P. Palmer, seconded by Mr. Paterson, and resolved,

That the reading of the Report be dispensed with.

# Annual Report, 1877.

The Directors of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute beg leave to submit their Report for the financial year ended April 30th, 1877.

It is a matter for sincere congratulation that the re-purchase of the Institute Building from the Government, as authorized by the Membership, has been at last completed. A portion of the purchase money (\$10,000) has been paid since the close of our accounts, the balance (\$18,000) will probably be spread over the remainder of The present current rate of inthe year. terest will enable the incoming Board to easily raise the same at 71/2 per cent., or perhaps a shade less. With the alterations hereinafter mentioned, enabling the Institute to rent several valuable offices, supplemented by the profits of the Recreation Room, it is hoped that a sinking fund may be established, almost from the date of the Institute's new career.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

A comparison with last year shows a decrease in the Membership of 82. It must be admitted this is far short of the support such an Institution has a fair right to expect from the population of Toronto. The new scheme of making all the subscriptions fall due on the 31st of October has the effect of making the receipts from this source much smaller this than last year. Next year will of course show an increase, or should do so, sufficient to balance the present deficiency. It remains, however, yet to be proved whether this scheme will be advantageous in the long run. If not, we must resort to the eld plan, and let subscriptions run for a clear year from date of payment.

#### FINANCES.

The finances of the Institute are, on the whole, satisfactory. There is a slight decrease in the receipts from membership, as already explained; also in a few other trifling sources of revenue.

#### READING ROOM AND LIBRARY.

This, the most important department of a Mechanics' Institute has during the past year received due care and attention; a large number of standard works have been replaced, and a larger quantity than usual of New Works have been supplied.

The ample supply of newspapers and magazines to the Reading Room, has been maintained, your Directors are pleased to report, at a somewhat reduced cost. It is, however, their painful duty to repeat the Reports of previous Boards, of the disreputable practice of mutilating and defacing the books and newspapers. This is not their only complaint, persons are found who are not honest enough, to pay the small subscription to entitle them to the great privilege of free access to the books, but who prefer to obtain that boon by unfair means.

It has been the custom to deduct \$100 for worn-out and lost books at the end of each year. This sum, it must be apparent, is altogether insufficient. Now that we are entering on a new era, it is recommended to the incoming Board, that the Library be valued by some competent person. It can do ne good going on year after year estimating ourselves so much richer than we really are.

CLASSES, 18TH SESSION.

Notwithstanding the almost unexampled depression, effecting perhaps most of all, those for whon our classes are established, the attendance during the past session has been highly satisfactory. The following Report, presented at a successful re-union, when the prizes were distributed, details the business of the session:--

"Your Committee have much pleasure in stating that the number of pupils enrolled has been 241, being 50 in excess of last year.

The attendance and conduct of the pupils has been highly satisfactory, many of them nave most diligently availed themselves of the advantages offered by the able staff of teachers, some of the pupils having obtained 85 per cont. of marks at their examinations.

Classes have been conducted in English Grammar and Composition, Bookkeeping, Penmanship, Arithmetic, Mensuration, French Language, Phonography, Telegraphy, Architectural and Mechanical Drawing, Landscape, Figure, and Ornamental Drawing.

Your Committee have adopted the recommendation of the Class Committee of last session, in again awarding useful articles for prizes in lieu of books, an alteration which appears to have received the approbation of the pupils.

The thanks of the Institute are again due to the Dominion Telegraph Company and their Managing Director, Thomas Swinyard, Esq., for their kindness in furnishing the necessary instruments and apparatus for the Telegraph Class free of any charge.

The thanks of the Institute are due to F. W. Cumberland, Esq., Managing Director of the Northern Railway Company, for a continuance of the kindness in donating annually one hundred dollars for the assistance of the Institute.

The prospects which were anticipated as the results from the new venture may be claimed to have been realized, and warrant the Directors in believing the room to be an established success. There is every reason for congratutation in regard to the number of subscribers, which include many entirely new to the Institute, and it is to be hoped that a largely increased membership will ensue, when the advantages to be enjoyed are more generally known amongst the young men in the city.

Your directors desire on behalf of the Institute, to thank the following Gentlemen who kindly delivered addresses and assisted at the Inauguration of this department of the Institute on the 11th Dec. last: The Hon. Vice-Chancellor Blake, Prof. Buckland, Dr. Canniff. T. W. Handford, Esq., Rev. D. J. MacDonell, Rev. Dr. Robb, Rev. John Smith.

#### GOVERNOR GENERAL.

The late visit of His Excellency the Governor-General and the Countess of Dufferin afforded your Directors as they thought, a fitting opportunity to tender to their Excellencies the congratulations of the members of this Institute. The ad dress conveying this was presented in the Recreation Room, when His Excellency was graciously pleased to reply, approving

of the objects of the Institute. This reply, most interesting in its details, it is recommended the incoming Board should publish in the Annual Report.

#### ALTERATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

Having obtained possession of the building, the opportunity is now afforded to enlarge the library and establish a reading rooms for our lady subscribers.

The Board have carefully considered these matters, and, after full investigation, beg respectfully to recommend the members to adopt the plan marked " $\Lambda$ ," herewith submitted.

This plan is for an open Library, as at present, but increased by the addition of one-third of the present Lecture Room, the remaining portion of the Lecture Room to be the Gentlemens' Reading The Magazine Room (extended Room. across the 🕐 passage), to he the Ladies' Reading Room, and the present Reading Room to be rented for offices. The estimated cost of these alterations, including new sashes with larger lights to the proposed Reading Room, is \$1,200.

The directors have much pleasure in bearing testimony to the continued zea and ability with which Mr. Davy continues to discharge his duties.





# Annual Report, 1878.

\*\*\*\*\*

Your Board of Management, in resigning their trust for the past year, beg to present the following Annual Report for the year ending 30th April, 1878.

The Institute being now in possession of ample space for full development, has greatly extended its facilities, in the hope that very many of our citizens will come forward and assist the work by becoming members. Another new department has been successfully inaugurated in addition to the Recreation Room for young men, viz., a special Reading Room for ladies, which while tending to the progress and popularity of the Institute, will, it is hoped, be appreciated by our citizens.

#### THE MEMBERSHIP,

notwithstanding the continued depression of business, shows an increase of 53 above the last annual return. It is gratifying to observe that the increase is much larger in the more permanent section of the membership, the number of members proper being 779 against 640 last year, a large proportion of the increase having been obtained since the alterations were completed.

#### FINANCE.

It is gratifying to observe the increase in the receipts from membership, which, during the past year, amounted to \$2,385 91, being the largest sum that has ever been received under that head, notwithstanding that 240 members pay reduced rates under the club system. The other items of revenue and expenditure are about the usual amounts, except the amount received from advertisements, which has unfortunately disappeared from our returns. The cost of gas is also much greater, in consequence of the increased space to be lighted for the convenience of the members; it is to be hoped, however, that the improvements which have been effected will, with the return of better times, produce a considerable increase in the membership, and consequently in the means of meeting these increased expenses.

The sum of \$10,000 has been paid to the Government on account of the repurchase of the building and lots.

The rooms now rented will produce a revenue of \$1,300 per annum, and there are three fine rooms still to be let, two of which, it is believed, may scon be rented, the difficulty which has hitherto existed, of obtaining separate access to each, having been overcome. This revenue will meet the interest on the liability incurred by the re-purchase of the building and lots.

#### READING ROOM AND LIBRARY.

During the past year very considerable improvements have been effected, in these, the most important departments of a Mechanics' Institute. The Reading Room is probably the largest and best in the Dominion, having ample space for the proper arrangement of the various newspapers and periodicals with which the Room is amply furnished, and affording much greater sitting accommodation, combined with good light and proper ventilation.

#### THE LADIES' READING ROOM,

suggested in the last annual report, was opened on the completion of the alterations, with a toilet room in connection therewith; both have been very comfortably furnished, and have met with the hearty approbation of the Ladies who frequent the Library. Your Directors believe that this addition will be a great boon to the Ladies of our city and cannot fail to mcrease the popularity of the Institute.

### THE LIBRARY.

Your Directors have much pleasure in reporting a considerable reduction in the number of Volumes missing at the last examination, which is doubtless to be attributed to the improved arrangement of the books, and they believe that few volumes have been taken out improperly since the completion of the alterations. They have also the pleasure to report that, of the 256 volumes missing at the examination last year, 121 volumes have been recovered.

The number of volumes issued during the past year has been less than during the preceding year, arising doubtless from the unavoidable annoyance occasioned to the members, especially the ladies, during the long period the alterations were in progress, which has, however, been more than compensated for by the increased facilities and comfort of the new Library.

It has hitherto been the custom to deduct \$100 each year for depreciation of the Library. That amount yourDirectors believe to be totally insufficient, and they have this year deducted 10 per cent., which of course produces a corresponding decrease in the estimated value of the assets of the Institute.

#### EVENING CLASSES, 19TH SESSION.

Consequent on the re-purchase of the building, the classes are now conducted in spacious and well ventilated rooms, a fact which is extremely gratifying to all who take an interest in the work of popular education carried out by the Mechanics' Institutes.

The total number of pupils during the past session has been 242, being one in excess of last year, which considering the depressed condition of trade, and the fact of several other evening classes having been organised in the city, is very satisfactory.

Classes have been conducted in English grammar and composition, bookkeeping, penmanship, arithmetic, and mensuration, French language, phonography, architectural and mechanical drawing, landscape, figure and ornamental drawing.

The various teachers have fulfilled their duties in a most satisfactory manner. In two cases the pupils testified their appreciation by presenting their teachers with testimonials and presents. The attention, and consequent attainments of the pupils, has been of a praise worthy character.

the pleasure evinced by the From pupils at the two preceding distributions of prizes, it was decided to continue the presentations of useful articles in lieu of books, and to present the prizes at a public re-union of the members and their friends. The large hall of the Institute not being available, which your Board much regretted, they availed themselves of the privilege kindly granted, to hold the re-union in the St. James' School House, which from its contiguity and size fully met the requirements anticipated; and it is pleasing to report that the re-union this season was a great success, a very large number from want of room, having been unable to obtain admission.

The Institution is under deep obligations to Dr. Hodgins, Deputy Minister of Education, for his presence on that occasion to aid in presenting the prizes, and for the encouraging remarks he was pleased to make; also to the Rev. T W. Handford, and Alderman Withrow, for similar favours. The thanks of the members are due to the Trustees of the St. James' School for their kindness in granting the Institute the use of the School House.

The thanks of the Institute are again due to the Dominion Telegraph Company, and their Managing Director, Thomas Swinyard, Esq., for their kindness in furnishing the necessary instruments and apparatus for the Telegraphic Class, free of any charge.

This new department of the Institute has been so successful during the past year as to warrant an increased expenditure in the purchase in February last of three additional billiard tables, making nine tables with which the room is now furnished, all of which have been fully occupied. The number of subscribers to the room is 190, and 1,039 visitors have been introthe 8th of November duced since last. This department of the Institute is becoming extremely popular among our young citizens, and has been the means of attracting a number of new members to the Institute.



# ANNUAL MEETING, 1879.

MONDAY, MAY 26, 1879.

The Annual Meeting of the members was held this evening in the Reading Room; MR. THOMAS DAVISON, President, in the chair.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

The Secretary having read the Annual Report, it was moved by Mr. J. J. Withrow, seconded by Mr. J. E. Pell, and resolved,

That the Report be received and adopted.

Moved by Mr. M. Sweetnam, seconded by Mr. L. Samuel,

That Section 5 of By-law 2 be expunged, and the following adopted in lieur thereof:—" No member elected to the office of President or Vice-President shall hold the same office for more than two consecutive years."

Moved in amendment by Mr. J. E. Pell, seconded by Mr. W. Davison.

That the further consideration of this motion be postponed until this day three months.

The amendment, having been put to the meeting, was declared carried.

The President appointed the following members scrutineers of the ballot :--Messrs. H. M. Alexander, H. J. Hill, D. Scott, W. M. Stark, R. J. DeVilliers and A. Wills.

Messrs. Davison, Lee, Sweetnam and Trotter, having declined their nominations for the Presidency, the President declared Mr. Donald C. Ridout duly elected President.

Messrs. W. Edwards, T. Maclear, J. D. Ridout and L. Samuel, declined their nominations for the First Vice-Presidency; Messrs. J. H. Mason and R. H. Ramsay, for the Second Vice-Presidency, and Messrs. A. R. Carmichael, T. Davison, F. W. Jarvis and L. Samuel, for the Treasurership.

The ballot was then proceeded with, and the scrutineers having reported, the **Pre**sident declared the following officers duly elected:—Mr. H. J. Rose, First Vice-President; Dr. Trotter, Second Vice-President; Mr. G. B. Morriss, Treasurer.

Messrs. W. Edwards, T. Hodgetts, F. W. Jarvis, T. Maclear, J. H. Mason, J. D. Ridout and J. J. Withrow, declined their nominations. The ballot was them

That the thanks of the members are due and are hereby tendered to Messrs. H. M. Alexander, H. J. Hill, D. Scott, W. M. Stark, R. J. DeVillers and A. Wills, who have so efficiently fulfilled the duties of scrutineers.

Moved by Dr. G. Wright, seconded by Mr. H. J. Rose, and resolved,

That the thanks of the members are due, and are hereby tendered to the gentlemen who so kindly fulfilled the duties of Examiners to the Evening Classes.

Moved by Mr. C. Borland, seconded by Mr. T. H. Hudson, and resolved,

That the thanks of the members are due, and are hereby tendered to the publishers of those newspapers which have been kindly furnished to the Institute during the past year free of charge.

Moved by Mr. A. Gibson, seconded by Mr. F. Nudell, and resolved,

That the thanks of the members are due, and are hereby tendered to the Auditors, Messrs. Jas. Moerschfelder and Jas. Porter, for their services during the past year.

On the motion of Mr. W. C. Morrison, seconded by Mr. J. E. Pell, the President left the chair, which was taken by the First Vice-President. It was then moved by Mr. J. E. Pell, seconded by Mr. W. C. Morrison, and resolved,

That the members of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute desire to record their appreciation of the services rendered the Institute by Mr. Thomas Davison, the retiring President, who for the past eleven years has continuously served upon the Board of Management, during which period he has been three times President, six times First Vice-President, and once Second Vice-President. Always ready with his pen to advocate the interest of the Institute, and to repel attacks made upon it by anonymous writers in the public press; ever foremost in originating improvements, and at all times to be depended upon as a careful financier and economist, the members feel that much of the stability and success of the Institute is due to his efforts, and they trust he will be long spared to work in its interests.

That the foregoing resolution be engrossed, and presented to the retiring **P**resident.

# FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT.

YOUR BOARD OF DIRECTORS, at the termination of their year of office, beg to submit the 48th Annual Report of the condition of the Institute.

When your Directors entered upon their term of office, grave apprehensions as to the financial result were felt. A commercial gloom was spread over the country, and economy the order of the day in all households. For this reason they feared a large diminution in the Membership. These fears have happily been averted, and the Report presented to night shows the financial condition of the Institute to be exceptionally sound.

## THE FORM OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Submitted in connection with this Report is somewhat different to that hitherto adopted. The Cash Statement is arranged under four principal headings, "Literary Department Account," "Recreation Room Account," "Building Account" and "Capital Account." The Statement of Assets is divided into "Available Assets" and "Permanent Assets," and the Liabilities into "Current Liabilities" and "Mortgage Liability."

The Literary Department is credited with all its earnings, and charged with its fair proportion of expenses, the balance of the running expenses being charged against the Recreation Room, which is, of course, credited with the earnings of the tables and the subscription fees paid for the privilege of using the room. The Building Account is credited with the amounts not properly earned by either of the other departments, and the charges, as will be seen, are arranged with the same view. The gratifying position of the Institute financially will be clearly seen from the following summary:

Or it may be stated briefly that the earnings of the Institute have enabled the Directors to pay all current expenses, and to expend upon Capital Account the large sum of \$1,558 81, and yet leave a cash balance of \$1,214 83 for their successors to commence the year with.

In the statement of Assets the Building and Lots are carried at cost price, which your Directors are informed, by competent valuators, is considerably under their present value.

The Library and Furniture, after deducting 10 per cent. for wear and tear, are valued at \$12,406 80.

As the Furniture in the Recreation Room was purchased at exceptionally low prices, and a sufficient amount expended during the year to keep it in first-class order, it was not thought necessary to write off any sum for deterioration. The total value of our Permanent Assets amount to \$44,075 37, while the debt chargeable against them is only \$19,000, leaving a surplus of \$25,075 37.

The cash and other available assets amount to the handsome sum of \$2,153 83, while the total floating debt, including accrued interest, is only \$903 32, leaving in cash, or its equivalent, a surplus of \$1,250 51.

Your Directors would suggest, for the consideration of the Members, the propriety of charging an entrance fee. As the Rules and Regulations now stand, Members can leave, if only for a month, and rejoin without incurring any loss; the consequence of this is that many Members, whose subscription expires in the spring, allow it to lapse until the fall, and then rejoin when the long winter evenings set in. In the meanwhile, the expenses of the Institute are running on just the same.

### THE LADIES' READING ROOM

Has not proved the attraction anticipated. Before its establishment there were 142 lady subscribers, while at the present time there are only 150 on the list. Your Directors hope that the ladies will make an effort to increase the Membership of this Room, otherwise it will have to be utilized for other purposes.

### THE TWENTIETH SESSION OF THE EVENING CLASSES

Was not so largely attended as the previous Session, but otherwise was satisfactory. The subjects taught were Grammar and Writing, Book-keeping, Arithmetic and Mensuration, Architectural and Mechanical Drawing, and Shorthand. The total number of pupils this year was 154, of which number 14 were females.

It has been customary to provide separate prizes to be competed for by the lady pupils; this year, at their request, they were allowed to compete with the rest, and it is pleasing to note that one lady succeeded in carrying off a first prize, and another a third prize, in competition with the sterner sex.

The prizes were distributed by Dr. George Wright, Chairman of the Board of Public School Trustees, at a public concert given under the auspices of the Directors, in the St. James' School House.

In the rapid growth of the City, the artizan and his family have, from motives of economy and health, moved to the outskirts of the City, and the Mechanics' Institute Class Rooms are now far from being conveniently located. This suggests the idea of the desirability of an effort being made to secure rooms at say three of the Public Schools, one at each extreme limit of the City, northeast and west, to establish Night Schools. Your Directors would strongly urge this matter for the consideration of their successors.

### THE LIBRARY

During the past year has received careful attention, the large sum of 1,155 24 having been expended in new books and periodicals.

This appropriation shows an increase of 80 per cent. over the average expenditure under this heading for the past ten years, and it is believed that when all the new books ordered have arrived, the marked improvement of the Library will have a very beneficial effect upon the membership roll.

As all the new books ordered have not arrived, the above statement does not exhibit the result of the expenditure before referred to. There were 32,920 Volumes issued during the year, classified as follows:

25,209 Volumes of Fiction appear large in an issue of 32,920, but the experience of Public Libraries, both in the United States and England, is in this respect the same as here. Your Directors, therefore, think that it is useless to repeat the stereotyped regret upon this subject, expressed annually in nearly all the Reports of the Mechanics' Institutes of Ontario, as it is clearly impossible to have it otherwise.

As the edition of the Library Catalogue, issued in 1867, is exhausted, it will be necessary to have a new one prepared as soon as possible. Before doing so, your Directors advise their successors to re-arrange and re-number all the books, with the view of having the subjects and authors better classified. In contemplation of such a change your Directors sent the Secretary to Buffalo to examine the system adopted recently in the Public Library of that City, and the information gathered has been embodied in a report, at the disposal of the incoming Board.

In former years it has been customary to close the Library for one week, in order to make the Annual Examination and prepare the Statements. The Secretary managed to perform all the necessary work this year quite as efficiently without causing the inconvenience to Members referred to.

### THE READING ROOM

Is probably better supplied than any other of its kind in Canada. Twenty-three of the leading newspapers of England are regularly received, thirty-six English Reviews and Magazines, fifteen Papers and Magazines from the United States, and fifty-two Canadian Papers are always to be found on the tables.

### THE RECREATION ROOM,

Inaugurated on the 11th December, 1876, has been during the year eminently successful—financially, as the accounts exhibit, and socially, as the cheerful appearance of the room every evening more than testifies.

At the meeting of the Mechanics' Institutes' Association, the representatives from our Sister Institutes evinced great interest in this new departure. Galt

and several other Institutes have already followed Toronto's lead, and it is probable, that before long, a Recreation Room will be an indispensable part of all the Institutes in Ontario.

The privilege enjoyed by Members of introducing strangers is much appreciated, and has proved a happy advertising medium; 1,580 strangers visited the Room during the year, and many new Members have in this way been secured. It is an important fact to notice, that every new member attracted by the Recreation Room, represents \$3 added to the funds of the Literary Department which would not otherwise have been obtained.

With the view of drawing the members together at a period of the year when the Institute is not so well attended as at other times, your Directors inaugurated a Moonlight Excursion, which was exceedingly successful.

### THE MECHANICS' INSTITUTES' ASSOCIATION

Held its Annual Meeting in the Reading Room of this Institute on the 24th September last, when the usual interesting business of the Association was transacted. In compliance with a resolution passed at this meeting, a convention of representatives from the various Institutes of Ontario was held in this Institute on the 11th of February. There was a large attendance, and no doubt good will result from the various well sustained discussions which took place.

YOUR DIRECTORS are of the opinion that an alteration should be made in the procedure provided for the annual election of Directors, in order to obtain the fullest possible vote on the occasion. As now conducted, only about 13 per cent of the members record their wishes. Your Directors believe that if the Constitution were altered so that the Ballot should remain open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on the day of the Annual Meeting, a much larger and better expression of opinion would be the result.

The recent change in the Tariff having added materially to the cost of books, your Directors, in retiring from office, would suggest to their successors the advisability of petitioning the Government to allow a rebate of the duty on books purchased for the use of Mechanics' Institutes. Such a petition would no doubt be endorsed by all similar institutes in Canada, and would receive the favourable consideration of the Government, when they were reminded of the fact that the Public Libraries in the United States are allowed this privilege.

The usual Certificate from the Auditors appointed by the members to examine the Books and Accounts of the Institute is appended, and also one from the Government Inspector. Your Directors have pleasure in drawing attention to the compliment paid by them to Mr. Davy, and cheerfully certify to the continued zeal displayed by him in the interest of the Institute.

### FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT.

YOUR Directors on retiring from office, beg to present the following report of their proceedings and the present position of the Institute.

### FINANCE.

The gross income from the Literary Department amounted to \$3,856 48, and the expenditure, without counting the cost of new books, to \$3,462 18, leaving a balance of \$394 30, an improvement of \$73 over last year.

The gross income from the Recreation Room amounted to \$2,050 78, and the expenditure, without counting the cost of new furniture, to \$1,359 29, leaving a balance of \$691 49. a decrease of \$396 53 as compared with the net amount received last year.

The rents realized \$1,465 87, and the expenditure on account of insurance, repairs, and such items, chargeable to the Building, amounted to \$583 59, leaving a balance of \$882 28 to carry to the General Account.

On turning to the General Account, it appears that the Institute commenced the year with a cash balance of \$1,214 83; borrowed \$14,000, which with the balances from the other accounts amounting to \$2,072 39 made a total of \$17,287 22, which was applied as follows:—

Although the balance on hand is not so large as the year was commenced with, the \$1,000 paid to discharge the Stewart mortgage more than accounts for the difference.

In the statement of Assets, the building and land it occupies are carried at the value placed upon them in December last by Mr. J. W. G. Whitney; the two lots on Adelaide Street are placed at their cost price, while a reduction of 25 per cent. on the value of the Library and its Furniture places these Assets at a reasonable figure.

In February, 1878, the property occupied by the Institute was

repurchased for the sum of \$28,000 and a mortgage for \$1,000, in all \$29,000. In May of that year \$10,000 was paid on account, but since that date no further sum, except interest on the \$1,000 was paid until January of this year, when the mortgage was discharged and a further sum of \$14,000 paid on account of the purchase, leaving a balance of \$4,000 and the accrued interest to be provided for. An arrangement was made to capitalize the accrued interest and adding it to the balance referred to; the whole has been made a mortgage debt bearing six per cent., on condition that a sinking fund of \$200 per annum be provided.

An examination of the Statements submitted with this report will show that with ordinary prudence the income of the Institute is sufficient to meet all charges, including what is now a new item, viz., Interest and Sinking Fund, amounting in all to \$1,540.

The income of the Institute from all sources, except the \$14,000 borrowed, amounted in the past year to \$8,692 28; and the expenditure, apart from the payments on account of the property and \$110 interest, amounted to \$6,751 15, leaving a balance of \$1,941 13, sufficient to have met the Interest and Sinking Fund, and to have left a balance of \$400 on hand. Your Directors have no reason to believe that the income will be less for the coming year, and as the Furniture in the Recreation Room is now complete and in first-class order, they anticipate a reduction in the items of Repairs and New Furniture, upon which was expended \$486 05 during 1879-80.

The reduction is in a measure accounted for by the closing of the Consolidated Bank, 10 Members; the withdrawal of the Dominion Telegraph Company Employees, 15: the Medical Association, 35; and Bank of Montreal, 18. In the Annual Report of 1865-66, astonishment is expressed "that so small a proportion of the citizens avail themselves of the advantages offered by the Institute." In that year there were, counting all Classes, 978 Members, only 72 less than is shown in the present Report. There were 6,958 volumes in the Library, and the annual issue amounted to 29,078. The gross income was \$7,053 42, and the expenditure under the heads now classified in the Literary Department has scarcely altered. When it is considered that the Institute is fifteen years older and the population of the city at least one-third greater, your Directors think that a comparison of the Financial Statement of 1865, with that submitted with this Report, will astonish many well-wishers of the Institute.

If the utter stagnation exhibited arises from any fault in the management it is time that it were discovered, as it appears from past Reports that no Board of Directors since 1861, when the membership rose from 620 to 989, has yet succeeded in discovering the talisman to induce a support from the citizens proportionate to the advantages offered by the Institute.

Your Directors invite discussion on this point in order that their successors may have the benefit of the views of all the Members who take an interest in the matter.

### THE LIBRARY

Is now in a very fair condition, all the old and soiled books have been replaced by new editions and many new books have been added. The the amount expended during the year was divided as follows:

In order to meet the wishes of a large class of the Members, the system of fines has for a short period been suspended; but the experience has convinced your Directors that fines are necessary in order to insure the return of the books within a reasonable period.

### THE LADIES' READING ROOM.

Your Directors regret that they are obliged to draw attention to the failure of this room to attract the support expected. It has not effected the membership in the slightest degree, nor can it be given credit for any increased receipts. Early in the year your Directors invited the ladies to meet together and discuss the matter in order to discover, if possible, what steps should be taken to insure a fair return for the outlay in establishing this room. As no one responded to the invitation your Directors assume that the ladies do not appreciate the advantage of this room, and therefore advise their successors either to charge a special fee to those wishing to use it or to close and utilize the room for some other purpose.

### THE TWENTY-FIRST SESSION OF THE EVENING CLASSES

Was largely attended, showing a marked improvement as compared with last year.

In compliance with a suggestion made in last year's Report, informal overtures were made by your Directors to the Board of Public School Trustees to open, in connection with the Institute, Evening Classes in the Public Schools. There were, however, legal difficulties in the way which prevented an amalgamation of this kind, but it is gratifying to record that following up the suggestion made by the Institute, the Trustees opened Evening Classes in their Schools, which were so largely attended that they intend carrying out the scheme on a much larger scale next winter.

Now that the School Trustees have determined to open Evening Classes during the winter months, where reading, writing, arithmetic, and probably one or two other elementary subjects will be taught free of charge, it will, of course, be impossible to continue the same character of Evening Classes which for twenty-one years have been conducted under the auspices of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute.

It will be the duty of the incoming Board of Directors to devise a new system of Evening Classes for next winter. Classes for instruction in the higher branches of Mathematics, in Architectural and Mechanical Drawing, in French, German and other such Classes not undertaken by the free Evening Schools, should be undertaken by the Institute, and, if possible, a system of popular lectures in History, Chemistry and other subjects should be inaugurated.

In order to secure a suitable Lecture Hall, it will only be necessary to remove the partitions forming the Class-rooms when a hall 76 feet by 35 feet will be provided. Besides using this hall for Lectures, it will be possible to hire it out for public meetings and private gatherings, thereby making a part of the Institute hitherto un remunerative a permanent source of revenue.

### RETURN OF THE EVENING CLASSES.

### GERMAN.

The Recreation Room continues to be an important department of the Institute. Although the income derived from it was not so large as last year, socially it was in every respect quite as successful, and no doubt attracted a class of Members which would not otherwise have joined the Institute. Your Directors are of opinion that the falling off in the revenue is due in a large extent to the opening of a number of Public Billiard Rooms in convenient and central situations, and the reduction, in many cases, of the charge to onehalf the usual rates. In noticing this reduction in the revenue it must be remembered that the original object of the Room did not aim so much at making it a source of profit, but more with a view of affording the young men of the city an innocent and healthful place of amusement.

Your Directors believe it a matter of satisfaction that, although the Room has only been opened about three and a half years, the whole cost of its equipment, consisting of eleven first-class tables with the necessary fittings, gas fixtures, &c., has been defrayed from the profits after the payment of attendance, gas, heating and all other expenses chargeable against this Department, and leaving a balance in hand to its credit of \$268 in excess of all liabilities. The total expenditure in fitting up the Room has amounted to \$2,150, which, with the balance of \$268 makes a total of \$2,418, representing the net profit which has accrued to the Institute since its establishment.

A large number of visitors have been introduced during the year; of these, 75 have become Members of the Institute, who would not otherwise have been obtained, and the revenue of the Literary Department has thereby been considerably augumented. The membership now numbers 213; and it is gratifying to your Directors to

be able to state that not one complaint has been made against the management during the year. Taken altogether the results are all that could have been reasonably expected; many young men spending their evenings in this Department in social converse and relaxation apart from every detrimental influence.

The thanks of the Institute are due to Mr. Cumberland and the Directors of the Northern Railway for the annual grant of of \$100 which has been generously contributed by this Railroad since 1862.

The usual Certificate from the Auditors appointed by the Members to examine the Books and Accounts of the Institute is appended, countersigned by the Government Inspector.

Your Directors have pleasure in certifying to the continued zeal displayed by Mr. Davy in the interest of the Institute.

## FIFTIETH ANNUAL REPORT.

Your Board of Management beg to present the following Report for the year ended 30th of April, 1881.

### MEMBERSHIP.

It is a gratifying fact that the Membership has been so well maintained; it had been feared that the improvement manifested in business circles would seriously interfere with the work of Mechanics' Institutes, as exemplified by its effect on the Public Libraries of the United States. The following paragraph is quoted from the Report of the Chicago Public Library :

"The recent Reports of all Public Libraries concur in the statement that the general revival in every branch of business during the past year, has diminished their circulation and the use of their reference books. The explanation is in the obvious fact that their patrons are so engrossed in business that they have not so much time for reading as formerly. Our statistics show the same result, the circulation for the past year being 16 per cent. below that of last year."

### FINANCE.

The loss of revenue from the Recreation Room, the severity of the past winter, (which entailed an additional expense of \$329 for heating) combined with the decreased rentals resulting from the inability of procuring suitable tenants for some portions of the building hitherto rented, have seriously affected the finances.

A mutually advantageous arrangement has, however, been made with the Toronto Lacrosse Club, whereby they have rented the Classrooms for a period of five years, and it is anticipated that, consequent on the increased business activity now manifested in the City, the rooms, at present vacant, will soon be tenanted.

### LIBRARY.

This important department has received careful consideration during the past year. The long desired printed catalogue has been published, and copies supplied free to the members and subscribers, while a large number have been distributed throughout the City. The financial position of the Institute has prevented as large an addition of new books as could have been desired, but it is confidently expected that the publication and distribution of the new Catalogue will cause a marked increase in the Membership, when, with the larger revenue, a fuller supply of new works may be obtained.

### EVENING CLASSES.

In view of the fact that the Puble School Board had opened free Evening Schools in various parts of the City, it was not deemed politic to continue the Classes so long carried on by the Institute, as such a course would assuredly have entailed a considerable loss.

### **RECREATION ROOM.**

It is a matter of regret that this Department, established to afford facilities for innocent amusement and relaxation, apart from all evil associations, has not been more largely appreciated by the younger portion of the community. The entire cost of fitting and furnishing having been defrayed out of the Receipts of the room, the special subscription of one dollar per annum was abolished in April last, and the room opened to the general Membership of the Institute. This course has produced such gratifying results that its continuance is strongly recommended.

The late F. W. CUMBERLAND, Esq., was elected a Life Member in 1848, and had held the position of President and other important offices in the management of the Institute. To his skill, energy and personal supervision, the Institute is largely indebted for the substantial building in which it is located. He always evinced the warmest interest in the welfare and success of the Institute, and was at all times ready to assist in promoting its prosperity. By his death the Institute has lost a tried and trusted friend, and a faithful advocate,

The late THOMAS DAVISON, Esq., had for the past 24 years been actively associated with the Management of the Institute; thrice he held the position of President, and for seven years occupied the office of Vice-President. During his long connection with the Institute he was ever foremost in assiduously serving to promote its interest. His loss will long be felt and sincerely regretted.

The late WM. GOODERHAM, Esq., A. T. MCCORD, Esq., and DR. RYERSON were old and highly esteemed Life Members, who were ever ready to promote the success of the Institute in which they took a deep interest.

### FINANCE.

The year just closed was commenced under peculiarly discouraging circumstances. The receipts from the Recreation room had seriously decreased, a very large portion of the building was lying unremunerative, the yearly rentals being \$600 less than the annual interest on the mortgages, and in addition to which, the sum of \$630 remained unpaid of the working expenses of the previous year.

It is now, however, gratifying to report that nearly all the building not required for the Institute purposes, is rented on leases to highly satisfactory tenants, the rentals of which amount to \$200 per annum above the interest payable yearly on the mortgages. One small room and the basement are vacant, but it is hoped that tenants for these may soon be obtained. The returns from the Recreation room have also considerably increased during the last few months. The total revenue of the Institute for the past year

With the exception of Gas and Water accounts for April last, all the working expenses of the Institute to the close of the year have been fully paid.

### THE LIBRARY AND READING ROOM

have received earnest consideration, but the urgent necessity for the most rigid economy in all the departments of the Institute prevented much being done that was highly desirable. The improved financial position, will, however, now permit more liberal measures to be adopted in the supply of new books and periodicals.

Previous to 1878, scarcely any deduction for loss and depreciation had been made from the annual valuation of the Library, Furniture, &c. From that date a yearly deduction has been made,—in 1878, \$1,305; in 1879, \$1,250; in 1880, \$2,812.89; in 1881, \$2,332.58, and in the past year, \$737.37, making a total reduction of \$8,437.84. A deduction of ten per cent. has also been made in the past year in the valuation of the Furniture, &c., in the Recreation Room. The amount, \$6,916.38, placed as the present value of the Library, Furniture, &c., is fully believed to be a cash value and greatly under what they could be replaced for.
