Notice to Manufacturers.

The corporation of the town of West Toronto Junction offer the following privileges to all manufacturers locating in the town, and employing on an average forty hands all the year around, provided that twenty of the employees reside within the limits of the town.

1. Exemption from general taxation for ten years.

2. Water at cost for ten years.

The following railways at present run through the limits of the town : C.P.R.-Ontario and Quebec Division.


Credit Valley Division.

Grey and Bruce Division.


G.T.R.-Western Division.

In addition to these, the C.P.R. Co. have ag ced to connect the new Buffalo and Hamilton line, and the proposed line to Sudbury with the lines already running through the town, thus connecting at this point the coal mines of Pennsylvania with the chief source of mineral wealth in Ontario. The new Belt Line round Toronto will pass through the centre of the town, the roadway

THE C.P.R. SHOPS.

The Canadian Pacific **Rai**lway Company have agreed in writing to commence at once the erection of the Repair Shops for the whole of the Ontario Division on the land now held by them in the heart of the town, immediately west of present C.P.R. station.

In these shops there will be employed at the start over three hundred hands, and within three years, from seven hundred to one thousand men, all of whom, from the nature of their employment, will be compelled to live within the limits of the town.


The Company propose to erect a club house and reading rooms for the use of their men, and to make this a centre for all their employees in this district.



THE REASONS OF THE GROWTH OF WEST TO-RONTO JUNCTION.

I. ITS SITUATION.

Lying to the north-west of the city of Toronto, five miles from the corner of Yonge and King Streets. High Park lies on the southern limit of the town, shutting off the growth of Toronto on the southwest, and thus forcing all the western growth of that city into West Toronto Junction. The distance from Toronto is sufficiently great to make of West Toronto Junction a commercial centre, and thus business men have all the advantages of the rapid growth of a western city, within fifteen minutes' run of Toronto.

2. THE ADVANTAGES OFFERED TO MANUFACTURERS:


The proximity to Toronto, the centre of commercial competition in Ontario; unrivalled shipping facilities: the privileges granted by the corporation to factories locating in the town [see inside of cover]; cheap factory sites; cheap houses for employees; gcod fire protection.


3. THE NATURAL BEAUTY OF THE RESIDENTIAL QUARTER.

The greater part of the land south of the railway is subject to building restrictions. Houses of a certain class only can be erected. The land lying south of the station is intersected by numerous thicklywooded ravines affording more beautiful sites for dwellings than can be found anywhere within the same distance of Toronto. The elevation is high, overlooking Lake Ontario; the soil is sandy, and absorbs all moisture rapidly. Residents have all the enjoyment of High Park at their doors, while the expense of maintaining it is borne by the city of Toronto.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

Two fine subways are in course of erection under the Canadian Pacific Railway on Keele Street and the Weston Road. These will afford verfect communication between the northern and southern portions of the town, and will open up a connection with some of the finest farming districts in Ontario. 27,500 feet of sidewalks have been laid down during the past year. Block-paving has been laid on two of the principal streets. A comprehensive system of sewerage is about to be commenced, and will be completed during the current year. The waterworks, complete l in August, 1889, have been pronounced by the Secretary of the Underwriters' Association, to be the most perfect in Ontario. Two fire halls are in course of erection, full equipments for which have already been purchased.






WEST TORONTO JUNCTION PLANING MILL.




