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
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
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

# Preface.

The Committee on Annual would again respectfully submit for the benefit of members of the Branch, the Ninth Volume of the yearly hand-book of the Association.

An apology is due for its late appearance again this year; but the fault is not that of the Committee. If clubs will not send in their returns in May and October more promptly, then the Annual cannot be issued on the First of December.

The Association has now increased to over sixty clubs, and as a result the Annual has perceptibly increased in size. It is pleasing to find an increase of interest in a publication which has been mainly instrumental in the rapid development of curling throughout Western Canada.

The Volume is replete with news of interest to members of the curling fraternity. The Constitution, rules of the game, district and bonspiel reports, and an interesting curling miscellany and songs, will amply repay perusal by every curler. Three deaths are also recorded in the obituary section.

The Work will be found exceedingly interesting from an artistic standpoint. The cover is emblematic of the game, and an excellent litho-photo production of local artists. An excellent photo of President Black adorns the frontispiece, and elsewhere through the work are fine photos of leading patrons of the game.

The records of the Ninth Annual Bonspiel, with the appended diagram of scores, under the Bagnall-Wyld System of drawing, will interest all who took part in the conflict of last year. The plates illustrative of a Rink and the Points game will be instructive to new curlers.

It was found impossible to summarize the apound reports this year, owing to the late date at which the majority of them were received. The annual reports must be sent in by the First of May, and semiannual, not later than the First of Novemberg, to give the Secretary some reasonable time to get the ANNUAL out at the proper time.



## CONSTITUTION

#### CHAP. I.—THE CONSTITUTION.

1. The Association shall be called the Manitoba Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club.

2. Its object shall be to promote the Game of Curling, particularly in the Province of Manitoba and the Northwest Territories; to unite all the curling clubs therein into one organization; to hold fraternal intercourse with other neighboring curling associations; and to maintain connection with the Royal Caledonian Curling Club of Scotland.

3. Its membership shall consist of the members, *Regular and Honor*ary, of all curling clubs which may be received into the Association, and conform to the rules thereof, as adopted.

4. The affairs of the Association shall be managed by a Representative Committee, composed of two representatives appointed by each affiliated club, as hereinafter provided, which shall have power to elect from amongst themselves the office-bearers of the Association, and to appoint committees for the transaction of the business thereof.

5. An Annual General Meeting of the members of the Representative Committee shall be held in Winnipeg, on the Tuesday of the week of the Winnipeg Industrial Fair in each year, to receive the Annual Report of the Executive Council of the Association, and take action upon the same; and to transact such other business as may be necessary.

6. No new law shall be enacted, and no existing law shall be altered or repealed, until approved of by at least two-thirds of the members present at the Annual General Meeting of the Association, and unless notice of such alteration or addition shall have been previously given at the preceding Annual or Semi-Annual Meeting.

#### CHAP. IL-CLUBS.

1. Any curling club shall be eligible to be received into the Association, which has a membership of not fewer than eight persons; and which has a constitution and a staff of office-bearers, including President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, and two Representative Members.

2. Clubs may be received into the Association at any meeting of the Representative Committee; and at any meeting of the Executive Council, if given power to do so at any regular meeting of the Representative Committee.

3. Every club desiring admission into the Association shall furnish a list of its office-bearers and members, and name of club; and shall agree to be governed by the Rules of the Association; and must be proposed by one member of the Representative Committee and seconded by another; and a two-thirds majority of votes of those present shall decide the question.

4. Every club shall elect annually, and not later than two months before the date of the Annual Meeting, two persons as its delegates on the Representative Committee; and no person shall, at any meeting of the Representative Committee, represent more than one club. In the event of any Representative being unable to be present at any meeting of the Association, a Proxy may be appointed by the executive of the club he represents, or by the President thereof.

5. No person can be a regular member of more than one affiliated club at one and the same time; and the lists of members sent in by the secretaries of local clubs to the Secretary of the Association for publication in the Annual for the season, shall determine the membership of each person and club for that season. The status of new members received into a local club, after publication of Annual, can only be established by the certificate of the Secretary of the Association, that their names have been added to the roll of the local club and dues paid. Should the name of any person be returned in the list of more than one club, such person shall be disqualified in all of them, until the General Secretary shall be notified by him that his name has been withdrawn from every list except the one to which he properly belongs. Persons who, from change of residence or other sufficient reason, find it desirable, may withdraw from one club, and be received into another during the curling season; but the change, before coming into effect, must be assented to by both clubs, and be approved of by the Executive Council; but no such change, or any other reason, shall make it lawful for any curler to play in any one season for or on behalf of more than one club for prizes allocated by the Association, or given under its auspices. Any club playing an Association Prize Match with one or more curlers in its ranks not properly qualified as members, shall forfeit all right to the prize if it shall have been successful in the contest.

6. Clubs must classify their members, as Honorary and Regular. Entrance Fee and Annual Dues shall be payable for each *regular* member returned as belonging to the club, and only *regular* members shall be entitled to take part in the Association games, and be eligible to the Representative Committee as delegates.

#### CHAP. III.—THE REPRESNTATIVE COMMITTEE.

1: The Representative Committee, composed of two Representatives from each affiliated club, shall hold one regular meeting in each year, as provided in Sec. 5, Chap. 1, of the Constitution, which shall be known as the Annual General Meeting of the Members of the Association. The Semi-Annual Meeting shall be held on the Saturday previous to the date of the opening of the Annual Bonspiel. Special meetings may be called by the proper office-bearers. At all such meetings, eleven shall be a quorum.

2. At said Annual Meeting, the Representative Committee shall elect for the year ensuing, the office-bearers of the Association, who shall come into office immediately upon their election, and continue until their successors are appointed. They shall consist of a Patron, a President, a First and Second Vice-President, a Chaplain and the Secretary-Treasurer. At the same meeting there shall also be appointed Standing Committees. The Executive Council shall consist of the office-bearers and six other Executive members; the Committee on Annual, and the Committee on Complaints and Appeals. The mode of election shall, in all cases, be by ballot, when more than one person has been proposed and seconded for any office.

a. The duties of the President shall be to preside and maintain order at all meetings of the Association, of the Representative Committee, and of the Executive Council; and he shall sign the minutes of such meetings after they have been confirmed, and all official documents. The chairman at all meetings shall have a casting vote in case of a tie, as well as a deliberative vote.

b. The First Vice-President shall take the place and discharge the duties of the President when he is absent; and the Second Vice-President shall have the same authority in the absence of the President and First Vice-President; and should all of them be absent from any regular or special meeting, it shall be competent for the meeting assembled to elect a chairman, who shall have, *pro tem.*, all the rights and powers of the President.

c. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep full and correct minutes of all the meetings of the Association, and the Executive Council, and shall conduct all correspondence arising out of the same, and generally carry out the work of the Association. He shall levy and collect all dues and fees, and pay all accounts, and shall keep regular and correct accounts of all moneys collected and bills paid. His books and accounts shall at all times be open to the inspection of the officebearers, and shall be audited at the close of each fiscal year.

d. The Executive shall consist of six members of the Representative Committee, who shall assist in conducting the business of the Association.

e. The Committee on Complaints and Appeals shall receive from the Secretary, and adjudicate upon all complaints and appeals from clubs in regard to their curling intercourse with each other, and especially with reference to competitions for prizes, played for, under the auspices of the Association, and shall report to the Executive Council. Their decisions shall always be communicated to the contending parties in writing, and will be held to be accepted and acquiesced in, unless they are notified to the contrary within ten days after their decision shall have been mailed to the said contending parties, and the reasons for non-acquiescence set forth in said notification.

f: The Committee on Annual shall be charged with the publication of the Annual of the Association, which shall be issued every year about the first of December, and shall contain a list of the officebearers of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, and of this Assocition, along with lists of the office-bearers and members of the clubs in connection therewith, the rules and regulations of the Association, the minutes of the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, and special meetings of the Representative Committee, the financial condition of the Association from year to year, reports of competitions for prizes allocated by the Association, along with records of other matters affecting curling, and calculated to promote the game in Canada.

g. Auditors shall examine and certify the Treasurer's accounts from year to year.

3. No complaint or appeal will be received unless sent in to the Secretary of the Association in writing, within one week from the date on which occurred the matter of the said complaint or appeal; and no complaint or appeal shall be decided until all parties thereto shall have been given an opportunity to state their case; and any party failing or neglecting to show cause within one week after being notified to do so by the Committee, shall thereby be held to have departed from their claim, and to have forfeited all rights to any further hearing. 4. At the Annual Meetings of the Representative Committee, the order of business shall be as follows, viz.:

1. Calling meeting to order.

2. Report on credentials of delegates.

3. Reading minutes of previous annual and special meetings.

4. Admission of new clubs.

5. Communications.

6. Accounts.

7. Annual Reports of Clubs.

8. Reports of Standing Committees,

9. Reports of SpecialCommittees.

10. Semi-Annual Reports of Clubs.

11. Unfinished business.

12. Reports of District Umpires.

13. Election of office-bearers.

14. New business.

15. Alteration of the Constitution.

16. Miscellaneous business.

5. At Special meetings no business shall be transacted other than that for which the meeting was convened, and which had been clearly set forth in the circular calling the meeting. The President, the Secretary, and any five members of the Executive Council, may convene a special meeting of the Representative Committee at any time.

#### CHAP. IV.-ENTRANCE AND ANNUAL FEES.

1. The fees payable by clubs shall be an entrance fee, club fee, annual dues and *per Capita* levy for maintenance of the ANNUAL.

2. The entrance fee for any club shall be \$5, which must accompany application, together with annual club fee and other dues.

3. The annual dues shall be paid in advance, as follows :—A club fee of two dollars each year from each club, and an additional sum of fifteen cents in respect of each *regular* member of the club, also a *per capita* levy of ten cents for maintenance of the ANNUAL. Members can be registered up to the 31st day of December in each year, and new clubs admitted up to same date.

4. From these sources shall be formed a common fund to be under the control of the Executive Council, and trom which shall be defrayed the printing, advertising and incidental expenses of the Association.

5. No club in arrears shall be entitled to compete in the District Matches or for any prize of the Association at the Annual Bonspiel. 6. If any club shall fall two years in arrear in the payment of its annual dues, it shall be struck off the list of the Association, and shall not be re-instated except as a new club, unless the Association shall decide to the contrary by a two-thirds vote.

#### CHAP. V.---THE GAME,

1. The standard length of the rink for play shall be 42 yards from hack to tee. No important match shall be commenced if the ice be not in a condition fairly to test the curling skill of the competing players; and it shall be stopped and declared "off," if, after it has been begun, the condition of the ice, by reason of thaw setting in or snow falling, becomes such, as not to afford a fair test of the curling skill of the competing players; or darkness comes on sufficient to prevent the stones at the tee, from being distinctly seen from the further hack; and in all cases of stopped matches, the postponed game shall be commenced *de novo*. The unpire's decision, regarding the condition of the ice and atmosphere, shall be final in all cases.

2. The tees to be made 38 yards apart, and around each, as a centre shall be described a circle of seven feet radius, which shall be called the "Home," or "Ring." To facilitate measurements, intermediate circles may also be described around the tee. Every stone within, or resting upon the outer ring, shall be entitled to be counted in the game; no stone shall be considered *without a circle*, unless it is entirely clear of that circle, nor shall a stone be considered *over a line* unless it has crossed and entirely cleared it. In every case this is to be decided by a square placed upon the ice.

3. From, and in exact alignment with both tees, a line, called the centre line, shall be drawn to a point four yards behind each tee; at this point a line shall be drawn, at a right angle to the centre line, on which the hack shall be cut. The hack shall not exceed six inches in length, nor shall the inner edge thereof, be more than three inches from the centre line, so that all stones shall be delivered with their centre upon the centre line.

4. Other lines, called the MIDDLE SCORE, the HOG SCORE, the SWEEPING SCORE and BACK SCORE, shall also be drawn on the ice at right angles to the centre line. The MIDDLE SCORE shall be drawn at midway between the two tees, to point out the place at which sweeping may ordinarily be commenced. The HOG SCORE shall be drawn at a distance from each tee of one-sixth of the length from hack to further tee; and shall indicate the point, which if a played stone fails to pass, it shall be counted a hog, and removed from the ice unless it has been prevented from passing by striking another played stone resting inside said hog score. The SWEEPING SCORE shall be drawn across the tees, for the guidance of the skips in sweeping. The






Diagram to be drawn on the ice previous to playing and referred to throughout the rules as "THE RINK"

5. All matches to be the majority of shots won, after playing a certain number of heads, or definite period of time, to be agreed on by the competing clubs before beginning to play. In the event of both parties being equal at the conclusion of the match, play shall be continued, under the direction of the umpire, by all the rinks engaged, for another head, or for such additional number of heads, as may be necessary to decide the match.

6. Every rink to be composed of four players a side, each using two stones, and playing one stone alternately with his opponent, and the rotation of players observed in the first head shall not be changed during the match.

7. The two skips opposing each other shall settle by lot, or in any other way they may agree upon, which party may lead in the first head, after which the winning party shall lead.

8. The skips shall have the exclusive management and direction of the game for their respective parties, and may play last or in any part of the game they please; but are not entitled to change their places when once fixed. When their turn to play comes, they shall each appoint one of their players to act in their places as skips of the game, and must take the position of ordinary players, until they have played and returned to the tee-head as skips.

9. Players, during the course of each end, shall be arranged along the sides, but well off the rink, as their skips may direct; and no party, except when sweeping according to rule, shall go upon the middle of the rink. Skips alone to stand within the 14 feet circle, or home; the skip of the party playing to have the choice of place, and must not be obstructed by the other in front of the tee, while behind it, the privileges of both, as regards sweeping shall be equal.

10. Every player to be ready to play when his turn comes, and shall not take more than a reasonable time to play. Should he play a stone belonging to another player, any of the players may stop it while running; but if not stopped till at rest, the stone which should have been played, shall be put in its place to the satisfaction of the opposing skip.

11. If a player should play out of turn, the stone so played may be stopped in its course and returned to the player; should the mistake not be discovered till the stone be at rest, or has struck another stone, the opposing skip shall add one to his score, and have the option of allowing the game to proceed, or declaring the end null and void. But if another stone be played before the mistake has been noticed, the end must be finished, as if it had been played properly from the beginning. 12. If any player engaged, or belonging to either of the competing clubs, shall speak to, taunt, or otherwise interrupt any other player, not of his own party, while preparing to play his stone, and so as to disconcert him, one shot shall be added to the score of the party so interrupted, for each interruption, and the play proceed.

13. If in sweeping, or otherwise, a *running* stone be marred by any of the party to which it belongs, it shall be put off the ice, and the opposing skip shall have the option to add one to his score, and allow the game to proceed, or to call the end null and void; but if marred by any of the adverse party, it shall be placed wherever the skip of the party to which it belongs may direct. If marred by any other means the player shall replay the stone. Should any *played* stone be displaced, by any of the players before the head is reckoned, it shall be placed as near as possible where it lay, to the satisfaction of, or by the skip, opposed to the party displacing it. If displaced by any neutral party, both skips to agree upon the position to which it is to be returned, and if they fail to agree, the umpire shall decide.

14. The sweeping shall be under the direction and control of the skips. Except when snow is falling upon or drifting over the rink, a stone shall not be swept until it has crossed the MIDDLE SCORE, and may be swept by the party to whose side it belongs, until it comes to the SWEEPING SCORE; but all stones when they have passed the sweeping score may be swept by EITHER SKIP ONLY. Skips will have liberty to sweep behind the tee at all times, except when a player is receiving directions to play from his skip. All sweeping shall be across the rink, and the sweeper must be in front of the stone being swept, and at one side thereof; and no sweepings shall either be moved forward or left in front of a running stone, or of a stone "at rest." It shall not be allowable for the party to whom a running stone belongs, to place their brooms before it or behind it to screen it from the wind, unless with consent of both skips; and the use of a broom or any other instrument as a fan, either to promote or retard the running of a stone, is strictly forbidden, and is to be dealt with as "a running stone" marred by the party to which it belongs. (See sec. 13.)

15. All stones shall be of a circular shape. No stone, including handle, shall be of a greater weight than fifty pounds, or of a greater circumference than thirty-six inches, or of a less height than one-eighth part of its greatest circumference.

16. No stone or side of a stone shall be changed after a match has been begun, unless with the consent of the opposing skip. Should a stone happen to be broken during a game, the largest fragment shall be considered in the game for that end, and the player shall be entitled to use another stone or another pair during the remainder of the game.

17. Should a played stone roll over, or stop on its edge or top, it shall be put off the ice. Should the handle quit the stone in delivery, the player will not be entitled to replay the stone unless he retains his hold of the handle.

18. No measuring of shots allowable previous to the termination of the end. Disputed shots to be determined by the vice-skips; or, if they disagree, by the umpire; or, if there is no umpire, by some neutral person chosen by the skips. All measurements to be taken from centre of tee to nearest point of stone, after removing stones intervening.

19. If any of the competing rinks are not ready to begin play at the hour named for a match, one end shall be counted as played for every ten minutes' delay; and the opposing rink, if ready to play, shall count one point in the game for each such period of time it is kept waiting.

20. "No rink shall be eligible to enter for any competition or match under the jurisdiction of the Association, unless in the first game they have four bona fide active players. If, however, after starting in any event, any member, through sickness or other unforseen circumstances, is unable to play, then the following rules to apply:

"a. If the skip be absent, then the third man becomes skip, and the second man plays his own and the third pair of stones.

"b. If the third player be absent, the second man shall play second and third place.

"c. If the second player be absent, then the lead plays first as well as second place.

"d. If the lead be absent, the second player shall play his own as well as the lead stones.

"e. A sweeper will be allowed for the absentee, but no rink shall continue play with less than three men.

#### CHAP. VI.-ICE RINKS.

1. All District matches, as well as those played at the Annual Bonspiel, and general competitions at the Points' Game, must be played on new or virgin ice, or upon neutral ice.

ICE FOR CURLING SHALL BE DEEMED NEW OR VIRGIN ICE :

a. When it has not previously been played on.

*b*. When, since last played on, it shall have been flooded so completely, as that the water shall have come to its natural level, over the entire ice surface, before freezing.

c. If, after being last used for curling, the ice shall have been refaced by sprinkling with water, and the tees changed, either at least two feet sideways or ten feet lengthways, so as to get rid of grooves or channels formed in the course of play.

d. Shaving off nodules or protuberances from the surface of the ice, or the application of any other mechanical operations, having for their object the bringing of the ice to a true and correct level, shall not be held as degrading ice otherwise entitled to be called new or virgin ice : but such operations must be carried out, under the direction of the umpire, and in no case shall any special preparation of the ice be made, intended, or calculated, or having for its object to facilitate the making of any particular shot, or to otherwise pervert the ice surface from the true and correct level.

e. It is desirable that artificial single rinks should be constructed not less than 18 feet in width by 152 in length, so as to admit of changing the tees both sideways and lengthways.

#### CHAP. 7.--THE POINTS GAME.


1. Rinks shall be laid off in accordance with the diagram given for this game in the Annual. Within the 14 feet circle, a circle 8 feet in diameter shall be drawn around the tee, and a centre line or score from the hack to the hog score; and the length of the rink from hack to tee shall be 42 yards.

2. Lots shall be drawn for the order of playing; each competitor shall change position one place each point, thus: The first player at any of the points, to be the last in playing at next point, and the second player at any point to be the first at the next, and so on. Each competitor shall use two stones, and play them, the one immediately after the other, and shall not during the competition change the side of a stone, or the stone itself, unless it happens to be broken.

3. Every competitor to play four shots at each of the nine following points of the game, viz:—Striking, Inwicking, Drawing, Guarding, Chap and Lie, Wick and Curl In, Raising, Drawing through a Port, and Chipping the Winner, according to the following definitions, and each succes-ful shot shall count as hereinafter provided.

a. Striking.—A stone placed on the sweeping score, and with its inner edge two feet from the tee. If struck to count 1; if struck out of the 14 feet circle to count 2.

b. Invuicking.—One stone being placed on the tee, and another with its inner edge 2 feet 6 inches from the tee, and its fore-edge on a line drawn from the tee at an angle of 45 degrees with the central line; if



the played stone strike the latter on the inside to count 1; if it perceptibly move both stones, to count 2.

c. Drawing.—If the stone played lies within or on the 14 feet circle to count 1; if within or on the 8 feet circle to count 2.

d. Guarding.—A stone, to be guarded, placed with its fore-edge on the tee. If the stone played, rests within 6 inches of the central line to count 1; if on the line, to count 2. It shall be over the hog, but not touch the stone to be guarded.

e. Chap and Lie. — If the stone placed on the sweeping score, with its inner edge one foot from the tee, be struck out of the 14 feet circle, and the played stone rest within or on the same circle, to count 1; if struck out of the 14 feet circle, and the played stone rest within or on the 8 feet circle, to count 2.

f. Wick and Curl In.—A stone being placed with its inner edge 7 feet distant from the tee, and its fore-edge on a line making an angle of 45 degrees with the central line; if the stone is struck and the played stone curls on or within the 14 feet circle to count 1; if struck and the played stone rests on or within the 8 feet circle to count 2.

g. Raising.—A stone placed with its centre on the central line and its inner edge 8 feet distant from the tee; if struck within or on the 14 feet circle to count 1; if struck within or on the 8 feet circle to count 2.

h. Drawing through a Port.—One stone to be placed with its inner edge on the central line, 10 feet in front of the tee, and another stone placed parallel thereto, and with its inner edge 2 feet from the central line; if the played stone passes between these two stones, without touching either, and rests within or on the 14 feet circle, to count 1; if within or on the 8 feet circle to count 2.

*i. Chipping the Wunner*—A stone being placed on the tee, and another 10 feet distant, and with its inner edge just touching the central line, and half guarding the one on the tee, and a third stone being placed 4 feet behind the tee, with its inner edge touching the central line, but on the opposite side from that on which the guard is placed ; if the played stone strikes the stone placed behind the tee to count 1; if it strikes the stone on the tee, to count 2.


j. Outwicking.—In the event of two or more competitors gaining the same number of shots, they shall play 4 shots at outwicking: that is, a stone being placed with its inner edge 7 feet distant from the tee, and its centre on a line making an angle of 45 degrees with the central line; if struck within or on the 14 feet circle to count 1; if struck within or on the 8 feet circle to count 2.

4. If the competition cannot be decided by these shots the umpire shall order one or more points to be played again by the competitors who are equal.

5. In the Points' Game the Rinks may be swept as often as required during the intervals between the playing of stones. A player may sweep his own stone, and may direct where a broom shall be held to guide him in playing.

NOTE.—It will save much time, if, in playing for local prizes, two rinks be prepared lying parallel to each other, the tee of the one being at the reverse end of the other rink; every competitor plays both stones up the one rink, and immediately afterwards down the other; finishing thus, at one round, all his chances at that point.

It will also save time if a code of signals be arranged between the marker and the players, such as: the marker to raise one hand when one is scored, and both hands when two are scored. In the case of a miss, both hands to be kept down.

The Melita Club, of Manitoba, was reinstated with 16 members; and the Aberdeen Club struck off the roll, having become disorganized. This leaves 55 clubs in good standing for this year.

Your Executive subdivided the territory under the jurisdiction of the Branch into twenty-two districts, and gave a handsome silver medal to each for local competition.

Your Executive submit with this report a printed copy of the programme of the Ninth Annual Bonspiel, which is the best ever offered for competition, and trust it will meet with acceptance. The number of ends in the several events this year have been reduced from 16 to 14, with a view to carry out the schedule of four games per day, and the hope is expressed that this will enable your Committee to complete the bonspiel within the week.

The Secretary reported the receipt of reports of the District matches from the whole 22 District Umpires.

On motion of John McKechnie, seconded by Thos. Johnson, the reports were received, and the Secretary instructed to convey to the Umpires the thanks of the Association for their gratuitous and satisfactory services to the Branch.

On motion of M. Fortune, seconded by John McKechnie, the Executive elect were empowered to admit all clubs applying between now and 31st December for admission to the Association.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

From T. H. Bunting, secretary Indian Head club, and the C.P.R. authorities, relative to some irregularity in the issue of certificates to parties at Indian Head who took advantage of the reduced fares to the bonspiel, who were not members of the club.

On motion of W. O. McRobie, seconded by Isaac Pitblado, the Secretary was instructed to write the various clubs, warning them against any abuse of privileges extended by the railway authorities.

From E. McCarthy, of Regina club, protesting against an injustice to his rink from aspersions in the press and otherwise, over a game with the Heather club, of Qu'Appelle, at the last bonspiel.

On motion of C. P. Wilson, the letters were filed, as no official notice could be taken of anything in dispute, unless brought before the Committee on Appeals in the regular way.

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From Col. Boothby and Col. McInroy, Vice-Presidents of the Royal Club, Scotland, acknowledging invitations to last bonspiel, and promising, if possible, to send a rink next season. A letter was also read from Dr. Bryce, chaplain, advising an early notice to the Royal Club, inviting a rink to the next bonspiel.

On motion of James Scroggie the letters were referred to the new Council.

From Sergt. Timmis, secretary of the Diagoons' Curling Club, withdrawing from the Branch, owing to some of the members of the club having left the city.

On motion of C. E. Carbert, the letter was referred to the new Executive.

From W. Conner, secretary of the Morden club, relative to the constitution of a rink, and as to compelling them to play when there are absentees at the time a match is bulletined for play.

On motion of M. Fortune, the letter was laid on the table, pending the consideration of the report of the Executive Council which has scme reference to the subject.

From the secretaries of clubs at Melita, Pilot Mound, Manitou, Grenfell, Boissevain and Sandon, B.C., relative to delegates and changes in districts, and fixing of local bonspiels for the current year.

On motion of J. Love, seconded by Isaac Pitblado, the letters were referred to Council, with instructions to meet the views expressed as far as possible.

#### DONORS OF SPECIAL PRIZES.

From Hiram Walker & Sons, of Walkerville, Ont., donating a new cup and four individual prizes for the bonspiel of 1898, the conditions as to the cup being, that the club winning it most frequently in five years, shall own it absolutely.

John McKechnie moved, seconded by A. Black, that the thanks of the Association be tendered the donors of this cup and accompanying prizes.

F. W. Stobart asked what would be the result in the event of five different clubs winning in the period for which the cup was given? John McKechnie thought there was no use of anticipating trouble. If such a contingency arose provision would doubless be made to overcome it. The resolution was then carried amid applause. Communications were read from Lord Strathcona, Geo. E. Tuckett & Son, Hamilton, Ont., J. G. Morgan, N.V. Life Ins. Co., Arthur Congdon, representing Alfred Dolge of New York, and Geo. F. and J. Galt, promising to renew their individual prizes to accompany their respective cups, for the bonspiel of 1898.

On motion of W. F. Payne, seconded by James Scroggie, the Secretary was instructed to acknowledge the letters, and to convey to the respective donors of special prizes the thanks of the Association for their generous donations to the bonspiel.

This resolution was also carried amid the most enthusiastic applause.

#### EXECUTIVE REPORT.

The Secretary-Treasurer presented for the consideration of the Association the ninth annual report of the Executive Council for 1896-7. It shows no abatement of interest in curling, as it grows in popularity. Clubs continue to multiply throughout Manitoba and all adjoining territories and even in British Columbia. There are at present fifty-five clubs under the jurisdiction of the Branch, of which number five are in north-western Ontario, thirty-five in Manitoba, eight in Assiniboia, one in Saskatchewan, three in Alberta and three in British Columbia. Your Executive are not without hope that this number will again be greatly augmented during the ensuing year.

Eight new clubs affiliated with the Branch during the past year : Cartwright, Hamiota, Hartney, Souris, Stockton and Wawanesa, in Manitoba; Wolseley in Assiniboia and Sandon in British Columbia. The Melita club, in Manitoba, was also reinstated, having become disorganized for two or three years. The Branch had during the past year fifty-five clubs under its jurisdiction, with an aggregate of 152 honorary and 1764 regular members in affiliation.

The Executive, pursuant to instructions, last year sub-divided the territory under its supervision, into twenty-two districts, and awarded a handsome medal to each for local competition.

The primary competition for the Tuckett also took place in the respective districts as provided under the rules governing the competition for this trophy. The club primaries for International, Royal Caledonian and Galt competitions also took place in the respective clubs, and were well contested. The district umpires discharged their duties with fidelity, and appear to have given the utmost satisfaction. We commend their diligence and think they are entitled to the thanks of the Association. The Secretary-Treasurer reports the receipts from all sources, inclusive of a balance of \$205.48 from the previous year, as \$835.38, and the expenditure, including the cost of the publication of ANNUAL and salary of the Secretary for 1895-6, as \$479.22, leaving a surplus on hand of \$336.16 for the ensuing year. Appended are duly audited statements of receipts and expediture.

The Council recommend the preparation of a draft of a constitution and by-laws for the guidance of affiliated clubs, so that more harmony as to dates of all regular meetings of clubs may be obtained. Unity of action in this respect will be conducive to the still further success of curling in this country.

The Executive further recommend the adoption of a rule and its publication in the ANNUAL, regulating what shall constitute a rink in entering any bonspiel or curling match, and also to make some rule as to absentees through sickness or other unavoidable causes, during the progress of a match. They would also suggest the advisability of a change in the constitution providing that the maximum gross weight of a curling stone shall uot exceed forty-five pounds.

The Council, in conclusion, makes an appeal to all clubs in affiliation with the Branch to do all in their power to advance the interests of the Association. Officers of clubs, particularly secretaries, are urged to be prompt in all business matters of their clubs, and to see that all returns are made to headquarters as promptly as possible, for without co-operation it becomes exceedingly difficult to manage so large an institution.

On motion of Mark Fortune, seconded by J. M. Chisholm, the report was received and adopted.

#### NINTH ANNUAL BONSPIEL.

The Executive Council submitted for the consideration of the Association their report of the Ninth Annual Bonspiel, held on the 8th of February, 1897. The bonspiel was really inaugurated with the semi-annual meeting of the Branch on the previous Saturday evening at the Manitoba hotel.

Play began, however, on the morning of Monday, the 8th of February, at nine o'clock, with the New York Life Grand Challenge Cup competition. There were eighty-one rinks entered, being a larger number than at any previous bonspiel. The reduction in the number of ends from sixteen to fourteen enabled the carrying out of the schedule of four games per day. Having the full day on Monday, aided materially in shortening the duration of the bonspiel.

The Council, in light of past experience, would suggest some changes in one or two competitions, so as to still further economize time during the bonspiel. The system of competing for the Royal Caledonian 'Tankard has not given the satisfaction expected at the outset, and they suggest a change for the next bonspiel. The Executive are consulting with the donors of the Tuckett trophy with a view to having eight individual prizes instead of four. The Patterson cup or Consolation event was found to be too open last year, and they suggest confining the entries to rinks losing games in the extra series or first draw of both the New York Life and Walkerville competitions.

The Executive regret the small representation from the United States, thus detracting from the interest taken in the International Competition. There was, however, a genial quartette of curlers from Duluth, which made a good record. They hope to have a greater number another year. It seems strange that with the fine programme offered rinks from Ontario and Quebec cannot be tempted to try conclusions with prairie curlers. The Council are not without hope of a visit of a rink from Scotland and another from New York at the next bonspiel.

The representation from the Branch was larger than at any previous bonspiel. A pleasing feature was the presence of a rink from Schreiber in the far east, and another from Prince Albert on the distant Saskatchewan. Next year rinks are expected from Lethbridge, Calgary, Edmonton and British Columbia. The weather was exceptionally fine, and as a result there was some keen curling. The bonspiel was conducted without a single hitch, competitors evincing the utmost satisfaction with the management. The work of the ice committee and the arrangement for the cartage of stones was well nigh perfect. Outsiders held their own against Winnipeg curlers and carried off several of the leading prizes. The entertainment to visiting curlers was a grand success socially if not financially. The smoking concert afforded any amount of amusement and was a pleasant relief in the middle of the week from the monotony of curling. The financial statement of receipts and expenditure was highly satisfactory, and shows a surplus to start the next bonspiel fund. The Council express gratitude to the wholesale and retail merchants, hotel keepers and many private citizens for generous donations of cash in aid of the bonspiel fund. The assets of the Association comprise trophies, tankards and cups, valued at 1,500, for the care and custody of which the Council are much indebted to D. R. Dingwall, jeweller, of this city. There are besides a large number of photo groups of prize winners at previous bonspiels, also some furniture used in connection with the Council rooms at bonspiels. There are no outstanding liabilities, They would recommend the securing of a permanent room for the use of the Association, and storing of the furniture and other property of the Branch.

The Executive last year offered the most attractive prize list ever offered at any bonspiel, either in Europe or America, and its success in this regard is due to the generosity of the friends and patrons of the Association. Subjoined is a list of the special donations and the winners of the leading events in 1897:

J. G. Morgan, manager New York Life Insurance Company, four handsome gold watches, value \$100, to accompany the Grand Challenge Cup. Won by F. L. Patton's rink, Assiniboine club, Winnipeg.

Alfred Dolge, of New York, four beautiful gold lockets, value \$100, to accompany the Alfred Dolge International Trophy. Won by D. A. MacArthur's rink, Thistle Curling Club, Winnipeg.

Hiram Walker & Sons, of Walkerville, Ont., four handsome gold medals, value \$100, to accompany the Walkerville Tankard Won (tankard absolute as well as medals) by Fred. Knight's rink of Brandon, Man.

Sir D. A. Smith, K.C.M.G., four fine gold medals, value \$100, to accompany his cup, Royal Caledonian Tankard. Won by W. A. Carson's rink, of the Thistle Curling Club, Winnipeg.

Geo. E. Tuckett & Son, Hamilton, Ont., four elegant gold medals value \$100, to accompany the Tuckett Trophy. Won by the Gladstone Curling Club, representing Beautiful Plains district; rinks skipped by H. J. Pearson and J. McCrae.

Geo. F. & J. Galt. Winnipeg, Man., four gold medals, value \$75, to accompany the Galt Trophy, being a change from silver medals, as in previous years, won by E. J. Rochon's rink of Fort William, Ont.

His Worship Mayor McCreary, four gold lockets, value \$50, to accompany Lieut.-Governor Patterson's Consolation Cup. Won by J. W. Smith's rink of Regina, Assa.

His Honor Lieut.-Governor Patterson, as patron, offered as first prize in the Grand Points Competition, a handsome gold watch, value \$75. Won by C. E. Carbert, of the Granite Club, Winnipeg. Score 36 points.

Council, with sincere regret, report the death of three prominent members of the curling fraternity during the past year : Robert Crawford of Indian Head, once Vice-President of the Branch, and one of the active promoters of the annual bonspiel; John Hettle, late M.P.P. for Turtle Mountain, and John W. Shaw, a regular member of the Granite Curling Club, Winnipeg. Mr. Crawford took an active interest in promoting curling in the Qu'Appelle district, where his genial face will be greatly missed by members of the fraternity. The late Mr. Hettle was also a representative on the Branch and did much to promote the success of the Association, particularly in southern Manitoba. The late Mr. Shaw, although never a delegate to the Branch, was nevertheless a keen curler. He fought many a hard fight on the glacial arena and won many laurels at home and abroad They recommend a minute to be made of their demise, for his club. and that short memoirs be prepared for publication in the next ANNUAL.

The Executive, in conclusion, congratulate the members of the Association upon the continued growth of interest in the annual bonspiel by members of the curling fraternity. They would commend the bonspiel to all affiliated clubs and ask for it their hearty support. The primary club competitions leading up to the district and annual bonspiel matches, as well as district play, should receive prompt attention at the hands of officers, so that all clubs may participate in the games and thus acquire a practical knowledge of this great winter pastime. They would also commend to the Association the gratuitous services of Mr. John Paterson, the veteran umpire, and his associates, who did so much to promote the success of the last bonspiel. Α noticeable feature of the bonspiel of last year was the absence of any protests, the services of the Committee on Appeals having never been necessary. This speaks well for the harmony and good feeling which animated such a large assemblage of curlers. It is with regret that your Council learn that Umpire Paterson has decided to retire this year, after being with the Association ever since its organization in 1888.

On motion of C. P. Wilson, seconded by James Scroggie, the report was laid on the table, pending the consideration of a number of recommendations therein.

#### REPORT ON "ANNUAL."

The Committee on ANNUAL presented a report on the printing and distribution of volume eight of the ANNUAL of the Association for the year 1896-7. It was found necessary to have 700 copies, owing to the rapid growth of the Association. The contract was awarded to McIntyre Bros., for the sum of \$160.

The volume, although greatly condensed, made over 150 pages, and the increase in price over the previous year was due to this fact and the augmentation in the number of copies. It was replete with all information relative to the Association and the affiliated clubs, and entailed a great deal of labor upon the Secretary in its preparation.

An excellent photo. of President Georgeson adorned the frontispiece, and inside was a fine composite group of the Patrons of the Branch. A beautiful litho-photo engraved cover greatly enhanced the appearance of the volume. The lithographic work was from the establishment of Bulman Bros., in this city, and reflects great credit upon our local artists.

The system of a levy of ten cents per capita is proving a success and ensures the annual issue of the work. The levy for the year amounted to \$175.60, and with arrears from previous years was fully sufficient for liquidating all expenses in connection with the publication of this volume.

Six hundred copies of the ANNUAL for 1896-7 were distributed pro rata among the fifty-five clubs affiliated with the Branch, averaging about one copy for every three members in a club. The balance were distributed as in previous years to sister associations, the press, umpires in the various districts, officers of the Branch, and donors of the leading cups and trophies. The report suggests a reserve supply to assist in the organization of new clubs.

On motion of C. E. Carbert, seconded by W. F. Crosbie, the report was received and adopted.

The Secretary reported having received only 35 out of 55 annual reports, which should have been received before the first of June last. Many of them were received within the past few days jointly with the semi-annual reports.

#### OFFICE-BEARERS 1897-8.

The election of officers for the ensuing year was next proceeded with, Messrs J. Love and W. F. Crosbie being appointed scrutineers. The result was as follows :

After the election of Alex. Black as President, the retiring President installed him into office. The President-elect, in a few remarks, acknowledged the honor done him and resumed his seat amid applause. Messrs. John Love and W. F. Crosbie briefly responded for the honor done their respective clubs.

C. P. Wilson, referring to nominations for office, thought they should not be strictly confined to delegates, and gave notice of a change in the constitution at the next annual meeting.

Many delegates expressed dissent from the principle of the notice of motion.

Isaac Pitblado gave notice, that at the next annual meeting he would move that the constitution be amended by doing away with the present Appeals Committee, and by making provision for three more members on the Executive, and that power be given the Courcil to appoint an "Appeals Committee," consisting of three members of the Association, to deal with each matter which may at any time arise by way of appeal.

Mr. John Paterson having retired from the position of Chief Umpire, Alex. Macdonald proposed the name of Alex. Brown, of the Thistle club, Winnipeg. The motion was carried unanimously.

On motion of W. F. Payne, seconded by John McKcchnie, the new Council were instructed to take into consideration the long service of Mr. Paterson, and make some tangible acknowledgment of the same.

#### NEW BUSINESS.

On motion of Alex. Macdonald, seconded by John McKechnie, it was resolved to hold the tenth annual bonspiel on Monday, the 7th day of February, 1898, and the new Executive Council empowered to make all necessary arrangements.

On motion of Wm. Georgeson, seconded by W. F. Crosbie, it was resolved to make the Royal Caledonian Tankard another open event, and that with a view to permit this, and otherwise shorten the bonspiel, that the number of ends be reduced from 14 to 12 in all competitions, and that a schedule of five games a day be played if necessary.

On motion of E. G. Conklin, seconded by M. Campbell, the rule for entries for the Patterson cup, or consolation event, was ordered to be changed, so as to make those eligible to enter, losers in the extra series or first draw of both the New York Life Challenge and Walkerville competitions.

On motion of C. P. Wilson, seconded by Wm. Georgeson, a change was ordered in the rule of the Tuckett Competition, so that in the district primary no club shall be compelled to put in more than one double rink, it to be optional with clubs to either select or play down for the two rinks that shall represent the club in the district.

On motion of J. Love, the new Council was empowered to arrange the districts for 1897-8, allocate clubs and name umpires.

On motion of Isaac Pitblado the Committee on Annual were instructed to publish 800 copies of the next annual.

On motion of Wm Georgeson, the new Council were authorized to prepare a draft of constitution and by-laws for the government of all affiliated clubs.

#### ALTERATION OF THE CONSTITUTION.

F. W. Stobart moved that the maximum gross weight of stones in all competitions or matches played under the jurisdiction of the Branch shall not exceed forty-five pounds.

W. McMillan, of Carberry, objected to springing this motion on the Association without due notice to the clubs. One or two other members, while agreeing with the spirit of the resolution, thought time should be given.

The mover agreed to let it stand as a notice of motion to the semi-annual meeting in February, when there should be a full attendance of delegates, and notice could be sent by the Secretary to all affiliated clubs.

E. G. Conklin moved, seconded by Mark Fortune, that a new section, to be No. 20, be added to Chap. V of the Constitution, which shall read :

"No rink shall be eligible to enter for any competition or match under the jurisdiction of the Association, unless in the first game they have four bona fide active players. If, however, after starting in any event, any member, through sickness or other unforseen circumstances, is unable to play, then the following rules to apply:

"a. If the skip be absent, then the third man becomes skip, and the second man plays his own and the third pair of stones.

"b. If the third player be absent, the second man shall play second and third place.

 $\ensuremath{^{\prime\prime}}$  c. If the second player be absent, then the lead plays first as well as second place.

"d. If the lead be absent, the second player shall play his own as well as the lead stones.

"e. A sweeper will be allowed for the absentee, but no rink shall continue play with less than three men.

There was considerable discussion over this resolution, but it was finally carried unanimously.

#### MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS.

On motion of John McKechnie, the Council-elect were empowered to fix uniform dates for the annual and semi-annual meetings of affiliated clubs, and to change the close of the curling year from 30th of April to the 31st of March in each year, On motion of J. Love, a vote of thanks was accorded the retiring office-bearers for 1896-7. Ex-president Georgeson responded in suitable terms.

Isaac Pitblado referred to the large amount of work the Secretary-Treasurer had to perform with the rapid growth of the Association, and moved that the new Council be empowered to increase the salary, if it be found inadequate compensation.

On motion of C. P. Wilson, a special vote of thanks was accorded John McKechnie, chairman of the ice committee for his services at the time of the last bonspiel.

On motion of M. Fortune, the Committee on Annual were instructed to prepare a minute regarding the deaths of R. Crawford, John Hettle and J. W. Shaw, members of the Association, and to insert suitable memoirs in the next ANNUAL.

On motion of Alex. Macdonald, the bonspiel report as amended was adopted.

After passing a vote of thanks to C. F. Bunnell, proprietor of the Clarendon, for the use of the dining room, the meeting adjourned.

The Association has this year again to lament the loss of some of its most esteemed members. Each year takes away some familiar face or friend, and this one proves no exception to the rule. Members of the curling fraternity will read with regret the records of the lives of men who were active in promoting in its early days the growth of the Association.



## THE LATE ROBERT CRAWFORD, INDIAN HEAD.

The members of the curling fraternity throughout Manitoba and the adjoining territories, will read with sincere regret of the death of the late Robert Crawford, of Indian Head, Assiniboia, which event occurred at that place on the morning of the 22nd of September, 1897. The deceased had been in comparatively good health for a man of his

age, but he finally succumbed, after a brief illness, to peritonitis. Mr. Crawford had a large circle of friends not only in the North-West, but throughout Canada. Having been an officer of the Hudson's Bay Co. for many years, he was well known to those in that service. He served the Company around Lake Superior for some time, and was for several years in charge of the post at Ungava Bay, Labrador. He spent some time at Brockville, Ont., after retiring from the H. B. service but in 1882 moved to Indian Head in the North-West Territories, where he opened a general store, and became postmaster. Mr. Crawford was born at Port Glasgow, Scotland, 11th August, 1834. He was the son of Capt. Andrew Crawford, and was educated in Greenock, coming to Canada in 1849. Entered the service of the H. B. Co. in 1855, and received his commission as Factor in 1867, continuing in the service until 1878. Married in 1853 to Elizabeth, second daughter of Robert Seaborne Miles, then Chief Factor in the H. B. Co's service. He was a prominent member of the Presbyterian church in Canada, and took part in many of the deliberations of the General Assembly. He was a member of the Ancient and Accepted Rite of Scottish Free Masonry, being a member of Winnipeg Lodge of Perfection. Members of the order will be greatly grieved at his death, as he was most highly esteemeed for many beauties of character possessed by him. Mr. Crawford actively identified himself with the progress of the Northwest Territories, and became a member of the Northwest Council at Regina, 14th of Oct., 1886, for Qu'Appelle. It was, however, as an enthusiastic curler, that members of the Association will remember Mr. Crawford. He was identified with the start of the curling club at Indian Head, and has been its delegate ever since upon the Branch. The Association owes much to the zeal of the deceased for its success at the start. He attended several bonspiels, and as Vice-President of the Association, did everything in his power to promote their success. The body was removed to Brockville, Ont., for interment, where the funeral took place on Sunday, the 26th September. It was conducted under the auspices of Sussex Lodge, A. F. & A. M., of which deceased was a member. There was a large turn out, and the floral offerings from Masonic bodies and personal friends were very handsome. bearing tribute to the great esteem in which he was held. Relatives and friends will have the sincere and heartfelt sympathy of the entire community in the bereavement they have sustained,

### THE LATE JOHN HETTLE, M.P.P., BOISSEVAIN.

The announcement of the death of the late John Hettle, M.P.P. for Turtle Mountain, in the Legislature of Manitoba, was received with considerable of a shock in the community, but to none with more sincere regret than the members of the curling fraternity in this country. The sad event took place at Boissevain, on the morning of Sept. 20th, 1897, cf diabetes, from which the deceased had been suffering for some time. Mr. Hettle was a genial man and of a kindly disposition, being highly respected in the community in which he has been a resident since coming to Manitoba. He leaves a widow, three unmarried sons, and a married daughter, Mrs. F. W. Young, of Glenboro, to mourn his demise in the prime of manhood. Mr. Hettle, although of Scottish parentage, was born in the village of Norham, in the county of Northumberland, England, May 23rd, 1842, and is therefore 55 years of age. He came to Canada with his parents in 1857, and settled in the county of Huron, Ont. He worked at home on the farm for several years, then engaged with a grain dealer at Sea-forth, Ont., with whom he remained until 1868. He next entered a store at Wroxeter, Ont., as a clerk. In February, 1869, he took charge of a branch store at Teeswater, County of Bruce, Ont. This business he purchased in 1871, and ran it until 1879. Mr. Hettle, while at Teeswater, in 1874, started the first creamery in Western Canada, and in 1880 it was one of the largest and best in the Dominion. Deceased came to Manitoba in March, 1881, as the representative of David Maxwell, the well-known manufacturer of farming imploments and machinery, of Paris, Ont, and travelled in this line for several years in Southern Manitoba. He was first elected to the Manitoba Legislature in 1888, as a liberal. He was again elected in 1892 and re-elected at the last general election of 1896. He was popular amongst members of the house, and his familiar face will be missed in the legislature. He took a warm interest in the dairy and creamery business, and was also identified with the Mutual Hail Insurance Co. In fact, he always conceived a warm interest in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the farming community. He was identified with the formation of the Heather Curling Club at Boissevain, and as its delegate for a number of years on the Branch, did much to promote the interest of curling in the Northwest. The funeral, which took place at Boissevain, on the 21st of September, was conducted by the Odd Fellows, and was the largest ever held in South-Western Manitoba. The Hon. Mr. Greenway, the Hon. Mr. Mickle, and the Hon. R. Watson were among the pall-bearers. The service was conducted by the Rev. P. Fisher, Presbyterian minister at Boissevain, assisted by the Revs. Messrs. Hill, Grant and Harrison, ministers of other denominations.

#### THE LATE JOHN W. SHAW, WINNIPEG.

Members of the curling fraternity, particularly those connected with the clubs in Winnipeg, will learn with profound regret of the demise, on the 27th of January, 1897, of John W. Shaw, late a member of the Granite Curling Club. True, he was not a delegate at any time upon the Branch, but he was nevertheless a keen curler, and gave evidence of his prowess with the channel stane upon many a hard fought glacial arena. The deceased was a well known contractor of Winnipeg, and was called away just in the prime of life, being only 45 years of age. He had been a sufferer for some time from cancer in the stomach, which disease finally carried him off. He leaves a widow and five daughters to mourn the loss of a kind husband and beloved father. The funeral took place on Friday afternoon of the 29th January and was largely attended. The attendance demonstrated the respect in which Mr. Shaw was held by all classes of the community. The remains were interred in St. James' cemetery. The casket was a mass of floral offerings, sent by the following : Pillow, Granite Curling Club; wreath, Thistle Curling Club; wreath, James A. Payne; maltese cross, Bricklayers' and Masons' Union ; bouquet, Mr. Edward Summers. The pall-bearers were : James A. Payne, J. P. Latimer, Joseph Lemon, J. Harrington, John Gilker and George Banning. The services at the house and at the grave were conducted by Rev. Hugh Pedley, assisted by Rev. Joseph Hogg. The familiar face of the deceased will be missed in the Granite Curling Club.


## 1896-97.

The territory under the supervision of the Manitoba Branch R.C.C.C. was sub-divided into twenty-two districts for 1896-7, to facilitate play in the Tuckett primaries and District Medal matches. The reports from the several umpires indicate good play and some keen contests. In the isolated districts where members of clubs play for the medal at points, some excellent scores were made. In territorial clubs outside of Manitoba, and in Brittish Columbia, there was some good play in the primaries for the Galt cup and gold medals. In many clubs the representative rinks for District Primary in the Tuckett were selected; in others there were club competitions. Club matches were also played in many clubs to determine the representative rinks for the International and Royal Caledonian competitions. Where members of the winning rinks could not come, substitutes were of course chosen. The umpires discharged the duties devolving upon them faithfully. few were, perhaps, dilatory in sending in their returns, forgetting that they are due at headquarters, not later than the 31st of January in each year.

## MANITOBA BRANCH R.C.C.C.

## ROYAL DISTRICT MEDALS.

The Association, with a view to promote and encourage District play, awarded twenty-two handsome medals for District competition in 1896-7. The umpires have the arranging of the time and place of all District matches, subject to the approval of the Branch Executive Council. Umpires should in all instances consult with the club interested in arranging for the District meeting.

#### RULES.

1. The Manitoba Branch R.C.C.C., in order to promote curling intercourse, and friendly rivalry between affiliated clubs has resolved to allocate annually for competition among them, medals to be known as Royal District Medals.

2. For such medal competitions, all affiliated clubs of the Branch shall be arranged in districts of not less than two clubs in each, such districts to be determined at the annual meeting of the Branch, each year.

3. The clubs in each district shall play off against each other, with not less than two rinks a side, and no club shall be compelled to play more, unless the membership exceeds twenty, when it shall be compelled to play not more than one rink for every twelve active members in the club over that number.

4. The umpire shall be nominated by the Executive Council of the Branch, for the respective districts, not later than the 1st of December in each year.

5. In all competitions for district medals 16 ends shall be played unless the clubs interested, with the approval of the umpire, mutually agree upon a less number.

6. When, owing to isolation and other circumstances, it is found impossible to form certain clubs into districts, then the individual members of such clubs shall play for the district medal, at the points game.

7. All matches in the respective districts shall be played each year on such ice as may be decided upon by the umpire, and his decision upon all matters in dispute shall be final.

### DISTRICT No. 1.—THUNDER BAY.

Two clubs, with three rinks each, competed in the Tuckett Primary,—Fort William and Port Arthur. Schreiber having been drawn against Port Arthur, defaulted, thus leaving the contest between the other two clubs.

The match between the two clubs took place at Fort William, on the 28th day of January, 1897, and resulted as follows : Fort William 39, Port Arthur 37, the former winning by two points.

The three clubs competed for the District medal. Fort William and Port Arthur played at Port Arthur, three rinks a side, on the 18th of January, resulting in a victory for Port Arthur. The score stood, Port Arthur 44, Fort William 38.

Schreiber and Port Arthur met at Fort William on the 5th of February, when Schreiber won with a score of 38 to 29.

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#### MIGHTY ARE THE SKIPS.

## THEY ARE KINDLY AUTOCRATS WHOSE EVERY WORD IS LAW TO CURLERS-HOW THEY DIRECT THEIR TEAMS.

#### By James S. Mitchell, in the New York World.

The game of curling is one of the most puzzling of our winter pastimes, and it has been claimed, perhaps very truly, that no man ever curled to perfection. But difficult and intricate as the sport undoubtedly is, the beginner may soon acquire sufficient knowledge to enable him to take a respectable place in a rink. No man should be deterred from it by the fear that it is too difficult a game to learn.

As the player stands ready to receive and obey orders from his commander—the skip—and poses himself steadily on his crampit, the tyro watching him will be able to pick up many useful points of the game. He will find that the first thing he must do is to "fit the tee" —that is, he must so place himself that his eye travels along the central line towards the further tee, while his right foot rests on the back, or heel of the crampit. No matter what kind of a shot he may be asked to play, even though the point aimed at may be several feet to the right or left of the distant tee, the crampit, or back, must remain immovable, and no advantage should be taken by changing to a place from which the shot could be more easily taken. This is to "fit fair," and it distinguishes the modern scientific game from the older style, in

which the curler, with his crampits fixed on his shoes, might play now from one side, now from another, as it suited him.

Many players bent their limbs in a very marked manner, and keeping the body perfectly rigid, do all their work with the right arm, which swings from the shoulder in pendulum fashion. No hard and fast rule for position can be laid down. Elegance should be sacrificed to ease, and the player need not trouble himself about the awkwardness of his position if he finds that he has command of his stone.

The swing next requires attention. The curling stone should describe the same figure in its upward journey as the player hopes to make it describe in its descent. As the stone descends the centre of gravity is advanced and the left foot must be lifted and advanced as a base line to preserve the stability of the body. This saves one from rushing forwards along the ice as some curlers do, and the lifting of the left foot in this way gives freedom in swinging the body and arm to the right or to the left as the mark to be aimed at may require.

When the curling stone has left the player's hand the whole weight of the body should rest on the left foot, and there is no necessity for a player to career up the ice after his stone.

But the acme of the curler's art is the "twist," the accomplishment of which gives a finishing touch to curling proficiency and marks out the true scientific player from all his brethren, however keen and successful they may be. The "twist" is what in golfing parlance would be called the "wrist" shot. It is by curlers variously designated in its two-fold aspect as "elbow in," "elbow out," "in-turn," "outturn," "wee finger in," "wee finger out."

The direction of the game in curling lies with the skip. The rink consists of four, and while three are under authority, one—the skip is absolute dictator. He is appointed to his office by the will of his brother curlers. The essential qualifications of a skip are a thorough knowledge of the game and an all-pervading sense of humor. With a couple of sour skips at each end of a rink all the life goes out of a game.

To the first player on the crampit the skip does not give any information as to what he wants done, but simply plants his besom-shank upon the ice.

"Ye ken what's wantit," he says. "Cannily down the howe ice; jist smell the ring an' I'll no blame ye."

He is a good skip who begins with caution and all through plays a cautious game. "A guid calm shot is aye the best." So the first stone comes "snoovin" up the howe. It does not quite reach the tee, and thus becomes a "perfect patlid"; it rests a foot or so in front of the tee, but it pleases the skip all the more, for it is in the way "o' promotion." He asks for a "quiet draw." Too much force, and the player is liable to go "ower a' the ice"; too little, and he places the fitst stone on the tee and himself lies a guard to the enemy. So he leaves the stone alone and with a "quiet draw" he gets his stone beside it, in none the worse position, because its line of promotion is not the direct line to the tee, for "a sidelin shot" may prove better than a "patlid" at the end.

To get this stone promoted and guarded is now the opposing skip's aim. So 'jist crack an egg on this," is his direction. But the player has been too timid and the stone lags on its journey, so the skip calls for the help of the sweepers.

"Gie him heels, gie him heels," he cries. "Soop him up, soop him up," and by the aid of elbow grease the work is done; his stone is on the tee and guarded.

"Weel soopit, lads. Come up, Sandy, an' look at it. Tak' yersel' by the han'. I'se gie ye a sniff fo' that."

Such are the skip's expression of satisfaction. "Rub off the gaird but dinna throw away your stane," is now the mandate of his rival. But it is a "ragging shot," and missing the gaird, it is through the "brough" and "awa" to the "calf neuk." Skip No. 1 is jubilant; he "is shot and guarded." "Big on, pile on agony," he cries, as his second player comes forward, and this is his demand for a double guard.

"Ower the hog and you're a great ane. There ! that's another mote i' their ee." "That's a seed in their teeth."

Then, with a self-satisfied smile, skip No. 1 steps aside to see how skip No. 2, with his second player, will deal with the situation. Two courses are at least open. He can curl round the guards and find the winner, or, by an outwick on his first player's stone, he can force that upon the winner and leave it shot. Then all the guarding of No. 1 is in his favor, and No. 1 is crest-fallen. So the game proceeds. The whole situation may alter in a moment, for it is a slippery game.

## AN EXCITING CURLING MATCH.

#### MR. EDITOR,

I dinna think there's anything mair comfortable than sittin' doon in the airm chair after supper, beside the stove wi' the paper, an' takin' a half hour readin' the news, while the guid wife's mendin' some o' the bairn's claes, or some ither much needed job.

Yesterday I was oot a' day for a load o' wood. It was real pleasant tae read hoo weel oor boys behaved at St. Paul, an' was sorry I couldna gang doon tae the bonspiel in Winnipeg, for ye ken oor rink blawed doon last spring an' we had nae practice this winter, an' we are in nae fettle tae play a match. While these thochts were rinnin' in ma heid, the door opened and a queer lookin body cam in. He was black, an' his een were wicked lookin'. He had horns on his heid and cloven feet. He put me in min' o' the pictures yae see o' the character that tempts mankind tae evil. Comin' up tae me kine o' bold like, he says :

"You are Mr. Hayseed the famous curler, I believe "

"Maybe I am," says I, "but wha are you, an' what dae yae want, yae hae the better o' me?"

"I think you guess who I am by this time, my name is Lucifer the Erebite, I've come to challenge you to a curling match which will be held in Winnipeg one week from to-night. Play begins at halfpast nine and ends at midnight. Those having most points then, will win the match. There will be about twenty rinks on each side. You Manitobans are getting too conceited about your curling, so we decided to challenge you. There will be rinks from Morden, Selkirk, Brandon, Virden, Portage la Prairie, and all over. We want to meet the best curlers in the Province. Will you come?"

"There's nae ice whaur you come frae," says I, "your jokin' me." "Nothing of the kind. We have ice, and curl, as you'll find out

if you come. Now say whether you'll come or not. If you're afraid to meet me, I'll look for another to take your place."

"Look here, Mr. Lucifer, I was never feart o' you or ony o' your

kidney. I'll be there on time, an' you'll be sorry for askin' me." "Bring your curling stones," he said as he went out of the door, "We'll bring ours."

Ma rink was there on time, an' it was a gran sicht tae see. The rink was big eneuch for twenty sheets o' ice, an' every sheet had its full number o' players. I noticed Nelson o' Selkirk, Kelly o' Brandon, Sparling o' Portage la Prairie, Fortune o' Winnipeg, an' a lot o' ithers. A' were ready tae play an' determined tae win.

The Erebites were there in force, an' appeared in great heart. They looked jist like the ane that came tae me, an' they a' carried big black brooms. The ice was by this time covered wi' the slain. "Manitobans," says Dr. Bryce, as he stood in the centre o' the ice an' holdin' his sword aloft. "It becomes us tae render thanks for this great victory over the Powers of Darkness."

As he said this, there was a sound in the building like a mighty whirlwind, and the Erbites, skulls and everything belonging tae them vanished oot the end o' the buildin' in a flame o' fire leavin' naethin' behin' but a heavy smell o' sulphur.



NINTH Ammual Bomspiel.

The Ninth Annual Bonspiel of the Manitoba Branch R.C.C.C., took place in Winnipeg, commencing on Monday, the eighth day of February, 1897, and was largely attended by representative rinks from clubs in affiliation with the Branch. There was some disappointment at the small representation from the United States, and the absence of curlers from so large an organization as the Ontario Curling Association. Those shortcomings, it is to be hoped, will be overcome another year. The weather was delightful, and the ice, which was limited to the curling rinks, was in excellent condition. The attendance of spectators was in excess of any previous year, and there was tremendous enthusiasm, both among curlers and throughout the city, when the final games in the several events were played. A pleasing feature of the bonspiel, was the way the prizes in the leading events were distributed throughout the various districts. The Duluth curlers played a strong game, and deserved to win a place. They may have better luck another year. Visitors were right royally entertained at the smoker in Victoria Hall. Mayor McCreary extended them the hospitality of the city, and citizens generally spared no effort to make their sojourn in the city as pleasant and enjoyable as possible. There was some keen curling during the week, but the most friendly rivalry prevailed; in fact to such an extent did harmony exist, that both the umpires and Committee on Appeals had scarcely anything to do. The transport service too, was almost perfect, the stones having been moved from and to the stations, and between the several rinks, without a single hitch. Taken altogether, it was one of the most successful bonspiels ever held under the auspices of the Association.

#### BAGNALL-WYLD SYSTEM OF DRAWING.

The system under which the draws were made for the various competitions throughout the bonspiel, is known as the Bagnall-Wyld system, and it has given entire satisfaction. The chief object of this method is to avoid byes, after the first draw; because a bye is of less value in the first round, than later in the competition.

If the number of entries be the power of 2, such as 4, 8, 16, 32 or 64, there will be no byes in the competition. If otherwise a preliminary extra series must be played, in which there shall be as many games as the number of entries exceeds the power of two next below, all the other rinks having byes. For example in the New York Life competition there are 77 entries, 64 being the next lower power of 2, there must be 13 extra games played to reduce the entries to 64. 51 byes with the 13 winners make 64 rinks, which is the number that will divide down without any further byes, viz : 64, 32, 16, 8, 4, 2, 1.

The number of byes is easily ascertained by deducting the number of entries from the power of 2 over that number. For instance in the New York Life Challenge there are 77 entries. Deduct this from 128, the power of 2 higher, and it leaves 51, the number of byes. The rest of those entered 26 have to play an extra game.

It will be observed that only one draw is necessary that skips may see who their opponents will be throughout the entire competition. This obviates all delay in waiting as formerly for successive draws. The names of skips should be written on slips of paper, carefully folded and put in a hat. They are then drawn one by one, and written one below the other, until the draw is completed. The pairs that are to play should next be bracketed together. Those playing the extra series shall be placed in the centre of the diagram.

## RULES.

1. Alfred Dolge, of New York, with a view to encourage a rivalry in curling between Canadian and American curlers, has resolved to give annually, at the bonspiel in Winnipeg, the above international prize.

2. This competition shall be open to all American rinks at the bonspiel, who will be opposed by an equal number of rinks selected from among Canadian curlers, entered at the bonspiel.

3. At least two American rinks must enter to ensure competition, and fourteen ends shall be played on each rink at each stage of the match.

4. The trophy, if won by the Americans at the first stage, shall be played down for by all American rinks at Winnipeg, until the winning rink be determined.

5. If won by the Canadians, it shall be played for by a representative rink from every Canadian club represented at the bonspiel, until the final winners of the trophy and medals be determined.

6. Entries for the International match shall be made with the Secretary on the Saturday night prior to the day fixed for the bonspiel.

There being only one rink entered from the United States, that from Duluth, there was no first stage in this competition. The Duluth rink was, however, allowed to compete in the second stage along with the Canadian rinks.

The clubs, in each district shall play off against each other, with not less than two rinks a side, and no club shall be compelled to play more, unless the membership exceeds tweaty, when it shall be compelled to play not more than one rink for every twelve active members in the club over that number.

4. The final winning clubs of the respective districts, shall select two representative rinks to play at the final stage, at the annual bonspiel of the Branch at Winnipeg.

5. In case of isolated districts, with only one club, such club shall be allowed to select two rinks to represent the district in the final competition.

6. In the primary competition in each district, 16 ends shall be played; but at the bonspiel 14 ends only, until the competition is finally decided.

7. Entries must be made not later than the Saturday before the opening of the bonspiel.







The Sault Ste. Marie and Port Perry clubs were dropped from the roll on account of being in arrears.

#### ANNUAL MEETING OF THE QUEBEC BRANCH R.C.C.C.

There was a large attendance at the annual meeting of the Canadian or Quebec Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club of Scotland. The Secretary's report was read and adopted.

A cablegram from the parent organization was read, announcing that a trophy had been presented for competition, but that it was intended as a permanent challenge trophy, which did not meet the wishes of the Branch, as previously indicated by the correspondence read. However, on motion of Dr. Barclay—who de precated discussion until the full conditions of the donation were before the Branch—it was decided to await the receipt of further intelligence before taking action thereon.

The arrangements for the international contest for the Gordon medal were left in abeyance, pending communication from the Grand National Curling Club of America, on whom the onus of a challenge rests for this year. A communication from the Ottawa Curling Club, making suggestions in regard to the conditions of play for the Governor-General's Prize and Branch Tankard was referred to the executive committee to deal with, after consulting the clubs specially interested.

The allocation of district medals for the coming season resulted as ollows:-Montreal Caledonia vs. Ormstown; Montreal Thistle vs. Kingston; Montreal vs. Arnprior; Buckingham vs. St. Andrews; Governor-General's vs. Cornwall; Carleton l'lace vs. Pembroke; Lachine vs. St. Johns; St. Lawrence vs. Victoria.

#### BONSPIEL AT NEEPAWA.

A very successful bonspiel of clubs along the Manitoba and North-Western Railway, was held at Neepawa, on the 20th of January, 1897, and concluded on Saturday the 23rd. Dr. Harrison was umpire, and the district events reported elsewhere, were played at the same meeting. Rinks were in attendance from Russell, Minuedosa, Rapid City, Neepawa, Gladstone and Portage la Prairie.

Five events were on the programme : The Grand Challenge, Union Bank Trophy, Corporation Trophy, Legislative Trophy and Bryan & Lee Trophy. McCrae, of Gladstone, won the Challenge, after an exceedingly keen competitian, Crawford, of Neepawa, being a close second. Skip St. John, of Neepawa, carried off the Union Bank Trophy, but had a severe tussle in the finals with Bell, of Portage la Prairie.

The Corporation Trophy competition was one between eleven Neepawa and the eleven visiting rinks. The result was a victory for Neepawa, the aggregate score standing 143 to 115. The Legislative Trophy competition was a double rink contest, from towns having two rinks at the bonspiel. Neepawa and Gladstone were in the finals, the latter carrying off the coveted trophy, the skips being Pearson and McCrae. The Bryan & Lee competion was won by skip W. J. Winning, of Neepawa.

Neepawa came out of the bonspiel with first in the District Medal, Corporation, Union Bank and Bryan & Lee competitions, and second in the Grand Challenge. Gladstone took first in the Tuckett Primary, Challenge and Legislative Trophy. The Granites, of Portage, took second in the Union Bank and third in the Challenge. Russell took fourth in the Challenge and third in the Union Bank.

A banquet took place on Thursday evening, at which an enjoyable time was spent, and true curlers' fellowship prevailed.

#### EARLY CURLING IN THE NORTH-WEST.

The first game of curling was played in the Northwest Territories in Nov., 1839, on the east side of the Rocky Mountains, at Boak Encampment, about a mile above the junction of the Clark and Lewis Rivers. The curlers were the members of the Hudson's Bay brigade, waiting for the overland transport from Vancouver, The skips were Dugald McTavish, brother of the late Governor McTavish, and Alexander Simpson, brother of Thomas Simpson of Arctic fame. James Steele, Roderick Finlayson, Wm. Spencer and Edward Spencer were the other players. Flat stones were used in the match.

#### DREWRY CITY CURLING PRIZES.

Mr. E. L. Drewry has been one of the most steadfast and generous patrons of curling in the Northwest, since the inception of the game. He has done much to promote the growth and prosperity of the Manitoba Branch, and has besides, aided many individual clubs.

The most important of the latter class, are his annual prizes offered for competition among the several clubs in Winnipeg. The prizes for 1897 were of a very unique design, consisting of an inkstand and thermometer, mounted on small silver curling stones, the whole forming one of the prettiest prizes one could wish for. The competition evoked in the first place a keen struggle for the primaries in all the clubs to determine the representative rink of each club in the finals. The following were the successful skips : S G. Harstone, Granite club; P.

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A. Macdonald, Assiniboine club; Sergt. McMillan, Dragoons' club, and W. A. Carson of the Thistle club.

In the draw for the finals, the Thistle drew the Dragoons, and the Granites the Assiniboine club. The Thistle boys won from the military and the Assiniboines beat the Granites. The deciding game between W. A Carson of the Thistles and P. A. Macdonald of the Assiniboines took place at the Granite rink, and was watched by a large crowd of interested spectators. Mr. Drewry was also present during the evening and evinced great interest in the game. It was one of the finest games of the curling season, and was finally captured by Carson of the Thistles, by a score of 16 to 12. The rinks were composed of the following players :

President Scroggie of the Granite club acted as umpire in the final match, and gave the utmost satisfaction.
