The Committee on ANNUAL present for the consideration of the Association the Eleventh Volume of the ANNUAL, trusting it may be found of interest to all members of affiliated clubs.

Notwithstanding that vigorous efforts were made under the new regulations to get the ANNUAL out by the first of December, yet it is late again this year. The delay was occasioned by only a few clubs, and the hope is expressed that this dilatoriness will be overcome next year.

There are 77 clubs now in affiliation with the Branch. One club was struck off the roll on account of disorganization, but eight new clubs were added this year. There will be upwards of 2,500 active curlers upon the ice this season.

The hand-book will be found replete with interest to members of the curling fraternity, who should diligently peruse its pages. Officers of affiliated clubs should give close study to the new Rules and Regulations on page 62, that they may the more efficiently attend to the government of their clubs. Perfect organization is the secret of success.

The volume now has some 200 pages of compiled matter, entailing considerable labor in its preparation. The frontispiece has an excellent litho-photo of President Scroggie, and there are others throughout its pages of patrons and friends of the Association. The records of the District Matches and Annual Bonspiel will be found interesting reading to all curlers.

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

CONSTITUTION

MANITOBA BRANCH

Royal Caledonian Curling Club of scotland,

CHAP. I.—THE CONSTITUTION.

1. The Association shall be called the Manitoba Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club of Scotland.

2. Its object shall be to promote the Game of Curling, particularly in the Province of Manitoba, adjoining Territories and neighboring States; to unite all the curling clubs therein into one organization; to hold fraternal intercourse with other neighboring curling associations; and to maintain connection with the Royal Caledonian Curling Club of Scotland.

3. Its membership shall consist of the members, *Regular and Honorary*, of all curling clubs which may be received into the Association, and conform to the rules thereof, as adopted.

4. The affairs of the Association shall be managed by a Representative Body, composed of two representatives appointed by each affiliated club, as hereinafter provided, which shall have power to elect from amongst themselves the office-bearers of the Association and to appoint committees for the transaction of the business thereof.

5. An Annual General Meeting of the members of the Association shall be held in Winnipeg, on the Monday of the week of the Winnipeg Industrial Fair in July each year, to receive the Annual Report of the Executive Council, and to transact such other business as may be necessary.

6. A Semi-Annual General Meeting shall take place in Winnipeg on the evening prior to the opening of the Annual Bonspiel in February, to inaugurate same and transact general business. 7. No new law shall be enacted, and no existing law shall be altered or repealed, until approved of by at least two-thirds of the members present at the Annual General Meeting of the Association, and unless notice of such alteration or addition shall have been previously given at the preceding Annual or Semi-Annual Meeting.

CHAP. II.-CLUBS.

1. Any curling club shall be eligible to be received into the Association, which has a membership of not fewer than sixteen persons; and which has a constitution and a staff of office-bearers, including Patron, President, First and Second Vice-Presidents, Secretary-Treasurer, Chaplain, Executive of five members, and two Representative Members on the Branch.

2. Clubs may be received into the Association at any meeting of the Branch, and at any meeting of the Executive Council, if given power to do so at any regular meeting of the Association.

3. Every club desiring admission into the Association shall furnish a list of its office-bearers and members, and name of club; and shall agree to be governed by the Rules of the Association; and must be proposed by one member of the Branch and seconded by another; and a two-thirds majority of votes of those present shall decide the question.

4. Every club shall elect annually, at the Annual Meeting (on the first Wednesday of April) of their respective clubs, two persons as its delegates on the Branch; and no person shall, at any meeting of the Association, represent more than one club. In the event of any representative being unable to be present at any meeting of the Association, a Proxy may be appointed by the executive of the club he represents, or by the president thereof.

5. No person can be a *regular* member of more than one affiliated club at one and the same time; and the lists of members sent in by the secretaries of local clubs to the Secretary of the Association for publication in the Annual for the season, shall determine the membership of each person and club for that season. The status of new membership received into a local club, after publication of Annual, can only be established by the certificate of the Secretary of the Association that their names have been added to the roll of the local club and dues paid. Should the name of any person be returned in the list of more than one club, such person shall be disqualified in all of them, until the

Secretary of the Branch shall be notified by him that his name has been withdrawn from every list except the one to which he properly belongs.

6. Persons who, from change of residence or other sufficient reason, find it desirable, may withdraw from one club and be received into another during the curling season; but the change, before coming into effect, must be assented to by both clubs, and be approved of by the Executive Council; but no such change, or any other reason, shall make it lawful for any curler to play in any one season for, or on behalf of, more than one club, for prizes allocated by the Association, or given under its auspices. Any club playing an Association Prize Match with one or more curlers in its ranks not properly qualified as members, shall forfeit all right to the prize if it shall have been successful in the contest.

7. Clubs must classify their Members, as Honorary and Regular. Entrance Fee and Annual Dues shall be payable for each *regular* member returned as belonging to the club, and only *regular* members shall be entitled to take part in the Association games, and be eligible to be representative delegates.

CHAP. III.-THE ASSOCIATION.

1. The Association, composed of two Representatives from each affiliated club, shall hold a regular meeting in July of each year, as provided in Sec. 5, Chap. 1, of the Constitution, which shall be known as the Annual General Meeting of the Members of the Association. The Semi-Annual Meeting shall be held on the night previous to the date of the opening of the Annual Bonspiel. Special meetings may be called by the proper office-bearers. At all such meetings, eleven shall be a quorum.

2. At said Annual Meeting, the Association shall elect for the year ensuing, the office-bearers of the Association, who shall come into office immediately upon their election, and continue until their successors are appointed. They shall consist of a Patron, a President, a First and Second Vice-President, a Chaplain and the Secretary-Treasurer. At the same meeting, there shall also be elected Standing Committees. The Executive Council shall consist of the office-bearers and six other Executive members; the Committee on Annual, and the Committee on Complaints and Appeals. The mode of election shall, in all cases, be by ballot, when more than one person has been proposed and seconded for any office. a. The duties of the President shall be to preside and maintain order at all meetings of the Association and of the Executive Council; and he shall sign the minutes of such meetings after they have been confirmed, and all official documents. The chairman at all meetings shall have a casting vote in case of a tie, as well as a deliberative vote.

b. The First Vice-President shall take the place and discharge the duties of the President when he is absent; and the Second Vice-President shall have the same authority in the absence of the President and First Vice-President; and should all of them be absent from any regular or special meeting, it shall be competent for the meeting assembled to elect a chairman, who shall have, *pro. tem.*, all the rights and powers of the President.

c. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep full and correct minutes of all the meetings of the Association and the Executive Council, and shall conduct all correspondence arising out of the same, and generally carry out the work of the Association. He shall levy and collect all dues and fees, and pay all accounts, and shall keep regular and correct accounts of all moneys collected and bills paid. His books and accounts shall at all times be open to the inspection of the office-bearers, and shall be audited at the close of each fiscal year.

d. The Executive shall consist of six members of the Branch, who shall assist in conducting the business of the Association.

e. The Committee on Complaints and Appeals shall receive from the Secretary, and adjudicate upon, all complaints and appeals from clubs in regard to their curling intercourse with each other, and especially with reference to competitions for prizes, played for under the auspices of the Association, and shall report to the Executive Council. Their decisions shall always be communicated to the contending parties in writing, and will be held to be accepted and acquiesced in, unless they are notified to the contrary within ten days after their decision shall have been mailed to the said contending parties, and the reasons for nonacquiescence set forth in said notification.

f. The Committee on Annual shall be charged with the publication of the Annual of the Association, which shall be issued every year about the first of December, and shall contain a list of the office-bearers of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, and of this Association, along with lists of the office-bearers and members of the clubs in connection therewith, the rules and regulations of the Association, the minutes of the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, and special meetings of the Branch, the financial condition of the Association from year to year, reports of competitions for prizes allocated by the Association, along with records of other matters affecting curling, and calculated to promote the game in Canada.

g. Two auditors shall examine and certify the Secretary-Treasurer's accounts from year to year.

3. No complaint or appeal will be received unless sent in to the Secretary of the Association in writing, within one week from the date on which occurred the matter of the said complaint or appeal; and no complaint or appeal shall be decided until all parties thereto shall have been given an opportunity to state their case; and any party failing or neglecting to show cause within one week after being notified to do so by the Committee, shall thereby be held to have departed from their claim, and to have forfeited all rights to any further hearing.

4. At the annual and semi-annual meetings of the Association, the Order of Business shall be as follows, viz. :

- 1. Calling meeting to order.
- 2. Report on credentials of delegates.
- 3. Reading minutes of previous meetings.
- 4. Admission of new clubs.
- 5. Communications.
- 6. Accounts.
- 7. Annual reports of clubs.
- 8. Reports of standing committees.
- 9. Reports of special committees.
- 10. Semi-annual reports of clubs.
- 11. Unfinished business.
- 12. Report of District umpires.
- 13. Election of office-bearers.
- 14. New business.
- 15. Alteration of Constitution.
- 16. Miscellaneous business.

5. At Special Meetings no business shall be transacted other than that for which the meeting was convened, and which had been clearly set forth in the circular calling the meeting. The President, Secretary, and any five members of the Executive Council may convene a special meeting of the Association at any time.

CHAP. IV.-ENTRANCE AND ANNUAL FEES.

1. The fees payable by clubs shall be an entrance fee, club fee, annual dues and *per capita* levy for maintenance of the ANNUAL.

2. The Entrance Fee of any club shall be \$5, which must accompany application, together with annual club fee and other dues.

3. The Annual Dues shall be paid in advance, as follows: A club fee of \$2 each year from each club, and an additional sum of 15 cents. in respect of each *regular* member of the club, also a *per capita* levy of 10 cents. for maintenance of the ANNUAL. Members can be registered up to the 31st day of December, in each year, and new clubs admitted up to same date.

4. From these sources shall be formed a Common Fund, to be under the control of the Executive Council, and from which shall be defrayed the salary of the Secretary-Treasurer, printing of the ANNUAL, advertising and incidental expenses of the Association.

5. No club in arrears shall be entitled to compete in the District Matches, or for any prize of the Association at the Annual Bonspiel.

6. If any club shall fall two years in arrear in the payment of its annual dues, it shall be struck off the roll of the Association, and shall not be re-instated except as a new club, unless the Association shall decide to the contrary by a two-thirds vote.

CHAP. 5.—THE GAME.


1. The standard length of the rink for play shall be 42 yards from hack to tee. No important match shall be commenced if the ice be not in a condition fairly to test the curling skill of the competing players; and it shall be stopped and declared "off," if, after it has been begun, the condition of the ice, by reason of thaw setting in, or snow falling, becomes such as not to afford a fair test of the skill of the competing players; or darkness comes on sufficient to prevent the stones at the tee from being distinctly seen from the further hack; and in all cases of stopped matches, the postponed game shall be commenced *de novo*. The umpire's decision regarding the condition of the ice and atmosphere, shall be final in all cases.

2. The tees to be made 38 yards apart, and around each, as a centre, shall be described a circle of seven feet radius, which shall be called the "Home" or "Ring." To facilitate measurements, intermediate circles may also be described around the tee. Every stone within, or resting upon the outer ring, shall be entitled to be counted in the game: no stone shall be considered without a circle, unless it is entirely clear of that circle, nor shall a stone be considered over a line unless it has crossed and entirely cleared it. In every case this is to be decided by a square placed upon the ice.

3. From, and in exact alignment with both tees, a line, called the centre line, shall be drawn to a point four yards behind each tee; at this point a line shall be drawn, at a right angle to the centre line, on which the hack shall be cut. The hack shall not exceed six inches in length, nor shall the inner edge thereof be more than three inches from the centre line, so that all stones shall be delivered with their centre upon the centre line.

4. Other lines, called the MIDDLE SCORE, the HOG SCORE, the SWEEPING SCORE and BACK SCORE, shall also be drawn on the ice, at right angles to the centre line. The MIDDLE SCORE shall be drawn at midway between the two tees, to point out the place at which sweeping may ordinarily be commenced. The HOG SCORE shall be drawn at a distance from each tee of one-sixth of the length from hack to further tee, and shall indicate the point which, if a played stone fails to pass, it shall be counted a hog, and removed from the ice, unless it has been prevented from passing by striking another played stone, resting inside said hog score. The SWEEPING SCORE shall be drawn across the tees, for the guidance of the skips in sweeping. The BACK SCORE shall be drawn just outside and behind the 14 feet circle around the tee (the home); all stones having passed this score must be removed from the ice.

For method of laying out rink, see diagram.

5. All matches to be the majority of shots won, after playing a certain number of heads, or definite period of time, to be agreed on by the competing clubs before beginning to play. In the event of both parties being equal at the conclusion of the match, play shall be continued, under the direction of the umpire, by all the rinks engaged, for another head, or for such additional number of heads as may be necessary to decide the match.

6. Every rink to be composed of four players aside, each using two stones, and playing one stone alternately with

his opponent, and the rotation of players observed in the first head shall not be changed during the match.

7. The two skips opposing each other shall settle by lot, or in any other way they may agree upon, which party may lead in the first head, after which the winning party shall lead.

8. The skips shall have the exclusive management and direction of the game for their respective parties, and may play last, or in any part of the game they please, but are not entitled to change their places when once fixed. When their turn to play comes, they shall each appoint one of their players to act in their places as skips of the game, and must take the position of ordinary players, until they have played and returned to the tee-head as skips.

9. Players, during the course of each end, shall be arranged along the sides, but well off the rink, as their skips may direct; and no party, except when sweeping according to rule, shall go upon the middle of the rink. Skips alone to stand within the fourteen feet circle, of home; the skip of the party playing to have the choice of place, and must not be obstructed by the other in front of the tee, while behind it, the privileges of both, as regards sweeping shall be equal.

10. Every player to be ready to play when his turn comes, and shall not take more than a reasonable time to play. Should he play a stone belonging to another player, any of the players may stop it while running; but if not stopped till at rest, the stone which should have been played shall be put in its place to the satisfaction of the opposing skip.

11. If a player should play out of turn, the stone so played may be stopped in its course and returned to the player; should the mistake not be discovered until the stone be at rest, or has struck another stone, the opposing skip shall add one to his score, and have the option of allowing the game to proceed, or declaring the end null and void. But if another stone has been played before the mistake has been noticed, the end must be finished as if it had been played properly from the beginning.

12. If any player engaged, or belonging to either of the competing clubs, shall speak to, taunt, or otherwise interrupt any other player, not of his own party, while preparing to play his stone, and so as to disconcert him, one shot shall be added to the score of the party so interrupted, for each interruption, and the play proceed.

13. If in sweeping, or otherwise, a *running* stone be marred by any of the party to which it belongs, it shall be put

off the ice, and the opposing skip shall have the option to add one to his score, and allow the game to proceed, or to call the end null and void; but if marred by any of the adverse party, it shall be placed wherever the skip of the party to which it belongs may direct. If marred by any other the player shall replay the stone. Should any *played* stone be displaced by any of the players before the head is reckoned, it shall be placed as near as possible where it lay, to the satisfaction of, or by the skip opposed to the party displacing it. If displaced by any neutral party, both skips to agree upon the position to which it is to be returned, and if they fail to agree, the umpire shall decide.

14. The sweeping shall be under the direction and control of the skips. Upon all occasions a stone may be swept from the HOG SCORE, nearest the point from which the stone is delivered, and may be swept by the party to whose side it belongs, until it comes to the SWEEPING SCORE; but all stones when they have passed the sweeping score, may be swept by EITHER SKIP ONLY. Skips will have liberty to sweep behind the tee at all times, except when a player is receiving directions to play from his skip. All sweeping shall be across the rink, and the sweeper must be in frout of the stone being swept, and at one side thereof; and no sweepings shall either be moved forward, or left in front of a running stone, or of a stone "at rest." It shall not be allowable for the party to whom a running stone belongs to place their brooms before it or behind it to screen it from the wind, unless with consent of both skips; and the use of a broom or any other instrument as a fan, either to promote or retard the running of a stone, is strictly forbidden, and is to be dealt with as "a running stone" marred by the party to which it belongs. (See Sec. 13).

15. All stones shall be of a circular shape. No stone, including handle. shall be of a greater weight than fortyseven and one-half pounds, or of a greater circumference than thirty-six inches, or of a less height than one-eighth part of its greatest circumference.

16. No stone or side of a stone shall be changed after a match has begun, unless with the consent of the opposing skip. Should a stone happen to be broken during a game, the largest fragment shall be considered in the game for that end, and the player shall be entitled to use another stone, or another pair, during the remainder of the game.

17. Should a played stone roll over, or stop on its edge or top, it shall be put off the ice. Should the handle quit the

stone in delivery, the player will not be entitled to replay the stone unless he retains his hold of the handle.

18. No measuring of shots allowable previous to the termination of the end. Disputed shots to be determined by the vice-skips; or, if they disagree, by the umpire; or, if there is no umpire, by some neutral person chosen by the skips. All measurements to be taken from centre of tee to nearest point of stone, after removing stones intervening.

19. If any of the competing rinks are not ready to begin play at the hour named for a match, one end shall be counted as played for every ten minutes' delay; and the opposing rink, if ready to play, shall count one point in the game for each such period of time it is kept waiting.

"No rink shall be eligible to enter for any competition or match under the jurisdiction of the Association, unless in the first game they have four bona fide active players. If, however, after starting in any event, any member, through sickness, or other unforeseen circumstances, is unable to play, then the following rules to apply:

"a. If the skip be absent, then the third man becomes skip, and the second man plays his own and the third pair of stones.

"b. If the third player be absent, the second man shall play second and third place.

"c. If the second player be absent, then the lead plays first as well as second place.

"d. If the lead be absent, the second player shall play his own as well as the lead stones.

"e. A sweeper will be allowed for the absentee, but no rink shall continue play with less than three men."


CHAP. VI.-ICE RINKS.

1. All District Matches, as well as those played at the Annual Bonspiel and general competitions at the Points' Game, must be played on new or virgin ice, or upon neutral ice.

ICE FOR CURLING SHALL BE DEEMED NEW OR VIRGIN ICE:

a. When it has not previously been played on.

b. When, since last played on, it shall have been flooded so completely as that the water shall have come to its natural level, over the entire ice surface, before freezing.



c. If, after being last used for curling, the ice shall have been refaced by sprinkling with water, and the tees changed, either at least two feet sideways or ten feet lengthways, so as to get rid of grooves or channels formed in the course of play.

d. Shaving off nodules or protuberances from the surface of the ice, or the application of any other mechanical operations, having for their object the bringing of the ice to a true and correct level, shall not be held as degrading ice, otherwise entitled to be called new or virgin ice; but such operations must be carried out under the direction of the umpire, and in no case shall any special preparation of the ice be made, intended, or calculated, or having for its object to facilitate the making of any particular shot, or to otherwise pervert the ice surface from the true and correct level.

e. It is desirable that artificial single rinks should be constructed, not less than 18 feet in width by 152 in length, so as to admit of changing the tees both sideways and lengthways.

CHAP. VII — THE POINTS GAME.

1. Rinks shall be laid off in accordance with the diagram given for the game in the ANNUAL. Within the 14 feet circle, a circle 8 feet in diameter shall be drawn around the tee, and a centre line or score from the hack to the hog score; and the length of the rink from hack to tee shall be 42 yards.

2. Lots shall be drawn for the order of playing; each competitor shall change position one place each point thus: The first player at any of the points to be the last in playing at next point, and the second player at any point to be the first at the next, and so on. Each competitor shall use two stones, and play them, the one immediately after the other, and shall not, during the competition, change the side of a stone, or the stone itself, unless it happens to be broken.

3. Every competitor to play four shots at each of the nine following points of the game, viz. : Striking, Inwicking, Drawing, Guarding, Chap and Lie, Wick and Curl In, Raising, Drawing Through a Port, and Chipping the Winner, according to the following definitions, and each successful shot shall count as hereinafter provided :

a. Striking.—A stone placed on the sweeping score, and with its inner edge two feet from the tee. If struck, to count 1; if struck out of the 14 feet circle, to count 2.

b. Inwicking.—One stone being placed on the tee, and another with its inner edge 2 feet 6 inches from the tee, and

its fore-edge on a line drawn from the tee at an angle of 45 degrees with the central line; if the played stone strike the latter on the inside to count 1; if it perceptibly move both stones, to count 2.

c. Drawing.—If the stone played lies within or on the 14 feet circle to count 1; if within or on the 8 feet circle to count 2.

d. Guarding. A stone, to be guarded, placed with its foreedge on the tee. If the stone played rests within 6 inches of the central line to count 1; if on the line, to count 2. It shall be over the hog, but not touch the stone to be guarded.

e. Chap and Lie.—If the stone placed on the sweeping score, with its inner edge one foot from the tee, be struck out of the 14 feet circle, and the played stone rest within or on the same circle, to count 1; if struck out of the 14 feet circle, and the played stone rest within or on the 8 feet circle, to count 2.

f. Wick and Curl In.—A stone being placed with its inner edge 7 feet distant from the tee, and its fore-edge on a line making an angle of 45 degrees with the central line; if the stone is struck and the played stone curls on or within the 14 feet circle, to count 1; if struck, and the played stone rests on or within the 8 feet circle, to count 2.

g. Raising.—A stone placed with its centre on the central line and its inner edge 8 feet distant from the tee; if struck within or on the 14 feet circle to count 1; if struck within or on the 8 feet circle, to count 2.

h. Drawing Through a Port.—One stone to be placed with its inner edge on the central line, 10 feet in front of the tee, and another stone placed parallel thereto, and with its inner 2 feet from the central line; if the played stone passes between these two stones, without touching either, and rests within or on the 14 feet circle, to count 1; if within or on the 8 feet circle, to count 2.

i. Chipping the Wiuner.—A stone being placed on the tee, and another 10 feet distant, and with its inner edge just touching the central line, and half guarding the one on the tee, and a third stone being placed 4 feet behind the tee, with its inner edge touching the central line, but on the opposite side from that on which the guard is placed : if the played stone strikes the stone placed behind the tee, to count 1; if it strikes the stone on the tee, to count 2.

j. Outwicking.—In the event of two or more competitors gaining the same number of shots, they shall play four shots at outwicking, that is: a stone being placed with its inner edge 7 feet distant from the tee, and its centre on a line making an angle of 45 degrees with the central line; if

struck within or on the 14 feet circle, to count 1; if struck within or on the 8 feet circle, to count 2.

4. If the competition cannot be decided by these shots, the umpire shall order one or more points to be played again by the competitors who are equal.

5. In the Points' Game, the Rinks may be swept as often as required during the intervals between the playing of stones. A player may sweep his own stone, and may direct where a broom shall be held to guide him in playing.

NOTE — It will save much time, if, in playing for local prizes, two rinks be prepared lying parallel to each other, the tee of the one being at the reverse end of the other rink; every competitor plays both stones up the one rink, and immediately afterwards down the other; finishing thus, at one round, all his chances at that point.

It will also save time if a code of signals be arranged between the marker and the players, such as: The marker to raise one hand when one is scored, and both hands when two are scored. In the case of a miss both hands to be kept down.



From E. Mitchell, Secretary, asking for the affiliation of the Sintaluta Curling Club, and that they be placed in the Qu'Appelle District. Geo. Hill and Dr. Geddes, delegates. On motion of James Scroggie, the club was admitted.

From O. E. S. Whiteside, Secretary, asking that Anthracite Curling Club be admitted to the Branch, and enclosing the necessary fees. Alex. Black and M. Campbell delegates. On motion of G. F. Bryan, the club was admitted.

From J. G. Clark, Secretary, asking that Banff Curling Club be admitted into the Branch, and enclosing the necessary fees. L. A. Hamilton and J. T. Speirs were named as delegates. On motion of Geo. F. Galt, the club was admitted. Ald. Speirs was then seated, as delegate. The Secretary-Treasurer reported that there were some other clubs in process of organization, and that authority should be given the new Council to admit them up to the end of December.

On motion of Thos. Black, seconded by G. F. Bryan, the Executive Council for the ensuing year were empowered to admit into the Association any further clubs applying for affiliation.

ANNUAL REPORTS.

Annual reports were received from all clubs in affiliation, except Birtle, Cypress River, Dauphin, Fort William, Glenboro, Hamiota, Hartney, Holland, Manitou, Melita, Moose Jaw, Napinka, Neepawa, Ninga, Pilot Mound, Port Arthur, Qu'Appelle (Heather), Rat Portage, Stockton, Treherne and Yorkton.

On motion of Thos. Johnson, the annual reports were received and placed on file.

SPECIAL PRIZES.

The Secretary-Treasurer read letters from the following donors of special prizes :

From J. G. Morgan, Manager New York Life Insurance Co., promising to renew four individual prizes to accompany the New York Life Challenge Cup.

From Arthur Congdon, Canadian Agent for Alfred Dolge, of New York, offering four handsome diamond horseshoe scarf pins to accompany the Alfred Dolge International Trophy.

From Messrs. Tees & Persse, agents for Geo. E. Tuckett & Son, of Hamilton, Ont., promising to renew their eight individual prizes to accompany the Tuckett Trophy at next Bonspiel.

From Buchanan & Gordon, Agents for Hiram Walker & Sons, offering four handsome ladies' gold watches to accompany the Walkerville Tankard at Bonspiel of 1900.

From Lord Strathcona, offering congratulations on the progress of the Branch, and enclosing cheque of \$100 for renewal of prizes to accompany the Royal Caledonian Tankard at next Bonspiel. From Geo. F. & J. Galt, promising to renew the four individual prizes, which will accompany the Galt Cup at the Bonspiel of 1900.

From Wm. Whyte, Manager C.P.R., Western Division, again offering to renew his silver cup for a veteran's prize at the next Bonspiel.

From C. C. Chipman, Commissioner, Hudson's Bay Co., enclosing cheque for \$50, to purchase four prizes to be awarded the rink taking second place in the Royal Caledonian Tankard.

On motion of I. Pitblado, seconded by J. M. Chisholm, the Secretary-Treasurer was instructed to acknowledge the communications from the several donors of special prizes, and to convey to them the thanks of the Association for their generous contributions in aid of the 12th Annual Bonspiel.

EXECUTIVE REPORT.

The eleventh annual report of the Executive Council of the Branch was laid before the Association. It refers to the national pastime of curling as growing in popularity throughout Western Canada. It seems to be without a rival as a winter sport in this country. The number of clubs under the jurisdiction of the Branch will soon reach the century mark. Seventy clubs were in affiliation with the Association during the past year, of which sixty-six were in good standing and active operation. This number would have been larger, but for the fact that Nelson, Kaslo, Rossland, Sandon and Revelstoke withdrew to form a new association in British Columbia.

Of the seventy clubs, comprising the Association, five are in North-western Ontario, fourteen in the North-West Territories, one in British Columbia, and fifty in Manitoba. Ten new clubs affiliated during the year: Beulah, Binscarth, Ninga, Oak Lake, Parkissimo, Pipestone, Roland, Shoal Lake, and the Heather Club, of Souris, in Manitoba, and Fort Macleod in the North-West Territories. Three clubs that had become disorganized: Winnipeg Dragoons, Carman and Minnedosa, were re-instated; and Mountainside having joined Deloraine, was struck off the roll. The branch had in active affiliation during the past year 2,155 regular members in good standing, being 290 in excess of the number reported the previous year.

The territory under the jurisdiction of the Branch was sub-divided into twenty-one districts, to facilitate competition for the district medals, Tuckett Intermediate badges and club primaries. The former continue to grow in interest and are quite an incentive to inter-club play in the various districts. The club primaries for the Tuckett, International and Galt cups also evince much interest, and give excellent practice to rinks having in view attendance at the Winnipeg Bonspiel. The Tuckett Badges for intermediate play have proved so popular that it might be well to consider this system of reward to winning rinks in the club bonspiel primaries. District umpires are thanked for their diligent and faithful services to the Association.

The Secretary-Treasurer reports the receipts from all sources, inclusive of a balance from the previous year, as \$1,169.95, and the expenditure, including the cost of publication of the ANNUAL, and salary of the Secretary-Treassurer, \$1,125.36, leaving a surplus on hand of \$44.19, for the ensuing year. Appended is a statement in detail of receipts and expenditures, duly audited.

The Council report the favorable acceptance, by nearly all the clubs in affiliation, of the new constitution and bylaws, approved at the last annual meeting of the Branch, for the government of such clubs. With one or two exceptions, the fixing of the fiscal year from the 1st of April to the 31st of March following, in all clubs is felt to be a step in the right direction, enabling clubs to wind up their affairs immediately after the close of the curling season. Another advantage gained is that the Branch will be able to hold its annual meeting in July, as provided by the constitution, closing its fiscal year on the 30th of June in each year.

The Executive have to report with sincere regret, the death, last year, of two well-known and highly-respected members of the curling fraternity. R. S. Alexander, banker, of Treherne, and for several years a delegate to the Branch, was the victim of a railway accident, just as he had reached the C.P.R. depot, being on a business trip to the city, in December last. He died on the eve of New Year's Day, and the body was interred in Kildonan cemetery. The other death was that of Jack McMillan, of Lindsay, Ont., who was well and favorably known among curlers, both in Canada and the United States. True, he was not a member of our Association, nevertheless, he was well-known in Manitoba, from having been a frequent visitor

at the annual bonspiels of the Branch. His death also was from an accident, his body having been mangled in milling machinery, His remains were interred in Lindsay cemetery, amid the gloom and sorrow of his curling comrades. Floral offerings were sent from many curling organizations throughout Canada and the United States. A fraternal message was wired from our Association, and a broken broom, as a floral emblem from the Branch, was placed upon the bier. The Executive recommended a minute to be made of both deaths, with suitable memoirs for publication in the next ANNUAL.

On motion of A. Macdonald, seconded by H. W. Nelson, the report was received and adopted.

ELEVENTH ANNUAL BONSPIEL.

The Executive Council submitted for the consideration of the Branch a report on the Eleventh Annual Bonspiel, held the 6th of February, 1899. The great event was inaugurated at the semi-annual meeting of the Branch, held in the Manitoba Hotel on the Saturday evening previous. On Sunday evening Chaplain Pedley preached a sermon in Central Congregational Church to some 500 curlers, from a text in Ecclesiastes. "The race is not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong."

Play began on Monday morning, with the New York Life Challenge Competition in which 110 rinks were entered. Competitors were in attendance from far and near, and vied with each other in the struggle for coveted trophies and accompanying honors. Veteran Skip Flavelle, from Ontario; Griggs and Defiel, from St. Paul; Chisholm, from Superior, Wis.; and Hurdon, McLeod and Black, from Duluth, together with a large representation from the Branch, made an aggregate attendance of some 500 curlers.

The weather was very severe, nevertheless the gathering was a success. Competition for the Tuckett, Walkerville, Royal Caledonian, Galt, Patterson, and Whyte cups was exceedingly keen. Citizens and curlers united in their efforts to please visiting curlers. The curlers' reception on Thursday evening, in the Winnipeg Opera House, to visiting curlers, was a fitting climax to a week of festivity, and was heartily enjoyed by a crowded house. The list of Bonspiel prizes was one of the best ever offered by the Association. It was made a ladies' year, and no effort was spared to make the prize list assume this character. Jerry Robinson's window was the cynosure of all eyes, particularly to those of the ladies. The Council ascribes the fine prize list to the generosity of the patrons of the Branch and business men of Winnipeg. The Executive express their indebtedness to the railway authorities for reduced rates to curlers, and excursion rates to visitors, thus virtually making bonspiel week a mid-winter holiday. The C.P.R. Telegraph, Bell Telephoue and Electric Street Railway Companies also extended courtesies to the Association that were duly appreciated.

Patrons of the Association who gave special prizes to accompany their trophies or cups were: Lord Strathcona, J. G. Morgan, New York Life Insurance Co.; Arthur Congdon, Canadian Agent for the Alfred Dolge Co.; Geo. E. Tuckett & Son, Hamilton. Ont.; Hiram Walker & Sons, of Walkerville, Ont.; and Geo. F. and J. Galt, of this city. Manager Whyte, of the C.P.R., gave for the first time a cup to veteran curlers, which elicited keen competition. Lieut.-Gov. Patterson presented a new cup, the old one having been won absolutely by Regina the previous year, and His Worship, Mayor Andrews, gave four beautiful ladies' watches to the team winning His Honor's Cup. Patron Macdonald gave an elegant ladies' gold watch as first prize in the Grand Point Competition.

The Secretary-Treasurer reports the receipts in cash from all sources, inclusive of a balance from the previous year of \$127.32, as \$1,933.32. The sources of revenue were entry fees from city rinks, grant from the City Corporation and subscriptions from hotels and business men of the city. The expenditure, inclusive of expense of Auditorium Rink, and cost of entertaining visiting curlers, amounted to \$1,927.76, leaving a small surplus on hand for the ensuing year.

The Executive express gratitude to the donors of special prizes for their generosity, and particularly to contributors of cash subscriptions from among business men of the city, who have given upwards of \$1,200 to the Bonspiel fund. A hope is expressed that the grant from the city council will be largely augmented, seeing the financial benefits that accrue to citizens as a result of the Bonspiel. The assets of the Branch consist of the trophies, tankards, and other permanent cups of the Association, for whose safe custody they are indebted to D. R. Dingwall. There are no outstanding liabilities.

The report concludes with congratulating the Branch upon the increased success and interest taken in the Annual Bonspiel. It is now assuming such vast proportions, that some active and vigorous steps must be taken to provide more ice and meet the increased expenditure. They recommend in future, that the Bonspiel begin on Wednesday morning, with the semi-annual meeting of the Branch the night before. A change is also recommended in the Patterson Cup Competition, to avoid the confusion of last year, by making it eligible to all rinks defeated in the extra series or first draw of the New York Life, Walkerville and Royal Caledonian competitions. The Council expresses its thanks to Chief Umpire Alex. Brown, and those associated with him, for the success with which they conducted the last Bonspiel.

On motion of Geo. F. Galt, seconded by S. P. Clark, the report was received and adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ANNUAL.

The Secretary-Treasurer presented a report from the Committee on Vol. 10 of the ANNUAL for the year 1898-9. The Committee found it necessary, owing to the increase in membership, to publish a somewhat larger volume, and a contract was entered into for printing 800 copies at \$220.00, a slight increase on the cost of that of the previous year.

The handbook of last year received the highest encomiums everywhere, both at home and abroad. It was not only an artistic production, but was replete with every kind of information of interest to members of the curling fraternity. The cover was a marvel of the lithographic art, as were also the many portraits that adorned the inside of the work, all being the work of Bulman Bros. of this city.

The levy of ten cents. per capita on the membership of last year realized the sum of \$215.50. In addition to this, arrears from previous years were collected, amounting to \$25.90, making the aggregate receipts for the ANNUAL \$240.40, almost sufficient to pay for the cost of publication.

Seven hundred and twenty-seven copies of the ANNUAL of last year were distributed *pro rata* among sixty-six clubs, in the ratio of one copy for every three members, in compliance with the resolution of the Branch regulating their distribution. Four clubs, being in default, were not sent ANNUALS. The remaining copies were distributed to sister associations, officers and umpires of the Branch, the city press, donors of leading special prizes, and a few of the larger contributors to the Bonspiel fund.

The ANNUAL has become an invaluable medium for members of affiliated clubs, enabling them to keep in touch with the entire work of the Association. A new feature last year was the publication of a draft of rules and regulations prepared by the Branch, for the ratification of all affiliated clubs. It was almost unanimously approved, and will do much to harmonize and strengthen the Association. The committee recommend that at least 1,000 copies be procured of the new ANNUAL for the ensuing year.

On motion of John McKechnie, seconded by M. Aldous, the report was received and adopted.

OFFICE BEARERS, 1899-1900.

The President next called for the election of officebearers for the ensuing year. Mr. T. A. Anderson, in retiring from the Presidency, made a neat speech, in which he thanked the Branch for the honor done him in electing him for the past year, and for the hearty support accorded him during his term of office. He cordially installed to the chair his successor, President-Elect Scroggie. The latter, in a pleasing address, acknowledged the honor done him, thanked the Branch for the compliment, and promised to discharge the duties devolving upon him to the very best of his ability.

A hearty vote of thanks was unanimously tendered the Auditors for their services the past year.

NEW BUSINESS.

On motion of Joseph Maw, the new Council were empowered to make all necessary arrangements for the forthcoming Bonspiel, fixed for Wednesday, the 14th day of February, 1900.

H. W. Nelson asked that one of the open competitions be made "Outside" vs. City of Winnipeg.

Geo. F. Galt thought the first draw of the Royal Caledonian Competition might be made to assume that character.

W. F. Payne was afraid that plan would not give satisfaction to outside curlers.

Isaac Pitblado agreed with Mr. Payne, and thought the plan of last year should be adhered to.

The question was therefore left with the new Executive to decide.

On motion of J. T. Speirs, the new Executive Council were empowered to sub-divide the territory under the jurisdiction of the Branch into districts, and allocate the clubs, also to order the District Medals, Tuckett and Umpire Badges.

H. W. Nelson asked that the name "Rockwood" be changed so as to read "Selkirk District," and that James Baxter, of Winnipeg, be umpire.

On motion of W. G. White, a vote of thanks was accorded the retiring office-bearers for 1898-9. President Anderson briefly acknowledged, on the part of the retiring officers, the compliment. On motion of W. F. Payne, a special vote of thanks was accorded Mr. John McKechnie, for his services as Chairman of the Ice Committee.

On motion of J. M. Chisholm, the Committee on Annual were instructed to procure 1,000 copies of the new ANNUAL, at a cost not to exceed \$225.

On motion of J. P. Robertson, a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. John Wilkes, for placing gratuitously at the disposal of the Branch the room used by the Association for the past year, and known as "Curlers' Headquarters," also for his liberal donation of \$50 to the Bonspiel fund.

The meeting then adjourned.

DISTRICT MATCHES


Manitoba Branch R. C. C. C.

1898-99. *

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The reports from the District Umpires show a continued interest in the District Matches, except in two or three instances, where there are only isolated districts. It has been suggested where there is only one club in a district, particularly in large towns like Calgary, Prince Albert and Edmonton, that it would be well for curlers to subdivide into two clubs of say twenty or more members in each. In this way considerable rivalry would grow up between them, and an opportunity would be given for competition for the Medal and Tuckett Intermediate Badges as in other districts. Even in other districts the principle of having two clubs in a large town works well. In Souris District there are two fine clubs in the town of Souris, as well as those in the surrounding country.

The fruits of inter-club play in the rural districts made itself manifest in the last Annual Bonspiel. Many rinks showed up to good advantage from out-lying points, and also carried off a fair share of the prizes. In addition to the play for the Tuckett and District Medal in Districts, there was some very keen competition in many clubs for the Bonspiel primaries. The Secretaries of some clubs neglect to mention this play in their Annual Reports which should now reach headquarters by the first of May in each year, after the holding of the Annual Meeting, which takes place on the first Wednesday of April. Club primaries are

for the Tuckett, International and the Galt, the latter of course for clubs outside of Manitoba. The way to do is to take entries at the start of the season for the club primaries, and then each rink to play every other rink to determine the order of priority of winning rinks. The first two usually take the Tuckett, and play for the Tuckett intermediate badges, as well as the District Medal, the next rink takes the International, and in outlying districts the fourth takes the Galt. In all cases where such winning rinks cannot play either for the Tuckett Intermediate or go to Winnipeg for the International or Galt, substitutes are allowed.

In isolated districts with only one club, the Medal is played for at points, just one game. Entries taken upon some fixed date, and time of play put up by a notice in the rink at least one week ahead. The ten highest scores have to be kept by the District Umpire, and returns made promptly to headquarters. In other districts, when a club wins the District Medal it is brought home and played down for at points, in the same way as in isolated districts.

In isolated districts the club primary play determines who is entitled to represent the club at Winnipeg in the Tuckett, International and Galt, as before stated, the two highest rinks taking the Tuckett, the third the International, and fourth the Galt.

The Executive sub-divided the territory under the jurisdiction of the Branch into twenty-one districts, and gave a handsome silver medal to each for local competition. They also gave eight nice badges to be awarded the players of the rinks winning the Tuckett Intermediate. The winners are expected to wear those badges when they come to Winnipeg to play the final. Players who have to procure substitutes must hand over their badges to such substitutes. The following allocation of clubs was made in the respective districts :

N.B.—District Umpires should lose no time in sending in their reports after the District Matches are over. They must positively not be later than the 31st of January. They should take place not later than the 15th of January and sooner if at all possible,

ROYAL DISTRICT MEDALS,

The Association, with a view to promote and encourage District play, awarded twenty-one handsome medals for District competition in 1898-99. They also awarded eight badges to each District for the individuals of the double rink winning the Tuckett Intermediate, and right to represent District in final at Winnipeg. The umpires had the arranging of the time and place of all District matches, subject to the approval of the Branch Executive Council. Umpires should in all instances consult with the clubs interested in arranging for the District meeting.

RULES.

1. The Manitoba Branch R.C.C.C., in order to promote curling intercourse and friendly rivalry between affiliated clubs has resolved to allocate annually for competition among them, medals to be known as Royal District Medals.

2. For such medal competitions all affiliated clubs of the Branch shall be arranged in districts of not less than two clubs in each, such districts to be determined at the annual meeting of the Branch, each year.

3. The clubs in each district shall play off against each other, with not less than two rinks a side, and no club shall be compelled to play more, unless the membership exceeds twenty, when it shall be compelled to play not more than one rink for every twelve active members in the club over that number.

4. The umpire shall be nominated by the Executive Council of the Branch, for the respective districts, not later than the 1st of December in each year.

5. In all competitions for the Royal District Medal 16 ends shall be played unless the clubs interested, with the approval of the umpire, mutually agree upon a less number.

6. When, owing to isolation and other circumstances, it is found impossible to form certain clubs into districts, then the individual members of such clubs shall play for the district medal, at the points game.

the district medal, at the points game. 7. All matches in the respective districts shall be played each year on such ice as may be decided upon by the umpire, and his decision upon all matters in dispute shall be final.

N.B.—Play for the Tuckett Intermediate shall be played under the same rules as the District Medal.

DISTRICT No. 1-THUNDER BAY.

Three clubs competed in the Tuckett Intermediate— Schreiber, Fort William and Port Arthur. Schreiber received the bye.

The match between the other two clubs took place at Port Arthur, on the 24th day of January, 1899, and resulted as follows: Fort William 39, Port Arthur 40, the latter winning by one point.

Schreiber being able to send only one rink to the Bonspiel at Winnipeg decided to default to Port Arthur in the Tuckett Intermediate.

The three clubs competed for the District Medal. Fort William and Schreiber played at Fort William on the 3rd of February, resulting in a victory for Fort William. The score stood, Fort William 33, Schreiber 21. The former winning by 12 points.

The final for the Medal was played between Port Arthur and Fort William, on February 21st, with three rinks a side, and resulted as follows: Port Arthur 38, Fort William 24. Majority for Port Arthur, 14 points.

DISTRICT No. 3-WINNIPEG.

Four clubs competed for the Tuckett Primary badges and Royal District medal in the Winnipeg District this year. The Granite Club won the Tuckett, and the Thistles the District medal.

THE TUCKETT INTERMEDIATE.

Rules and Regulations

CLUBS IN AFFILIATION WITH THE MANITOBA BRANCH R, C, C, C,

At the annual meeting in 1898, of the Manitoba Branch R.C.C.C., the subjoined Rules and Regulations for the government of all Clubs in affiliation with the Association were approved, and ordered to be printed in the ANNUAL, for the guidance of such Clubs. By filling in the blanks and formally ratifying the Regulations, each Club can have rules for its management, without the expense of printing a constitution and by-laws. The object is to create harmony and uniformity as to management of Clubs, to enforce the holding of meetings at fixed dates, so that the affairs of the Central Association may be easier directed, and the increasing labor at headquarters adjusted, so as to enable the general secretary to distribute the work, that is now too much concentrated in the winter season.

NAME.

ARTICLE 1.—This Club shall be known as the...... Curling Club, of..... and the curling rules of the Club, shall be those hereunder given and approved by the Manitoba Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, of Scotland.

ARTICLE 2.—The object of the Club shall be to promote the game of curling, to inculcate fraternal intercourse among its members and with other clubs in the Association to which it is affiliated.

MEMBERS.

ARTICLE 3.—The members of the Club shall consist of two classes—regular and honorary, who shall be duly proposed and elected, upon condition of complying with the rules and regulations provided for the government of the club.

OFFICE-BEARERS.

ARTICLE 4.—The office-bearers shall consist of a patron, president, two vice-presidents, secretary, treasurer (the two latter may be filled by one person), chaplain, and an executive of five regular members. The president, vice-presidents, secretary and executive shall be a board of managers, to attend to the business of the club, and five members shall constitute a quorum.

REPRESENTATIVES.

ARTICLE 5.--Every club shall elect annually, at its annual general meeting, when electing the other officers, two persons as its representative delegates to the Branch. Those chosen must be regular members of the club they represent, or of some other club in good standing in the Association. Should any member so chosen be unable to attend a meeting of the Branch, then the President or executive may name a proxy.

MEETINGS.

ARTICLE 6.—The annual general meeting of the club shall be held on the first Wednesday of April, for the election of office-bearers, reception of financial and other reports of the previous curling year, ending the 31st day of March in each year. and for general business. Seven members shall form a quorum, at all regular and special meetings of the club. Secretaries of clubs must forward to the secretary of the Branch, not later than the first day of May in each year, a synopsis report of this meeting.

The semi-annual general meeting of the club shall be held on the first Wednesday of October for the final revision of the roll of officers and members, for publication in the Annual of the Association, payment of annual fees, election of skips, and making necessary preparations for the curling season. A report of this meeting, with list of officers and members finally revised, and fees due the Association, must be forwarded to the Secretary of the Branch not later than the first day of November in each year. Special meetings of the club may be called at any time, after due notice, by the President, upon the request in writing of five regular members of the club; but this request shall state the object of the meeting, and the Secretary, in notifying members of such meeting, shall set forth the business to be transacted at such special meeting.

SKIPS.

ARTICLE 7.—Every club, at the semi-annual meeting in October, shall elect one skip for every seven members upon the revised roll, who shall be called club skips; and they shall form their rinks on the voluntary principle, or in such other way as may be decided by a majority of the members in attendance at such meeting.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

ARTICLE 8.—The President shall preside at all meetings, and shall have a casting vote in the event of a tie, in all equal divisions of the vote of the club. He shall have power to convene meetings as provided in the Constitution. He shall take charge, when elected, of all medals and other trophies of the club, and shall be responsible for their safe keeping.

The Vice-Presidents, in the absence of the President, shall, according to their order of seniority, be vested with the powers and duties of the President.

The Secretary shall keep correct minutes of all meetings, a register of members, and a record of all club matches and medal competitions, it being obligatory upon skips to furnish him details of such matches, and shall submit same at the annual general meeting of the club in April. He shall conduct all correspondence, notify new members of their election, and attend to such other duties as shall pertain to the office.

The Treasurer shall, from a certified roll by the Secretary, collect all subscription fees due by members, and other monies payable to the club. A roll once prepared must have no names deleted therefrom, except for death, removal from the locality, and resignation in writing, and this must be done at the semi-annual meeting of the club in October, called among other things for the final revision of the roll. The fiscal year of all clubs begins on the first day of April and terminates on the 31st day of March of the succeeding year. He shall make all necessary disbursements on account of the club, on the order of the President. He shall keep an account in detail of receipts and expenditure, and submit the same to the annual general meeting of the club in April, when provision can be made for auditing the same.

The Board of Managers shall have the superintendence of the affairs of the club, and may appoint sub-committees from their number. They shall have full control of the rink and preparation of the ice, and may make regulations for the management of games and competitions of the club, not already provided for under the Constitution. They shall arrange the dates and places at which matches with outside clubs are played, and notify skips of same, and may appoint umpires when requisite. They shall report the result of their work at the annual and semi-annual meetings of the club. They shall meet at least once a week during the curling season, but only once a month the rest of the year.

FEES AND PENALTIES.

ARTICLE 9.—The prompt payment of fees is the essential requisite in all clubs to success. Every member of a club is expected to be paid up not later than the first Wednesday in October. Fees are payable in advance, at the annual meeting, but members have to the semi-annual meeting in October, before penalties are enforced. The subscription fee shall be such as may be determined at any annual meeting of the club.

Any member whose fees are not paid by the first Wednesday in October each year, shall be debarred from playing in any club matches, and shall not be allowed to take part in any proceedings of the club, or to vote on any subject connected therewith, or be eligible for election as an officer or skip, until such dues are paid. It shall be the duty of the executive to take cognizance of any default herein, and enforce the rule.

FOREIGN MATCHES.

ARTICLE 10.—In all outside or foreign matches with other clubs for trophies, medals or other consideration (not monetary), the president shall summon a meeting of skips for the selection of the skips to play in any of said competitions. The mode of election shall be by ballot from among themselves, when those having the plurality of votes shall be chosen, and the rinks built up to the best possible advantage with the assistance of the board of managers.

RULES OF CURLING.

ARTICLE 11.—The play in all matches or competitions shall be governed by the existing rules of the Manitoba Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, as published from time to time in the ANNUAL.

AMENDMENT OF CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 12.—The former constitution of the club is hereby repealed. No alteration or amendment shall be made to this constitution except by a two-third vote at an annual meeting of the club, and thereafter must have the sauction of the Manitoba Branch R.C.C.C., before being finally adopted. Notice of any change must be given not later than the semi-annual meeting in October.



ELEVENTH

AMMUAI BOMSpiel. Manitoba Branch R.C.C.C. 1899.

The Eleventh Annual Bonspiel under the auspices of the Branch was held on the week commencing Monday, the sixth day of February, and was one of the most successful in the annals of the Association. The only drawback was the intensely severe weather, it being a trying ordeal to stay on the ice, particularly in the new Auditorium rink. It was fortunate that the games were only twelve ends each.

The ice, considering the cold weather and the intense frost, was in fairly good condition, and there was keen competition. The New York Life Challenge competition was marred somewhat by the non-arrival in time of many rinks entered from Southern Manitoba. The Americans, from Superior, St. Paul and Duluth, were up in force, making in all six rinks, in the Alfred Dolge International Trophy, which they nearly captured, only losing it by one point. The veteran J. D. Flavelle was up with a rink from Lindsay, Ont., and added much to the interest of the bonspiel.

The loss of the Manitoba Hotel by fire about the middle of the week cast a damper for a day upon the gathering, but the contest went on without hindrance till the close. The entertainment of visiting curlers in the Winnipeg Opera House, on Thursday evening, the 9th of February, was a great success. It was probably one of the greatest fraternal gatherings ever held in America, there being over 600 curlers in attendance.

The result of the bonspiel too was highly satisfactory, many of the prizes having gone to visiting curlers. Had the Americans won the International, the distribution in this respect, would have been complete. One thing was manifest at this bonspiel, that the rinks from rural districts had developed wonderful skill in the game. Another year some of our best rinks will have to look to their laurels. Another interesting feature of the bonspiel was the large attendance of spectators, notwithstanding the terribly severe weather, showing the wonderful increase in the popularity of the game.

BAGNALL-WYLD SYSTEM OF DRAWING.

The system, under which the draws were made for the various competitions throughout the bonspiel, is known as the Bagnall-Wyld system, and it has given entire satisfaction. The chief object of this method is to avoid byes, after the first draw; because a bye is of less value in the first round, than later in the competition.

If the number of entries be the power of 2, such as 4, 8, 16, 32 or 64, there will be no byes in the competition. If otherwise a preliminary extra series must be played, in which there shall be as many games as the number of entries exceeds the power of two next below, all the other rinks having byes. For example in the New York Life competition there were 110 entries, 64 being the next lower power of 2 there must be 46 extra games played to reduce the entries to 64. 18 byes with the 46 winners make 64 rinks, which is the number that will divide down without any further byes, viz; 64, 32, 16, 8, 4, 2, 1.

The number of byes is easily ascertained by deducting the number of entries from the power of 2 over that number. For instance in the New York Life Challenge there are 110 entries. Deduct this from 128, the power of 2 higher, and it leaves 18, the number of byes. The rest of those entered 92 have to play an extra game.

It will be observed that only one draw is necessary that skips may see who their opponents will be throughout the competition. This obviates all delay in waiting as formerly for successive draws. The names of skips should be written on slips of paper, carefully folded and put in a hat. They are then drawn one by one, and written one below the other, until the draw is completed. The pairs that are to play should next be bracketed together. Those playing the extra series should be placed in the centre of the diagram.

4. In this competition, 12 ends shall be played in each successive game, until the match is finally decided.







3(n Memoriam.



THE LATE J. A. McMILLAN, OF LINDSAY, ONT.

Members of the curling fraternity were greatly startled over the announcement of the sudden and tragic death of Jack McMillan, the renowned Lindsay curler, on the evening of Saturday, the 8th of April, 1899. He was a young man in the prime of life, highly esteemed by every one who had the pleasure of his acquaintance, and a keen curler, having won many laurels in different parts of Canada and The accident which cut off the life of the United States. this promising young man took place in Sadler, Dundas & Flavelle's Öatmeal Mill, Lindsay, Ont., on the above date. He was in the act of closing down the machinery about midnight. To do this, it became necessary to throw off a huge belt that ran from the fourth storey to the base-It is supposed that he went to the basement in a ment. hurry, with a lantern, to swing the belt, and shut off the clutch, and that in so doing he slipped, and being carried around with the belt, was terribly mangled, and fatally injured,

Drs. Shier and Gillespie made an examination of his injuries, when they found the left leg almost entirely severed at the knee, and the bone protruding; the right leg had a terrible gash above the knee, separating the rectus muscle, both ends of which projected; below the right groin was a gash four inches or more in length, and quite deep. On the right side, above the hip bone, was a lacerating wound penetrating into the peritoneal cavity, from which the crest of the hip bone was removed. The left lung was seriously injured, and in addition to these injuries, there was a cut over the left eye, a gash on the left wrist, and another on the right elbow. Notwithstanding all the efforts of the surgeons, he succumbed to his injuries at 6 p.m., Sunday, 19 hours after the accident.

His sudden death cast a gloom over Lindsay, and none felt the bereavement more than the members of the Lindsay Curling Club. The blow was a severe one to Mr. J. D. Flavelle, his employer and veteran skip, as well as to his relatives. Messages of condolence poured into Lindsay from all over Canada and the United States, wherever poor Jack had been known. The funeral was one of the largest ever seen in Lindsay, and the bier was covered with floral offerings, and the remains were interred in Riverside Cemetery, on Tuesday, the 12th of April.

President Anderson, of the Branch, sent a private message of condolence, and the Secretary sent the following message of sympathy from the Association :

THE LATE R. S. ALEXANDER OF TREHERNE, MAN.

The sudden death of Mr. Robert Samuel Alexander of Treherne, banker and merchant, and for several years a delegate to the Manitoba Branch R.C.C.C. from the curling club of that town, cast a terrible gloom over both Winnipeg and Treherne in December last. His death was the result of a serious accident near the C.P.R. depot, just as he was reaching the city on a business trip from Treherne, on the 30th of December, 1898. It was all the more lamentable, from the fact that no one saw the accident, the body having been subsequently found by the crew of a train coming through the yard. He is supposed to have slipped from the platform in some way while out seeing if the train was nearing the depot. The train passed over his feet crushing them badly. Dr. Blanchard was speedily summoned, and the patient removed to the General Hospital. Amputation became necessary, but death resulted about four o'clock of Saturday morning the 31st of December, more from internal injuries sustained, than from the effects of the contusions to the limbs. The deceased was highly respected by all who knew him, and was a favorite among members of the curling fraternity. He organized the Treherne Curling Club. The funeral took place on the 4th of January, 1899, from the residence of A. D. McKay, Ellice Avenue, to Kildonan Cemetery.

The late Mr. Alexander was a native of Truro, N.S., and was about 38 years of age. He came to Manitoba from the Maritime provinces some fifteen years ago, and was for several years a resident of Winnipeg. He then located at Broadview, Assa., but shortly afterwards removed to Treherne, where he entered into the grain business, and later established a private bank. He was a very successful business man. Mr. Alexander leaves a widow but no children. A sister, the wife of Mr. G. R. Crowe, M.L.A., resides in Winnipeg, and a brother, Dr. Alexander, is a resident of Killarney. Deceased was a keen lover of all legitimate sport, and for several years was an officer of the Treherne Curling Club. Deceased left a large estate besides life and accident insurance policies for the benefit of his immediate relatives.

THE LATE HIRAM WALKER,

The announcement of the death of Hiram Walker, the founder of Walkerville, Ont., and of the great distillery firm of Hiram Walker and Sons, at Detroit on the 12th of January, 1899, was received by the members of the curling fraternity throughout Manitoba and the adjoining territories with sincere regret. The late Mr. Walker was one of the first patrons of the Association, when the Branch was organized some twelve years ago. It was fitting then, that the Association should have conveyed to members of his family a resolution of condolence and sympathy in their sad bereavement. He retired from the firm some years ago owing to his advancing age, and spent his declining years in Detroit, where he died as above related, in the 83rd year of his age.

The deceased was born in Massachusetts, and when a young man went to Kentucky and there learned the process of manufacturing whiskey. He then came to Canada, and started a distillery in 1847, which subsequently developed into a business of such great proportions that his whiskies obtained a world wide reputation. Later Mr. Walker bought land to the extent of 3000 acres, and founded the town of Walkerville, Ont., directly opposite Detroit. His business included a brewery, stock farm, where cattle are fattened on the refuse of the distillery and shipped abroad; tobacco farm, hop fields, furniture factory, iron works, engine works, the ownership of the Erie and Huron and Lake Erie and Detroit River Railways in Canada, and of a railway and ferry line connecting with the coal fields of Pennsylvania.

He was also the proprietor of natural gas works and other landed estates, aggregating in value some \$40,000,000, which passed to his children—three sons and a daughter. Frank H. Walker has been the moving spirit of the firm since the retirement of his father. His success has been one of the most conspicuous of any business man in Canada, achieved by business ability of the highest order.

"Mr. Hayseed," says he, "dae ye no' think it's time ye were gaun in the veterans' rink. That's a competition jist got up fer men like ye, an' let the younger players fecht it oot. Ye're auld eneuch noo, an' it wad be a gracefu' way o' reticin' wi' honor."

"That's what ye wad ca' in politics," says I, "retirin' frae the hoose o' commons tae tak' a seat in the senate. Na, na, Sandy," says I, "I'm guid fer mony a year on the ice yet, an' if ye rin against me ye'll fin' that oot."

"Mr. Hayseed," says he, "I was jist warnin' ye as a freen', an' tae save ye frae bein' humiliated. It maun be real hard for a man wha' has been a guid curler, an' a clever sportsman like you, tae acknowledge that his best days are gane, an' that henceforth he maun fecht his battles ower again wi' his tongue an' tell how guid a man he was in his young days, but we maun come tae it some time. Ye maun un'erstaun' that curlin', like ivery ither sport, is improvin' and gettin' mair scientific. The ANNUAL is late again, owing to less than half-adozen of clubs being late in filing their semi-annual reports. Secretaries of clubs, and their executives, must see to it that their revised list of officers and members reach headquarters not later than the 1st day of November in each year.

Page 47—In the Winnipeg District, where reference is made to the intermediate Tuckett Match, between the Thistles' and Assiniboines', it should be with "four" rinks a side, instead of "three" as therein stated.

The Rules and Regulations governing affiliated clubs are repeated in the ANNUAL of this year, and will be found on Page 62. Officers of clubs are particularly requested to peruse them carefully, and govern themselves accordingly.

The annual meetings of affiliated clubs must be held on the first Wednesday of April in each year, as the curling year ends on the 31st of March.

The semi-annual meetings of all affiliated clubs must be held on the first Wednesday in October in each year, for revising the roll of members, payment of dues, and getting ready for the ensuing curling season.

THE DREWRY PRIZE.

(Four handsome gold watches for competition among city curlers.)


This annual competition among members of curling clubs in the City of Winnipeg has uow come to be recognized as one of the great curling events of the year, outside of the bonspiel. Mr. Drewry, who is a Past Patron of the Manitoba Branch, takes great interest in curling, in fact he is a warm devotee of all genuine sport, but notably of curling and hockey. He is also a leading spirit in the management of the Auditorium skating rink, which affords so much amusement to citizens of Winnipeg throughout the winter season. Mr. Drewry gave four beautiful gold watches in this year's competition, being exceedingly tempting prizes for the city curlers.

The semi-finals in the Drewry competition were played on the evening of March 7th, 1899, and excited considerable interest. One game was played at the Assiniboine Rink and the other at the Granite Rink. The former was between R. H. Dunbar, of the Thistle Club, and C. P. Wilson, of the Assiniboines, and resulted in a victory for Dunbar, with a score of 20 to 7. The game was a keenly contested one, and spectators witnessed some fine curling.

The game at the Granite Rink was a closer contest, being between Jas. Scroggie and Thos. Kelly, skips, of the Granite Club. Large crowds clustered around the ends of the rink. The result was a surprise, but Scroggie put up a good game. The game opened in Kelly's favor, but towards the middle of the game Scroggie pulled up and finally won, with a score of 18 to 13.

The finals, between Messrs. Scroggie and Dunbar, were played March 9th, on the Assiniboine ice, which although a little sticky, was nevertheless, as near perfection as it was possible to get it. Dunbar took the lead and kept it throughout, although Scroggie played a tenacious game, contesting every end with his opponent. The score was 17 to 12; and with the close of the Drewry competition, interest in curling came to an end for the Season of 1898-9.

THE CLARENDON TROPHY.

The trophy and individual prizes donated the Granite Curling Club of the City of Winnipeg, by C. F. Bunnell of the Clarendon Hotel, is one of the most interesting events connected with the curling season in the Granite Club. The Cup is a handsome one, being equal to any of the best tankards and cups offered at the Annual Bouspiel.

Mr. Bunnell⁵s object in presenting the Cup was to test the skill of all the members comprising A, B, and C classes. It is played down in each class, rink against rink. The winner in A and B classes playing off and the winner in C class gets the bye in the finals.

The trophy will be competed for by all members for five years, when the skip winning the most games will become the owner of the cup. Each year the names of the winning rink is engraved on the silver shields on the pedestal of the cup.

Mr. Bunnell presents with the cup each year four very handsome and valuable individual prizes for the members of the winning rink.

Last year Mr. Jos. Lemon's rink, composed of W. M. Conklin, J. H. Turnbull, T. H. Verner, and Jos. Lemon, skip, won the coveted trophy, which also carries with it the Granite Club championship.

L is for "lie," often mixed up with "lay," By the skip as he shouts in excitement of play.

M's for the "medal," that hangs from his chain, With a curling device, and no sin if he's vain.

Mc is for "Mac," he can't keep away, In his blood it was bred, he must have his play.

N is for "narrow," and twist as he may, His only salvation 's a rub on the way.

0's for the "ring," with circumference of blue, Where the skips in rotation each other pursue.

P is for "points," and the "port" in the play, The stone that runs through, gets a cheer on the way.

Q's found in "square," which is used to decide, The stone lying shot, when the eye fails to guide.

R's for the "rink," where ice and stones blend, All sorts and conditions, into brother and friend.

For the greater convenience of purchasers, the Company have adopted the following terms of payment :

The aggregate amount of principal and interest is divided into ten instalments, as shown in the table below; the first to be paid at the time of purchase, the second two years from the date of purchase, the third in three years, and so on.

While the second instalment becomes due in two years from date of purchase, interest on the outstanding purchase money is payable in one year, except in the case of an actual settler who breaks up at least one-sixteenth of the land within that time. No rebate of interest is allowed on hay lands.
