


Murdoch Stuart of Tain, formerly Bay Scotland went to Quebec in 1760. He owned about 700 acres in one block including Kitmaroon Sillery, extending in some places from the River St Lawrence to the St Joz Road. He built the first wall at Quebec, St Andrews. He was known by the French as Benhomme for Nam, owing to his peculiar character. His house which was in the city, was afterwards known as the Old London Coffee House. He died at Kitmaroon in 1822 at the upper house which was afterwards sold by his daughter to DeBell.

Angeline Stuart afterwards married John Widen of Kitmaroon, Scotland who built the Kitmaroon House on the property given to his wife by her father Murdoch Stuart. (Angeline Stuart) A.M.S. was daughter of Murdoch.

My great great great great Grandfather - Pierre Cartier, of Prulier, in the diocese of Angers, France, was according to a family tradition descended from a brother of Jacques Cartier, the celebrated St. Malo Navigator, and discoverer of Canada, but there are no positive proofs of this. In Brittany, Anjou and La Vendee, Cartiers are numerous, and undoubtedly a number of people of that name came to Canada while it was under French domination. Three of Pierre Cartier's sons, Jacques, Francois, and Louis Cartier were residing at Quebec in 1740 and were distictively known as Cartier d'Angevin, because they came from Anjou. All record of lost of the two younger brothers but the eldest, Jacques, was the founder of the Cartier connection in Canada. He established an extensive business in salt and fish both in Canada and Europe. On July 6th he married at Beauport, Delle Marguerite Monieon, daughter of Nicholas Monieon, and niece of Mgr Signon 1st Archbishop of Quebec. Besides my 4th grandmother Angelique Cartier, there were two sons by this marriage, Jacques and Joseph, who settled in the Richelieu district, at St Antoine, and St Denis, respectively, and where there descendants still reside. Sir George E. Cartier, one of the frameworke of Confederation was a grandson of Jacques Cartier of St Antoine.

* Jean Cartier of Quebec was one of the associates of the Sieur de la Pleschamps, the celebrated explorer of the West, and in 1734 he sailed for Mexico near the junction of the St. Lawrence and the Saguenay. The Cartier however is a son of Paul Cartier a merchant of Quebec and René (born Quebec 1685) died 1701, a time associated de Sa Majeste dans les
