The C.W.A.C. Girls

"... and who are they, of the C.W.A.C.?" They are the Canadian Women's Army Corps—Canada's "Women in Khaki." One of them may be your daughter, your sister or your friend. She's in the Army now, doing a man's job by carrying out duties formerly performed by a soldier. She felt she wanted to take her active part in this war.

Back in ancient times a mythical Goddess of the Greeks, Pallas Athene, was the patroness of the ancient Greek warriors and heroes. She aided and supported her warriors in time of battle. Her direct counterpart in today's war is the C.W.A.C., and the insignia which the women of the C.W.A.C. so proudly wear has engraved upon it the head of Pallas Athene.

The members of the C.W.A.C. have enlisted from all walks of life. From the Universities, offices, factories and homes they come, some trained, some untrained—some are single, while others are married. They all joined the ranks of the C.W.A.C. to do their duty for Canada. Theirs is an important work, for it relieves their brothers in the Active Army for fighting service.

In the C.W.A.C. the age limit is from eighteen to forty-five, and the applicant must be physically fit with no dependents. (Daughters under seventeen or sons under sixteen.) The pay is good, being two thirds that of the soldier rank for rank. All clothing and equipment is supplied. Medical and dental services are free and hospitalization is provided. Moreover, the personnel of the C.W.A.C. is entitled to pension and rehabilitation grants upon discharge.

The C.W.A.C. uniform is in Style for Freedom. It is the envy of every girl not in the Corps and the pride of all who are privileged to wear it.

Complete information about the C.W.A.C. can be obtained from any recruiting station. They will tell you where you can join and how serve your country. In many of the recruiting stations a C.W.A.C. officer is on duty to guide you. She will tell you of the opportunities for advancement and special training. She can also supply you with the Offer of Service form and help you in filling them out.

The Girls behind the Boys behind the Guns—

Here's how the Canadian Women's Army Corps releases men for fighting service . . .



TRANSPORTATION This classification covers the drivers and all those who keep the cars and trucks on the road. The corporal, pictured above, is one of the girls who drive staff cars, ambulances, light trucks and that mighty steam—the Army jeep. Other branches of this service, to mention a few, are the motor mechanics, automotive technicians and automotive electricians.



ADMINISTRATION This corporal is a stenographer-deck. She has been moved to Army administration methods and such girls have released thousands of men for fighting service. The demand for such personnel is unlimited and includes such vital jobs as secretaries, bookkeepers, pay and postal clerks, stenographers and messengers.



COOKING It's a well known saying that an Army marches on its stomach. What is more fitting than for the Canadian Army to march with the aid of Canadian women who have been doing just such a job at home for husbands and sons. This smiling C.W.A.C. cook knows the can please her Army boys. She is helped by dietitians, canteen cooks, kitchen aides and waitresses.



COMMUNICATIONS In this war, speedy communications is a vital factor. First to this work came the telephone operators who manned the busy switchboards at headquarters all over the country. There are also the operators at the many camps, the line operators and technicians. Others of equal importance are the wireless operators, the telegraphers and the communication technicians.



STORES This general heading includes all C.W.A.C. personnel who handle the vast quantities of food, clothing and supplies necessary for a mobilized Army. The girls shown in this picture are checking and issuing clothing. They are classified as warehousemen. There is much work to be done and stores personnel includes many secretaries, clerks, sewing women and tailresses.



TECHNICIANS This is a most important and interesting branch of the service. Illustrated above is just one of the many special positions, that of X-ray work. The C.W.A.C. needs dental technicians, dentists, draughtsmen, laboratory technicians, and engineers, to mention a few. In this field very women with technical training will find a useful place.
