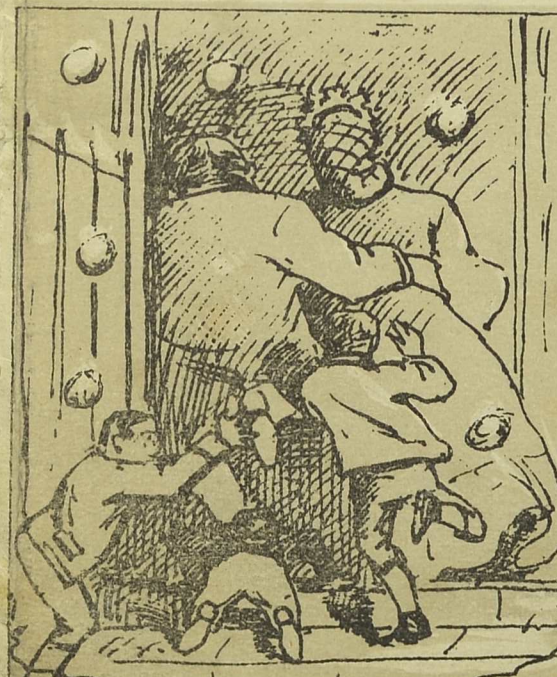
S P E N T X M A S.

good things to come.

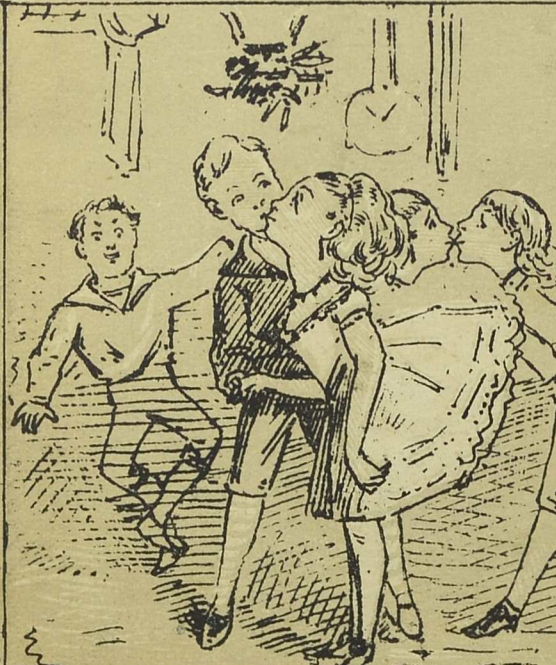
"Without the door let Sorrow lie, And if for cold it hap to die,

give the Pudding a hearty reception.



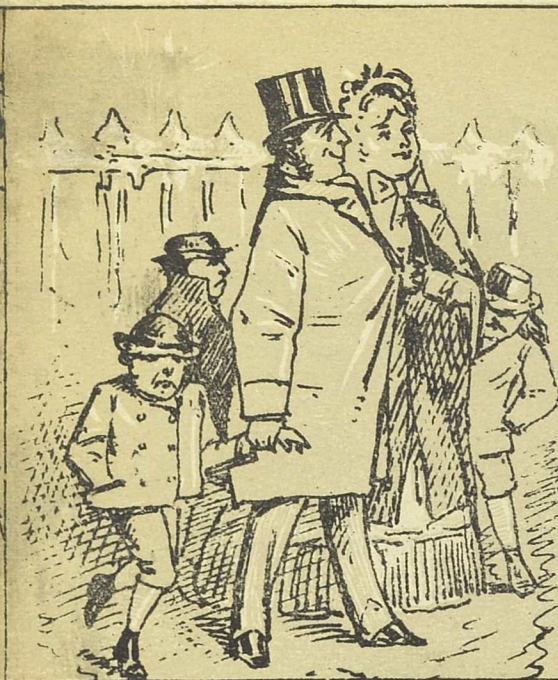
After Dinner they are slightly indisposed.



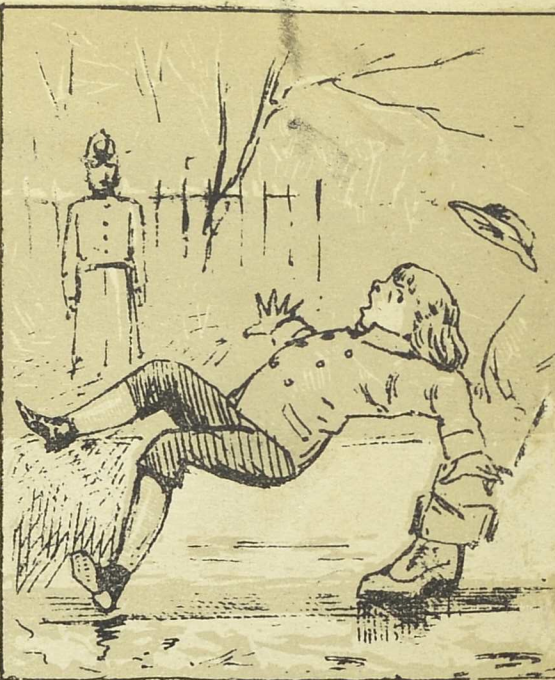
But they recover in time to kiss their Cousins

Conservatory indulges in a little flirtation.



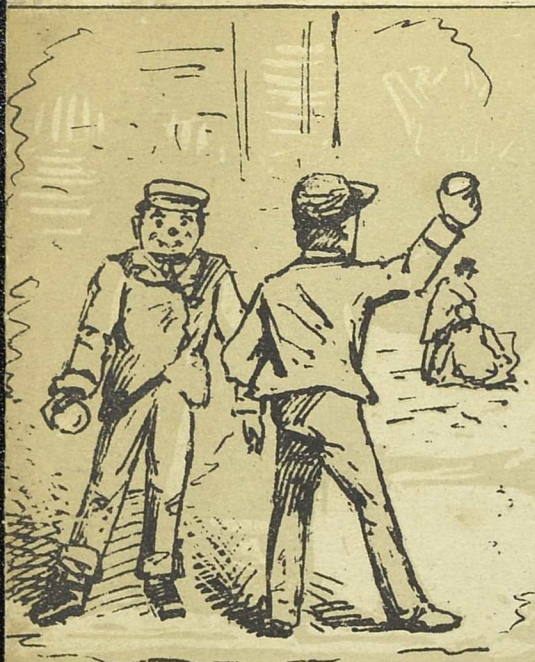
A Rival appears.
