MOTHER is mending Mary's socks. She wishes Mary to learn, and do this for herself. Mary is laying out the Sunday clothes ready for the Sabbath.




JACK, THE DONKEY.

BABY is getting a nice ride on Jack. Charlie is a kind little master to Jack. He never beats him, or makes him go too fast.




MOTHER PRAYING.

THIS is a kind brother, who is trying to amuse his little invalid sister. He would like to be at play, but chooses rather to stay with her.




A GOOD HELPER.

LITTLE THINGS.


THE bricklayer's labourer is a useful man. He has no great things to do, but all the little things are very important, and should be well done.




COAL-HEAVER.
