FOURTH SESSION 1871.

Tuesday, 5th December, 1871.

At 2 p.m. the Council met.

Present—The Warden, Messrs Allen, Armstrong, Denison, Detlor, Dollar, Ham, Hannah, Hogle, Hope, Hott, Lake, Parrott, G Paul R Paul, E Perry, W H Perry, and Sexsmith.

The Warden in the Chair.

The Minutes of the Special October Session were read, amended and approved.

The following petitions were presented and referred :

By Mr W H Perry, of James Perry, respecting damages to fruit trees.

By Mr G Paul, of Trustees of Newburgh High School.

By Mr. Detlor, from Trustees of Napanee High School.

A communication from F. Burrowes, Esq. County Inspector, was received and referred to Committee on Education.

Several accounts were referred.

Mr. E. Perry gave notice that he will to-morrow introduce a By-Law to amend By-Law No. 39, respecting County Roads.

Mr. Parrott presented the Report of the County Engineer,

which was read and referred to the Committee on County Property.

The Council adjourned till 10 a.m. to-morrow.

SECOND DAY.

Wednesday, 6th December, 1871.

The Council met.

Present, all the members.

The Warden in the chair.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Mr. E. Perry, according to notice, introduced a By-Law to amend By-Law No. 39, which was read and referred to Committee of the Whole, rule suspended.

Mr. E. Perry in the chair.

The Chairman reported the second reading of the By-Law without amendment, and upon motion for the third reading, the Yeas and Nays were taken as follows:

Yeas—Messrs. Detlor, Ham, Hannah, Hope, Hott, Lake, Lane, G. Paul, R. Paul and E. Perry—10.

Nays—Messrs. Allen, Armstrong, Denison, Dollar, Hogle, Howard, Parrott and W. H. Perry—8.

The By-Law was then read a third time, entitled By-Law No. 46. and finally passed. Rule suspended.

Moved by Mr. Lake, seconded by Mr. Hogle that a Special Committee, composed of Messrs. Detlor, E. Perry and Hogle, be appointed to memorialize the Local Legislature to amend the law regarding Joint Stock Road Companies. Carried.

The Council adjourned till 2 p.m.

Council resumed.

Mr. E. Perry presented the petition of Wm. Madden and others respecting Check Gate, which was read and referred to the Committee on County Property.

A communication from the Treasurer was received and read.

Moved by Mr. Hannah, seconded by Mr. Lake, that a

Special Committee, to be composed of Messrs. E. Perry, Hogle, Hope and Detlor, be appointed to memorialize the Local Legislature to amend the Municipal Law, to enable Municipal Councils to pass By-Laws to compel proprietors, tenants or occupants, to enclose their premises with a lawful fence, according to the By-Laws of such Municipality. Carried.

Mr. Sexsmith, chairman, presented the report of the Committee on Roads and Bridges, which was read and referred to Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Sexsmith in the chair.

The Chairman reported, and the report of the Committee on Roads and Bridges was then adopted.

Moved by Mr. Parrott, seconded by Mr. Hogle, that the Treasurer be instructed to sell to Ernesttown Municipality, Debentures to the amount of \$4,500 at par. Carried.

Mr. Lake, chairman, presented the report of the Committee on County Property, which was read and adopted.

Mr. Lake, with leave, introduced a By-Law to amend By-Law No. 36, relating to tolls, which was read and referred to Committee of the Whole, rule suspended.

Mr. Lake in the chair.

The Council resumed.

The chairman reported the second reading of the By-Law, and upon motion the By-Law was read a third time, entitled By-Law No. 47, and finally passed. Rule suspended.

The Council adjourned till 10 a.m. to-morrow.

THIRD DAY.

Thursday, 7th December, 1871.

At 10 a.m. the Council met.

Present, all the members.

The Warden in the chair.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Mr. W. H. Perry presented a petition from Hugh Rourke for a free pedlar's license.

Moved by Mr. Hogle, seconded by Mr. Lake, that the Treasurer be directed to grant a pedlar's license for three months to Hugh Rourke, without charge, excepting the usual fee. Carried.

Moved by Mr. E. Perry, seconded by Mr. Detlor, that each local Corporation that may receive grants from this Council shall, as early as possible after the first day of January in each and every year, furnish, under the hands of the Auditors' of such Corporation, a full statement of all monies that may have been expended for repairs or construction of Roads and Bridges within their Municipality during the preceding year, other than sums expended on County Roads, to the County Treasurer, who shall annually ask such information from the several Corporations. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Detlor, seconded by Mr. R. Paul, that the Rev. G. M. Meachem be appointed a Trustee of the Napanee High School, in place of Rev. W. Scott, who has removed from the county. Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. H. Perry, seconded by Mr. Hogle, that Mr. W. H. Gadanin be granted the sum of Five Dollars for extra services as County Engineer. Carried.

The Council adjourned to 3 p.m.

At 3 p.m. the Council resumed.

Mr. Armstrong, Chairman, presented the Report of the Committee on Finance, which was read and adopted.

Moved by Mr. Detlor, seconded by Mr. E. Perry, that the Clerk be instructed to ascertain from the Richmond Road Company what amount they will accept in full for their roads, such offer by the Company to be open for acceptance by this Council until after the January session. Carried.

The Council adjourned till 10 a.m. to-morrow.

FOURTH DAY.

Friday, 8th December, 1871.

At 10 a.m. the Council met,

Members present--The Warden, Messrs. Allen, Denison, Detlor, Dollar, Ham, Hannah, Hogle, Hope, Hott, Lake, Lane, Miller, Parrott, G. Paul, R. Paul, E. Perry, W. H. Perry and Sexsmith.

The Warden in the chair.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Mr. Lake, Chairman, brought up the second report of the Committee on County Property, which was read and adopted.

Mr. E. Perry, Chairman, brought up the report of the Committee on Education and Printing, which was read and adopted.

Moved by Mr. Detlor, seconded by Mr. Sexsmith, that William George be paid Four Dollars for attendance on this Council during the present session. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Dollar, seconded by Mr. Denison, that the Check Gate on the Kingston and Napanee Road, at Gate No. 1, be removed at the expiration of the time for which it has been leased. Negatived.

Upon motion of Mr. Lake, seconded by Mr. Parrott, the Warden was requested to leave the chair, and Mr. E. Perry to take the same.

The Chairman then presented an Address to the Warden on behalf of the members of the Council.

The Warden replied, and resumed the chair.

Upon motion of Mr. Lake, seconded by Mr. Ham, the Council adjourned to meet at the call of the Warden.

ON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

Adopted 6th December, 1871.

The Committee on Roads and Bridges beg leave to report and recommend as follows :

1st. On application of R. Denison for the grant of One Hundred Dollars on the road leading from Napanee to Mill Point in Richmond.

2nd. On application of John Hogle, that One Hundred Dollars more be granted to build the bridge crossing the stream at Mill Haven, Ernesttown.

3rd. On the petition of Timothy Pringle and others, that Thirty Dollars be granted on road leading from German Settlement on Addington Road leading to Denbeigh Mills.

4th. On application of S. Detlor, the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars be granted on Napanee Bridge leading to Kingston.

5th. On application of R. Paul, that Twenty-Five Dollars be granted on bridge crossing Clare River near McDonald's Mills.

6th. On application of Thomas Armstrong, that Fifty Dollars be granted on bridge in Bath.

The above sums to be expended by the Reeves and Deputy Reeves of each Municipality, and that the Treasurer be instructed to pay the amounts upon the order of said Reeves.

On County Property.

Adopted 6th December, 1871.

The Committee on County Property beg leave to report as follows :

1st. They met on the 29th July, examined the grounds in front of the Court House, decided to level them off and put them in a proper shape for planting trees thereon ; and left it in the hands of the Warden and Mr. Detlor to receive tenders and have the work performed.

2nd. Your Committee, on examining the Armory, found it in a very slovenly state, explosive materials lying loosely about. They immediately ordered all powder and explosive materials to be removed forthwith.

3rd. On 4th November your Committee again met and sold the Toll Gates of Napanee and Kingston Roads, after regulating the tolls, reducing the fare for single horse and vehicle to 3cts., a By-Law to be passed confirming this arrangement.

No. 1 Gate was sold for \$865, (\$40 deposit). Sureties, Wilder Joy or David Bell and Henry Lanxon.

No. 2 Gate to David Shorey, (deposit \$50), for \$240. Sureties George Clough and Nelson Venton.

No. 3 Gate, William Gordon, (deposit \$50), for \$690.00. Sureties George Clough and Nelson Venton.

Mr. Allen received the sum of \$8 for his services as Auctioneer.

4th. The account of Robert Chatterson for beef for Gaol to 29th November, 1871, amounting to\$12.58.

They recommend the payment of the same.

5th. The account of J. C. Huffman, oil, chimnies, &c., \$11.06 They recommend the payment thereof.

6th. On the petition of George Cliff, asking for \$100 on account of his salary as Engineer and Superintendent of the Registry Office.

They recommend payment of the same.

7th. The account of E. Dickens for supplies of bread and

potatoes for the Gaol to 5th December, 1871\$45.96
 They recommend payment.

8th. The account of W. Miller for stuff furnished and
 bought for gaol\$ 8.10
 And Water Lime, Sand, &c., for fixing bridge and King-
 ston and Napanee Macadamized Road 8.75

They recommend the payment of the same\$16.85

9th. The account of Wm. George, for placing and remov-
 ing shavings from three courts at \$2 each\$6.00
 They recommend payment of the same.

10th. The account of Clark Aishton, for plastering holes in
 cells, making saw horses, and a bag of salt for gaol, amounting
 to \$2.50.

11th. The account of J. R. & T. D. Pruyn, for oatmeal, tea,
 sugar and tobacco for gaol\$15.26
 They recommend payment of the same.

12th. The account of E. Hooper for shirting, linen, &c, \$4.20
 They recommend payment of the same.

13th. They recommend that the prayer of James Perry be
 not granted, and that the Warden notify the parties owning
 lands opposite the trees on the Kingston Road, near Moscow, to
 remove any that are dangerous.

14th. The account of Whitney George, for making wood
 boxes, window glass, door knobs, and fixing chimneys, &c.,

15th. They recommend that the Superintendent's Report
 of the Kingston and Napanee Road be received and filed.

In consequence of the difficulty with Gleason, your Com-
 mittee gave the whole contract for breaking and putting on stone
 to Mr. Allen, for \$5 per toise for three years.

2nd Report on County Property.

Adopted 8th December, 1871.

The Committee on County Property beg leave to present this, their second report, and recommend as follows:

1st. They recommend that no action be taken upon the prayer of the petition of William Madden and others, asking to have the check gate near Toll Gate No. 1 removed.

2nd. They have used every exertion in their power for the completion of the Registry Office in the time specified in the contract, but regret that they have not succeeded; however, they are satisfied that it will be completed in about three weeks.

3rd. The engineer reports that the amount of work performed, and material furnished, amounts to \$4,600, of which \$1,200 has been paid.

They would recommend that the further sum of Eleven Hundred Dollars be paid.

4th. The work of grading the grounds in front of the Court House, and putting up the fence, was contracted at \$400, of which \$155 has been paid.

They would recommend that the further sum of Eighty Dollars be paid on work already completed, and that \$125 be advanced on work not completed, retaining the sum of Forty Dollars in the hands of the Treasurer, to be paid when the contract shall be completed.

5th. They would recommend that upon the completion and acceptance of the Registry Office that a coal stove be procured and placed therein, and fire constantly kept in it.

6th. We recommend the payment of J. Gibbard & Son's account, \$16.00.

On Printing and Education.

The Committee beg leave to report as follows :

1st. In reference to the applications from the High Schools of Napanee and Newburgh, we find, on referring to the new school act, that this Council has to raise a sum equal to half the sum paid by the Government for aid to the High Schools.

We therefore recommend their application for aid, and that the sum of \$470 be paid to Napanee School and \$295 to Newburgh School.

2nd. In reference to the report of our County Inspector, of the 2nd inst., we beg to say that we feel thankful that things pertaining to the education of our youth are as favorable as is set forth in said report. We would earnestly recommend that our Inspector will, in relation to our schools in the remote and newly-settled parts of our county, as well as the sparsely and not wealthy settlements arounds the borders thereof, be as lenient as possible in demanding and enforcing the full requirements of the law, believing that if a rigorous exaction be made on them, that it will shut up their schools and leave their children without any opportunity of obtaining the blessing of education.

3rd. We recommend the payment of the sum of \$74.85 to the Standard Office, and the sum of \$17.17 to the Express Office, for printing done this year.

Resolved, that a Special Committee be named by this Council to consider the best means whereby this Corporation may assume the toll roads in this County, and devise means to make them free, giving to municipalities where no toll roads exist an equivalent for such sums as they may be obliged to pay

in resuming and keeping the present roads in repair, &c., said Committee to consist of the Warden, Ira Ham, Thomas Sexsmith, R. Graham, W. Perry, and the mover and seconder. Carried.

On motion the Council adjourned till 2 p.m.

That this Council reconsider the resolution of Mr. Williams for the appointment of a Committee to consider the propriety of free roads, and that said resolution be amended by inserting "that the Committee obtain the required information free of charge." Lost.

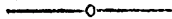

That they are not sufficiently informed of the facts of the case to warrant them in recommending the Council to pass the By-Law at present, and therefore recommend that further time be given your Committee to examine into the matter and report at the next session of Council, and that the second reading of the By-Law be deferred.

Special on Memorial.

Adopted June 12th, 1872.

To the Members of the County Council :

GENTLEMEN,—We, the delegates appointed by you in

January last for the purpose of laying before the President of the Council a memorial relating to various matters touching the settlement of our lands in the interior, beg leave to report :

That as was anticipated, your delegates were joined by the gentlemen appointed by the Frontenac Council as bearers of a similar memorial to the Honorable Edward Blake, and with them we proceeded to Toronto. The utility of having the Warden of the County of Hastings with us was discussed on our way up, and it was decided that if he could be induced to join in the presentation of our memorial, that his great experience and weight of character would be important, and at the first opportunity we telegraphed him, and his answer was that he would be up on the evening train.

Your delegates, during the interim, called on the members connected with our county, viz., Messrs. Grange and Deroche. Those gentlemen welcomed us with warmth and earnestness, nor did their kindness ebb while we stopped at Toronto. To them we feel indebted for the good feeling that was manifested to us by a large number of the members of the house. It was through their influence that we got an interview with the President of the Council, who was sorely pressed for time. He pledged to us, through them, an audience of one quarter of an hour, and gave us a whole one.

After the Warden of Hastings joined us, we were received by Mr. Blake in the most courteous manner. The subject matter contained in your memorial we fully discussed, and Mr. Blake gave us the assurance that he sympathized with his memorialists and would do what was in his power to remove the disabilities complained of. He stated that he viewed the vested rights of lumbermen obtained through laws and usages, as a matter not easily disposed of or set aside, and pledged himself that some means should be devised that our country saw mills should get stock, and that the rights of the settler and lumberman should be so defined that the former would know where his ended, and the latter where his began. From this your delegates deduced the fact that a line would be made completely distinctive between those classes. He intimated that he was not

aware of any just reason why there should be antagonism between the settler and lumberman, but frankly admitted that it existed, and that he would try to erect a barrier that each should, if justly disposed, know when he was infringing on or interfering with the others rights.

Your delegates assisted in urging outlays by our Government on our Colonization Roads, and he informed us that the policy of the new government would be very liberal towards developing the resources of our Province.

We retired from the audience with the conviction that an able and honest man was at the helm, and wondering in our minds how any person who had so recently stepped into a situation beset with care and anxieties, where so much varied information had to be obtained, and from such multitudinous sources—who was hourly pestered by questions out for honest information by friends, and questions to embarrass by foes—who at one moment was imparting information to sincere enquirers, and the next defending himself and colleagues against wiley and not over-scrupulous opponents—that he could receive our combined delegation with such equanimity and forbearance, when we also had sought him out to worry and badger him with the tale of our wrongs.

Special on Frontenac Claims.

MEMORIAL

TO THE HONORABLE EDWARD BLAKE, PRESIDENT OF THE
EXECUTIVE COUNCIL OF THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

The Memorial of the Council of the Corporation of the County
of Lennox and Addington,

RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH,—

1. That your Memorialists and the inhabitants of this County are mainly composed of agriculturists and manufacturers, and have, in common with our fellow-subjects throughout this Province, a deep interest in the prosperity and progress of our country, situated as we are without extensive fisheries, and but a small portion of it being rich in mineral deposits; our success, therefore, mainly depends on the productions of the forests, on agriculture, manufactures and commerce.

2. We, your Memorialists, believe and know that great wealth exists in our forest: and we regret to observe the rapid extinction of the same, caused by fires through reckless lumbering, as year after year numerous lumbering parties visit our pineries for the purpose of making square and broad timber. This practice is fruitful of fires, from the accumulation of under-

brush, chips and shavings produced. The system of slashing down the trees and underwood where the timber is made, prepares a magazine of combustible matter that burns with such intensity that utterly destroys the remaining standing timber to at least ten times the value of that taken. We hold it equally wrong that lumbermen should be permitted to go into the best groves of pine, cull out and cut down the best trees, and take therefrom the choicest part of the tree and leave the balance to rot and encumber the ground. This system is practised annually by lumbering firms in this and other counties of the Province.

3. Your Memorialists are aware that there exists a great value in pine logs and timber over and above what is paid for dues, ground rent and the bonus system recently inaugurated, irrespective of the cost of manufacture, which does not find its way into our Provincial Exchequer, but is absorbed by foreign capitalists and foreign mill-owners, who mainly control the lumbering interests in this Province; and it is a well known fact that lumbermen will freely pay one dollar and twenty-five cents a standard log to any settler who has the right to sell the same on our inland waters, from 60 to 100 miles from the frontier. They would not do this unless there was a good margin of profit left, and we are of opinion that the Government should legislate in a channel so that the commercial worth of our forests, as far as is consistent with the honest profits to the manufacturer, should be left for the benefit of the settlers. We are also aware that large sums of money have been expended by the lumbermen in the erection of mills, and the improvement of streams, and the building of crafts to carry on their business, and we hold that these lumbermen should be protected; yet we claim that it is unjust that the whole of the immense wealth of our forests should be placed at their disposal for it is a well known fact that the moiety paid by them for timber dues is a mere fraction of the net profits of the proceeds after paying all the expenses attending its manufacture

4. Your Memorialists would also state that another grievance exists from the universal system of licensing, which we

feel the more acutely for the reason that it appeals directly to our pockets--that is, the increasing value of lumber. Our local mills cannot get timber because all available pineries are under license to rich and extensive lumbering companies, and the restrictions attached to lands that are sold or settled as free grants, totally exclude aid to our country mills, and we who live within sight of extensive pineries, are not able to procure lumber for our ordinary buildings, except of the most inferior description, while we have the mortification of witnessing immense quantities of logs annually floated down our streams to be shipped to foreign countries. We, your Memorialists, would therefore trust that future legislation will remedy this oppressive state of things.

5. Your Memorialists would also state that there is another source of deep disquietude felt by us that has grown out of the system of licensing and disposing of our public domain to the favored lumberman. This disquietude is not sectional, but universal, in the Province, and there is scarcely a family but what has felt its paralyzing effects: we have reference to the drain of our enterprising young men, as well as whole families, the bone and sinew of the country, who are annually leaving the country by thousands for the United States. This we attribute to the locking up of the timber exclusively for the benefit of the favored lumbermen, and the closing of the sale of wild lands only in such localities as the government choose to dispose of, for under the present licensing system the settlers on free grants are tyrannized over, and their rights treated with the greatest of contempt by the licensed lumbermen, who are in the habit of appropriating to their own use the most valuable timber on the lands of the settlers, even after they have performed the settlement duties on said lands, but have been unable to get their patents from various trifling causes, and in the interval have witnessed their most valuable timber cut down and taken off their land without having the power or means to prevent it.

6. That under the present licensing system the great wealth of the country is fast melting away before this huge lum-

ber monopoly, the licentiates being privileged to cut, slash, take away and destroy all the timber on lands covered by their licenses ; and that without any corresponding benefit to the country or to the inhabitants thereof, those lumbermen are stripping the land of its most valued timber, in open defiance to the rights of the settlers located within their limits, also to the injury of small mill-owners, farmers, etc., in the older settled parts of the country ; and so intolerable has this grievance become that hundreds of settlers in this county alone are abandoning their farms and improvements in disgust to seek a home in a foreign land and among a strange people. We cannot be persuaded that emigrants unacquainted with our municipal institutions and our mode of clearing lands, can be looked upon by us as an equivalent for the loss of our enterprising youths that are leaving us, who have been educated and taught the way of converting our wild lands into cultivated fields, and by their general knowledge of the country can easily adapt themselves to the ways and institutions of the country.

7. Your Memorialists would also beg leave to bring under your notice that an Act was passed and assented to on the 15th of February, 1871, relative to Government road allowances, and the granting of crown timber licenses therefor. This Act, we believe, was passed at the very close of the session, when most of the members had left for home. We do not, therefore, consider it an expression of the deliberate views of a majority of the members of that Parliament. We feel that it has taken from the municipalities certain valuable rights and privileges that have been conferred on them by the Municipal laws of the Province, and we are confirmed in our opinion by a decision of the Court of Error and Appeal, recently rendered, in the suit Township of Barrie vs. Gilles and McLaren, lumbermen, where a majority of the judges of said Court declared that the road allowances as much belonged to the municipalities as a man's land when he held the Government Patent for it—against which there were no adverse claims. In this Statute we think we see a direct infringement of our rights as British subjects, and we therefore pray that your Honorable House will be pleased to,

direct that an Act be introduced during the present session to repeal the said Act, in conformity with the decision given by said Court of Error and Appeal, Sec. 2nd of the said Act, entirely prohibiting the taking or using any timber off said road allowances for the purpose of repairing or improving the said roads.

8. Your Memorialists would therefore pray that your Honorable House would carefully consider the subject, and that you will be pleased to adopt a more liberal policy towards the settlers on Crown and other lands in the rear townships, and we are certain that if such a liberal policy be adopted, emigrants seeking a home in our Province, and others wishing to settle in the back townships, should be allowed to purchase larger blocks of land, in quantities of say from four to six hundred acres of land; and that all the land so purchased, and all timber and other material growing on or being on said land, should become the property of the purchaser immediately on his entering into possession of the same, and that the rights of the licensed lumbermen should immediately cease on any land becoming located by a *bona fide* settler. Should this liberal policy be adopted, wealthy emigrants would be induced to settle on our Crown Lands, and capital would flow into our country, the Government charging the settler a standard duty on all logs and timber cut by him. The Government would thus receive a revenue as lasting as the forests; and the settler, by the aid of the sale of his timber, would be in a position to obtain assistance to clear up his land and erect comfortable buildings, to assist in the erection of churches and school-houses, to clothe and educate his family, to stock his farm with the best breed of cattle, and enable him to live in comfort and happiness. Any Parliament that will adopt and carry out such a liberal policy towards the settler, will receive the gratitude of the people for generations to come.

And your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray, &c.

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By-Law No. 48.

Passed 27th January, 1872.

The Council of the Corporation of the County of Lennox and Addington, enacts as follows:

1. That any person who shall place any obstruction upon any of the County Roads within this County, so as to impede the free use thereof, or make dangerous travelling thereon, or who shall make excavations in such roads by digging for sand or other material, shall incur a penalty of not more than Ten Dollars with cost, for every such offence, and the convicting Justice may order such offender to remove such obstructions or repair such other damages, and for neglect to obey such order, the person or persons offending, shall incur a further penalty of not more than Ten Dollars, with cost, for every day he or they shall so neglect to pay such order.

2. That any person or persons guilty of a violation of any of the provisions of this By-Law shall, upon conviction before any Justice or Justices of the Peace having jurisdiction, be liable to the fines and penalties hereby imposed, with cost of conviction, to be collected by distress and sale of the goods and chattles of the offender or offenders, and in case no such goods and chattles can be found, it shall be lawful for any such Justice or Justices of the Peace, to commit the offender or offenders to the Common Gaol of this County, for any period of not more than Twenty Days, unless the fine be sooner paid.

3. That all fines and penalties imposed and collected hereunder, shall be paid over to the County Treasurer, and shall form part of the funds of the County.

By-Law No. 49.

To Assess for County and School Purposes for the Year 1872.

Passed 13th June, 1872.

WHEREAS, it is necessary to provide by general assessment on the rateable property of the County of Lennox and Addington, for the payment of the general and incidental expenses of the county, and also for the payment of qualified School Teachers and the County Inspector, and whereas the assessed value of the rateable property within the county for the year 1871, amounts to \$4,300,000, upon which it will be necessary and expedient to levy and collect the sum of Three Mills in the Dollar, for the purposes aforesaid, and also to levy and collect the sum of \$2,848 for the support of Public Schools for the current year,

The Council of the Corporation of the County of Lennox and Addington, enacts as follows:

That the sum of \$12,900 shall be raised, levied and collected, on all the rateable, real and personal property, within the County of Lennox and Addington for the general and incidental expenses aforesaid, and the sum of \$2,848 for the support of public schools, all of which shall be paid into the hands of the County Treasurer on or before the fourteenth day of December next ensuing the passing of this By-Law, by the respective, town, township and village municipalities, as named in the Schedule herein set forth, without any deduction for fees or percentage for paying as aforesaid:
