PREFACE.

THIS little book has been made with the hope that its rhymes and pictures may, as far as little children are concerned, diminish the labour of obtaining a knowledge of the leading events in English History, and that its numerous repetitions will, in it, as in its model of nursery celebrity, "THE HOUSE THAT JACK BUILT," cause that, when once committed to memory, it may never be forgotten.

The writer has endeavoured to select the most important events in our annals, to throw them, and a few dates, into something like readable verse, to produce a catalogue of events, so short as to be easily learned by heart, and sufficiently copious to convey clear ideas of the vicissitudes through which the English nation has passed; he has also striven to avoid party politics—how far he has succeeded his readers must judge.

Having mentioned The House that Jack Built, it is scarcely necessary to add that these lines are intended to be read in a similar manner, beginning with the first article, then taking the second and the first, afterwards, the third, second, and first, and so on through the whole.

If the writer has discovered a way by which knowledge may be increased, or the trouble of

gaining it lessened, he is amply rewarded for his exertions; if he has failed, his consolation must be, that, though he has wasted a portion of his time, it has been with the intention of doing good.

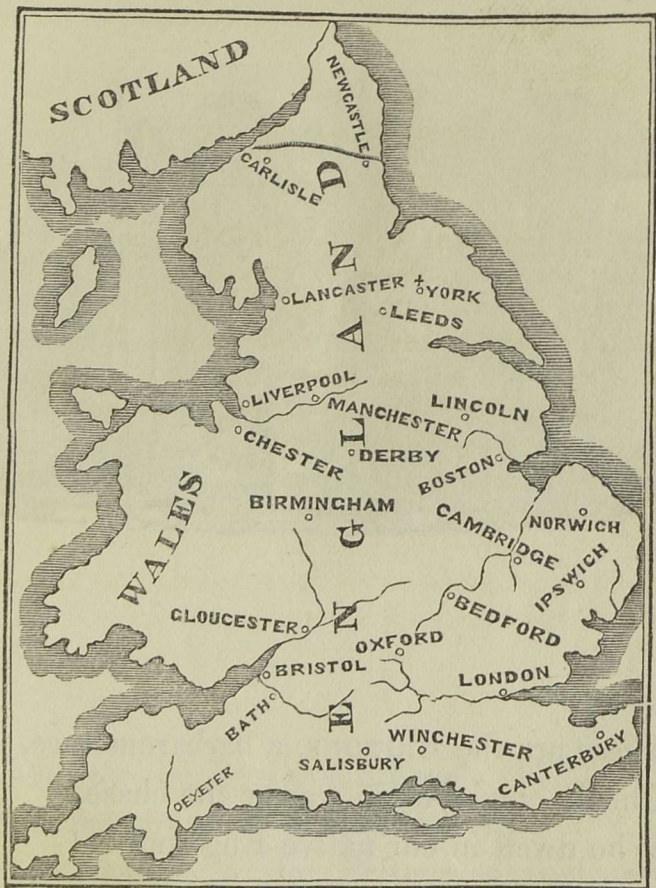

race, &c.



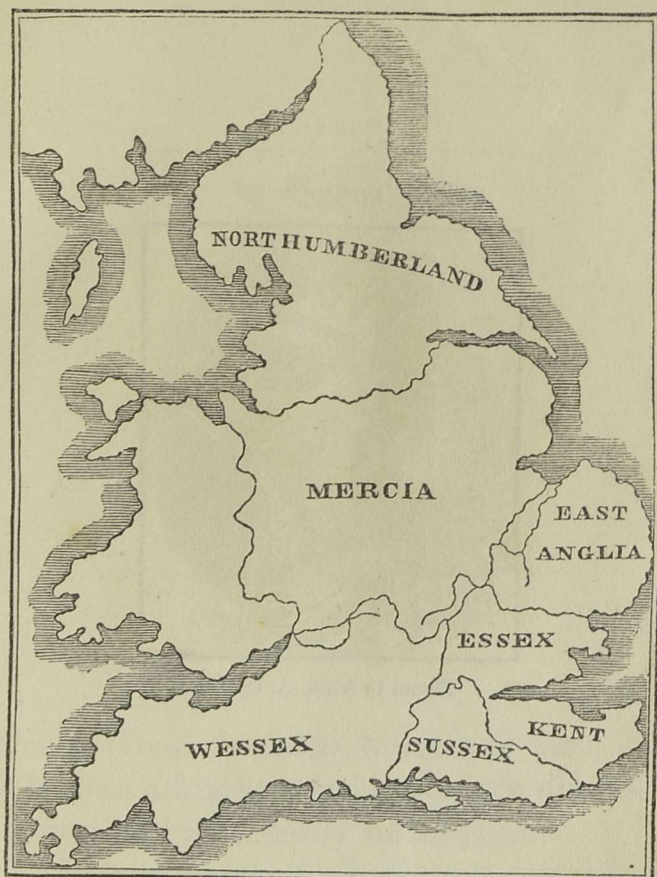
These are GOTHs and VANDALS, tribes of

Born 849, began to reign 871.

This is Great ALFRED, brave and wise,
Who like a bright star in the dark did rise ;
He labour'd incessantly to assuage
The fury and vice of a barbarous age ;
He quelled the DANES, that with ruthless
hand
Carried fire and sword throughout the land.
He was grandson of Egbert, whom we
call, &c.



These are three Danes on our throne that sate,
The first CANUTE, who is called THE GREAT ;
Then two of his sons to him succeed—
HAROLD, called HAREFOOT, because of his
speed ;

The last of the race was HARDICANUTE,
Whose grossness with royalty little did suit ;
Then Danish power had stronger grown,
And the Saxons been often overthrown,
Since the days of Great Alfred, brave and
wise, &c.



This is the great battle on HASTINGS' plain,
Where HAROLD the king by an arrow was
slain,

(While his men with Normans in combat mix
In the year *One thousand and sixty six.*)

Son of EARL GODWIN; and successor
To good KING EDWARD THE CONFESSOR.
He followed three Danes on our throne that
sate, &c.

WILLIAM THE CONQUEROR.



Born 1024, began to reign 1066.

This is WILLIAM THE CONQUEROR, stern
and bold,
Who ordered the *Curfew bell* to be toll'd;
He caus'd the *Doomsday book* to be made,
And the Norman *Feudal laws* obey'd;
He won the great battle on Hastings'
plain, &c.

WILLIAM RUFUS.



Born 1057, began to reign 1087.

This is WILLIAM, called RUFUS, which
signifies *Red*,

A prince of bad morals and manners, 'tis
said.

The throne by his quickness in travelling he
won

From his brother ROBERT, the eldest son
Of William the Conqueror, stern and bold, &c.

HENRY I.



Born 1068, began to reign 1100.

This is HENRY THE FIRST, in learning
skill'd,
Who rul'd when his brother by chance was
kill'd;
William, call'd Rufus, which signifies Red, &c.

STEPHEN.



Born 1105, began to reign 1135.

This is STEPHEN, whose reign, full of civil
strife,
Caus'd a dreadful waste of human life ;
Next to Henry the First, in learning
skill'd, &c.

HENRY II.



Born 1133, began to reign 1154.

This is HENRY THE SECOND, wise and great,
Yet sorrow reach'd his high estate,
From *Thomas à Becket* much trouble grew,
Whom at Church the king's attendants slew;
For which Henry himself, without complaint,
Was scourg'd at the shrine of the (so call'd)
saint;

He follow'd Stephen, whose reign, full of
strife, &c.

RICHARD I.



Born 1157, began to reign 1189.

This is King RICHARD OF LION HEART,
Who in *Palestine* play'd a warlike part ;
The Germans in prison did him detain ;
At the siege of *Chalons* in France he was
slain.

Son of Henry the Second, wise and great, &c.

JOHN.



Born 1166, began to reign 1199.

This is the weak and wicked King JOHN,
Whose Barons combin'd, and strongly con-
tended

To cripple the power their sov'reign defended;
His crown to the *Pope* through fear he re-
sign'd,

And fam'd *Magna Charta* at *Runnymede*
sign'd.

Brother to Richard of Lion heart, &c.

HENRY III.



Born 1207, began to reign 1216.

This is HENRY THE THIRD, from whose life
we find,
That he, like his father, was feeble in mind.
His reign was the longest of any but one.
Son of the weak and wicked King John, &c.

EDWARD I.



Born 1239, began to reign 1272.

This is EDWARD THE FIRST, of lengthy limb;
Wales was annexed to the realm by him.
He warr'd with the *Scots*, whom often he
beat,
Though they rallied again after each defeat.
Son of Henry the Third, from whose life we
find, &c.

EDWARD II.



Born 1284, began to reign 1307.

This is EDWARD THE SECOND, whose deeds
evinced

That he was a silly and dastardly prince ;
Defeated by Scotchmen at *Bannockburn*,
Home with disgrace compell'd to return ;
A horrible murder concluded his days ;—
His fate we must pity—his life cannot praise.
Son of Edward the First, of lengthy limb, &c.

EDWARD III.



Born 1312, began to reign 1327.

This is EDWARD, the flower of chivalry,
The THIRD of the name; who, with his
brave son
The battles of *Cressy* and *Poictiers* won.
Half a cent'ry of rule to this monarch was
giv'n;
He died thirteen hundred and seventy seven.
Son of Edward the Second, whose deeds
evince, &c.

RICHARD II.



Born 1366, began to reign 1377.

This is RICHARD THE SECOND, an imprudent
king,
Whose folly did many misfortunes bring;
For which, without doubt, he repented too
late,
When at *Pontefract Castle* he met with his
fate;
He was born at *Bourdeaux*; the grandson
was he,
Of Edward, the flower of chivalry, &c.

HENRY IV.



Born 1367, began to reign 1399.

This is HENRY THE FOURTH, call'd BOLING-
BROKE,

Both warlike and wise; till death he retain'd
The crown, which by force from his cousin
he gain'd—

Poor Richard the Second, an imprudent
king, &c.

HENRY V.



Born 1389, began to reign 1413.

This is HENRY THE FIFTH, a hero as bold
As any of whom in romances we're told ;
In conquests he placed his chief delight ;
At *Agincourt* beat the French in fight,
And brought most of their land beneath his
yoke.

Son of Henry the Fourth, call'd Boling-
broke, &c.

HENRY VI.



Born 1421, began to reign 1422.

This is HENRY THE SIXTH, meek, timid,
and mild,
Who came to the throne when a little child,
The whole of his reign by trouble was cross'd,
And his father's conquests in France were lost.
Then the factions of *Roses*, White and Red,
Caus'd rivers of noble blood to be shed ;
Until his young heir, and himself beside,
By the hands of cruel assassins died.
Son of Henry the Fifth, a hero as bold, &c.

EDWARD IV.



Born 1442, began to reign 1461.

This is EDWARD THE FOURTH, of handsome mien,
In whose time the first English printing was seen :
Of the *House of York*—his forces prevail'd,
When they the Lancastrian troops assail'd.
Successor to Henry the Sixth, meek, timid,
and mild, &c.

EDWARD V.



Born 1471, began to reign 1483.

This is EDWARD THE FIFTH, poor hapless
boy,
Son of Edward the Fourth, of handsome
mien, &c.

RICHARD III.



Born 1443, began to reign 1483.

This is RICHARD THE THIRD, that in fight
was killed ;
A monster as frightful in body and mind
As ever was suffered to plague mankind ;
His own little nephews he did destroy ;
One was Edward the Fifth, poor hapless
boy, &c.

HENRY VII.



Born 1456, began to reign 1485.

This is HENRY THE SEVENTH, of *Tudor* line;
Two insurrections disturb'd his reign,
But courage and vigilance made them vain.
His policy much the realm improv'd,
Though hoarding his money he dearly lov'd.
He won the great battle of Bosworth field,
Where Richard the Third in fight was
kill'd, &c.

HENRY VIII



Born 1492, began to reign 1509.

This is HENRY THE EIGHTH, who married
six wives,
And ended by violence two of their lives ;
He was a tyrant, fat, savage, and proud ;
Yet still he was useful, it must be allow'd,
As first of the sov'reigns who govern'd this
nation,
That sanction'd the Protestant Reformation.
Crown'd in the year *Fifteen hundred and*
nine,
Son of Henry the Seventh of Tudor line, &c.

EDWARD VI.



Born 1537, began to reign 1547.

The next that rul'd was that excellent youth,
A pattern of piety, wisdom, and truth,
King EDWARD THE SIXTH, who left this
sad scene

For the regions of bliss at the age of sixteen.
Son of Henry the Eighth, who married six
wives, &c.

MARY.



Born 1516, began to reign 1553.

This is MARY, that married KING PHILIP
OF SPAIN,

(May times such as hers be ne'er seen
again,)

Full of "zeal without knowledge," she Pro-
testants burn'd,

Unless to the Romish religion they turn'd.

Cranmer, Ridley, and Latimer, perish'd in
flames,

And distant posterity honours their names.

Half-sister was she to that excellent youth,
&c.

ELIZABETH,



Born 1533, began to reign 1558.

This is ELIZABETH, England's boast,
Who saw the *Armada* approach her coast;
Then the storm-shatter'd remnant that fled
from the fight,
Hurrying homeward in pitiful plight.
Long and splendid her reign, it yet had some
spots,
The worst was the death of *Queen Mary of
Scots*.
Unmarried Elizabeth lived and died;
A sister was she, by the father's side,
To Mary, who married King Philip of
Spain, &c.

JAMES I.



Born 1566, began to reign 1603.

This is JAMES THE FIRST, since whose time
we "*Remember*"

The "*Gunpowder treason,*" and "*fifth of
November.*"

Then England with Scotland united became,
As he to both sceptres had lineal claim,
At the death of Elizabeth, England's
boast, &c.

CHARLES I.



Born 1600, began to reign 1625.

This is CHARLES THE FIRST, who lost his
head,
After his men from battle had fled;
For disputes arose, and to war he went
With his unruly parliament:
Son of James the First, since whose time we
remember, &c.

OLIVER CROMWELL.



Commonwealth lasted from 1649 to 1660.

This is OLIVER CROMWELL, the state's
director,

Under the title of *Lord Protector*,

Who rose from a private gentleman's station
By courage and cunning.—He govern'd the
nation

When Charles the First had lost his head, &c.

CHARLES II.



Born 1630, began to reign 1660.

This is CHARLES THE SECOND, who, when
 elevated [pated,
 On Great Britain's throne, prov'd gay, dissi-
 Luxurious, and vain;—loving pow'r above law.
 Then England some dreadful calamities saw;
 The Plague desolated her principal town;
 Which, in the *three sixes*,* was burnt nearly
 down. [rounded,
 The court and the city by spies were sur-
 Executions were frequent—for treason
 abounded. [began,
 Charles reign'd nearly twenty-five years, and
 Less than two from the death of that bad
 clever man,
 Oliver Cromwell, the state's director, &c.

JAMES II.



Born 1633, began to reign 1685.

This is KING JAMES, who did abdicate
In *Sixteen hundred and eighty-eight*,
After he'd earnestly striv'n in vain,

WILLIAM AND MARY.



William born 1650 began to reign 1689.

These are WILLIAM AND MARY, of ORANGE
NASSAU,

Who jointly were sov'reigns, for such was
the law.

He was valiant in battle, in council serene,
And she was an excellent woman and queen.
Daughter of James, who did abdicate, &c.

ANNE.



Born 1665, began to reign 1702.

This is ANNE to PRINCE GEORGE in wed-
lock join'd,
Who died without leaving an heir behind.
Whig and *Tory* squabbles then reach'd great
height,
Marlbrough conquer'd at *Blenheim's* fight,
And in other battles shed much blood,
Of which we never found out the good.
Saint Paul's Cathedral finished by *Wren*,
Eighth year of this reign;—*Sev'nte*n hun-
dred and ten.
This queen was the last of the *Stuart* race,
Of pleasing manners and handsome face.
Next to William and Mary of Orange Nas
sau, &c.

GEORGE I.



Born 1660, began to reign 1714.

This is KING GEORGE, THE FIRST of the
name,
In whose time the *Pretender* to *Peterhead*
came;
Then finding he had but a slender chance
To conquer Great Britain, return'd to France;
And his followers, unable the troops to with-
stand,
For disloyalty lost both their lives and their
land.
So the throne to the *House of Brunswick*
went,
As laid down in the Act of Settlement.
After Anne to Prince George in wedlock
join'd, &c.

GEORGE II.



Born 1683, began to reign 1727.

This is GEORGE THE SECOND; in his reign
 The French and English fought again.
 The young Pretender, in *forty-five*,*
 In the north of Scotland did arrive;
 At *Preston Pans* the royalists beat,
 But at *Culloden* suffer'd a great defeat;
 Then fled away from Britain's shore,
 And his cause was ruined for evermore.
 George was the last, a foreigner born,
 By whom our island's crown was worn.
 Son of King George, the First of the
 name, &c.

GEORGE III.



Born 1738, began to reign 1760.

This is the patriarch GEORGE THE THIRD ;
In his longest of reigns great events occur'd :
Th' Americans fought for a new constitution ;
France was convuls'd by a vast revolution ;
Duncan, Howe, Jarvis, Nelson, great victories gain'd,
And Britain the rule of the ocean maintain'd ;
India, Egypt, Spain, Portugal, torn by alarms,
In turns saw the conquests of old England's arms ;

The last of her triumphs, the greatest one
too,
Was by *Wellington* won, at famed *Waterloo*.
Then swords slept in peace, and banners
were furl'd,
When, aged eighty-two, the king left the
world.
Before his accession his father was dead,
So he was advanc'd in his grandfather's
stead,
King George the Second, in his reign, &c.

GEORGE IV.



Born 1762, began to reign 1820.

Son of the patriarch George the Third, &c.

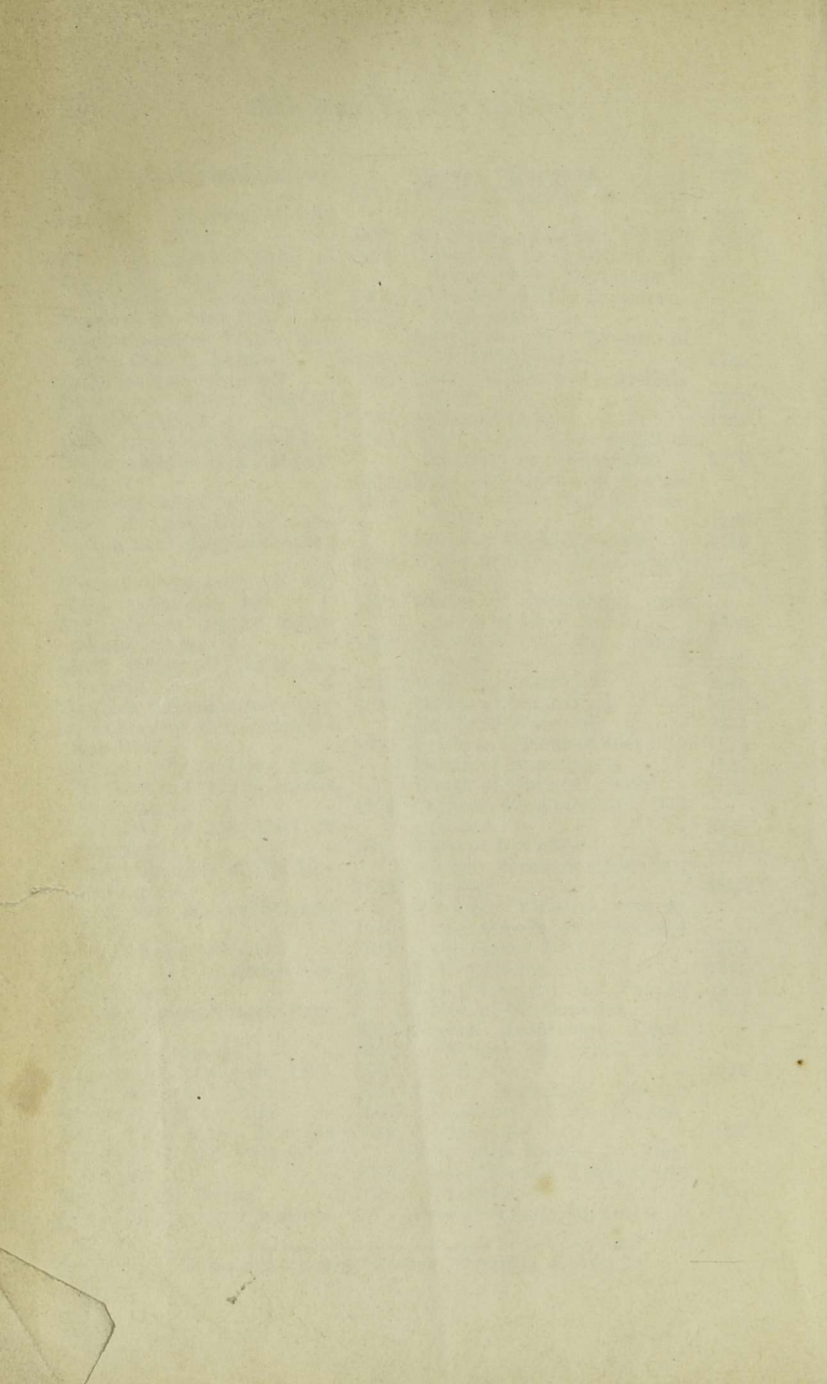

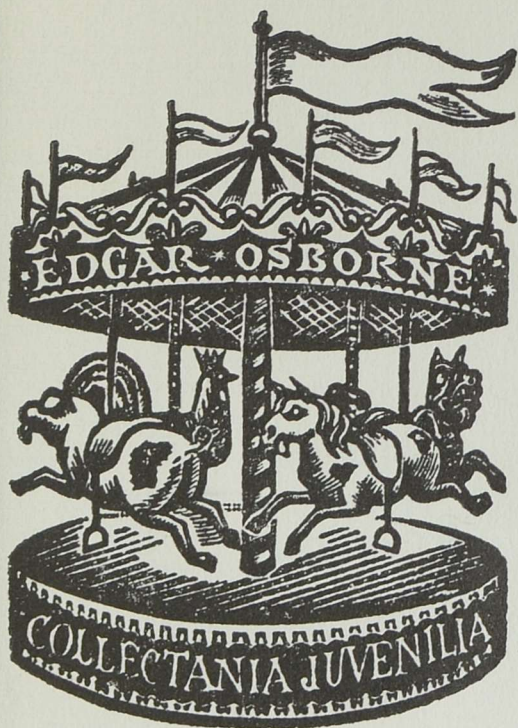
