John the Baptist.

In the Frontispiece you may see Timothy, to whom St. Paul wrote two epistles, which are called by his name. We know very little about Timothy, except that he was a very good and holy bishop; and that St. Paul calls him his beloved son, and takes much pains to teach him his duty in the beautiful epistles which he wrote to him. St. Paul also says that he knew Timothy had a good and pious mother and grandmother, and that he had known the Scriptures from a child, so we may suppose he was well and carefully taught. I suppose this picture is intended to show us Timothy learning to read from his grandmother; or else she is warning him against the love of riches, for, when he grew up to be a man, St. Paul dwelt upon the same subject, writing to him in a letter, That godliness with contentment is great gain, and that

when God gives us food and raiment, we ought to be content and happy and thankful to him for the blessings we have, not envious of our neighbours who are better off than we are: and should we be intrusted with riches, he strictly enjoins us to do all the good we can, "To be rich in good works, ready to distribute." We are not to be high-minded, nor place our trust in them, as they are ever uncertain, and can make to themselves wings and fly away, but we must place our trust in the living God, trying to serve him with all our hearts, and laying up in store for ourselves a good foundation against the time to come; for we must all die, and in the hour of death we shall find our riches will avail us nothing, as we cannot take them out of this world with us, neither can gold purchase for us a place in heaven. "The pure in heart only shall see God." And we must be kind, and gentle in spirit, forgiving injuries, loving and serving each other, if we desire to gain heaven. It is when we are young that we ought to live to God; so that when we are old he will not forsake us, but will say unto us, Well done thou good and faithful servant, enter into the joy of thy Lord. Try now, my dear children, to copy the example set before you by the children you have read about in this little book. They every one loved God, and tried to serve him with their whole hearts. And when you are older, and can read the Bible itself, you will find a great deal more about all these persons, and very many more. But at present, if you listen to the teaching of your parents, as Timothy did, you will learn quite enough to enable you to love and please God as you ought to do. He has been so good to you, you ought to give up your whole hearts to him, like the "Children of Scripture."

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
