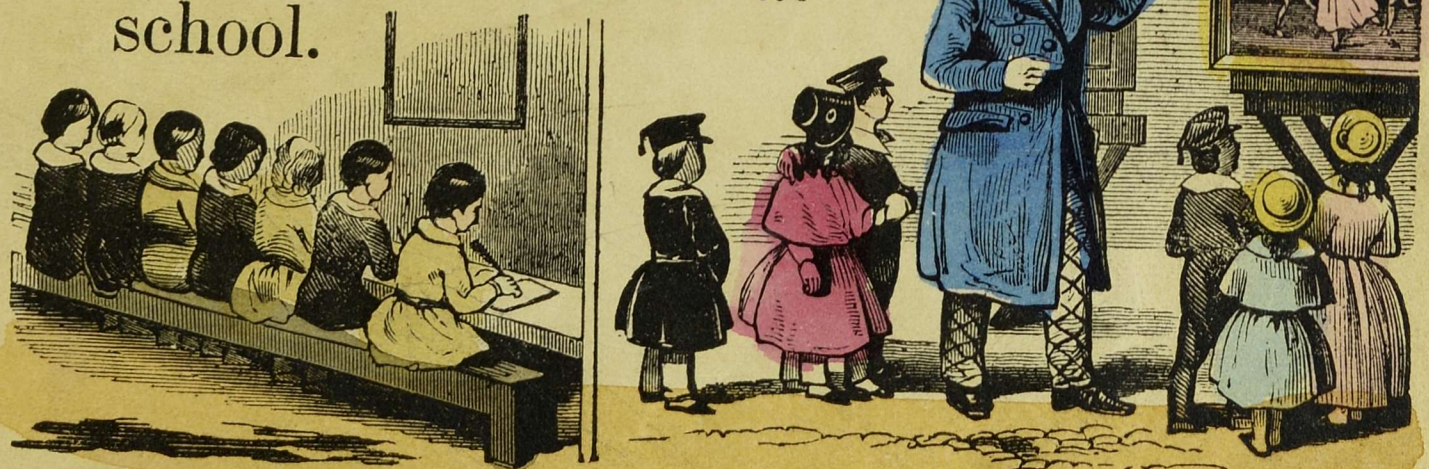


6 good boys with 1 kite, my dear,

 Of sums well learned at school.











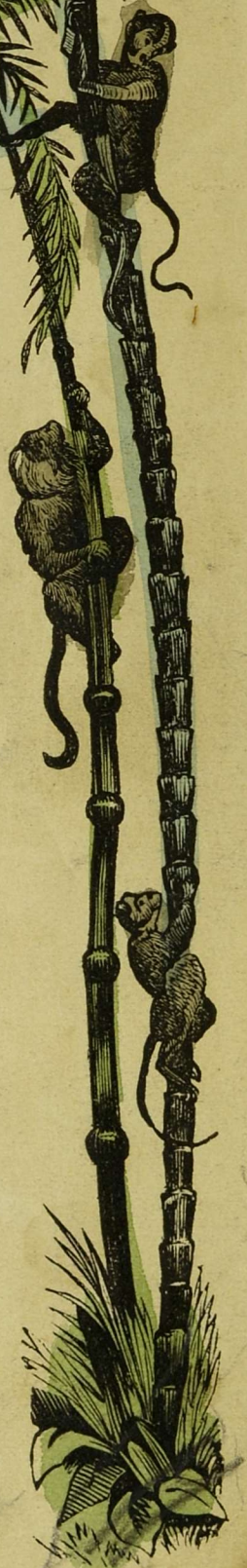




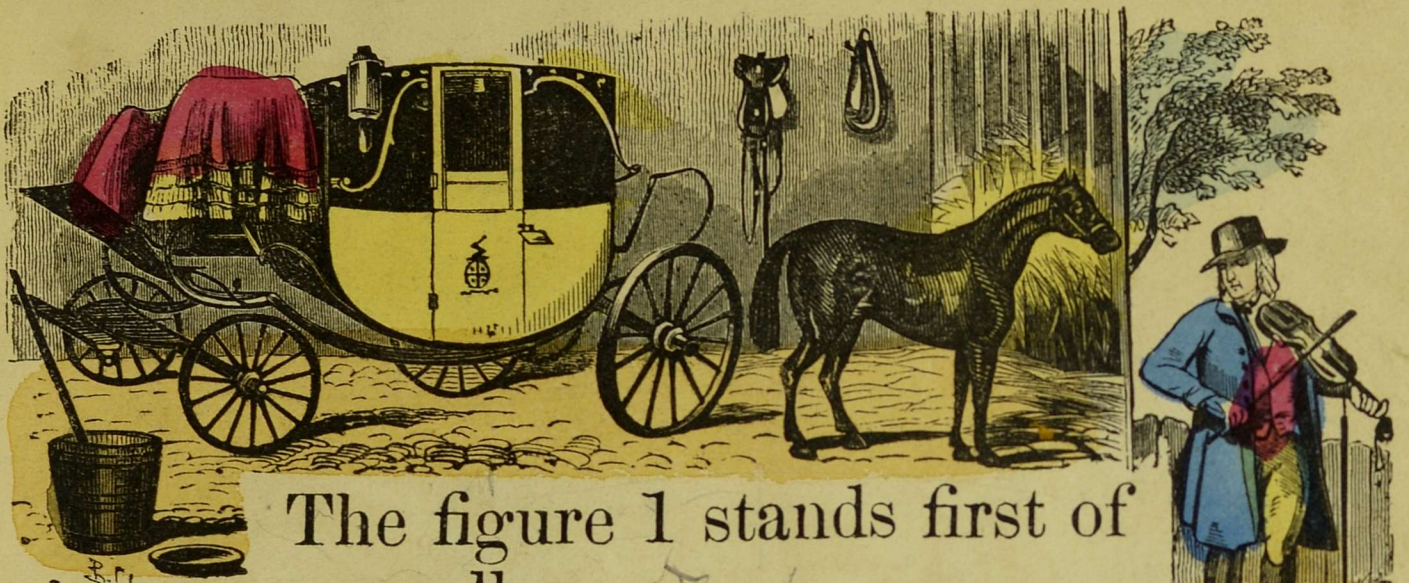
The figure 9 is 1 and 8,

Twice 2 the figure 4 will
