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
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LESSON I.

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


LESSON II.

LESSON IV.


John may go with me to see the cow and sheep.

Come to school clean and neat, take your book go to your place, and learn as fast as you can.


When you have learnt the task that is set you, and it is your turn to go out to read, speak plain, and sound your words right.

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
LESSON VI.

LESSON VIII.


The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.
