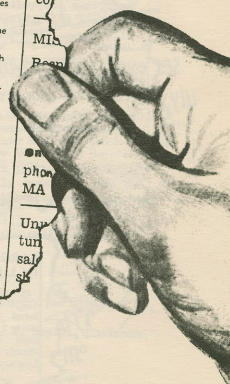

BOOK STOCK AT AN ALL TIME HIGH

Leaside, Ont., Dec. 31st—2959 volumes were purchased by the Library and put into circulation during 1955. 1368 worn out books were discarded, leaving net gain of 1191 volumes.

Books on the shelves and in circulation now stand at 20,157 volumes—12,159 in the Adult Department and 7998 in the Boys' and Girls' Department.

OVER 55% OF TOWN'S POPULATION BELONG TO LIBRARY

Leaside, Ont., Dec. 31st—Library membership at the end of December 1955 totalled 9671—of which 3,159 were boys and girls, and 6512 adults.

LARGEST CIRCULATION IN LIBRARY'S HISTORY

Leaside, Ont., Dec. 31st—128,466 volumes were circulated in 1955, as compared with 117,981 in the previous year. Circulation has shown steady increase since the Library's inception.

MANY SPECIAL SERVICES AT LIBRARY

Leaside, Ont., Dec. 31st—The Library subscribes to and has available for your use 65 magazines.

Monthly book lists are available thereby keeping you posted on current acquisitions.

A weekly review of new books is a feature in our local paper.

CO-OPERATION WITH SCHOOLS

Leaside, Ont., Dec. 31st—During the year the entire staffs of all the schools of Leaside met with the Trustees and personnel of the Library—aims of mutual interest were discussed, so that an even greater degree of co-operation might exist.

APPRECIATION OF MUSIC ENCOURAGED

Leaside, Ont., Dec. 31st—The Library has a record collection of 274 records. 1180 records were borrowed in 1955, compared with 1059 in 1954—an increase of 121.

TO THE CITIZENS OF LEASIDE:

The following are some of the facts concerning the administration, financing and operation of your Public Library.

In our Town, the Library is the only cultural and educational organization which is jointly sponsored by all the people of Leaside. It serves not only the Town's recreational and educational reading needs, but also distributes information of a technical nature to business and industry within the Town.

The Library is financed by means of Provincial grants, grants from the Town of Leaside and miscellaneous revenue derived from rentals, fines and membership fees.

The Board, which administers the Library and sets its policy, is appointed by the following bodies: the Council of the Town of Leaside, the Leaside Board of Education and the Metropolitan Separate School Board.

Each year the Library has been able to point to a picture of growth in membership and in circulation. Combined with this progress has been an ever increasing number of new books and records.

Your Library and its staff, under the capable direction of the Chief Librarian, Mrs. Eleanor MacAlpine, have received much favourable comment from other library bodies.

The children's section of the Library is one of the best in the Metropolitan area. Parents accompanying their children are pleasantly surprised with the interest displayed and intelligent guidance offered by the librarians and the staff.
