# 1962 - THE LIBRARY REPORTS - 1962

The Etobicoke Public Library ended its 13th year of operation with a circulation of over a million books. This was achieved in part by the operation of a second bookmobile for 10 months of the year but also by a general increase from all outlets. Greater use was made of all the resources of the library, the usual programmes were continued and new activities were undertaken.

### MOBILE SERVICE

The major expansion for 1962 was the acquisition of a second bookmobile, of the trailer type, which was put into service in February. This made it possible to give service to new areas of the township and to extend the time spent at several existing stops. There are now 36 weekly stops on the timetable.

### HOURS OF OPENING

Hours of opening in the Main Library were extended to 6 days, a week with Wednesday hours being the same as the other 5 days, 12 noon to 9 p.m. in the Adult Department and 12 noon to 6 p.m. in the Boys' and Girls' Department. The Boys' and Girls' Department also increased its hours of opening by remaining open Thursday and Friday evenings until 8 o'clock.

### EATONVILLE BRANCH

At the year's end plans were going ahead for the building of the new community branch on Burnhamthorpe Road just east of Highway 27. Preliminary plans of the architects, Elkin and Becksted, had been approved and the building should be completed late in the summer.

# SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

"YOU AND YOUR FAMILY." The Adult Department of the Main Library co-operated with the Boys' and Girls' Division in a new project combining a booklist and display of books entitled "You and Your Family". The display of books was chosen from book stock ready for the Eatonville Library and was used by many Home and School, P.T.A. and Church Groups in the township. The display was usually accompanied by a librarian who discussed the books and introduced other services of the library.

"FILM FESTIVAL." The library sponsored a successful Spring Film Festival held on three successive Saturdays in the Etobicoke Collegiate auditorium. Children between 8 and 12 were introduced to films of better quality, most of them from other countries. A similar programme will be sponsored by the library in 1963.

### 1962 - GENERAL ACTIVITIES - 1962

- 208 elementary school classes visited the Boys and Girls departments.
- 3159 children attended story hours and other special programmes for children.
  - 19 community groups were visited by librarians.
  - 21 book lists were compiled and 17,000 copies distributed.
  - 42 adult discussion groups met at the Main Library and Alderwood branch
  - 3 art exhibits were held: two at Alderwood branch and one at the Main Library. The latter was a display of pictures from the International Children's Library in Munich which was later sent on to the Canadian Library Association for bookings in other Canadian libraries.
  - 4 travelling book displays from the Canadian Library Association exhibited books from Italy, Germany, Great Britain and the Republic of China.
