n 1990, the City of York Public Library was affected by provincial and federal legislation on the broader public sector. Bill 154, An Act to provide for Pay Equity, roquired the library to devise, post and implement a plan to ensure its employees equal pay for work of equal value. In many cases, this has led to fair and just increases in salaries for library employees Bill 49, the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act, grants the public the right of access to records held by institutions limited only by specific exemptions, while it protects the privacy of personal information held by institutions. Individuals have the right of access to their own personal information and can request correction of erroneous information. The federal government's Goods and Services Tax has increased the financial burden on public libraries in a time of overall restraint. The savings due to the removal of the Federal Sales Tax on manufactured goods is expected to be small, while the GST will be applied to almost all purchases that the library makes. In April, the draft of the proposed Ontario Public Library Strategic Plan was released at public meetings held in public libraries across the province. The Strategic Planning Group invited responses from the public library community. The City of York Public Library Board discussed the draft version in May and sübmitted a detailed response to the Strategic Plan. In its response, the Library Board affirmed its commitment to an independent board of trustees as the best way to govern public libraries in Ontario.

MESSAGE

n 1990, the City of York Public Library enjoyed one of its most successful years since it began operation in 1945.

Total circulation surpassed the one million figure, ending the year at 1,159,325, an increase of 16,9% over 1989. Significant growth was recorded in the circulation of books, which increased by 10.5% to 769,946 videotapes, which increased by 43.8% to 300,503; and compact discs, which nearly tripled from 4,100 to 11,953.

Both regular and special programs attracted many people to the library in 1990 Pre-school children attended weekly programs for tots and pre-school storytimes at the branches, as well as the annual Cookie Monster Challenge on January 27 and Bear Week from



February 20 to 24. School-age children enioved regular pograms on Saturday afternoons and during the March and Christmas breaks and summer vacation Special programs for school-age children included National Book Week. Public Library Week and Children's Book Festival, During the school year, each branch received regular class visits from nearby schools. Regular programs for adults included books over coffee. computer clubs, film nights, seniors' programs and small business seminars. Special programs for adults featured compostina, financial planning, income tax clinics, life insurance, the new home market, retirement planning and many others.

The popular series of programs on "How the City is Run" continued in 1990. Parficipating in this year's series were Mayor Fergy Brown, Aldermen Bob McLean, Ben Nobleman, Frances Nunziata and Bill Saundercook, City Manager Bill Stockwell, Commissioner of Finance Lorne Hampson, and John Payne of the City of York Fire Department. In addition, Metro Chairman Alan Tonks spoke to several school classes about the Metropolitan Toronto government.

Many multicultural programs were offered in 1990, including Chinese films at the Main Library. Polish Film Night

and Polish Language Story Time and Vietnamese films at the Jane-Dundas Branch. This year's Multicultural Evening was a great success and attended by the Hon. Rosario Marchese, Minister of Culture and Communications, who commended the City of York Public Library for its commitment to serving Canada's multicultural population.

Outreach programs were again used to enhance the library's image in the community. These included a display at the Westside Mall during Education Week and Literacy Week, a booth sponsored by the Public Libraries of Metropolitan Toronto at the Good Age Show, a display at the Municipal Offices on Environment Day, and the Canada Day celebrations at Coronation Park

Effective public relations ensured that library programs and services were well publicized. Fall and winter program brochures and summer program calendars were produced for each branch. Flyers. posters and bookmarks were used to advertise library programs. A special "Green Theme" bibliography promoted awareness of environmental issues. The Toronto Star, Kids Toronto and Bloor West Villager printed notices of programs. Radio stations CFRB, CHUM, CJRT and Q107 and Graham Cable aired public service announcements.

A milestone was reached in the automation of library services when a contract was signed in June with Dynix Library Systems, Inc. to install an automated library system. Much of the second half of 1990 was devoted to preparing for the automated system. In 1991, the online public access catalogue will be available at all

branches and circulation control will be implemented branch by branch.

In concluding this report, I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Frank Lambert, Chaliman, and to the members of the Library Board for their continuing guidance and support during the past year and to the staff of the City of York Public Library for their efforts to provide the public with the best library service they can.




