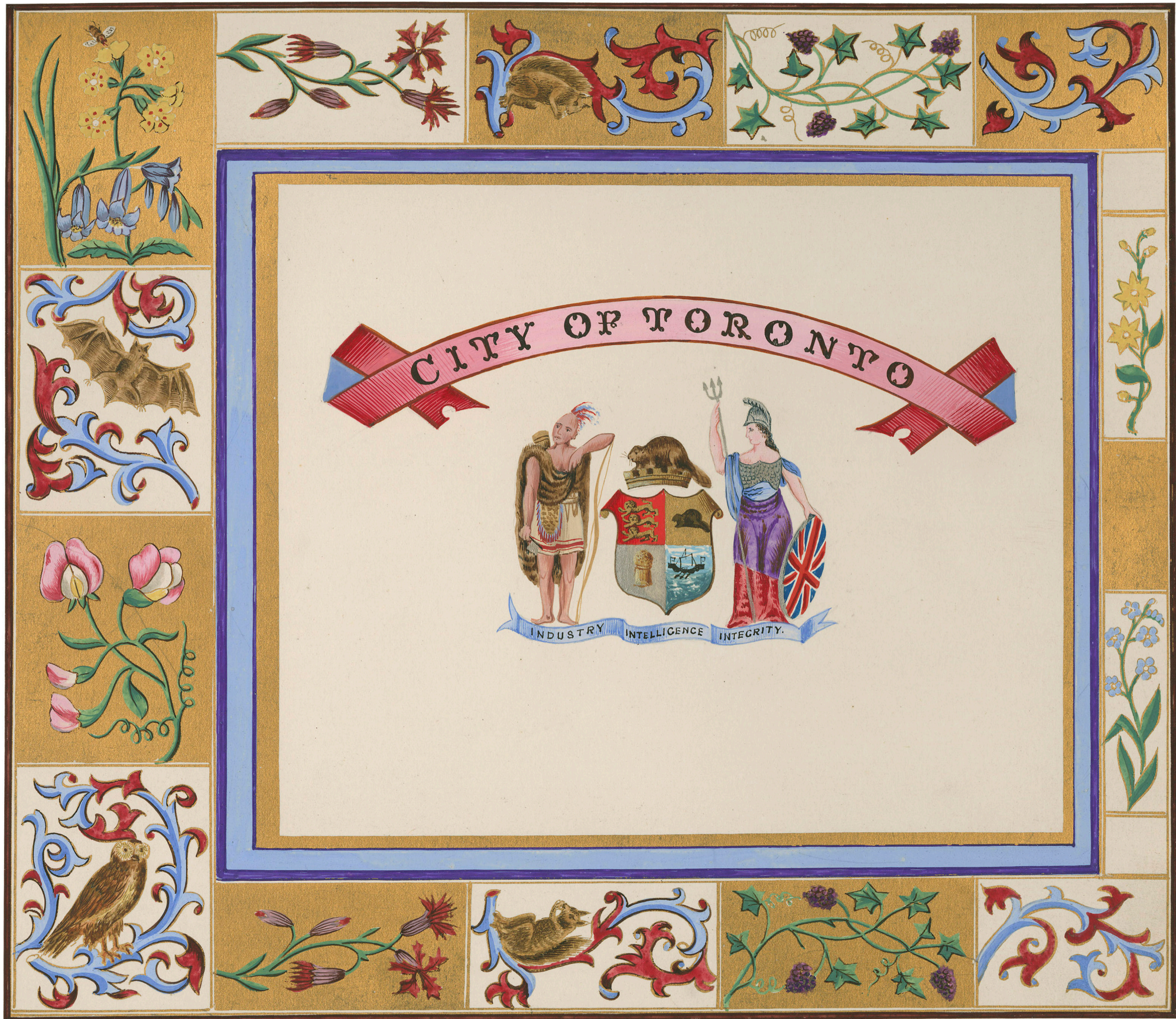

to leave the Chair without expressing, and that in the strongest terms at their com-
mand their feelings of high personal respect towards himself, and their appreciation of
the impartiality with which he has discharged the arduous duties incumbent upon
him by virtue of his position.

THE Mayors inaugural Election in 1881 by the large majority of 1161,
and his re-election in 1882 by acclamation evidence more than by any words that can

be used, the estimation in which His Worship is held by the Electorate of the "Queen City of the West."

THE Civic year now closing has been remarkable for the good feeling that has prevailed among the Members of the Council, while an exacting public has suspended criticism in honor of one who has so greatly contributed to the same, and has ably led the Council in a dignified discharge of its high functions.

THE Council desire to assure His Worship that he retires with the sincere & good wishes not only of the Council, but of the staff of Corporation Officials of every department, and of every grade, for the welfare and happiness of himself and family, and while they hope that his term of Civic administration may be pleasantly remembered by himself the pleasure will be theirs to witness that further success in public life, of which the Mayorship of Toronto may prove a happy and eventful forerunner.
