

## TO THE READER.

In compiling the following pages, my object was to furnish Teachers and Learners with as complete a Spelling Book as my limits would allow; and, therefore, in order to supersede the necessity of a Pronouncing Dictionary for children, I have not only given the Acceptations, common to most Spelling Books, but also the Sounds and the Parts of Speech of all the Words, to which such appendages were thought necessary; except the select words, in the Appendix, which, for the reason given in the title, are only accented and explained.

Spelling, the elementary part of Reading, consists in naming the letters contained in any words singly, and in rightly dividing words into syllables; therefore great care has been taken in this publication, to divide them agreeably to the sound of each syllable, as far as they could be so divided with propriety.

The mode of division herein adopted, is that recommended by DRS. LOWTH and ASH. The former, in his grammar, page 18, says, "the best and easiest rule for dividing words into "syllables in spelling, is to divide them as they are naturally "divided in a right pronunciation; without regard to the "derivation, or the possible combination of consonants at the beginning of a syllable."

Doctor Johnson's Dictionary being universally acknowledged to be the STANDARD for the spelling of English words, I am sorry to see in practice, so many deviations from it, particularly in words, derived from the French, ending in "eur," which the learned author very properly terminates in "our", as, Anteriour, demeanour, emperour, errour, favour, fervour, governour, honour, horrour, humour, inferiour, interiour, odour, posteriour, rigour, rumour, savour, superiour, terrour, valour, vapour, vigour, &c. and many other words, as, Arbour, ardour, armour, harbour, labour, tumour, &c. not derived from the French, which the Doctor spells as above, but which some of our modern writers, without either

improving the language or the appearance of the words, omitting the u, spell as they are spelled in the Latin.

As the superintendents of most seminaries at their commencing the arduous, but honourable and important employment of instructing youth in the various branches of education, have, doubtless chosen such elementary publications as then appeared to be the best adapted to their several purposes; it has, therefore, frequently so happened that later works of similar kinds, with perhaps much more merit, have been retarded for many years, before they could obtain that general introduction, of which their sterling value rendered them highly worthy: yet, true as this statement is, I am happy to inform my friends and the public at large, that I have no reason, for any such complaint; for, in a much less time than could be expected, upwards of FORTY THREE THOUSAND copies (the amount of the preceding impressions) have been disposed of; and that I am now called upon for another edition: which, after a careful revision, I, with much pleasure, submit to the inspection of a discerning and generous public.

It has often been remarked by people, very differently circumstanced in life, that public or private praises have generally had a tendency to create, or increase in their recipients an unbounded share of vanity; be this as it may, as I never yet have met with any author, who did not wish to give publicity himself to what had been partially published in his favour, I hope it will not be deemed vain in me to close this address with an honourable critique, given of the first edition of this work in the Anti-jacobin Review, Feb. 1810.

"Mr. Hornsey's past productions in this class of literary composition, have done him great credit, and proved him to be admirably qualified for an instructer of youth. His present work might aptly be styled MULTUM IN PARVO; for it certainly contains a great deal of useful matter, comprised in a small compass, and sold at a very moderate price."




