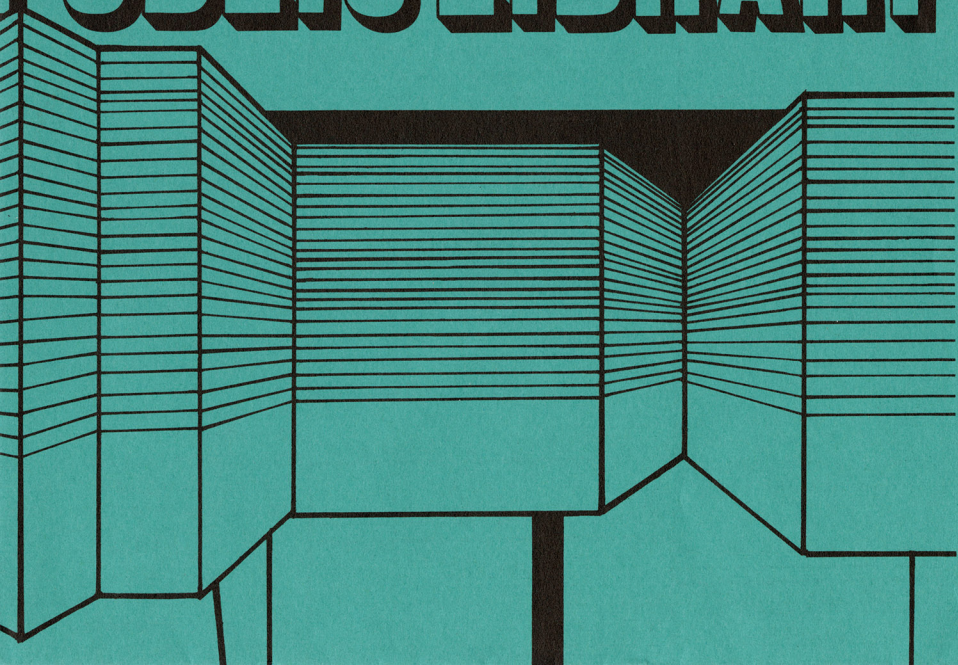

ART IN SUBURBIA

The library's art committee aims at presenting exhibitions of art in many forms. During 1970, electronic, plastic, graphic and computer art, sculpture, painting, mushroom spore prints, wall hangings, photography, and furniture of the future were displayed.

The sources were as varied as the exhibits, representing schools of art and design, craft guilds, downtown galleries and such unexpected sources as penal institutions and emotionally disturbed children.

THE ImMEDIATE BAG sight and sound

Since the start of educational television (Channel 19) in September '70, CEDARBRAE DISTRICT BRANCH has been tuned in daily via the display kiosk on the main floor.

A number of Channel 19 adult programs are available to individuals or groups for playback on videotape complete with guides and resource material.

Scarborough Public Library's collection of videotapes has grown over the years and there are 150 at present - a part of the library's resources for information and continuing education.

Your library card entitles you to your choice of 17,920 records, cassettes and reel-to-reel audio tapes. These include rock, folk, jazz, classical music and musical comedies, language instruction, sound effects, how-to-do almost anything, and radio lectures.

In 1970, film fans (264,897 of them) in families, church and social organizations, discussion groups, business seminars, clubs, senior citizens activities and birthday parties watched 11,635 films (16mm) borrowed through branches of the Scarborough Public Library - FREE.

WELCOME TO THE SCARBOROUGH PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Scarborough Public Library System was founded in 1955 as a community service supported by local taxes and provincial grants. It is governed by the Public Library Board under The Public Libraries Act of Ontario. As a free service for all residents who live, work or attend school in Metropolitan Toronto, the Scarborough Public Library operates 2 district libraries (the second to be opened in the summer of 1971), 7 neighbourhood libraries, 3 bookmobiles and an Administration Centre.

The Scarborough libraries operate as community resource centres to assist all citizens with their work, hobbies, informational and cultural needs. It is a vital information oriented agency keeping pace with the increasing demands of Scarborough residents for printed, audio-visual material and programs of all kinds.

scarborough information network

Our teletype network is used to speed up the interchange of material and information between branches. It is also linked with Centennial College and R.H. King Collegiate in Scarborough, as well as all other library systems in the Metropolitan Toronto area. Using this service anyone may find the location and availability of any material in any branch at a moment's notice. Material not found among Scarborough's resources can still be located elsewhere in Metro. During 1970 - 47,594 interlibrary loans were completed.

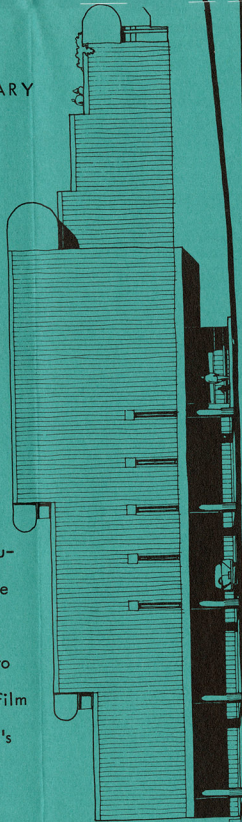

ANNOUNCING THE NEW
ALBERT CAMPBELL DISTRICT LIBRARY
OPENING SUMMER 1971

Located at 496 Birchmount Road
(at Danforth Road), it will serve the south-
west area of Scarborough. This multi-level
building has an area of 26,100 sq. ft.
and will ultimately house a collection of
150,000 items, with special emphasis on
materials for business and industry. Booths
are provided for quiet study and for listen-
ing to recordings and tapes. Individual
television facilities allow for viewing of edu-
cational programs (off-air and replay) at the
user's request. A large meeting room with a
seating capacity of 200 will be available to
community groups. It will also be used for film
shows, panel discussions, talks and children's
activities.
