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The Year in Review

A Message from the Library Board Chair



In last year's Annual Report, I stated "1995 was one of the most challenging, yet rewarding" years that I spent on the Etobicoke Public Library Board. Little did I know that 1996 would bring significant changes that will impact on how library services are to be delivered not only in Etobicoke, but throughout Metropolitan Toronto, in the future.

This made 1996 not only a challenging year, but an interesting one. To ensure that the Libraries' focus was still appropriate, the Mission Statement for the Board was revisited and refined. The Board's revised mission statement states that "The mission of the Etobicoke Public Library Board is to provide and promote relevant and efficient public library services that are accessible to the residents of the City of Etobicoke."

Throughout the year, the Library Board has continued to achieve the

service objectives outlined in the Service Development Plan in spite of a reduction in its grants and rising operational costs. Even with the many unknown external influences, staff has continued to deliver the best possible library service to the residents of Etobicoke.

Our 1996 accomplishments included:

- · Opening of the new Humberwood Library in a unique multi-purpose facility.
- Enhanced information resources such as community information databases, Toronto Free-Net access and dial-in access to the CD-ROM network.
- · Introduction of a circulating CD-ROM collection at key library branches.
- · Implementation of a successful fundraising campaign.
- · Increased circulation over 1995.
- · The renovation of Humber Bay, one of the oldest libraries in Etobicoke.
- · An overwhelming successful Reading Festival and Summer Reading programme.

During 1997, the Management Team of the Etobicoke Public Libraries will work closely with the Board to ensure that quality service continues to be delivered to customers during the transition process. It will be important that close contact be maintained so that we are in a position to react appropriately to the impact of amalgamation.



tobicoke Public Libraries (EPL) opened its 13th branch, Humberwood, to an eager public on Friday, January 26.

Humberwood Library's first customer, 17year-old Sarabjit Bola, had been waiting outside for an hour, eager to have a look at the new materials. Two-year-old Crystal Smith and her mom, Wendy, were the branch's second customers.

"The library is great for us," said Wendy. "We live right across the field from here and it's only a 10 minute walk."

The Humberwood Centre, home to the Humberwood Library, had its official opening celebrations on Saturday, June 8. The Centre, located at 850 Humberwood Blvd. in northwest Etobicoke, houses a public school, a separate school, a public library, a recreation complex and a child care centre. It is the first facility of its kind in Ontario and the proud partners in this venture congratulated each other as they brought greetings to the community at the opening event.

Over 1,800 people attended the official opening. EPL entertained the crowd with Stan the Balloon Man and Eeple, the mascot for the summer reading game. The Holy Child and Humberwood Downs Joint Band and the HumberChild Teacher's Band provided musical performances, while the Parks and Recreation department hosted facepainting.

Since opening, Humberwood Library has been a popular spot. Staff and students from the two schools in the Centre use the Library's resources on a daily basis. Family Night programmes are a great hit with parents and children and a March Break Magic Show attracted over 250 children!

he Humberwood Centre Joint Development Project brought together the Etobicoke Public Library Board, the L Etobicoke Board of Education, the Metropolitan Separate School Board and the City of Etobicoke in partnership to share a single mixed-use building (see page 1). It is the first venture of its kind in Ontario and sets an important precedent in public sector partnership alliances.

tobicoke Public Libraries' (EPL) number one priority during 1996 was to meet the service needs of our customers

The over 1,151,700 items in the collection generated a circulation increase of 2.5% over 1995 (see circulation statistics on page 7). Home Library Services circulation increased by 21% with 38,339 items delivered to 377 Etobicoke residents who were unable to visit the Libraries due to physical limitation. A satisfied customer states "EPL's Home Library Services does everything for me and makes me happy."

A number of enhancements were introduced that strengthened our collections. The Canadian history collections in all branches were assessed and updated. Customers were also provided greater access to information resources with the addition of:

- · Dial-in access to CD-ROM
- · Community information databases
- Toronto Free-Net
- · Staff access to the Internet's research capabilities

Programmes supporting literacy and reading were very successful. The 1996 summer reading programme (see page 8-9) attracted the largest number of participants ever. The 1996/97 Read to Succeed campaign continued to receive City-wide participation from Grade 4 classes. A new writing component was added to this year's programme, culminating in a luncheon and writing workshop with author Paul Kropp for the 50 winning children.

A Writer Laureate programme featuring Paul Kropp was introduced in 1996. Due to the overwhelming response from customers, a new series is being planned for 1997.

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ctober 1996 marked the launch of Etobicoke Public Libraries' (EPL) fundraising campaign. With budget cutbacks over the last several years and the increasing demand for up-to-date library materials and technology, EPL has had to look to sources other than government funding for support.

The Working Together to Enhance Your Library campaign invites individuals, community groups and corporations to enhance the Libraries' collection, information resources and programmes through monetary donations. There are four levels of support: **Donor** - \$10 to \$49; **Supporter** - \$50 to \$99; **Partner** - \$100 to \$249 and **Leader** - \$250 and over.

Lead donors for the campaign were The Etobicoke Historical Society, The Etobicoke Guardian and Mr. Oliver Walters from City TV - Breakfast Television.

In conjunction with Ontario Public LIbrary Week (October 21 - 26) the Working Together to Enhance Your Library fundraising initiative began. Marilyn Mushinski, Minister of Citizenship, Culture and Recreation was on hand to "kick-off" the campaign.

In 1996, the campaign raised almost \$24,000. The money was used to enhance the Libraries' collections and to support reading programmes.








