

REPORT FROM THE CHAIRMAN

The year 1978 has been one of pleasure and satisfaction for me and the Scarborough Public Library Board. The public has increased the use of its libraries, and the staff has responded to the challenge of providing services to a growing population.

Members of the Library Board are representatives of the public. Our chief responsibility is to see that the public library effectively serves the community that supports it. To do this, we act to fulfill the principal functions of trustees which are to determine library objectives suited to the community's needs and re-examine them periodically; to appoint, at fitting salaries, qualified librarians and other staff to direct the activities which will attain these objectives; to secure sufficient funds from the appropriating agency, and from new sources if necessary; to establish policies governing the library and its operation, after consultation with staff; and lastly, to approve the budget and the expenditure of library funds.

Much has been accomplished during the past year. A study entitled "A Framework for the Development of Library Service in the Borough of Scarborough" was produced. Its aim is to "provide a guide for the development of the library system during the next five to ten years, which will thereby influence the quality and type of library service available to the citizens of the Borough".

The On-Line Reference Service has been in operation at Cedarbrae District Library for a full year. This computer-based reference system permits accurate and fast delivery of up-to-the-minute information of all kinds. It has proven itself to be useful to all segments of the community.

We have made some renovations and many repairs to the libraries and we hope to continue to upgrade facilities as funds permit. The Morningside Branch Library was moved to temporary quarters pending the completion of the new Morningside Mall. We look forward to the library's next move into bigger and better facilities.

The Board has decided to replace the book catalogues in libraries with microfiche catalogues and this change is planned for 1979. The new system will improve service and lessen costs, as it is easier to use and requires less space and very little maintenance.

Appreciation and recognition is extended to those many agencies and offices in Scarborough who co-operated with and supported library programmes and services in the past year, and, of course, to the public whose continued patronage gives meaning and incentive to our work.

REPORT FROM THE DIRECTOR

\$4,982,873

During 1978, the people of Scarborough made record use of the library materials provided by the public library system from its fourteen branches and two bookmobiles. The members of the community who were in search of information, self-development, culture and relaxation, borrowed 3,317,912 items and requested answers to 720,833 questions. To support this activity in the public service locations, staff in the support services processed 136,357 new items, obtained 4,050 books from other libraries in Canada and arranged for 42,339 specially reserved items to be made available at the requester's branch libraries.

The special services dealing with senior citizens, children, multilingual materials and films were all kept busy during 1978, fulfilling the many demands from the population. The Shut-In service called on 292 senior citizens and handicapped adults each month with supplies of books and cassettes. Each month, 21 senior citizen nursing homes and apartments having deposits from the library system, were visited. The priorities for the Children's and Young Adults' service were to start separating the children's collection from the adult collection, to stimulate interest in the important pre-school reading material among the parents, and generally to heighten the awareness of the joys of reading amongst the younger members of the population. The multicultural services improved the collections of multilingual material and now acquires books in twenty different languages. 16 mm. films are increasingly popular and in 1978, 40,766 were borrowed, an increase of 18 per cent over the previous year.

In 1978, there were 3,872 programmes held in the branch libraries attended by 87,710 people. The programmes included book clubs, film shows, story hours, puppet shows, discussion groups, demonstrations and lectures. Some of the subjects covered during the lectures and discussions were: making a will, law and small business, home insulation, travelogues, family relationships and a multitude of subjects of interest to the people of the local communities.

The public library's resources include 592,487 hardcover books, 125,272 paperbacks, 2,022 films and videotapes, 35,158 records and cassettes and 1,116 framed pictures. Reports from municipal, provincial and federal governments are available, pamphlets and reports from many sources are collected and approximately 900 journals and newspapers are purchased, many kept on microfilm. To assist in answering questions, the library subscribes to several machine-readable data bases and special financial information services.

The cost of this service in 1978 was \$4,982,873 or approximately \$12.50 per capita for Scarborough. 82 per cent of the money comes from the Borough of Scarborough Council and the balance from the Provincial Government and general income. The work was accomplished by 230 permanent, full time and part time staff and some 120 high school students.
