

# From the Chairman Sandy Douglas

1996 was an exciting year to serve as Chairman of the Scarborough Public Library Board: circulation and use of public library service continued to rise dramatically, new technologies were introduced to enhance and expand the range of services, and the City of Scarborough celebrated its

In keeping with the Library Board's mission, the Bicentennial theme presented the opportunity to provide our customers with information about life in early Scarborough; programs and exhibits focused on the people and cultures who comprise our City. One notable program, Memories of Scarborough, invited members of the community to submit written memoirs about their childhood. The collection of notes provides fascinating insights into the lives of 25 people who grew up in Scarborough, and whose personal histories date as far back as the Great Depression.

Demand for library services continued to grow in 1996, while revenues from provincial government grants were drastically reduced. Annual use figures increased by more than 10%, and library staff are to be commended on meeting the demands of increased use, while continuing to find innovative ways to provide excellent service to the residents of Scarborouch.

In February, the Library Board launched its first Internet web-site on a server at Scarborough Campus of the University of Toronto. The homepage presents basic information about library services in Scarborough and gives users the opportunity to offer feedback about the future development of information services and resources in our libraries.

In response to City Council's decision to construct the City component of the Scarborough Community Complex as a 1996 Capital project, the Library Board, following considerable debate and discussion with staff and City officials, elected to move the construction of the library forward to 1997 in its Capital Plan. The decision was subject to Council approving repayment of the project's cost as part of the Board's pooling debt. The actual opening of the Library Board's 20th library will be conditional on the current budget review at the time construction is completed.

Even as we prepared for the future, budget restraints saw the Board having to end one of Scarborough's most valued services - the bookmobile. In the early days of public library

service in Scarborough a fleet of bookmobiles served the new subdivisions throughout the city. In later years, with the development of more branches, the bookmobile's role changed. Regrettably, provincial funding cuts of more than 1/4 million dollars resulted in the loss of this service.

As the year closed, it became increasingly evident that the controversial legislation on the governance and funding of library boards, introduced by the Province would result in many more challenges. In conjunction with the proposed changes to the infrastructure of the City of Scarborough and Metropolitan Toronto, the Library Board's ability to continue to provide our current level of service may be in jeopardy. To ensure the future of public library services, alternate sources of funding and revenue from corporate and private benefactors will be explored in the months to come.

I have no doubt that the coming years will provide many new challenges for public libraries in Ontario. However, with the support of the Library Board's valued customers and caring, dedicated staff, we will continue to provide dynamic, responsive, and efficient library service into the next millenium.



## From the Chief Executive Officer

In 1996 the Scarborough Public Library Board celebrated the City of Scarborough's Bicentennial with programs, exhibits and displays focussing on local heritage. The Library Board is grateful for its partnership with community organiza-

tions such as the Scarborough Historical Society, the Ontario Multicultural History Society, the Scarborough Arts Council and the Scarborough Historical Museum.

Even with more revenue from increased fees and fines, the Library Board's operating budget declined by 1.8% from the prior year. resulting in a reduction in the funds available for providing library services from \$36.51 to \$35.54 per Scarborough resident. Nevertheless, overall use of the library system continued to surpass that of previous The number of registered customers increased by over five percent to 332,000 residents and circulation also increased by five percent to 6.4 million.

In fact use of library services and resources continued to rise in almost all areas. In addition to recreational use, children. students and adults used their public libraries to support life-long learning. Reference questions rose by almost ten percent to 1.3 million and materials used in the libraries increased over eight percent to 2.6 million. The Library Board provided service from nineteen locations. and 313 home readers and fifteen residential institutions received regular

deliveries of print and video materials, and talking books. In addition to English and French, library materials were made available in twenty-four languages. Unfortunately, even in light of the community's high demand for library services the bookmobile service was eliminated as of May 1st, as the Library Board dealt with the effects of the \$263,000 reduction in Provincial funding.

FestivalExtra, the City of Scarborough's first annual film festival, was co-sponsored and promoted by the Library Board. This successful series of four award-winning films was sponsored by STUDIOASIS. An audience of nearly 800 residents was treated to introductions by the film makers and producers, and filmgoers with series tickets met celebrities after each presentation.

1996 was also a year of preparing the ground work for


achievements that will be acknowledged in vears to come. Construction was started on the Scarborough Community Complex. This development will include Scarborough's twentieth public library, a community recreation centre and the Chinese Cultural Centre With the introduction of CD-ROMs to the circulating collections in the district libraries customers were provided with a new format of library material. Extensive research by library staff resulted in the Library Board's decision to have Data Research Associates. Inc. supply the new automated bibliographic system, and combined with new electronic databases, a whole new dimension of library








