REPORT FROM THE CHAIRMAN

1988 has been another year of increased demand for library service in the City of Scarborough. This trend has continued unabated for 25 years. Providing new services to developing areas of the City, while sustaining and improving existing service and programming is an ongoing challenge. The Library Board's accomplishments during 1988 in which we can take particular pride are discussed below.

Progress on the Northern District Library - a long-awaited and much needed facility for the patrons north of Highway #401. With continuing support from Scarborough's City Council and the community, this project moves closer to reality. During 1988, site confirmation was received. The new location of the Northern District Library can be confirmed as Kennedy Road and Sheppard Avenue. If, as expected, the remaining capital funds are approved in the 1989 budget, then the Library Board will be in a position to proceed with the building design. On this basis, the target opening date is 1991.

Additional hours of service for the Woodside Square Neighbourhood Branch - a branch with extremely high service demands located north of Highway #401. During 1988, an extra day of service was made available. This is now a full-service branch, open six days a week.

Opening of Kennedy/Eglinton Neighbourhood Branch - much needed service in an older area of Scarborough. The branch has been very successful in its first seven months, exceeding circulation and service expectations.

Improvements to computer system with the continual growth of the City, a
major upgrade to the computer system was
needed to improve service to all patrons.
Waiting time has been significantly reduced
for both enquiry and materials check-out.
The upgraded computer will accommodate
further growth of the City.

Programming and special events continue to be a major part of the service to Scarborough's residents and the Library Board takes pride in the level and diversity of programmes offered to the public. This year, for the first time, a "writer-in-residence" programme was offered. Ronald Wright provided advice on original

manuscripts, poetry and plays. Funding was provided by the Ministry of Culture and Communications.

Another highlight was the special event held at Woodside Square Neighbourhood Branch to receive a collection of books in Chinese script from the People's Republic of China. Over 220 titles were donated to the permanent collection.

The Library Board continues to monitor the impact of relevant Federal legislation. For example, Bill C60, an amendment to copyright legislation, may require reconsideration of the video lending policy of the Board.

The Library Board is proud of the way in which its management and employees deliver services to the public with the means at hand. For the record, the City of Scarborough's public library system continues to have one of the highest materials circulation rates per capita in Ontario, while maintaining one of the most efficient cost structures. Many thanks to the staff of the City of Scarborough Public Library Board for their dedication to providing excellent service to the residents of Scarborough.

REPORT FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

The 249,239 residents of the City of Scarborough possessing library cards made record use of the services provided by the City of Scarborough Public Library Board. The citizens made an estimated 3,720,798 visits to the eighteen branches, bookmobile and film section borrowing 4,594,219 items and requesting answers to 972,890 questions. The above figures represent increases from 2,9% for items borrowed to 11.9% for the estimated annual visits to the branches of the library system.

Although the major users of the public library's services are the adults of Scarborough, considerable attention is paid to the younger people of the population. During 1988, there were approximately 3,300 programmes attended by 69,000 children. These programmes are designed, in the main, to stimulate the appreciation of books and reading, introducing children to authors, literature and all that is available for them in the libraries.

For the 25% of the population whose mother tongue is other than English and French, material was purchased in 30 languages. The multicultural services range from collections of books, audio and videocassettes to citizenship, informational, language and cultural programmes designed to assist residents of various cultural backgrounds to fully participate in society and to retain and share their culture. The items borrowed from the collections showed an eight percent increase from 370,430 to 400,122. The languages with the highest circulation were Chinese, Hindi, Italian, Japanese, German and Spanish. Children's programmes used multicultural themes throughout the year and there were programmes conducted in Urdu, Chinese. Pilipino, Hindi and Celtic.

The libraries provided programmes of special and current interest tailored to the needs of the neighbourhoods they serve. More than 10,000 adults attended over 620 programmes which included book clubs, film shows, lectures, authors' readings, income tax clinics and presentations on contemporary issues.

The number of talking book users increased by 41% to 157 people. The delivery service to home readers, who are people unable to leave their homes because

of illness or disabilities, reached 156 people throughout Scarborough. In addition, 11 institutions received deposit collections and 16 other institutions were visited regularly.

The public library's resources grew to 977,243 hardcover books; 240,914 paperback books; 5,607 16mm films and videocassettes; 115,897 records and audio cassettes; 1,033 framed prints; 5,501 microforms; 1,360 toys; and 1,167 periodical titles. In addition, the library system has reports and pamphlets from government, corporate and private services numbering in the tens of thousands. There are accessible on-line, from the district libraries, hundreds of data bases across North America and Europe as well as such newspapers as the Globe and Mail, Toronto Star, Financial Times and the Vancouver Sun.

The total budget for 1988 amounted to \$14,657,100 which, at a cost of \$29,21 per citizen, is below the average cost of a hardcover non-fiction book. The major part of the budget, 87%, comes from the Scarborough City Council, 8% as a grant from the Provincial Government and the remaining 5% is realized by levied charges and recoverables.

The responsibility for the management of the City of Scarborough's public library system is with a nine-person Board, all of whom are residents of the City. All appointments are made by Scarborough City Council and include four members of the Council. The non-elected members of the Board are recommended by the Administrative Committee of Council, the Scarborough Board of Education and the Metropolitan Separate School Board.






