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ANNUAL REPORT

of the Mayor of Quebec to the Members of the City Council.

GENTLEMEN,—A review of the operations of this Council for the year just expired, offers

nothing new compared with that of the year 1851.

On the point of commencing the drainage of the city, of introducing water from the St. Charles river, and of paving the streets with hard and durable stones, this Council has confined its operations the present year to supply the most pressing wants, to finish the works commenced, and has not undertaken any considerable improvements which might be injured by the above mentioned works. One single exception was made, viz: the widening of that great thoroughfare, Mountain Street, a most desirable improvement, which could not injure those in process of completion. It is sufficient perhaps to make known that the Road and Gas Committee which has always had the initiative in improvement of this nature was stopped by the above mentioned considerations. This Committee has, however, secured from the Council the appropriation of considerable sums for improvements to be made in the year 1853, which will be a compensation for the forced repose of 1852, and which will change the aspect of the city and the annual value of the property even in the remotest quarter. These important improvements, undertaken by the Council, will increase considerably the debt of the city.

These new appropriations are, without doubt, the result of the good administration of our finances, which has created a confidence in our credit and in our solvency, which has remained unchanged for the last three years. The premium which is offered on the sale of our debentures is the best proof of the confidence reposed in our resources. It cannot be doubted that this state of things will long continue since every proper means is taken to preserve it, first, by the creation of a special fund for the payment of interest on the debentures the exact day it becomes due; secondly, by the establishment of a sinking fund, the produce of which

is constantly and rapidly increasing.

This prosperous condition is liable to be easily affected by this Council; it may in a moment be destroyed or long maintained. Let the expenditure exceed for even a few years the amount of the receipt, the base of our credit will be immediately destroyed. On the contrary, if the expenses are in proportion to the revenue, this base will become stronger and stronger every day. In the situation in which the Council is now placed, what is its duty? Should it confine itself within the limits of a prudent expenditure, or apprehensive of arresting the progress of the city, or under the pretext that changes and improvements are necessary and

demanded by the citizens, should the Council continue to undertake other expensive operations? In this latter case your future financial prosperity imposes upon you as an obligation, a sine quâ non, viz: the creation of new sources of income, equal in amount at least to the interest you will be called on to pay. Care must be taken that the new loans be not invested in unproductive works; on the contrary, they must produce and insure a return sufficient to meet the punctual payment of the interest in the first place, and of the capital borrowed at a more distant period, in the second.

Expending the sums borrowed unless they produce a revenue, is a ridiculous calculation which would not be adopted by any citizen acquainted with his own true interests. By many and various means which you can easily employ, you should create new sources of income, sufficient to pay the interest of the new loans; otherwise it is evident the most deplorable consequences will ensue to the credit of the city; and at least, gentlemen, you are aware that the man with good credit can borrow on cheap terms, while the man without cannot borrow at all.

There is no apprehension now that the credit of the city will be affected by the recent or proposed increase of the debt, for it is to be hoped that the present councillors and those who shall succeed them will see the necessity, and be guided by the rule which experience has pointed out, that regularity in paying interest and fulfilling our engagements is the first and only base of our credit. There is no deception in this. Hesitation would be fatal to it.

With the proposed increase of the debt in view, I take the liberty of suggesting to the Council, and of requesting the adoption of new measures to render the present rates more productive. These measures carried out with justice and discretion would press but lightly on the rate-payers, while at the same time they would insure to the Council some return for the improvements made to the city.

The City Police force has displayed a greater zeal and activity than formerly to bring to light and to repress the violations of our by-laws. There is not a proper understanding, however, amongst the men composing this force with relation to the strict performance of this part of their duties. The reading by order, in the several police stations, of the by-laws and regulations of this Council would have the good effect of making them better acquainted with their duty, and that greater protection is afforded to the citizens in general, the more strictly they enforce the law against the individual infinging it.

A gigantic work is proceeding under your directions. It is necessary that I should particularly allude to it. I mean the Water Works of Quebec, works which are now completed to the limit of the city, covering an extent of nearly nine miles to the Château d'Eau. The Committee entrusted with the direction of these works has evinced great activity and zeal in causing so many obstacles, numerous and difficult, to be overcome in so short a time. Early next spring we shall all, without an effort, be able to see the continuation of the work under our eyes, within the city itself. From the nature of the ground to be excavated, the difficulties of a climate extremely cold during several months of the year, difficulties which required important, expensive, but necessary works, to insure a constant, sufficient and abundant supply of water for fires, it is more than probable that the sum of £125,000 appropriated for this work will be insufficient, and that £50,000 more will be required. This last sum, according to the calculation of our engineer, would be ample to complete and perfect the whole of the works. The balance remaining to be disposed of on the amount appropriated is very small, as shown by the statement of the expenditure of the Water Works Committee submitted to this Council.

The Council has encountered many difficulties in obtaining a new charter, an act of incorporation with more extensive powers. The draft of the bill submitted to the legislature contains an omission which it is important to correct, not to be obliged to appear again before parliament.

It is known to all that beyond the western limits of the city, populous suburbs are forming, already rich, being necessary appendages of the city, and enjoying by their proximity certain advantages which are due to the tax-payers alone. I would suggest the introduction in the bill of a clause giving power to the Governor in Council to issue his proclamation to extend on that side the limits of the city, in such a manner and at such a period as shall be prayed for by

the City Council, this addition of territory to form thereafter part and parcel of the city for

all lawful ways and purposes.

The citizens have been long complaining of the limited extent and improper situation of the common gaol of this district. The Inspector of goals, in his recent report to government, insists strongly on the expediency or rather the absolute necessity of transferring the gaol to a more suitable place. Would it not be proper that the Council should take this opportunity to propose to Government the sale or exchange of a portion of the lot of ground acquired from Mrs. widow Pelletier? I have no doubt but this proposal would be favorably received. The square in which the gaol and its dependencies are situate might be sold in lots, with advantage to the city and the neighbouring properties in the ward.

Another object which should not be lost sight of by this Council and more especially by the health Committee, is the erection of a general hospital, the want of which is so pressingly and so keenly felt every day. We should avail ourselves of the presence of the Government in this city to obtain such an establishment, otherwise it will be indefinitely postponed and put back to a very distant period. Meanwhile the city will remain exposed to all the sad

effects of epidemies without the means of successfully resisting them.

On completing this year an administration of three years duration as Mayor of the city, I have an agreeable task to fulfil in declaring and making known that all the officers of this Corporation have ever shown a great desire to perform the duties of their several offices, and that in my constant relations with them I have learned to appreciate with what praiseworthy capacity, ability and attention they have fulfilled their respective duties. I have no doubt that the members of the several committees whose duties have brought them into communication with the officers will confirm the testimony which I am bound to bear to their merits.

As for you, gentlemen, whom I consider and call my friends, I have only to thank you for your constant co-operation in all we have together accomplished during the three last years that I have had the honor of presiding at your meetings, and for the consideration and respect shown me. This will always be an agreeable recollection and will constantly keep alive the feelings of gratitude which I entertain towards you all.
