



The general discipline, while it does not descend to those minute and specific requirements which seem necessary in the conduct of schools more primary in their character, is nevertheless, sufficiently strict and exacting to place the responsibility of the student's progress upon himself. A record of attendance is kept in connection with the recitations, and promptness, as far as may be, is required. The progress of each student in his course is regulated by such frequent and thorough examinations as shall be competent to satisfy the teachers in charge, and no student is permitted to pass from one division of his course to another without giving evidence of suitable proficiency.

PREPARATORY EDUCATION.—A fair knowledge of the ordinary English branches constitutes a sufficient preparation for entering upon a Commercial Course.

Time of Commencement.—As there are no term divisions and no vacations, students can enter at any time, and pursue their course as rapidly as their ability will admit.

DIPLOMAS.—Those students, and those alone, who fulfil the prescribed course of study, and pass the requisite examination, are entitled to the honours of graduation. Diplomas are awarded to all such, free of charge.

EMPLOYMENT.—It is for the interest, as it will ever be the pleasure, of the Principals and Teachers at these Colleges, to use their best exertions to obtain good situations for their graduates. In this they have, heretofore, been very successful; and while it is not our practice to hold out inducements in this direction, we hazard nothing in saying that we possess unusual facilities for securing desirable positions for competent young men.

OTTAWA.

SHORTLY after the conclusion of the War of 1812, the attention of the British Government was drawn to the necessity of strengthening the defences of Canada, in case of another war with the United States. In 1816, the advice of the late Duke of Wellington was asked, and on consulting the map, he pointed out the necessity of making an interior water communication with Lake Outario, so that supplies and boats might be thrown into the upper part of the country, in case of need. A commencement was made in 1819, by sending a large force of the Royal Staff Corps to construct the Grenville Canal.

About 1823, three exploring parties were organized to explore the country from Lake Ontario to the Ottawa. One starting at Belleville came out at Pembroke, another from Kingston, arrived at this point, and a third party came out at Hawkesbury. The Duke of Wellington, in emphatic terms, gave his advice, and the line of the Rideau Canal was selected. No time was lost in acquiring ground, for, in 1824, the British Government purchased a large tract of land from the late Mr. Fraser, prothonotary, of Montreal. It extended from the concession line at the west end of Wellington street, along Wellington and Rideau streets, nearly to the Rideau river, and all north to the Ottawa. The rest of the land on which the city stands was held by Judge Sherwood, Captain LeBreton, N. Sparks, L. Besserer, Dr. Munro, and William McQuin; this last is now held by the heirs of Col. By. The only attempt as yet at reclaiming the forest was made by Mr. Sparks, who survived all the rest. In 1826, Lieutenant-Colonel By, R. E., was sent out from England, with instructions to construct a canal of certain dimensions from the mouth of the Rideau river to Kingston. On the 16th September, 1826, he arrived in Hull, and set to work to select a site for the debouche of the canal. He first thought of carrying it up through the gorge of the present slide, but he found Captain LeBreton and Judge Sherwood so impracticable, that he gave it up,

and addressed himself to Dr. Munro, intending to avail himself of the Rideau river; but the same exhorbitance met him here, and he at last selected the present site of the locks, making reasonable terms with Mr. Sparks, who always showed himself, shrewd, liberal and open to reason. Thus it came about that Ottawa was placed where it is, and we shall see, presently, how it came to assume its present straggling form, which, however, will not be of long duration. There being no settlement on this side of the river, Colonel By took up his residence for two or three years in Hull, passing the winters in Montreal.

In May, 1827, he returned from Montreal, and began the works in carnest. The few veteran settlers of that period, who survive, can be counted on the ten fingers, and are popularly known as the "Old Twenty-sevens." Colonel By immediately took measures to connect Hull with Ottawa, constructed the present weir causeway, and instead of the Suspension Bridge, put up a truss bridge, which soon fell, however; a second was then put up, which fell about the year 1840, when the present elegant and substantial structure was put up, in 1843-4, by the Board of Works of Canada, at a cost of seventy-five thousand dollars, under the superintendence of Samuel Keefer, Esq., C. E., and will long remain as a monument of his engineering skill. Messrs. David Wilkinson & Son were the contractors for the cable and roadway and Mr. Alexander Christic contractor for masonry. Tolls are collected by the Government at the following rates, viz.: For a double team, 3d.; single team, 2d.; horse and rider, 1d.; cattle, per head, 2d. Foot passengers are free. John, Quain, collector of tolls. the steamer began to call at the wharf near Stirling's Brewery. town was laid out on its present admirable plan, wide and straight streets, varying from 60 to 120 feet. There were three points which formed the nuclei of the town, Wellington street, west of Bank street, from its being on the line from Hull; Sparks and Rideau streets, on each side of Sappers' bridge, from their proximity to the Locks, where work was going on, and the middle of Sussex and York streets, from the nearness of the wharf and market. From these points the place gradually extended itself by contiguity. Daly street and neighbourhood were thrown into the market, and Sandy Hill took a start.

From some legal dispute, Centre-town, or that part lying between Bank and Elgin streets was not built upon until 1852, since when it has advanced with wonderful rapidity. In 1853, the Government sold

the water-power of the Chaudiere Falls, which was taken up chiefly by Americans, which caused the speedy settlement of LeBreton flat, which is now a town of itself. In 1854, the Ottawa and Prescott Railway was opened, which was a great additional impetus to the town.

On its first establishment, the inhabitants unanimously desired that the name of Bytown should be adopted, which was accordingly done: but getting ambitious, although 2000 under the legal number required for a city, interest was made, and Bytown, in 1854, became a city, under the old Indian name of Ottawa. It extends two miles along the river, and from a mile and a half to two miles inland. The banks are high, rocky and precipitous. The cliff on which the Parliamentary Buildings are placed rises almost perpendicularly 170 feet—the scenery from the top of which is of the most beautiful and diversified kind. the left are the noble Falls of the Chaudiere, the Grand river stretching away far above it, studded with islands, and the shores running out in Opposite lie the undulating cornfields of Hull, wooded capelands. intermingled with patches of forest losing themselves in the mountains, which again stretch away as far as the eye can reach. Looking to the right again, we see the picturesque French village of Gatineau, situated at the mouth of the river of that name, which rises 300 miles to the north, and will some day be of great importance, from the abundance of mineral wealth along its course. Nearly opposite to the Gatineau, the Rideau river discharges itself into the Ottawa by two pretty falls, 60 feet high. This river forms the eastern boundary of the city, and a drive along its banks to Billings' Bridge will well reward the lover of rural scenery.

It would exceed the space at command to give even an outline of the many natural objects of interest in the vicinity. There is a great variety of building materials in the neighbourhood, which are skilfully employed by the architects, and the result will be that this will become one of the most unmonotonous towns in the world. Trenton limestone, black or light gray, according as dressed; Nepean freestone, white or light yellow; Perth freestone, dazzlingly white; Chats marble, white and dove; Ohio freestone, fawn colour; Arnprior marble, wavy lines of white, green, grey and black; Malone red freestone; white and red brick.

Twelve years ago, the number of stone houses did not exceed 25, all except two or three of the coarsest rubble work: now they may be counted by hundreds. Hitherto the prevailing material has been cut

limestone, for shops, but lately the Ohio stone has been introduced, and some shops are going up of it. Black Trenton, with Nepean sandstone dressings, for gentlemen's houses, chiefly in the Tudor style, is much in vogue, and the effect is very pleasing. The shops are very handsome, and well furnished with every luxury and convenience at moderate prices.

Ottawa is very well off for Hotels: the Royal Victoria and Russell House are kept in the best style of the New York hotels; Matthews' Hotel, as a commercial house is not to be excelled; besides, there are several family hotels, such as Armstrong's and Graham's, where country families can find quiet and comfortable retreats.

There is a class of inns peculiar to this city, which have sprung up out of the necessities of the timber trade. The majority of the dumberers are furnished, i. e. provided with means for carrying on operations in the woods, by parties in Quebec, which is advanced by instalments, the first being used to buy provisions, clothes and other necessaries, and they (the lumberers) are consequently out of funds immediately; but they must have men. At certain seasons, thousands of men flock to Ottawa, chiefly from the French parishes, and the Highland settlements, with a fair proportion of Irish, in, search of employment in the woods. As a general rule they arrive penniless yet are hospitably received by any of the numerous tavernkeepers who follow this particular line of business. When a lumberer wants men, he goes to one of these hosts, and says, I want to hire so many men; the host engages the required number, and of course his own lodgers The men are all in debt to the tavernkeepers for board, and offen for whiskey and medical attendance; the lumberer has no more money left than will transport these men to the scene of labour, so he gives his due-bill for each man's debts, payable when the timber arrives in Quebec. Should the raft be wrecked or burnt, the tavernkeeper Isses his money, or should it be left in the forest by the falling of the waters, "stuck," as it is technically called, and so delayed a year in getting to market, he has to wait. The butcher, the baker and the physician, all wait upon the tavernkeeper-who waits upon the lumberer--who waits upon the furnisher--who waits upon the bankwhich sits like a spider in the midst of this great commercial net, always sure of its prey. Thus, the issue of comparatively few flimseys in Quebec, adds hundreds of thousands of pounds to the wealth of the

country, and gives rise to that unique institution, the Ottawa tavern-keeper. Most of those engaged in it make money at it, and some are wealthy.

Ottawa is a warehousing port of entry; the receipts are about £35,000 a year, and the expenses about £4,000, so it may be taken for one of the Queen's cheap bargains. The population of Ottawa is now, at a moderate guess, 18,000 inhabitants, and is rapidly on the increase.

Public Buildings.—The Government Buildings will be described at the end of this introduction by themselves. With three exceptions, the public buildings are remarkable for the laborious ugliness and want of taste which characterize them all. There is a Roman Catholic cathedral and two parish churches, an Episcopal parish church, a Free Presbyterian, a Methodist and a Baptist chapel, all of stone; and a wooden barn apiece for the Free Presbyterians and the Methodist Episcopals. It is doubtful whether Christ-('hurch or the Kirk is entitled to the jackknife, or which is brother Ben. The Court-house has the stereotyped bald ugliness of its class. The City Hall is a large, shabby market house of wood, of which the upper part has been fitted up for the corporation. The exceptions are: first, the Church of England School-house, Sussex street, Darwent, architect. This is a little gem of Cothic architecture, but requires to be finished with the cresting and finials, to do full justice to the design. The New Gaol, Horsey, architect, is really a noble building externally, and from the perfection of its interior arrangements, has been pronounced by the Prison Inspectors, "the model prison of Canada." The Quebec Bank, Horsey, architect, is a chaste, elegant structure, and shows admirably the great capability of the Trenton limestone for architecture. There is a large Market going up in By ward, that will be an ornament to the town; the Montreal and British North America Banks are going to put up handsome structures; the Queen's Printers are putting up a building 150 feet on Sparks street and 100 on O'Connor street, five stories high. shows great improvement in the public taste of late years.

HOSPITALS.—There are two hospitals: the General Hospital, erected by the Sisters of Charity, is a plain, substantial building, just finished, and has accommodation for about 120 patients. The County of Carleton General Protestant Hospital, another plain substantial building, has about 40 or 50 beds; a considerable addition is about being built.

LITERARY INSTITUTIONS.—The oldest in the city is the Mechanics' Institute and Athenœum, organized March, 1853. The promoters of it were Judge Armstrong, Messrs. Heron, Billings, and Dr. Sewell. It is very flourishing, has a large well-furnished reading room, a library of 1800 volumes and a museum. The Natural History Society, lately started, gives signs of great vigor, and has a very fair beginning for a museum. The St. Patrick's Literary Institution is flourishing, has frequent lectures, a library and reading room. The Canadian Institute has a library enriched by superb donations from the Emperor of the French, a news-room, and frequent lectures. The Royal Horticultural Society has entered on the second year of its existence, and promises a career of great usefulness.

BOARD OF TRADE.—There is here a Board of Trade, but as hitherto the members have signalized themselves by doing nothing, there is nothing to be said for or against them.

Post Office.—The Post Office is in a very anomalous position, for a city: although the majority of post offices in the Province are on the established, this one is still on the pro rata, or commission plan. Why such a state of things should still exist, is hard to explain.

THE PRESS.—There is a daily, a bi-weekly, a tri-weekly, and several weeklies. These are all conducted with, perhaps, more than an average ability, and are well supported.

THE LUMBER TRADE.—The sawn lumber trade is something beyond what is supposed by the generality of the Province. The mills at the Chaudiere and the Rideau Falls send out every year nearly one hundred millions of feet, board measure. The mills at the Gatineau Falls, seven miles from Ottawa, Leaming's Mills, the Lievre Mills, owned by Thompson; Hawkesbury Mills, Hamilton Brothers-together, send out seventy million feet of deals: and numerous smaller mills through the country send out some twenty millions more, for all of which Ottawa is the commercial centre. This, coupled with the square timber trade, makes Ottawa a great commercial point, as well as in the eyes of the late Duke of Wellington, a great military centre. The unbounded water power of the Chats, the Gatineau, the Blanche, the Lievre, and other rivers, that must be opened up by the inevitable Ottawa and Huron Canal, will make Ottawa one of the grand distributing points of this continent.

SQUARE TIMBER.—This, the most extensive and important of the trade of Ottawa, and of other points above the city, is engaged in by so many that their name is legion. Many thousands are kept employed by these "lumber merchants," as they are termed, in the winter preparing the timber for market, and in the spring and summer in rafting it to Quebee. These "bush men" have constant employment during winter and summer, and although hundreds of them have families living in the city of Ottawa, and many thousands have occasion to visit Ottawa during the spring and fall, still no city of its size, on the continent, can boast of so small a record of crime at its police courts as Ottawa. The fact of there being only one policeman for a city of about eighteen thousand souls, besides a large transient population, and the small business done at the police or other courts, will of themselves be indubitable proofs that the city is justly entitled to be called the "model city."

THE PARLIAMENTARY BUILDINGS.—The glory of Ottawa, apart from the numberless scenes that nature has lavished around, is the set of buildings now being erected, on the rock which guards, as it were, the town from the river. It must be acknowledged that to Sir Edmund Head should be awarded the merit of having selected the plans. are three buildings, forming three sides of a square; but they are not joined, the vacant spaces at the corners being of considerable extent The fourth side opens upon one of the principal streets of the town. The centre building is intended for the Houses of Parliament, and the two side buildings for the Government offices. Of the first, Messrs. Fuller & Jones are the architects, and of the latter, Messrs. Stent & Laver; and it is to be regretted, that some very paltry political manœuvres have deprived all these gentlemen, except Mr. Fuller, of the superintendence of the completion of the buildings. These buildings are characterized by purity of art, manliness of conception, beauty of outline, and truthful nobility of detail. There is no modern gothic purer of its kind, or less sullied with fictitious ornamentation. British Houses of Parliament are very fine, but it is generally felt that the ornamentation is too minute, in fact, invisible in the upper half from the ground, giving rise to the suspicion that perpendicular Gothic is not capable of the highest nobility that architecture can achieve. The total frontage of the quadrangle, including the side buildings is 1200 feet: that of the centre building is 475 feet. The buildings front upon the principal street of Ottawa, and stand upon a rock,

looking immediately down upon the river, being thus blessed with a site singularly happy. Though they look down from a graud eminence, immediately on the river, they are approached from the town without any ascent. The rock, though it falls almost precipitously down to the water, is covered with trees and shrubs; and then, the river that runs beneath is rapid, bright, and picturesque in the irregularity of its lines. The view from the back of the Library, up to the Chaudiere Falls, and to the saw-mills by which they are surrounded, is very lovely. So, it must be allowed that there is no site for such a set of buildings, so happy as regards both grandeur and beauty.

It is intended that the Library, of which ten feet only are now above the ground, shall be an octagonal building, in shape, and in outward character like the chapter-house of a cathedral. The interior will be circular, and ninety feet in diameter; the roof will be entirely of stone, and altogether, will be a curiosity in architecture—a "tour de force"—that must attract visitors from every part of the civilized world.*

MANUFACTURES.

The first and most important branch of trade of Ottawa is its Lumber Manufacturing. There are eight saw-mills, viz.: that of Harris, Bronson & Co., who employ about one hundred hands, and saw fifteen million feet per annum; Perley & Pattee employ sixty five hands, and manufacture about ten million feet of sawn lumber during the season; J. R. Booth employs about fifty men, and manufactures eight million feet of lumber per annum; Taylor & Wilkinson manufacture four millions of feet, and give employment to about twenty hands; Levi Young & Co. employ about forty hands, and saw six millions of feet; A. Baldwin gives employment to about forty hands, and manufacture five millions of feet during the season; George and Robert Mason employ four or five hands: these are all supplied from the Ottawa, at Chaudiere Falls. The sawed lumber manufactured is nearly all sent to the American At the Rideau Falls, the saw-mills, sash, blind and door factory of J. M. Currier & Co. is situated: a large number of mechanics and labourers are employed by this firm.

^{*} The preceding historical sketch has been furnished us by Dr. Sewell, of Ottawa City.

The number of men given as employed by the several lumber manufacturers are only such as are engaged immediately in the mills; those firms have several hundred men in the woods, cutting and drawing saw-logs, or rafting them on smaller streams to the Ottawa, in many instances from one to two hundred miles up the river.

Ottawa contains three iron foundries. The Victoria Foundry is situated on Middle street, Victoria Island, and is owned and carried on by N. S. Blasdell & Co.; the machinery is propelled by water power furnished by the Ottawa. This foundry has been established for many years, and contains the very best kinds of machinery—some originally designed and manufactured by the proprietors. They received, in 1861, the Prince of Wales' Gold Medal for their patent planing machine, which is considered the best machine of the kind in America. They employ about twenty hands, and turn out steam engines, lathes, agricultural implements, saw and grist mill machinery of every description.

In connexion with the Victoria Foundry, there is a very powerful force pump, requiring a force equal to eighty horses to work: this is fully supplied by the almost unlimited power afforded by the Chaudiere Falls. This pump is put up in a suitable stone building in a position where, in case of fire on either side, hose can be attached, and half-a-dozen streams be made use of. This pump was manufactured by N. S. Blasdell & Co., of the Victoria Foundry. It has the capacity of pumping two thousand gallons per minute: during a recent fire in Mackay & Co.'s mills, the streams worked by this pump were doubtless the means of preventing the entire premises from being destroyed. It may not be out of place to remark here, that notwithstanding the efficiency of the Fire Brigade, which is composed of three fire companies and a hook and ladder company, still their efforts almost invariably are of comparatively little effect, on account of the difficulty of getting a constant supply of water. On the first alarm of fire will be seen an army of water carts whose owners are chiefly French Canadians, and as a class are not over scrupulous as to their non-religious sentiments expressed to parties standing in the way, or to their own hard-worked animals. These carters are paid by the city so much a load. It may possibly be the case, that the water barrels used may leak badly, as they are generally only about half full by the time they reach the engine to supply it.

The City Foundry was established in 1848, by T. M. Blasdell, and is now about being removed to the Chaudiere Falls, from the old location on Wellington street; a number of men are kept employed. Mill machinery and agricultural implements are the chief articles manufactured.

Perkins' Foundry is situated on Sparks street, and was established in 1840, by Lyman Perkins; the machinery is propelled by two engines of twenty-five horse power: thirteen hands are kept employed in the manufacturing of agricultual implements, steam engines, boilers and mill machinery. There are also two other machine shops, viz.: that of James Perry, on King street, and Mr. Lindsay, on George street; in the latter establishment, axe making will constitute the chief article of manufacture.

Ottawa contains three extensive carriage and waggon factories. Wm. Stockdale & Brother's, on Rideau street, was established in 1854: in this factory, twenty-six hands are employed, and an engine of ten horse power: carriages, waggons, sleighs, cutters, &c., are turned out, each year, to the value of twenty thousand dollars. Peter Dufour established his carriage works in 1832; he was the first who manufactured a carriage or waggon in Ottawa City: thirteen hands are kept in constant employment at Dufour's factory. The Royal Carriage Factory was established in 1840, by George Humphries, who employs fourteen men, and turns out carriages, waggons, &c., to the value of ten thousand dollars per annum.

Axe and Edge Tool manufacturing is a branch of industry for which Ottawa has been justly famous for many years. There are three factories, turning out a large amount of all kinds of axes and edge tools, and giving employment to over forty workmen, viz.: Tongue, Brown & Co., whose factory is in Hull, C. E., Edward Proulx and S. Washburn. There is another axe factory about being established, by Mr. Lindsay, on George street.

In the manufacture of Furniture, Chairs and Bedsteads, Holgate, Oliver & Annable are doing a large business; their factory is on Chaudiere Island; they employ eight hands, and turn out manufactured articles to the value of seven thousand dollars per annum. J. M. Healy also manufactures furniture, chairs and bedsteads, and gives employment to five hands. There are several smaller establishments.

In Sash, Doors and Blinds, the principal factories are E. Leiver's, on Chaudiere Island, where twelve hands are employed, and fifteen thousand dollars' worth turned out during the year. J. M. Currier & Co., employ about twenty men and turn out a large amount of work. J. R. Booth is about putting first-class machinery into the large and substantial stone building adjoining his saw mills, for the manufacture of sash, doors, &c.

The Wood Turning establishment of George Newell is on the Chaudiere Island, and turns out two thousand five hundred dollars' worth of chair and bedstead stuff.

In Pumps and Fanning Mills, James and John Petrie, Chaudiere Island, are the only manufacturers. Their trade extends over a large section of country.

Ottawa is well supplied with Flouring Mills, having the following, viz: that of Mackay & Co., at the Rideau Falls, or New Edinburgh and at the Chaudiere Falls; this firm are very extensively engaged in the manufacture of flour, as well as that of oatmeal. Taylor & Wilkinson, at Thompson's Mills, are doing an excellent business in gristing and flouring. The Ottawa Mills, carried on by William, Morrison, is one of the oldest mills in Ottawa, and still enjoys a large gristing business; it has the capacity of grinding two hundred bushels per day. Henry McCormick, baker and miller, does a large baking business, and grinds about seventy thousand bushels of wheat per annum. The mills are driven by water, and contain four run of stone.

Rochester's tannery is the largest in the county, from twenty-five to thirty men are kept in constant employment and the establishment turns out about sixty thousand dollars' worth of leather during the year. That of James McCullough, established in 1860, employs four men, and turns out about four thousand dollars worth per annum.

Ottawa has four breweries, viz: the Victoria Brewery, established in 1829 by John Rochester, sen., and James Rochester, now conducted by John Rochester, jun.; seven hands are here employed in the brewing of ale and porter. The Chaudiere Brewery was established in 1858. It is now carried on by Parris & Smith, who employ ten hands and are brewing ales and porter to a very large amount during the year. 





Keenan, teacher, and one good stone church, built at a cost of \$1,000, and used alike by the Church of England, Rev. Charles Pettit, rector; Free Church of Scotland, Rev. J. L. Gourley, officiating; and Wesleyan Methodist, no settled pastor. The 7th Division Courts are held here, Christopher Armstrong, judge; and Thomas G. Anderson, clerk. Distant from Ottawa, 10 Daily mail. Population, about 150.

Near the village are the picturesque Falls of the Chats, which form eleven falls, and plunge perpendicularly to the depth of thirty-three feet. On the south side of the river, directly opposite the village, is the Government slide, for the passage of timber manufactured at points hundreds of miles up the river. The village is bounded on the east by the Carp river, on the right bank of which the land rises to a considerable height, affording a magnificent view of the surrounding country. On the west, the Mississippi, a very rapid stream, enters the Ottawa by two branches. The facilities for manufacturing purposes are most extensive, and the Ottawa and Mississippi could be made available for almost an unlimited amount of hydraulic power. The first settlers of this portion of the township were Andrew Forbes and Charles Sheriff, who settled here about the year 1819. The village site was surveyed and laid out by John Robertson, P. L. S., for Robert Sheriff, in 1836. A post office was established in 1830, William Gillespie being the first postmaster appointed, who was succeeded by the present official, Robert Sheriff. The village contains five general stores, two grist mills, one saw mill, a tannery, and three hotels; also one good school, with an average attendance of forty There are three churches, built of stone: the church of England, cost, \$2,000, Rev. C. P. Emery, minister; the Canada Presbyterian church, cost, \$1,600, Rev. G. Young, minister; and the Roman Catholic church, cost, \$2,000. The Fourth Division Court

is held here and at Riddle's Corners, alternately. Distant from Ottawa city, 34 miles; population about 200.

RICHMOND.—An incorporated village situated on the Goodwood river, in the east corner of the township of Goulbourne, 21 miles from Ottawa City, and 11 miles from the Ottawa river. The village was laid out for the Government in 1817 by Colonel Fortune, and settlement commenced as early as 1818. This was a military point for a number of years. The Duke of Richmond, then Governor General of Canada, died here in 1819 from the bite of a pet fox, in a frame barn on Chapman's farm, about 2½ miles from the village, on the Goodwood river. The village derives its name from the Duke of Richmond. For a number of years the trade and business was very active, but latterly appears to have declined. It contains, however several well-filled general stores, flouring mills and tannery; a grammar school, building of frame, erected at a cost of \$600, Rev. Hiram Scott, master. Four churches—Church of England, built of stone in 1862, at a cost of \$2,000, Rev. C. B. Pettit, rector; Established Church of Scotland, building of frame, erected at a cost of \$1,200, Rev. James Whyte, minister; Wesleyan Methodist, built of wood, at a cost of \$1,000; and the Roman Catholic church, built of stone, and cost \$3,000, Rev. Mr. O'Connell, parish priest. Mails daily. Population, 600.

the remedial value of Mineral waters in the treatment of many types of chronic disease, is at the present day fully recognized in this quarter of the globe, and the history of ages the most remote evinces that it has always been highly appreciated in the old world. The practice of resorting to baths, and potations of natural springs for curative purposes, is both sanctioned and recommended by the Medical Profession at large. Y., forty-two miles, by Buffalo and Lake Huron and Welland Railroads; thirty-six miles from Hamilton, via Great Western, and forty miles from Toronto by Port Dalhousie or Niagara Steamer. St. Catharines numbers above 7,900 inhabitants. With an unrivalled water-power at command, and facilities for shipping productions, both by water and rail, of the highest order, it promises to become at some future day the Manchester of its region.

A combination of favorable circumstances, in climate and locality, together with the indisputable efficacy of the waters, have enabled this place, in an unprecedented short space of time, to attain a high rank among the watering-places of America.

THE SEASON

Extends from the first of May to the last days of November. The proprietor of the "Stephenson House" has completed arrangements to enable invalids to use the waters within the building throughout the winter months. A comfortable bathing apartment has been fitted up in the first story of the hotel, and the services of efficient bath attendants and rubbers have been secured. An extensive verandah and long well-lighted halls will permit a sufficient amount of exercise in cold or stormy weather.

THE HOTEL.

The "Stephenson House" may now claim a favorable comparison with any similar establishment upon this continent. In construction, proportions, and general commodiousness, it will be found to afford every requisite for the accommodation of all classes of visitors.

THE BATHS.

The thermal establishment originally constructed to furnish baths for 200 persons daily, has recently been more than doubled in extent, and a variety of douches and vapor baths, after the latest and most approved models, have been introduced. All the important and useful appliances for the employment of water in disease, usually adopted at Hydropathic Institutions, are also provided.

THE WELL

Is an Artesian boring, about 600 feet deep, into corniferous limestone, capable of yielding 30,000 gallons per diem. The water is pumped up by a steam engine into reservoirs upon the summit of the bank. In one of these it is heated by a simple contrivance, without injury to its composition, and then distributed by pipes to the "Cabinets" in the bath-house.

CHEMICAL COMPOSITION.

The silurian rocks of Canada afford a great number of mineral waters, reducible into three principal classes—the saline, the sulphurous, and the acid. The first of those divisions, to which this spring belongs, holds generally in solution Alkaline Chlorides, Chlorides, Iodides, and Bromides of Calcium, and Magnesium, and Sulphates of the Alkaline earths. This analysis establishes a similarity approaching to identity of composition with some of the most important and fashionable German Spas, those of Kreuznach, the muriated saline waters of Wiesbaden and Kissengen, and the waters of Salins, in the Jura, France. In the source of these waters we may discover the cause of the complete and thorough solution and blending of their constituents, so as to produce a perfect and homogeneous whole; they are filtered through miles of solid rock, subjected to additional atmospheric pressure, and stored up for ages in the chasms and caves in which they originally accumulate. These circumstances may account for the fact now very generally admitted, that no solutions artificially prepared will produce equal medicinal effects.

THERAPEUTIC ACTION OF MINERAL WATERS.

COURTS.

COUNTY COURT.—Presided over by a resident judge in each county. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant, or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant to £100; and to all bail bonds or recognizances of bail given in the county court to any amount; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, actions for libel, slander, crim. con. or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the

superior courts of law. These courts also possess equity powers to the amount of £50, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. Officers of Court—Judge, Christopher Armstrong; James Fraser, clerk.

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—C. Armstrong, chairman. This court is held four times a year for trials by jury in cases of larceny, misdemeanor, and other offences.

COURT OF CHANCERY.—John Wilson, Master and Deputy Registrar for the County of Carleton.

Surrogate Court.—The jurisdiction of these courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada, and all matters arising out of, or connected with, the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts.

LAW CIRCUITS.—The Circuits are held twice a year in each county; between Hilary and Easter Terms, and between Trinity and Michaelmas Terms. Clerk of Assizes—Deputy Clerk of the Crown, ex officio.

DIVISION COURTS.—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge, but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to action of debt or contract amounting to £25, injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to £10, but not to actions for gambling debts, liquors drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, etc., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction, or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P., for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each division or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions. There are six Divisions in the County of Carleton. The following are the names of the clerks, and the places of holding the courts.

No. 1, comprising the City of Ottawa and township of Nepean, and part of Gloucester. George R. Burke, clerk.

No. 2, comprising the village of Richmond, township of Goulbourne, and part of Marlborough. John A. Bryson, clerk.

No. 3, comprising townships of Huntley and March. John Fenton, clerk.

No. 4, comprising townships of Fitzroy and Torbolton. William Pigott, clerk.

No. 5, comprising township of North Gower and part of Marlborough. William Cowan, clerk.

No. 6, comprising township of Osgoode and part of Gloucester. Ira Morgan, clerk, village of Metcalfe, Osgoode.

EDUCATIONAL.

In the very important matter of education, great progress has been effected in the County of Carleton, and she has now the advantages of a liberal and permanent provisions for the general and thorough education of her rising population, fully enjoying the privileges and benefits conferred by the excellent School Act for Upper Canada (13th & 14th Vic. cap. 48, 1850). Altogether, an excellent and well organized system of schools and churches has been planted amongst the settlers, and such as had been the blessing of their earlier days, and the pride of their fathers.

There are one hundred and thirteen school sections and schools in the county, under the tuition of highly qualified and certificated teachers, besides three grammar schools, viz, one in Ottawa City, one in Richmond village, and one in Metcalfe, besides several private schools and academies, where all the branches of a thorough English and classical education are competently taught.

TOWNSHIP OF FITZROY.

The township of Fitzroy is bounded on the north and north-east by the Ottawa river and township of Torbolton; on the south-east by the township of Huntley; on the south west by the township of Pakenham, county of Lanark; and on the north-west by the township of Macnab, county of Renfrew. The township is generally well improved, the land is level and well watered, and the timber pine and hardwood. The Mississippi and Carp rivers drain the township, and afford sufficient depth of water during the spring freshets for the rafting of timber and saw logs to the Ottawa river at Fitzroy harbor. In the north of the township is a deep bay or inlet of the Ottawa, at the foot of the Chats Falls, known as Fitzroy Harbor, where a village was laid out in 1836. The township was first settled in 1819 by Andrew Forbes and Charles Shiriff, and was surveyed by John Robertson, Esq., P. L. S., now of Fitzroy Harbor. There are 11 falls here, having a perpendicular fall of thirty-three feet each. Immediately below the falls the Mississippi river, a very rapid stream, enters the Ottawa by two branches. In 1850 the township contained 2,557 inhabitants. 22,600 bushels of wheat, 23,700 bushels of oats, 41,700 bushels of potatoes, 6,000 bushels of turnips, 13,800 pounds of maple sugar, 6,800 pounds of wool, and 20,900 pounds of butter were produced from the crop of 1849. By reference to the following table the latest agricultural statistics will be found.

Abstract of the Local Superintendent's report to the Municipal Council of the County of Carleton, respecting Schools in the Township of Fitzroy, for the year 1863. Rev. Thomas Bonsfield, Local Superintendent, C. S. Fitzroy.

School Section No. 1, A. Pettapiece, teacher, has been open for the twelve months during 1863, with an average attendance of twenty-five pupils. The building is log, and partly furnished with proper apparatus, maps, &c. There has been one lecture, on the subject of "improvement and attention," delivered during the year.

Section No. 2, A. T. Rathwell, teacher, open during the whole year; average attendance, thirty-seven pupils. The building is log, and partly furnished with apparatus, maps, &c. The subject of the lecture delivered was "diligence and order."

Section No. 3, F. E. Barford, teacher. One lecture, on "system and punctuality," was delivered during the year. The average attendance at this school has been twenty-four pupils. The building is log, and is not furnished with the proper apparatus, maps, &c.

Section No. 4, W. Tyndall, teacher. The lecture delivered in this section was on the subject of "education means to and uses." The average attendance is twenty-three pupils. The school building is log, and not furnished with any apparatus or maps.

Section No. 5, J. Sinclair, teacher. The subject of the lecture given was "the value of training." Average attendance, forty-one pupils. The school has been kept open during the year. The building is frame, and partly furnished with maps, school apparatus, &c.

Section No. 6, R. Foster, teacher, has been open all the year, with an average attendance of forty-seven pupils. The building is frame, and fully furnished with school apparatus, maps, &c. The subject of the lecture delivered during the year was on "improvement."

Section No. 7, W. Pettapiece, teacher, has been open all the year, with an average attendance of twenty-three pupils. The building is log. The subject of the lecture was "work while you work, and play while you play."

Section No. S, B. Kerns, teacher; open all the year, with an average attendance of twenty-seven pupils. Building log. Partly furnished with apparatus, maps, &c. The subject of the lecture was "work while you work, and play while you play."

Section No. 9, L. Shirreff, teacher, has been open for ten months of the year, with an average attendance of thirteen pupils. The building is log. The subject of the lecture was "the use of school to train us for future life."

Section No. 10, W. B. Boyle, teacher, has been open for eleven months and a half of the year, with an average attendance of seventeen pupils. The building is log. The subject of the lecture was "the uses of grammar and elementary studies."

Section No. 11 contains neither school house nor school.

Section No. 12, Margaret Mohr, teacher, has been open during the year, with an average attendance of nine pupils. The building is log. The school has no apparatus. The subject of the lecture was "application, order, progress, and grammar."

The soil consists chiefly of a blue clay, and is well adapted for agricultural purposes, and 17,900 bushels of wheat, 24,000 bushels of oats, 48,000 bushels of potatoes, 3,000 bushels of turnips, 7,800 lbs. of wool, and 22,600 lbs. of butter, were produced from the crop of 1849. The township is well settled, and in 1850 contained 2,226 inhabitants; and according to the census returns of 1861, it contained 2,914 inhabitants.

TOWNSHIP OF HUNTLEY.

The township of Huntley is bounded on the north-east by the township of March, on the south-east by the township of Goulbourne, on the south-west by the township of Ramsay, County of Lanark, and on the north-west by the township of Fitzroy. The township is well watered by the Carp river, a tributary of the Ottawa; and the land is generally level, and in some portions swampy. The soil is very good; and the principal crops are spring wheat, oats and potatoes. The timber is mostly pine, which is of rather small growth. In 1850, the township produced 15,000 bushels of wheat, 19,000 bushels of oats, 27,500 bushels of potatoes, 5,000 lbs. of wool, and 13,000 lbs. of butter, with a population of 2,080. By the census returns of 1861, the township contained 2,651 inhabitants.

TOWNSHIP OF MARCH.

The township of March is bounded on the north-east by the Upper Ottawa, or the Chaudiere River, as it is sometimes called, on the southeast by the townships of Nepean and Goulbourne, on the south-west by the township of Huntley, and on the north-west by the township of Torbolton. The land is undulating and well watered, and the timber consists of pine, cedar, maple, bass, birch, hemlock, &c. Spring wheat, barley and oats, seem to be the most certain crops. In 1850 the township was but thinly settled, and contained 824 inhabitants, one grist and two saw mills, and 6,800 bushels of wheat, 8,900 bushels of oats, 18,700 bushels of potatoes, 2,300 lbs. of wool, and 7,000 lbs. of butter were produced from the crop of 1849. By the census returns of 1861, the number of inhabitants had increased to 1,454, and the prosperity of the township had increased in the same proportions.

# TOWNSHIP OF MARLBOROUGH.

The township of Marlborough is bounded on the north-east by the township of North Gower, on the south-east by the Rideau canal, which forms the dividing line between Marlborough and the township of Oxford, County of Grenville, on the south-west by the township of Montague, County of Lanark, and on the north-west by the township of Goulbourne. In soil and quality of timber it much resembles the township of Goulbourne, the soil being a blue clay, and the timber a mixture of pine and hardwood, and of a most luxuriant growth. In 1850 the township contained 1,480 inhabitants, and 2,331 by census returns of 1861; 11,900 bushels of wheat, 21,000 bushels of oats, 25,000 bushels of potatoes, 14,000 lbs. of maple sugar, 4,000 lbs. of wool, and 14,600 lbs. of butter, were produced from the crop of 1849.

# TOWNSHIP OF NEPEAN.

The township of Nepean is bounded on the north by the upper Ottawa river, and the township of March, on the east by the Rideau river, which is the dividing line between Nepean and the township of Gloucester, on the south by the township of North Gower, and on the west by the township of Goulbourne. In the north-east corner of the township, at the junction of the Rideau river with the Ottawa, and a little below the beautiful falls of the Chaudière, is situated Ottawa City, the future capital of the province, and the head quarters of the lumber trade for Canada; of which a description more at length will be found on pages 1 to 25 inclusive, of this work. The township is well settled, and in 1850 contained a population of 2,819, and in 1861 by census report of that year, it had increased to 4,410, or about 33 per cent. 12,462 acres were under cultivation in 1849, and 34,000 bushels of wheat, 34,000 bushels of oats, 6,000 bushels of peas, 68,000 bushels of potatoes, 8,700 bushels of turnips, 5,000 lbs. of wool, and 18,700 lbs. of butter, were produced from the crop of that year. ### TOWNSHIP OF NORTH GOWER.

The township of North Gower (or Gore, as it was originally called, from its shape), is bounded on the north by the township of Nepean, on the east by the township of Osgoode, the Rideau canal being the dividing line, on the south by South Gower, county of Grenville, the Rideau canal still forming the dividing line, and on the south-west by the township of Marlborough. The township is small but well settled, having an excellent soil for agricultural purposes, besides being well timbered. It is watered by the Rideau river and canal, which skirts

its southern and eastern boundary, and also by several smaller tributaries. 13,700 bushels of wheat, 13,500 bushels of oats, 20,600 bushels of potatoes, 12,500 lbs. of maple sugar, 5,000 lbs. of wool, and 8,900 lbs. of butter, were produced from the crop of 1849. In 1850, the township contained a population of 1,577; and by the census returns of 1861, it had increased to 2,576 inhabitants.

### TOWNSHIP OF OSGOODE.

The township of Osgoode is bounded on the north by the township of Gloucester, on the east by the township of Russell, County of Russell, on the south by the townships of Winchester and Mountain, County of Dundas, and on the west by the township of North Gower. The township is generally level, with several cedar and tamarac swamps distributed over it. Besides being watered by the Rideau river, some branches of Castor creek, which is a tributary of the Nation river, numerous smaller streams find their source in the township. The quality of the soil is good, and well adapted to agricultural purposes, and the timber consists of cedar, tamarac and hardwood. It is well settled, and in 1850 had 2,733 inhabitants, which had increased in 1861 to 4,332; 9,886 acres were under cultivation, and 21,000 bushels of wheat, 23,000 bushels of oats, 26,000 bushels of potatoes, 8,800 bushels of turnips, 12,000 lbs. of maple sugar, 6,600 lbs. of wool, and 9,400 lbs. of butter, were produced from the crop of 1849.

### TOWNSHIP OF TORBOLTON.

The township of Torbolton is nearly triangular in shape, with its base lying to the north, and is bounded on the north by the upper Ottawa, whose waters expand into a broad and beautiful sheet, and take the name of Lake Chaudière, on the south-east by the township of March, and on the south-west by the township of Fitzroy. It is generally level and well watered, and the timber consists of pine and hardwood. The eastern part of the township is traversed by a small stream, called Constance creek, which takes its rise in Constance Lake, in the township of March, and discharges itself into Sandy Bay, a small inlet of Lake Chaudière. The soil is good, and fall wheat is thought to be the most successful crop. In 1850 it was but thinly settled, and contained 370 inhabitants, and 1,325 acres of land under cultivation, but by census report of 1861 it and increased in prosperity almost 100 per cent., having at that time 675 inhabitants, and 15,608 acres of land taken up, with 3,595 acres under cultivation.

### TOWNSHIP OF HULL, C. E.

SKETCH OF THE FIRST SETTLEMENT OF THE OTTAWA OR GRAND RIVER.

The following interesting sketch of the early settlement of the township of Hull, C. E., has been condensed from an article which appeared in the Ottawa Citizen in February, 1863, from a copy of the statement made by P. Wright, Esq., before a committee of the House of Assembly in 1824, and published with the report of that committee.

Mr. Wright was born in Massachusetts in 1760, of English parentage, and there lived until he was thirty-six years of age in the occupation

of farming and grazing.

In 1796 he came to Montreal to explore the country and change his residence to Canada. After spending some time in exploring the country he returned to Woburn, Mass., the place of his birth, and in the following year came again to Canada and visited Quebec. He then viewed the country on both sides of the St. Lawrence the whole of the distance from Quebec to the Ottawa or Grand River. After spending some time in exploring and examining the country bordering upon both sides of the Ottawa, as respecting its navigation, with the advantages and disadvantages attending a new settlement in that country, he returned to his native home.

In the year 1798 Mr Wright again visited Canada to obtain full information relative to the local situation of the lands on the Ottawa, which having done, he returned to Massachusetts with a determination to commence a settlement upon the said Ottawa; he endeavored to hire axemen but did not succeed, the distance being eighty miles beyond

any settlements at that time bordering on the river.

This country had immense resources in fine timber, sufficient to furnish large supplies for any foreign market, and was unknown or unthought of by the inhabitants of Montreal, except the North-west Company, in whose interest it was to keep it in an uninhabited state, and who therefore did not feel a desire to recommend a settlement in this part of Canada. However Mr. Wright, not desirous of giving up his intention of establishing a settlement there, hired two men in Massachusetts for the purpose of going with him to the Ottawa. These men reported that they had ascended the Ottawa one hundred and twenty miles from Montreal. The first forty-five miles they found some settlers, who appeared to have done but little towards making themselves independent farmers. They, however, ascended the Ottawa up the rapids sixteen miles further to the head of the Long Sault, continuing their course sixty-four miles further up the river.

From the head of the Long Sault to Hull the river is remarkably smooth, the water still and sufficiently deep to float a sloop of war. At

Hull they purposed to explore the township back of the river, accordingly they spent from the 1st to the 20th of October, 1799. They climbed to the top of trees to view the situation of the country, which was accomplished in the following manner:—They cut smaller trees in such a way as to fall slanting and lodge in the branches of larger ones, when they ascended until they arrrived at the top. By this means they were enabled to judge of the face of the country, which they found to answer their expectations. They afterwards descended the river to Montreal, and gave a general description of their discoveries, and on their return to Massachusetts, after a report made public of the situation of this part of the country, Mr. Wright had no difficulty in procuring as many men as he wanted to commence the new settlement.

He immediately hired twenty-five men and brought them with his mill irons, axes, scythes, hoes, and all other kinds of tools he thought most useful and necessary, including fourteen horses and eight oxen, seven sleighs and five families, together with a number of barrels of clear pork destitute of bone, of his own raising, all of which left Woburn on the second of February, 1800, and arrived in Montreal on the 10th. After a short stay in Montreal, they proceeded on their route for the township of Hull, making generally amongst the old settlements about fifteen miles per day for the first three days, owing to their horses and oxen travelling abreast and their sleighs being wider than was usual in this section of the country. Under these difficulties they travelled the first three days, stopping with the habitans those three nights until they got to the Long Sault, which was the end of any travelled road in that direction in Lower Canada Being then eighty miles from their destination, and no road, they found that it was next to impossible to proceed in consequence of the depth of snow, and were therefore obliged to make a stand, and set one part of his men to alter the teams so as to go singly, and the other part of the men to proceed forward to cut the After making the necessary preparations they proceeded for the head of the Long Sault, taking care before night came on to fix upon some spot near water to encamp for the night, and particularly observing that there were no dried trees to fall upon them or their cattle. then they cleared away the snow, cut down trees for fire for the whole night, the women and children sleeping in covered sleighs, the men with blankets, around the fire, and the cattle left standing among the In this situation thirty of them spent the night, and Mr. Wright describes it thus :-

"I must say that I never saw men more cheerful or happy in my life than they seemed to be, having no landlord to call for expenses, nor to complain of extravagance, nor no dirty floors to sleep upon, but the swept ground which belonged to our gracious Sovereign, observing to take refreshments and prepare sufficient for the day, so as to lose no time on the journey when daylight appeared, always keeping the axemen forward cutting the road, and the foraging teams next the axemen,

and the families in the rear, careful to look out for a good place for the camp, until arriving at the head of the Long Sault."

From that place they travelled the entire distance (sixty-five miles) upon the ice. The guide that Mr. Wright had employed the fall before was unacquainted with the ice, consequently they were obliged to travel very slowly, keeping axemen forward trying the ice. The ice was covered with snow to the dephth of a foot, hence the precaution necessary. Mr. Wright relates an incident of the greatest humanity extended towards him by a denizen of the forest. The party on their journey up the river on the first day met a savage and his wife drawing a child upon a little bark sleigh: the habits, manners, customs, and particularly the cattle, were objects of astonishing interest to the savages. The Indian endeavored to make discourse with them relative to the ice, but of course was not understood. He was observed pointing to the woods, as if giving directions to his squaw to go into the woods and make herself comfortable. She immediately left him for the woods, and he proceeded to the head of the company without the promise of fee or reward, with his small axe trying the ice every step they went, as if he had been the proper guide or owner of the property. On night coming on they found it impossible to ascend the banks with their sleighs, the banks being about twenty feet in height. The sleighs were left on the ice while they ascended the bank and cleared off a resting place for the night. Before daylight breakfast and provisions for the day were cooked, and as daylight appeared they were ready to resume their arduous journey. The Indian behaved with remarkable civility during the night, and proceeded to the head of the company as he had done the day before. This day's march was accomplished without any accident. On the approach of night they encamped in the same manner as on the previous one, and early in the morning began their march in much the same way, the Indian taking the lead as

In this way, owing to the depth of snow, it took Mr. Wright and his party six days to accomplish a journey of sixty-four miles to the township of Hull. After some little trouble in cutting away brush and banks, they ascended the bank, which is about twenty feet high. Their Indian friend, after seeing them safely at their destination, gave them to understand he must return to his squaw and child, and to do so he must travel at least sixty miles. The party arrived here on the 7th of March, 1800. Soon, operations were commenced for the erection of houses for the several families. As soon as they commenced the cutting and clearing, they were visited by two chiefs of two tribes of Indians, at that time living at the Lake of the Two Mountains, who were greatly astonished at the sight of the cattle, horses, and the various tools and implements brought there by Mr. Wright. The chiefs of a great many tribes assembled together, and through their interpreter, George Brown (formerly a clerk in the Indian trade),

demanded of Mr. Wright by what authority he was cutting down their wood, and taking possession of their lands. He told them he possessed regular documents from their great father, which he had received in Quebec, and also orders from Sir John Johnson, who was agent in the Indian Department, and from whom they received their yearly dues from Government; finally after many meetings, and a visit on the part of Mr. Wright to the Indian Department Office at Montreal, the whole was arranged very friendly, the Indians agreeing that Mr. Wright should be a brother chief, and if any difficulties should arise in the future, it should be settled by mutual agreement amongst the chiefs. Mr. Wright after an acquaintance with these people of over twenty years, acknowledged that they were particularly strict in their regard of justice and equity. Mr. Wright and his men now began the cutting and clearing of the land in earnest, and in building houses for the accommodation of the families and men. He found the spring opened much earlier than he ever knew it in Massachusetts which was a cause of great encouragement to all. During the whole of March, April and May, they continued cutting, clearing, building and putting in vegetables and garden stuffs; during August fall wheat was sown, and an excellent crop realized. For sixteen years Mr. Wright battled against difficulties, misfortunes through fire, distance from markets, and succeeded through unexampled energy and perseverance in having a farm of eight hundred acres cleared from its natural forest in five years, (from 1811 to 1816), and during the same period of time raising one hundred and forty-three head of cattle on the same farm.

The present village of Hull is situated on the same farm, at that time called by Mr. Wright the "Columbia Falls Farm and village No. 4." A description of the "Columbia Falls," or "Chaudiere," as they are

now called, will be found in another place in this work.

The following will give Mr. Wright's improvements, and what he has accomplished for the settlement, in his own words:—1802—"I finished the mills and log house, and built a temporary blacksmith's shop, purchased a set of tools at Montreal, so as to complete any work in that line, and save the trouble of going to Montreal for every article we wanted of that nature. 1803, hired a blacksmith and miller to attend the mill and shop, and cleared one hundred acres of land on the Gatineau Meadow, for the benefit of the Columbia Falls Farm. 1804. made some additional improvements in buildings, and cleared fifty acres of land; sowed it with fall wheat. 1805, built a large barn, forty by sixty, eighteen feet posts, and sheds for the accommodation of my cattle; gathered in the aforesaid wheat, which proved an extraordinary crop, not short of forty bushels per acre; and cleared one hundred acres of land on the Gatineau Meadow, and sowed it with fall wheat. 1806, built one small house, and expended considerable sums of money in other improvements, say about one hundred and fifty pounds. 1807, built a hemp mill, and made other improvements.

1808, on the eighth day of May the whole of my mills burnt down. and no insurance. Same year commenced building them again. 1809, made improvements upon the land, repairs upon the mill dam, &c. 1810, built a dwelling house and store, and removed to this place to take charge of the whole; cost about one thousand three hundred pounds. 1811, employed about ten men upon this farm, in different branches of business, and made further improvements, and also built a large school house. 1812, much the same as the preceding year on this part. 1813, built a house, cleared some land, and made considerable fencing, also built a barn, and cleared about one hundred acres of land on the Gatineau Meadow for the use of the Columbia Falls Farm. 1814, '15, '16, much the same routine as the years before mentioned, except letting out a number of jobs for clearing of land. 1817, built a large school house. 1818, built a large dwelling house, about one hundred and fifty rods from the falls, upon a height of ground, which, as soon as finished, I removed into, and placed one of my sons in the one I had just left, to take charge of the Falls store. This house cost two thousand pounds, with sheds adjoining the same, barn, &c. We likewise laid out a road to the Lake Chaudiere, seven miles in length, called Britannia Road, built two stores at each end for the deposit of goods, for the accommodation of the upper country. I also built a large barn, forty by sixty, eighteen feet posts, sheds, yards, &c., to the amount of one thousand five hundred pounds, three gardens, also fenced round with a stone wall, an extensive nursery of fruit trees, which cost me about three hundred pounds. 1819, erected a large tannery with evlinder to grind bark by water, forty by seventy-five, three stories high, with dams to contain the water for working the mill; cost about six hundred pounds. I also built a dwelling house, twenty by thirty, upon the common so called; this cost me about two hundred pounds. 1820, built a large house, called the Columbia Hotel, forty by eightythree, with four stacks of chimneys and eighteen fire-places, three stories high on the front. This house is upon a large scale, with two handsome arched chambers, and well finished off, painted and railed in front, with seats and trees planted for the accommodation of public travellers; cost me two thousand two hundred pounds. I have also erected a large stone house, three stories high, thirty by sixty-three, the lower floor being appropriated for blacksmiths, gunsmiths, and other mechanical workmen, with the advantage of the bellows being worked by water, and also a trip hammer to strike by water; this cost me about one thousand two hundred pounds; also two new mills, one a saw mill, the other a grist mill, at the expense of one thousand six hundred pounds, with an expensive stone dam to convey the water to said mills, thirteen hundred feet long, twenty feet broad, and ten feet deep; the walls upon each side are built with the best and largest quarry stone, the whole of the stone rough-faced on the front sides, the insides of the wall filled up with pounded stone. This is the finest

piece of stone work in North America, as is supposed by many; some of the stones required ten yoke of oxen to draw them to the spot; cost was about two thousand pounds. I also built a stone building, say forty by forty-one, twenty-two feet high, with lofts, the stone wall hewed on three sides of the building, which cost me about one thousand pounds, 1821, built a saddler's shop and shoemaker's shop, and cleared about one hundred acres of land; the shops cost me one hundred pounds, and clearing the land about four hundred pounds. 1822, built a bakehouse, which cost me seventy-five pounds; also built a stone gun-house, twenty-eight by thirty-eight, twelve feet high, finished complete, having arched magazine and other apartments, a good well painted roof to cover the same, which cost me about two hundred pounds, for the deposit and safety of two handsome pieces. of brass cannon, three pounders; and I also raised a company of seventythree men, which are commissioned by His Excellency the Earl of Dalhousie. 1823, have been chiefly employed in building a church of stone in this village (Hull), forty-six by sixty-eight feet, height of the walls twenty-eight feet, the front or south end is of well hewn stone, and about fifteen feet high; in this said front wall there are two square polished stones, with the following inscriptions engraven thereupon, one, "Erected in the year 1823," and upon the other, "Built by subscriptions and donations." The steeple is one hundred and twenty-one feet high, the body of the church is well covered, and the frame is of the best red pine. We this year cleared sufficient land to make up the quantity to about six hundred acres for the village and benefit of the present establishment.

HULL, C. E.—A post village of the township of Hull, county of Ottawa, Canada East, situated on the Ottawa river, at the Chaudière Falls. Here across the Ottawa, immediately below the falls, a suspension bridge and roadway of solid masonry connects Upper and Lower Canada. Hull has almost an unlimited amount of hydraulic power, some of which has been made available for the propelling of various kinds of machinery by the late P. Wright, Esq.*

At present in the village there is a match factory, established in 1854, giving employment to three hundred and twenty-five hands, and turning out about sixty thousand dollars worth per annum. The pail, tub and wash-board factory, established in 1856, gives employment to forty hands, and manufacturing from fifty-five to sixty thousand dollars worth per annum. In the saw mill there are fifty hands

and 7,500,000 feet of sawn lumber turned out per annum. These establishments are owned and carried on by E. B. Eddy, who also carries on business as a general merchant, and does a business of twenty thousand dollars per annum.

Tongue, Brown & Co., of Ottawa city, are engaged in the manufacture of axes and edge tools in general. Other branches of trade are carried on successfully, and ere long no doubt the splendid water

power here will be fully made available.

The village contains two churches, as follows:—The Church of England (St. James), erected in 1823 of stone, at a cost of six thousand dollars. It will accommodate about five hundred persons; Rev. John Johnston, incumbent; Church wardens and delegates, Geo. J. Marston and William McKay Wright. The Roman Catholic Church was erected in 1852 of frame, and cost two thousand dollars. It will seat two hundred persons; Rev. H. Mauroit, parish priest

- AYLMER. C. E.—An incorporated village of the township of Hull, and the County town of the County of Ottawa, situated at the foot of Lake Deschène. It was first settled in 1825 by Charles Symmes, who was the first merchant and hotelkeeper in the village. John Gainford, settling there about the same time, started and carried on blacksmithing. The Church of England was the first church built, and was erected in 1835. Mr. Symmes commenced the sale of lots in 1826, and the site was surveyed by Mr. Smith, Provincial land surveyor. The village was made the County town about 1845, and the substantial stone buildings used for county purposes were erected shortly after, at a cost of ten thousand pounds. It has two daily lines of stages to Ottawa city, connecting with the Montreal steamers, and with the Ottawa and Prescott Railway, conveying passengers for the upper boats at Aylmer, a distance of nine miles from Ottawa city. The road leading from Hull to Aylmer is gravel, and is kept in good condition. The views of the Chaudière Falls, on crossing the suspension bridge, the Little Chaudière, about three miles further up the river, and the fine and well improved undulating country through which the road passes, well repays the trip from Ottawa to Aylmer, where excellent hotels are kept in a style not inferior to many of the largest city hotels.
- The Ann Sisson, a first class steamboat, plys daily between Aylmer and Pontiac, at the foot of the Chats Falls, where she connects with a railway three miles in length, with the steamer Oregon on the Chats Lake, to Portage du Fort and intermediate landings.
- The town contains a steam saw mill requiring a fifty horse-power engine to propel two circular and one gang of saws. This mill has the capacity of sawing 30,000 feet per diem.
- The Aylmer tannery was established in 1861 and employs four men, and turns out about eight thousand dollars worth per annum.
- It contains a church of England edifice erected at a cost of eight hundred pounds, and capable of seating 250 persons. Rev. Mr. Codd, rector.
- The Presbyterian Church was built in 1860, size 40 by 62 feet. It is capable of seating 500 persons. Rev. J. Gourlay, minister.
- The Roman Catholic Church was built in 1860, and will cost when fully completed ten thousand dollars; size 50 by 100 feet, with a capacity to seat 1,000 persons. There are male and female academies under the auspices of the Church of Rome; the former under the charge of Joseph B. DeGuise; number of pupils 75. The female academy is conducted by Miss Anna McDonald, number of pupils, 78.
- The Wesleyan Methodist Church is built of stone, with parsonage adjoining; the whole cost was \$2,000. The church will seat 300 persons. Rev. Joshua H. Johnston, minister.


