• **FOR NOVA SCOTIA, CAPE BRETON and PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND,**
Held at Newport, on Tuesday the 4th of June, 1844.



THE Meeting having been opened in the usual way, the Rev. Richard Knight, Chairman of the District, was called to preside. The Report of the Committee was then read by the Rev. Charles DeWolfe, Secretary. After which, the following Resolutions were proposed and unanimously adopted.

Moved by the *Rev. Wm. Webb*, seconded by the *Rev. J. B. Strong*—

I. That the Report just read be adopted, printed and circulated, under the direction of the Committee.

Moved by the *Rev. John McMurray*, seconded by the *Rev. Roland Morton*—

II. That this Meeting has heard with great delight of the recent opening for Missionaries in Western Africa, and would feel themselves specially encouraged to the prosecution of their efforts by such a signal and gracious interposition of Providence, and would earnestly pray that the devoted Missionaries in that region may find the work of the Lord to prosper in their hands.

Moved by the *Rev. H. Pope*, seconded by the *Rev. W. Wilson*—

III. That this Meeting would gratefully acknowledge the goodness of God as manifested to this department; as well as to others, of the great Missionary Army, during the past year, and would affectionately sympathize with all those Societies—fellow labourers, in this great work, in the Trials to which their Faith and Patience, have been recently subjected; and would pray for God's continued blessing upon their united efforts, till "Jews and Gentiles be gathered into one fold."

Moved by the *Rev. Thos. H. Davies*, seconded by the *Rev. John Allison*—

IV. That this Meeting deeply deploring the state of the Heathen World, would pledge themselves to renewed exertions, and recognizing the Holy Spirit as the sole author of evangelical prosperity, would not cease to pray for his blessing on all the churches at home and on all the Missions abroad.

R E P O R T .

THE return of another Anniversary calls for renewed expressions of gratitude, to the Giver of all Good, for the mercies of another year : and summons your Committee to the pleasing task of submitting to you, a brief Review of the Proceedings of the Parent Society for that period, and of the progress of the important Missions committed to their charge. The large Report from Home, which is furnished to all annual subscribers of one pound and upwards, is a document richly stored with subjects and statements, of profound interest to every true friend of Christian Missions ; and though the limits assigned to our Annual, are necessarily narrow, yet we will endeavour to select from the other, some portion of its ample matter, that may set before you in an impressive manner, the present condition of our part of the Great Mission Field.

It is heart-cheering to learn from year to year, that the Gospel is still marching on, from one field of victory to another, and that He, who took the lead of Israel's camp, is at the head of his Missionary Army, and that they, animated by the shout of their King, are going on, "conquering and to conquer." To hear, that after the experiment has been made, the world, however hostile to the Truth, cannot resist that Gospel, which is "mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds ;" is already to anticipate a universal triumph, and even now to hear, by faith the acclamation, "the kingdoms of this world, have become the kingdoms of our God and his Christ, and He shall reign for evermore !"

E U R O P E .

We begin with this part of the world, whose influence extends to every other quarter of the Globe ;—and, of which, it may be safely said, that to convert its millions into true disciples of the Lord Jesus, is to have taken the great step to the Conversion of the World.

In Ireland, 24 Missionaries are labouring, in the face of much opposition, to preach the unadulterated Gospel, and have been instrumental in gathering many wanderers into the Fold of Christ. Still, it is their determination, to urge on their way, through every

difficulty, till the time come when the Union between Ireland and Popery shall be Repealed, and then, shall the Emerald Isle, be one of the brightest gems, in Immanuel's Crown. Who would not pray for such a consummation ! The work in Winnenden, is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes, for without any other help than what he derives, from 52 of the older converts, Mr. Muller is enabled to sound the glad tidings in 50 towns and villages of the Kingdom of Wirtemberg, and has already joined 800 persons in Church fellowship. The religious horizon of France begins to brighten, and a spirit of enquiry is evidently spreading among the people, which is not confined to the Protestants, but prevails in some measure among the Romanists also. The generality of the members adorn their Profession, and a number of devoted and well-qualified young men, are rising up, at the several stations, who are likely to be instrumental in perpetuating and extending the work of God, in their native land. The accounts from Paris are encouraging, and the new Chapel commands a very good congregation. In Calais, two or three conversions to God have taken place, during the past year, and there is a slight increase of church members. Two have died, since the Conference : they were converts from Popery, of five years' standing, during which period they have maintained a consistent and unwavering Protestant profession. One of them had to endure severe persecution, but held fast, the beginning of her confidence steadfast unto the end. In tranquilly yielding her spirit, into the hands of her Lord, she said : " I die ; but Jesus Christ is my Saviour, and I am going to Heaven !" The other passed through much bodily affliction to her eternal rest. In the moment of departing, she exclaimed, " I am going to Christ—to Christ—to Christ !" and then " fell asleep in Jesus." In Switzerland the Mission had sustained some loss of members, by the withdrawal of a number of persons from our societies. This defection arose, from a perverted and unscriptural view of the second coming of Christ ; but God has given the Missionaries, others in the place of those withdrawn, so that the number is only five less than that of last year. The Gibraltar Mission is in a hopeful state, and could the Society afford to keep a Missionary, solely for the Spanish department of the work, great results might be expected. As it is, many of the Romanist children are taught in our school, and a weekly service is held, for the exposition of the scriptures, and prayer expressly for the benefit of the Spanish people. The total number of attendants on public worship, is 598 The Mission at Malta has been abandoned from want of funds.

ASIA.

Our attention is next in order claimed for the vast and populous regions of the East, which by the Providence of God, now form part of the British Empire. The condition of these countries very happily differs in various important particulars from that of many other parts of the great heathen world which will pass in review before us. Although they are morally and spiritually under the government of abominable idolatries, and of superstitions which are at once offensive to the Majesty of Heaven, and destructive of the present happiness and eternal safety of their deluded votaries, they are not shut up against any Missionary operations by any political obstacles, but on the contrary present a wide and open field upon which the Christian labourer may enter, or rather upon which the whole Christian Church may enter, and find sufficient scope for all their energies and zeal in contending with the darkest forms of error, and in extending the peaceful and holy reign of the Common Saviour of Mankind.

It is cause of devout and sincere thankfulness to God that a large measure of success has attended the diligent and praiseworthy labours of the Committee formed in London for the purpose of conveying to the Government the strong disgust and abhorrence excited in every portion of the Christian community by the long continuance of Government patronage to the Idolatry of India, and of Government connexion with it. That Committee, supported by the earnest and repeated memorials of the different Missionary Societies, have now the happiness of witnessing such a result of their labours as to encourage them to persevere until all they desire shall be accomplished, viz., the practical establishment of the great policy laid down in the Despatch of the Court of Directors to the Supreme Government of India, in 1833,—“That in all matters relating to their temples, their worship, their festivals, their religious practices, their ceremonial observances, our native subjects *be left entirely to themselves.*”

No British soldier is called out on duty on the occasion of idol-festivals to do honour to idol-processions. No British magistrate or other functionary is under the necessity of regulating the affairs or managing the revenues of the temple. The removal of this main obstacle to Missionary operations in India having been, to a great extent, secured, it remains that the supply of zealous and faithful Christian labourers to that part of the world shall be made, in some degree commensurate with the opportunities for usefulness which are presented, and the greatness of the

work which remains to be achieved. In this respect there does not appear to be any great cause of congratulation, either to this Society or to the Christian world at large. India is still unconverted, and one great reason of this mournful fact is, that for the most part India has not yet had the Gospel preached unto it. To India applies the solemn appeal of the Apostle, "How shall they believe on him of whom they have not heard?"

We would not, unnecessarily, depreciate what has been done, and what is now doing for India, both by this, and other Missionary Societies; but when the extent of the field is considered, and the teeming population, well might we ask, "what are these among so many?" We may turn from this language of desponding enquiry, to recite a few incidents connected with our Missions there, which breathe of Hope. The Missionary writes from Bangalore "that it is very obvious to a careful observer that the people of those places in which Christianity has most frequently been made known, are in *the transition-state*. Idolatry has a decidedly weaker hold of the affections of the mass of the people. The return of a great festival day is still a summons to thousands to congregate and celebrate it as their forefathers did; but much of the enthusiasm of feeling usually excited by such occasions has disappeared. The diminished influence of the Brahmins has become notorious; and to a great extent the veneration in which they were held has been exchanged for utter neglect.

"We would not set these facts forth, as if we considered that the ultimate object of Missionary labour had been realized: but they may, we think be regarded as sure indications of something being at work which will ere long change the whole aspect of society. Nor are there wanting other and more decisive harbingers of India's renovation. The leaven of the Gospel has worked in some hearts effectually, and thus furnished unequivocal evidence that it is capable of producing the same results here, which in other places have authenticated its divinity."

In North Ceylon, the influence of God's spirit has not been withheld, and the watch night service, there, of 1842, was conducted in three languages, and was peculiarly distinguished by seriousness and devotion. Among the Veddahs, the work advances, and there had been, in one year, at Batticaloa, and its neighbourhood, 169 baptisms; out of these 145 were Heathens, 18 Veddahs, and 6 the children of Christian Parents; 42 Romanists also recanted last year. We have therefore cause to bless God, and take courage.

IN SOUTH CEYLON.—“At a late festival held at *Dondra* in honour of all the deities, or demons, whom all Ceylon worshippeth, a number of the people banded together to plunder the temple, or *Dewala*, of all the offerings brought by the people. These offerings sometimes amount to nearly one hundred pounds sterling. The men were fishers. The plot, however, was discovered by the head men and priests, who are the only persons that derive any gain from these scenes of ungodliness. And they were compelled, not only to hire and keep a strong guard to prevent the intended pillage, but the ceremony which from time immemorial was performed in the darkness of night, their fears prompted them to have celebrated in the broad blaze of day. They thus secured their pelf: but we may regard this as one of ‘the signs of the times;’ and a not unimportant diagnostic of the declining state of heathenism.

“A few months ago, a Buddhist Priest of *Petanghawatte*, declaring open war against Christians of every sect, sent a challenge to the Baptist Missionary in the neighbourhood, avowing his perfect readiness to disprove the truth of Christianity, and at the same time fixed the day and the place for this exhibition of his courage and skill. Not to depend, however, merely on his own prowess or tact in handling the sword of disputation, he requested several of his brother priests to back him on this important occasion, with their talents, presence, and aid. The Baptist Missionary also sought assistance from his brother in Christ, the Wesleyan. The day of intended warfare came. The Wesleyan and the Baptist party, on reaching what was meant to be the scene of conflict at nine o’clock in the morning, saw a great multitude of people waiting with seeming anxiety for the arrival of the Missionary party. But the champion who had thrown down the glove and sounded the trumpet of war, was not found. His messenger, however, was presently seen bringing the intelligence that he withdrew the challenge, and declined the contest. The priests who had arrived, hastened, as if covered with shame, to their respective temples. The assembly was then addressed by the Baptist and Wesleyan Missionaries on the extreme folly and wickedness of idolatry, and on the only way of salvation through the knowledge of ‘the only true God and Jesus Christ sent’ by Him to be the Saviour of our whole sinful race. This we may regard as another of the favourable ‘signs of the times,’ and as another good impression made on the minds of the people with respect to the unimpeachable truth of Christianity. Buddhism, we trust, is rapidly on the wane; and the Sun of Righteousness we know must shine, ‘more and more unto the perfect day.’”

The Australian and Polynesian Missions have sustained a severe loss in the death of the Revd. John Waterhouse, the General Superintendent; but we know that the Great Head of the Church can bury his workmen, and yet carry on his work. In New Zealand great has been the number ‘added to the Lord,’ where 3,000, nearly are, meeting in class. The dissemination of the written word among the people, although insufficient satisfactorily to meet the existing want, has already opposed a powerful counteracting influence to the advance of Popery. The Rev. John Warren, writing from the *Hokianga*, in the Northern Island, remarks in reference to the Popish Priests:—

"There is every prospect of their cause in this valley speedily coming to naught, as their people are daily leaving them; and many of them are beginning to attend our services. Scarcely a day passes without bringing to the Station its company of five or six Romanists, who come for the express purpose of conversing with me on religious subjects, and begging books. It is to the munificent gift of the British and Foreign Bible Society, under the blessing of God, that I very much attribute the rapid decrease of Popery in this District. The Priests have tried to prevent their people from reading the Testament, but have not been able. The native mind has become enlightened, and they are, consequently, beginning to look upon the Priests and their superstitious *retenga* with strong aversion."

The Committee gratefully acknowledge another liberal grant of Five Thousand copies of the New Zealand Testament from the Committee of the British and Foreign Bible Society, in addition to the Ten Thousand formerly voted; but they are persuaded that this will fall far short of meeting that large demand which is made by the natives within the range of the Society's Missions.

The Missions in the Friendly Islands, are stated to be suffering in consequence of the depressed state of the Society's funds, which prevents the Committee from employing the number of Missionaries, required to build up the Infant Church, to train the rising generation, and instruct the people in the things which belong to their temporal, as well as their spiritual and eternal state.

"The very existence of these Missions is threatened by the measures of the Popish emissaries, aided by the power of France. In the course of last year a French ship of war, accompanied by the schooner of the Roman Catholic Bishop of New Zealand, visited *Vavau*, for the purpose of inquiring, in the name of the King of the French, why the bishop was not allowed to leave Romish Missionaries at *Vavau*, on his former visit. The inquiry was conducted with ostentatious parade, and the Chiefs were interrogated whether they had not heard what had been done at *Tahiti*, and other places, by the French. The King being absent at *Habai*, no decisive steps were taken at the time, and no further communications have been received by the Committee from either *Habai* or *Vavau*; but a letter from the Rev. John Thomas, dated *Tonga*, July 22, 1842, states, that the bishop had been at that island, and placed a Missionary at the *Bea*."

Of the spiritual state of the people pleasing reports are forwarded from some of the Islands, shewing that the good seed of the kingdom has taken root in many hearts, and is producing the fruits of a holy life. In *Fegee* the number of full and accredited church members has already increased to 837, while there are upwards of eleven hundred adults and children in the schools; a result scarcely to have been expected in so short a time among such a degraded and ferocious people as the *Fegeeans*.

"There are 309 Church-Members at *Ono*, and 29 on trial. That Island is a very important part of this Circuit. We have been enabled to meet, in some measure, the demands of the people for superior help. A respectable Tonguese Chief, *Sailasi Faone*, who has devoted himself to the cause of God, has left *Rewa* for *Ono*, agreeably to an arrangement made by the last District-Meeting. He is pious, intelligent, and zealous. He was received with pleasure by the *Ono* people, who made him presents on his arrival, as expressions of their gratitude. The three remaining heathens embraced the religion of Jesus during Mr. Williams's visit. He baptized nearly 200 persons. He admired the seriousness of those who were thus received into the visible Church. Several of our Members there 'know whom they have believed;' and the people generally are earnestly seeking religion. A heathen Chief from *Bau*, who was lately drifted in his canoe to *Ono*, was favourably impressed by their good conduct. He said on his return, 'I know that Christianity is true and good. I have seen people truly in earnest. They act very differently to those whom we see here'—referring to the Tonguese. 'I now wish to embrace Christianity, which I shall do before long; and, when I do, I shall abandon all my old ways. Feejeans will be in earnest when they embrace religion.' It affords us great pleasure to find that our Members at *Ono* are 'not slothful in business,' but provide a great quantity of cynet and mats for the King of *Lakemba*; by which conduct religion is in good repute."

AFRICA.

In Southern Africa, it is to be regretted that the band of Missionaries, is manifestly inadequate to meet the pressing wants of the Stations, though the work at Great Namaqualand, among the different tribes, still continues to be favoured with the Divine blessing, and has prospered during the past year beyond what could have been anticipated from the comparatively small amount of labour bestowed.

"At *Blydeverwacht*, a strong Chapel and Preacher's-room have been built. The wood and other materials were conveyed, and the workmanship performed, chiefly by the Natives themselves. And the first time that I had the pleasure of visiting them after the building was ready for occupation, subscriptions amounting to not less than £20 for the General Fund, were given by that very poor people. Nor were their liberal subscriptions the only proof that they had given their hearts first unto the Lord and then unto us. The willingness of those tribes, to which we have been able to pay a little attention, to contribute for the furtherance of the cause of God, is to us quite astonishing, and we think will be as much so to those of our friends who hear of it; and certainly it furnishes no mean proof that the hand of God is with us, while it calls upon the Committee to meet such unprecedented liberality by sending as far as possible the assistance needed. *Jonker Afrikaaner* has also got up a large and tolerably strong Chapel, so that with the temporary one at *Ameral's*, we have now four Chapels with religious Societies connected with them; besides two little Churches in the wilderness formed of the people of *Francman*, and the *Velschoon Draagers*. Another Chapel at *Aam's*, connected with the *Bundel Zwaarts*, would be a great acquisition, and we hope, this year, to get it completed for a very small sum."

The Missions in the Albany and Kaffraria District have been for several years steadily rising in importance. The Missionaries of the Society have now under their instruction, in Kaffraria itself, upwards of 30,000 natives of both sexes, besides several thousands within the limits of the colony. The most Easterly stations have, however, been painfully exposed to the injurious visits of the insurgent Boors, who made a most unprovoked attack upon the chief *Neapai*, killing many of his people, and carrying off several thousands of his cattle.

"At NEWTON DALE, the Mission is much exposed, owing to the unsettled state of affairs in Kafirland. Yet, in the midst of these circumstances, we take courage from beholding the continued steadfastness of the chief *Kama*. On receiving his last Society ticket, he remarked, 'I have much to try me, yet I sometimes feel as if I had already ascended up on high, and left all these earthly things behind. At these seasons I converse with God, and am filled with great joy and love. At other times I am cast down; yet do I not utterly fall: for when depressed I am supported by *one thing*. I know whom I have believed; I remember that he has pardoned my sins, and that I am his child. Yes, I never forget this; and by this, even in trials, I have inward peace and joy.' While then the political circumstances of this Tribe occasion great embarrassment and perplexity; yet, with the chief's enjoying God's favour, and zealously endeavouring amidst the cares and anxieties of Government, to propagate the truth among his people, we cannot despair of much good being ultimately the fruit of Missionary labour at this place."

The Missionary at Invani relates a very remarkable case of the consistent conduct of a native female Christian, who resides in the midst of heathen darkness, full twenty miles from any Mission-Station: she does indeed shine as a light in a dark place.

"Lately she has had several severe trials to pass through, but they have only been the means of refining her graces, and manifesting more fully the power of the Gospel. Her husband's brother being ill, a 'witch-dance' was held, when the priest or doctor 'smelt out' five persons, whom he charged with the crime of bewitching the sick man. They were therefore, as is customary, tortured in various ways to make them confess their crime. One poor fellow was tied up before a large fire, and nearly roasted to death! It is customary for all the adult persons of the kraal to be present at such 'witch-dance,' and to render such assistance as may be required of them. And it is at their peril to refuse, as any person so doing would be considered as an accomplice of the unfortunate beings who may be 'smelt out.' She, however, resolutely refused to be present at, or in any way join in, this 'work of darkness.' She also reasoned with them on the wickedness of their conduct. And when the diabolical means made use of failed to restore health to the sick man, she did not forget to point out to them the folly of trusting to such 'vanities.' Another trial of her faith was the following. It is the custom of the Kafirs on the birth of a child, to perform certain superstitious ceremonies, and to tie charms about the infant: sometimes they draw out some of the long hairs from the end of

a cow's tail, which they tie round the child's neck, and the cow is then considered sacred. Sometimes they cut off the first joint of one of its fingers. On their proposing that her child should be subjected to these heathenish vanities, she resisted, and besought them to let her take the child to the Mission-Station, and devote it to God by the Christian ordinance of baptism; and, although for a while she suffered a good deal of persecution on this account, yet she eventually prevailed, and the child was brought and baptized in the name of the Holy Trinity. Thus in the midst of discouragements we are kept from despairing, by beholding the power of the Gospel as manifested in the conduct of, here and there, a solitary individual."

We must, hasten, however, to close these remarks on Southern Africa, by reference to the power of the Gospel in overcoming one master vice.

"Drunkennes," says the Missionary, "is the besetting sin of the Korannas; as a people, and our efforts have been in no small degree rendered abortive by its prevalence among them. Such, however, is the influence which the Gospel has obtained over this half-civilized people, that a law has lately been made among them, by which the buying or selling of ardent spirits is entirely prohibited. The consequence is, that rioting has given place to tranquillity, and the number of those attending the ministry of God has been considerably augmented."

From Western Africa the accounts are of the most encouraging and delightful character. The select committee of the British House of Commons, have acknowledged the great services rendered to religion and civilization on this coast by the Wesleyan body. The Institution for the training of the sons of native chiefs, which is established in Macarthy's Island, appears to be in a flourishing state. Mr. Freeman's third Journal has come to hand, and brings with it the recital of his visits to Kumasi the third time, to Badagry and Understone—where he met with a reception so cordial, that his visit appears more like the march of a conqueror, than the pilgrimage of a Missionary. The King of Ashanti appears anxious to become a Christian: he already craves a blessing from God upon his daily meals, and retires to a private part of his house every day, for devotional purposes. He told Mr. Brooking that he had to ask a blessing mentally, and not aloud, because his countrymen are so prejudiced against innovations, and that he must proceed cautiously, at first. He is able to read the first chapter of St. John's Gospel, and has commenced teaching *his people* to read, saying if knowledge be good for himself, it must also be good for his people. It appears that the practice of kidnapping is not wholly banished yet from Badagry:

"This morning," says Mr. DeGraft, "we had a painful evidence of it; we saw from the Mission-House that several parsons were run-

ning to a landing-place on this side the river, close to our own, where we heard at the same time lamentation and weeping and howling of anguish. On inquiry we found that last night a child belonging to one of the natives was missed by its parents; they went from door to door of their neighbours, &c., in search of the poor child, but no trace of the child could be seen. The parents of course retired to their house in deep sorrow and anxiety; but to aggravate their trouble, this morning the corpse of their child was seen afloat close by the landing-place before mentioned, about ninety yards from our premises. The parents, hearing of this, hurried to the spot, and to their utter confusion and sorrow they saw their poor child dead at the landing-place, which they immediately wound up in a new mat, and took it home. On examination they found the child was kidnapped by some one; but fearing the untiring search and inquiries of the parents, after their poor little one, lest they should find him out, the party during the night gagged the poor child by putting a large piece of cloth into its mouth, and putting her into a canoe, he paddled out into the midst of the river, and threw the poor creature into it, after securing her arms, and came away, the dead body of which the current of the river drove to the shore this morning; but painful to relate, there is no law here to enforce the diligent search of such a murderer. The poor bereaved parents are left desolate to bemoan their painful loss in total silence. The child is about eight years of age."

AMERICA.

Last year we made reference to the painful occurrences that had taken place in the West Indies, in the destruction of Mission property by earthquakes, and the consequent depression in business which ensued; but the work itself is in a prosperous state—the congregations, in general, are crowded—and the societies rapidly increasing. At one of the recent Annual District Meetings of Jamaica, two respectable young men of colour have been warmly recommended, as suitable candidates for the sacred office of the ministry. In North America, the most interesting features of the Work are presented, among the Indians of Canada, and the Hudson's Bay Territory.

"The Indian Society at *Alderville*, consisting of one hundred, are divided into six classes, who are met by their leaders weekly. On the Sabbath day we have two religious services, as also four prayer-meetings in the week, held in rotation by the exhorters and leaders; and for seventeen years they have as a Society, nothing abated in the fervour of their devotions. A Missionary and Bible Society are in operation, to both of which almost all the Indians are subscribers. Every family is furnished with a Bible published by the British and Foreign Bible Society.

"We have, however, to lament the infirmities of some of the Indians, among which is a want of persevering industry. A few of the people are yet too fond of the chase, by which much of their valuable time is lost for farming pursuits; though the School and Model Farm are exercising a salutary influence, and in no small degree check this evil, as well as to elevate their general character. It is but just to re-

mark, that the Indians are every year improving their condition, and the past has been the most comfortable year they have known.

"The Indian females have shared largely in the advantages of the Gospel. They are now treated with kindness, by the men taking the largest share of the burdens. They now sit at table with their husbands; are seen walking at their side to the house of prayer, and participating in the comfort and pleasure of domestic life. In nothing has the grace of God been more signally displayed than in the faith and triumph with which many have borne their afflictions in seasons of suffering and death. Of the fifty-eight adults who have died during the last few years, there is scriptural grounds for believing, that with few exceptions, they all died in sure and certain hope of a glorious resurrection unto everlasting life."

Many encouraging things are spoken by the Missionaries of the Hudson's Bay Stations, and we sincerely trust that those remote and frozen regions will shortly shine radiant in the beams of 'the Sun of Righteousness.' It would not be proper to conclude these hasty notices without referring to the prosperous state of SACKVILLE ACADEMY, which is now in full operation, numbers 80 scholars, and bids fair to be one of the most efficient institutions of these Provinces. The Provincial Legislature, the Session before the last, voted £200 per annum towards its support for 2 years—a grant which it is hoped will be continued, as the institution already numbers among its pupils many youths from this Province. A revival of religion has recently been vouchsafed to this seat of learning, and it is hoped that such seasons will not be of rare occurrence within its walls.

In conclusion, your Committee would call upon their own souls, and the souls of all that love the prosperity of religion and the salvation of the Heathen, to bless God for what he has done for the Heathen, through the instrumentality of this Society, and all other Societies, whose object is the promotion of the Divine Glory. Never would they forget that those who are engaged in this good work, are auxiliaries in the field, and that the field is so wide and the work so great, that if every Christian Church were to arouse to the work, that even then there would not be too many “come to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against the mighty,”—nor would they forget that the triumph of one, is the triumph of all.

They would regret that a nation so great as France, should lend its aid to force upon the unoffending natives of the Ocean Isles, the Vampire of Popery ; and trust that the Most High will

cover these anti-Christian artifices with speedy and signal discomfiture.

They would beg special attention to the representations made in the monthly notices concerning the state of the Society's funds, and would deeply sympathize with the Parent Committee in the painful feelings they must experience when loud and earnest calls are made from Heathen lands for help, and none can be afforded, because the Mission chest is exhausted. O, shall this reproach never be wiped away from the Christian Church, that her Divine Head has committed to her charge the conversion of the world, and that she is too stinted in her charities to fulfil the commission? O, must the spirit so long suspend his influences, because the Church so long suspends her labours? "May the Spirit and the Bride say" Come! and the thirsty come and partake of the water of life freely.

The sure, irrevocable word has passed the lips of Jehovah, "unto me every knee shall bow, and every tongue confess;" and if we refuse to perform our part of the work, God can do it by others: but let us rather gird up ourselves to the great, and good, glorious work; besiege his throne with prayer—load his altar with gifts—and give "free course to his word"—then shall God, even our own God, bless us; "God shall bless, and all the ends of the earth shall fear him." "Less than entire consecration," says an eloquent writer, "has been tried for ages; and the fatal result is to be seen in the thousands perpetually passing—passing at this moment—to the bar of God from regions where the sound of salvation has never been heard. If you sympathise with Christ, then in the travail of his soul, you will from this time see, what entire devotedness can do for their recovery. Are you aspiring to win from his lips the "Well done, good and faithful servant" which awaits each of his devoted followers, on their arrival in his presence above? Enthusiasm is sobriety here! In this cause, the zeal of Christ consumed him—his holiest ministers have become flames of fire; and, as if all-created ardour were insufficient, here infinite zeal finds scope to burn, "for the zeal of the Lord of Hosts shall perform it."
