PROCEEDINGS of the Twenty-Sixth Annual Meeting

OF THE

WESLEYAN METHODIST MISSIONARY AUXILIARY SOCIETY.

For Nova-Scotia, Cape Breton, and Prince Edward Island,

Held at Halifax, on Tuesday, 30th MAY, 1843.



THE Meeting having been opened in the usual way, the Rev. R. KNIGHT, Chairman of the District, was called to preside. The Report of the Committee was then read by the Rev. CHARLES DEWOLFE, Secretary. After which, the following Resolutions were proposed and unanimously adopted.

Moved by the Rev. William Smith, seconded by the Rev. William Wilson-

I. That this Meeting has listened with deep interest to the Report just read, and do hereby recommend that it be printed and circulated under the direction of the Committee.

Moved by the Rev. William Webb, seconded by the Rev. Roland Morton—

II. That this Meeting desires gratefully, to acknowledge the gracious and signal approval the Great Head of the Church has been pleased hitherto to grant to this and other Evangelical Missionary Societies, in their labours of love, and to pray that the protection of his Providence, and the effusion of his spirit, may still be vouchsafed to the present fields of labour, and that he may be pleased to give his servants " access to the parts beyond."

Moved by the Rev. Henry Pope, seconded by the Rev. C. Churchill,

III. That this Meeting deeply deplores the intellectual and spiritual degradation by which so vast a portion of the human family are yet enthralled, and feel it incumbent on them in every possible way, to extend the knowledge of that Gospel, which alone can raise man from this condition.

Moved by the Rev. William Bennett, seconded by the Rev. J. Norroway-

IV. That this Meeting deeply sympathizes with their brethren and their charge in the West Indies, who have recently suffered from painful visitations of the Divine Providence, and trust that these trying events may be overruled for the glory of God and the ultimate good of these highly important Missions.

REPORT.

THE return of this Anniversary calls for renewed expressions of gratitude, to the Almighty, for his goodness manifested to this Society, during the year that is past. Its friends can sing of mercy as well as of judgment, and while receiving the various and numerous tokens for good, that the Lord has been pleased to vouchsafe, they would confidently say, "This God is our God for ever and ever i"

As the history of Missions presents a more ample page to the Christian student, the more fully are we convinced, that if the moral maladies of the world are ever healed, it will be by the application of "Gilead's balm" under the direction and with the blessing of the great Physician of Souls. Other expedients have been tried, but tried in vain. Science and Legislation, and Civilization have all attempted the momentous work, of ameliorating man's moral and physical condition, but all attempts of this kind have failed to reach the core of the disease; but those who have gone forth with the Gospel into lands of heathen guilt and gloom, and barbarism, have never been compelled to sound a retreat, but have found "the wilderness and solitary place glad for them, and the desert has rejoiced and blossomed as the rose." These encouragements from abroad, have been met in some degree by correspondent efforts at home, and though the peculiarly trying circumstances of the Mother Country, have prevented the benevolent public for making those extra exertions, which the opening fields of usefulness in distant lands demanded, yet it is cheering to learn, that the heart still sympathetically responds to the loud call of a perishing world, and it is both hoped and believed, that when the present temporal embarrassment of England and her Colonies is overpast, that new and teeming supplies will flow into the coffers of evangelical liberality.

Never has this Society deviated from its one professed aim, that of winning souls to God, and never have its lamentations been more sincere, than when untoward events have arisen, to retard the progress of the Redeemer's Kingdom. It has always rejoiced in the prosperity, that has attended the efforts of all Protestant Missionary Societies; and has ever cultivated towards them, "the things that make for peace." Nor would they ever be high-minded, as though they were the only Body owned and honored by God, in this great and glorious work; but rejoice, that those minor distinctions, which oft cause apparent divisions between the various squadrons of Immanuel's Army, have not caused the Captain of Salvation to depart from the head of His host, but that He still is present with his people; still He leads them on "conquering and to conquer," and still the shout of a King is heard in their Camp. Especially is it necessary in the present day, to cultivate towards 'all them that love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity,'-feelings of genuine fraternal charity, while Antichrist is making an onset on Gospel doctrines and Protestant denominations; an onset so fearfully determined and malignant, that it is hoped it is as the death struggle of a vanquished foe.

We now proceed to give a brief review, of the operations of the Society.-On the Continent of Europe, our Missions are still crowned with success; and almost every month affords new proofs of their importance, while it opens new spheres of la-Mr. Scott still continues in Sweden, those evangelical labor. bors which have already tended so materially to revive the work of God, in the Church of that country. Mr. Muller at Winnenden still holds on his way, amidst opposition, and is cheered, by seeing the word of the Lord glorified. He states, that the number of Members in the 40 towns and villages, to which he has access, amounts to 657, of whom 52 render him important assistance, as local exhorters and class leaders. France and Switzerland now afford a most interesting and promising field of In Paris, a proper Chapel had long been wanted, and now labor. by the goodness of God, the prayer of His people is answered. Two years ago, a theatre was fitted up and opened, under the windows of the place then occupied for worship, which was a great annoyance, especially on Sabbath evenings, for, at that time, the theatres are most numerously attended, in that city. This theatre did not succeed, the parties failed, and it was closed. This was what we desired, as it was clear says our informant, Mr. Toase, that either it or the House of God must fail. Christ and Belial cannot dwell together. The old theatre has been taken down, and a New Chapel built, which presents a very neat appear-It is 60 feet long, and nearly 30 feet wide, ance. It is authorised as a Wesleyan Chapel by the Government. Knowing the embarrassed state, of the funds of the Society at home, we resolved to get up this place of worship by exertions among ourselves and friends. When we state, that this is the *third* theatre in France, that has been converted from a play-house into a place of worship, our friends will thank God and take courage. From other parts of the Continent, the accounts are also highly encouraging.

We turn now, to the Missions in Ceylon and Continental India. Parts of the Island of Ceylon, present under the influence of the Gospel, a vegetation of righteousness, more beauteous than that with which its fields are so richly clad by nature; and many of the natives reclaimed from idolatry, are living as God's witnesses, and presenting a vivid illustration of the saving and civilizing power of "the truth as it is in Jesus." But other parts afford as revolting a contrast. Mr. Kessen writes from Negombo, that the inhabitants are in general most deeply degraded. "In indolence, improvidence, selfishness, and deadness of heart, to every claim of God or man, they cannot be exceed-Such is the utter degradation of nearly all, that out of ed. every 80 persons I meet, 60 of them, for a pice or a glass of arrack each, would deliver false evidence on oath. This is neither a secret, nor to them a cause of shame, for they glory in their shame. One village is notorious for its brutality. Yesterday I visited 5 of its families, but I might write from morn till noon, from noon till dewy eve, and my tale of the ignorance and abomination of the people would be untold. In all the villages may be seen, numbers of young and old, almost in a state of nudity, hurrying to their graves, not knowing, according to their own statement, whether they have souls or not; and without one idea of God or eternity. The people have given themselves up to every kind of wickedness, and that, too, in spite of the efforts to They are in an awfully literal sense, the property save them. of the devil: they pay every kind of worship to him. Surely such a people need the Gospel, and blessed be God, He can bind the strong man, and take the prey from the mighty." That the Gospel can, by God's blessing, accomplish so desirable a result, is evident from what has taken place among the Veddahs, who inhabit the jungle, in the interior of the Island. The Government had been anxious to settle and civilize this wild people, and the Agent, thinking the Cross to be the most efficient instrumentality, invited the Missionary to accompany him.-Mr. Roberts, the Missionary thus chosen, says that he found them in the rudest and lowest state of barbarism. I inquired of the old Veddah where they slept ? 'On the trees !' But where do your wives and children sleep? 'On the trees !' But how

can they climb? 'It is their nature.' Do you marry? 'We do not marry : we take a woman, and when we are tired of each other, we part, and seek another.' What do you eat ? ' Such things as we can get.' And what are they ? ' Roots, deer's flesh, honey and fish, when we can catch it.' Do vou ever catch elephants ? 'Yes.' How ? 'We shoot them with the bow and arrow and follow them till they fall.' Of what religion are you ? ' I do not know what you mean.' Where do people go after death ? ' We do not know.' How many Veddahs are there in these forests ? 'We cannot tell.' Are there 500? 'Yes, more,' Are there 1000? 'We cannot tell.' Since that, the Revd. R. Stott writes, that he had baptized numerous converts among these Veddahs, that villages had been formed, the old abominations banished, and a new creation produced. Such are the bloodless triumphs of the Cross !

From Continental India, the report of one circumstance must not be omitted, that since the government have withdrawn their patronage to idolatry, the Hindoos have publicly denied that they are idolators, thus shewing that they begin to be ashamed of their system. May their filthy idols soon be cast to the moles and to the bats, and the Saviour Jesus be universally acknowledged as Lord, to the glory of God, the Father.

The Australasian and Polynesian Missions now occupy so large a range, that we fear it would detain you far beyond the usual limits of the Report even to present a few extracts from the numerous and interesting accounts of the Missionaries. The schools are well sustained, and the Scriptures are circulated as widely as possible. Mr. Waterhouse (who has been called home to his reward since) writes that he had scarcely met with a New Zealander in any place where the missionaries have been, who cannot read the Sacred Scriptures, and I never knew any people in humble life possessed of so much knowledge of the New Testament. In my casual intercourse with them they have constantly been asking the meaning of various texts ; and Book a ! Book a ! is their constant cry .- While Mr. Waterhouse was at Mangungu, a missionary meeting was held, at which the natives contributed £11. The recent unjust assumption of French dominion in Tahiti has increased the apprehension of the Committee respecting their own Polynesian missions; and deeply sympathizing with the London Society on account of the great calamity which has befallen it, in its earliest field of labour, as well as actuated by a sense of common interest, they have united in an appeal to the British Government for redress. The

state of things in many of the Islands of Fegee is decidedly encouraging. Wherever the missionaries have maintained their ground, for any considerable time, hopeful indications of a beneficial change have been exhibited ; barbarous customs have been dispensed with; the confidence of the chiefs and people, in the idolatry of their forefathers, has been shaken ; and even the priests, speaking in the name of the national deities, confess that they are much afraid, now that the great God of the Christians has come among them.-Already have hundreds of debased and cannibal Fegeeans, proved the Gospel to be the power of God to their salvation. An Institution, for the more effectual train ing of native youth, is to be opened at Lakemba, under the more immediate care of the Revd. John Hunt, whose sound theological training at Hoxton, and general qualifications, mark him out for the important office.

In Southern Africa, an unusual measure of success has been vouchsafed to the Society's operations the past year. The Rev. J. L. Hodgson speaks of a Missionary meeting held in Little Namaqualand, as one of great interest. The natives contributed cattle and corn to the value of £18 2 6. While the people were announcing their several subscriptions, Mr. H. states, I was much effected to see 21 little children approach Mr. Jackson with a halfpenny—9 with a penny, and 2 with 3 halfpence *each*, and the cheerfulness which was depicted on their swarthy countenances, affectingly conveyed to my mind the impression that they felt themselves honoured, in being permitted to cast their mite into the Lord's treasury.

In Western Africa, we have only time to make brief reference, to the new and highly auspicious mission commenced in Ashanti by Mr. Freeman, whose two Journals are now before the public, and are among the most thrilling missionary documents of modern times. On the 6th of Nov., 1841, Mr. Freeman visited Kumasi, the capital of Ashanti, the second time, accompanied by the two Ashanti princes, and a number of other persons ; but owing to the weather, and in order to avoid the sight of a great and bloody slaughter of human victims that was about to take place, they did not reach their destination till the 13th of Decr. The King received him in a very cordial manner, and requested him to convey his thanks to the committee in London, for the handsome carriage they had sent him; and immediately gave him land for the erection of a suitable Mission House. Mr. Freeman immediately appointed regular hours for divine services, which were well attended ; many of the Ashantis are present on every occasion, and it is not unusual to witness some of the King's household paying serious attention to the word of life. A religious society has been formed of converted Fantis, connected with the mission, and a few strangers, and thus the nucleus of a Christian Church already exists in Kumasi. A school has also been commenced for the instruction of the Ashantis.

We now come to that portion of the mission field which lies nearer home, and therefore on some accounts is calculated to lay hold more closely upon our feelings.

In the West Indies, the loss of many valuable lives has been sustained, and many vacancies occasioned in the missionary ranks ; which the society have been unable, from financial difficulties, to fill. It is a gratifying fact that the West India stations last year presented to the General Mission Fund the noble sum of The schools generally are in efficient operation. £4500. school, for training teachers, at Kingston, in Jamaica, has been commenced under the able direction of Mr. Auld, late of the Glasgow Educational Institution, with an encouraging prospect of suc-The coloured population, under the care of the missioncess. aries, have shewn by their pious and orderly conduct that though now emancipated from the thraldom of man, yet that they love to serve the Lord Christ. Yet it is necessary to state, that the society's operations in the West Indies have been seriously interrupted by the late calamitous earthquakes. In Hayti, one of the mission stations has been blotted out of existence. A heavy loss in mission property has been sustained, in consequence of the more recent earthquakes, but in these, as in all such instances, the merciful preservation of missionary life is gratefully acknowledged.---Many thousands of pounds will be required to repair the damaged Chapels, School Houses, and other Mission Buildings.

In the British North American Provinces, the work of God is still prosecuted by your missionaries with great and glorious results. The Gospel has been faithfully preached—sinners have been awakened, the number of believers has been increased, the ordinances observed, and in some of the Circuits and Stations it has pleased God, in an especial manner, to revive his work. The people have displayed much liberality in helping to support their ministers, as well as by directly contributing to the funds of the Parent Society. An elegant Academy has been erected at Sackville, in the neighbouring Province, at an expense of upwards of £5,000; and presented to the Connexion by Charles Allison, Esq., of that place. Such a Seminary is greatly needed by the Wesleyans, and, it is hoped, will prove itself a help to the diffusion of useful knowledge and vital piety.— The accounts from the Indians of Canada and the Hudson's Bay territory, are very cheering, and already does the sun of Righteousness illumine many of their minds with his truth, and warm their hearts by his love.

In conclusion, well may we congratulate our friends that the experience of another year has gone to prove that the cause of missions is the cause of God! Nor is it a matter of small or inferior interest that the Divine Being, while he has been blessing this department of the Missionary army, has not been unmindful of the other bands of the Sacramental Host of his elect—thus shewing us, as Protestant Christians, whose charter of spiritual liberty is the Bible, whose field of Christian benevolence is the world, whose hope of salvation is the Redeemer's blood, and whose pro-

fessed object, in all our efforts, is the glory of Him, of whom the whole family in Heaven and Earth is named, that if we will but labour harmoniously in his cause, we shall go up upon the earth, in the length and breath of it, where a sinner is to be found, and plant that tree whose leaves are given, for the healing of the nations. Among the signs of the times, we are not to overlook the increasing desire of all Evangelical Christians to make common cause in recovering a revolted world to God, and doubtless, this itself will cause at last a more sincere and lasting approximation of sentiment and feeling, than could ever be caused by the pen or the voice of controversy. Of all other kindred Missionary Societies, we would say, "for our brethren and companions' sake" "we will pray for your prosperity." Divine Providence is evidently preparing the way for his gospel, into lands hitherto considered inaccessible; yea, He who before Cyrus opened the seven-barred gates of brass, is now opening in heathen countries a great door and effectual, and recent events tend to excite the hope that not a hundred years will elapse before China-proudly self-styled the Celestial Empire-shall, by the preaching of the Cross, become indeed Celestial, because that What there the God of Heaven shall have set up a Kingdom. a call for new exertions, new gifts, new prayers, and new sacrifices, does the present crisis make !---And who will refuse to join in sending to them that perish, the tidings of salvation? Who that has a heart to feel for man can refuse ? Who that has vowed to live for Christ can hesitate ? Who that is alive to what is vast in design, and noble in motive, and glorious in result, can A mere worldly philanthropy may point to its schools, linger? and hospitals, and tell of the minds that science has enlightened, and of the diseases that medicine has cured, but Christianity, while she originates these very institutions, only considers her work begun, as she marches on ; she scatters these minor blessings among mankind, but she accomplishes a good infinitely greater, she points out ignorance sitting at the feet of Christ, and hearing words of life. Hordes of the wilderness, stained with blood guiltiness once, and soiled with every impurity,-now washed and justified, and sanctified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God !-the worshippers of Devils changed into the sons and daughters of God !---and the prostrate victims of superstition raised up even to Heaven and made pillars in the temple above !

Now the world is waiting for us to be faithful to our duty to our souls—to their souls, and to the Father God—let us ask ourselves what have we done, and what are we doing ?—Is the utmost extent of our instrumentality in this great work, a small donation in money and occasionally a languid prayer ? Finally, we would only quote the words of one of our West Indian coloured men, who, when he brought a donation which the Missionary thought too large, but which he insisted on giving, said, "Massa, the work of God must be done, and I shall soon be dead !"
