# **BY-LAWS**

# ΙΝΤΒΟ Ο Π СΤΙΟΝ.

Without order and decorum, harmony cannot be preserved, nor the business of Masonry be properly conducted; at the third stroke of the Master's hammer, therefore, profound silence shall be observed.

#### CHAPTER I.

## Of Erregular Behabiour.

- 1. If a Brother say any thing improper in the Lodge, hold private conversations, dispute about religion or politics, interrupt a Brother while speaking to the Master, be not on his legs when addressing the Master, sit down unclothed, or otherwise conduct himself indecorously, he shall be formally admonished by the Master; and, should he still so far persist in his disorderly conduct as to require a second and third admonition in the course of the same evening, he shall, at the discretion of a majority of the members present, be liable to suspension from the Lodge; and he shall, in that case, be reported to the Provincial Grand Lodge, should such exist, and to the United Grand Lodge of England.
- 2. No Brother shall be allowed to speak more than once to the same question, unless it be in explanation; or when called upon by the Master; or, as the mover, in reply.

## CHAPTER II.

## Of the Times of Meeting.

This Lodge shall meet on the second Tuesday of every month, at the hour of seven o'clock, P.M., and shall continue to work as long as the Master shall direct, except in the months of June, July, August, September, and October, when the regular meetings shall be suspended, except in cases of emergency.

The members may partake of refreshment in Lodge at any meeting, with the sanction of the Master.

## CHAPTER III.

#### Officers.

The Officers of this Lodge shall consist of a Master, two Wardens, a Treasurer, a Secretary, two Deacons, an Inner Guard, and a Tyler or Tylers, and, if expedient, a Chaplain, two or more Stewards, and a Director of Ceremonies.

#### CHAPTER IV.

# Of the Clection and Appointment of Sticers.

This Lodge shall annually elect, by ballot, the Master, Treasurer, and Tyler or Tylers, at the regular meeting immediately preceding the Festival of St. John the Evangelist; and on the morning of that Festival, the Master, and other newly elected officers, shall be installed according to ancient usage; after which, the Master shall appoint and instal his Wardens and other officers.

No member shall be allowed to vote on any subject unless his dues be paid up.

#### CHAPTER V.

## Of the Master.

- 1. The Master of this Lodge is responsible for the warrant and correct keeping of the records and papers in general during his administration.
- 2. The Master being absent, a Past-Master shall preside, the immediate Past-Master taking precedence. If there should be no Past-Master present, then the Senior Warden, or in his absence the Junior Warden shall act as Master, otherwise the Senior Master Mason.
- 3. The Master shall make a return to the Provincial Grand Lodge, should such exist, and to the United Grand Lodge of England, at least once in every year, of the members of this Lodge, and shall remit the fees for the Grand Lodge certificate and registration; and at the regular meeting in January shall report to the Lodge what return he has made and what fees have been remitted.

#### CHAPTER VI.

## Of the Wardens.

The Senior Warden shall be responsible for the safe keeping of the jewels, furniture, and paraphernalia of the Lodge, and may, in the absence of the Master, cause Summonses to be issued; but he shall not preside should a Past-Master of the Lodge be present.

The Junior Warden shall see that the Brethren get their dues when ordered by the Master, and shall attend to the necessary arrangements for refreshments on all ordinary occasions, and shall be, ex officio, chief of the Stewards.

#### CHAPTER VII.

## Of the Treasurer's Buty.

The Treasurer shall receive the monies of the Lodge, and discharge bills when duly vouched and sanctioned by the Master. He shall keep books, in which his account of receipts and disbursements shall be regularly entered, so as to exhibit, at one view, the balance in his hands; which books shall be open for the inspection of the members at every meeting of the Lodge. The accounts of the fund of benevolence, the fund for the general purposes of the Lodge, and the United Grand Lodge Fund, shall be kept distinct from each other.

The accounts of the Treasurer, and vouchers in support thereof, shall be annually submitted to the permanent committee, at least a week previous to the Festival of St. John the Evangelist; and the balance in his hands shall be paid over to the Treasurer elect, at the meeting on that day or otherwise, as the Lodge shall direct.

The Treasurer shall insure, annually, the jewels, furniture, and other property of the Lodge against loss by fire.

And he shall furnish the Secretary with a list of the dues owing by each member at least once every quarter.

#### CHAPTER VIII.

# Of the Sceretary's Buty.

The Secretary shall issue Summonses to all the members of the Lodge, at least seven days previous to each regular or emergent meeting, particularly noticing

elections and initiations, passings, and raisings of members, new members to be admitted, By-Laws to be altered or repealed, or new ones to be made. He shall make minutes of all matters which are regularly proposed and seconded in the Lodge, as well as of the initiating, passing, raising or joining of Masons, and of all other things the Master may order. He shall also keep a register of the members of the Lodge, showing the dates of initiating, passing and raising, or joining, and of calling off; and shall, at least once in every quarter, notify each member in his Summonses of the amount of dues owing by him.

## CHAPTER IX.

## Of Tyler's Duty and Fee.

The Tyler shall, under the direction of the Senior Warden, keep in good order, the jewels, furniture, and paraphernalia of the Lodge, and attend all meetings, for which he shall receive the fee of five shillings, and his assistant two shillings and sixpence, at each meeting, and when the Lodge partake of refreshment they shall each receive two shillings and sixpence extra.

The Tyler shall also deliver the Summonses to the members, for which he shall receive the further sum of two shillings and sixpence.

#### CHAPTER X.

#### Of the Bermanent Committee.

1. A Permanent Committee, consisting of the Wardens, with the Secretary and Treasurer, and three members, to be elected annually, on St. John the Evangelist's day, shall superintend the finances and property

of the Lodge, and consider of any special matter regarding its interests. They shall meet whenever summoned by the Master or the President, and three shall be a quorum. The result of their proceedings shall be forthwith communicated to the Master, and shall be reported at the next regular meeting of the Lodge, for approbation.

- 2. The Committee shall choose a President and Vice President at the first meeting, and in the absence of both these officers, the Committee shall choose one of their number to preside at the meeting.
- 3. All accounts against the Lodge may be referred by the Master to the Permanent Committee, for examination and approval.
- 4. On applications for relief, addressed to the Master during recess, and by him referred to the Permanent Committee, (in case of their favourable report,) the Master shall be authorised to draw on the Treasurer to the extent of the amount recommended. All applications for Masonic relief, which require investigation, shall be referred to the Permanent Committee.
- 5. The Permanent Committee shall annually, previous to the Festival of St. John the Evangelist, audit the accounts of the Treasurer, which, with all other accounts and affairs in general, relative to the Lodge, shall be settled and reported at the meeting on the said Festival of St. John.

## CHAPTER XI.

# Of Initiation, Admission, &c.

1. No person shall be initiated in, or admitted a member of this Lodge, if, on ballotting, there be

found more than one black ball; but, to prevent the possibility of a mistake, the ballot may be taken a second or even a third time.

- 2. Every Brother, on becoming a member, shall sign the By-Laws, and be furnished with a printed copy thereof by the Secretary.
- 3. AnyBrother, having once been a subscribing member of this Lodge, may at any time, (should he have withdrawn,) rejoin the Lodge without any admission fee, provided his old dues be all paid up, and that on ballotting there shall not be more than one black ball against his rejoining.
- 4. Any Brother, not a member of this Lodge, may be passed or raised in it, for the sum of one pound five shillings, currency, for each degree, provided he has been made in a regular Lodge, and produce proof to that effect.

#### CHAPTER XII.

## Funds.

- 1. Every member of this Lodge shall pay fifteen shillings, currency, quarterly in advance, whether present or absent; one-fourth of which must be applied to the fund of benevolence, and the remainder to the general fund of the Lodge.
- 2. Every person initiated in this Lodge shall pay seven pounds ten shillings, currency, which sum shall be considered in payment for the first three degrees, and shall include the fee for registration and the Grand Lodge certificate, and the members proposing or recommending a candidate shall be responsible for the

payment of the initiation fee, which, in all cases, must be made on the day of initiation. Every member joining shall pay two pounds ten shillings, currency, which shall cover the fees for registration, also the Grand Lodge Certificate, when necessary.

3. Any Brother stating in writing that indispensable business will cause his absence from the city for the term of six months or upwards, upon giving due notice thereof to the Lodge at a regular meeting, may, by a majority of votes of the Brethren present, have his quarterly contribution of fifteen shillings commuted to three shillings and ninepence, being the proportion appropriated to the fund of benevolence. Immediately on his return, the full dues shall be resumed.

## CHAPTER XIII.

## Of Monorary Members.

1. The members of this Lodge, considering it a duty they owe to several Brethren, for the great services they have rendered the craft, to grant them the privilege of becoming Honorary Members, have resolved, that in all cases where any Brother, who has served as a Master or Officer of this Lodge, and has been a subscribing member for ten years, or has been an ordinary member, without holding office, for fifteen years, may, if he be deemed worthy of that honor, on motion of any Brother, duly seconded, be admitted an Honorary Member of this Lodge; provided there shall not be more than one black ball against such admission, and that such application on the part of the member moving, do lie over for one month, and notice thereof be given in the Summonses. Such Honorary Member shall be ex-

empt from all dues, save the contribution to the fund of benevolence, and the evening dues when present, but should he again take office he shall be placed on the list of subscribing members during the time he holds office.

2. Officers in Her Majesty's service, quartered in this Garrison, being Master-Masons, may become members on application to that effect, subject to the ballot mentioned in the last section and to the usual notice in the Summonses. They shall pay the joining fee of two pounds ten shillings, currency, and the full dues the same as other members. An Officer, member of the Lodge, on removing from the Garrison, shall, ipse facto, be considered to have called off from the Lodge without notice.

#### CHAPTER XIV.

## Of Masonic Clothing.

No Brother shall, on any pretence, be admitted into Lodge unless his clothing and insignia be strictly conformable to those prescribed by the Constitution of the United Grand Lodge of England, in the Chapter of Regalia.

## CHAPTER XV.

## Fines and Forfeitures.

1. Any member of this Lodge who shall have allowed his dues to be in arrears for twelve months, to be computed from the amount first due, shall, after notice given, be liable to be excluded and have his name struck off the list of members, and shall thereon be reported to the Provincial Grand Lodge, should such exist, and to the United Grand Lodge of England.

- 2. Any brother regularly struck off the list of members of the Lodge for non-payment of dues, shall, on no account, be permitted to rejoin the Lodge, until such back dues, to the time of his being struck off, shall be paid, in addition to the joining fee.
- 3. If any Officer of the Lodge shall neglect to attend any of the meetings, without giving at least one day's notice to the Master, he shall pay a fine of five shillings currency.
- 4. If any member of the permanent Committee shall neglect to attend, when regularly summoned, he shall pay a fine of two shillings and sixpence currency.
- 5. Any Officer of the Lodge, who shall not be present in the hall of the Lodge within thirty minutes after the appointed hour of meeting, shall pay the following fines, viz.:—The Master, two shillings and sixpence; the Wardens, Treasurer, Secretary, Deacons, Inner Guard, and Director of Ceremonies, two shillings each.
- 6. All fines levied shall be applied to the fund of benevolence.

## CHAPTER XVI.

#### Of Wisitors.

No Visitor shall be admitted into this Lodge unless he be known to, or satisfactorily vouched for by a member present, nor shall he be admitted when the Lodge is on private business, unless by the unanimous consent of the members present, and should he remain to partake of refreshment, he shall pay a fee of five shillings currency, and the member introducing him shall be responsible for the same.

## CHAPTER XVII.

## Lodges of Emergency.

Should a Lodge of Emergency be called on the general business of the Lodge, the expense shall be paid out of the general fund; but if, at the request of any Brother, for his benefit or progress, the expense shall be paid by such Brother, and the same shall not exceed three pounds ten shillings currency.

## CHAPTER XVIII.

### Of Motions.

No motion of any kind shall be regarded, unless duly seconded; and shall, in every instance, be reduced to writing.

### CHAPTER XIX.

## Of Members withdrawing.

Any member of this Lodge, having paid his dues, being desirous of withdrawing, shall make application in open Lodge, either personally or in writing.

#### CHAPTER XX.

# Of Furniture, &c.

The furniture, &c. of this Lodge shall, on no account, be removed to any other house, cases of extreme emergency excepted, until after a regular meeting, and a resolution of the Master and a majority of the Brethren, to that effect.

# CHAPTER XXI.

# Of altering By-Laws,

No alteration shall be made in these By-Laws but at a regular meeting of the Lodge, by motion in writing, to be handed up to the Master in the Chair, and if duly seconded, must be inserted in the proceedings of the Lodge; such motion shall be mentioned in the summonses for the next regular meeting, at which it shall be discussed, and the resolution of the Lodge entered thereon.

# EXTRACTS

#### FROM

# "THE BOOK OF CONSTITUTIONS,"

PUBLISHED BY THE AUTHORITY OF THE UNITED GRAND LODGE, IN 1841, BY WILLIAM HENRY WHITE, AS GRAND SECRETARY.

## Of Pribate Lodges.

I.—The Masonic Officers of a Lodge are the Master and his two Wardens, with their Assistants, the two Deacons, Inner Guard, and Tyler; to which, for the better regulation of the private concerns of the Lodge, are to be added a Treasurer, and Secretary, and other Officers, viz: a Chaplain, Master of Ceremonies, and Stewards may also be added.

II.—Every Lodge shall annually elect its Master and Treasurer by ballot, such Master having been regularly appointed and having served as Warden of a Warranted Lodge for one year, and, at the next meeting after his election, when the minutes are confirmed, he shall be duly installed in the Chair according to ancient usage, after which he shall appoint his Wardens and other Officers, except the Treasurer and Tylers. Tylers are chosen by the members of the Lodge.

N. B.—It is not essential, although very desirable, that a Brother should be present when appointed to any office, provided it be known that he will accept the same.

III.—No Master of the tavern or house, at which the Lodge meets, shall be appointed to or hold any office in the Lodge, without a dispensation from the Grand Master or the Provincial Grand Master.

IV.-Every Lodge has the power of framing By-Laws for its own government, provided they are not contrary to or inconsistent with the general regulations of the Grand Lodge. The By-Laws must be submitted to the approbation of the Grand Master, or the Provincial Grand Master, and when approved, a fair copy must be sent to the Grand Secretary, and in the case of a country Lodge, also to the Provincial Grand Master; and, when any material alteration shall be made, such alteration must, in like manner, be submitted. No law or alteration will be valid until so submitted and approved. The By-Laws of the Lodge shall be fairly written in a book. and shall be delivered to the Master on the day of his installation, when he shall solemnly pledge himself to observe and enforce them during his Mastership. Every Brother shall also sign them when he becomes a member of the Lodge, as a declaration of his submission to them, and every member shall at all reasonable times have access to such By-Laws, and be allowed to take copies thereof, if they are not printed for the use of the Lodge and delivered to the members.

V.—Every Lodge shall keep a book or books in which the Master or some Brother, appointed by him as Secretary, shall enter the names of its members and of all persons initiated or admitted therein, with the dates of their proposal, admission, or initiation, passing and raising; and also their ages, as nearly as possible, at that time, and their titles, professions, or trades, together with such transactions of the Lodge as are proper to be written.

The particular house or place of meeting, as well as the regular days of meeting of the Lodge, shall be specified in the By-Laws, and no meeting of the Lodge shall be held elsewhere, except a removal be decided upon in conformity with the laws enacted in that respect.

VI.—A Lodge of Emergency may, at any time, be called, by the authority of the Master, or, in his absence, of the Senior Warden, but on no pretence without such authority first given. The particular reason of calling the Lodge of Emergency shall be expressed in the summons, and, afterwards, recorded on the minutes, and no business but that so expressed, shall be entered upon at such meeting.

VII.—Every Lodge, when regularly removed to a new place of meeting, or whenever the day of assembling shall be altered, shall immediately send notice thereof to the Grand Secretary, and, if a country Lodge, also to the Provincial Grand Master. The Officers of a removed Lodge shall not be permitted to attend the Grand Lodge or Provincial Grand Lodge until such removal shall be properly notified.

VIII.—The precedency of Lodges is derived from the number of their constitution, as recorded in the books of the Grand Lodge. No Lodge shall be acknowledged nor its Officers admitted into the United Grand Lodge or a Provincial Grand Lodge, nor any of its members entitled to partake of the general charity or other Masonic privilege, unless it has been regularly constituted and registered.

IX.—Any Lodge which may not be distinguished by

a name or title, being desirous of taking one, must, for that purpose, procure the approbation of the Grand Master, or Provincial Grand Master, and the name must be registered with the Grand Secretary. No Lodge shall be permitted to alter its name without the like approbation.

X.—No Lodge can make a Mason or admit a member without strictly complying with all the regulations enacted for the government of the craft on these occasions.

XI.—No Lodge shall, on any pretence, make more than five new Brothers in one day, unless by dispensation; nor shall a Lodge be permitted to give more than one degree to a Brother on the same day; nor shall a higher degree in Masonry be conferred on any Brother at a less interval than one month from his receiving a previous degree, nor until he has passed an examination in open Lodge in that degree.\*

XII.—No other Lodge shall initiate into Masonry any non-commissioned officer or corporal belonging to a regiment or battalion to which a military Lodge is attached, nor shall any Lodge initiate any military person below the rank of a corporal, except as a serving Brother, or by dispensation from the Grand Master.

XIII.—No Lodge shall make a Mason for a less consideration than three guineas, exclusive of the registering fee, nor on any pretence remit or defer the payment of any part of this sum. The member who proposes any candidate must be responsible to the Lodge for all the fees payable on account of his initiation.

This is not to extend to the making of serving Breth-

ren, who may be initiated by the Lodge which they are to serve; provided that no fee or reward in such case be taken, and that a dispensation from the Grand Master or Provincial Grand Master be first obtained; but a Brother so initiated cannot be a member of the Lodge in which he was made a Mason, though eligible to become a subscribing member of any other Lodge, and upon being registered as a joining member of such other Lodge, and paying his contributions in like manner with other members, he is entitled to all the privileges and benefits of the craft. If, however, there be no other Lodge in the vicinity of his dwelling of which he can become a Member, he may be permitted to pay, through the Lodge in which he was initiated, the quarterly dues to the fund of benevolence, and after having served the Lodge and paid such dues for four years at least, may be considered eligible to be relieved in case of necessity, and entitled to the other privileges of the craft in the same manner as if he had been a regular subscribing member.

XIV.—Every Lodge must receive as a member, without further proposition or ballot, any Brother initiated therein, provided such Brother express his wish to that effect on the day of his initiation, as no Lodge should introduce into Masonry a person whom the Brethren might consider unfit to be a member of their own Lodge.

XV.—Every Lodge must be particularly careful in registering the names of the Brethren initiated therein, and also in making the returns of its members, as no person is regularly entitled to partake of the general charity unless his name be duly registered, and he shall have been at least two years a contributing member of a Lodge; except in the following cases, to which the limitation of

two years is not meant to extend, viz.:—shipwreck or capture at sea, loss by fire, or breaking or dislocating a limb, fully attested and proved.

To prevent injury to individuals, by their being excluded the privileges of Masonry, through the neglect of their Lodges, in not registering their names, any Brother, so circumstanced, on producing sufficient proof that he has paid the full fees to his Lodge, including the register fee, shall be capable of enjoying the privileges of the craft. But the offending Lodge shall be reported to the Board of General Purposes, and rigorously proceeded against for detaining monies which are the property of the Grand Lodge, and which had been paid to the Lodge for specific appropriation.

XVI.—All monies received or paid on account of the Lodge shall be entered in proper books. The fees or dues received on account of, and payable to, the Grand Lodge, or Provincial Grand Lodge, shall be kept separate and distinct from the monies belonging to the private fund of the Lodge, and shall be deposited in the hands of the Master instead of the Treasurer of the Lodge, and shall be transmitted to the Grand Lodge, or Provincial Grand Lodge, at such times as the laws of the craft require. The accounts of the Lodge shall be audited, at least once in every year, by a Committee to be appointed by the Lodge.

XVII.—Each Lodge shall procure for every Brother initiated therein, a Grand Lodge certificate, to be paid for by the Lodge.

XVIII.—No Lodge, or Officer or Member of a Lodge, shall, under any circumstances, give a certificate or recommendation to enable a Mason to proceed from Lodge

to Lodge as a pauper, or in an itinerant manner to apply to Lodges for relief.

XIX.—No Lodge shall form any public Masonic procession without a licence from the Grand Master, or a Provincial Grand Master.

XX.—All Lodges are particularly bound to observe the same usages and customs; every deviation, therefore, from the established mode of working is highly improper, and cannot be justified or countenanced. In order to preserve this uniformity, and to cultivate a good understanding among Free-Masons, some Members of every Lodge should be deputed to visit the other Lodges as often as may be convenient.

XXI.—If any Brother behave in such a manner as to disturb the harmony of the Lodge, he shall be thrice formally admonished by the Master; and, if he persist in his irregular conduct, he shall be punished according to the By-Laws of that particular Lodge, or the case may be reported to higher Masonic authority.

XXII.—No Lodge shall exclude any member without giving him due notice of the charge preferred or complaint made against him, and of the time appointed for its consideration. The name of every Brother excluded, together with the cause of his exclusion, shall be sent to the Grand Secretary; and, if a country Lodge, also to the Provincial Grand Master or his Deputy.\*

XXIII.—The jewels and furniture of every Lodge belong to, and are the property of the Master, Wardens, and Brethren of such Lodge; and the master of the house where the Lodge is held, shall have no property

therein or lien thereon; nor shall the master of any tavern or public-house be suffered to be the owner of the jewels or furniture of any Lodge, under the penalty of the forfeiture of the constitution. Nor shall any jewel be worn in a Lodge other than those specified for the Officers, except such honorary or other jewel as shall appertain to, or be consistent with, those degrees which are recognized by and acknowledged by and under the control of the Grand Lodge.

XXIV.—All minutes, lists, and books of account, belonging to a Lodge, must be produced by the Master, when he shall be so required by competent authority.

XXV.—The majority of the members of a Lodge, when congregated, have the privilege of giving instructions to their Master, Past Masters, and Wardens, before the meeting of the Grand Lodge; because such Officers are their representatives, and are supposed to speak their sentiments.

XXVI.—Each Lodge shall annually make a return to the Grand Secretary of the Masters, Wardens, and Past Masters of the Lodge, and including all members who claim to be entitled to attend in a Grand Lodge as Past Masters, as having served the office of Master in some other Lodge, specifying the Lodge in which each of such Past Masters has served the office of Master; and no Brother shall be permitted to attend in Grand Lodge unless his name shall appear in some such return.

XXVII.—Each Lodge shall make its returns and payments regularly to the Grand Secretary, according to the regulations under the heads London and County Lodges; and in case of neglect for one whole year to make such returns and payments, or if the Lodge do

not meet during that period, it is liable to be erased. The Master, Past Masters, and Wardens of a Lodge which shall have neglected for one whole year to make its returns or its payments to the Grand Lodge, are thereby disqualified for attending the Grand Lodge or sitting upon any Board or Committee until those returns and payments shall have been completed.

XXVIII.—If a Lodge be dissolved, the warrant shall be delivered up to the Grand Master, and shall not, on any account, be transferred without his consent.

XXIX.—If the warrant or constitution of a Lodge be sold, or procured by any other means than through the regular channel of petition to the Grand Master, or a Provincial Grand Master, such Warrant shall be forfeited, and the Lodge erased.

XXX.—As every warranted Lodge is a constituent part of the Grand Lodge, in which assembly all the power of the fraternity resides, it is clear that no other authority can destroy the power granted by a warrant: if, therefore, the majority of any Lodge should determine to quit the Society, or that Lodge, the constitution, or power of assembling, remains with the rest of the members, who adhere to their allegiance. If all the members of a Lodge withdraw themselves, their Warrant ceases and becomes extinct; and all the authority thereby granted, or enjoyed, reverts to the Grand Master.

XXXI.—If the Brethren holding a warrant for a Lodge render themselves unworthy of longer possessing it, the Grand Master may, after the Grand Lodge shall have decided on that fact, transfer such warrant to other Brethren, whom he may think deserving, with a new number, at the bottom of the Lodges then on re-

cord. But no Lodge shall be erased, or its warrant declared forfeited, until the Master or Officers shall have been warned, in writing, of their offence, and shall have been summoned to answer to the complaint made against them.

XXXII.—If any Lodge, or its Master and Wardens, be summoned to attend, or to produce its warrant, books, papers, or accounts, to the Grand Master or his Deputy, or the Provincial Grand Master or his Deputy, or any Board of general purposes or Board Committee authorized by the Grand Lodge, and do not comply, or give sufficient reason for non-compliance, a peremptory summons shall be issued; and in case of contumacy, such Lodge may be suspended, and the proceeding notified to the Grand Lodge.

XXXIII.—A Lodge offending against any law or regulation of the craft, to the breach of which no specific penalty is attached, shall, at the discretion of the Grand Lodge or any of its delegated authorities, or of a Provincial Grand Master, be subject to admonition, fine, or suspension.

If fine be the punishment awarded, it shall be, for the first offence, not less than one pound, nor more than five pounds; for a second offence of a similar nature, within three years, it shall be, not less than two, nor more than ten pounds; and if the Lodge shall refuse to pay the fine, or be guilty of a third offence, within three years of the second offence, the Lodge shall be liable to be erased, and to have its constitution forfeited.

All fines levied shall be applied to the general charity.

# Of the Masters and Wardens of Lodges.

I.-All preferment among Masons should be ground-

ed upon real worth and personal merit only, therefore no Brother shall be elected Master of a Lodge or appointed to any office therein, merely on account of seniority or rank. No Master shall assume the Master's chair until he shall have been regularly installed, though he may, in the interim, rule the Lodge.

It is necessary, previously to the installation of the Master, that the minutes of the preceding meeting of the Lodge should be read and confirmed, so far at least as to the election of the Master, after which the usual ceremonies of installation are to be performed. Should the minutes of the election of Master not be confirmed, then a summons must be issued for the following regular meeting of the Lodge, setting forth that the Brethren were again to proceed to elect a Master, and on the confirmation of the minutes of that election in the following ordinary meeting of the Lodge, the installation of the Master will follow.

II.—Every Master, when placed in the Chair, shall solemnly pledge himself to observe all the old-established usages and customs, and to preserve the land-marks of the order, and most strictly to enforce them within his own Lodge.

.III.—No Brother shall continue in the office of Master for more than two years in succession, unless by a dispensation, which may be granted by the Grand Master or the Provincial Grand Master in cases of real necessity; but he may be again elected after he has been out of that office one year.

IV.—The Master and Wardens of a Lodge are enjoined to visit other Lodges as often as they conveniently can; in order that the same usages and customs may be observed throughout the craft, and a good understanding be thereby cultivated amongst Free-Masons.

V. The Master is responsible for the due observance of the laws relating to private Lodges, and is bound to produce all books, minutes, and accounts, when required by any lawful authority.

V1.—If the Master should die, be removed, or be incapable of discharging the duties of his office, the Senior Warden, and in the absence of the Senior Warden, the Junior Warden, and in the absence of both Wardens then the immediate Past Master, or in his absence the Senior Past Master, shall act as Master, in summoning the Lodge, until the next election of officers. In the Master's absence, the immediate Past Master, or if he be absent the Senior Past Master of the Lodge present, shall take the Chair. If neither the Past Master nor any Past Master of the Lodge be present, then the Senior Warden, or in his absence the Junior Warden, shall rule the Lodge.

VIII.—The Master and Wardens of every Lodge shall attend the Grand Master or his Deputy, or the Provincial Grand Master or his Deputy, or any Board or Committee authorized by the Grand Lodge; and produce the warrant, minutes, and books, of the Lodge, when summoned so to do, under pain of suspension, and being reported to the next Grand Lodge.

IX.—The Wardens or Officers of a Lodge cannot be removed, unless for a cause which appears to the Lodge to be sufficient; but the Master, if he be dissatisfied with the conduct of any of his officers, may lay the cause of complaint before the Lodge; and if it shall appear, to the majority of the Brethren present, that the

complaint be well founded, he shall have power to displace such officer, and to nominate another.

# Of Members and their duty,

I.—No Brother shall be admitted a member of a Lodge, unless the laws of the craft, relating to the proposing and admitting of candidates, shall have been strictly complied with. (See proposing members.)

II.—A brother who has been concerned in making Masons clandestinely, or at a Lodge which is not a regular Lodge, or for small and unworthy considerations, or who may assist in forming a new Lodge without the Grand Master's authority, shall not be admitted as a member, nor even as a visitor, into any regular Lodge, nor partake of the general charity or other Masonic privilege, till he make due submission, and obtain grace.

III.—No Brother shall presume to print or publish, or cause to be printed or published, the proceedings of any Lodge, or any part thereof, or the names of the persons present at such Lodge, without the direction of the Grand Master, or Provincial Grand Master, under pain of being expelled from the order.

This law is not to extend to the writing, printing, or publishing, of any notice or summons, issued to the members of a Lodge, by the authority of the Master, or the proceedings of any festival or public meeting at which persons not Masons are permitted to be present.

V.—The majority of the members present at any Lodge duly summoned have an undoubted right to regulate their own proceedings, provided that they are consistent with the General Laws and Regulations of the craft; no member, therefore, shall be permitted to enter in the Minute Book of his Lodge a protest against

any resolution or proceeding which may have taken place, unless it shall appear to him to be contrary to the laws and usages of the craft, and for the purpose of complaining or appealing to a higher masonic authority.

VI.—If any member shall be excluded from his Lodge, or shall withdraw himself from it, without having complied with its By-Laws, or with the general Regulations of the craft, he shall not be eligible to any other Lodge, until that Lodge shall have been made acquainted with his former neglect, so that the Brethren may be enabled to exercise their discretion as to his admission. Whenever a member of any Lodge shall resign, or shall be excluded, or whenever, at a future time, he may require it, he shall be furnished with a certificate, stating the circumstances under which he left the Lodge; and such certificate is to be produced to any other Lodge of which he is proposed to be admitted a member, previous to the ballot being taken.

VII.—All differences between or complaints of members, that cannot be accommodated privately or in some regular Lodge, shall be reduced into writing and delivered to the Grand Secretary, who shall lay them before the Grand Master, or the Board of general purposes, or Committee appointed by the Grand Lodge, or to the Provincial Master if there be one. When all parties shall have been summoned to attend thereon, and the case shall have been investigated, such order and adjudication may be made as shall be authorized by the laws and regulations of Masonry.

VIII.—A Mason offending against any law or regulation of the craft, to the breach of which no specific penalty is attached, shall, at the discretion of the Grand Lodge, or any of its delegated authorities, or of a Pro-

vincial Grand Master, be subject to admonition, fine, or suspension.

If fine be the punishment awarded, it shall be, for the first offence, not less than one pound nor more than five pounds; for a second offence of a similar nature, within three years, it shall be not less than two nor more than ten pounds; and if a brother shall refuse to pay the fine, or be guilty of a third offence within three years of the second offence, he shall be liable to expulsion from the craft.

All fines levied shall be applied to the General Fund of Charity.

## Of Proposing Members.

Great discredit and injury having been brought upon our ancient and honorable fraternity from admiting members and receiving candidates, without due notice being given, or inquiry made into their characters and qualifications; and, also, from the passing and raising of Masons without due instructions in the respective degrees, it is determined that, in future, a violation or neglect of any of the following Laws shall subject the Lodge offending to erasure, because no emergency can be allowed as a justification.\*

I.—No Brother shall be admitted a member of a Lodge without a regular proposition in open Lodge, nor until his name, occupation, and place of abode, as well as the name and number of the Lodge of which he is or was last a member, or in which he was initiated, shall have been sent to all the members in the summons for the next stated Lodge meeting; at which meeting the Brother's Grand Lodge certificate, and also the certificate of his former Lodge is to be produced, and the

descision of the Brethren ascertained by ballot. When a Lodge has ceased to meet, any former member thereof shall be eligible to be proposed and admitted a member of another Lodge, on producing a certificate from the Grand Secretary, stating the fact and specifying whether the Brother has been registered and his quarterage duly paid.

II.—No person shall be made a Mason without a regular proposition at one Lodge, and a ballot at the next regular stated Lodge; nor until his name, addition or profession, and place of abode, shall have been sent to all the members in the summons.

In cases of emergency, the following alteration, as to the mode of proposing a candidate, is allowed. Any two members of a Lodge may transmit in writing to the Master the name, &c. of any candidate whom they may wish to propose, and the circumstances which cause the emergency; and the Master, if the emergency be proper, shall notify the said recommendation to every member of his Lodge, stating the name, age, addition or profession, and place of abode, of the candidate; and may, at the same time, summon a Lodge to meet at a period of not less than seven days from the issuing of the summons, for the purpose of balloting for the Candidate: and, if the Candidate be then approved, he may be initiated into the first degree of Masonry. The Master shall, previous to the ballot being taken, cause the said proposition, and the emergency stated, to be recorded in he Minute-Book of the Lodge.

3. No man shall be made a Mason in any Lodge under the age of twenty-one years, unless by dispensation from the Grand Master, or Provincial Grand Master. Every candidate must be a free man, and his own master, and, at the time of initiation, be known to

be in reputable circumstances. He should be a lover of the liberal arts and sciences, and have made some progress in one or other of them; and he must, previous to his initiation, subscribe his name at full length, to a declaration of the following import,\* viz.:

To the Worshipful Master, Wardens, Officers, and Members of the Lodge of No.

I, being free by birth, and of the full age of twenty-one years, do declare, that, unbiassed by the improper solicitation of friends, and uninfluenced by mercenary or other unworthy motive, I freely and voluntarily offer myself acandidate for the mysteries of Masonry; that I am prompted by a favourable opinion conceived of the Institution, and a desire of knowledge; and that I will cheerfully conform to all the ancient usages and established customs of the order. Witness my hand, this day of

Witness

- IV. No person can be made a Mason in, or admitted a member of a Lodge, if, on the ballot, three black balls appear against him. Some Lodges wish for no such indulgence, but require the unanimous consent of the members present; some admit one black ball, some two; the By-Laws of each Lodge must, therefore, guide them in this respect; but if there be three black balls such person cannot, on any pretence, be admitted.
- V. Every candidate shall, on his initiation, solemnly promise to submit to the constitutions, and to conform to all the usages and regulations of the craft, intimated to him in time and place convenient.

## Of the Lodge Seal.

Every private Lodge should have a Masonic Seal, to be affixed to all documents proper to be issued.

An impression of the Seal is to be sent to the Grand Secretary, and, also, by a country Lodge, to the Pro-

vincial Grand Master; and whenever changed, an impression of the new Seal shall, in like manner, be transmitted.

# Of Payments, &c.

A Provincial Grand Master shall pay three guineas for his patent, and twenty guineas to the fund of general purposes; and if he have not served the office of Grand Steward, an additional twenty guineas to the fund of benevolence. The twenty guineas to the fund of benevolence is not, however, to be paid by a Provincial Grand Master appointed to a colonial or foreign district, provided the Brother be resident in such district.

A Deputy Provincial Grand Master shall pay two guineas for registering his name in the books of the Grand Lodge. Granting a new warrant, five guineas; a warrant of confirmation, two guineas. Grand Lodge Certificates, six shillings and sixpence.

Registering Fee for a Mason made in a country, foreign, or military Lodge, ten shillings and sixpence; for a Brother joining a country, foreign, or military Lodge, he having been initiated in another Lodge, two shillings and sixpence.\*

It was resolved and ordered,

That, in consideration of peculiar circumstances, which have been represented on behalf of the Lodges in the Province of Upper Canada, and which are considered to apply to many other Lodges in His Majesty's North American Territories, wherein Provincial Grand Masters have been appointed, and Provincial Grand Lodges constituted, under the authority of this Grand Lodge; and further, in consideration of the expediency of establishing, in such Masonic Provinces, a regular system of Provincial Registry, as well as with a view of obtaining more regular returns of the Masons initiated in such Lodges, it be

## Of Certificates.

1. Every Brother shall be entitled to a Grand Lodge Certificate, immediately upon his being registered in the books of the Grand Lodge, for which Certificate the Lodge shall pay six shillings and six pence. Each Lodge, therefore, when it makes a return of the Masons whom it has initiated, shall, in addition to the register fee, make a remittance of the money for the Certificates.

RESOLVED.

1st,-That, in the different Masonic Provinces and Districts, within His Majesty's North American Territories, the Registering Fees shall be (in lieu of those at present required by the Constitution) for a Mason made in any Lodge; or for a Mason heretofore made, and not yet registered, the sum of ten shillings, current money of the said Provinces, or two Spanish milled dollars; and for a Mason previously registered in one Lodge joining another Lodge, the sum of five shillings, current money aforesaid, or one such milled dollar; such fees to entitle Masons, in such cases, to the benefit of registry in the books of this Grand Lodge, as well as in those of the Provincial Grand Lodge.

2d.—That the Master of each Lodge shall be answerable for the collection, safe keeping, and regular transmission of these fees, once at the least in each year, to the Provincial Grand Treasurer in each Masonic Province or District, together with proper Lists of the Members of such Lodge in duplicate, one copy of which shall be transmitted to the Grand Secretaries of this Grand Lodge, and the other shall be deposited with the Provincial Grand

Registrar.

· 3d,—That one equal moiety of the amount of such fees shall once at the least in each year, be remitted by such Provincial Grand Treasurer to the Grand Secretaries of this Grand Lodge, together with the said Lists of the Members of Lodges, in order to their names being registered in the books of the Grand Lodge; and that the other equal moiety of the said amounts be applied in such manner as each such Provincial Grand Lodge shall direct, to defray the expense of the Provincial registry. But that these payments shall not entitle the Brethren to receive Grand Lodge Certificates, but that Brethren requiring such Certificates must pay, in addition, the sum of six shillings and sixpence.

which may either be taken out of the initiation fee, or be charged separately to the Brothers for whom the Certificates are obtained, at the discretion of the Lodge.

- 2. Every Brother to whom a Grand Lodge Certificate is granted must sign his name to the margin thereof, or it will not be valid.
- 3. No Brother shall obtain a Grand Lodge Certificate if he shall have been admitted to more than one degree of Masonry on the same day, or at a shorter interval than one month from his receiving a previous degree. Every return, or other document upon which a Grand Lodge Certificate is to be issued, must specify not only the date of initiation, but also the days on which the Brother was advanced to the second and third degree, as the case may be.
- 4. All applications for Grand Lodge Certificates must be made to the Grand Secretary; and if the name of the Brother wishing for the Certificate has not previously been registered, the money payable on registration must be transmitted at the same time; as no Certificate can, on any account, be issued until such money has been paid.
- 5. A Brother, who shall have obtained a Grand Lodge Certificate of the first or second degree will, after he has advanced to a superior degree, be entitled to exchange such Certificate for one of the superior degree without any additional expense.
- 6. No Lodge shall grant a Private Lodge Certificate to a Brother, except for the purpose of enabling him to obtain a Grand Lodge Certificate, (in which case such Certificate shall be specifically addressed to the Grand Secretary); and except also such Certificates as may be required by the laws of the Grand Lodge,

or called for by any of its Boards or Committees. Nor shall a Lodge, under any pretence, make a charge for a Private Lodge Certificate.

# Of Regalia.

The following Masonic clothing and insignia shall be worn by the craft, and no Brother shall, on any pretence, be admitted into any Lodge without his proper clothing.

No honorary or other jewel or emblem shall be worn in any Lodge which shall not appertain to or be consistent with those degrees which are recognized and acknowledged by and are under the control of the Grand Lodge,

## JEWELS.

The above Jewels to be in silver. The collars to be light-blue ribbon, four inches broad: if silver chain be used, it must be placed over the light-blue ribbon.

#### APRONS.

Entered Apprentice—A plain white lamb skin, from 14 to 16 inches wide, 12 to 14 inches deep, square at bottom, and without ornament; white strings.

Fellow Crast—A plain white lamb skin, similar to that of the Entered Apprentice, with the addition only of two sky-blue rosettes at the bottom.

Master Mason—The same, with sky-blue lining and edging 1½ inch deep, and an additional rosette on the fall or flap, and silver tassels. No other colour or ornament shall be allowed except to officers and past-officers of Lodges, who may have the emblems of their offices in silver or white in the centre of the apron.

The Masters and Past-Masters of Lodges to wear, in lieu and in the places of the three rosettes on the Master Mason's apron, perpendicular lines upon horizontal lines, thereby forming three several sets of two right angles; the length of the horizontal lines to be two inches and a half each, and of the perpendicular lines one inch; these emblems to be of riband, half an inch broad, and of the same colour as the lining and edging of the apron. If grand officers, similar emblems, of garter-blue or gold.

#### Of Wisitars.

No Visitor shall be admitted into a Lodge, unless he be personally known, recommended, or well vouched for, after due examination by one of the Brethren present; and during his continuance in the Lodge he must be subject to the By-Laws of the Lodge. The Master of the Lodge is particularly bound to enforce these regulations.

A Brother, who is not a subscribing member to some Lodge, shall not be permitted to visit any one Lodge in the town or place where he resides more than once during his secession from the craft.
