YORK, U. C.
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P R E F A C E.

YORK, the Capital of Upper Canada, is beautifully situated near the head of Lake Ontario, on the North side of an excellent harbor, in Lat. $43^{\circ} 29'$ North, and Long. $79^{\circ} 36'$ West from the Meridian of Greenwich. York harbour is an elliptical basin of an area of 8 or 9 square miles, formed by a long sandy peninsula stretching from the land east of the Town to a point called Gibraltar Point, abreast of the present Fort, where the troops are stationed, from which it is about two miles distant, and upon it is a Light-House; thence it stretches towards the shore about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile, then dips under water, continuing in the same direction, carrying on it from 2 to 3 ft. of water, until within about 1,500 yds. of the shore; it then breaks off, dropping suddenly down from the spot where the Buoy is laid, to 13 ft., soon deepening to $14\frac{1}{2}$, the deepest bed of the channel, which is mud. Here ends the Peninsula sand, or Island as it is generally called.

The channel then gradually shoals towards the shore; at 13 ft. you strike rock, and 700 ft. from the shore you have 9 ft. water, leaving a channel from that depth out to the Buoy, about 815 ft. wide.* The Bay is about 3 miles across, having a small river, the Don, emptying into it at the east end.

On the Island or Peninsula, Mr. Knott has lately erected a manufactory for making starch, soap, &c; attached to which, is an hotel for the accommodation of parties of pleasure visiting the Island, and for whose convenience in getting there a boat has been established, propelled by four horses.

The town of York is laid out at right angles: the streets are spacious: the Main Street, called King street, runs through the centre of the Town, from east to west, and is $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile in length: the side-paths are well flagged, and an act was passed last Session for macadamizing the street; the Houses are partly built of wood, but many of them are of Brick and Stone; it contains the Public buildings of the Province, viz. The New Parliament buildings with the Government Offices attached, the Government House, the College of Upper Canada, the Hospital, the Upper Canada Bank, the Court House, and Gaol, a splendid hall called Osgoode Hall, for the Law society, a newly erected handsome stone Church of the Church of England Establishment, a Scotch Church, a Roman Catholic Church, and many other Churches and Chapels belonging to the different religious persuasions, all of which are described at length under the head Ecclesiastical Department folio 117 of this book. The Barracks are situated at the West end of the town, with a Battery which protects the entrance of the harbor.

The only outlets from the town are Yonge st. to the North, leading through the villages of Vaughan, Markham, King, Thornhill, &c. to Newmarket and Lake Simcoe, from whence there is a communica-

tion by Penetanguishine to Lake Huron. This being a route of much importance was greatly improved by the North West Company, for the double purpose of shortening the distance to the Upper Lakes, and avoiding any contact with the American Frontiers. The outlet from the Town to the East, is called the Kingston road, crossing the Don river about one mile from the Town over a handsome Bridge built by the present Governor Sir John Colborne; thence through Scarborough, Whitby, Cobourg, Port Hope, crossing the River Trent to Kingston at the Lower end of the Lake. The outlet to the West is Lot-street, continued by what is called Dundas street, crossing the river Humber about 7 miles from the Town, to Burlington Bay at the head of Lake Ontario and Dundas 52 miles from York: this is the direct road to the Canada Company's lands, the London and Western Districts.

The Town of York contained, according to a census taken by the compiler of this work in July of this year 1833, a population of from 8 to nine thousand inhabitants, (which population is more particularly described at the end of the work) composed of English, Irish, Scotch Native-born Upper Canadians, and a very few French Canadians.

When it is considered, that 40 years ago the site of York and the whole country to the north and west of it was a mere wilderness, the haunt of the savage, and of beasts hardly more savage, that sustained him in being. The splendid marks of growing opulence, which every where surround him, must strike the spectator with wonder and admiration, and certify to his mind that he beholds the nucleus of a great and powerful Empire.

York from its locality being the focus, to which converges the produce of an extensively surrounding country of immense fertility, thickly settled by a robust and industrious population, blessed with a salubrity of climate which braces and invigorates the human frame and stimulates to and sweetens labor, and being withal the seat of Government, whence is diverged the retributive and enriching streams of a rapidly increasing revenue, has acquired an impetus in a career of prosperity, to which it would be difficult to assign bounds.

In whatever direction the eye of scrutiny be turned, it luxuriates in the solid evidences of a well directed industry, and from the precosity of enterprise every where pre-eminently conspicuous in efforts to inspire with life and activity our inexhaustible fund of now inert wealth, mechanically conveys to the mind, anticipations of future consummations calculated to illustrate even the brightest pages of future histories of Commerce.

However unfavorable may be the prepossessions which have been imbibed by strangers from the misrepresentations of restless and insidious maligners of our Colonial Government, a short sojourn in the country is invariably so prolific in evidences of a thrift that shuns association with the bugbear of the whining and fretful demagogue, as to dispel alarm from the most timid, and sweep clean from prejudice the mind most pre-occupied with morbid discontent.

It is a self evident proposition, that man bestows not his cheerful toil on a land cursed by the exactions of the tyrant or oppressor; thus do the receding forests, the smiling farms, yielding their abundant crops the comfortable homestead, with on either hand the well replenished barn or fold-yard, garnished with life, in the full and broad proportions indicative of munificent and careful husbandry; the smiling, contented look of the proprietor, as he contemplates their increase, and counts the profit from their sale: the rapid transformation of the pri-

mitive Log Hut, into the spacious Frame House or doubly fortified brick or stone dwelling; the substantial and tasteful structures of the Towns and Villages, at once evidence of comfort, security, and opulence, and finally the prodigious capital expended in the magnificent means of transport upon our inland seas, collectively conspire to give unalloyed assurance that neither tyranny nor oppression hold for long in the land.

The administration of Sir John Colborne has thus far proved a brilliant era in the progress of this infant empire, his every act having been propitious to its advancement in knowledge, population and wealth. Long after his envious maligners are forgotten, will his revered name be associated with the existence of Upper Canada College, which has opened to our youthful generation the means of sound and useful education, and to His Excellency's continued efforts does the Province look with longing anxiety, for the foundation and ample endowment of the long projected University, an honor, it is fondly hoped, is not in reserve for a successor.

Conjoined with the paternal ministration of His Excellency, have been the efforts of the Canada Company, to promote the general prosperity, which have been attended with surprising success. They have pierced through the wilderness to the very shores of Lake Huron and have already been the founders of two towns, Guelph and Goderich; their extensive means have been elaborately and judiciously employed in providing a safe refuge for the burthensome population of the mother country, not only available to mete comfort to the afflicted of the present generation, but prospective of affluent independence to their posterity.

Among the several causes which have so largely contributed to our rapid improvement, it would be disingenuous to neglect assigning a due influence to the Bank of Upper Canada, which in as far as the Legislature has granted it the means, has by its judicious and liberal conduct contributed to the great result of inspiring universal confidence in the continuance of the rapid progressive improvement, now recorded with such heartfelt satisfaction. Additional aid to commerce and agriculture is anticipated from the branch of the sister institution, the Commercial Bank of the Midland District, wisely established in York, of which the direction so far has given an earnest of a desire to stint none of the efficiency its capital and charter have the power to impart.

In offering to the public this little work, a large indulgence is solicited. Although the most sedulous industry has been employed to make it as extensively useful as possible, it is not presumed that upon a first attempt a work of this nature can be quite perfect; in future editions, it is hoped the Compiler's labours will regularly improve in the estimation of a Public, whose good will by faithful service it is the height of his ambition to secure.—He has the honor to subscribe himself,

The Churches at St. Thomas and at London, in the London District, are at present without a Clergyman.

The income of the Clergymen from their hearers is upon an average, from twenty to thirty pounds per annum, besides their share of the Government appropriation, which diminishes in the ratio, that their number increase.

The sum total from Government is one thousand pounds divided between Clergymen and Teachers, exclusive of five hundred pounds which the Bishop receives annually.

The Clergy are twenty in number, namely, one Bishop and nineteen priests, and there are thirty-five Churches built and building.

There are Schools at Sandwich, Amherstburg, Guelph, Kingston, York, St. Andrews, St. Raphaels, and at Alexandria.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

NOTE.—The Doctrines and Rules of the Primitive Methodists, for private members, are the same as the Wesleyans, from whom they differ in some points of Church Government, viz. their District and Annual Conference being composed of two parts Laymen, and one part Travelling Preachers: this was intended to preserve a just equipoise of power, and unite all the intelligence and experience of their Society, in their Church Government,

A commodious Brick Chapel in Bay Street, York, has been lately finished, capable of holding 600 persons.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS OF THE YORK AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

Rule 1st.—This Society shall be denominated, the York U. C. Auxiliary Bible Society—having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz.—the circulation of the Bible without note or comment—to act in concert with the Parent Society, or separately as circumstances may require.

Rule 2nd.—The Society shall consist of all who are disposed to promote the object of the institution, without regard to difference of religious sentiments.

Rule 3rd.—Every subscriber of five shillings annually shall be considered a member as long as he pays his subscription.

Rule 4th.—A subscriber of five pounds, shall be a member for life. Donations of any amount, small or great will be thankfully received.

Rule 5th.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice Presidents, a Treasurer, two Secretaries, a Committee of twenty-seven of its own members, and a depository, of its Bibles. Nine of the Committee shall go out annually—and five shall be a quorum. Ministers of all denominations, who subscribe, shall be stated members of Committee.

Rule 6th.—The Committee shall meet on the second Mondays of February, May, August, and November, or when called by the chairman, or any three of the committee.

Rule 7th.—The Society shall meet annually, on the second week in February, in York. The day and hour to be fixed by the committee and advertised—at which meeting the committee shall give an account of their transactions and funds.

Rule 8th.—Every subscriber of one pound five shillings annually shall be entitled to purchase Bibles and Testaments, to the amount of five pounds, at the reduced prices of the Society.

Rule 9th.—The Committee shall be empowered to sell the Scriptures or to give them gratis when they find well authenticated claims. They are to purchase from the Parent Society to supply their wants, and if there are any overplus funds to spare, to remit the same to the Parent Society, for the purpose of supplying other nations with the pure word of God.

Rule 10th.—No alterations shall be made in these laws, but at a General Meeting of the Society.

This Institution owes its origin to Mr. Thomas Carfrae, jun., it comprises Six Acres of Ground, and has a neat Sexton's house built close by the gate; the name of the Sexton is John Weistencroft, who keeps a Registry of every person buried therein. Persons of all creeds and persons of no creeds are allowed burial in this cemetery, fees to the Sexton 5s. It was instituted in the fall of 1825 and incorporated by Act of Parliament 30 January 1826: it is managed by Five Trustees who are chosen for life; and in case of the death of any of them, a public meeting of the Inhabitants is called, when they elect a successor or successors in their place.

CELEBRATION OF MARRIAGES.

The Members and Officers of the Legislature not residing within 10 miles of York, during the Session are admitted to the News-room, on entering their names in the introduction-book.

All Strangers are permitted to frequent the Rooms for one Month, upon either a personal or written introduction by any subscriber.

The Room is open every day except Sunday, from 6 in the morning to 8 in the evening, from 1st April to 1st October; and from 8 in the morning until 10 in the evening from 1st October to 1st April.

The days of closing for those places three times per week are Mondays, Thursdays, and Saturdays :—for those twice per week, Mondays and Thursdays, except for Wilton, Camden East, Galt, Guelph, and Waterloo, which are made up on Tuesdays and Fridays :—and Cavan and Peterborough on Tuesdays and Saturdays.

Those made up once per week are on Thursdays, except Scarborough, Markham, and Stouffville, which are made up on Fridays.

NOTE.—Drummondville. U. C. is made up but twice per week in winter, viz. on Mondays and Thursdays. Mails for all Offices lying North, West, and South of York, including the United States, are closed at 11, A. M., and for all East at 4, P. M.

Letters can be sent, after the hours of closing, up to five minutes to 12 in the forenoon, and five minutes to 5 in the afternoon, on payment of threepence additional with each letter.

The Western and Southern Mails due daily, except Sundays, at 1 P. M.

The Northern Mails due on Wednesdays and Saturdays, at 1, P. M.

The Eastern Mail, due daily, except Mondays, at 7, A. M.

Letters for the United States must be paid to Lewiston; and such as are intended to go that way to Europe, must be paid to New York. Letters for Europe can be sent by way of Quebec, between the 20th of May and 1st of November, in merchant-vessels. They can be forwarded by Halifax (per Falmouth packet) and New York at any season.

The postage must be paid either way.

A letter with *one* inclosure is *double*; and with *two* or more inclosures, if it does not weigh an ounce, is *treble*.

Letters weighing an ounce are chargeable with *four single rates*; and for each quarter-ounce over that weight, a single rate is chargeable.

Colonial newspapers may be sent to Great Britain or Ireland either by way of Halifax or by way of New York. If sent by way of Halifax, the *sender* is not required to pay any postage;—if sent by way of New York, one and a half cent, or one penny currency, must be paid by the *sender* at the time of putting the paper into the Post-office. In either case, the *receiver* of the paper in Great Britain or Ireland has to pay threepence on its receipt. The average time which letters or papers for the Old Country take to reach their destination is, *via* New York, five weeks; *via* Halifax, three months. As papers sent by way of New York are sometimes mistaken, by the Post-office Department at home, for American or United States newspapers, which are not, in the present state of the law, allowed to pass through the Post-office on the same terms as Colonial papers, we would recommend such as are desirous of sending Canadian newspapers to their friends in the Old World, to address them in the following manner, recollecting always to leave one or both ends of the paper open:—

If addressed in this manner, and one penny paid at the time of putting it into the Post-office, there is no doubt of its reaching its destination.

When newspapers are sent from Great Britain or Ireland to these Provinces, three halfpence must be paid on each at the time of sending them, and then no postage is chargeable here : provided the paper is sent within seven days next after the day on which the same shall be published ; but if after the expiration of such seven days, such paper to be charged as a single letter. If the three halfpence be not paid by the sender, they are chargeable, on delivery here, with the same rate of postage as letters.

The expense of a letter to London from York, if sent by way of New York, is to the sender 2s. 0d. the postage to New York. The postage to the receiver in London is about 1s. 3d. depending upon the port the letter-bag is landed at.—No letters can be sent by mail out of these Provinces [except to certain public offices at home] unless the postage be paid to the port of embarkation, or to the Lines, if for the United States. Many letters and newspapers are lost to all concerned, from ignorance of these Regulations.

THE OFFICE AT YORK IS OPEN FROM 8 O'CLOCK, A. M., TO 7, P. M., DAILY, EXCEPT WHEN OPENING MAILS,—AND ON SUNDAY, FOR ONE HOUR, FROM NINE TO TEN, A. M.

TAXATION IN UPPER CANADA.

The general revenue, for the purpose of supporting the Government in Upper Canada, and administering of the laws is raised by a duty of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. on all goods and merchandise, imported by sea, at the ports of Quebec or Montreal.—Wines, liquors, and certain articles of luxury, have a specific duty laid upon them. This duty is paid by the importer, to the officer at Quebec, Upper Canada receiving one-third of the sum collected each year. This amount, with a duty upon shop and tavern licences for vending spirits, Distillers, Hawkers, Pedlars, and Auctioneers, and a duty upon certain imports from the United States, which are also paid by the importer, form the public resources of the Province, and is at the disposal of the Provincial Legislature, for the payment of public officers, and for such general purposes as may be deemed essential to the welfare of the people and interest of the Province.

NOTE.—The rate of Assessment in any District is limited to one penny in the pound, which when collected is paid into the District Treasury, and is applicable to local purposes within the District for which they are levied.

Every person possessed of a Waggon, Cart, or Team of Horses, Oxen, or beasts of burthen or draft used to draw the same, to work on the highways three days.

Every male inhabitant from 21 to 50, not rated on the Assessment Roll, is compelled to work on the highways three days.

Persons emigrating to this Province, intending to become Settlers, and not having been resident six months, are exempt ; and all indigent persons, by reason of sickness, age or numerous family, are exempt at the discretion of the Magistrates.

Any person liable may compound, if he think fit, by paying 5s. per day for each cart &c. and 2s. 6d. for each day's duty, to be paid within 10 days after demand made by authorized Surveyor, or the Magistrates can issue their distress for double the amount and costs.

Members of the House of Assembly for Townships are paid 10s. per day, during the sitting of the House, from an Assessment upon the inhabitants, apportioned according to the foregoing Assessment scale. Members for Towns are not paid.

A Police Tax of £100 per Annum is raised from the Inhabitants of York, according to the same Assessment scale.

TAVERN AND SHOPKEEPERS' LICENCES.

Persons keeping an Inn or Tavern must be licensed by the Magistrates, and the Licence costs Eleven Pounds Five Shillings per Annum. Penalty retailing without a Licence, £20.

Shopkeepers can take out a Licence which costs Five Pounds Three and Eightpence, for selling Spirituous Liquors, Wines, &c. in quantity not less than one quart.

Penalty for selling without a Licence, or in less quantity than one quart, Twenty Pounds.

REGULATIONS OF THE POUND AT YORK.

Persons allowing their pigs to run about the Town, are liable to a fine of ten shillings : if empounded, the pound-keeper's fee is one shilling, and one shilling and three pence per day for the pig's keep, and after three days to be sold.

Horses and Cows are not to be empounded unless trespassing : pound-keeper's fee 2s. 6d. and to be allowed 2s. 6d per day for keep : to be kept fifteen days & then sold : notice must be placed in 3 different public places, of the empounding, &c.

IMPROVING THE HARBOUR OF YORK.

An act was passed the 13th of February 1833, for granting Two Thousand Pounds for improving the Harbour of York, for re-payment of which a Toll is imposed upon the cargoes of vessels coming into the port of York and unladen within the same, and for wharfage on vessels lying under and protected by any work which may be constructed by the Commissioners, who are William Chisholm Esq., Hugh Richardson Esq., and James C. Chewett, Esq.

HORSE-BOAT TO THE ISLAND.

A boat propelled by four horses, called the Sir John of the Peninsula, runs every day from the Steam Boat Wharfs, to the starch factory on the Peninsula or Island, across the Bay: her trips regulated to suit public convenience.

Fare to and from the Island, 1s. 3d.

An Hotel has been opened on the Island, to accommodate sportsmen, parties of pleasure, &c.

MODE OF PROCURING LANDS BELONGING TO THE CROWN.
IN UPPER CANADA.

According to regulations of Government of the 27th May 1833, (except in the case of U. E. Loyalists, and other persons entitled by the existing regulations of the Government to free grants, no person can obtain any of the waste lands of the Crown, or of any of the Clergy Reserves, otherwise than by purchasing at the Public sales, made from time to time under the direction of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, and Clergy Reserves,—*The Hon. Peter Robinson.*

Note—For further particulars see Government advertisement at the end of the Book.

Persons applying for free grants of Land as U. E. Loyalists,* must address his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor by petition through his secretary.

The petitioner must take the oath of allegiance before one of the Commissioners appointed for that purpose, and a certificate of his having done so will be required to accompany his petition, likewise a certificate sworn before the Magistrates at the Quarter Sessions of the District where the petitioner resides, that he is the person he describes himself to be.

The petition, as soon as it shall have received his Excellency's order thereon, is referred to the Surveyor General for a report, which is transmitted to his Excellency the Lieut. Governor, and the Executive Council, for consideration and decision. His Excellency in Council having decided upon the petition, if the same be allowed, an order is made thereon and forwarded to the Surveyor General, when the petitioner may be forthwith located, subject to certain conditions annexed to his Location Ticket.

* U. E. Loyalists, or united Englishmen Loyalists, are those who, at the time of the separation of the United States from Great Britain, preserved their allegiance and fled into Canada. An Act of Parliament was passed afterwards, granting to the Heads of families and all their children, 200 Acres of Land each in whatever part of Canada they chose to fix upon.

The Locatee having complied with the conditions, is required to bring or send the necessary proofs thereof, accompanied by his Location Ticket, to the Surveyor General's office, that the same may be duly certified.

If the Grant be subject to any charges under the former regulations, they are to be paid, a portion to His Majesty's Receiver General, and a portion to the Special Receiver.

Having paid such charges as the Regulations require, the Locatee must deposit the Location Ticket and receipt with the Attorney General, who will issue his Fiat thereon, and a description of the Land being transmitted from the Surveyor General's department to the office of the Secretary of the Province, the Patent will then be perfected and registered, and be ready for delivery to the Grantee.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS IN THE ARMY AND
NAVY,

who have served in his Majesty's regular Army or Navy, and who may wish to avail themselves of the regulations issued in their favor for obtaining land in Canada, and which came into operation in August 1831.

No free grant of land is now made to officers; but upon their purchasing land, they are entitled in proportion to their rank and service, to a remission of the purchase money, according to the following graduated scale:

Field officers of 25 years' service and upwards	£300
Do. 20 years, do.	250
Do. 15 years' service or less	200

Captains, 20 years' service and upwards	£200
Do. 15 years' service or less	150
Subalterns 20 years' service or upwards	150

Officers of the Royal Navy or Marines are entitled to a similar remission of their purchase money. Officers wishing to avail themselves of these regulations, and being resident in the Province, should address a petition to the Lieutenant Governor in Council, stating their wish to become resident settlers in Upper Canada, their having served in His Majesty's Army or Navy, and their never having received any land from the Crown, in any of His Majesty's Colonies.

The petition must be accompanied by an affidavit of their having taken the oath of allegiance, and a verified statement of the services and testimonials of unexceptionable character from the Horse Guards or Admiralty.

When the Council have decided on the case, the Petitioners are located on any vacant lots of Crown land they may fix upon; but it is to be clearly understood, that no Patent or Deed will be issued to those who may receive location tickets, until it shall be ascertained by the Surveyor General that a resident settler is established on some part of the purchase.

INSTRUCTIONS

FOR SOLDIERS OR SAILORS, WHO HAVE SERVED IN HIS MAJESTY'S REGULAR ARMY OR NAVY.

Soldiers or Sailors becoming entitled to a grant of one hundred acres of land, must send a petition to the Lieutenant Governor in Council praying for the same, accompanying their petition with a certificate of their having taken the oath of allegiance, and their discharge. If the Council decide upon granting the petition, a Location Ticket (not transferable) will be issued, assigning the number of acres prayed for, free of fees, *subject to the condition of actual residence and cultivation of the land for three years*; at the expiration of which, a patent will be issued free of expense; but the Location Ticket will be cancelled, if it cannot be proved that the party has complied with the conditions.

Discharged Soldiers and Sailors cannot sell or otherwise dispose of their lands, until the Patent issues.

**INSTRUCTIONS
TO CLAIMANTS AS UPPER CANADA MILITIA.**

Officers and privates of Provincial Militia, having claims for land, are required to produce the necessary proofs to the Adjutant General of Militia, Col. N. Coffin, Office 66 Front st., near the Garrison, York, who being satisfied therewith, will issue a certificate to the Surveyor General, who will locate them accordingly.

THE LOCATION TICKET (not transferable) requires the conditions of *Actual Settlement* upon the grant.
