UNIVERSITY OF QUEEN'S COLLEGE,

The Trustees of Queen's College embrace the opportunity afforded by the publication of their annual statements and accounts, to lay before the venerable Synod of the Church, a brief Report on the position and prospects of the University. As each succeeding year adds to the number of our congregations, and to the vast extent of country over which they are as yet but thinly scattered, the friends of this branch of the Parent Church of Scotland cannot but regard with deepening interest the advancement and welfare of Queen's College. To the Church of Scotland, and especially to the fostering care of her Colonial Committee, the Presbyterians of Canada are indebted for many pious and able Ministers, but it is no disparagement of the assistance and sympathy so freely accorded, to say that for the future, our main dependence must be placed on the Institution over whose interests the Trustees have been appointed to watch.

The Trustees feel that lengthened arguments in behalf of Queen's College are superfluous when addressed to a Court which has so often urged their claims upon the attention of its adherents, and which numbers among its members an increasing number of Ministers who have gone forth from the College Halls to fill places of usefulness in the Church. The objects of this statement will be better attained by stating the present position of the College, and by endeavoring to show that, both as a School of Scientific learning, and as a Theological Institution, its sphere of usefulness has been enlarged.

fearning, and as a Theological Institution, its sphere of usefulness has been enlarged. It is with sincere pleasure that the Trustees are able this year to report a large encrease to the number of Students. At the close of the Session the state of the Roll was as follows:

being the greatest number ever matriculated in any one year at Queen's College. In addition to the Students enrolled in the Divinity Hall, 34 now in Arts, have announced their intention to prosecute their studies with a view to the Ministry. The Church can thus look forward to the services of 45 Ministers from the number of students at present on the Roll.

It is gratifying to find that the Synods of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are successfully encouraging young men within their bounds to study at Queen's College, as will be seen from the list appended to this statement, 12 Students have been thus received.

The office of Principal continues to be held by the Rev. Dr. Cook, whose services in that capacity the Trustees would gladly retain, were it possible to carry out such an arrangement. Deeply impressed with the importance of this office to the College and to the Church, the Trustees are using every endeavor to procure from Scotland a suitable Principal, and are now in correspondence with the Colonial Committee, and with parties at home, whose co-operation and advice have been solicited. The anxiety of the Trustees in regard to this matter will doubtless meet with the sympathy of the Synod, as it is not placing too high an estimate upon the importance of the office to say that whoever receives the appointment may influence, through his teaching and example, no small portion of our church during many years to come. The Trustees cannot allow an opportunity such as this statement affords to pass without bearing testimony to the ability and success of the Professors of Queen's College. Labouring under difficulties inseparable from carrying on the work in a country where the means of elementary education are beyond the reach of many students, each of these gentlemen has brought his class into a high state of order and efficiency. The recent examinations at the close of the Session, were such as to reflect high credit upon all who are charged with the laborious duties of the Professional Chair.

Since last meeting of Synod, Dr. George Lawson of Edinburgh has been appointed Professor of Chemistry and Natural History in the University, and the Trustees feel assured that his services will prove very beneficial to the Students of Queen's College, and will tend to give the Institution a higher standing than before among the schools of scientific learning in the Province.

The Treasurer's accounts appended to this statement, afford full information in regard to the Finances of the College. The revenue continues to be derived from the interest of funds safely invested in Bank Stock and other Securities, together with annual grants from the Legislature, the Temporalities Board, and the Colonial Committee. It is a matter of regret that the collections in aid of the fund for purchasing the present eligible site and building, have fallen so far short of the amount anticipated. At a cost of $\pounds 6,000$ the property was acquired, but not more than one-half of that sum has been collected.

Owing to rapid increase in the number of Students, the accommodation afforded by the old College Building has been found quite inadequate to meet the requirements of the University. Several larger class rooms were greatly needed, those formerly in use being over crowded and even unhealthy. After much deliberation, and confidently relying upon the liberality of the Church, the Trustees decided to expend a portion of their funded capital in the erection of a large building in rear of the College, a portion of which was used for the first time at the recent examinations. In addition to commodious class rooms, a large Hall for Divine service and for assembling the entire body of Students at examinations &c. has thus been provided, together with a suitable apartment for the museum in course of formation. The Medical Department, it is understood, are to pay a proportionate rent for the rooms appropriated to their use, but the large expenditure will still make a serious inroad upon the limited income of the College, and the Trustees therefore again respectfully appeal to the Synod and to the Church, for further aid to their building fund.

The Library of the College has received but few additions during the past year, the sum available for purchasing new books being very limited. Donations of suitable books will be gladly received by the Trustees, and acknowledged through the *Presbyterian*.

In older Universities at home, it has been found necessary to afford aid to deserving young men while prosecuting their studies, and in a new country such as Canada, the need of such assistance is even more urgent than in Scotland. Notwithstanding former appeals to the liberality of the Church, the Bursary Fund of Queen's College is still quite inadequate to meet the necessities of many students, and this deficiency has been a source of deep anxiety to the Professors and Trustees. Several Congregations have responded most liberally to the appeal made with the sanction of the Synod, and in some instances Bursaries have been endowed or promised. From a large portion of the Church, however, no response has been received, and the Trustees again venture to crave the approval of the Synod to a further effort for the supplementing of this most deserving scheme. During the summer one or more of the Professors will, it is hoped, be able to visit congregations of the Church with a view to laying before them the claims of the Bursary Fund.

The closing exercises of the College Session took place on Thursday, 28th April, in the new Hall of the University, when degrees were conferred on graduates in Arts and in Medicine, and a closing address was delivered by the Rev. Dr. Cook. Previous to these exercises, the various classes were examined by their Professors in presence of the Trustees, and ample opportunity was thus afforded of testing the attainments and comparative standing of the Students. Were proof needed of the usefulness of Queen's College, and of the high order of instruction communicated within her walls, such an occasion as this was well fitted to encourage the friends of the University, and no one could witness the promising body of young men then assembled, without solemn emotions of gratitude to Him who has sustained the Institution during many a season of trial, and is now bestowing upon it so large a measure of success.



A Statement of this Fund to 9th ult. accompanies the other accounts, then audited, of Queen's College, and submitted herewith. The above is a continuation of the same, which it was thought proper to submit also for the information of the Synod, being further payments made to Students on the orders of the Senatus, at the close of the Session.

at the close of the Session. It will be observed that the funds contributed were much short of what was required for those payments, which were only effected by a temporary advance obtained from the General Funds of the University. This, at the present time, when the Trustees have to dispose of a portion of their Funded Capital to provide means for the new buildings now in course of erection, was felt to be in-convenient; but in order to meet the exigencies of the case, it was made, in the confident hope that by the liberality of the Church it would be speedily made up. From the Report of the Trustees, it will be noted that a large accession to the numbers of those studying for the ministry last Session in Queen's College, may be expected in the next. This, whilst it calls for gratitude to God on the part of every well wisher of the Church, calls also for the exercise of the wisdom and prayerful consideration of the Synod, in devising and carrying out of measures, adapted not only to sustain but to increase this Fund, in the objects of which so much of the future prosperity and increase of our Church is involved. FACULTY OF ARTS.

JUNIOR LATIN CLASS.

Part of Livy, Book I. Virgil's Æneid, Book X. Horace's Odes, Books III and IV. Arnold's Latin Composition. Anthon's Latin Prosody.

SENIORS.—Euclid, Eleventh Book, 1—21, 33; Twelfth Book, 1, 2; Analytical, Plane, and Spherical Trigonometry (Snowball), with Application to Geodetical and Astronomical Problems; Whewell's Conic Sections; Differential and Integral Calculus. Numerous Exercises throughout the Session.

NATURAL PHILOSOPHY.

JUNIORS.—Earnshaw's Statics and Dynamics. Hydrostatics, Hydrodynamics, and Pneumatics. Numerous Exercises during the Session.

SENIORS.—Lectures on Electricity, Voltaic Electricity, Magnetism, Optics. Examinations on Herschell's Astronomy. Draper's Natural Philosophy, and Subjects of Lectures.

MORAL PHILOSOPHY AND LOGIC.

One hour for Lecture; the other hour of the day was devoted to examination on the Lecture previously heard, and to the reading of Essays. The Students were required to write an Essay each week, which was read and criticised in the class.

FACULTY OF THEOLOGY.

A daily Lecture each morning : an hour in the afternoon for examination and Essays.

ORIENTAL LANGUAGES.

I. HEBREW—Junior Class.—Elements of Grammar. Read from Genesis, Exodus, and Psalms. Written Translations from English into Hebrew.

Senior Class---Revised the Grammar. Read from Pentateuch, Psalms, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Joel, and Micah. Written translations from English into Hebrew.

II. CHALDEE.—Rigg's Manual. Read from Daniel and Ezra. III. SYRIAC.—Grammar. Read from Gospel of John.

BIBLICAL CRITICISM.

Read from the four Gospels in the original, and from Genesis in the Septuagint; Lectures; Examinations in Horne's Biblical Criticism and Interpretation. Essays from the Students.

CHURCH HISTORY.

16th and 19th Centuries; Lectures; Examinations in Mosheim's Ecclesiastical History. Essays from the Students.

THE Eighteenth Session of Queen's College will begin on the first Wednesday of October (5th October), 1859, st which date all Intrants and regular Students in the Faculty of Arts are required to be present.

The Divinity Classes will be opened on the first Wednesday in November.

Candidates for matriculation as regular Students of the first year will undergo an examination before the College Senate in the first three books of the Æneid of Virgil; the first three books of Cæsar's Commentaries, Mair's Introduction; the Greek Grammar; the first book of Euclid; and Arithmetic, as far as Vulgar and Decimal Fractions, and the Extraction of Roots, inclusive.

The only charges are £1 for Matriculation Fee ; £2 for each class per session, to be paid on admission to the classes; and £1 additional in the Natural Philosophy Class, for expenses of Apparatus.

Each Student on entering must produce a certificate of Moral and Religious Character from the Minister of the Congregation to which he belongs.

Intrants becoming candidates for Scholarships, will be required, in addition to the ordinary Matriculation Examinitions, to undergo an examination on the Greek Grammar and the first ten chapters of the Gospel of John. For Students of previous years the subjects of examinations for Scholarships will be those prescribed at the close of the session.

THE PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT, or College School, will be conducted as usual, under the charge of competent Masters.
