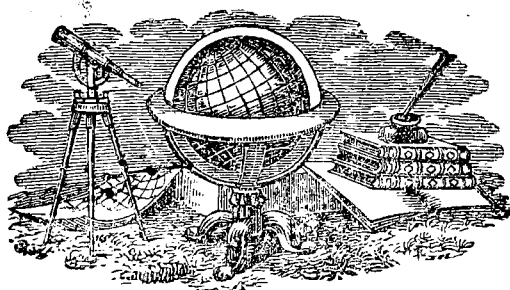

ECLIPSES OF 1842.

There will be five Eclipses this year, three of the Sun, and two of the Moon, in the manner following:—

I. The first will be an annular Eclipse of the Sun, Tuesday, January, 11th day, \odot at 11h. 34m., mean time, in the forenoon, or morning; invisible here: \odot 's lat. 48 m. 11 s. South, ascending, or tending North.—Central annular Eclipse on the Meridian, in the Antarctic Ocean, at 11h. 19m. A partial Eclipse will be visible at the Cape of Good Hope, in which about three fourths of the Sun's disc will be covered, at 6h. 56m. 42s., mean time, evening, at the Cape. It will pass over the Southern and South Pacific Oceans.

II. The second will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, Wednesday, January 26th day, \odot at 1h. 9m. mean time, afternoon; and invisible to us: it will begin at 11h. 34m., mean time, forenoon; middle 1h. 3m. afternoon: end, 2h. 31m.; and digits eclipsed, 90 deg. 56m., from E. side of \oplus 's shadow

III. The third will be a total Eclipse of the Sun, Friday, July 8th day, \odot at 2h. 20m. 30s., mean time, morning; invisible here: \odot 's lat. 23m. 20s. N. descending, or tending S.—Central and total Eclipse on the Meridian, a little southeasterly of the town and fortress of Omsk, in Russia, at 2h. 16m. A partial Eclipse will be visible in the British Isles, in which from half to two thirds of the Sun's face will be hidden. It will pass over part of Europe, Africa, and Asia.

IV. The fourth will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, Friday, July 22d day, \odot at 6h. 17m., mean time, morning; and invisible to us: it will begin at 5h. 2m., mean time, morning, or about 24m. after setting to us; middle, 6h. 7m.; end, 7h. 10m.; and digits eclipsed, 3 deg. 28m., from N. side of \oplus 's shadow.

V. The fifth will be an annular Eclipse of the Sun, Saturday, Dec. 31st day, \odot at 2h. 22m., mean time, afternoon, or evening; invisible here: \odot 's lat. 9m. 46s. S. ascending or tending N.—Central and Annular Eclipse on the Meridian, a little southeasterly of Easter Island, in the South Pacific Ocean, at 2h. 22m. It will pass over the South Pacific Ocean and South America.

Morning and Evening Stars of 1842.

The Planet Venus (\diamond) will be *Morning Star* till March 5th; then *Evening Star* till December 18th; then *Morning Star*.—Jupiter (♃) will be *Morning Star* till July 10th; then *Evening Star* to the end of the year.—Mars (♂) *Evening Star* till June 25th; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.—Saturn (♄) will be *Morning Star* till July 3d; then *Evening Star* to the end of the year.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Commissioners for Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—John Ward, senr., Robert W. Crookshank, Thomas Barlow, John Ward, junior, Lauchlan Donaldson, and W. F. W. Owen, and I. Woodward, Esqrs.

Commissioners for Partridge Island and the Beacon Light Houses.—John Ward, senr., and Lauchlan Donaldson, Esquires.

L. Donaldson, Esq., Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick; and also of those belonging to Nova Scotia, which are partly supported by New Brunswick.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about 2 miles S. S. W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed side of the Digby Gut—from Brier Island N. Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. The Lamps and Lanterns were renewed in the Spring of 1835, and reflectors furnished, so that this Light is in high order.—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 21 miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles.

Bearings from the Gannet Rock Light House—

To the Old Proprietor, which dries at $\frac{1}{2}$ ebb; (very dangerous), E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. 7 miles.

- " Black Rock, (always above water 25 feet) off White Head, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.
- " South West Head of Grand Manan, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.
- " Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, (dry at two thirds ebb), N. W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.
- " Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, (always out of water), S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.
- " Machias Seal Island Lights, distant about 13 miles, W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about eight miles, lies a dangerous breaker called the Roaring Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.—The red glass having been removed from the Lantern, there is now a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute.—The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Two fixed *white* lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, were put into operation in 1832—they were elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American)—the following are the bearings from them, viz:

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.
- " Gannet Rock Light E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing into the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan, and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy: it enables vessels at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, and distant 28 feet.—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and *white*. In consequence of orders from the Home Government, this Light was, in 1840, painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally, in order that it may be seen more distinctly at a distance.

Partridge Island Light.—This light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty

years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Cape Forchu Light.—The Light House on Cape Forchu, on the W. side of the entrance to Yarmouth, (Nova-Scotia,) in lat. 43, 39. N. long. 66 8, West, was put in operation on the 15th January, 1840, and exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage.—A new Light House, nearly opposite to Apple River Harbour. A plain *white* light. The House is painted white, and about 120 feet above tide mark.

The half of the expense of the Cape Sable and Brier Island Lights is paid by New Brunswick, as they are so highly useful to vessels trading with this Province.

West Quiddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport; a new light house has lately been erected here, and the light much improved.

Light Houses in Nova Scotia—in addition to those previously noticed.

Sambro—Sambro Island, mouth of Halifax Harbour—a fixed Light.

Roseway—M'Nutt's Island, mouth of Shelbourne Harbour—two Lights, one above the other.

Liverpool—Coffin's Island, mouth of Liverpool Harbour—one revolving Light.

Canso—Island, Gut of Canso, two Lights, one above the other.

Halifax—Meagher's Beach, Halifax—one Light.

Pictou—Entrance to Pictou Harbour—one fixed Light, for eight months in the year.

Cross Island—Cross Island, near Lunenburg.

Low Point—Entrance to Sydney Harbour—one fixed Light.

SIGNALS

Displayed at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John:

One ball close, for one square-rigged Vessel.

One ball half hoisted for two ditto.

Two Balls close, for three	Vessels.
Two Balls separated, for four	ditto.
A Pendant of any colour, for five	ditto.
A ditto under a Ball, for six	ditto.
A ditto over a Ball half hoisted, for seven	ditto.
A ditto under two Balls close, for eight	ditto.
A ditto under two Balls separate, for nine	ditto.
A Flag of any colour, for ten or more	ditto.

The above are displayed at the East or West yard arm, according to the direction in which the Vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their use can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast head, in the following order :

A Union Jack, with a white Pendant over, for a small armed vessel.

A blue Pendant for a Merchant Ship.

A red ditto, for a Merchant Brig.

A white and blue ditto, for a Foreign Vessel

A white ditto, (without a ball,) for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.

A red Flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews and Eastport.

A Ball at the mast head, Vessel is on Shore or in distress.

☞ Should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In foggy weather a gun will be fired from Partridge island, in return for each heard at sea. Should a vessel require a Pilot her descriptive Pendant will be displayed at a yard arm the place of a Ball.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS, NEAR SAINT JOHN.

The Falls are level (or still water), at about $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours on the flood, and about $2\frac{1}{2}$ on the ebb, which makes them passable four times in twenty four hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time.—No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed July 1835.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British or Foreign Steam Boats, or British Vessels, drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take Pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred, and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

AGRICULTURAL INFORMATION.

A Test for Sound Seed Potatoes.—From the now general diseased state of the potatoe, it appears to us that there is only one way to test the seed before planting, which, if properly attended to, will prevent those melancholy results that may be anticipated in the crop. It is this: select from the potatoes proposed for seed, a dozen or two; cut them with a sharp knife into sets, then put them on the floor of a potatoe house, or any other place free from damp, with the skin next the floor; if, upon examining them three or four days after, it should be found that the incision has dried up, and is covered with a kind of new skin, be assured that the seed is wholesome—plant it. But if, on the contrary, the wound is found to be wet, sluggish, and spotted, touch not the unclean thing, but be certain that the constitution of the potatoe is exhausted. This experiment should not be tried until vegetation has completely taken place, say about the middle of April."

Potatoe Blossoms—I was induced to try the experiment, whether plucking of the flower before any balls were formed, would increase, or diminish its productiveness. It may not be improper to preface my remarks that for several years past, there has been a disease in our seed, which has subjected the potatoe to the *dry rot*, and it has been recommended in the report made by the Agricultural Society lately formed here, and by the most skilful agriculturalists, that the most effectual remedy that can be adopted to eradicate it, "is to plant the potatoe whole;" but as it is impossible to persuade every one to adhere to this principle, we shall, I fear, be still subject to it. The potatoe

I selected for the experiment was the white kidney (early sort) grown from the apple by the late John Young, Esq., and of course planted *whole*. The following are the particulars and the result. I selected two rows in my field along side each other, 39 feet long, each planted at the same time, the same manure, and the same seed, distance potatoe from potatoe 10 inches. When I received your paper, the blossoms had just opened. One row I plucked off the blossoms, and on the other I suffered the flower to exist. I dug them yesterday, and the product was as follows:

The row on which the blossoms remained, produced 61 lbs. potatoes.

The row from which I plucked the blossoms, produced 71 lbs. potatoes, not so numerous as the former, but much *larger*, so that it appears the latter has yielded an increase of *one sixth*—and of better quality.

Like yourself, I do not pretend to understand the philosophy of it, but the accuracy of the foregoing statement you may rely upon, but let us remember, that the laws of nature are not yet, nor never will be understood; the common place opinion however here is, that by taking off the blossom, it throws the strength of the plant to the root, and they justify this opinion, by reference to the lopping off the branches of a young tree, which causes it to spread, and throw out more bush at the bottom.

If this experiment, made upon a small scale, yet applicable to a general principle, can elicit any useful information to the farmer I shall be much gratified.—*New-England Farmer*.

MISCELLANEOUS.

WE understand that the Bath census reveals one astonishing fact, namely, that of all the unmarried spinsters there, scarcely one has grown a year older since it was last taken! Not a few bachelors, too, still stick at the same age which they owned in 1831!

There are 30,000 persons in Georgia over 20 years of age, who cannot read. New England Education does not appear to have been the rule down South.

Palestine.—The following masterly view of the impression made on the mind of a christian visiting the Holy Land is from the pen of Chateaubriand. Extraordinary appearances (says he,) everywhere proclaim a land teeming with miracles. The burning sun, the towering eagle, the barren fig-tree, all the poetry, all the pictures of Scripture are here. Every name commemorates a mystery, every grotto announces a prediction, every hill re-echoes the accents of a prophet. God himself has spoken in those regions, dried up rivers, rent the rocks, and opened the grave. The desert still appears mute with terror; and you would imagine that it had never presumed to interrupt the silence since it had heard the awful voice of the ETERNAL.

What is Death?—The laws of nature are all directed by wisdom, for the purpose of preserving life and increasing happiness. Pain seems, in all cases, to precede the mutilation or destruction of those organs which are essential to validity, and for the end of

preserving them; but the mere process of dying seems to be falling into a deep slumber; and in animals, who have no fear of death dependent upon imagination, it can hardly be accompanied by very intense suffering. In the human being moral and intellectual motives constantly operate in enhancing the fear of death, which without these motives in a reasoning being, would probably become null, and the love of life be lost on every slight occasion of pain or disgust; but imagination is creative of respect to both passions, which, if they exist in animals, exist independent of reason, or as instincts. Pain seems intended by an all-wise Providence to prevent the dissolution of organs, and cannot follow their destruction. I know several instances in which the process of death has been observed, even to its termination, by good philosophers; and the instances are worth repeating:—Dr. Cullen, when dying, is said to have faintly articulated to one of his inmates, “I wish I had the power of writing or speaking, for then I would describe to you how pleasant a thing it is to die.” Dr. Black, worn out by age, and a pulmonary hemorrhage, which obliged him to live very low, whilst eating his customary meal of bread and milk, fell asleep, and died in so tranquil a manner, that he had not even spilt the contents of the spoon which he held in his hand. And the late Sir Charles Blagden, whilst at a special meal with his friends, Monsieur and Madame Berthollet and Guy Lussac, died in his chair so quietly, that not a drop of the coffee in the cup which he held in his hand was spilt.

THERE is no learned man but will confess he hath much profited by reading controversies, his senses awakened, his judgment sharpened, and the truth which he holds more firmly established. If then it be profitable for him to read, why should it not at least be tolerable and free for his adversary to write? In logic, they teach that contraries laid together more evidently appear: it follows then, that all controversy being permitted, falsehood will appear more false, and truth the more true; which must needs conduce much to the general confirmation of an implicit truth.

Smart Reply.—A short time ago, as a boy was riding a horse to the fair at Barnsley to sell, he was accosted on entering the town by a sprig of a dealer, who called out in a consequential tone, “Why, Jack, that horse you’re riding is badly, look what a white face hee’s gettan.” “Hey,” said the lad, breaking off whistling, “an yod hev a white face too, if yod look’t through a helter az long az it hez.”

Horticulture.—[By Mrs. Sigourney.]—If the admiration of the beautiful things of nature has a tendency to soften and refine the character, the culture of them has a still more powerful and abiding influence. It takes the form of an affection. The seed which we have sown, the bud which we have nursed, the tree of our planting, and under whose shade we sat with delight, are to us as living and loving friends. In proportion to the care we have bestowed on them, is the warmth of our regard. They are gentle and persuasive teachers of His goodness, who causeth the sun to shine and the dew to distil, who forgets not the tender buried vine amid the snows and ice of winter, but bringeth forth the root long hidden from the sight of man, into vernal splendour, or autumnal fruitage.

The learned among the works of nature are of peculiar value in the present age. The restlessness and din of the railroad principle which pervades its operations, and the spirit of accumulation which threatens to corrode every generous sensibility, are modified by the sweet friendship of the quiet plants. The toil, the hurry, the speculation, the sudden reverse, which mark our own times, beyond all that have preceded them, render it peculiarly salutary for us to heed the admonition of our Saviour, and take instruction from the lilies of the field, those peaceful denizens of the bounty of Heaven.

Horticulture has been pronounced by medical men salutary to health and to cheerfulness of spirits; and it would seem that the theory might be sustained, by the placid and happy countenances of those who use it as a relaxation from excitement of business or study. And if he who devotes his leisure to the culture of the works of nature, benefits himself; he who beautifies his garden for the eye of the community is surely a public benefactor. He instils into the bosom of the man of the world, panting with the gold-fever, gentle thoughts; which do good, like a medicine. He cheers the desponding invalid, and makes the eye of the child brighten with more intense brightness. He furnishes pure aliment for that taste which refines character and multiplies simple pleasures. To those who earn their subsistence by labouring on his grounds, he stands in the light of a benefactor. The kind of industry which he promotes is favourable to simplicity and virtue. With one of the sweetest poets of our mother-land, we may say—

“Praise to the sturdy spade,

And the patient plough, and the shepherd's simple crook.
And let the light mechanic's tool be hailed
With honour, which encasing by the power
Of long companionship, the labourer's hand,
Cuts off that hand, with all its world of nerves,
From a too busy commerce with the heart.”

Important in Surgery—The New-York Herald says—"An important operation for the cure of stammering has been successfully performed by Dr. Schmidt, of Warren-street. The cause of stammering, it may not be generally known, is a convulsive motion of the genio hyoglossus muscle, which attaches to the tips of the tongue and the inner surface of the under jaw bones. The cure is performed by dividing this muscle, which was done instantly and with perfect safety. Dr. S. enjoys the credit of being the first to perform this operation in our country. It was performed in the presence of several medical gentlemen, among whom was the distinguished Dr. Mott, who assisted in the operation."

A Circassian Slave—I was very much struck with the beauty of one of the slaves, who brought in coffee and sherbet. She was a Circassian, and, I should think, the very perfection of height and proportion. She had a fair, clear, and beautiful texture of skin with a mild and dignified expression of countenance, to which it is impossible, by description to do justice; in regularity and cast of features, a good deal resembling the late Mrs. Arbuthnot. She wore a yellow turban, and a partial drapery of the deep blue of a Raphael picture. Her arms were of beautiful form, and crossed, resting on the shawl folded round her waist, which gave her the classical *pose* one sees in antique sculpture, and which so few of the European artists have the good fortune to copy. I never so much wished to draw, and be able thus to convey the *beau ideal* of female refined beauty.

Enjoyment.—When I walk the streets, I use the following natural maxim, (viz: that he is the true possessor of a thing who enjoys it and not he that owns it without the enjoyment of it,) to convince myself that I have a property in the gay part of the gilt chariots that I meet, which I regard as amusements designed to delight my eyes, and the imagination of those kind people who set in them gaily attired only to please me. I have real, and they only an imaginary pleasure from their exterior embellishments. Upon the same principle, I have discovered that I am the natural proprietor of all the diamond necklaces, the crosses, stars, brocades, and embroidered clothes, which I see at a play or birth night, as giving more natural delight to the spectator than to those that wear them. And I look on the beaux and ladies as so many paroquets in an aviary, or tulips in a garden, designed purely for my diversion. A gallery of pictures, a cabinet, or library, that I have free access to, I think my own. In a word, all that I desire is the use of things, let who will have the keeping of them. By which maxim I am growing one of the richest men in Great Britain; with this difference, that I am not a prey to my own cares, or the envy of others.

Manzoni.—The Italian seems to indemnify himself for not roving over the world by walling in a little world of his own, which he calls a house. We were shown through a suit of empty apartments to the drawing-room, where we found Manzoni, his mother, wife, and children, and all the shows, and appliances of comfortable domestic life. Manzoni is a little past fifty, with an intellectual and rather handsome face, and a striking expression of goodness. He

was cordial in his manner, and frank and fluent in his conversation. He and his mother (the daughter of Beccaria,) a superb looking old lady, expressed an intelligent interest in our country, and poured out their expression of gratitude for what they were pleased to term our kindness to their exiles, as if we had cherished their own lost children. He told some interesting anecdotes of Beccaria. He said he was so indolent, he never wrote without being in some sort forced upon it; that his celebrated essay on criminal law was procured by the energetic management of a friend who invited him to his house, and locked him up, declaring he should not come out till he had written down his inestimable thoughts on that subject. Beccaria good naturedly acquiesced, and the work was actually finished in his friendly prison."—*Miss Sedgwick's Letters.*

An Apothecary too Honest.—A gentleman telling a lady, that a certain apothecary had failed, she inquired the cause; to which the other replied, he was so honest a man, that, instead of loading his patients with physic, he advised them to take the air and exercise, as being better for them than drugs. "Poor man, (said the lady,) it is plain he could not live by the air, though his patients might."

An enlightened Corporation.—The city council of Cincinnati have hit upon an economical plan of lighting that city. They have passed an ordinance requiring each coffee-house to set up a lamp post in front, and keep it lighted at night; and in order to have the whole city illuminated, they have increased the number of licensed houses. One of the papers of that city compliments the guardians upon the ingenuity of the plan, and observes that whenever a grog drinker or a julep sipper goes into a coffee-house, he may indulge in no small self-congratulation upon the amount of light he distributes to the city. He lightens his purse, he lightens his understanding, he lightens his character, and he lightens the streets!—His fellow citizens may look upon him as a great enlightener!

A Phenomenon.—The Germantown Telegraph states, that on the night of the 12th inst. when the stars were in "full-orbed splendour," and not the smallest cloud visible in any direction more than seven and a half degrees above the horizon, and no sensible breath of air in motion, Fahrenheit's thermometer at 58 degrees, a gentle shower of rain fell for more than ten minutes!

RECIPES, &c.

The Nettle.—The nettle is generally considered by farmers and gardeners as a useless and troublesome weed; but it needs little argument to prove that the most common gifts of Providence are often the most useful to mankind. The common stinging nettle is one of the best medicines which is produced in the vegetable kingdom; and its medical qualities ought to be more generally known and appreciated. In the form of a simple, weak infusion, taken in the quantity of a pint a day, it acts as an alterative and deobstruct in impurities of the blood. A strong decoction taken in the same quantity proves an admirable strengthener in general or partial relaxation. Applied as a fomentation or poultice, it relieves swellings, and abates inflammations; and the expressed juice taken in spoonfuls, as the exigency of the case may require, in internal bleedings, is the most powerful styptic known. We may add, that its leaves, when boiled, are converted into a tender, healthy, and nourishing aliment, grateful to the palate. And yet there are few plants whose appearance is viewed by the farmer with more disgust than the stinging nettle.

Chloride of Soda, is said, in the London Lancet, a medical work, to be an effectual cure for a burn. It is stated in that journal, as an example, that an attorney, in attempting to put out the flames that had attacked the curtains of his bed, got his hands burned and blistered, but not broken. He sent for a couple of quarts of the lotion, four ounces of the solution to a pint of water, had it poured into soup plates, wrapped his hands in lint, as no skin was broken, and so kept them for some time. Next morning he was so perfectly well that only one small patch of burn remained, yet an hour had elapsed before the application. It is added that the same remedy is sufficient to heal scalds and a black eye.

Cure for Cancer.—Mr. Thomas Tyrrrel, of Missouri, says he has effectually cured himself of an obstinate cancer, "by the free use of potash made from the ashes of red oak, boiled to the consistence of molasses, used as a poultice, covering the whole with a coat of tar. Two or three applications will remove all protuberances, after which it is only necessary to heal the wound with common salve."

Simple Remedy to Purify Water—It is not so generally known as it ought to be, that pounded alum possesses the property of purifying water. A large table spoonful of pulverised alum, sprinkled into a hogshead of water (the water stirred round at the time,) will, after the lapse of a few hours, by precipitating to the bottom the impure particles, so purify it, that it will be found to possess nearly all the

freshness and clearness of the first spring water. A pailful, containing four gallons, may be purified by a single tea-spoonful.

As the dove will clasp its wings to its side, and cover and conceal the arrow that is preying upon its vitals, so is the nature of woman to hide from the world the pangs of wounded affection.

It is proper for all to remember, that they ought not to raise expectations which it is not in their power to satisfy, and that it is more pleasing to see smoke brightening into flame, than flame sinking into smoke.

Every Day Happiness.—Occupation and a clear conscience, the very truant in the fields will tell you, are craving necessities. But when these are secured, there are higher matters, which to the sensitive and educated at least, are to happiness what foliage is to a tree. They are refinements which add to the beauty of life without diminishing its strength; and, as they spring only from a better use of our common gifts, they are neither costly nor rare. Many have learned secrets under the roof of a poor man, which would add to the luxury of the rich. The blessings of a cheerful fancy and a quick eye come from nature, and the training of a vine may develop them as well as the curtaining of a king's chamber.

PHYSIC, for the most part, is nothing else but the substitute of exercise or temperance.

Chastity.—How large a portion of chastity is sent out of the world by distant hints—noddled away, and cruelly winked into suspicion by, the envy of those who are past all temptation of it themselves. How often does the reputation of a helpless creature bleed by a report—which the party, who is at the pains to propagate it, beholds with much pity and fellow-feeling, that she is heartily sorry for it—hopes in God it is not true; however, as Archbishop Tillotson wittily observes upon it, is resolved, in the mean time, to give the report her pass, that at least it may have fair play to take its fortune in the world—to be believed or not, according to the charity of those into whose hands it shall happen to fall.

To Cure a Burn.—A Lady in the Knoxville Register, gives the following recipe for a burn:

"Take a table spoonful of lard, half a spoonful of spirits of turpentine, and a piece of rosin as big as a hickory nut, and simmer them together till melted. It makes a salve, which when cold, may be applied to a linen cloth and laid over the burn. If immediately wanted, spread it on a cloth as soon as melted—it will very soon cool. I have seen it applied after the corroding effects of chemical poison, after a foot has been burned by boiling sugar, after severe scalds, and in every case the sufferer obtained perfect ease in ten or fifteen minutes after it was used. It may be applied two or three times a day, or as often as the cloth becomes dry."

Sound travels at the rate of 1,1342 feet per second in the air, 4,960 in water, 11,000 in cast iron, 17,900 in steel, 18,000 in glass, and from 4,636 to 17,000 in wood.

Mercury freezes at 38 degrees, Farenheit, and becomes a solid mass, malleable under the hammer.

The greatest height at which visible *clouds* ever exist does not exceed ten miles.

Air is about 16 times lighter than water.

The pressure of the atmosphere upon every square foot of the earth amounts to 2,160 pounds. An ordinary sized man, supposing his surface to be 14 square feet, sustains the enormous pressure of 30,240 pounds.

Heat rarifies air to such an extent that it may be made to occupy 5 or 500 times the space it did before.

The violence of the expansion of *water* when freezing is sufficient to cleave a globe of copper of such thickness as to require a force of 28,000 pounds to produce the same effect.

During the conversion of *ice* into water, 140 degrees of heat are absorbed.

Water when converted into steam, increases in bulk 1,800 times.

One hundred pounds of water in the *Dead Sea* contains 45 pounds of salt.

The explosive force of closely confined *Gunpowder* is six and a half tons to the square inch.

Hailstones sometimes fall with a velocity of 113 feet in a second.

Rain, 34 feet in a second.

The greatest artificial *Cold* ever produced is 91 degrees Farenheit.

Electricity moves with a greater velocity than light, which traverses 200,000 miles of space in a second of time.

Thunder can be heard at the distance of 30 miles.

Lightning can be seen, by reflection, at the distance of 200 miles.

A smooth sea never made a skilful mariner. Neither do uninterrupted prosperity and success qualify man for usefulness or happiness. The storms of adversity, like the storms of the ocean, rouse the faculties, and excite the invention, prudence, skill and fortitude of the voyager.

A celebrated physician, boasting at dinner that he cured his own hams, one of his guests observed, "Doctor, I would sooner be your ham than your patient."

Sagacity of Animals.—Plutarch, an ancient writer of great celebrity, informs us, that the Thracians, when they were to pass a frozen river, used to turn a fox loose upon the ice; it being customary with this cautious and cunning beast, to move very warily on such a dangerous surface, holding his ear toward the ice, so that if he had heard the surface crack, or the water flowing beneath, he might retreat in season; but if he perceived no danger, he would proceed boldly to the opposite shore!

The same writer gives the following wonderful instance of sagacity in a dog, of which he was an eye-witness. Being on shipboard, he observed a dog very busy about a jar, that was apparently half full of oil, which the dog in vain endeavoured to reach. However, the seamen being busily engaged, the creature took up successively a number of stones, and dropped them one by one, into the jar till the oil rose high enough in the jar, when he took of it as much as he pleased! "I was astonished," says Plutarch, "how the dog could possibly know that the immersion of heavier substances would cause the lighter substance to ascend."

Cowardice in the Soldier.—It is perhaps needless to observe, that it is scarcely in the power of an individual foot soldier to perform any enterprising feat in the field of action, unless he be on some detached duty in front, such as is frequently the case with the skirmishers. Winchester Cathedral.—What think you of our New World eyes seeing the sarcopagi containing the bones of the old Saxon Kings—the Ethelreds and Ethelwolves, and of Canute the Dane; the tombs of William Rufus and of William Wickham; the chair in which Bloody Mary sat at her nuptial ceremony; besides unnumbered monuments and chapels built by Kings and Bishops; to say nothing of some of the best art of our own time, sculpture by Flaxman and Chantrey. Their details were lost upon us in the effect of the great whole, the long-drawn aisles, the windows with their exquisite coloring, the lofty vault, the carved stones, the pillars and arches—those beautiful Gothic arches. Its long-buried dead, or rather its dim spectres, appear with all the freshness of actual life. A miracle is wrought on poetry and painting. While they represented what we had never seen, they were but shadows to us—a kind of magic mirrors, showing false images: now they seem a divine form for the perpetual preservation of the beautiful creations of nature and art.

The completeness of nearly every thing in England, especially of the houses and concomitants of the wealthy, also struck the strangers mightily.—Miss Sedgwick's "*Letters from Abroad*."

Genius.—It is interesting to notice how some minds seem almost to create themselves. Nature seems to delight in disappointing the as-

sidiuities of art, with which it would rear legitimate dulness to maturity; and to glory in the vigour and luxuriance of her chance productions. She scatters the seeds of genius to the winds, and though some may perish among the stony places of the world, and some may be checked by the thorns and brambles of early adversity, yet others will now and then strike root even in the clefts of the rock, and spread over their sterile birth-place in all the beauties of vegetation.

It is curious to imagine those people of the world, busy in thought, turning their eyes toward the countless spheres that shine above us, and making them reflect the only images their minds contain. To the money hoarder, and the mass of worldly folk, the whole great Universe above glitters with sterling coin, fresh from the mint, coming always between them and heaven, turn where they may. But, notwithstanding the surpassing interest which attaches itself to Scripture localities, *very few*, even of the most remarkable places mentioned in the Bible, *have ever been delineated*. The few wretched engravings which occur in books of Travels, convey a very inadequate idea of the places which they are intended to represent.
