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

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ECLIPSES OF 1847.

There will be four Eclipses this year, two of the Sun, and two of the Moon, in the manner following :-

I. The first will be a very Partial Eclipse of the Moon, on Wed nesday, March, 31st day; but it will be wholly invisible to us;-It will begin at 3h. 43m. even.; eclipse 8, 4h, 371 m.; middle, 4h. 50m.; end, 5h. 50m.; duration, 2h. 7m.; and digits eclipsed, 3º 24' on @'s northern limb. At Melinda, on the eastern coast of Africa, she will be in the zenith at the middle.

II. The second will be a Total Eclipse of the Sun, on Thursday, April 15th day, o at 1h. 41m. 20s., mean time, in the morn.; invisible to us; Moon's lat 32m. 21s. S. descending, or increasing

south. This Eclipse will be central, on the Meridian, in the Indian Ocean, nearly midway between the Island of Mauritius and New Holland, at 1h. 21m. of our time. And a Partial Eclipse will be visible at the Cape of Good Hope.

III. The third will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, on Friday, September, 34th day, but not visible at all in our hemisphere:—
It will begin at 8h. 43m. morn.; ecliptic, 8, 9h. 45m.; middle, 9h. 54m.; end 11h. 1m.; duration, 2h. 18m.; and digits eclipsed, 5° 15' on G's southern limb. At the middle, she will be in the zenith near Matthias, on the northerly coast of New Guinea.

IV. The fourth will be an Annular Eclipse of the Sun, on Saturday, October 9th day, 6 at 4h. 26m. 8s., mean time, in the morn.; but not visible in our vicinity; Moon's lat. 31/25" N. ascending, or increasing north. This Eclipse will be central, on the Meridian, at Bassorah, on the Euphrates, near the Persian Gulf, at 3h. 59\mathbb{m} morn. our time. [Near Bassorah was the Garden of Eden and the birthplace of Man.] It will also be Annular in many parts of Europe.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS OF 1847.

The Planet Venus (Q) will be the Evening Star till October 3d; then Morning Star to the end of the year.—Mars (3) will be Morning Star till October 31st; then Evening Star to the end of the year.—Jupiter (21) will be Evening Star till June 20th; then Morning Star to the end of the year.—Saturn (b) will be Evening Star till February 22; then Morning Star till September 2d; then Evening Star to the end of the year.

Machias Seal Island Lights, distant about 13 miles, W. by N. 4 N.

Note.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about eight miles, lies a dangerous breaker called the Roaring Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.—The red glass having been removed from the Lantern, there is now a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute.—The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, were put into operation in 1832—they were elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American)—the following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.

Gannet Rock Light E. by S. 4 S. 13 miles.

" Southern Head of Grand Manan, I'. by N. 1 N.

Northern Head of Grand Manan. N. E. & E.
N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. F. by N.

Little River Head, N. by W.

" Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing into the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan, and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed white light

light.

Point Le Preau Lights. -Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, and distant 25 feet.—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. In consequence of orders from the

Home Government, this Light was, in 1840, painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally, in order that it may be

seen more distinctly at a distance.

Partridge Island Light.—This light, at the entrance of the River and Harbonr of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes,

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar, i which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade

Light House on the Island of St. Pierre and Miqueton.—This Light House is situated upon a bluff, called "Gallautry Head"—just above Cape Noir—on the southern part of the Island of St. Pierre. The light is a fixed one, and is clevated at 64 French motres—equal to 210 English feet—above high water mark, and it is calculated may be seen at a distance of 19 or 20 miles.

The light will be seen at sen from W. N. W. to N. N. E., six degrees East by compass in passing by the South. It will be shut in by the highlands of St. Pierre, from N. N. E. six degrees East, to W. N. W., by compass passing to the North. North latitude, 43 45.50; West longitude from the Meridian of Paris, 63 30 60.

SIGNALS

Displayed at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John:

One ball close, for one square-rigged Vessel.
One ball half hoisted for two ditto.
Two Balls close, for three Vessels.
Two Balls separated, for four ditto.
A Pendant of any colour, for five ditto.
A ditto under a Ball, for six ditto.
A ditto over a Ball half hoisted, for seven ditto.

A ditto under two Balls close, for eight ditto.
A ditto between two Balls separate, for nine ditto.
A Flag of any colour, for ten or more ditto.

The above are displayed at the East or West yard arm, according to the direction in which the Vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their kie can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast head, in the following order

A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.

with a Red Pendant over, for a two-deckerwith a Blue Pendent over, for a Frigatewith a white ditto for a small armed vessel.

A blue Pendant for a Merchant Ship.

A red ditto, for a Merchant Brig. A white and blue ditto, for a Foreign Vessel.

A white ditto, (without a ball,) for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.

A blue Flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.

A Red Flag pierced White, for a Steamboat from Digby.

A Red Flag with a White square, for a Steamboat from E

A Red Flag with a White square, for a Steamboat from Boston.

A Ball at the mast head, Vessel is on Shore or in distress.

Should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In foggy weather a gun will be fired from Partridge Island, in return for each heard at sea. There is a Fog Bell on the Island, which is rung in foggy weather, to warn vessels of their approach to the shore. Should a vessel require a Pilot her descriptive Pendant will be displayed at a yard arm in the place of a Ball.

CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John-passed July, 1835.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British or Foreign Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored, or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head. bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance—From Point LePreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sexpence per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan—or North Channel as aforesaid—to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, Eight Shillings and Ninepence per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Ten. Shillings per foot.

HARBOUR MASTER'S FEES.

On Vessels of 30 Tons and under 50, 2s. 6d.; Vessels of 50 Tons and under 75, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150 and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200 and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300 and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; Decked Vessels, under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British Vessels under that tonnage trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from Ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any Port in Nova Scotia, to pay tons, 5s.; over 30 and under 50 tons, 10s.

RATES OF WHARFAGE.

Under Provincial Law, 5 Vic., cap. 49.

For every Decked vessel, or Wood Boat, of 40 \ 1s. 6d. per day.

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From 100 to 400, 6d. for each twenty tons; from 400 to 450 tons, 11s. 3d.; and for every 50 tons additional, 1s. 3d.

RATES OF SLIPPAGE AT THE ORPORATION SLIPS. All Decked Vessels, same rates as for Wharfage; Wood Boats—Three half-pence for every Ton burthen, and allowed to remain six days each trip, for the purpose of discharging: if they remain longer to pay One Penny per ton additional for each day. No Boat to remain longer than twenty days.

RATES OF FERRIAGE,

Between St. John and Carleton—from Ferry Landing at the foot of Princess street to the Landing at the end of Rodney street, in Carleton—and to the Landing at Sand Point, called Steam Ferry.

Every grown person, 3d.; Children under 14 years of age, 13d.; every Horse, 3d.; every Ox, Cow, or other large animal, 4d.; every Calf, Swine, Sheep, Lamb, or Goat, 1d.; every Waggon, Cart, Sled, Carriage, or other Vehicle, (loaded or not loaded with goods) usually drawn by cattle. 3d.; every Hand Cart, Sled, or Wheelbarrow, 1d.; every Barrel, 13d.; every Pipe, Hogshead, or Puncheon, 9d.; every Cask of Lime, 3d.; every Firkin, Keg, or Small Box, not exceeding in size a Firkin, 1d.; Grain, Salt, Potatoes, Turnips, or Vegetables, usually sold by the bushel, per bushel, &d.; Iron, Steel, Copper, and the like, per cwt. 1d. And the rates of Ferriage for the Short Ferry, so called, and also for Ferriage across the Steam Ferry, so called, when the Steamer is lying by to clean boilers, or other circumstances preventing the plying of the Steam Ferry Boat, as follow, viz.:— Foot Passengers, 3d.; Two Horses, with Waggon or Stage. 2s. 6d.; One Horse and Gig, Sleigh, Sled, Cart, or Waggon, 1s 6d.; an Ox, Horse, or Cow, 1s.; a Swine, 5d.; a Sheep, 4d.; a Barrel of Flour, 3d.; a Keg of Powder, 3d.

RATES AT THE PUBLIC WEIGHING MACHINES.

Every L oad not exceeding 1000 lbs. weight, One Shilling; and One Penny for everyadditional cwt.; payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

PUBLIC PORTERS AND HAND CART MEN.

For loading, carrying, and housing any goods, or any other articles, on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slipin King's and Queen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several Five districts, the rates of prices are as follow:—For the first district 3d; second district 3d; third district 4d.: fourth district 4d.; fifth district, 5d.

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The First District to comprise all that part of the City between the south line of Pond street and north line of Duke street, which lies to the westward of the East line of Mill street, Dock street, and that part of Prince William street situated between the north line of the brick building belonging to Mr. James K. M'Kee, (rorthward of the Market square.) and the north line of Duke street, and including King street, to the westward of the west line of Germain street.

Second District to comprise all that part of the City between the north line of Union street and south line of Saint James' street, which lies without or beyond the First District, to the westward of the east line of Charlotte street.

Third District to comprise all that part of the City, which lies without or beyond the Second District, to the westward of the east line of Sidney street.

Fourth District to comprise all that part of the City lying without or beyond the Third District, to the westward of the East line of Carmarthen street.

Fifth District to comprise all that part of the City lying without or beyond the Fourth District.

Observations—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to midday or noon, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening shiring six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the cond is concerned, the observer should be within sight of a good rane, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.

AGRICULTURE, &c.

MANURE -If public opinion can be excited upon the subject of manure-if our farmers generally will pay that attention to the subject its importance demands, we may expect that great changes will ere long take place in our agriculture.

Whatever prejudice may say to the contrary, science should certainly lend its aid in the business of making and managing manure.

Now indeed, every farmer may, if he will, avail himself of the advantages of science. The question may be asked, what is science? Is it not what reason and experience have taught mankind? To explore, to examine, and to find out the intimate nature of the substances with which the farmer has to do, is the business of science. Agriculture is a science which is at once theoretical and practical. Now the philosopher by dint of thinking or reasoning may make new discoveries or form new theories-to ascertain whether these are really useful or not, we must submit them to the test of experiment. Science indeed may suggest that the muck or mud, and peat of our swamps, if applied to the soil will increase its productiveness. Science may suggest the idea that these substances in a raw state may possess a certain acidity, a kind of sourness, unfriendly to vegetation. Bring these theories to the test of experiment, and what experience pronounces to be true, the most sceptical will not question, and the most unlettered man in the country may avail himself of the advantages of science.

Mix these substances properly with barn yard manure, with ashes or lime, and if this will destroy the acidity and render these valuable for manure, and if repeated experiments demonstrate the fact, the most sceptical will not cavil, and the most unlearned will ac-

knowledge science to be his benefactor.

When we consider the vast amount of materials for mapure to be found in our swamps, pond-holes, and other places, we are asto-

nished that so little attention is paid to the subject.

Every load of manure which a farmer procures is of lasting advantage, not only to himself but to his posterity. Manure increases vegetable growth, which also adds to the manure heap, and it is easy enough to see that the effects will be felt for consecutive ages.

That plants derive a part of their support from the atmosphere is a fact which remains undisputed. Matter is continually passing from the earth into the air, which makes a considerable part of the food of plants. Now in fact what is drawn from the atmosphere by the leaves of plants and ploughed into the soil is clearly gained. The farmer need not regret the loss of a crep—he should consider the amount of fertility added to the soil as a part of his annual income. It has often been asserted that farmers cultivate too much land-ten acres skilfully cultivated will certainly yield more net profits than twenty acres poorly managed. Now let every farmer, who practices running over land, appropriate a few acres for the purpose of ploughing in some crop to enrich his soil, apply the same amount of manure to the remainder, and in a few years he will see the result.

Suppose that a farmer will appropriate a few acres of Again.

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his mowing lands for the same purpose, or suppose he will be persuaded to turn over a few acres of his grass stubble immediately after haying, or say in dull weather before he has completed haying, seed with fresh grass seed, use the harrow and coller, &c. Do not neglect to plough one acre of the cow pasture each year. Now it has been often a question whether farming can be rendered a profitable business in our country. It can be most certainly rendered a profitable business if our farmers can possess the requisite qualities. Knowledge and industry are two great necessary qualifies for a good farmer. Agricultural works are the best means which can be employed to convey useful knowledge to the people, and by industry we could understand not only a diligent attention to business, but energy to put into execution such schemes as may be suggested.

To prevent depredations by Hawks.—One or more guinea hensin a flock of fowls, it is said, will effectually prevent molestation from hawks.

Cabbage.—This vegetable requires a light, rich, and rather moist soil. The seed may be sown about the middle of May, either in a bed for transplanting, or where they are intended to grow. The transplanting should be done when the ground is light, just before a shower, or in cloudy, moist weather, but never when the ground is wet and heavy. Before transplanting, dip the roots into a mixture made of rich mould and water. They should be hoed often while young, at least twice a week; the best time for hoeing is when the dew is on If lice should appear on the plants, wet them with a strong decoction of tobacco, put on with a small brush, or rubbed on with the hand. Cabbage should be secured before very cold weather, and their roots buried in the dirt; but never let them rot in a cellar under your dwelling house, unless you wish to destroy the health of your family.

Preservation of Herbs.—Every diligent housekeeper should have a complete stock of herbs before the frost places them beyond her reach. Many of these are invaluable for the little necessities that occur from time to time, while the green plants are hoarded in the earth not to be come at till another season. When gathered and dried in the shade, they should be carefully packed away beyond the reach of vermin, dampness or other injury, and the fragrant herbs should be closely sealed up in jars, air tight boxes, or paper bags, to retain their odour.

Cure for Warts in Horses and Cattle.—A strong wash made of pearlash and water, applied thrice a day, will remove tumours and warts.

Candles.—Prepare your wicks about half the usual size, wet with spirits of turpentine, put them in the sun until dry, and then mould or dip your candles. Candles thus made last longer and give a much clearer light. In fact they are nearly or quite equal to sperm, in

KEEPING POTATOES SOUND .- We have had occasion to commend the practice of keeping potatoes through the winter in heaps, out of doors, by using an abundance of straw and but a moderate quantity of earth as a covering. We have repeatedly known heaps of 60 or 70 bushels, covered with a compact layer of straw one foot thick, only a few inches of dirt outside, to endure the winter and early spring without the loss of a peck. In a late experiment of the writer, a heap thus covered wintered through with the loss of not half a peck, although a large portion of the same crop which was removed to the cellar was lost by the rot; and at the same time that many neighbors lost three quarters of their potatoes buried in the usual way, that is with only a few inches of straw under a foot of earth. It will be perceived at a glance that the mode here proposed secures in an eminent degree, sufficient protection from frost, dryness, and ventilation. All potatoes in heaps, when buried early in autumn, should be kept constantly well ventilated by a hole and The mass of rotten potatoes, so usually whisp straw in the top found at the apex of the heap, and usually attributed to freezing, is more frequently the result of foul confined air, rising in the top.

To prevent Hay stacks from taking fire—When there is any reason to fear that the hay which is intended to be housed or stacked, is not sufficiently dry, it is only necessary to scatter a few handfuls of common salt (muriate of soda) between each layer. The salt by absorbing the humidity of the hay not only prevents the fermentation and consequent inflammation of it, but it also adds, a taste to its forage, which stimulates the appetites of cattle, and preserves them from many diseases.

Protecting Trees from Mice.—A correspondent of the Gardener's Chronicle, mixes soot and milk till of the consistency of thick paint, and then applies it to the trees with a brush. This, applied once a year, he finds effectual protection against hares and rabbits. Would it not be equally so against mice!

The Borer in Apple Trees.—W. Buckminster, at an agricultural meeting at the State House, Boston, stated that the borer, which is a fly in its perfect state, lays ten eggs on the tree near the ground; that they hatch young worms and enter the bark the first year; the next they eat into the wood and ascend; and the third, come out and change to the perfect insect. He says the best remedy is to wash the trees with strong lye in July, after the eggs are laid and before the worms have buried themselves in the bark.

To take spots or stains out of Linen.—Take the juice of lemon and red onion mixed together, put to it a little gum sanderach, and crumbs of stale white bread; heat these gently over a fire, and then dip the part that is stained often in it; let it then dry, and get in readiness a hot lather of soap and water, to wash it immediately; and doing so, in two or three washings it will quite disappear.

Remedies against Fleas.—Fumigation with brimstone, or the fresh leaves of penny-royal sewed in a bag, and laid on a bed, will have the desired effect.

Glass Milk Pans .- Why can't we have glass milk pans in this country? They are being introduced in the English dairies, and are much liked. They are said to be much more easily cleaned than pans of any other materials, and are so strong that they will bear a very severe blow without breaking The only objection to them is their cost, which, on account of duties, is rendered high. We suppose they might be afforded cheaply in this country .--American Paper.

To take out Pitch, Wax, Rosin or Tar .- If any of these happen on a garment, either silk, linen, or woollen, pour a little oil af turpentine on the place, and let it soak in about half an hour; then rub it, but not too hard; and you will find the turpentine has soaked out the glutinous quality, so that it will crumble out like small bits of dry dirt.

To take out Ink stains, Stains with Fruit &c .- Take half and ounce of powder of allum, two ounces of the juice of house-leek senugreen, and apply them, the allum being dissolved very hot.

An excellent Receipt to mend China.—Take the white of two eggs, half an ounce of quick lime beaten to powder, a drachm of the powder of burnt flint, and the like quantity of gum sandrick; temper them together, and moisten it with some lemon juice; then with a feather anoint the edge of the broken vessel, and put the pieces together by a warm fire; and if your hand is steady, the fracture will hardly be discerned. Or you may use white lead and oil, such as painters use.

To polish Icory. -Ivory is polished with putty water, by means of a rubber made of hat, which in a short time produces a fine gloss.

To destroy Bugs.-1. Take oil of turpentine, and with a brush wash over the bedstead and the nail holes, chinks, &c , it will kill both bugs and knits.

2. Rub the bedstead with verdigris ground in linseed and turpentine oil, and the bugs will not harbour.

3. Take common oil, or water, in which boil wormwood and rue till the water is near consumed, then strain it, and mix with it a good quantity of grease, of which making an ointment, rub the chinks and joints of the bedstead with it.

Earthquakes at Lima, Peru.—On an average of a dozen years, fifty shocks are annually felt. most of which occur in the latter half of Oclober, in November, December, January, May and June—January is the worst month, during which, in many years, scarcely a day passes without convulsions of this kind. The terrible earthquakes that play such havoc with the city, come at intervals from forty to sixty years: since the west coast of South America is known to Europeans, the following are the dates: 1586, 1630, 1687, 1712, 1746, 1806; always two in a century. It is greatly to be feared that ten more years will not elapse without Lima being again visited by one of these awful calamities. Dr. Tschndi gives a brief account of the carthquake of 1746. It was on the 28th of October, St. Simon and St Jude's day, that at 31 minutes past 10 P. M., the earth shook with a fearful bellowing noise, and in an instant the whole of Lima was a heap of mins. Noise, earthquake, and destruction were all the affair of one moment. The few buildings which resisted the first shock were thrown down by a regular horizontal motion of the earth, which succeeded it, and lasted four minutes. Out of more than three thousand houses, only twenty-one remained uninjured. Nearly all the public buildings were overthrown. At the port of Callao the destruction was more complete; for scarcely was the earthquake over, when the sea arose with a mighty rushing sound, and swallowed up both town and inhabitants. In an instant five thousand human beings became the prey of the waters. The Spanish corvette San Fermin, which lay at anchor in the harbour, was hurled far over the walls of the fortress, and stranded at more than five hundred yards from the shore. A cross marks the place where she struck. Three heavily laden merchantmen met the same fate, and nineteen other vessels foundered. The town had disappeared, and travellers have related however, even now, when the sky is bright and the sea is still, the houses and churches may be dimly seen through the transparent waters.

Beauty.—There is something in beauty, whether it dwells in the human face, in the pencilled leaves of flowers, the sparkling surface of a fountain, or that aspect which genius breathes over its statue, that makes us mourn its ruin. I should not envy that man his feelings, who could see a leaf wither or a flower fall, without some sentiment of regret. This tender interest in the beauty and frailty of things around us, is only a slight tribute of becoming grief and affection; for nature, in our adversities, never deserts us. She even comes more nearly to us in our sorrows, and leading us away from the paths of disappointment and pain into her spothing recesses, allays the anguish of our bleeding hearts, binds up the wounds that have afflicted, whispers the meck pledges of a better hope, and, in harmony with a spirit of still holier birth, points to that home where decay and death can never come.


