ANNUAL REPORT,

1856.

The Annual Meeting of this Society was held in the City Hall, on Friday, the 20th February, 1857.

J. D. Humphreys, Vice President, presided.

The Annual Report for 1856, was read as follows:—

REPORT.

In resigning their trust, the Committee of Management of this Society have much pleasure in being able to congratulate their fellow members on its steady progress and encouraging prospects. If during the past year no extraordinary results have to be recorded, it is satisfactory to know that the Society's operations have been silently improving and extending, its exhibitions attended by an increased number of visitors; and by greater zeal and united effort in bringing its important claims before a discerning and patriotic public, there can be little doubt of its more rapid advancement and prosperity for the future.

The first exhibition was held in the St. Lawrence Hall, on the 21st of May, a period which, considering the lateness of the season, was a fortnight too early to allow of an extensive display of flowers and vegetables. The consequence was that several of the more important premiums offered were not competed for. The collection of geraniums was very inferior, compared with previous years, and afforded no proper idea of the

state of perfection to which this extensive and beautiful class of plants is brought by our gardeners and amateurs. Unfortunately the attractive class of tulips and other bulbous plants were not, for the reason before stated, sufficiently advanced to be shewn at all. This occasioned a marked deficiency; and had it not been for a number of articles sent in for sale, the display of flowering plants would have been meagre in the extreme.

In Fruit but little could be expected at so early a period. There were, however, several dishes of apples in excellent condition, and of first-rate quality—indicating the appreciation of the successful culture of this invaluable class of fruits.

As might be expected, the display of Vegetables was not extensive, but many of the articles were of superior quality, testifying to the skill and care of their producers. In potatoes, cauliflowers and cabbage, there were some very fine specimens; also, cucumbers, radishes, and salads.

Your Committee are of opinion that, considering the variableness of our Springs, and the uncertainty of the weather, it is not expedient to hold the Spring Exhibition before the end of May or beginning of June.

The Summer Exhibition took place on the 10th of July. It attracted a large number of visitors, and was extensive and highly satisfactory.

In the Flower Department the show of Fuschias was quite superior. Among plants recently introduced, some were very fine—such as the Hoya Bella, Exora Coccinea, Stephanotis Floribunda, Allamanda Neriflora, Clerodendron Fragrans, Manettia Glabra, Ardisia Crenulata, and several others. The collection of roses, if

not very numerous, contained several excellent specimens, among which may be mentioned the Tea, Bourbon, Hybrid China, Hybrid Perpetual, Moss Roses, &c. Quite an extensive collection of bedding-out plants made a fine display, such as Verbenas, Petunias, Scarlet Geraniums, Heliotropes, &c. In herbaccous plants there were some very fine specimens of Phloxes, and other choice productions of the garden, as Delphinium Grandiflora, Double White Rocket, Double Campanula, Aconitum Variegata, Double Lychnis, &c.

In Annual and Biennial Flowers several splendid specimens were shown, such as some fine varieties of Sweet William, Antirrhinums, and general collections of Annuals.

Among Shrubs may be mentioned some fine specimens of the beautiful Weigela Rosea, Deutzia Gracilis, Spireas, Syringas, &c.

The collection of our principal Wild Plants, botanically named, was highly interesting, and by no means devoid of instruction, shewing that our Canadian Flora comprises a large number of beautiful specimens, which would be more highly prized if they were less common. A collection of dried native plants, prepared and exhibited by a lady, was much admired.

The Vegetable Department was extensive, and comprised many excellent specimens of the leading varieties, such as cauliflower, cabbage, potatoes, peas, turnips, cucumbers, celery, with other kinds of less note.

Among the Fruits may be mentioned as superior specimens, several varieties of the melon and strawberry; of the latter Hovey's Seedling, Alice Maud, the Boston Pine, and McEvoy's Superior, were large and of excellent quality. There were also a few specimens of exceedingly well grown gooseberries, which, in this climate, indicate both skill and care in their production.

The Autumnal Show was held September 11th, in the usual place, and was the most successful of any of the season. In all the departments the display of flowers was very good. Amongst the new kinds of plants recently introduced that attracted much notice and were deservedly commended, may be instanced the following: Cissus Discolor, Cole's Blumii, Cactus Triangularis, (in bloom;) Gloxineas, Achemenes, Pentas Carnea, Justicia Carnea, Adamia Versicolor, Torenia Asiatica, Lycopodium Coccineum, Begonia Prestonensis, Gesnerias, &c.

The display of Garden Flowers was very attractive, and in the following varieties the show was excellent: Verbenas, China Asters, Balsams, Double Stocks, Petunias, Hollyhocks, Pansies, &c. In consequence of the extreme dry weather of the two preceding months, the Dahlias were but indifferent. On the tables were several beautiful bouquets and floral ornaments. The effect of the whole was highly pleasing.

In Vegetables the show was eminently successful, and the numerous and superior specimens exhibited evinced at once the skill of the cultivators, and the suitableness of the soil and climate of this portion of the Province to these indispensable productions. In this respect we need not fear a comparison with any district of North America. Cauliflowers of the best quality were shown of great size—some weighing as much as eight pounds each. Cabbages were equally good, and the same may be said of beets, parsnips, carrots, turnips, potatoes, onions, &c.

The display of Fruit was not so extensive, nor perhaps the quality equal to what it would have been under more favourable circumstances. The extreme severity of the preceding winter, greatly affected most kinds of fruit trees over a large portion of this continent. As a consequence no Peaches grown in the open air were exhibited; the only specimens of this delicious fruit had been produced under glass. Plums were also scarce, from the same cause, and also from the effects of the curculio, which seems to be spreading its ravages in this section of country, as well as in most others. There were several excellent specimens of hot-house Grapes, and some produced in the open air that were highly creditable to the grower. Melons were very fine. Of that most important fruit-the Apple, there were several very good specimens, but the cause before stated, had operated against this fruit; and likewise the Pear, of which, however, there were a few creditable specimens on exhibition. Our prospects for fruit, seem from one cause or another, anything but brightfor, perhaps, some years to come; the extreme cold winters and the increase of insect depredation, operating most injuriously on this important department of Horticultural pursuits.

Your Committee are desirous of expressing their conviction, that notwithstanding the progress already made, the Horticultural Society has not yet received from the citizens of Toronto, and those actually engaged in the pursuit of gardening, that degree of encouragement to which it is most indisputably entitled. Horticulture, it should be remembered, supplies us with several of the necessaries, as well as many of the luxuries of life, and exerts in every community in which it

is practised and encouraged, a powerful influence in refining the taste, beautifying the abodes, and promoting the civilization of mankind. When it is considered what an important part Horticultural productions occupy in supplying the daily wants, and ministering to the higher tastes and gratifications of every comfortable and well ordered family, a Society whose object it is to foster and improve that beautiful and important art, must offer a strong claim to a hearty and general support.

In connection with these remarks, your Committee cannot conclude this very imperfect sketch of the past year's proceedings without urging, in the most earnest manner, the great desirableness of enabling their successors in office to avail themselves of the munificent offer of permanent grounds, free of charge, from the esteemed and patriotic President of the Society. These grounds are very eligibly situated and admirably adapted to the proposed purpose. If the present opportunity of possessing a beautiful site for the erection of a suitable exhibition building, in the midst of ornamental grounds, should from apathy, or any other cause, be neglected, the like, in all probability, will never occur again. Your Committee, aided by a few gentlemen who feel a deep interest in the project, have already made a commencement, and what now remains is to take prompt and vigorous measures for effectually carrying the object your Committee would fain believe, cannot fail of receiving adequate support from the citizens of this rapidly advancing city, when it shall be fully brought before them. And we shall be proud to see Mr. Allan's name and munificence thus associated, among other noble objects of his native city, with the refining and health-imparting influences of Horticultural Grounds, in accordance with the improved tastes and habits of the present age.

Your Committee has much pleasure in referring to the deep interest which Mr. Sootheran (of the Bank of British North America,) has evinced in reference to this object, that gentleman having generously contributed a very handsomely finished plan of the projected building and garden for the consideration of the Society.

Mr. Sootheran will be happy to explain the scheme of the proposed plan to any one interested in the object.
