# ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1862

OF THE

#### COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

# Toronto Korticultural Society.

Your Committee in resigning their trust for the past year, would respectfully lay before the meeting the following

#### REPORT:

Although labouring under serious financial embarrassments during the past year, the Directors of the Toronto Horticultural Society, and Botanical Gardens, cannot but regard their operations during the year as highly encouraging. They have accomplished one great object in the establishment of the Society: the promotion of social enjoyment, and agreeable recreation.

Not only have the ordinary exhibitions been well attended, but large numbers of persons have been induced to frequent the Gardens during the summer months; thus acknowledging by their presence the claims of the Society to general support.

Much of this increased popular appreciation of the advantages of the Society's Gardens, as a place of recreation is due to the periodical presence of the admirable Band of H. M. Both Regiment; to the favourable notices of the press generally; and to the labours of the Managing Committee in charge of the Grounds.

The Directors cannot but express a hope, that the efforts made by them may have a beneficial influence in promoting horticultural pursuits, and induce those who have hitherto paid little or no attention to this important subject (and whose general excuse is that they have no home facilities for the cultivation of flowers) to take every opportunity of visiting so favourable a spot for creating a taste, which circumstances might prevent them from developing elsewhere.

The Directors have to record with much pleasure the general liberality of many friends of the Society; to the President and first Vice-President for Silver Medals; and to several individual Directors for Prizes to compete for, their best thanks are due; while to Messrs. Ellwanger & Barry, of Rochester, they are under obligations for a most valuable donation of trees.

The Directors, in presenting their Report of the various Exhibitions, are happy to say that in some respects they were superior to those of former years. The May Exhibition is more particularly worthy of notice, for the beauty and variety of the plants and flowers exhibited; they were all well grown, indicating great care in their culture and management.

The Directors are satisfied that the policy

which has been adopted, in offering Prizes for new and rare Plants, &c., has been eminently successful, and would recommend that it should be continued as a means of introducing new and valuable plants, &c.

With a view of encouraging the cultivation of Strawberries and of drawing the attention of the public generally to the growth of that delicious fruit, the Directors individually offered Prizes to be competed for at a special Exhibition; the fruit on this occasion was unusually large, some of the berries measuring five and-a-half inches in circumference, but much disappointment was felt at the small number of entries; and the Directors trust that not only the gardeners, but private individuals, will in future take greater interest in this branch of horticulture, and shew what can be done in the cultivation of this favourite as well as profitable fruit, so well adapted to our climate.

At the July Exhibition a plant was exhibited (Wilson's Albany) that had (390) good sized berries on it; nearly all the fine varieties in cultivation have been introduced here, and are found to maintain their character for productiveness and flavour.

The display of Hot-house Grapes at the September Exhibition was unusually fine, some of the bunches weighing from 43 to 47% oz., those more particularly worthy of notice were specimens of Muscat of Alexandria, several varieties of Black Hamburgh, Chasselas Musque, White Assyrian, White Frontignae, and several other fine varieties, all remarkably well grown, and in such perfec-

tion that your Directors have no hesitation in giving it as their opinion, that European Grapes can be grown as well in Canada, under glass, as in any other country; this fact is now being fully appreciated if we may judge from the number of vineries that have been erected in Toronto and vicinity within the last few years. Next season, we may expect a greater competition, in the production of this delicious fruit, than has heretofore taken place.

Pears of all the leading varieties have been exhibited largely in excess of former years; and it is satisfactory to find that this valuable fruit can be grown to such perfection here, now that the cultivation on the dwarf stock has been fully tested, and their economy in small gardens has proved so satisfactory, we may expect that this favourite fruit will receive a greater degree of attention than formerly. The high price they generally command in our markets cannot fail to be remu-

nerative to the producer.

Apples, in almost endless variety, were exhibited at the September Show, and of such superior growth that we can safely state we have never seen finer specimens in any country: the excellence of Canadian apples is now attracting great attention, and both trees and fruit have been exported to England during the past season.

The Directors cannot close this report without drawing attention to the evil effects arising from two Societies, having nearly the same objects in view, being established within the limits of this city; the consequence is that

neither Society is able to meet its liabilities without great sacrifices on the part either of the Directors or Exhibitors, many of whom have for years relinquished their prizes to enable the Societies to meet their engagements.

This has an injurious effect and should be remedied, it is to be hoped that means will be taken during the ensuing session of Parliament to have the clause (relating to cities) of the Electoral Division Society's Act repealed, so that the Horticultural Societies already established in those cities, may be allowed to draw the government grant on complying with the prescribed conditions.

This would enable the Societies to enlarge the field of their operations, and would be a general benefit to the Province, for it is a striking fact, that at the last Electoral Division Exhibition, held in Toronto, the entries made in Horticultural products were two hundred and sixteen, while in Arts and Manufactures, the entries did not reach half that number.

Before closing the Report, your Directors are sorry to say that on referring to the statement submitted by the Treasurer, it will be found that there is still a considerable sum in arrears, although the greatest economy has been practised by the Directors. It is worthy of remark that the large proportion of the liabilities of the Society had been incurred in providing for the appropriate reception of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. Under such circumstances the Directors trust their successors will not fail to make a special appeal to the liberality and co-operation of the friends of the Society to extricate it from the pressure of these liabilities.

#### RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1st. All Articles entered for competition for the regular Prizes must be bona fide the property of, and grown by the exhibitor.

2nd. In all cases the articles sent in must correspond exactly with the terms of the Prize List, and in case of this rule not being adhered to, the Judges are empowered to withhold the prize.

3rd. No exhibitor can receive a second premium for the same variety of Flowers, Fruits, or Vegetables.

4th. All articles entered for competition must be correctly named and labelled; and all specimens entered under the head of "Plants and Flowers" must be in flower, except Foliage Plants.

5th. The Judges have the power of refusing to recommend any article, which in their opinion is not worthy of a premium.

6th. Any publicly expressed opinion impugning the decision of the Judges, during the Exhibition, shall involve the forfeiture of all prizes of such competition.

7th. While the Judges are making their decisions no person shall be present, except those appointed by the Directors.

8th. No exhibitor shall be allowed to remove any article before the close of the Exhibition, (under penalty of forfeiture of all prizes), unless by written permission of the President, Vice-President, or Secretary.

9th. The Judges are empowered to award a discretionary prize to any particular article they may think deserving of the same, said prize, not to exceed \$1. The money prizes not to exceed nine in number.

10th. No articles can be admitted to competition unless entered in the Secretary's books, and placed on the stands by eleven o'clock on the day of exhibition.

11th. An annual subscription of two dollars constitutes a competing member, enabling the person subscribing to compete for all prizes offered by the Society, and admission, with his family, to the shows.

The above Rules will be strictly enforced.

Donations of any Botanical or Horticultural production will be gladly received, and duly acknowledged in the reports of the Society.
